



Cortese takes over as chair of the MTC

anta Clara County Board of Supervisors President Dave Cortese was elected chair of the Metropolitan Transportation Commission board at its meeting on Feb. 25, for a two-year term.

The unanimous vote was taken by 18 voting members of the 21-member regional commission in charge of planning, financing and coordinating transportation for nine counties that comprise the San Francisco Bay Area.

"I am honored to be steering MTC during this time of tremendous challenge and opportunity for the agency and the region," Cortese said. "The Bay Area is blessed with renewed economic growth, but we must contend with

'n a time when bad news proliferating airwaves and print, Cadwallader Elementary School decided to focus on a week of goodwill with the Great Kindness Challenge.

EVC development bad planning

Editor,

t recently came to my attention that the Evergreen Valley College is planning a massive development on the vacant areas on the property.

As a resident in Evergreen for more than twenty years, I have come to enjoy the rustic-like atmosphere of the Evergreen neighborhood. I enjoy the green rolling foothills sprinkled with poppies and yellow flowers.

Now, however, Evergreen Valley College (EVC) is planning a huge

build out on the vacant land. This includes adding 500 apartments, 40,000 square feet of retail space, 40,000 square feet of office space and a 40,000 square foot private competitive swim club. The apartments themselves may very well be four-story eyesores which would disrupt the beautiful natural sight lines of our community. And the additional residential and office/retail spaces will certainty impact traffic.

It's been projected that the new build out will degrade the Level of

Service at the San Felipe/Yerba Buena intersection to a grade of "F". This translates to "unacceptable" delays. So what's unacceptable?

According to the Supplemental Environment Impact report (PP-08-121) the average delay controls will be greater than 80 seconds per car. To put this in perspective, for a queue of 10 cars, the total delay would be about 13 minutes. That

And if the number of cars were to increase to 15, the delay grows to 20 minutes. That's unacceptably bad. Furthermore, the noise will significantly increase in our quiet neighborhood.

I encourage you to stay informed on the EVC plans. On March 5 at 7 p.m., there is a meeting at the Evergreen Community Center, where you can ask questions and raise concerns to the EVC planners and members of our city (Vice Mayor Rose Herrera's staff) and county (Supervisor David Cortese's staff) governments. Also, check out the NextDoor.com forums for Evergreen where there are lively discussions on the merits of these plans as well many other issues affecting our community.

students participated in the Challenge with bliss and huge smiles. Teachers and parent volunteers guided students to smile, compliment everyone or even create your own kind deed to someone.

"It definitely has changed what the children are talking about out on the playground," said Cadwallader Principal Tina Tong Choy. "We have had the Kindness Station set up throughout the week at lunch time that parents and upper grade leadership students have been running. It has actually

turned into a meeting place at lunch for kids to talk about kindness as they do different kindness activities ... Students are coming up to me letting me know how they have been kind to others. It's been the talk of the

Choy credits parent Galeon for bringing Great Kindness Challenge to Cadwallader. But the school already implements a culture of kindness. Monthly, a different classroom decorates a wall in the staff office. The month of February is full of cut out Valentine hearts with messages like "I show love by calling a friend" and "I show love by giving chocolates to mom."

"Children have a natural ability to share kindness with others regardless of societal boundaries," says Choy. "The kids are already looking forward to doing it again next year or even sooner. Kindness truly matters.'

Cadwallader third-graders Isabella Aquino, Hannah Arellano, Estrella Contreras and Anahy Perez loved the Great Kindness Challenge.

"It was fun," said Isabella and the other three girls smile and agree. Asked what their favorite activity was for the week and they all chimed in "making the poster with handprints!" The classmates definitely epitomized a culture of kindness.

Cortese

Cortese noted that he is the first Santa Clara County representative to lead the MTC since Jim Beall, who was a commissioner from 1987 to 2006, and chair from 1999 to 2001. Beall, now a state senator, recently became chair of the Senate Transportation and Housing Committee.

"I feel fortunate to be stepping into the MTC chair role at a time when the Senate Transportation Committee is being chaired by someone as knowledgeable about transportation and the Bay Area as Jim Beall," Cortese said. "The close working relationship we've developed over our many years in government will be helpful as the region

partners with the state to implement the Cap and Trade Program and address other urgent issues."

Cortese served eight years as an MTC commissioner, with the past two years as MTC's vice chair. He was first appointed to MTC in 2007 as the Association of Bay Area Governments' representative, later transitioning to Santa Clara County's seat on the Commission.

Cortese has served on the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors since 2008, and in January of this year, was elected to serve as the 2015 Board President. He also chairs the Board's Housing, Land Use, Environment and Transportation Committee.

