## Carbin wins high jump competition at 2016 USATF

*Carbin is tied for the fourth best mark in California State history*

**M**t. Pleasant High School graduate Darius Carbin won the high jump competition at the 2016 USATF under 20 track and field championships last Sunday at Buchanan Veteran's Memorial Stadium at Clovis, CA.



Balboa of San Francisco's Maurice Crumby jumped 7'4 1/2" in 1983.

Last month, Carbin also won the Central Coast Section Championship in both the triple jump and the high jump. The winning high jump was 7' on the same track in Clovis on June 2.

Carbin, who won a bronze medal at last summer's World Under 18 Championships in Cali, Columbia will now represent the USA in the world under 20 championships in Bydgoszcz, Poland July

Carbin's jump of 2.22 meters or 7'3 1/4" is a new CCS all time record. The previous Central Coast Championship record of 7'3" was accomplished in 1985 by Jeff Rogers of Overfelt High School.

Carbin is tied for the fourth best mark in California State history.

# New water use rules for residents now in effect

## Outdoor water conservation rules and recommendations

Outdoor water use is probably the easiest place to reduce water use since it accounts for roughly half of the average water bill. Beginning July 1, 2016, please follow these rules:

**Be cool – water when it's cool**, by hand held hose with an automatic shut off nozzle or irrigation system before 10:00 a.m. and after 8:00 p.m. With a SPRINKLER system, water before 10:00 a.m. and after 8:00 p.m. only on three designated days:

Odd numbered addresses may water on Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays;

Even numbered addresses may water on Tuesdays, Fridays and Sundays;

Properties without an address may water on Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

Watering outdoors at other times is not allowed. Less evaporation occurs in the cooler evening and early morning hours — so you can use less water and your plants and landscape will absorb more of it.

Lawns are incredibly resilient and can tolerate the dry conditions of summer, if left alone. Letting your lawn go dormant and turn brown is okay. The grass will bounce back when rainfall and cool temperatures return in the fall and winter months. Learn more about lawn watering tips.

**Be a sharp shooter — with automatic shut-off nozzles.** Cars can be washed at home, but only using hoses with a nozzle that shuts off automatically when the handle is released. This helps you aim and control the water and can save many gallons.

**Be quick — fix water leaks as soon as possible.** Fix visible leaks as soon as possible. If notified of a leak in your system, fix it within 5 working days. Visit our **leaks** page to find out how to detect water leaks and fix them.

**Be in control — don't let water flow into gutters or streets.** Beyond minor splashing of



surfaces, sprinkler and drip systems and hand watering that cause water to flow into gutters and streets or that make large puddles is not allowed.

**Be a sweeper — sweep hard surfaces.** Use a broom instead of a hose to clean patios, sidewalks, driveways, parking lots, or other hard surfaces. Note: Hosing is allowed when health and safety issues are a concern.

**Be frugal — water less often and consider rebates.** Many plants can survive on less water, especially when the weather starts to cool. Consider replacing lawns and thirsty plants with drought tolerant landscaping and get a rebate from the Santa Clara Valley Water District! **Be resourceful — don't water after it rains.** Watering outdoors within 48 hours after measurable rain is not allowed.

Exemptions: The use of recycled water and graywater is exempt from these rules. There are many recycled water users in the South Bay so you may see daylight watering of landscaping at business, retail, and municipal locations or in medians and parks that are connected to the recycled water system.

Currently, the San Jose Evergreen Community College District is in the midst of negotiating the development of land adjacent to Evergreen Valley College.

This event will be an opportunity for the District to provide the community with an update, as well as answer community questions.

The San Jose Evergreen Community College Board of Trustees recently approved the creation of a closed committee ("Asset Management Committee") with the goal of moving forward on the proposed development of the 27 acres on the college site.

The plan includes up to 40,000 sq. ft. of retail, and 18,000 to 40,000 sq. ft. of office space with a gym.

