# Three arrested for motor vehicle theft and burglary

18 and 169 junction. She was arrested without incident on outstanding warrants. The Trans Am was subsequently reported stolen from another Farm Island Township resident. Located in the Trans Am were some 30.06 ammo and 42 grams of methamphetamine.

Garman was arrested in a U-Haul truck after being spotted in Garrison by a Crow Wing County Deputy. He was arrested without incident. Also assisting the Aitkin County Sheriff's Office was the Mille Lacs Tribal Police Department.

The Aitkin County Attorney's Office filed complaints against the three in Aitkin County District Court on June 17.

Bourcy was charged with two counts of felony theft of a motor vehicle, felony burglary - 3rd degree, felony fleeing police officer in a motor vehicle and misdemeanor damage to property in the 4th degree.

Garman was charged with two counts of felony theft of a motor vehicle, felony burglary -3rd degree, and misdemeanor criminal damage to property in the 4th degree.

Warmbo was charged with felony controlled substance crime – 1st degree, two counts of felony felon in possession of ammunition, two counts of felony theft of a motor vehicle, felony burglary – 3rd degree, felony possession of burglary tools, misdemeanor criminal damage to property-4th degree and misdemeanor tamper with a motor vehicle.

All three made appearances in Aitkin County District Court in front of the honorable Judge John R. Solien. Bourcy and Wambo were remanded to custody. Bond/bail on Garman was set at \$5000/\$750. All three remain in the Aitkin County Jail.

The Centenarian shares her birth year with such famous people as Rex Harrison, Louis L 'Amour, Bette Davis, Percy Faith, James Stewart, Estee Lauder, Nelson Rockefeller, Milton Berle, Lyndon B. Johnson, and "Baby Face" Nelson.

Ethel was born in Garrison on June 28, the fourth eldest

Nineteen hundred eight in a family of 11 children. She spent her formative years milking cows on her father's dairy farm and also delivering milk. A self-described tom boy, she frequently rode her pony with no saddle and would be found climbing

She dated Carl Satre for a long seven years; they survived the Great Depression and eventually married in 1934. The couple settled in Brainerd where Carl worked as a blacksmith for the Northern Pacific Railroad and they raised a daughter, Phyllis, and son, Glen. Ethel was a hard working homemaker who made hearty meals for her family, cared for the children, baked, sewed, and gardened.

She also worked for some years housekeeping for the Schaeffer family and was an active member of the Brainerd Garden Club. The harvegetable gardens not only feed her family but all of her neighbors as well. She was also very active in her church circle and led a bible study. After Carl retired, they spent many happy years together travelling across the country in a motor home.

Sadly, their son was killed in a snowmobiling accident in 1997 and at that time they moved from their long-time family residence to Woodland Senior Living. Carl passed away in 1999 and she continued to live there on her own until 2009.

When she was 100 years old, Ethel moved in with her daughter and son in law. In the spring of 2014, she became ill and relocated to Cuyuna Regional Medical Center's Care Center. Today, Ethel sleeps and reads a lot but looks forward to her daughter's daily visits as well as occasional trips to the Dairy Queen.

She also enjoys visits from her five grandchildren and numerous great grandchildren and great, great grandchildren who live throughout the country. Ethel frequently goes back and forth with a few giving them grief while they tease each other. Her pastor also regularly visits and after he gives her communion, they enjoy provoking each other.

Her daughter says she is as easy going as can be and that in all her years; she has only heard Ethel get angry twice.

An avid reader, the alert and petite 5-foot woman recently sat in the Care Cen-

hair styled and nails polished delving into the daily newspaper surrounded by her daughter and a group of friends. Although she sat in a wheelchair she does walk.

"Aren't we lucky to have such a nice place to live, they feed us so well here," Ethel said to the other residents.

While she officially cele-

brates her birthday on June 28, family and friends will gather on Saturday, July 2, from 2 to 4 p.m. at the Care Center's Activity Center to share in her milestone. They'll serve cupcakes for her birthday party visitors; Ethel hopes to enjoy her favorite dish--creamed asparagus on toast.

#### Do Christians share blame for Orlando?

JIM DALY, PRESIDENT OF FOCUS ON THE FAMILY Have Christians created a harmful atmosphere for gays?

That's the question The New York Times asked me last week in the aftermath of the massacre in Orlando by self-proclaimed ISIS supporter Omar Mateen.

If you think the question is startling, you're not alone.

