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#### **Neighborhood crime** prevention meeting held at San Jose Chinese School

The increase in break-ins and burglaries were discussed at a community service seminar organized by the San Jose Chinese School located at Leland High School on March 28.

Officer Rey Cedeno represented the Crime Prevention Unit of San Jose Police Department at the meeting and the meeting began with a moment of silence to honor Officer Michael Johnson who recently lost his life in the line of duty.

"I was shocked to hear that this beautiful,

little lake had been drained," says resident Valerie Fulton. "Especially in this drought, it is a very important source for nesting and water for the birds and animals around Almaden, and coming out of Quicksilver Park."

Resident David Meidinger is also frustrated with the timing. "There should have been a plan as to when to drain it, and a plan to refill it immediately," he says. See ECHO LAKE, page 8

# Girl Scout Troop promotes walk week during Graystone Elementary Spring Celebration

Imaden Girl Scout Cadette Troop 60323 hosted a booth at the Graystone Elementary School Spring Celebration and Walkathon on March 27 to promote walking to school and reducing air pollution.

Students of all ages from Graystone kindergarteners to Bret Harte 8th graders came to the booth and learned about air pollution and Walk Week on April 20-24.

"The troop came up with the idea of promoting a Walk Week to encourage students to walk to school April 20-24 in celebration of Earth Day as part of the Take Action portion of their Girl Scout journey studying the air we breathe," said troop leader Janette Chock. The troop expects to give away raffle tickets for prizes to all Bret Harte walkers every morning of 'Walk Week' with winners to be announced on Friday April 24.

The troop funded the project with proceeds they earned from this year's cookie sales. The Girl Scout Breathe Journey is the troop's first journey as Cadettes and this is their first Cadette Take Action project.

The Troop's booth included prizes to motivate everyone to walk more. More than 400 lollipops from a specially constructed lollipop tree were handed out during the event. The lollipop tree was constructed so that students could get a chance to win raffle tickets and later enter them into a drawing for one of three pedometers. Chock said the troop thought it would be a good idea to offer the pedometers as a prize so winners could record their steps as they walk to school. More than 200 names were entered into the drawing for three pedometers which were won by three Graystone students.

More than 35 students received 'Walk Week' inspired henna tattoos on their arms to help them remember the upcoming "Walk Week." Henna is a plant-derived substance which is painted on the skin, staining it a reddish-orangeto-brown color and generally contains no additives or chemicals.

Students visiting the Troop's booth learned about what they can do to help reduce air pollution in

the community. In particular, they called attention to how cars generate air pollution which can eat away at the ozone layer contributing to global warming, weaken immune systems, and increase the risk of skin cancer and eye disease.

The Troop has been putting up flyers and posters at both Graystone and Bret Harte to publicize 'Walk Week' this week. "So spread the word! From April 20-24, join in with Walk Week," said Chock. "Let's all work together to clean up the air around our community by walking to school and stop air pollution in its tracks."

in the criminal justice system: lawmakers, law enforcement, court, and correction. It is essential for the four to work hand in hand. Police departments operate under the umbrella of law enforcement.

Apart from dealing with crimes that have already occurred, police also work on crime prevention programs. Cedeno explained the importance of having adequate information communicated at a 911 call because it's crucial to protect both the caller and the first responders to the scene.

A homeowner from the audience suggested that "a successful youth program would be very helpful in crime prevention." Officer Cedeno readily agreed with the notion, noting that "as a matter of fact, of the 115 recent arrests for home burglaries, 14 percent of the crimes were committed by youth under 18 years of age. San Jose Police Department currently has programs specifically catered to youth in the area," said Cedeno.

Other effective crime prevention measures focus on how to avoid being an easy target. Besides organizing a neighborhood watch, the three L's are very useful and effective: adequate lighting around the house, quality door and gate locks, and good landscaping. It is important to trim excess foliage to eliminate potential hiding places for unwanted intruders.