The developer is also considering building an aquatics center, not the District as earlier reported in the Evergreen Times. If the aquatics center is built, it would be included in the 27-acre development. However there is no signed agreement or understanding between the District and the developer as to who can use the center and under what conditions, including the public.

The district would lease the ground to a real estate developer but retain ownership of the land, which it says is not needed for expansion of the academic program.

Many Evergreen community leaders believe that rather than leasing the land, the District should be focusing on working with the community to develop the college into a first-rate institution that serves students' needs.

"The District needs to consider expanding their curriculums and course offerings to attract back a significant number of the 18.5 thousand students who are leaving our community and district to go to other community colleges in the local bay area," said Sandi Randles, advocate for quality education.

College Chancellor, Dr. Debbie Budd, published a letter in the Evergreen Times to the community stating that the development proposal "will specifically not encompass the entire 27 acres." However, an email dated June 10 from Kimberley Vacca, Long Range Planner for the City of San Jose states, "They [the applicant Republic Urban] have confirmed that their proposed acreage remains at 27 acres for the General Plan Amendment."

## Water district board approves grants for 11 wildlife habitat restoration projects

Last week the Santa Clara Valley Water District Board of Directors approved more than \$1 million in grants to 11 agencies to move forward on planning, design and construction of wildlife habitat restoration.

The money is included in the Safe, Clean Water and Natural Flood Protection Program, a 15-year parcel tax approved by voters in November 2012.

“We are excited to provide the necessary funding to advance these projects,” said Board Chair Barbara Keegan. “Working closely with our partners in the community helps us leverage the public’s money to get even broader protections for our local waterways.”

The 11 projects, totaling up to \$1,095,004 in grants and partnerships, are in addition to four others, valued at \$893,680 that the Board awarded in December 2015. With funding left in the project budget, the Board directed staff to extend the application time period and to broaden the types of eligible projects to include planning and feasibility studies. These 11 projects are a result of that action.

**The projects are listed below:**

- Loma Prieta Resource Conservation District, \$79,953, for Sycamore Alluvial Woodland Restoration Phase II
- Friends of the Stevens Creek Trail, \$52,162, for Stevens Creek Steelhead Passage Improvement Project
- Working Partnership, \$24,750, for Planning Coyote Creek Invasive Plant Removal and Revegetation
- City of Mountain View, \$43,920, for Permanente Creek Watershed Enhancement Project
- Save the Bay, \$95,868, for Palo Alto Baylands Tidal Lagoon Transition Zone Habitat Restoration Project
- City of Santa Clara, \$165,249, for Ulistac Restoration 2016 Project
- San Francisco Bay Bird Observatory, \$217,032, for Establishing Forster’s Tern Nesting Colonies for the South Bay Salt Pond Restoration Project Using Innovative Technologies project



■ City of San Jose, \$191,041, for Evergreen Creek Corridor Restoration project

■ Children’s Discovery Museum of San Jose, \$142,771, for Bill’s Backyard: Bridge to Nature project

■ Santa Clara Valley Chapter of the California Native Plant Society, \$50,574 for Plant Pathogen Training and Education at CNPS Nursery.

■ Campus Community Association, \$31,684 for Metcalf Ponds Parkway Lakes Steelhead Habitat and Passage Improvement Project.

The projects were reviewed by a panel that included a nonprofit organization leader, water district and Gilroy city staff with experience in habitat restoration projects.

The water district will work with these entities to develop grants and partnership agreements for execution immediately. Projects awarded grants and partnerships under this funding cycle are targeted for completion by December 31, 2019.

Each year, one or more grant programs will have a new funding cycle in the Safe, Clean Water program. This cycle will fund grants and partnerships for wildlife habitat restoration projects. 



## HelloBots brings the fun of LEGO Robotics to the San Jose community

As the world around us advances through the world of technology, it is likely that future generations will depend on technology as a main necessity in life. But how will these young generations know what the future has in store for them without getting the proper exposure at a young age?

