Concerns over EVC planned land development

Editor,

As a Villages resident and a faculty member at Evergreen Valley College, I am writing because I believe Evergreen residents have not been informed of the San Jose Evergreen Community College District's planned Land Development of 27 acres that consist of the previous SJECCD district office, the Police Academy, and 14.8 acres of vacant land along San Felipe Road.

The site plan consists of: 1)

Expansion of the existing shopping center; 2) Up to 400 affordable and/or senior apartments; 3) Medical outpatient, dental, and urgent care facility; 4) Private aquatic and competitive training site. The process has started and the bids are due April 14, 2015.

I have several serious concerns about this proposal: 1) the Board of Trustees believes that this is surplus land, but the college faculty and students believe this land is needed for the growth of Evergreen College. 2) This development will have dangerous effects on traffic in the area. 3) The increased housing will affect Evergreen K-12 schools that are already impacted with too many students. 4) The college's land and operations are funded by taxpayers to serve the community's educational needs, not for commercial investments that negatively impact Evergreen neighborhoods, schools, and quality of life.



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

SCHOOLS East Side District Board ratifies salary increases

he East Side Union High School District Board of Trustees ratified the collective bargaining agreements for each of the bargaining units: East Side Teachers Association, California School Employees Association, American Federation of Teachers and Administrator Collaborative of East Side at their meeting on Jan. 15.

The ratified agreements include a 5 percent on the schedule salary increase and up to an additional 1.5 percent on the schedule salary increase, which is contingent on the Legislature taking action increasing current year (2014-2015) Proposition 98 LCFF funding. The new agreement continues to pay 100 percent of family medical insurance benefits, including 100 percent of life insurance, vision and dental benefits.

The Collective Bargaining Agreement with the East Side Teachers Association also includes: an increase to hourly rates used to pay for teachers' extra duty; stipends for advisors, counselors and other certificated positions outside of the classroom; and, an increase to the salary schedule for our children's center instructors.

the Board of Supervisors, our County CEO and our community partners to be open to ideas and solutions from any quarter that will improve the services we

deliver to our community. I'm challenging our residents, too.

I want to know what you think of the initiatives I have proposed, how you can help us get them done and any new ideas that you have to help solve our most pressing problems. Among my proposals:

Homelessness: A new Task Force will meet for 10 months and focus on the most immediate needs of the thousands of people in Santa Clara County who are homeless. Co-chaired by Matt Mahood, President and CEO of the San Jose Silicon

Valley Chamber of Commerce, and Ben Field, Executive Officer of the South Bay Labor Council, the Task Force will hear ideas from the public and come up with a plan this year to create transitional housing as a safe and healthier alternative to forcing people to camp near creeks and sleep in doorways.

Type 2 diabetes: In Santa Clara County, 18 percent of adults have been told they are diabetic or pre-diabetic. And, of course, it's unknown how many residents have not been diagnosed but are at serious risk of developincrease their contribution for certificated and classified employee pension benefits, effective July 1, 2014.

> ing type 2 diabetes. Supervisor Ken Yeager will lead an effort to make sure everyone has access to screening and diabetes-prevention education. This is a health problem we can do something about now.

> Office of Neighborhood Safety: This new office is patterned after one in

Richmond. Our Office of Neighborhood Safety will focus on children and young adults who have been victims or offenders of violent crimes. With mentorships and intervention services, we'll work to change this behavior and lower violent crime statistics.

The South Bay really does have a South Bay: Boaters and kayakers have been making use of our access to the San Francisco Bay at the Alviso Marina County Park for years. It's time we invest in making the marina a must-visit attrac-

tion and an educational tool for residents, visitors and school children. I'm envisioning a floating classroom where students-and adults-can learn about the Don Edwards Wildlife Refuge or just enjoy our very own South Bay waterway.

OPINION ETA President says teachers are being suffocated with Common Core

omething is amiss. Some are saying there is a problem in the way our district implemented the Common Core with regard to teacher workload in creating new lessons, presenting, and grading them.

