

Last year, the district had a net loss of students almost entirely due to increased losses to various charter schools. Aitkin students have attended a number of charter schools over the past, including Minnesota Online High School, Bluesky, Minisinaakwaang Leadership Academy, Emily, Minnesota Transitions and Cyber Village. The number attending any of these schools has ranged from one to six. In 2014/15, the number of students attending Minnesota Transitions rose from 2 in the prior year to 26.

By ANN SCHWARTZ Older school buildings that need work, combined with a state proposal to add pre-kindergarten school days

for 3-5-years-olds spurred the Aitkin School District to take a serious look at its longrange planning to determine its future facility needs.

"We're looking down the road to what our facility needs will be over the next 20-50 years," said Superintendent Bernie Novak in an interview.

To that end, a task force of about 30 community members (see sidebar page 2) has held two meetings and will hold two more (on February 3 and February 17 at 6:30 p.m. at the Aitkin High School Media Center). While these are not public meetings to take public input, they are open meetings, clarified Novak. Anyone who comes will be expected to listen and not contribute as the school board itself is also just listening at this time.

"Do we continue to upgrade and repair our buildings or go in a different direction?" mused Novak.

The board recently put a lot of money into a new boiler for the high school, thinking it was staying put. But even if the final vote is to "do nothing" there is still about \$4 million in roofing, ventilation and other needed repairs to buildings that must be undertaken.

The final outcome could include adding on to Rippleside Elementary or the Aitkin High School, or both, or building a new building

which could be configured as a grade 5-12 building or some other configuration. Right now, all ideas are being considered.

Novak said that one of the major forces that got them thinking about facility upgrades was Gov. Mark Dayton's proposal to add allday prekindergarten classes for 3-5 year olds. Although it didn't pass the last legislative session it is just a matter of time until it passes, said Novak. If it does, they'll need to add on to Rippleside Elementary or make changes elsewhere.

"Nowadays, with two parents in the household working, we find that children are not 100 percent ready for kindergarten," said Novak.

Another, much-needed space at Rippleside is an expansive pick-up and dropoff area for students that is separate from the bus boarding and debarking area. If Rippleside is reconfigured, it is likely that Woock Field -north of the Rippleside school building and now the high school baseball field -- will



confirmed.

One year ago, the community voted against a \$24 million referendum that would have remodeled schools and added an off-site athletic complex. Question 1 requested \$24.2million to fix up the high school and Rippleside Elementary and add an addition to each school. Tax impact would have been \$84 a year on a \$100,000 home; \$211 on a \$200,000 home and \$338 on a \$300,000 home. Tax impact on a \$500,000 commercial industrial property would be \$1,079.

The second ballot question, which could only have passed if the first question passed, asked voters for a \$3.2 million dollar new sports complex. Land would have been purchased and softball and baseball fields, a football field and a track and tennis courts would have been built there, along with a nice building for bathrooms and concessions and adequate parking.

If that question had passed, tax impact would add \$11 to the \$100,000 home; \$28 to the \$200,000 home; \$45 to the \$300,000 home and \$144 to the \$500,000 commercial property.

#### Back to the present: Ideally, to handle the needs

50 years into the future, the board would purchase a parcel of land 60 acres or more in size within a mile of Aitkin. One outcome could be that land is purchased for the future even if a new school is not built now, No-

#### vak advised.

Once the task force completes its work, an important recommendation will be presented to the school board. What are the key components expected from the recommendation?

"It will be whether we remodel our current buildings and stay where we are with more space, or, if we build new, what will it be?" Novak conjectured. "Or do we do nothing but maintain the buildings we have? More than anything, we want the Task Force to develop a strategic long-range plan for our facilities that will take us out 30 years into the future. What will the Aitkin School District look like 30 years from now?"