Labanya Mukhopadhyay, currently a junior at Evergreen Valley High School, was drawn into robotics from her fourth grade. She noticed that robotics was an activity that only privileged children had access to and girls steered away from it due to preconceived misconceptions. As a captain of an all girls school robotics team, she observed how robotics could open up a new dimension of knowledge, and could change one's attitude towards science and education. That inspired her to start the HelloBots LEGO robotics program for the ethnically diverse and primarily immigrant children in San Jose.

HelloBots organized 5 to 6 weeks workshops for 4 - 8th grade children about how to build and program a robot using Lego Mindstorm, completely free of cost. Labanya received a great support and inspiration from San Jose Branch librarians to make this a successful program.

HelloBots runs workshops at four Public Branch Libraries and after school classes at two public school districts in San Jose. HelloBots

arranged an all-girls workshop in February, 2016 called "HelloBots for Her" with an aim to encourage more young girls to the world of technology and robotics. This is the first LEGO robotics program for the students of Alum Rock community. So far HelloBots served more than 200 children from San Jose and beyond. HelloBots also offers Advanced level workshops, where children with basic robotics knowledge can explore further.

This program has been recognized by the City of San Jose. Labanya received a commendation from the Vice Mayor for her contribution to San Jose community through HelloBots. According to Diana Learned, a librarian at the Alum Rock

Public Library, "The HelloBots program has been successful and brought a new, high-tech offering to the low-income, primarily immigrant community served in the Alum Rock area." HelloBots is a proud recipient of a generous grant from San Jose chapter of Awesome Foundation in the month of July 2016.

HelloBots has planned an exciting LEGO Robothon, a fun robotics competition on August 13th, at the Evergreen Branch Library, San Jose. Here students will build and program a robot in teams, with guidance from instructors, and compete for prizes in a friendly setting. All attendees will win prizes. This event is sponsored by San Jose Vice Mayor Rose Herrera, Silver Creek Academy, and Walmart. This competition is the first of its kind in San Jose to foster STEM education to our youth in the most fun and creative way possible, LEGO robotics!

These exciting new events and workshops wouldn't have been possible without the dedication and hard work of the directors, Mayank Kulshreshtha, and Megha Mohanakrishnan, and instructors Tedra Chen, and Kaitlyn Gunadhi. The Hellobots team is determined to reach out to every child in San Jose and beyond. ## Double promotion has lasting effect on student

The principal moved a chair from behind her desk and placed it next to mine: we sat almost shoulder to shoulder. A bit unusual, but I viewed her demeanor as positive, not confrontational.

If you're a teacher, you know when the principal calls you into the office, closes the door, and asks, "How are things going?" things are about to get dicey. That's the way our afternoon meeting began. It was early October of 1982.

Overwhelmed by a surge of anxiety, my stomach felt hollow. I thought, *this is the way meetings begin when you have really screwed up.*

"Something has come to my attention."

She spoke slowly, pausing, choosing her words with care. "You're aware that we don't normally double promote students? And if we did, it would have to be a decision made by the teacher, parents, student, and the school administration."

"Yes." My throat became dry. I coughed.

Calmly, the principal continued, "Last June you double promoted a child."

I stared at the principal in disbelief. My jaw might have fallen an inch or two. I thought to myself, *there must be some kind of mix-up.*

"Do you remember Kim Le?"

"Yes."

With incomplete information, my brain worked its way in circles. Calm

on the outside, I tried to make a single, meaningful connection.

Concerned, I spoke slowly, working my way from the known in a seemingly futile attempt to resurrect some suppressed and forgotten sin.

"Kim Le had been a fifth grade student, and academically the best in my class. After a long pause, I added, "I didn't double promote the girl."

Dumbfounded, I learned that this meeting centered upon a promotion error. During my entire career I had never double promoted a student. There were students who should have been given the opportunity, but in spite of written or oral requests to principals and counselors, the educational system, the one I knew, never followed my recommendations regarding promotions or retentions.