MTC's Commission also serves as the governing board of the Bay Area Toll Authority and the Service Authority for Freeways and Expressways, and Commissioner Cortese will chair those as well.

Fast and furious: Ninth Annual Boy Scout Pinewood Derby

ub Scouts were racing to the finish line at the Boy Scout's ninth annual Coyote Creek District Pinewood Derby.

Race day was on Saturday, Feb. 8, at the Eastridge Mall. Sixty-four racers registered at this year's event and qualified for racing with five classes of racers – Tigers (first-graders), Wolves (second-graders), Bears (third-graders), Webelos (fourth- and fifth-graders), and Open Class (racers of any age, Girl Scouts, and even adults!).

Vice Mayor Rose Herrera welcomed the Scouts and their families to the exciting event for the youth of San Jose. She helped kick off the derby racing by starting a few races, and as in previous events, assisted in the voting for the winners of the Best Design, Akela Award and Most Original categories – always a difficult task with so many incredibly designed cars.

A tradition that started in 1953, entering a Pinewood Derby is one of the highlights of a Cub Scout's year. The idea behind the Pinewood Derby is for the parent to spend time with their child by helping the child design, carve, paint and tune the car. Each

Scout gets a kit that is simply a block of pinewood and a set of plastic wheels, along with nails that serve as the axles. Each car is carefully inspected before qualifying for racing. The rules state the car must be no longer than 7 inches, no wider than 2¾ inches, no taller than 3 inches, and no heavier than 5.00 ounces. With a little imagination, some sanding, and paint, these impressive racecars compete by zooming down one of the three computercontrolled racetracks.

The Cub Scouts and their families cheered as their cars competed and speeded down the tracks. Each car runs in each of the four lanes of one of the tracks,

and competes for the fastest cumulated time. Winners of each class received dazzling trophies and the congratulations from everyone in the district.

To commemorate the ninth Annual Pinewood Derby at Eastridge Mall, Vice Mayor Herrera awarded Ron Davis, Chairman of the Pinewood Derby, and the Coyote Creek District of the Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council, Boy Scouts of America a Commendation from the City of San Jose, that was also signed by Mayor Sam Liccardo.

Ron Davis, also serving as event emcee, organized the exciting event with the help of many other volunteers, including more than 35 Boy Scouts and Adult Leaders from Troop 251 (Chartered by St. Francis of Assisi). After all the races were completed, Rick Adams, BSA District Executive, and Vice Mayor Herrera awarded the winners their trophies.

Life cycle of the San Jose budget

t's that time of year again, when peregrine falcons nesting atop city hall, actively circling the high-rise structure for their next meal, are a reminder that we are in the midst of budget season. A falcon's priority is to lay their eggs, then, once the chicks are hatched, feed their young to allow them to grow up strong and healthy and finally fledge from the nest. It's all part of a cycle of life that reoccurs every year, just like our city's budget cycle. The Mayor and City Council are required each year to produce a balanced budget by June 30 for the following fiscal year.

Early in the budget cycle we seek community input through the Priority Setting Sessions, where neighborhood association

leaders across the city from every council district (a good reason to start a neighborhood association) and members of the vouth commission are invited to City Hall to participate in Budget Games and improving community engagement in budgeting. These neighborhood leaders and youth commissioners will be meeting on Saturday, March 7 to get a first look at the 2015-2016 City Budget and they will be asked to work in groups to prioritize funding of city services using the available budget presented to them.

In addition to the Priority Setting Session this weekend, the Mayor's office will be hosting two additional events where the budget priorities will be discussed. The Mayor's State of the City Celebration will be held on Saturday, March 14, 2015 at the Independence High School Gym (1776 Education Park Drive, San Jose, CA 95133). The doors open at 9:30 a.m., and the program starts at 10 a.m. Registration is required by going to http://events.r20.constantcontact.com/register/event?oeidk=a07 eaghyhmg36391c55&llr=ffcsvncab. or by calling the Mayor's office at (408) 535-4800. This year, the State of the City will include a resource fair following the official ceremo-

The second event is the Community Budget Meeting held in each district of the city. I will be welcoming the Mayor and his staff to present to the District 8 residents on Tuesday, May 19, 2015 from 6 p.m. – 8 p.m. at the Evergreen Community Center (4860 San Felipe Rd, San Jose, CA 95135). The purpose of these meetings is to inform residents about the city's fiscal situation and potential budget impacts. They also provide and opportunity for residents to give their input on the budget directly to City leaders.

