The Observatory's 7" refractor telescope, 14" Schmidt-Cassegrain telescope observatory and several telescopes set out for the pub-


lic will be utilized for the event. The event is weather dependent.

Homelessness comes home to Evergreen Valley

isfortune can visit even the best of families. Sometimes the well-to-do might think that they will never feel the pangs of hunger or having to sleep on the street under a dirty hedge.

Ahn came originally from Vietnam to the state of Connecticut. He said he left because there were not many Vietnamese there. He drove himself to San Jose but has no recollection of the automobile he used to get here. He said he first lived with his sister, but has since lost her phone number because it got wet. He then moved in with another man, but did not get along with him, so he went on the street.

Everything he has is in a few shopping carts consisting mostly of rotting vegetables, empty cans, a few cans of soup, and some old rotting clothing. He did have a pretty good sleeping bag. When

asked where he slept, he said that he slept underneath some bushes which grew alongside the beginning of Norwood Avenue.

He related that he was a Buddhist and had been one all his life. When told that he should visit one of the temples to get some help he said that he did not know where one was located. He probably would be too proud to approach one while in his condition.

He was located at first in front of a church on So. White Road but seemingly was told to leave by the police. This is why he has taken up his residence on Norwood Avenue.

There must be a better way for the mentally ill to find some help. It seems that society has just turned them out on the street to fend for themselves. Local police officers must know of places that would help someone in Ahn's present fix. All that could be done at present was to take him some water, a cold soda, and a small handout.

CRIME REPORT Homicide at local Evergreen park

An investigation is ongoing by the San Jose Police Department in a fatal shooting that occurred at Fowler Creek Park in Evergreen on August 7.

Officers responded to the area of Tully Road and Capitol Expressway on a report of a person shot. Upon arrival officers located an adult male suffering from at least one gunshot wound. The adult male victim was pronounced deceased at the scene a short time later.

The San Jose Police Departments Homicide Unit responded to the scene to take over the investigation. Follow up investigation revealed the shooting occurred Friday evening at Fowler Creek Park in Evergreen. The victim's friend attempted to drive the victim to the hospital when they contacted police in the area of Tully Road and Capitol Expwy.

Preliminary investigation revealed the suspect confronted the victim, words were exchanged and the suspect shot the victim. The unidentified suspect has not been located and remains at large.

Persons with information regarding the homicide are asked to contact Detective Sgt. Milliken #3591 or Detectives Corral #3469 of the San Jose Police Department's Homicide Unit at (408) 277-5283. Persons wishing to remain anonymous may call the Crime Stoppers Tip Line, (408) 947-STOP (7867). Persons providing information leading to the arrest and conviction of the suspect may be eligible for a cash reward from the Silicon Valley Crime Stoppers.

Carjacking near Eastridge Mall

Three suspects were arrested near Eastridge Mall on August 10 after they stole a vehicle and attempted to steal another and opened fire as officers when they closed in on them, according to a police report.

The suspects carjacked a vehicle near Monterey and Ford roads at approximately 11:30 a.m. Patrol officers and members of the Santa Clara County Regional Auto Theft Task Force found the suspects minutes later at Quimby Road and Capitol Expwy near Eastridge Mall.

As officers saw the suspects try to carjack another vehicle. At some point, the suspects opened fire. The officers did not return fire. No one was injured during the arrest of the three suspects.

Funding road repair in San Jose is a key concern of many residents

ur crumbling roadways are cited as the number two concern of most residents in San Jose behind public safety. And we should be concerned with the condition of our streets. The longer we wait to fix them, the more they will cost - hundreds of millions more. Poor roads also cost residents more in higher car repair bills like wheel alignments.

The city's 2,400 mile street network has a pavement maintenance backlog of \$504 million that will grow to approximately \$1 billion by 2020, unless significant additional funding and investment occurs. The city pavement network has a condition rating of 62 on a 100 point scale (currently fair, but on the steep decline and heading towards poor). To raise the condition rating back to 70 (the lowest rating in the good category, and a level where the cost to perform regular preventive maintenance is much lower than having to perform major rehabilitation), the city needs

to invest \$104 million annually over the next 10 years. Programmed, on-going funding starting in 2016-17 is \$13 million, leaving an annual gap of over \$90 million each year.