Softly and professionally, the principal said, "I've been in contact with Kim's principal at her new school. I have also spoken with her father by phone. We try to keep students with their social peer groups. Kim Le should have been promoted to the sixth grade, but somehow she got double promoted to the seventh."

Certain that I had a quizzical look on my face, my mind tumbled trying to reconstruct what had caused such a problem. I had no clue.

The principal continued, "The family moved to a new school district. With report card in hand, Kim Le's parents registered her in the seventh grade. After three weeks, her student-records folder had caught up with her and the school office staff

realized that Kim had been placed in the wrong grade."

Kim's father, a proud man, had stood his ground refusing to allow his child to be regressed to the sixth grade. I could visualize the man defending his daughter while pushing Kim's report card forward for all to see. Letter grades and repeated teacher notations clearly spelled out that his daughter was socially and academically exceptional. He told everyone who would listen. "Kim is doing well in the seventh grade, an abrupt change at this late date would be disruptive, unfair, and disrespectful to my daughter and to our family."

After all, the report card did clearly state that Kim *had been* promoted to the seventh grade. The administrators of each school had been caught in the middle of a situation not of their making. Not surprisingly, some answers were called for and those answers would have to come from me.

Trying to be helpful, I found myself as puzzled as others.

Suddenly, I understood it all. Chagrined, I let out a loud, "Oops!" I leaned forward in my seat and proceeded to give an accounting of the events that led to Kim's double promotion.

The preceding year I had taught a combination class of fifth and sixth grades. Because of multiple classroom management and teaching challenges, such a class can be difficult. In September Kim Le enrolled

in my class as a fifth-grader. She earned an A plus on all assignments and tests. Soon I seated her with my sixth graders because of her exceptional ability. I became aware that she was helping some of my academically challenged students.

In June, I noted on report cards for fifth-graders, "Promoted to sixth grade." For six-graders, I checked off, "Promoted to seventh grade." I had forgotten that Kim was a registered fifth grader.

Smiling reassuringly and touching my shoulder lightly, the principal said, "Everything will be okay. Because the father is so steadfast, the school will put Kim Le on probation, and a final decision regarding her placement will be made at the end of the first quarter."

In late spring of the same school year, I received a phone call at home. It was Kim. She spoke in a small voice that did not conceal her excitement. Her school had allowed her to remain in the seventh grade. What's more, as a seventh-grader, she had been on the honor roll for three quarters and expected to do so again in the school year's final quarter.

"Tell me about your grades."

"Mr. Denevan," she said softly, "all A's."

For once a rigid system regarding promotion had exhibited a degree of flexibility. That made me feel good. Now, years later, I still get emotional just thinking about it.

Eight years passed. It was the final day of the school year, and my students were excused for the last time. Most, I would never see again. An hour later, the classroom was vacant

and silent. Bulletin boards were down, and trash cans overflowed. The dust had not yet settled. Cards and small gifts crowded my desktop.

Through an open door, afternoon summer sunlight flooded the empty room. I looked up from my work and saw the silhouettes of two women, one older and one younger. They slowly stepped into the room. With a big smile of recognition and a nod of respect, I greeted them. I took their hands in mine, as the older woman introduced herself and her daughter.

With a questioning smile, the younger woman turned her dark eyes from her mother, blushed, and in a small, hopeful voice said, "Mr. Denevan, do you remember me?"

My heart said, "Yes. Oh, yes!"

Moments like that are golden. For a teacher, they are few and far between. Only one in a hundred former students will ever contact a teacher. Fewer yet will voice that you made a difference, and that's okay. It is just the way it is.

We sat down. I tried not to show the forming beads of tears in my eyes. In eight minutes, mother and daughter told me a story covering eight years. Kim Le was now a young lady of nineteen. As in elementary school, she had also skipped one year of high school. Two days earlier, Kim had graduated as a pre-med student from Santa Clara University—doing so in just three years, instead of the expected four.