While Christians have mourned the loss of life in Orlando and area Christians have jumped in to provide tangible love and support for those impacted by the violence, there's been a push by some to put some of the blame on Bible-believing Christians - specifically, those of us who support God's design for marriage and who have advocated for it in the public square.

Last week The Washington Times reported on LGBT activists who blame Christians for the attacks. Since then, the opinion pieces keep coming in.

A few examples: Slate accuses conservative Christian activists of spending "decades fomenting anti-gay hate

in Orlando." A senior correspondent for the CBC (Canadian Broadcasting Company) accuses Christian traditionalists (among those of other faiths) of portraying their "homophobia as a matter of religious freedom."

Saying "hate crimes don't happen in a vacuum, The New York Times Editorial Board blamed Christians (and Republicans) for

helping to create an atmosphere that facilitated Mateen's "hatred toward gays and lesbians."

The New York Times also ran an article saying the biblical book of Romans "calls for the execution of gays."

As a Christian, it's hard not to be outraged by these accusations. Like I wrote last week, it's hard not to hit back

But responding in kind will do little to demonstrate the reality of Christian teaching.

We now live in a culture where those of us who hold to a biblically orthodox view of sexuality are in the minority. As mainstream church attendance and Bible reading wanes, more people will be learning about Christianity second-hand through media pieces like the ones I've listed above.

That means that now, more than ever, we should take our mandate to witness carefully.

We must witness through our actions and deeds, of course. But we also need to witness with our words.

"How then will they call on him in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in him of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone preaching?" (Romans 10:14)

More than ever, Christians need to understand what the Bible says about issues like homosexuality - and how they tie into the bigger picture of sin, grace, and redemption. We need to have boldness to share this message with our friends and family, online, and with our neighbors. Not with a pushy arrogance, but with the

humility of someone who was lost

but now is found. That's why when The New York Times asked me to respond to the startling question I shared at the start of my post, I said I would.

I wanted to unequivocally defend our right to live out and share our Christian faith - but to do so by sharing some context about what the Bible teaches.

You can read my full answer, "Restricting Free Expression Is Not the Answer to Terrorism," online in the Room for Debate section of the paper's website. I'll leave you with

an excerpt: It's a big mistake to link events of this nature with the cultural debate about same-sex marriage and L.G.B.T rights. Taking away someone's right to express his views openly is not the answer to terrorism.

To be sure, the Christian faith includes very strong views on sexual morality, but it also teaches tolerance - not violence and murder. It tells us to express our understanding of God's eternal truths by loving our neighbor, not killing him.

Christians aren't trying to control the culture by means of force. Instead, our goal is to influence it by presenting a Christ-like example to the world.

I hope you'll head over to the Times and read the entire piece. I also hope you'll pray for us here at Focus on the Family as we continue to engage the culture - we need the Lord's wisdom and grace to do it well.

## Lueck encourages participation in broadband information sessions

Rep. Dale Lueck, R-Aitkin, is encouraging citizens, local government officials and other broadband stakeholders to participate in a series of upcoming webinars/tollfree conference calls hosted by the Minnesota Office of

Broadband Development. The informational sessions will detail changes made to the program during the 2016 legislative session and will provide key details about the application process.

Over the past two years, Lueck has worked tirelessly to increase rural broadband funding. This biennium's state budget includes a historic investment totaling \$45 million. That investment is more

than double the previous two-year state budget total. Minnesota is expected to see well over \$100 million in broadband investment in the next year alone when combined with federal and private funds.

"Tools are available to help improve rural broadband service," Lueck said. "With this unprecedented additional funding we can continue to move forward. These sessions will provide current information to help people better understand exactly how areas - such as ours - can benefit by accessing resources from the State Office of Broadband."



# Two Hasting residents arrested and released in death of 10-year-old girl

#### DNA matching girl was found on trailer / Meier's next court appearance is August 1

Two Hastings residents were arrested and released in connection with the hit and run accident on Hwy. 18 near Mille Lacs Lake that killed 10-year-old Caylin Donovan of Lake Park on June 10.

Steven Lee Meier, 44, and Deborah Lynn Chandler, 45, both of Hastings, were arrested after the Minnesota State Patrol recieved a tip from the public.



Steven Lee Meier, 44

Meier was charged on June 22 with two felony counts: one count of felony criminal vehicular homicide – leave scene of collision and one count of felony criminal vehicular homicide – fail to notify law enforcement of collision. He was released on a conditional bond of \$50,000.

His Omnibus Hearing is set for August 1, 2016 at 1:30 p.m.