The district also bought Investigations Math Supplemental Program for grades 1-5 and it is this parent's opinion there may be problems associated with it. Now we learn there is currently is a teacher workload situation.

At the Jan. 8, 2015 school board meeting the following was stated to the school board trustees by the Evergreen Teacher Association President Brian Wheatly, "... I hope you are aware ETA filed a demand to bargain around the implementation of Common Core ... Basically, the people I represent are suffocating under the weight of having to create new curriculum as well as implement it ... the time commitment required is simply unsustainable."

Evergreen School District did not adopt of a new Common Core Math Textbook for this school year. With extended time requirements placed on teachers for creating tailored math and language arts Common Core lessons, all other subjects and responsibilities such as science, art, physical education, social studies, differentiating lessons for English Language Learners, and behavior management may also be negatively impacted due to a lack of time for the tired teachers to do it all. So, what should parents do?

We must create "buy in" on how

Common Core will be taught and measured and not have top down implementation of it. We need horizontal collaboration of decisions with equal power from all stakeholders. Teacher and parent input must be a solid part of the decision process in selection of teaching materials (the district is currently testing out possible textbooks for next year).

Let's listen to teachers, knowing we have an earnest desire to not only hear them with a nod, but to truly understand what they want. Let's build schools and classrooms so that the teaching materials and methods are loved by parents and teachers and students instead of imposing materials and methods that are not embraced or effective. Everyone must get involved in deciding solution paths.

Let's lean on data to know which teaching materials truly help educate properly with strength, for some publishers are radical in nature, and can sell slick products with substantiated hogwash at a high price tag that can actually regress learning in my opinion. This is why teachers and parents are the watchdogs of improper and non-effective teaching methods and materials. Voices matter!

Speak out if you believe, parts of the education process are slipping in the classroom or school your child attends. If you don't, they will never know your views. Also, negative snowball effects could take place that could slow the child's academic growth year to year with troubled issues of the implementation of this Common Core learning methodology. We have to keep an eye on it a11.

At the beginning of this school year the Evergreen School District stated in their newsletter to all ... "Attract, develop, and retain quality staff at all levels Once again, these two interdependent goals will form the epicenter of the top-quality education our students will receive. We are now utilizing Common Core State Standards (CCSS) and have been working closely with our teachers to provide them the support they need to be successful. Teacher-led design teams worked throughout the summer on CCSS-aligned mathematics and language arts units - these Units of Study are the backbone to class-



room instruction in 2014-15 and beyond serving as a guide to planning instruction. (Detailed Common Core information can be found on our District website.)"

In the opinion of this parent, the above paragraph is perhaps full of wishful hyperbole, and instead, more concrete planning may be needed with traditional measures of student academic growth (benchmarks). The current roll out of Common Core materials and teaching has affected the school and classroom climate and weather inside each classroom. There may be different levels of teaching effectiveness from school to school so find out if it is raining inside your child's classroom or full of sunshine.

Be involved in checking to see if Common Core teaching methods are effective in your son or daughter's classroom and explore supplemental websites such as IXL math. Help in convincing the district to reinstate math benchmarks on report cards so we can determine if Common Core Learning is understood without grade subjectivity. No matter how imperfect, we need immediate math benchmarks. Email decision makers. Ensure some subjects are taught with extra at home time if teachers are being pressed for time. Ask your child if they like Common Core math.



StartOrganic's mission is to empower and educate people to grow their own produce By Ankita Bhanot

In today's world, especially here in the Bay Area, many people are seeking fresher, healthier, and more organic foods. But as our local supermarkets seem to be leaning farther and farther away from this label, how are we to maintain easy access to the healthiest foods?

According to StartOrganic, the answer is right under our noses—our own backyards.

Started by Josh Levine and Troy Smothermon in 2011, StartOrganic is a professional landscaping service specifically designed to help South Bay area residents grow the best organic produce right at home: The goal being for more residents in our community to become less reliant on produce in the grocery stores and reach for a superior food product.

"We have a great environment, many of us have ample space in the yard, and almost everyone has a lawn," Levine said, when asked how the idea for StartOrganic was born.