Proceeds from this event will be donated to the Brainerd Warrior Fishing Team in support of our next generation of anglers. First held in 1991, this event has never been canceled and been postponed only two other times, in 2002 and 2012. The contest was moved to a different lake once in 2006. ## **Request for female WWII pilots to** be buried at Arlington

U.S. Senator Amy Klobuchar is calling on the U.S. Army to allow female World War II pilots to be buried at Arlington National Cemetery (ANC). The Army currently does not permit Women Airforce Service Pilots (WASPs) to be interred at ANC. Klobuchar sent a letter, on January 18, to the Secretaries of Defense and Army requesting that the Army allow the brave women who flew missions during World War II to have their ashes laid to rest

at the cemetery. Minnesota is home to one of the last remaining WASPs. Elizabeth Strofus, a 95 year old native of Faribault, taught male cadets how to fly warplanes and ferried B-17 bombers across the country during World War II,

"During World War II more than 1,000 Women Airforce Service Pilots (WASPs) served in the United States military," Klobuchar wrote. "They test-flew repaired military planes and

trained combat pilots. These brave women shouldn't have to fight for the honor and the privilege they earned to be interred at Arlington National Cemetery. It is my hope that the Department of the Army will not make these heroes fight yet another battle, and I respectfully request that the Army allow these women the opportunity to be interred at Arlington Cemetery if they so choose"

The full text of the senator's letter is available below:

Dear Secretary Carter and Acting Secretary Fanning:

I write to request the Army allow the brave women who flew missions during World War II to have their ashes laid to rest at Arlington National Cemetery.

During World War II more than 1,000 Women Airforce Service Pilots (WASPs) served in the United States military. They test-flew repaired military planes and trained combat pilots. Thirty-eight WASPs died in the line of duty. It took the United States 33 years to grant these courageous women status as veterans and another 25 years for the Army to recognize those contributions with eligibility for burial at Arlington Cemetery Unfortunately, in March of 2015 Secretary McHugh reversed the 2002 directive allowing WASPs to have their ashes interred at Arlington.

I understand Arlington National Cemetery has limited space for burial. However, allowing WASPs to be buried at Arlington would not significantly impact the cemetery's capacity because there are very few WASPs still living. Minnesota is home to one of the last remaining WASPs, Elizabeth Strofus. Ms. Strofus is a 95 year old native of Faribault, Minnesota. After the bombing at Pearl Harbor, Ms. Strofus volunteered to be a gunner pilot but was instead given the job of teaching male cadets how to fly warplanes and ferrying B-17 bombers around the country. Ms. Strofus and the other WASPs served bravely and earned a spot in Arlington. These brave women shouldn't have to fight for the honor and the privilege they earned to be interred at Arlington National Cemetery. It is my hope that the Department of the Army will not make these heroes fight yet another battle, and I respectfully request that the Army allow these women the opportunity to be interred at Arlington Cemetery if they so choose. Thank you for your consideration of this important matter.



By THE OFFICE OF MINNESOTA ATTORNEY GENERAL LORI SWANSON By some estimates, over 85 percent of Americans have a computer in their home. Many computer users do not have the technical knowhow to fix their computers when they break or jam. Scammers—many from other countries—continue to seek to exploit these two facts. "Tech Support" Scams.

Tech support scammers make unsolicited phone calls in which they pretend to be a technician for a reputable, well-known computer or software company. The caller claims your computer has

have the technical knowhow to fix their computers unsolicited phone calls in a virus.

> The scam artist may say that your device will crash or that hackers will steal your information if the issue is not immediately resolved. They do this to get you to act quickly, without researching the caller. The scam artist may ask you to open a program on your computer that logs various activities, such as error and warning messages. While these entries may appear alarming at first glance, they are usually harmless notations that occur during the normal operation of your computer.

After convincing you there is a problem, the scammer claims he can repair your device remotely for a fee. Unsuspecting people may then give the scam artist their credit card or bank account information and remote access to the computer. This is where the trouble begins.