My inner self was bursting with satisfaction. Teachers plant seeds. Few see what grows. I had recognized Kim's potential and believed in







## Steven Liu named alternate to International Chemistry Olympiad

National chemistry whiz Steven Liu has been named as an alternate to the team that will represent the U.S. at the 48th International Chemistry Olympiad (IChO).

The members of the Alpha Iota Team will travel to Tbilisi, Georgia, where they will compete with their peers from more than 70 nations for gold, silver and bronze medals, July 23 – Aug. 1.

The competition for the U.S. team was fierce, beginning with a multiple-choice exam taken by nearly 16,000 high school students across the country. The top 1,000 then advanced to take the National Chemistry Olympiad test. From there the top 20 went on to a study camp at the University of Mary Washington (UMW) in Fredericksburg,

Virginia, where four were selected for the team along with two alternates.

The IChO originated with Czechoslovakia, Poland and Hungary in 1968. Soon, other Eastern European countries joined the event; Western Europe began participating in 1974. The first U.S. team competed in 1984, winning one silver and two bronze medals.

The American Chemical Society is a nonprofit organization chartered by the U.S. Congress. With nearly 157,000 members, ACS is the world's largest scientific society and a global leader in providing access to chemistry-related research through its multiple databases, peer-reviewed journals and scientific conferences. Its main offices are in Washington, D.C., and Columbus, Ohio.

# Natural v. Added SUGARS

## What does it mean for your family's health?

## FAMILY FEATURES

**S**ugars are one of the most important health conversations today. A diet filled with too many added sugars is associated with weight gain, type 2 diabetes and heart disease. According to the 2005-2010 National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, the average American consumes an average of 20 teaspoons a day, significantly more than the 6-9 teaspoons recommended daily by the American Heart Association.

Sugar can mean different things to different people, which not only adds to the confusion, but can quickly derail even your best intentions as you try to make the right choices for your family.

### The difference between added and naturally occurring sugars

Many nourishing foods such as fruits, vegetables, certain whole grains and dairy products contain what are known as naturally occurring sugars; these are simple carbohydrates that are naturally present in a food's biological structure. For example, the lactose found in milk is a sugar, as is the fructose in fruit.

In contrast, added sugars are those sugars or sweeteners you add in your kitchen – adding sugar or honey to a recipe or onto your breakfast cereal, for example – as well as sugars and sweeteners that are added to a variety of products by food manufacturers. Added sugars are often used to enhance taste and flavor, of course, but can also be included for other reasons, such as to prevent spoiling – think summer jams – or assist in fermentation, such as in baking.

“Working with the Florida Department of Citrus, I’ve seen firsthand how much confusion there is around this topic for many families,” said registered dietitian Kate Geagan, author of “Go Green Get Lean.” “Yet while too many added sugars can fill your diet with ‘empty calories,’ naturally occurring sugars are found in some of nature’s most nutrient-rich packages, delivering a bevy of benefits such as vitamins, minerals, antioxidants and more.”

An 8-ounce glass of 100 percent orange juice, for instance, has no added sugar. Beyond being an excellent source of vitamin C, it’s a good source of folate, especially important for women of childbearing age, as well as potassium, a vital mineral which helps nerves and muscles communicate and can help offset the effects of too much sodium in the diet. In fact, the FDA recently announced it will add potassium to the Nutrition Facts Panel because many Americans are falling short.

The benefits don’t stop there, though. A glass of 100 percent orange juice also delivers magnesium, vitamin A and niacin. Plus, it’s a significant source of hesperidin, an antioxidant that research suggests may have heart, blood pressure and cognition benefits, as well as reduce inflammation and oxidation. Furthermore, one glass counts as one serving (1 cup) of fruit to help you meet the 1.5-2 cups per day recommended by the Dietary Guidelines for Americans.

