



Issue of Confederate flag resolved at Crosby High School

Cody Nelson, a senior at pal Jim Christenson and post-Crosby-Ironton High School, was sent home from school on Monday, May, 16, after refusing to remove a Confederate flag from his car.

The car was parked in the student parking lot when Nelson was called to the principal's office and told to remove the flag.

The suspension notice signed by High School Princi-



ed on Facebook by Cody's mother, Dorene Nelson cited that Cody's display of the flag was a 1.) willful violation of school board regulations, policy and /or rules; 2.) willful conduct that significantly disrupts the rights of others to an education or disrupts the school personnel to perform their duties or disrupts school

activities; 3.) willful conduct that endangers the student, endangers other pupils or surrounding personnel or that endangers property of the school district.

"They told me if I do not take this flag down the next three days, I will not be able to graduate," said Nelson.

Tuesday morning, May 18, Nelson, his friends and his mother Dorene showed up at the school to support him. Cody displayed his flag with his vehicle parked on the street, not in the student lot. Media entered the school with Nelson until the Crosby police asked them to leave.

A compromise was reached and Cody can keep his flag and can graduate.

God uses ordinary people to change history

BY JIM DALY, PRESIDENT OF FOCUS ON THE FAMILY Our society needs heroes.

In fact, I think it's how God has wired us.

The human spirit is nourished by witnessing men and women who answer the call of God upon their lives and overcome amazing obstacles with unwavering faith.

I think this is partly why Jesus took on human nature and lived among us. God didn't abandon us to figure life out on our own or leave us the Bible as a sterile rule sheet to follow. Instead, Jesus came as the living embodiment of Scripture. He walked among humanity, so we could see what it means to devote our lives to God as well as be inspired by His example.

That same process is at work in our hearts when we learn the story of other great men and women of the faith who accomplished something significant or who aspired to a cause that was bigger than themselves.

Who are your heroes in life?

I'm convinced that when you encounter greatness, you'll be inspired to pursue greatness yourself.

That idea sets the stage for a powerful conversation we'll be having over the next couple of days on our program with author, speaker, and radio host, Eric Metaxas. His latest two books highlight the lives of ordinary men and women who stepped forward into life's challenges and changed the course of history.

Like Jackie Robinson, for example. Jackie became the first African-American to play Major League Baseball. He was signed into the league by Branch Rickey, a league executive who was serious about his Christian faith and who believed Jackie Robinson's faith would enable him to succeed as the first black ballplayer.

And so Jackie courageously stepped into the fray, gave up his right to defend himself, and withstood an avalanche of hateful discrimination. But he took the seemingly endless abuse for a greater cause - so that future African-Americans could receive fair and equitable treatment, not just in baseball, but in every area of life.

That is the very picture of nobility.

Similar stories of greatness could be told of men like William Wilberforce, Eric Liddell, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, and George Washington.

On that note, did you know that George Washington's officers nearly led a military coup to enthrone him as king over America? Washington's men were, essentially, offering him unlimited power. Who in the history of the world has ever turned that down?

And yet when Washington heard of their plans, he was enraged. He was sickened that his men would even consider such a scheme. For him, liberty wasn't merely an ideal. He was committed with everything within him to establish it as a reality.

And because he refused to be raised up as a monarch, he changed the history of the world. If he had said yes, how many future generations, if any, would have seen the liberties of

the United States of America that we've enjoyed for over 200 years?

Women, too, have played vital roles in displaying greatness and altering the course of history, among them Joan of Arc, Saint Maria of Paris, Corrie ten Boom, and Rosa Parks.

Mother Theresa is arguably the most influential woman in modern times. Much of her greatness came from the fact that she served others in awe-inspiring ways, yet she was a real human being who struggled mightily with not feeling the presence and the love of God.

When she died, letters written by her came to light about that. Her words illustrated what is rightly understood as "real faith." She held firmly to the belief that, whether she felt God's love or not, He did love her.

Her testimony is amazing because it shows true faith is not about feelings. It's about what is real and true. Her struggle encourages us all to believe that if a giant of faith like her could struggle, we all can rise to stronger faith in the midst of our doubts.

There is a thread of God's grace and love throughout all of these stories, which is important to our understanding of achieving greatness. If you want to live a meaningful life, open yourself up to the One Who is the author of all greatness and all goodness.

Why?

Because He is the author of you, and He has very specific plans for how He wants to use you to impact the world around you.







Education leaders choose projects for \$1.5 million Innovation Funding



Local education leaders discussed and voted on innovative projects, recommending over \$1.5 million in Innovation Funding to directly benefit Region 5 school districts. The 2016 Innovation Funding Review day took place on May 12, providing an opportunity for nearly a dozen local schools and education partners to present their projects. Members heard project proposals, discussed, and then awarded projects that had the most potential for student impact and success. School districts created the ideas and National Joint Power Alliance (NJPA) provides support and funding. The formula for the program promotes out-of-thebox collaboration on projects that might otherwise not get off the ground. The NJPA Board of Directors gives final approval of the funding at its June meeting.

