What the Bible says about divorce and remarriage

JIM DALY, PRESIDENT OF FOCUS ON THE FAMILY

In 1995, employees at the five-story Sampoong department store in Seoul, South Korea, noticed cracks developing on the top floor around one of the support columns. Despite warnings from civil engineers, the store's owner refused to close the building for repairs.

It was a minor problem, he insisted.

In reality, the crack was merely a symptom of a much larger structural failure. That became evident on June 29 when the entire building collapsed, killing over 500 people and wounding nearly 1,000 more.

A similar catastrophe is developing in our culture. We notice the cracks in our society, but many choose to ignore them and fail to recognize that the central problem is the breakdown of the family.

The epicenter of that upheaval is the far too high divorce rate, both in and out of the church. It's weakening the very structure of our nation

and, given enough time, could bring everything we value crashing to the ground.

Many will dismiss that warning as alarmist tactics, but marriage is a pillar that stabilizes our society.

It's a violation of the oneflesh-for-life union by which righteousness is passed from one generation to another. Marriage is also the means by which the relationship between Christ and His Church is demonstrated and symbolized in the world. When a marriage is shattered, there's loss on all fronts. Not only does that particular union break up, but the ability to pass God's truth to the next generation falls under terrible duress. It also confuses the relationship between the church and Jesus Christ.

It's all tied together.

With so much at stake, I think it's important that Christians revisit the topic of divorce and remarriage and develop a thoroughly biblical understanding of the idea.

So what does the Bible actually say about divorce and remarriage?

What we can know with cer-

tainty is that God hates divorce (Malachi 2:16).

But it's also important to share the other side of that perspective. God's heart is for your marriage, and, like every other area of our lives, His desire is to bring hope and healing to that which is broken. That means that, even if you have biblical grounds for divorce, you can choose to pursue reconciliation.

Mille Lacs economic aid, marketing funding are key for the area

The Minnesota Legislature began the second half of their 89th biennial session on March 8 this year, an unusually late start, leaving only 11 weeks to meet in regular session before the constitutionally mandated deadline of May 23. The House adjourned just before midnight on May 22, and the Senate adjourned the following morning. They were able to reach agreement on and pass omnibus spending and tax bills, but the transportation funding/bonding legislation ran into snags over a late Senate floor amendment to expand the Met Council's authority to bond for light rail, ultimately killing the bill for the regular session. The Legislature was also unable to agree on a real ID/drivers license bill to bring Minnesota into conformity with federal law. There is already some discussion of a special session to deal with these

call a special session.

Even though some business remained unfinished at the conclusion of the 2016 session, Rep. Dale Lueck, R-Aitkin, said it is important to recognize that key work such as the economic aid package for the Mille Lacs Lake region did receive final approval by the Legislature.

The legislation includes two important provisions that will provide immediate aid to businesses in the Mille Lacs Lake region and strengthen the ability to frame Mille Lacs Lake as a premier outdoor recreation destination. Both provisions were part of a supplemental finance bill that area legislators and Gov. Mark Dayton's office developed. Pending the governor's approval, the area would see approximately \$4 million in aid to bridge the current economic issue.

"This legislation is very important to our area, we fought

said. "While the Senate may have unraveled transportation and bonding at the last minute, this immediate aid for Mille Lacs was badly needed. It shows we can work on a bipartisan basis at the Capitol."

The package includes a \$3.7 million in direct aid and loans that will be available to businesses around the lake that have been adversely impacted by the current issue with walleye regulations. Mille Lacs County will serve as the fiscal agent for the program with assistance from the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development.

Lueck said he is especially pleased legislation he introduced providing \$300,000 to the Mille Lacs Tourism Council was adopted in order to "continue telling the story that Mille Lacs Lake offers a wide range of world-class recreational opportunities."



Rain garden project approved, busy city attorney stalls garbage contract

At the Crosby Council meeting on May 23, Building Inspector Scott Sadusky reported about the brew pub application and rental meeting progress.

Mayor Joanna Lattery interjected, "I had this question asked. If you look in a window of a business, and you look up and you can see sky. Does that give you the authority to go in?"

Sadusky said, "Not from a building code perspective, I don't think. Not unless there is an immediate danger."

Lattery continued "Well don't you think that there is a hole there and that could be?"

It was discussed and determined that it was a vacant building the Mayor was talking about and not an active business.

Sadusky suggest he should get a formal complaint and he would look in to it to get it resolved. Sadusky indicated the ordinance requires buildings to have roofs that are water tight.

In the public comment portion of the meeting. Nadine Albrecht owner of the Spalding House asked, "Is it common practice for the city to cash checks before the council approves licenses?"

Mayor Lattery responded "the city is not allowed to hold any checks given to them. When checks come in they have to be deposited."

Albrecht clarified "the question is if it is appropriate and prudent for the city to be cashing checks before the council approves."

"A liquor license," Lattery finished Albrecht's sentence and then continued, "If the license is going to have to be gotten in, I believe it is."

Clerk/Treasurer Lisa Sova read from the ordinance that it was required that all license fees must be paid in full with license application submissions.

