Neighborhoods in zip codes 95122, 95148, 95135, 95111, 95121 received fogging treatment late Wednesday night Sept 2 in an effort to prevent the outbreak of human cases of the disease.



Additional ground fogging will most likely be scheduled.

The Santa Clara County Vector Control District is a County public health program that controls and monitors disease-carrying insects such as mosquitoes and ticks, and other harmful pests such as yellow jackets and rats.

at Fowler Creek Park was held on August 24 at Tom Matsumoto Elementary School to discuss the recent gang related shooting death at Fowler Creek Park.

The meeting was sponsored by Vice Mayor Rose Herrera and Councilmember District 8. Speakers included Assistant Police Chief Eddie Garcia, Foothill Commander Captain Tony Mata, Crime Prevention Specialist Sandra Garcia, and the Director of Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services, Angel Rios, Jr.

Vice Mayor Herrera kicked off the meeting thanking the neighborhood for its input and suggestions on ways to improve on the safety of Fowler Park. She acknowledged the severity of the recent gang related shooting, but See FOWLER, page 5

Gurdwara attracting visitors of many faiths

he San Jose Sikh Gurdwara has drawn interest due to its growth in size over the years, and now Gurdwara is seeing an increasing number of visitors from all religious faiths as the sanctuary is now ranked 24th out of 142 things to do in San Jose according to TripAdvisor.


Perched on the hills of Evergreen Valley, the San Jose Sikh Gurdwara looks over the Bay Area. The Gurdwara or "the gateway to the guru" is a place of worship for people of the Sikh religion.

Sikhism is a religion founded in northern India by Guru Nanak Dev Ji in 1469 and has progressed through ten gurus. All ten of these gurus compiled their teachings in the holy book for Sikhs, the Guru Granth Sahib.

The San Jose Sikh Gurdwara was founded in 1984 due to an increased amount of Sikhs moving into the Bay Area. It was initially a

small building, but after receiving substantial donations, the Sikh Gurdwara was finally fully built in 2011 at a cost of \$32,000,000.

Along with being ranked as an attraction, the San Jose Gurdwara has received endorsement from California Governor Jerry Brown and San Jose Vice Mayor Rose Herrera and former San Jose Mayor Chuck Reed. In fact, on the day the new main hall was inaugurated, Jerry Brown addressed the Sikh community: "It is an honor to be in this magnificent temple... you in the Sikh Community are very important to our country, to

California."

The Gurdwara is open to all no matter what religion. It has two main buildings, the main prayer hall and the langar hall. In the main prayer hall, there are religious hymns sung and prayers are recited using the tabla and harmonium. The tabla is a percussion instrument which is similar to a drum and the harmonium is more commonly known as a pump organ or a reed organ. In the center of the main hall, there is a palanquin holding the sacred Guru Granth Sahib. The temple holds prayers everyday although the majority of the worshippers attend on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday.

While prayers continue in the main hall, hundreds of worshippers and visitors enjoy delicious food in the langar hall which is a free community kitchen (langar) that serves North Indian cuisine. The meal is vegetarian and consists of lentils, vegetables, yogurt, and roti (Indian bread). Along with this meal, there is always tea and some sort of Indian dessert.

Volunteers are responsible for the preparation of the food, the maintenance of the kitchen, and cleaning all the dishes. At all gurdwaras, langar is active 24 hours a day. The Golden Temple, the largest gurdwara in the world serves food to an average of 80,000 people a day as part of the community kitchen.

The premise for the tradition of langar is to unite all humanity, regardless of their faith or background. Not only does the San Jose Gurdwara provide and maintain a free kitchen, but it also promotes education through its Sunday school. The Sunday school, better known as *Khalsa School*, enrolls hundreds of kids who learn the Punjabi language from volunteer teachers.

Through support from government leaders and the Bay Area Sikh community, the Gurdwara has expanded and will continue to grow in different ways to help the community.

The San Jose Gurdwara is a place Evergreen residents can visit and experience at least once in their lifetime.

OP ED: Parents await new student test results to arrive by mail

he SmarterBalance/California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (C.A.A.S.P.P.) report is arriving soon to inform parents how their son or daughter is doing in math and language arts.

This test is different than the old Standardized Testing and Reporting (S.T.A.R.) test which was discontinued. The new test uses computer-adaptively for each child (the test individually adapts for each child at unique and varying degrees of aptitudes).