Meier has previous offenc-

es: one DUI in 2007, one seatbelt and two speeding, violations.

Chandler has been released with no charges at this time.

According to Aitkin County Attorney Jim Ratz, "This is an active investigation at this point." Chandler could be charged later.

According to the criminal complaint, Meier was driving a white Jeep Cherokee with a boat and trailer. Chandler was following Meier to Myr-Mar Resort, driving a Chevrolet Tahoe and a camper.

On June 10, 2016, at approximately 7:56 p.m., Joel Jader contacted the Aitkin County Sheriff's Office and reported a hit and run crash at 38714 State Highway 18 in Wealthwood Township, Aitkin County. Jader reported the victim, Caylin Donovan did not have a pulse. At

approximately 8:19 p.m., ambulance personnel arrived on scene and pronounced Donovan dead.

At approximately 8:10 p.m., Aitkin County Deputy John Wersal arrived at the crash and spoke to Jader who stated he had been in his screened-in porch when he heard the crash. Jader stated he saw a big truck, which had loud howling tires, traveling westbound. Jader heard a loud bang and then heard the vehicle accelerate. When Jader looked out at the highway he saw a white pickup pulling a 5th wheel camper, which also accelerated quickly. Jader thought the two vehicles may have been traveling together and the driver of the second vehicle could have witnessed the accident.

Troopers did not observe any marks on the pavement indicating a vehicle had braked.

On June 12, 2016, William Granholm contacted State Trooper Keith Benz and reported he had observed a maroon Tahoe or Suburban with Wisconsin license plates driven by a female, which was pulling a camper.

Shortly after meeting the Tahoe, the reporting party came upon the crash. Granholm stated he remembered

the vehicle because he did not see many women driving a vehicle pulling a camper

Officers reviewed security video at the Junction Gas

On June 13, Trooper Benz located the Chevrolet Tahoe, and a camper, parked at Myr-Mar Marina. Trooper Benz noted there was also a white Jeep Cherokee, boat and trailer at the campsite.

Chandler stated on June 10, they drove I-35 north to Finlayson, then traveled westbound on State Highway 18 to State Highway 47, turned westbound on State Highway 18 in Malmo, south onto US Highway 169 to Myr Mar Resort. Chandler said she did not know the way to Myr Mar Marina, so she was following Meier. Chandler denied seeing anyone walking or sitting along State Highway 18; she denied knowing anything about the

The troopers noted at no point did Chandler appear tearful, remorseful, or upset about the crash.

Meier stated he drove the Jeep pulling the boat and he said he did not see anyone walking or sitting along State Highway 18 and denied hitting anything.

Sergeant Turcotte observed the boat trailer had right side damage by the wheel well fender, which Meier indicated was from when a tire blew and wrapped around the wheel well.

Sergeant Turcotte learned in the days following the crash multiple people had reported seeing Donovan sitting on the shoulder of the roadway near the fog line. On June 15, 2016, Sergeant Turcotte and BCA Special Agent Eric Jaeche spoke to Joel Jader who stated Donovan may have been picking up rocks.

Sergeant Turcotte learned from the Medical Examiner that Donovan did have multiple rocks in her pocket.

On June 16, 2016, Sergeant Turcotte viewed security video from Barnacles

Resort, which is located less

The of

than three miles from the crash site. Sergeant Turcotte noted Meier's Jeep traveled westbound by Barnacles Resort at approximately 7:49:12 p.m., followed by Chandler's Tahoe at approximately 7:49:17 p.m. Sergeant Turcotte noted the closest vehicle in front of Meier and Chandler traveled by Barnacles Resort approximately one minute and 25 seconds ahead of them and one minute and 45 seconds passed before the next westbound vehicle traveled by Barnacles Resort behind them. Using time distance calculations with average road speeds, Sergeant Turcotte determined Meier and Chandler would have been at the crash site at the approximate time of the crash.

Sergeant Turcotte received a photograph of what appeared to be a tire tread mark on Donovan's thigh.

Sergeant Turcotte compared the photograph to a photograph Trooper Benz had taken of the tire tread on Meier's boat trailer, whereupon Sergeant Turcotte determined the tread on the outside edge of the tire closely resembled the mark on Donovan's thigh.

Sergeant Turcotte and Special Agent Jaeche went to Meier and Chandler's residence in Hastings, to speak to Meier and Chandler. The officers took a taped statement from Meier who denied seeing anyone on State Highway 18 on June 10, 2016.

Meier stated when they got to Myr-Mar Resort, Chandler told him she saw a lady on the side of the road.