While we must continue to seek additional funding to fix the pavement maintenance

backlog, back in 2010, I recognized the need to prioritize the precious few ongoing pavement maintenance dollars towards the priority street network of which Tully Road is one. After two years of my strong advocacy for this project, Tully Road is finally going to undergo a complete re-surfacing from Highway 101 East to Capitol Expressway beginning in about five weeks. Construction is estimated to take six weeks. As Tully is one of the primary arterials in and out of Evergreen, having a new smooth roadway will welcome residents and visitors

It is not just the city facing a pavement maintenance funding crisis, the State of California has a \$59 billion dollar backlog in deferred maintenance for state highways and it is growing larger every year that we don't address it. Fortunately, the biggest hope we've had in years to make some headway on the backlog is in the form of Senator Jim Beall's Senate Bill 16, now named SBX1-1, which will make San Jose be eligible for

between \$25-35 million to help fund the repairs and repaving of our streets to make them smoother and safer for all of us. San Jose has over 2,400 lane miles of streets and nearly two-thirds of them are at the point where they may require expensive repairs. As

a voting member of the League of California Cities Transportation Committee, I was able to help advocate for this bill.

The bill is the result of four Transportation Committee hearings that were held up and down California that received testimony from local government officials, transportation experts, businesses, and the public. The bill proposes to take the truck weight fee, which raises about \$1 billion a year, from the general fund and return it to its intended purpose: mitigating the damage to roads caused by heavy commercial trucks. The per gallon

excise fuel tax would be increased by 10 cents to make up for the decline in value lost to inflation. The vehicle license fee would be increased by 0.07 percent annually over five years. The vehicle registration fee would be increased by \$35. Zero-emission vehicles would be subject to an annual \$100 fee. The bill also guarantees that the revenue will be used exclusively for road, street, bridge repairs, and improving freight mobility at ports. The good news is that Senator Beall's

bill has been moving forward and gaining momentum. It was put on the agenda of the Governor's special Transportation session for August 19, 2015. From there, the bill will have to go to the Senate Appropriations Committee then the Senate Floor, as well. Following that, it will go through a similar process in the Assembly. They are attempting to push the bill over the goal line by the end of the special session on September 11, 2015. We will keep you updated on their progress.

While the Beall bill could add \$25-35 million a year to our pavement maintenance budget, it still leaves a \$60 million a year gap. The Valley Transportation Authority (VTA), through an initiative called Envision Silicon Valley, is working on a possible ballot measure to raise revenue for transportation including pavement maintenance. VTA is one of the only metro transit agencies that contributes 100% of it's funding to transit and state highways and zero to cities for pavement maintenance. All of the current sales tax measures do not contribute funds to pavement maintenance. While BART and other mass transit must be a top funding priority, it will be important to make sure that if there is a ballot measure, that it includes money for pavement maintenance.

Dinos

After digging up dinosaur fossils in Katherine Smith Elementary School's garden, students were immediately asked, "What happened to all of the dinosaurs?"

"We really wanted to engage our students with a project that would challenge all levels of learning," said Trowbridge. "Digging for Dinosaurs helped bring history to life for many of them," said Trowbridge.

Students launched into a world of inquiry while immersed in literacy and math significant content. After creating a digital story about their most fascinating dinosaur, students became curious about what happened to the dinosaurs. Through class investigations, the teachers introduced four different theories of dinosaur extinction.

"Students really enjoyed this project and learned a lot even when they thought they were just having fun. This project is a great example of integrating content within PBL," said fellow teacher Schorr.

The project culminated with a digging for dinosaurs project exhibition night and a Dino Stomp performed for parents and community members.

"The parents and community are part of everything we do, and we work to ensure they are just as engaged in our school as the students are," said Aaron Brengard.

New Tech schools are grounded in three key design principles: teaching that engages (centered on project-based learning), a culture that empowers students and adults, and the pervasive use of technology to enable learning. Supporting the existing school district principals and teachers, NTN collaborates on school design, and provides the training, coaching and professional development to implement the new school designs.

"We often focus our college and career ready efforts at the high school level; however, research supports the importance of exposing younger students to authentic inquiry-based learning," said Lydia Dobyns, President and CEO of New Tech Network. "We are thrilled that teachers like Ms. Trowbridge and Ms. Schorr exemplify how this emphasis on 'early readiness' is taking place in New Tech elementary schools," she said. "As a country, we dwell on the 'going-to-college' problem, yet the even bigger crisis is that in the U.S we graduate far too many students who are not 'ready-for-college'."

New Tech Network (NTN), recently released its 2015 Data Report showing a higher than national average rate of high school graduation and college enrollment from NTN schools located in diverse communities across the country. New Tech Network's strong student performance continues from previous years' outcomes and is noteworthy as the number of schools has expanded to more than 175 public K-12 schools in 28 states and Australia and China.