The scammer may use the remote access to perform fake "repairs" or install software that is available for free through other sources. The scammer does this to justify the bogus fee. Other times, scam artists install malware or viruses, which allow them to secretly steal information stored on the computer.

Either way, the end result is this: your device is less secure and the scam artist charges you hundreds or thousands of dollars for services that were unnecessary and useless.

"Ransomware" Scams. If you are on the Internet, you may receive an unexpected pop-up message that freezes access to your computer. The message will ask you to call a telephone number or follow other instructions to un-jam your computer.

If you call, you will be asked to pay the scam artist a fee to unfreeze your computer. In other words, the scammer who jammed your computer asks you to pay him money to unjam it. Paying him money will usually result in requests for even more money.

How to Avoid these Scams.

• If you receive a call from someone who offers technical support, or claims your computer has been hacked or infected with a virus, hang up.

• If you need help with your computer, call the manufacturer or software company at the phone number given to you when you bought the product, or take it to a local company.

• Never give an unknown party remote access to your device.

• If your computer does not have security software, install antivirus, antispyware and antimalware software on your computer. Keep this software up to date.

• Make sure your device's firewall and pop-up blocker are turned on. This will help prevent intrusions and unsafe pop-ups. Turn off your computer when not in use.

• Do not download software from unknown sources or "click" open links, attachments, or images in unsolicited emails, text messages, or popup messages.

## Novice turkey hunters can register for upcoming mentored hunts

On a spring morning, a novice turkey hunter holding a turkey call tries out a newfound skill of imitating the yelp of a turkey hen. From the field edge, gobbling ensues and a dark shape approaches. With the advice of a mentor in mind, the hunter holds still to avoid alerting the curious bird.

Scenes like this play out each spring across Minnesota during mentored turkey hunts that give youth, adults and families opportunities to learn under the guidance of National Wild Turkey Federation (NWTF) volunteers. This year, the mentored hunts take place Saturday, April 16, and Sunday, April 17.

"Novice turkey hunters can gain valuable knowlgain the skills necessary to harvest a bird."

The deadline to apply for the hunts is Monday, Feb. 15, and applications are available at www.mndnr. gov/hunting/turkey.

The hunts for youth, adults and families are open to those who have purchased no more than one turkey license in a previous year and have not harvested a turkey. Hunters must have a valid firearms safety certificate and must be 12 years old on or before April 16. Youth from 12 to 17 must have a parent, guardian or adult authorized by a parent or guardian accompany them for all activities. If there are more applications than available mentors, hunters will be selected in a lottery. A hunt orientation is required and orientations are scheduled at various times and locations around the state. The cost for the orientation ranges from \$5 to \$10. Hunting licenses are free

for 12 year olds; \$5 for ages 13 through 17; and \$26 for hunters 18 and older.

"The DNR and NWTF have cooperated for 14 years on these mentored hunts, and over that time we've introduced thousands to the sport of turkey hunting," Kurre said. "We enjoy hearing about one-time novices completing the circle and returning to the program as mentors for others."

#### Paul Bunyan State Trail to remain open during Highway 371 realignment The Paul Bunyan State Trail No closures of the trail are The Paul Bunyan State Trail

The Paul Bunyan State Trail between Nisswa and Jenkins will remain open during the State Highway 371 North realignment project, but trail users should be cautious near construction activity and check trail conditions before traveling.

Construction crews will begin removing brush and trees at the end of January, and work near the Paul Bunyan State Trail is expected to last through the fall of 2016. No closures of the trail are expected this winter, but snowmobile trail users could encounter crews working near the trail and are asked watch for activity and proceed cautiously.

To allow for highway realignment, a new section of trail will be constructed this summer and will become a permanent reroute. The trail alignment will be changed with minimal disruption to users. is 115 miles long and extends from Crow Wing State Park south of Brainerd, to Lake Bemidji State Park north of Bemidji. It is the longest of Minnesota's paved state trails and the longest continuously paved rail-trail in the country.