2016 Recommended Projects:

• Bridges Career Academy and Workplace Connection provides a career link between secondary and post-secondary institutions, and businesses from local communities in an effort to ensure the next generation of students is career and college ready for the workforce. Long-term goals for the group include expanding the number of Region Five schools using the program from 17 to 22, providing new

developing internship and educator in the workplace opportunities. The program requested \$230,000 in Innovation Funding from NJPA.

 Minnesota School-Based Occupational and Physical Therapists are initiating the First Annual Institute offered to every school district in the state of Minnesota. The local Paul Bunyan Education Cooperative is providing staff as presenters for the event. The goal of the project is to improve skills for implementing alternative service delivery models, promote evidence-based services, and improve understanding of related services in Minnesota schools. Educators asked for \$22,500 to support the event.

• The Metier Program helps students build 21st century character traits (grit, attitude, optimism, and creativity) and skills (creativity, collaboration, communication, and critical thinking). Three local school districts are collaborating to use the program, including: Little Falls, Bertha-Hewitt, and Pillager Middle Schools. The districts requested \$285,000 in Innovation Funding from NJPA.

• The Alternative Career Pathways initiative supports personalized professional development for educators. The program was developed out of a desire by teachers and administrators to find graduate-level programs with direct relevance to their classroom

and content area. Little Falls, Menahga, Pequot Lakes, Pierz, Swanville, Upsala, Verndale, Bertha-Hewitt, Pillager, Walker-Hackensack-Akeley school districts will collaborate in the program, which started in Little Falls. The \$300,000 request includes the cost of a regional coordinator for the program.

• Innovative Classroom Matching Funds was spearheaded by Pillager Public Schools, requesting \$75,000 to be used for matching grant funding to a single 50I(c) (3) organization from each school district that raises funds for innovative classroom grants in public schools within Region Five. This project would match dollar for dollar any money raised up to \$5,000 for a public school district foundation. By providing these funds, the community, alumni, and friends of the foundations are motivated by the call to action and incentive to support public education at a new level of giving.

• The Search Institute and The Roadmap to REACH, was proposed for the Pine

River-Backus School District, Pequot Lakes School District, Staples-Motley School District, Little Falls School District, Northland Communities Schools, and Crosslake Charter School. In order to better serve Region 5 students and promote academic, social and emotional success and health, The Roadmap to REACH is a research-based and data-driven program that will strengthen student motivation to succeed in school and beyond by developing non-cognitive skills. The project includes pre and post intervention survey analysis; intensive, intentional and focused professional development - with cohorts of teachers/professional staff from each participating school. The proposal requested \$72,100 which would include regional coordination support.

• FIT (Follow IT Through) Activity Day allows school leaders the opportunity to provide needed time for effective implementation of new initiatives, while providing families a safe and dependable plan for their children during the nonschool day. The program will communicate to the entire community the importance of giving educators the opportunity to learn and practice new skills over a period of time which will embed the learning into the daily life of the school. The Staples-Motley School District is seeking \$23,050 for the proposal.

• The Rural Minnesota CEP, Inc. (RMCEP) Career Advisor Program is seeking to provide career advisor services to an additional 4500 students in the 16 school districts that they currently serve throughout the five-county Central formation, guidance, and opportunities to connect them with community employers and regional Occupations in Demand. These connections will provide enhanced opportunities that lead to a more prosperous future and contributes to breaking the chronic cycles of poverty that exists in families across the region. The RMCEP was seeking \$374,000 in Innovation Funding. • The Open Educational Resource (OER) Project



Family fun spring is a great time to plant trees and save money



With the warm weather, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources reminds homeowners and forest landowners that spring is an excellent time to plant trees. There are many good reasons to plant trees.

Deciduous trees—those that shed their leaves in the

winter-can help save money on summer cooling bills, if planted on the south or west sides of buildings. Planting conifers on a building's energy-sucking winter winds. Fruit- and nut-bearing trees can provide homes and food for hungry wildlife. Basswood and linden trees can attract pollinators. Sturdy, long-lived trees such as oak, walnut or hackberry can add beauty and increase property values.

"I recommend planting a variety of different tree species to add diversity to your property, which will make it more resistant to tree pests and climate change," said Jennifer Teegarden, DNR forestry outreach specialist. "Some trees, like green ash, aren't recommended at all because of their susceptibility to the tree-killing emerald ash borer beetle."

Teegarden reminds homeowners that if they plan on

north side can help block digging, they should first call Gopher State One Call at 811. Someone will be dispatched to mark underground utility lines. It's also important to not plant trees under power lines or right next to building foundations.

Caring for trees extends beyond simply planting them. Place 2 to 4 inches of mulch around the base of the tree, making sure to keep mulch away from the trunk to avoid rot. Also, new trees need a good soaking of water every week in the summer and fall for a few years after planting.

Be sure to plant your tree right and avoid common mistakes. For example, planting trees too deeply stresses trees, which shortens their lives. Homeowners should check the DNR's tree planting and care Web page at www.mndnr. gov/treecare for proper tree planting instructions and help selecting a tree.