Emotionally overwhelming

Brengard said there were three finalists for the award, another elementary project and two high school projects. "They were all very impressive," he said. " When they called our name at the closing keynote at New Tech Annual

Conference, I could not hold back the tears. We've all worked so hard to give our students the best possible education."

Schorr who was preparing for her wedding could not attend the ceremony. As Trowbridge stepped up to the podium, she called Schorr using "FaceTime" in front of the crowd. "Guess where I am?," said Trowbridge. "I'm standing on stage accepting our Best in Network award," said Trowbridge. "Schorr's scream through the small cell phone speaker said it all," said Brengard. "We had done it!"

Project's purpose

"Our purpose in designing 'Digging for Dinos' was to find an engaging way for second grade students to make claims and support them with evidence," said Schorr. "After digging up dinosaur bones in our school garden students became immediately engaged in answering the Driving Question, "What happened to all of the dinosaurs?"

"To support our wide range of learners, including a significant English learner population, we used a variety of strategies to explicitly teach project vocabulary," said

Trowbridge. "Anchor charts and graphic organizers provided scaffolds for all learners," she said. "Students generated a list of "Need to Know" questions. These questions guided their learning and teachers often re-visited the list to check for understanding. Students launched in to a world of inquiry while immersed in literacy and math significant content."

"Students really enjoyed this project and learned a lot even when they thought they were just having fun," said Schorr. "The project was a great example of integrating content within PBL (project-based learning)," she said. "The project provided opportunities for students to examine text at their appropriate reading level. Using literature, non-fiction texts, and technology, students wrote a descriptive book about the most fascinating dinosaur to them. Students went through a Critical Friends protocol in order to give and receive feedback on their digital story."

"The best part was when we knew the students could make a claim and support it with evidence after we created an authentic simulation for them," said Trowbridge. "After a fossil went missing from the classroom, used clues left behind to make a claim as to who took and using evidence to prove it. Using their experience with supporting claims with evidence, students chose one theory and proved it in a paragraph. This experience helped students transfer their knowledge of how to make a claim to their final deliverable; a paragraph that asserted which extinction theory they felt was most likely. They used that information that they learned in class to support this theory with evidence."

"Writing lessons were focused around paragraph structure using Step Up to Writing," said Schorr. "Math was also a component of this project. We incorporated math measurement standards and apply what they learned about inches and feet to create their own dinosaur with specific requirements. We even used T-Rex teeth as a unit of measure."

21st Century learning at K. Smith School

"Three years ago we reinvented Katherine Smith School with a commitment to 21st century learning," said Brengard. "We want our students to be prepared to face any challenge in this every-changing world," he said. "Schools can no longer simply deliver content. We need to create opportunities for students to develop and apply essential college and career skills like critical thinking, oral and written communication, and collaboration."

Brengard said K. Smith School teachers had to learn to be curriculum designers.

"We've worked closely with the Buck Institute for Education and the New Tech Network to build our capacity to use project-based learning to create meaningful learning experiences and engage students," said Brengard. "When we started, no one on our staff knew how to do this," explained Brengard. "The fact that just three years later, one of our projects has earned such an incredible honor, demonstrates the effort and time our teachers have put into this work."



Evergreen Valley hit by rare summer lightning storm

The lightning began about 8 p.m. Thursday along the Big Sur coast and moved north through Santa Cruz and into the South Bay before heading over to the East Bay close to midnight, said Steve Anderson, a National Weather Service forecaster.

Of the estimated 1,000 lightning strikes, 150 of them hit the ground, according to Steve Anderson, forecaster for the National Weather Service.

Oh, yes, we are still in a major drought. New rules prohibit watering within 48 hours of rain events.



Strange how things happen sometimes...

ecently I wrote a story for the Evergreen Times in San Jose about a 96 year old veteran of the Second World War. It so happened that it was first printed in the Almaden Times, and it appears in this issue of the Evergreen Times (see next page).

I had interviewed the man, Charles Robert Mathison, in April 2015, sending the resulting story immediately to the Times editor but

for some reason the story was held up until the week of August 10-14, at which time it was printed in the Almaden Times.

The Sunday before the story appeared, I was visiting the Evergreen Farmer's Market and happened upon a booth where that a Jehovah's Witness group was passing out tracts to all the passers. I walked up to them and asked them if they had ever heard of one of their own named 'Bob Mathison,' as he was accustomed to be called.

They replied, "Sure we know him and, in

fact, his memorial is scheduled to be held on Saturday, August 15, at 2:00 p.m." I told them that I had written an article about him and it would be printed the following Thursday. They asked me to come to the memorial, at which I replied, "I would be happy to be in attendance!"