It's not only during the budget season that I am working on the priorities of creating a vibrant, safe city. I work all year long to identify - many times with the help of residents who write, call, or stop me on the street - priorities within our community that need funding or additional funding to make them successful or sustainable. At present, my top priorities are public safety, pedestrian safety, creating local jobs and increasing San Jose's tax base by attracting revenueproducing businesses to locate here.

One of my top priorities is to rebuild our joseca.gov/district8.

police department, but this will take time. We now have an offer out to the Police Officer's Association (the police union) and we're hoping that they join the city at the bargaining table soon. I voted for and supported the funding for the Community Service Officer program now finishing it's first successful year of 28 out on the streets assisting our sworn personnel. I will be supporting funding this year for additional 28 Community Service Officers to be trained and deployed.

Pedestrian safety must be a critical priority as San Jose has seen at least five pedestrian fatalities this year. If we want to encourage the development of a walkable city, we need to make sure the city is safe for pedestrians. Therefore, I will be supporting additional funding for traffic safety mitigation

across our City. Projects like speed bumps and traffic Radar feedback signs can reduce speed and make streets safer. I've supported efforts in the past to streamline the process for implementing these kinds of projects in neighborhoods and will continue to advocate for flexibility.

A strong priority of mine every year since joining the city council has been to increase the number of local jobs. These jobs are not only for the high tech, highly educated workforce

but jobs for every skill level and especially our youth. Recently, Mayor Liccardo appointed me to the San Jose Works -Youth Jobs Working Group. Despite a growing regional economy, San José's youth unemployment rate continues to hover above 20 percent. This Teen Jobs Initiative has a goal of increasing youth employment and expanding access to job training for at risk youth/young adults. I look forward to working on this initiative and expanding opportunities for training and employment for our young people.


Recent articles have highlighted the fact that, unlike other cities to our north, San Jose does not have enough jobs or economic base to support a healthy taxbase. Our per capita sales tax and property tax is lower making it more difficult to pay for city services. I will continue to work with our economic development department and private sector to encourage companies to start, grow and locate in San Jose.

All of these priorities are not housed in silos, but interconnected initiatives that will help the overall health and prosperity of our city. If you have priorities you would like to share with me, I invite you to attend the Community Budget Meeting and let your voice be heard!



GasBuddy says: Expect aggressive increases at the pump

The transition from 'winter blend' to 'summer blend' gasoline always brings increases in retail gasoline prices, but nothing you've seen over the past year is likely to match what GasBuddy anticipates over the next two to three weeks.

"Wednesday brought a big price rally in gasoline markets and gasoline wholesalers are seeing huge increases," said Patrick DeHaan, senior petroleum analyst for GasBuddy. "Wholesale prices today alone have increased coast-to-coast from 10 to 27 cents per gallon; and when you add that on top of the increases that occurred earlier this month, it's inevitable that retail prices will climb aggressively in weeks ahead."

While some of the rally is attributed to the seasonal decline in gasoline inventory; reduced refinery output and the shift to summer grades of gasoline, there have also been significant operational issues at refineries in five states. And of course, the United Steel Workers Union strike that began Feb. 1 exacerbates operations at 12 refineries where they've imposed 'work stoppages' in California, Texas, Louisiana, Indiana, Kentucky and Ohio.

"Volatility is the name of the game right now and we expect that to translate into 10-cent increases in retail gasoline, week after week over the next two to three weeks, with larger, more immediate increases in West Coast areas," DeHaan said.

Yosemite displays climate changes

alifornia is a land of change. When Atlantis sank, the western regions, known as the Pacific Coast, arose, and have been rising since.

Recent drought conditions have caused

changes in nature not usually seen at this time of year. Is this due to Global Warming? New England, with six feet of snow, would beg to differ. Nevertheless, reality must be faced at some interval.

On a recent trip to Yosemite National Park, I saw firsthand the results of sparse rainfall, and almost no snow in the Sierra Mountains.

The air was so clear that, even with a small digital camera, great photos of El Capitan, Sentinel Rock and Half Dome were possible. As monoliths, they remind one that we are only a small piece of the puzzle of nature.

Entering the Ahwahnee Hotel, one is taken back in time to the 1920s. Times were simpler and not many of lesser means were able to enjoy the amenities of a luxurious resort hotel. The greeting was very cordial and helpful: The staff make sure that one's stay was both comfortable and enjoyable. They said to make sure that no water, food, or hand cleaner was left in automobiles

overnight as bears, usually in hibernation at this time of year, could possibly do damage to vehicles as they meandered around at night. Another hazard of this unusual warm weather there.