The new test includes unique test performance

tasks to better hone in and show what each student knows and what they can answer or accomplish on their own.

Some States are using other test measures. Our state needed to roll out this new test because of the adoption of new standards called Common Core and the decision to use less reliance on multiple choice pencil to paper test booklet methods of assessment.

The results of the new test in this parent's opinion are sort of a work in progress in that the teachers and school districts are trying to explore how to teach Common Core.

The scores will not be perfect. Some school

districts have not had new Common Core math textbook/workbook adoptions, while some have. Some schools have had more computer access than others, allowing for more student practice in how to take the new test. Many factors have been in play so that this year the use of the SmarterBalance/CAASPP will not be used to measure the effectiveness of how schools operate.

It is a possibility that the scores of the children may not be accurate if they had trouble taking the new test and if the teachers had trouble presenting all the new standards in ways that work for children of different ability so that all can

reiterated that the event was atypical of the Evergreen area. Her comments, as well as many others, focused on the overall safety aspects of the park, which has become a magnet for late night partying, drinking, pot use and noise.

Herrera indicated that a few of the suggestions made by Fowler Park neighbors would be implemented immediately, including:

* Rotating sprinklers would be rescheduled to turn on during the peak hours when loitering has been occurring to discourage people from lingering after park hours.

* Signage indicating park hours and park rules (such as no loitering), will be implemented.

* LED lighting is being prioritized for the park (currently, the city is converting all city lighting to LEDs based on a "hot spot" priority list; Fowler Park was not on this list, but Herrera's staff is working to get it prioritized).

* Surveillance cameras are being discussed for a possible trial at Fowler Park. There was an earlier city trial in another park that showed cameras didn't work well, having very poor resolution. In conjunction with the new lighting, the cameras might be workable at Fowler Park.

The San Jose Police Department's website (http://www.sipd.org/_forms/CameraRegistrat ionFAQs.asp) has a homeowner surveillance camera registration portal where homeowners can register their video cameras. Should police have a need to access video cameras in a given homeowner's vicinity, they'll have the contact information in order to contact that homeowner to request to see recent footage.

Herrera also said that with the recent settlement relating to Measure B, it appeared the city was well on its way to resolving a major issue with police retention and recruitment. Adequate resourcing has been a tremendous issue, but now she is hopeful that if the settlement is approved that as many as 40-60 officers who left might consider returning.

Foothill Commander Captain Tony Mata gave an overview on the current crime levels within the Foothill division. The Foothill division spans from Milpitas to Southern Evergreen (Heartland/San Felipe); and from 101 to the foothills. It is a large territory covering 19.4 square miles and (based on 2010 census) more than 58,890 people. At current staffing levels, an average of 4-5 officers is available on each shift.

There are 4 districts within the Foothill division, and Evergreen is considered district "P."

A few statistics he shared (which he also indicated are available on the sjpd.org site):

* Crimes, citywide from 2014-2015 (same Jan-July timeframes) were up around 4.7 percent overall

* Break-ins for July 2015: 139 incidents in all of Foothill Division, 54 were in district "P"

* Violent crime for July 2015: 9 in all of

Foothill Division, 2 were in district "P"

Mata discussed how resources are deployed. Priorities are customer service, gang violence and burglaries. Based on 911 and 311 calls resources can get moved around to cover "hot spots" or areas where there are concerns (speeding, suspected drug use). He asked the community not just to post their observations on Nextdoor, but to call them in to 311 (if nonactive situation) so they are added to available crime data.

Current 911 response time throughout San Jose is an average of six minutes, but they do not currently have enough resources to always get to 311 calls. They realize quality of life issues and traffic enforcement has been very low priority due to resources.

"Community Service Officers" are being deployed for low priority follow-up such as burglaries, thefts, stolen vehicles and non-injury accidents. They are only used in non-active situations. This program is working out well to help reduce administrative overhead on police officers, and the program is going to be expanded to include weekend coverage.

Angel Rios, the Director of Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services spoke about the two ways his organization is addressing the Fowler Park concerns. First, the shooting activated a 'strike team' within the Mayor's Gang Prevention Task Force (MGPTF) which activates a variety of activities to ensure there are no gang retaliations or other gang activity in the park's vicinity (Vice Mayor Herrera is also a part of this task force). Second, his organization is working to step up the priority for LED lighting in the park, add signage and look into the other points that Vice Mayor Herrera spoke about.