The publisher of the Times Media, William Bellou, informed me he had printed 50 extra copies to be handed out to family members at the memorial. I was asked to take the copies with me as I had written the article. I agreed to do so.

On Friday, August 14, I was having dinner at Panda Express on San Felipe Avenue where I found myself seated at the table next to an Asian family consisting of a mother and two young boys. As I am a writer for the newspaper, I am the one most likely to start a conversation. One can never tell what will emerge from a simple conversation.

As I passed by the three after filling my water cup, I asked the older of the two boys, "So I guess you will be soon starting back to school?" "Next week," he replied.

So what grade will you be in?" I asked as I seated myself. Second grade" he replied proudly, and my brother is going into kinder-

This began a conversation which lasted until we were all finished eating. It turned out that Shirley, the mother of the two boys, was a nurse. The older of the two boys told me about a trophy he had won at school for reading the most books. The younger of the two can already read and write and has not even started kindergarten yet.

For some reason, the conversation turned to what we would be doing on Saturday.

"I will be attending a memorial for a 96 year old WW2 veteran, I informed them.

"So what was the Veteran's name?" Shirley asked. I told her his full name and wide-eyed she exclaimed, "Bob?" "Yes" I said. "He used to come to the nursing facility day care where I work," Shirley said with tears in her eyes.

I asked her if she would like to attend the memorial and she said she and the boys would be there.

Saturday, August 15, 2015 was a very hot day but did not stop the overflow crowd who attended Bob's memorial at the Kingdom Hall of Jehovah's Witnesses on Clayton Road in San Jose. I went a little early to take the article about Bob that had appeared in the Almaden Times the week before. I was told by Ken, one of the members of the group, that He would put the papers in his car to be delivered to the luncheon which was to follow the memorial. I did not quite understand his reasoning, at first, as I had made special time to deliver the papers and to attend the memorial. Afterward, it began to dawn on me that Ken was a wise man. If the attendees had been given the paper during the memorial they would not have paid attention to the speaker at the dais and would have been discussing the article. Ken and his wife had been the caretakers and power of attorney for Bob when he was still able to stay in his home in Evergreen.

Shirley, with her two boys in tow, came about two minutes late to the memorial, but sat in the adjacent room and were able to hear the proceedings from that vantage point. As soon as the memorial was finished at the hall, I began looking around the room for Shirley and her children. I spotted her in the back talking to one of the gentlemen I had met before. I made my way to her and we greeted each other as friends, even though we had only met the night before. I invited her and children to attend the luncheon to follow the memorial, and she agreed to go. It was to be in a Mobile Home Park behind the Target store in South San Jose.

While at the luncheon, Shirley asked me who had had power of attorney for Bob while he was still living at home. I told her that it was Ken and his wife. "I have spoken to them on the phone quite a few times when it came to making decisions for Bob at the See MATHISON, next page

Evergreen WWII veteran and teacher set example, lived life to the fullest

y life began in Indian Creek, Philo, California on Sept. 5, 1918." These were the words of Charles Robert Mathison, artist, teacher, and local former sheetrock contractor.

Three years and five months later in Santa Barbara, California, on February 25, 1922, Charles' future wife, Vivian Louise Fibiger, aka Peggy, made her debut.

After graduating high school, Charles, better known as 'Bob', went to work with his father felling trees to earn money for college to become an art teacher. Bob went on to San Jose State College to fulfill this dream.

Peggy attended and graduated from Santa Barbara High School then went to work at Santa Barbara State College. Later she entered Los Angeles General Hospital School of Nursing. In 1943, she took a leave of absence and met Bob. They were married in September 1943.

Bob was drafted into the army and participated in the Battle of the Bulge in June 1944 ending up in Germany. "Peggy fought her own battle of the Bulge at home, the war ended but he and Peggy continued the battle of the bulge," Bob laughingly stated.

Bob had entered the army as an enlisted man and after attaining the rank of Sergeant he was encouraged to enter OCS and train as an officer.

After serving his country, Bob finished college, graduating with honors and began his first job as an art teacher at Burlingame High School, Burlingame, California. Bob also became a talented graphic artist and has paintings hanging in homes throughout the Bay Area.

In July 15, 1947, Bob and Peggy were baptized into the Jehovah's Witness Faith where they remained faithful stewards. He and Peggy were married 66 years before Peggy's passed away. Bob, now 96 years old, resides at a rehabilitation center in Santa Clara, California.