Meier stated he believed Chandler thought the lady on the road was a deer.

Meier denied swerving, hitting anything, running anything over, going off onto the shoulder, or hitting any bumps while traveling on State Highway 18. Meier stated the boat and trailer had been put into two different lakes over the weekend of lune 10.

The officers next took a

taped statement from Chandler who stated she thought she saw a deer and then at the last second realized it was a lady on the road by the fog line and had to move over to the left to avoid striking the body.

Chandler stated she was traveling approximately 15 yards behind Meier and he did not swerve for anything. Chandler admitted she did not call 911 or any authorities to report the body on the highway.

When they arrived at Myr-Mar Resort, Chandler asked Meier if he had seen the body on the highway, to which he indicated he had not seen anything. Chandler stated she was unaware Donovan had died until the next day when someone at the bar told her. Chandler stated she felt guilty for lying to Sergeant Turcotte at the campground and felt horrible for not stopping.

Search warrants were executed by State Troopers and BCA Special Agents, wherein evidence was collected from the Jeep, boat and trailer belonging to Meier. Analysis of the boat trailer determined there was a suspected fabric type imprint on the grommet by the marker light on the passenger side of the trailer, near the damaged area. There was also obvious wiping/ scrubbing visible on the passenger side of the trailer and on the underside of the wheel well on the passenger side tire compartment. There was no wiping/scrubbing seen on the driver side of the boat or trailer. The diamond plate foot step on the passenger side was easily removed and there were indicators the underside of the foot step had been wiped/scrubbed. Several blood swabs were taken from the passenger side of the trailer. DNA profiling was done on a swab taken from the damaged rear passenger wheel well of Meier's trailer.

The profiling revealed a single source DNA profile, which indicated a female and matched the DNA of Donovan.

# Aitkin deserves better than good enough

At the April 18 Aitkin School Board meeting, Hasskamp, Welshons and Hoge very clearly held their nose...s and voted in support of the committee's recommendation to pursue a referendum to build a new school. They honored the letter of their promise of support but violated the spirit of it. Chute just voted, no. This undermined the process they themselves set up.

The district hired a firm (FJJ) to form and facilitate a committee of volunteer community members to study and discuss all of the relevant facts. They decided to pursue a new building rather than remodel the old building. The information that led to this decision is on the school district's web page. Rather than second guess the validity of the process, we should as a community do what the school board and superintendent were unable to bring themselves to do and get

behind the decision and work to make it happen.

The future deserves better than good enough. Consider the growth and size of the district's fund balance through the years in relation to the deferred maintenance that resulted in hundreds of thousands of dollars in damage from a roof cave-in at the high school last summer. That is what "good enough" looks like. School board members and administration are the sum of their decisions and choices. When those decisions are ineffective and unproductive the community should take notice.

chose to leave their old locations

They were probably criticized and second guessed too, but they took the creative and courageous leap to build on what they'd started without being tied to the limitations of the past.

The students of Aitkin deserve that kind of creativity and courage. To retrofit and remodel a landlocked, outdated building with no opportunity for future growth is just buying time. The school leadership does not have the capacity to make this happen. If it did, we wouldn't be in the fix we are now. It is on the community and the community should not just choose to buy time but instead, invest in the future by voting to build a new school on



#### Northeast Brainerd celebrated for History Week

# Iconic Evergreen Cemetery resting place of prominent area citizens

Information taken from "A Brief History of Northeast Brainerd" by Ann M. Nelson Whether you are talking

about The Shops, The Mill, The Mall, the Triangle or the Red and White, these iconic locations are remembered fondly of those of us who grew up in Northeast Brain-

Roughly bordered by Lum Park on the east, the old paper mill on the north, the Railroad Shops on the south and Cemetery Hill on the west, northeast Brainerd is home to generations of Brainerd residents. It also was the site of much industry in the area -- industry which ultimately attracted many families to live and work in the Brainerd

As part of Brainerd History Week, Duane Blanck and John VanEssen hosted a walking tour of the Evergreen Cemetery, a huge, tree-lined expanse that follows along the Mississippi River and has been the interment site of local citizens for over 130 years.

The walk included highlighting the graves -- marked and unmarked -- of wellknown Northeasters and also a lesson in the industry that built the area.

#### **Northeast Industry**

The Northern Pacific Shops, which still exist as the NP Events Center and also a working space for the BNSF railroad, were once one of

the finest railroad shops in America. The complex included many buildings for doing various jobs of assembling and repairing rail cars and engines. Some of the buildings were built from brick that was also mined on the Mississippi River bank in northeast Brainerd. At times of high activity, The Shops, as they are known locally, employed over 1,000 people.