A concerned mother who had an incidence in which someone stole a package from her doorstep asked Officer Cedeno "should we open the doors when we see

someone taking parcels from our door steps?" The answer was a firm no. "You should never confront a burglar," said Cedeno. "Your life is more important than anything else," he said. Cedeno said that we should get close enough to see the person but without challenging him directly because that may put our lives in danger. "However, we should answer the door or use other means to let people think that we are at home. Burglars are sneaky and like to pick empty homes that are easy for break-ins," he said

Officer Cedeno displayed useful information regarding crime statistics and emergency telephone numbers that can be used to report crime. 

community. The former short-lived Radar Station played essentially no part in the day to day lives of this County. Granting it the status of historic site would be inappropriate because historic sites are normally places where some great event took place that was integral to the lives of the Country or to the community in or near the site. The base structure for the former radar transmitter does not meet those criteria.

In my view attempting to save the structure would be opening a large can of worms for the Mid-peninsula Open Space District. I object to the District spending money on maintaining a structure that will continue to decay over time; a structure that is of no discernible value to the region for which the District receives its funding. It is already succumbing to the weather and, unlike natural features of the mountain; the structure is not likely to survive over time unless it receives continuing maintenance. Thirty years or fifty years from now it will still need frequent and constant maintenance to keep from looking like the abandoned buildings at Chernobyl. It could become a hazardous nuisance and, ultimately, the District would have to decide whether it wants to continue to spend money on a ramshackle structure, of no particular historical significance, or to finally do what should have been done early on: Demolish the structure and return Umunhum to its truly historic place as a natural mountain peak sacred to the original residents of this area, the Ohlone Tribe.

Resident Jenny Walicek agrees. "At immediate issue is the Almaden Golf and Country Club's responsibility to restore the water for wildlife," she says. "It's breeding season for the mallard ducks and snowy egrets who have built their nests in the marshes, and for many other water birds who live among the now-exposed reeds."

In a letter of complaint to the Country Club's General Manager Robert Sparks, Walicek said, "You are... destroying the natural habitat of so many living things. The lake is full of fish that will soon be floundering in mud. Amphibians have lost their shoreline shelters. Deer, bobcats, coyotes, and other animals... drink from this rapidly emptying water hole. Your actions are going to cause animals to die."

Walicek also noted that those creatures seeking water elsewhere may find it on the golf course to their detriment. "Based on last year's killing of the wild pigs," she said, "I assume you would take a similar approach to deer, their predators, and other desperately thirsty creatures mucking up your greens."

Resident Peter Haas has fond memories of walking around the lake with his children when they were young and recalls his son's first grade teacher taking her students to the lake to see the baby ducks.

"We've appreciated the beauty of the lake, and it's been sad for us seeing its gradual degradation," he says. "The Country Club has shown a lack of respect and stewardship for the natural environment and a lack of faith towards its surrounding community."

The Country Club responded to community concern, saying it intends to restore water to the lake once repairs are complete.

"Almaden Golf and Country Club strives to be a good neighbor and a responsible property owner, and we regret any impact upon wildlife caused by our need to drain some water from Echo Lake to conduct repairs," said Country Club President Mike Cannestra in an open letter posted on NextDoor.

The leak was located near one of the valves used to regulate the flow of water from the lake to the golf course.

"By draining a limited amount of water from the lake, we have been able to locate the source of the leak and facilitate repairs," he says. "The Club does not plan to drain any additional water from the lake and expects that repairs will soon be complete. Although we are not obligated to restore the water level in the lake, the Club plans to do so."

"We had two storms and it filled it up," says resident Terry Haggin, "and each time they drained it, saying there was a leak in the pipe. They've had a year and a half to refill it and they haven't done so."

For Kimberly Jolly and her family, Echo Lake has always been an important part of the serenity and beauty of their neighborhood and one of the reasons they moved there. She appreciates the opportunity it allowed her children to see baby quail hatch and baby ducks float on the lake.

"Seeing that being destroyed has us pretty upset," she says. "To see the frantic attempts of the wildlife trying to restore their nests, the mournful cry of the mother birds helpless to protect their offspring... the fish floundering on the edges of the muddy water... is heartbreaking."