"We developed the nuts and bolts of StartOrganic in a Tahoe cabin over the winter of 2010 and have been growing food with Silicon Valley residents ever since!" he adds.

Since its founding, StartOrganic has had great success with its clients, who are happy to not have to perform countless hours of research for each step of the growing process and have a resource that has been growing food for a long

time. To effectively walk their clients through each step, StartOrganic has designed a comprehensive at home education program where an expert small plot farmer comes monthly to the client's home to teach them the best practices for growing organic food in their specific garden location. This also functions as a support system, where the client can contact their farmer throughout the month for any general gardening question.

Even beyond their connection with individual clients, StartOrganic has extended to benefit the community as a whole. They donate a percentage of each garden they build to support the StartOrganic Institutional Learning (SOIL) fund which builds at least one school garden at no cost to the school each year. So fair, SOIL has given back to schools like Downtown College Prep, Forest Hill Elementary and Steinbeck Elementary, among others.

Additionally, Levine and Smothermon have also volunteered and spoken at local schools in the area and given consultations to help spearhead children's connection with the earth and best practices for organic gardening. The two are currently on the planning board for the San Jose Go Green Schools Conference, which will be happening again March 2015.

With the drought becoming a statewide issue, StartOrganic has created 'SmartScaping' to combat what they believe are the two root causes of wasted water: lawns and wasted landscaping. SmartScaping involves replacing lawn with good looking, droughttolerant native flowers and plants combined with mulch, gravel or other low-maintenance materials.

"The most rewarding part of this job, for me, is seeing our clients grow food successfully for the first time," said Levine. "I really love seeing children's first realization that the seed they planted two months ago has turned into this carrot that they pulled out of the ground this morning, and will eat as a snack this afternoon! That moment of connection with the food that is going to be eaten is priceless."

San Jose a national leader in gang prevention

well-known axiom often heard from San Jose police leadership is that "we can't arrest our way out of a gang problem." San Jose approaches gang prevention from a three-prong approach - prevention, intervention and suppression. If you want to learn about why San Jose is recognized as a national leader in gang prevention, plan to attend the Seventh Annual Crime and Gang Prevention Summit, sponsored by the Mayor's Gang Prevention Task Force, on Saturday, Feb. 28, 2015 from 8:30 a.m. – 2 p.m. at the Mount Pleasant High School Theater – 1750 South White Road. The purpose of this summit is to educate residents about the goals and activities of the gang prevention task force and solicit community input. Representatives from City of San Jose, and local community-based organizations will share their efforts to build a safer and more vibrant city. You will hear from ex-gang members on how they turned their lives around as well as basic information on how to keep kids out of gangs. The summit will feature informational workshops, a community resource fair, children's activities, and a free lunch for participants. Engaging the community as partners in preventing gangs has been a critical factor in the task force succeeding. As a member of the Mayor's Gang Prevention Task Force (MGPTF), and the Chair of the Community Engagement Subcommittee, I have worked directly with the outstanding members of the MGPTF technical team who have successfully completed 151 specifically planned actions to increase the safety of neighborhoods and schools. The MGPTF recommended and helped institute longterm structural changes that are now in place such as the school-based emergency response protocol through the Safe School Campus Initiative, which allows city staff and the San Jose Police Department to directly interface with other frontline service providers and community members.

Since the inception of the Mayor's Gang Prevention Task Force in the early 1990's the city of San Jose's commitment to ensuring safe communities and neighborhoods has remained steadfast. Over the years, we have developed a strong relationship with our neighborhood faith communities, many in Evergreen through the connections made at my annual Faith Leaders Appreciation Breakfast. It's by leveraging the resources the faith community offers the MGPTF, either by volunteer work and/or facility use, that our programs for youth are enhanced.