Rios also requested that community members sign up as part of the "Adopt-A-Park" program. "In other neighborhoods this has helped deter criminal and nuisance activity, said Rios. "We hope that some renewed funding will help with hiring park rangers to help with park enforcement in the future," he said.

Assistant Police Chief Garcia reiterated that extra patrols are currently assigned to check the Fowler Park area during every shift.

Sandra Garcia, representing the SJ Police Department Crime Prevention Unit, spoke about the importance of people holding a local Neighborhood Watch meeting to get to know their neighbors. It is a major preventative measure against crime.

Vice Mayor Herrera ended the meeting encouraging people to attend her, "Coffee with the Captain" meeting. The next one is scheduled at the New Season's Market, on October 8, from 9:30-11:30 a.m. Herrera encouraged residents to drop by for an informal chat.

Flying the POW/MIA flag at City Hall year round would honor local veterans

an Jose is the home to thousands of military veterans, many of them living in East San Jose and Evergreen. I'm very proud that as a city we remember and honor the sacrifices of our veterans and offer the community many ways to participate. You can visit the veteran's memorial of San Jose in downtown. Located adjacent to the Center for Performing Arts on Park Avenue,

Center for Performing Arts on Park Avenue, this unique memorial is designed to be something of a sanctuary. Opening in 1997, it is dedicated to all the men and women from all branches of the military who have served our country. There are 76 unmarked white flags on stainless steel poles integrated with large glass panes that have sepia tone photographs and text of actual letters from servicemen on duty sent to friends and families. Everyone should stop by for a visit.

By contrast, the Vietnam War Memorial, opened in 2013 and located on Santa Clara Street adjacent to Arena Green, specifically honors Vietnam War soldiers from San Jose who died. It is similar to the Vietnam War Memorial in Washington D.C., which is a black slate wall with the names of the fallen service members etched in white. We owe a debt of gratitude to Dennis Fernandez for his leadership in raising the funds and his perseverance in seeing it through to its opening in March to welcome home those who gave their lives over 40 years ago.

As a Vietnam era veteran, I am reminded of those who served and those who did not

return and made the ultimate sacrifice. And this is the purpose of such memorials—to have us remember and honor what others did for us.

Thanks to the continued work of the United Veterans Council and many veterans

organizations who have kept this event going, San Jose will host the 97th annual Veterans parade on November 11, one of the largest veterans parades in Northern California. Everyone is invited.

In previous wars, a larger percentage of the population was in the military or connected to the military. Today, our all-volunteer military depends on a small percentage (less than 1%) of the U.S. population to defend the country. These men and women have been called on to serve in Iraq and Afghanistan and will likely be called to serve our coun-

try in the future. Even though many of us no longer know anyone in the military, the importance of acknowledging and honoring their service remains just as important as ever and includes honoring those who become prisoners of war or those who go missing in action.

As the San Jose City Council Veteran's Liaison and as an Air Force Veteran - the only Veteran on the 11 member City Council – I understand the importance of remember-

ing and honoring those soldiers who never came home from war or conflict. The principle of leaving no one behind — no matter the cost — is deeply embedded in the U.S. military, and for our Veterans who did come home and the families who still grieve over

POW/MIA victims, flying the POW/MIA flag provides some amount of consolation. This past month of May, the United Veteran's Council of Santa Clara County requested that the City of San José display the Prisoners of War/ Missing in Action flag permanently at City Hall. Soon after, several Veterans groups, including Veteran Voices of Santa Clara County, Vietnam Veterans of America, and Veterans Supportive Services Agency came together and requested that San Jose become the first city in Santa Clara County to display the POW/MIA flag all

year round at City Hall.

The creation of the POW/MIA flag began in 1971 when Mrs. Michael Hoff, the wife of a U.S. military officer listed as missing in action during the Vietnam War, developed the idea of a national flag to remind every American of the U.S. service members whose fates were never accounted for during the war.

Today, the POW/MIA flag is a symbol of our nation's concern and commitment to resolving as fully as possible the fates of

Americans from all American wars who are still prisoners, missing, or who are unaccounted

When the issue was presented at the City Council meeting in June, I authored a memo in support of the Veteran's request and we won approval to fly the flag in additional to the days designated by Congress: Independence week, POW/MIA Day, and Welcome Home Vietnam Veteran's Day. We also won approval to convene local Veteran's groups in the month of July to come back in August to offer additional policy alternatives looking at flying the POW/MIA flag at City Hall 365 days a year.