Haas sites flooding and high mercury lev-

els as obstacles to developing houses on the Echo Lake property. He also notes that at least one protected species, the green heron, inhabits the lake.

"The Country Club seems to be following a strategy of making the lake as unappealing as possible," says Haas, "so that resistance to development efforts will be weakened."

The Country Club disagrees. "The drainage of the lake is unrelated to the potential sale or development of the property," says Cannestra.

Although the Country Club says it is aware that some homeowners oppose development at Echo Lake, Cannestra says that the Board of Directors felt that current market conditions make a sale at this time advantageous.

The Echo Lake Property, known as Parcel 841, has been for sale off and on for more than 10 years. In order to build on the property, changes would have to be made to the existing Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CC&Rs). A case currently pending in Santa Clara County Superior Court may determine the extent to which development at the property may occur, as well as approval by the City of San Jose.

"The Country Club has tried repeatedly to sell the land to contractors," says Haas. "We understood from the CC&Rs that they'd leave the lake as it was, not sell the land to build houses. Developer Paul Ugenti sued 113 families in an attempt to intimidate us into letting him overturn the CC&Rs."

Attorney Paul Glaspy is representing some of the families named in a Complaint being prosecuted by resident Paul Ugenti, who is under contract with the Country Club to purchase the Echo Lake property.

"His lawsuit requests that the court determine whether he has the right under the CC&Rs to put any houses on that property," says Glaspy. "The homeowners believe that the CC&Rs state that those lots were not to be used for residential purposes and are going to oppose that lawsuit."

"There's a misinterpretation and misinformation when people talk about these lots and the water storage area," says Ugenti. "As far as I understand it, there's nothing in the CC&Rs that require the Country Club to maintain a water supply up there."

Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, Restrictions and Easements (CC&Rs) - The General Plan dated October 31, 1974.

A-2. Exception: Non-Residential Lots. Lots 841, 843 and 873, Tract 5472. These three lots shall not be used for residential purposes as they constitute land being used as a golf course reservoir and related golf course uses. Note: City of San Jose zoning includes golf course areas and uses in their "residential" zoning. Lots 841, 843 and 873, Tract 5472 are excluded from residential restrictions in these covenants, however, uses and buildings approved by Use Permit before scheduled Owners of lots in Tract 5472 (other than Lots 841, 843 and 873) do not have any ownership, rights, or privileges, in or in relation to Lots 841, 843 and 873.

Ugenti says that he sent an Alternate Dispute Resolution to all of the homeowners in Tract 5472 requesting mediation. "No one in the entire tract agreed to any type of arbitration or conversation about the situation," he says. As there was no response, he sent out a Declaration of Judgment, alerting the homeowners that he would be taking the CC&Rs before a judge for interpretation.

"I think we all just need to respect each other's opinions," says Ugenti. "When you have people that have a disagreement and can't come up with an answer, there's a venue for that and it's usually in a court."

Complaint for Declaratory Relief and To Quiet Title, filed March 5, 2015. Paul S. Ugenti, Plaintiff. 106. The Almaden Golf & Country Club is the owner of the real property located in San Jose, California. 107. The Property consists of undeveloped land that is not currently being used for a golf course reservoir or any related golf course uses. 108. Ugenti has entered into a contract with the Club to purchase the Property and the Club has assigned to Ugenti all of its rights and interests in and to any causes of action necessary to obtain a judicial decree that the Property may be used for, among other things, residential purposes, including, without limitation, the causes of action alleged in this Complaint.

"Over time, I think a lot of the people in the community have kind of taken an ownership of the property, when they don't really have an ownership," says Ugenti. "There are even [No] Trespassing signs posted up there, and I think that gets violated all the time. I think that the owners of the property also have rights... and I think if they want to sell the property... they have the right to do that. I think the CC&Rs as they're written... give the right to the Country Club to sell that property," he says.