### How much added sugar is too much?

A delicious, vibrant eating plan that you can stick with for the long haul doesn’t mean you can’t ever consume added sugar, but it is about cutting back for most Americans – especially for groups with the highest intakes, such as adolescents and men – and replacing those calories with nutrient-rich foods.

The most recent Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommend limiting added sugar intake to a maximum of 10 percent of total calories each day, or 200 calories of a 2,000 calorie diet, which matches guidelines from the World Health Organization and the American Heart Association.

For best results, focus on filling your diet with an abundance of naturally nutrient-rich foods and shift to a diet that includes plenty of plant foods. For more recipes using Florida orange juice, visit [floridacitrus.org](http://floridacitrus.org).

### Homemade Orange Granola

Servings: 6

- 1 1/2 cups quick cooking oatmeal
- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- 1/2 cup sliced almonds
- 1/4 cup sunflower seeds or pumpkin seeds
- 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 cup 100 percent Florida orange juice, divided
- 3 tablespoons canola oil
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup dried cranberries

Heat oven to 325 F. Spray baking sheet with non-stick cooking spray.

In large bowl, combine oatmeal, walnuts, almonds, sunflower seeds and cinnamon; mix well. Drizzle in 1/3 cup orange juice; stir well to evenly coat oatmeal mixture.

Repeat twice more, stirring after each addition of orange juice.

In small bowl, combine oil, honey and vanilla; stir well to combine. Drizzle oil mixture over oatmeal mixture; stir well to coat oatmeal mixture.

Spread oatmeal mixture on prepared baking sheet in even layer. Bake 30 minutes, stirring every 10 minutes, to evenly brown granola.

Remove from oven, add cranberries and cool completely. Store in airtight container up to one week.

**Serving suggestion:** For a morning parfait, serve homemade orange granola with milk or a dollop of plain Greek yogurt. Add in sliced fruit for extra color.



### Clearing up food label confusion

In May 2016, the FDA announced a revamped Nutrition Facts Panel that includes, among other improvements, clearly listing added sugars on their own line for the first time.

Up until now, both added and naturally occurring sugars have been lumped together under one “sugars” line, making it vexing for the average eater to determine how much sugar is naturally occurring versus added, especially given the dozens of different names for sweeteners that manufacturers often use. When this change hits supermarket shelves, families will be able to more easily spot foods and beverages that contain little to no added sugar.

In addition to highlighting added sugars and potassium, the Nutrition Facts Panel will now more accurately reflect serving sizes that Americans actually eat and drink. Also, packages that are reasonably consumed in a single sitting will no longer get a free ride using smaller serving sizes and listing multiple “servings” per bag, container or can.

### Sloppy O Joes

Servings: 4

- 9 ounces lean ground turkey
- 1/2 large minced onion
- 1 small red bell pepper, minced
- 1 teaspoon cumin seed, ground
- 1 teaspoon coriander seed, ground
- 1 cup Florida orange juice
- 1 cup organic tomato juice
- 1 large sweet potato, baked and diced
- 4 whole wheat dinner rolls

In medium saute pan, saute ground turkey over medium heat until cooked thoroughly. Remove turkey; reserve.

Saute onion until translucent. Add red pepper, cumin and coriander; saute for 1 minute then add orange juice. Cook until orange juice is reduced by two-thirds; add tomato juice and cooked turkey.

Cook until tomato juice has reduced by two-thirds then add diced baked sweet potato and stir until combined.

Split dinner rolls in half; spoon turkey mixture in center. Serve immediately.

# New California vaccine law challenged in court



## New Seasons Market to host culinary series with French-trained chef

New Seasons Market Evergreen will be hosting four culinary education classes led by Chef Barbie Aknin starting July 14.

The owner of Community Cuisine, Chef Barbie Aknin has provided cooking instruction in corporate settings and cooking schools for more than twenty years. She has diplomas in restaurant and food management from West Valley College in Saratoga and a Diplome Etudes de Culinaires from La Varenne Ecole de Cuisine in Paris, France.

