Family Matters with Amber



Guardrails for the Digital Circle

In 1991, I graduated from a large regional high school where I navigated a physical community of over 2,000 students. My “circle” wasn’t just my graduating class; it crossed age groups and status lines. Quite the social butterfly back then, I ran with a variety of crowds—and some weren’t the best. But even then, the risks were localized. Getting caught in the wrong place was a neighborhood danger. The threats weren’t as accessible as they are today—and neither were we. Now the picket fences are gone, the “bad crowd” is no longer local...it’s in our youth’s pocket 24/7. It encompasses anything from digital scammers to sophisticated predators, all disguised as harmless apps, viral trends, or “friends” three states away who are fellow gamers claiming to be “the same age.”

When I was young, my father kept me on a short leash, and his lectures always sounded like a broken record I couldn’t wait to turn off. I spent years rolling my eyes at those ‘talks’, only to realize they were the exact blueprints I needed once I had my own children. One of Dad’s lessons in particular became a North Star for me: “Who are your kids’ friends?” He followed that with a sobering truth: “Our children’s circle of friends is not just about their social life—it’s their primary influence.” As parents, we’d like to think we are the primary influence. To some degree that is true—until it’s not. Once they reach a certain age, the “circle” takes the wheel.

As a teenager, of course, I didn’t connect those dots. But as a parent, the picture became crystal clear and a focus on my children’s relationships became paramount. It wasn’t about control; it was about understanding who they were choosing and, more importantly, why. Then, it was my job to have the guardrails ready. When they couldn’t see the edges of the road, it was my responsibility to make sure they didn’t veer off the cliff. Now that my children are adults, the fruits of that labor occasionally pop up in my text notifications. One of my daughters recently messaged me about a name from her youth. The young man had

been incarcerated for domestic violence. It was a relief to both of us that he was a distant memory—one we had navigated together—and not a current reality. Even in middle school, his behavior raised red flags for me. At the time, those flags were invisible to my daughter; there was a brief, mutual interest—the kind of adolescent spark that blinds a young girl to the warning signs that a mother sees instantly. This is the inherent vulnerability of youth: our teens only know what they know. They trust because we—their parents and family—have taught them that. It’s a beautiful foundation. But paired with adolescent naivety, it becomes a dangerous blindspot.

Currently, there is a narrative suggesting that teens who fall prey to traps are unintelligent, or that their parents have failed. I couldn’t disagree more. I suspect those casting stones have forgotten their own youth or have never had to raise a child through this modern landscape. I barely made it through myself. You can talk until you’re blue in the face, but you can’t talk a child out of a danger they don’t believe exists. That is why I never worried about being the “unpopular” parent. Eventually given the title “Bada\$\$ Mom” by my kids’ real friends, and gaining the respect of school staff, I relied on my gut instincts and a refusal to look away. I pursued the contents of their phones regularly, used locator apps, and stood my ground when 3:00 AM inappropriate messages pinged on the kitchen countertop “Drop Spot.” Even then, I misstepped sometimes. When I “blinked” it was because I wanted so badly to trust my kids, but those are the moments they fell. We simply do the best we can with the tools we have. In the end, I’d rather face my children’s eyerolling than look back and wish I had done more. You might be teetering on the brink of this parenting cliff yourself. If you are, I have some tips.



Young Campers Discover Hidden Talents

Campers discover hidden talents in many different fine arts camps this summer available at Rabbit Run Community Arts Association (RRCAA) in Madison.

possible on what your child's age group might get involved in or encounter. Stay up to date on new apps (especially hidden ones) and gaming platforms. Learn all the games they play, apps they use, as well as slang used to code what they're talking about.

Shared Passwords: This is about safety as much as it is about transparency. No 'child' should have a locked phone that a parent cannot get into.

The "Drop Spot": Designate a central location (like the kitchen counter) where all devices "sleep" at night. (Hint: When you go to bed, devices go with you. If they need an alarm to wake up, plenty of stores sell those.)

The Truth: Frame your involvement as your "job". Explain that your "work" is a responsibility you have as a parent and that having access and using monitoring tools is the safety net they don't yet realize they need.

Validate the Blindspot: Tell your kids that predators are professionals at being likable. It's not a lack of intelligence; it's a surplus of manipulation.

Ignore the "Stones": Your goal isn't to be the cool parent—it's to be the one who gets your child safely to the other side.

Trust Your Instincts: If your gut says something is off, it is. Your intuition is the most sophisticated monitoring tool you own.

Don't Get Angry, Rather Have Conversations: If (and when) you find questionable content or engagement, do not get angry, accusatory, or give in to the urge to shame your child. The goal is to build trust through communication. Asking questions is key, listening to understand is the other key.

It's a lot of work navigating this current landscape as a parent—but as a wise Uber driver (and fellow parent in the trenches) once told me, if it's not hard work, we're probably not doing it right.

The conversation doesn't end here. If you're feeling overwhelmed, you aren't alone. Visit my blog www.FamilyMatterswithAmber.com where I share deeper stories I couldn't fit here—including three specific times my instincts and proactive guardrails saved my children from genuine harm. Let's keep our kids safe, one red flag at a time.