Resident Tobin Gilman agrees. "I am sympathetic to the sentimental attachment that people have to the lake," he says, "but I'm troubled by the apparent sense of entitlement some folks have to dictating the use of property owned by others. If the lake is drained and filled in, the wildlife will adapt."

Due to the 'No Trespassing' signs, resident Teri Chow says she was surprised that her neighbors felt permitted to walk on the property. "I felt like they were one ones breaking the law." she says.

After a boy drowned at Echo Lake many years ago, she agreed with the installation of a fence on the property even though it curtailed her walks around the lake. "The 400 members of the Country Club have always been very aware of the lake and the liabilities it raises for the co-owners of the golf course," she says.

Haas questions the Country Club's motives in constructing the fence. "They put up an ugly chain link fence around the lake saying it was a safety and liability issue," he says, "but it seemed disingenuous as the fence was built many years after the accident occurred. Moreover, there was no mention of putting a fence around the Country Club's new water supply [on the golf course]. The effect of the fence was to severely diminish the beauty of the lake and to obstruct the wildlife that regularly came to the lake to drink."

According to Haggin, the fence went up in 2002, and everything changed. "The Country Club used to have a guard patrol at the lake and sell fishing licenses to the kids," says Haggin. "There were no problems with trespassers or trash because the country club and the community used to work together."

Haggin says that in the past, the Country Club watered the golf course and kept the lake full even during the summer. Before they sprayed, he says, the serpentine rocks were surrounded with wild flowers and a waterfall trickled down the hillside.

Now, he says, the Country Club doesn't maintain the water levels and dumps their leaves and clippings there. Pigs come down to wallow in the mud and nose for grubs on neighbor's lawns. It smells bad and mosquitoes and flies are a problem.

"This isn't about who is right and who is wrong," say Jolly. "This is about saving a natural habitat, and the beauty of our neighborhood. Refill the lake. It's a hidden treasure and we want to keep it."

Resident Jean Mullinix agrees. "The natural beauty that has always surrounded this wonderful community is a big part of the draw to Almaden Country Club," she says.

Mullinix enjoys watching the ducks that visit her home every spring and likely nest at the lake. "The loss of the lake would affect many animals and destroy the natural beauty that has stood the test of time," she says. "We all know that once it's gone, it's gone forever and how sad is that?"



#### Supervisors consider options on housing for the homeless in Santa Clara County

The idea of investing in micro-housing received a nod of approval from the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors, along with a slate of other options aimed at providing shelter for the thousands of homeless people who sleep by creeks, in parks and on the streets.

At their meeting on Tuesday, March 24, 2015, the board accepted a comprehensive report weighing the costs and feasibility of immediate solutions for homeless people while plans to build affordable housing take



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At the request of Supervisor Cortese and Supervisor Cindy Chavez, the Board voted in December to call for an analysis of available options and the cost effectiveness of each. Tuesday's discussion was based on the results of the research.

Besides micro-housing, or tiny house villages, options include funding unused beds in shelters, providing legal and safe places for people who live in their cars to park, renting motel rooms or allowing tent communities in sanctioned areas.

"We can't sit back and wait until we have enough affordable housing to meet the needs of our residents," said Board President Dave Cortese. "In fact, we don't have permanent housing solutions at this time. We have to move quickly to help people now, and use every option we have available."

The report recommends that the Board consider partnering with nonprofits and community based organizations to build and manage micro-housing villages, but cost estimates vary with the type of structures. Where to locate micro-housing is another issue that will be tackled in the future.

These temporary housing options will also be considered by the Housing Task Force, a short-term working group charged with focusing immediate solutions to the housing crisis. The Task Force's first meeting will be 9 to 11 a.m. on Friday, April 24, in the County Government Center, 70 West Hedding Street.

On any given night in Santa Clara County, an estimated 7,600 are homeless, with only about 2,000 able to find beds at shelters or other temporary housing.

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
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#### You may assume risk at health clubs for ordinary negligence

#### This week's question:

I have been looking at a health club to join and really get in shape. However, each one that I have visited requires a long legal document that I need to sign, including my assumption of risk of injury at the club. Is this legal? Can they require me to sign such a document? Do you know of any way around that?