During the month of July I worked closely with Veteran groups to discuss policy alternatives to fly the POW/MIA flag all year round and it became evident that the POW/MIA flag was only one of the many issues that had not yet been addressed in the Veteran community. Our Veterans, like many other residents, are facing serious issues around homelessness, unemployment, and mental illness. While flying the POW/MIA flag is a major step in the right direction, it is not enough.

In light of this, I have convened a group called, *Veterans Empowering Veterans (VEV)*, with the goal of helping address some of the issues affecting the Veteran community. Through advocacy work and outreach to the Veterans themselves, *VEV* hopes to serve as a channel of change in the Veteran community. All the Veterans part of *VEV*, including myself, are conscious of the complexity of *See POW/MIA*, page 8



ne of the most exciting things to happen in California in the 1950s was the building and opening of Disneyland. On opening day my brother Dave and I (ages 14 and 16) bicycled from Long Beach. The excitement! Only my brother had the \$11.50 to enter. I watched from outside. The next Saturday, penniless, my friend Henry and I parked our bikes at the employment trailers on the west side of the Park. Employment? No luck! amendment to the flag display policy passing it unanimously and making San Jose one of the few cities in the Bay Area to display the flag permanently at City Hall.

The official flag raising ceremony for the POW/MIA flag will be on the third Friday of September, September 18th, the National POW/MIA day and will mark the first day the POW/MIA flag will begin flying permanently at City Hall. You may be asking, why parents can't just rely on school district report cards to know how their son or daughter is doing in math or language arts?

The SmarterBalance/C.A.S.P.P. in the opinion of this parent, is a measure of how all children should be doing across the U.S.A. and beyond in our global world of competition. This means that if one state has lower expectations than another, that, it will show up in the score mastery of the SmarterBalance/C.A.A.S.P.P.

The Smarter Balance test can act as one of many tools, for parents to measure areas where their son or daughter may need help, to keep step and perhaps be lifted up to keep pace, with learning at the same expected levels of children in different countries in our global world around us. If a child needs help in an area parents can join in more to help the child grow.

Perhaps too, if no schools are to be judged by the State of California in performance with an assessment tools this year and perhaps next, then there should be a moratorium too on teacher reviews by any school district until California gets the education check for understanding rubrics, figured out.

Our California Department of Education has just created a new task force to help recommend how schools will be assessed in years to come. Some believe that testing should be only one part of any rubric of how schools are preforming. Some believe other measures instead of testing should be used.

It is important for parents to know you can look up the Common Core standards by doing a google search and you can help in assisting your child to master them. The standards are items to teach but they do not tell people how to teach.

Maybe teachers just need more independent time to present all the yearly standards in the unique ways each teacher wishes to do it, for it seems that vast training is imposed upon them. Perhaps there is too much of a push to tell teachers how to teach. We as parents must honor the teachers and understand that they have a new system of education that they are grappling with.

Let us allow teachers lead in their own unique ways and use the SmarterBalance/C.A.A.S.P.P. test as a transparency parent tool to help us know what areas our children need to grow in as they progress from one school year to the next. Parents must be vigilant as to the growth of their children in both academics and other equally important things that ensure child well-being.

The SmarterBalance/CAASPP test is currently an evolving work in progress. The test is exciting! Let us honor it while knowing too that it is in its infancy. SET YOURSELF UP FOR SUCCESS WITH FITNESS

Sustainable lifestyle changes start with a comprehensive fitness program

E very person is beautifully unique. We may share values, social norms and ethics. Our children may attend the same schools, and as a community we collectively look out for another. One commonality I think about often is

that we all want to be healthy.

When it comes to fitness our physical abilities differ, our behaviors, our mindsets, our goals. How do we accomplish our goal becoming fit and healthy while making it work for us as individuals as well?

It comes down to starting comprehensive approach of making sustainable lifestyle changes to your fitness regimen as a foundation and gradually adding nutrition and other lifestyle choices to set yourself up for success. Research has shown that people are 75 percent more likely to maintain new behaviors if changes are incorporated incrementally.