The staff also said that between 4 and 5 p.m. there would be tea and sweets at the first floor lobby. This was made more enjoy-



able as strains of classical and big band songs permeated the entire area by means of piano. Later, at dinner in the huge dining area and the piano maestro happened to play, "Moon River," harkening another past time.

If one wants to know anything about the area of Yosemite, just go to the gift shop. On asking the girl there why the animals and birds, usually not present at this time of year, were still around, she said: "Due to the unusually high temperatures, lack of snow, and complete climatic changes, the birds have not migrated, the bears have not hibernated, and the other animals are a little confused as to what they should be doing." This explained the presence of the coyote in daylight hours just standing idly in the parking lot.

Leaving the park, the devastation left by the Yosemite fire is seen. Such waste of huge conifers. Animals habitats are no longer in existence. Surely, man has speeded his own demise as evidenced by his lack of care for nature. When will mankind wake up from this awful disdain of his own environment?

You may have noticed there is a war going on in the auto industry; horsepower wars.

According to auto enthusiasts, the 2015 Dodge Challenger and Dodge Charger are currently the cars with the greatest bang for the buck. The Dodge Brothers are offering musclecar metal and with some seriously awesome engines.

The 6.4-liter Hemi V-8 makes 485 hp and 475 lb-ft; choose either a six-speed manual or eight-speed automatic. The aptly named Hellcat has a supercharged 6.2-liter V-8 good for 707 hp and 650 lb-ft, with either a six-speed manual or eight-speed automatic. The automatic is faster, hitting 60 mph in 3.6 seconds, while

the manual is more fun and still quick doing 0-60 in 3.9.

If you are considering purchasing the Hellcat engine option for the Challenger or the Charger, should you opt for the automatic? 

Restricted watering hours change March 8

espite a few impressive rain winter, storms this California's multi-year drought is still far from over, and the need to save water remains critically important.

As spring approaches and daylight hours lengthen, the allowable hours for outdoor watering will change with the start of Daylight Saving Time. Watering will be allowed only before 8 a.m. and after 8 p.m., effective Sunday, March 8. Outdoor water use is the easiest place to reduce and accounts for roughly half of the average residential water bill.

To meet the state's voluntary water conservation target of a 20 percent reduction. San Jose water regulations remain in effect and apply to everyone in San José, regardless of which water utility is providing service.

According to the Santa Clara Valley Water District, statewide and local precipitation has remained low. In the Sierras, where San José imports half of its water, the snow pack measurement in February was only 19 percent of normal levels. Locally, groundwater level in San Jose is about 45 feet lower than the five-year average.

The California State Water Resources Control Board declared

an emergency water shortage last year and asked all Californians to reduce water use by 20 percent. The San Jose City Council also declared a water shortage emergency last year. San José's water rules only apply to drinking water, not gray or recycled water.

Here are some water rules and conservation tips to keep in mind:

- 1. Be cool water when it's coolest. After Daylight Saving Time begins on March 8, outdoor watering hours are restricted to before 8 a.m. and after 8 p.m.
- 2. Be quick fix leaks as soon as possible
- 3. Be in control don't let water flow into gutters or streets
- 4. Be a sharp shooter with automatic shut-off nozzles. Hoses are required to have a nozzle that shuts off when the handle is released
- 5. Be a sweeper sweep hard surfaces. Use a broom instead of a hose to clean patios, sidewalks, parking lots, or other hard surfaces



Here's what you can do to protect your

mail from thieves:

Use the letter slots inside your Post Office for your mail, or hand it to a letter carrier.

Pick up your mail promptly after delivery. Don't leave it in your mailbox overnight. If you're expecting checks, credit cards, or other negotiable items, ask a trusted friend or neighbor to pick up your mail.

If you don't receive a check or other valuable mail you're expecting, contact the issuing agency immediately.

If you change your address, immediately notify your Post Office and anyone with whom you do business via the mail.

Don't send cash in the mail.

Tell your Post Office when you'll be out of town, so they can hold your mail until you return.

Report all suspected mail theft to a Postal Inspector.

Consider starting a neighborhood watch program. By exchanging work and vacation schedules with trusted friends and neighbors, you can watch each other's mailboxes (as well as homes).

Consult with your local Postmaster for the most up-to-date regulations on mailboxes, including the availability of locked centralized or curbside mailboxes.

If you see a mail thief at work, or if you believe your mail was stolen, call police immediately, then call Postal Inspectors at (877) 876-2455 (press 3).

Tax solutions for Baby Boomers

he Baby Boom generation, the children born in the post-World War II years between 1946 and 1964, includes about 76 million people. Now that generation is heading into retirement, with roughly 10,000 Boomers expected to retire every day between now and 2030.