#### Dear Jack.

Sorry you have had problems with the legal documents they asked you to sign, Jack, since good workouts and good health are so important for all of us.

The short answer to one of your questions above is that such a document may be proper from a legal perspective. Of course, if you will not sign any kind of proper legal document under any circumstances you can take your business elsewhere.


The Court of Appeal for the Second Appellate District in southern California was faced with a release in a recent case. In that case, a member at a health club signed the club's standard form of release when he joined the club.

The release stated in part: "Using the 24 Hour Fitness USA, Inc. (24 Hour) facilities involves the risk of injury to you or your guest, whether you or someone else causes it. Specific risks vary from one activity to another and the risks range from minor injuries to major injuries, such as catastrophic injuries including death."

The release went on to say, "In consideration of your participation in the activities offered by 24 Hour, you understand and voluntarily accept this risk and agree that 24 Hour, its officers, directors, employees, volunteers, agents and independent contractors will not be liable for any injury, including, without limitation, personal, bodily, or mental injury...whether related to exercise or not"

The plaintiff in the case was Timothy Grebing and the defendant was 24 Hour Fitness USA, INC. Mr. Grebing was injured at the health club while using a "low row machine" at the facility in La Mirada, California. The low row machine is operated by sitting with one's legs extended on pads and lifting weights by pulling a metal handlebar with both hands.

In Mr. Grebing's case, a clip or snap hook connects the handlebar to a cable or belt running through pulleys and attached to weights. Mr. Grebing did three sets on the machine and

It was filed January 29, 2015, and publication was ordered on February 19, 2015.

We need to keep in mind that since it is a very recent case, it may be appealed to the California Supreme Court, or other cases somewhat similar to it may "distinguish" it significantly.

# Let's keep community spirit alive in the memory of Officer Michael Johnson

t the April 2 m e m o r i a l service for San Jose Police Officer Johnson, Michael each speaker called attention to the overwhelming outpouring of support and sympathy from the community for the Johnson family, the San Jose Police Department and all men and women who choose a career in law enforcement.

We often come

together as a community in the wake of a tragedy. In this case, it was for 14-year veteran Officer Johnson, 38, who was killed on March 24 by a bullet from a suicidal man whose wife had called the police for help.

From Los Gatos to the SAP Pavilion, people lined the route of the procession bringing Officer Johnson's casket to the memorial service. Some waved flags, others held up signs of sympathy and gratitude. There were schoolchildren, military veterans who raised their hands in salute and parents who felt the pain of a family losing a son.

People also lined Monterey Road along the route to Oak Hill Cemetery, where a private burial service was held. Most of them, as well as the 10,000 attendees inside SAP, had never met Office Johnson. But they were united in wanting to show that they cared about this tragic loss and that we should come together for the common good.

I did know Michael Johnson and I've known his family for quite some time. I had the honor of meeting with them the day after Michael died. We talked about his devotion to his family and his service as an officer in helping the most vulnerable among us. It brought to mind the words that Cesar Chavez wrote in "The Prayer of the Farm Workers' Struggle:"

"Grant me courage to serve others; for in service there is true life.

Give me honesty and patience; so that I can work with others.

Let us remember those who have died for justice; for they have given us life."

On the day of the memorial, hundreds of law enforcement officers from the Sheriff's Department and from across the region volunteered to fill work shifts so the SJPD officers could attend the service. As they arrived for the 7:30 a.m. briefing, I greeted them along with members of my staff, the staff of Supervisor Cindy Chavez, other supervisors and Sheriff Laurie Smith, with beverages and snacks set up near the Old City Hall. They officers said they were glad to provide their service.

Along a fence outside the SJPD headquarters and in front of the main entrance, memorials grow with



flowers, notes and signs. The San Jose Police Officers Association is continuing its online donation drive at www.sjpoa. com, and my office is involved in a fundraiser for Saturday, April 11. As the memory of

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

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