OPINION: America marches blindly toward single-payer health care

Hillary Clinton just dipped her toe a little bit further into the waters of single-payer health care, prodded by her competitor for the Democratic presidential nomination, Bernie Sanders.

She recently called for allowing more people to join Medicare -- the government-run healthcare program for seniors -- by allowing those "55 or 50 and up" to buy into it. Sanders can no doubt take credit for pulling her further left -- his proposal to expand Medicare to all Americans has evinced cheers from his partisans.

But the record of other single-payer systems should silence those cheers. Single-payer would destroy health care quality and rob patients blind in the process.

Sanders has been agitating for single-payer for decades. The supposed price tag of his latest proposal for "Medicare-for-All?" About \$14 trillion over 10 years, he's claimed.

But according to studies from the Urban Institute and

the Tax Policy Center, the real cost would be about \$33 trillion. Even after accounting for the revenue that Sanders's plethora of new taxes would take in, the government would still need \$16 trillion. Nevertheless, Sanders's

focus on single-payer has attracted attention. A recent survey found that 63 percent of people had a positive reaction to the term "Medicare for all." Meanwhile, thousands of doctors recently signed on to a plan similar to Sanders's.

Some states could even green-light single-payer in the coming months. This November, Colorado voters will decide whether to create a state-level single-payer system. The initiative would cost \$38 billion annually and require billions in new taxes.

Coloradans should take note of another state that tried to implement a single-payer system and failed -- Sanders's home state of Vermont.

The state's attempt at single-payer in 2014 was projected to cost \$4.3 billion -- almost equivalent to the state's entire \$4.9 billion budget. To fund the program, Vermont would have needed an extra \$2 billion in revenue -- plus new taxes on businesses and residents. Officials abandoned the idea because it would have collapsed the state's economy.

The recent history of single-payer systems sponsored by the federal government isn't much more encouraging.

Take the Veterans Health Administration, which continues to subject beneficiaries to lengthy waits for care. In March, the Government Accountability Office tracked the experience of 180 newly-enrolled vets and found that 60 waited as many as 71 days to see a primary care doctor. Sixty more never even managed to get an appointment.

Patients haven't fared much better under single-payer systems abroad.

Horror stories from Britain's National Health Service emerge almost daily. Recently, a government investigation found that hospitals are discharging elderly patients without ensuring that they're fit to go home.


This spring, thousands of junior doctors went on strike. Patients had no choice but to wait for the walkout to end, as hospitals postponed more than 112,000 appointments and 12,700 operations in response.

Canada, my native land, has similar issues. Canadians must wait an average of 18.3 weeks to see a specialist after getting a referral. That wait time is 97 percent longer than it was in 1993. Almost 900,000 Canadians are waiting for treatment.

The promise of single-payer -- high-quality, universally accessible, free -- is nothing like the reality of such a system. Taxpayers pay dearly for the promise of such care.

This fall, voters must not allow themselves to fall prey to the siren song of single-payer.

Education leaders choose projects for \$1.5 million Innovation Funding | Continued from Page 6

While this is certainly an education program, it is equally as much an economic development program that invests in young people and shows them all of the possibilities that exist in this part of Minnesota for profitable businesses and industries. The initiative is seeking \$21,500 in funding.

• Technology Mobile is a collaborative, technology-sharing effort within Region 5, namely Central Lakes College and Minnesota State Community & Technical College, and are seeking \$50,000 in 2016 NJPA Innovation Funding to further expand their program. For the 2016/2017 school year, Technology Mobile has expanded to five new schools in Region 5; Bertha-Hewitt, Pillager, Staples-Motley, Upsala, and Verndale. The new schools will have access to the technologies that the pilot schools integrated, while the pilot schools will have access to new technologies in Green (Environmental) Technology, Nano Technology, Medical Technology, and Art Technology. The new school teachers will attend different summer training sessions to get them acclimated to the equipment for implementation to occur for the upcoming school year.

Innovation Funding was created to help Region 5 entities (education, local government, and non-profits) fund initiatives aimed at creating collaboration and improving the region. These awards are not intended to support single individuals, organizations, or communities, but are intended to support region-wide initiatives, consortiums and collaborations impacting many, and serving a greater public purpose. A second funding review day will be held for Region 5 city and county projects in June.

NJPA does not select projects, but hosts the program and comes alongside the chosen regional initiatives while financially supporting them to ensure successful regional impact. This annual funding opportunity is in its third year, with \$800,000 awarded in 2014, more than \$1 million in 2015, and now another \$1.5 million is slated for the third round for 2016.

National Joint Powers Alliance (NJPA) is a public service agency that is committed to providing cooperative solutions that assist government, education, and non-profit entities as they strive for efficient public service. NIPA was created in 1978 by Minnesota Statue 123A.21, Subdivision 1 as one of Minnesota's nine service cooperatives and offers a variety of cooperative programs and services for members on a local, regional, statewide, and national scale including Canada.