Albrecht then asked what if the check is cashed and the application gets lost and never processed. Lattery said, "I am going to have to say that I think that's really kind of unprofessional for you to say that. For one thing is, we have to follow our ordinances and our rules and regulations. And to even imply that an application could be lost. If you have a problem with that. the clerk's office is willing to work with you on that."

Albrecht responded, "I don't think it was unprofessional of me to simply repeat something that was said to me, which was what was said if they lost the check. If she (the clerk) brought up losing the check, It is not unprofessional of me to bring up that if someone in the clerk's office could also lose the application."

Crow Wing Soil and Water Conservation District, Stormwater project update was presented by Beth Hippert. Hippert thanked councilmen Prushek and Heglund for their work on the stormwater project committee. Hippert said three of the biggest phosphorous sources had been identified and the threats were needed to be reduced.

The committee unanimously agreed that they would like to look at reducing the phosphorous from a pipe on second street. The pipe discharges directly into Serpent Lake.

Hippert talked about planting some new rain gardens and replanting the old rain gardens by the city hall, because on complaints that they have become an eyesore. They are looking to get some volunteers to maintain these gardens. Hippert suggested to post a workshop to examine the two options and look at feedback and ideas for future projects. They were seeking the councils clear direction and approval of the plan for the storm water project. According to Hippert, the grant funding would cover the project with no cost to the city.

However, Melissa Barrick,

Crow Wing SWCD District Manager, indicated the city would need a 25% match component to the total grant. The grant amount presented at the February 8 council meeting was \$400,000, so the city's match would be \$100,000.

Councilman Goshey made a motion of support with councilman Heglund seconding. It was passed unanimously.

In reference to the fireworks contract, City Attorney Tom Pearson wanted time to review the contract. The council approved a suggested solution by Attorney Pearson. It would allowing the mayor to sign the contract and pay the \$6,500 deposit once the contract had been reviewed and approved by the city attorney.

The council approve the small cities assistance program/road maintence grant of \$33,000.

Councilman Heglund again requested summer help for the city crew of two high school students. A suggestion was made to publish the ad for two weeks and if there was still no response to open it up to other age groups.

There were several 3.2 and full on and off Sale Liquor licenses for nine Crosby businesses were approved by the council: Barstock Liquors, Crosby Bar, Cuyuna Lanes, Miners Inc. DBA Super One, Nordic Inn, Peanuts Pub and the Midway, Spalding House, Croft Pub and Grub, and Red Raven LLC. The council also approved a 3.2 liquor license to the Crosby Fire Relief for Fourth of July Celebration.

Council approved the CSAH 33/3rd Street SW project.

Justin Burslie spoke about the storm water proposal ordinance with his recommendation for approval by the Planning and Zoning Board. Mayor Lattery asked Attorney Pearson, if he had a problem with accepting ordinance as written. Pearson indicated that he felt Burslie had a good history and no review would be necessary. It was pointed out by Clerk/Treasurer Lisa Sova there was a missing item in the ordinance, under financial security there was no amount indicated. The missing information was explained by Crow Wing SWCD Technician Darren Mayers indicating it could be a percentage or a dollar amount. It would depend on the cost of the project. Mayor Lattery asked what it should be, a percent or a dollar in the blank? City Attorney Pearson recommended the city be allowed some discression depending on the size of the project. Mayers recommended 10% fill the blank with an unrevokable security option added and a cash deposit by the city. The council approved the storm water proposal zoning ordi-

nance addition. Councilman Paul Heglund ask about a request for rezoning from a property owner from residential to commercial and was wondering where the Planning and Zoning Board was at with that. Burslie indicated it was on hold with the comprehensive plan not being done yet.





Keep aquarium pets and plants out of Minnesota lakes and rivers

With warmer weather and the end of the school year, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources reminds teachers and hobbyists it is illegal to release aquarium animals and plants into the wild. One example commonly found in classrooms, the red swamp crayfish is causing major environmental and economic harm as nearby as Wisconsin.

"Teachers and hobbyists may not be aware that dozens of aquarium animals and plants are prohibited or regulated invasive species that can cause serious harm if released into the wild," said Heidi Wolf, DNR invasive species unit supervisor. "The red swamp crayfish is a good example of a prohibited species that some online retailers ship to unsuspecting teachers or to people hosting 'crawfish boils.' A special permit is required to import crayfish for any purpose, and without a permit it is illegal to buy or possess red swamp crayfish in Minnesota."

Prohibited species cannot legally be possessed, released into the wild, or transferred to others. The recommended and most humane method of disposing of them is to put them in a plastic bag in the freezer for a day, then put the bag into the trash. "We

recommend teachers check the prohibited invasive species list before committing to classroom aquarium animals," Wolf said. "We also encourage teachers to discuss invasive species with their students."

Examples of prohibited and regulated species include goldfish and koi (which are types of carp), rusty crayfish, red swamp crayfish, Chinese and banded mystery snails, and many aquatic plants. DNR staff recently found these invasive aquarium species in Minnesota waters: piranha, koi, goldfish, yellow iris, Amazonian catfish, and even a cayman, a type of alligator.