This Faith Initiative has the goal of proactively establishing a relationship between the Faith Based Community and the Mayor's Gang Prevention Task Force to create community awareness of resources and foster hope in gang affected neighborhoods. Borrowing an idea

from Salinas, community volunteers, led by clergy, have been walking through gang

evenings on Friday nights to show support for the neighborhood. In coordination with our police department, San Jose Night Walks in the Alum Rock neighborhood started Friday, April 18, 2014. As of Friday

the leader in this initiative, Reverend Peggy Bryan, the Night Walks participants have been walking every Friday for 40 weeks with 153 different individuals participating. Representation from the community includes 21 different faith community members from Christian. Jewish, Buddhist and Unitarian congregations, as well as 4 non-

profits, local, county and state government representatives, and 7 educational institutions including elementary, high school, college and district offices. Early results show fewer incidences of crime along the Night Walk route.

Night walks have been a strategic method of crime prevention in other Bay Area Cities - all with one common purpose: to rebuild and establish good relationships in communities in need. The Night Walks Project offers a great outreach opportunity for all faith communities in and around Santa Clara County. Assemble a group and schedule one Friday over the next six months. Santa Clara County pilot summer jobs initiative approved

Program aims to reduce youth crime, improve career prospects

The Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously this past week to create up to 500 paid summer internships and job opportunities for at-risk and low-income youth.

The Board action on a proposal by President Dave Cortese and Supervisor Cindy Chavez authorizes the county to partner with the non-profit Work2Future to coordinate with public, private and nonprofit employers in providing paid internships and employment opportunities for youth and young adults from 16 to 21-years-old. This pilot program would target foster youth, CalWorks families, low-income and disconnected youth.

The plan, which was first proposed by Cortese and Chavez in September 2014, was met by support from the City of San Jose. On Feb. 9, Mayor Sam Liccardo stated in a letter that the city would be willing to match funding for the program.

"I am grateful for the outpouring of support from my colleagues on the board, the City of San José, and from the overall community," said Cortese. "The unanimous approval of this pilot youth summer jobs program is a clear message across our region, state and nation that we in Santa Clara County are willing to use every tool at our disposal to make our community safer and more prosperous."

"We know from first-hand experience that increasing job opportunities decreases the incidence of high-risk behaviors," said Chavez. "In addition to the fact that it is smart public safety and economic policy, it's the right thing to do."

In 2012, President Obama announced a public-private partnership initiative to create 110,000 new summer jobs for youth. Since then, summer youth jobs programs in cities such as Philadelphia, Chicago and San Francisco have resulted in dramatic reductions in crime rates among target populations. Studies have also shown that high school students with summer employment experience tend to be more successful later

in their careers.

In January 2015, the U.S. News and World Report stated that there has been a 40 percent decline in summer youth employment particularly among low-income and racial and ethnic minority youth.

Supes approve proposal to curtail growth of Type 2 Diabetes

Recognizing that the development of type 2 diabetes among adults and children is growing at an alarming rate in Santa Clara County, the Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to expand screening and strengthen education efforts to fight the chronic disease that affects 29 million people each year in the U.S.

The unanimous vote was taken at the Board of Supervisors meeting on Feb. 10, at the request of Supervisor President Dave Cortese, who also proposed the initiative during his State of the County speech on Jan. 27. Supervisor Ken Yeager is leading the initiative, which will be heard first by the Board's Health and Hospitals Committee.

In Santa Clara County, 18 percent of adults have been told they are diabetic or pre-diabetic, and countless others could be at high-risk of developing diabetes.

"We can ensure that every one of our 1.8 million residents has access to screening and care that will prevent cases from getting beyond the pre-diabetes stage," Cortese said. "Valley Medical Center has more than 35,000 diabetic patients now, compared to 15,000 in 2011, representing a 123 percent increase in four years."

"Diabetes is rising at a scary rate," said Yeager. "If we are going to slow the growth in health care costs without limiting access, we need better prevention strategies.

Diabetes care is one of the major drivers of increased health care costs. If an effective diabetes prevention program for patients of the local health care safety net system could be implemented on a large scale, the potential for financial savings is substantial. With a goal of addressing the critical challenges of economic disparity and public safety, Mayor Sam Liccardo today took the first steps in launching two signature initiatives, SJ Learns and SJ Works, announcing the co-chairs and initial meeting dates of the working groups for both.