Two of the classes feature fermented foods. "A fermentation revival is sweeping the Bay area and the nation," said Chef Aknin. "This method yields nutrient-dense foods that are alive with probiotics, vitamins, minerals and enzymes, all of which strengthen the immune system and the health of the gut," she added.

The first class on Thursday, July 14 is a sauerkraut workshop, and the second class on Thursday, July 21 is fermenting vegetables with salt brine. ## Tips to grill chicken perfectly every time

Grilled chicken is one of those foods that can go terribly wrong. Clint Cantwell of ChefWorks.com took some time to teach us the five biggest mistakes — along with solutions — that arise when grilling chicken at your backyard cookout. —Editor

Grilling chicken doesn't have to be a disaster if you follow grilling master Clint Cantwell's five tips.

Grilled chicken is a staple at backyard cookouts across the country, but far too often, it falls flat. Whether it's a lack of seasoning, burnt-on barbecue sauce, or (eek) undercooked meat, bad chicken can quickly turn your gathering into an epic fail.

To help step up your chicken-grilling skills, we've teamed up with the culinary team at Chef Works, the leading suppliers of culinary apparel for chefs and home cooks alike, for five tips for reaching grilled chicken perfection!

### Bland Chicken

**Problem:** Great grilled chicken starts with proper seasoning, but often, cooks are too focused on getting the bird on the grill to properly flavor it.

**Fix It:** As with any protein, chicken should be liberally seasoned with either salt and pepper or your favorite barbecue dry rub. Better yet, soak the chicken overnight in a saltwater brine to not only add flavor but also ensure the chicken stays moist.

### Burnt Barbecue Sauce

**Problem:** Barbecue sauce goes great with grilled chicken, but it is often added before the chicken hits the grill or as soon as it starts to cook. Unfortunately, barbecue sauce is full of sugar, which will quickly burn, not only ruining the overall taste but also giving the cook the false sense that the chicken is done.

**Fix it:** Hold the barbecue sauce until the last two to three minutes of the grilling process. Simply sauce both sides using a basting brush, cover the grill, and allow the sauce to set before serving.

### Grill Temperature Is Too High

**Problem:** Unlike steak, which

requires a high heat to sear on a grill, chicken will burn on the outside while not fully cooking on the inside if the heat is too high. It will cook more evenly and thoroughly at a lower temperature.

**Fix it:** Create a two-zone fire by placing all of the charcoal briquettes on one side of the charcoal grate. That way, you'll have a hot side for browning and crisping the chicken and a cooler side where it can be moved to finish cooking without burning the outside (note: on a gas grill, simply turn the burners off on one side for a cool zone). Once you've moved your **chicken** to the cool side, simply cover the grill and allow it to come to temperature.

### Treating All Chicken the Same

**Problem:** Whether it's bone-in, boneless, skin-on, or skinless, not all chicken grills in the same amount of time. Bone-in, skin-on chicken breasts, for example, might take up to 20 minutes to cook, while chicken legs will take slightly less time, and boneless, skinless thighs can be grilled in a matter of minutes.

**Fix it:** Select one cut of chicken and stick to it versus offering multiple options. Chicken thighs are a great option for everyone as they are much more forgiving if slightly overcooked.

### Relying on Looks to Determine Whether the Chicken Is Done

**Problem:** Too often, people assume chicken is done simply based on looks. The problem is that while it looks great on the outside, it could still be raw inside, creating a serious health hazard.

**Fix it:** Investing in an instant-read meat thermometer is a sure-fire way to know if the chicken has cooked to the FDA-approved temperature of 165 degrees F. You can take the chicken off the grill once it reaches 160 degrees F, as the temperature will continue to rise slightly even after it is removed from the heat. Be sure to let the chicken rest for a few minutes before serving so the cooking can complete.