If you or a family member are part of this group, do you know what tax and other financial issues should you be considering? The California Society of CPAs (CalCPA.org) provides some timely tips.

Be aware of the RMD deadline

Required minimum distributions (RMDs) can create a potentially expensive pitfall for those who aren't aware of the important rules surrounding them. The RMD rules apply to traditional individual retirement accounts (IRAs) and IRA-based plans such as SEPs, SARSEPs, and SIMPLE IRAs.

If you have an IRA, you must take your first required minimum distribution for the year in which you turn age 701/2. However, the first payment can be delayed until April 1 of the year following the year in which you turn

So, if you turned 70 on, say, May 15, 2014, you hit 701/2 six months later, on Nov. 15, 2014, and you would need to start taking IRA distributions by April 1, 2015. For all subsequent years, including the year in which you were paid the first RMD by April 1, you must take the RMD by Dec. 31 of the year.

The amount of the RMD is generally calculated by dividing the prior Dec. 31 balance of your account by a life expectancy factor, published in Internal Revenue Service tables.

Any withdrawals you take will be included in your taxable income (unless they have already been taxed, as would be the case with a Roth IRA, for example). If you miss the RMD deadline, fail to withdraw a RMD, or fail to withdraw the full amount of the RMD, the amount not withdrawn is taxed at 50 percent. It's important to note that the RMD rules do not apply to Roth IRAs while the owner is alive.

Don't confuse IRAs and 401(k)s

The RMD rules apply to all employer sponsored retirement plans as well, including profit-sharing plans, 401(k) plans, 403(b) plans, and 457(b) plans. While RMDs are required beginning at age 70½ for IRAs, with an employer sponsored retirement plan, distributions begin at 70 ½ years of age or, if later, the year in which you retire, as long as your employer's plan allows it.

You should also be able to continue to contribute to the plan as long as you work, unless you own 5 percent or more of the business. If you are a 5 percent owner of the business sponsoring the retirement plan, the RMDs must begin once you are 70 ½. It's very important, then, to understand the different rules for each type of retirement account. You could face a penalty if you don't take RMDs as required, but you could miss out on some tax benefits if you take them before it's neces-

Sound a little confusing? It can be. That's why it's a good idea to consult your CPA about how the RMD rules affect your specific situation.

Taxes on Social Security income

Want to minimize taxes on Social Security income? Your tax rate on Social Security varies depending on your total taxable income, including distributions from retirement accounts. There are a number of steps you can consider to reduce that rate. For example, you could take distributions from a Roth IRA rather than from a traditional IRA, since a qualified Roth IRA withdrawal should generally not be taxable.

Keep in mind, too, that you can delay collecting Social Security. If you do, the amount vou receive will increase until vou reach age 70. If you plan to work into your 60s or 70s, you might consider putting off taking Social Security benefits, even if you've reached full retirement age, until you've stopped working. The result: You'll get higher benefits and the tax you pay on them may be reduced.

Supes approve \$1.8 million to fund immigrants' legal services

n an effort to meet the needs of more than 50,000 Santa Clara County residents potentially eligible to apply for administrative relief, the Board of Supervisors unanimously approved a plan to allocate \$1.8 million in onetime funding for information and legal services to help them through the process.

The funding, which will be available for 20 months starting in April, will be distributed by the Silicon Valley Community Foundation to nonprofits who provide services to immigrants.

'This outreach isn't being done now and notarios are preying on those who are eligible for DACA or DAPA, promising them a path to citizenship, taking their money and then nothing happens," said Board President Dave Cortese.

"The unanimous support from the Board is a distinct message that we are a family of immigrants in Santa Clara County," said Supervisor Cindy Chavez, "I am grateful for the support from my colleagues, the community, City of San Jose, and all our partners to address this pressing issue."

Proposed by Cortese and Chavez, the Immigrant Family Relations Implementation Plan would also:

- Launch an outreach and education campaign about the President's Executive Order enacting Deferred Action for Parental Accountability (DAPA) and expanding Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals
- Establish a partnership with the City of San Jose for shared funding and coordination.
- Require reports from the Silicon Valley Community Foundation on how the money is being spent.



dissipate around noon. To the south were a few stubborn ones that refused to leave. These formations were some of the greatest sculptures one would ever hope to see. Second, as these clouds came from the southwest, they were met by clouds that were coming over the east foothills. Static responses to this produced a lightning storm.

Fourth, and very suddenly, large drops of rain began to pelt the ground. Some of these drops, when hitting the sidewalk, produced spots as much as two inches across. It was