The working groups will bring together experts from the community, education, philanthropy, labor, and business to tackle these challenges in a spirit of collaboration.

"We can arm every teenager with a job and a path to college, or we can let the gangs arm them with a gun and a burglar's crowbar," said Liccardo. "It's critical for San José's future that we reach our kids first."

SJ Learns: After School Program

SJ Learns proposes to expand after-school programs for children in kindergarten through fifth-grade. Emmett Carson of the Silicon Valley Community Foundation, and Councilmember Magdalena Carrasco, will co-chair the SJ Learns Working Group, which will hold its first meeting on Monday, Feb. 23 from 9 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. in the Room 118, City Hall Wing.

"Investing in our children is an investment in our collective future. By expanding high-quality after-school programs for elementary school children we can set them on track for future success," Carson said.

"All of San José's children deserve the opportunity to access quality academic and enrichment programs that provide a strong foundation for achievement," Carrasco said. See YOUTH, page 14

treat to watch the students interact. Some of our students spoke Mandarin; some of theirs spoke English. But the universal language was friendship."

The SJ Learns Working Group will have 20 to 30 members with backgrounds in education and youth development including school superintendents, school board members, as well as representatives from foundations, nonprofits, and universities, including Councilmembers Carrasco and Donald Rocha. The Working Group will develop a roadmap that identifies best practices within after-

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school programs, and potential private investors to leverage an initial city investment and expand the number of high-quality after-school programs for students in grades K-5.

SJ Works: Youth Employment SJ Works has a goal of increasing youth employment and expanding access to job training for at risk youth/young adults. The co-chairs of the SJ Works Working Group are Josue Garcia, CEO of the Santa Clara & San Benito Counties Construction & Building Trades Council, and Matthew Mahood, president & CEO of the San José Silicon Valley Chamber of Commerce.

"Despite our growing economy, youth unemployment continues to be over 20 percent. By working together, we can build opportunities for at-risk youth to develop skills so they can compete in the workforce and have success in life," Mahood said.

"Often that first job experience makes all the difference for a teen,

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giving them the confidence they need to pursue further training or education. I'm looking forward to partnering to expand opportunities to get San José youth into the workforce," Garcia said.

The SJ Works Working Group will hold its first meeting on Wednesday, March 4 from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. at the Roosevelt Community Center. Membership will include 20 to 30 representatives, including Vice Mayor Rose Herrera and Councilmember Johnny Khamis.

Liccardo will announce a push for funding for 500 youth summer jobs in his March Budget Message. The County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to help provide funding for employment for summer jobs for 300 to 500 youth. The nonprofit Work2Future will be the contractor with the county.

There will be opportunities for teens to sign up and learn more about the summer jobs program at the upcoming Mayor's Gang Prevention Task Force Annual Crime and Gang Summit on Saturday, Feb. 28, and at the State of the City Celebration's Resource Fair on Saturday, March 14.

San Jose launches voluntary security camera registry

The city of San Jose announced this past week the launch of a voluntary security camera registry that allows residents and business owners to notify the San Jose Police Department that they are using security cameras on their homes or businesses.

In the event of criminal activity in a neighborhood, patrol officers and investigators can review the registry and reach out to residents and businesses that have security cameras and ask to review their security tapes to seek leads to help solve crimes.

"Security camera registries work in other cities," said Mayor Sam Liccardo, who first proposed the idea as the District 3 councilmember following a series of arson fires in his district. "I want to encourage our residents and businesses to sign up. The video footage you share could help solve a crime and keep our neighborhoods safe."

Participation is voluntary. SJPD will only access camera footage after an incident has occurred and with the permission of the camera owner. The police will not be able to access the camera remotely or in real time. Camera owners may leave the registry at any time.

"Knowing where neighborhood camera resources exist will save time for our investigators and will allow us to reach out quickly to review potential evidence," said San Jose Police Chief Larry Esquivel.

The camera registry was announced on Feb. 11 community meeting at Bret Harte Middle School in Almaden Valley, the South San Jose neighborhood that has been recently experiencing an increased number of residential burglaries.

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
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