From 1872 to 1881, the

Schwartz Brickyard operated on the east bank of the Mississippi River where the future paper mill would stand. From a bed of clay that was thirty-six feet deep, bricks were manufactured that built many buildings in Brainerd and elsewhere in Minnesota and the Midwest. A train spur was run to the brickyard to supply bricks for the growing Railroad Shops complex and brickyard staff was housed in a boarding house onsite. The former courthouse on the north side of Brainerd, now an apartment building on the southeast corner of Fourth and Kingwood streets, is one of the few remaining buildings that show off the high-quality light-colored brick that came from Brainerd.

#### The Fill.

Many old timers refer to The Fill, which is gap on Washington Street on the south side of the street. The old football field by the former Franklin Junior High School is on the north side of The Fill.

People from northeast had a difficult time crossing the huge ravine to get to downtown Brainerd and had to walk way out of their way to cross by the cemetery or use the railroad tracks by The Shops, risking being hit by a train. There was also a rough plank bridge located barely above the stream at the bottom of the ravine, with steep, sandy fifty-foot banks to climb up or down on either side. Also, Northeasters were afraid to cross the ravine at night due to the suspicious characters who lurked there.

A new bridge was built

across the ravine in 1885, and, subsequently, bridges were repaired and new ones built, which were always failing. In 1914, bids were were employed to fill the ravine along with an extensive operation of tracks and steam shovels. After the Washington Street Bridge over the Mississippi was constructed in west Brainerd in 1932,

Brainerd at Kingwood Street. The northeast site prevailed and a dam was completed in 1888 that consisted of wooden pilings driven inside a belt a hundred feet wide, with spaces in between filled with rock. Material to build this dam, which is still operational today, were 2.5 million board feet of pine, 70,000 feet of oak, 800 tons of iron and 2,800 cords of stone. The city of Brainerd took ownership of the dam in in recent years.

Other industry of note in northeast included the headguarters of the Brainerd and Northern Minnesota Railroad Company, the Lumberman's Hospital (which later moved and became St. Joseph's Brainerd wagon bridge at the dam, dropping 50 feet into the water before workers at the mill could rescue him. Ahren's Hill later was the site of a forestry fire tower and a parking spot for young lovers. It now has homes on it.

Benjamin Arnold 1888-1916, was a University of Minnesota Law School graduate who drown in Clark Lake trying to rescue a young woman. He received a Carnegie Hero Fund award.

William Brockway, a Canadian who died in 1896, came to Brainerd in 1882 and operated the East Brainerd Hotel at what is now the northeast corner of First Ave and Washington St. Later, it became the Lumberman's


Hospital.

Marie Ann Canan, who died in 1944, was one of two women photographers in Brainerd. She opened a studio in 1898 and operated it for 36 years. Many local families have photos taken

Jessie Canniff, 1889-1974, operated a photography studio on South Sixth Street from 1918 to 1951. She lived with her sister Fleda Mae, 1885-1958, who was a school teacher for 41 years and the principal of Harrison School from 1910 to 1952.

Edward Albert Crust, Sr., whose grave is pictured, was

as "Mrs. Northeast". Born in New York, she came to Brainerd in 1876 and was a very popular Brained hostess, elected the first Worthy Matron of the Eastern Star. She was philanthropic, kept thoroughbred horses, planted maple trees along what is now H Street and held lavish parties at the Frosythe home on the corner of Third Avenue and D Street, which was torn down in 1976. Over 250 guests came to their silver wedding anniversary party held in that home. She owned considerable property, including the First Avenue Hotel and a downtown restaurant.



George Crust, an Englishman, was a blacksmith foreman at the Railroad Shops and held many political offices in Brain-

an Englishman who was foreman of the Northern Pacific blacksmith shop for 33 years. He served on the Brainerd City Council and the Crow Wing County Board, was a mayor of Brainerd and held various offices within the Masonic Lodge.

David Frank Ebinger came to town in 1878 and operated a brickyard after the Schwartz Brickyard closed down. He also ran a confectionary store on 4th Ave NE and a grocery store on South Eighth St. His son Howard and grandsons Bill and Ed were grounds superintendents at Evergreen Cemetery for over 60 years.

Henry Elvig opened Elvig Pharmacy in downtown Brainerd in 1944. The store was a fixture at the northwest corner of Laurel and South Eighth streets.