Here's a formula for success:

Incremental Changes in Diet + Exercise + Time = Sustainable Lifestyle Changes (SLC)

What a Sustainable Lifestyle Change means specifically is a better quality of life, healthier relationships, improved sleep quality, confidence, ability to handle stress, and the list is endless. The challenge is that most people are unsuccessful taking on too many aspects at once. If they can't adhere to a strict program they feel they've failed and can become frustrated, doubting their ability to succeed. Even their self-esteem can erode. It becomes a self-fulfilling downward cycle.

Step One

Make one change at a time and start with stepping up your fitness. I usually suggest that people allow themselves to become acclimated to a new routine and the good feeling they get from being consistent and feeling their body change.

Fitness programs have as many shapes as there are shapes of people. It can be as simple as daily walking, joining groups, gyms or recreational teams. Small group fitness programs are ideal because the routine can be customized to each individual. For people of all activity levels, be certain to incorporate balance and stability training which is needed at any age, and especially important as we approach our golden years.

I have been teaching a personalized group fitness program for nearly nine years. It cultivates mutual accountability, nurtures peer support, and instills confidence. A variety of different workouts, including balance and stability, core training, upper body strength conditioning and switching up the workout prevents stagnation and plateauing.

"A single behavioral change becomes habit, habit evolves into a healthy lifestyle, which eventually will be come your preference."

Step Two:


Once a fitness program is underway, it's time to turn to making incremental nutrition changes. From an emotional standpoint, it's more inspiring to consider eating well because people don't want to "undo" or undermine all the efforts they put forth during their fitness regimen. They have a reason and purpose to start eating better quality foods.

Modify the portion control and target a daily deficit of 500 calories (this will result in a one pound weight loss each week), jumpstarting momentum toward weight loss goals, toning, improving body composition and overall feelings of strength and accomplishment. The idea is to lose fat and build muscle, which in turn builds metabolism.

Build metabolism through building muscle. For every pound of muscle on your frame, you'll burn between 30-50 calories per day. Each pound of fat only burns only two calories, so you can see that building muscle works to your benefit

Scale weight isn't nearly as important as body composition. Most people of average weight can be around 30 percent body fat or more. The ideal is between 20-24 percent to be considered fit. This is very different from BMI which is based on height and weight only, and does not take body composition, or the amount of lean muscle into consideration.

"It's fascinating to watch people hit their stride; getting their nutrition dialed in and the empowerment they feel after just a few months."



Here are three ways you can make incremental lifestyle changes so you are set up for success:

At the Office: Ask your employer if they offer internal lifestyle, nutrition and fitness programs for the employees. Many companies have cafeterias, or at a minimum a break room or micro-kitchen. If they provide food services, voice your preferences for healthy food options and reducing the amount of low quality snack foods and sugary beverages. If it's not there to tempt you, you'll be more successful at improving your food quality and reducing unnecessary calories.

If you are eating to maintain your weight, but you fall victim to an extra daily snack—even something as seemingly innocuous as a plain bagel—that alone will provide a surplus of 300 calories every day, and can result in nearly 15 pounds of added weight gain in only six months.

If fitness programs aren't offered, start your own walking group. Thanks to a plethora of apps, you can download one that tracks your steps as long as you have your phone with you

Home Hacks:

Build your meals to build your metabolism. Always start with a lean protein and combine complex carbohydrates and healthy fats into each meal. This combination will keep you fuller, longer and can aid in weight loss. Protein is critical for your immune system and we all need about 50% more after age 65.

Keep your portions small and balanced. To learn portion control weigh and measure you food for about a week so you get a good sense to ballpark later. Check out BITE ME! Change Your Life One Bite at Time to learn how to design your meals to build metabolism.

Eating Out and About:

In general people are less successful in their attempts to eat healthy in social situations, and the more people, the more challenging it is. According to the National Institutes of Health, compared with eating alone, individuals eat 35 percent more when eating with another person, 75 percent more with three other persons, and 96 percent more with a group of seven or more. Environments with harsh lighting, hard seats and fast-paced music affect our behaviors by eating more quickly.

Being mindful of this scenario will make you more effective if you plan ahead. Bring a healthful side dish or snack to social gatherings so you are sure to have something you can eat without guilt.

Plan on bringing "emergency food" with you such as highprotein muffins (found in the BITE ME! book) so you don't have to make nutritional compromises if you're caught hungry without good options.

Lifestyle changes that start with a supportive fitness program and gradually incorporate incremental nutrition changes over time will provide lasting, sustainable results!





Tech for Kidz is dedicated to donating technology items such as laptops for underprivileged schools. The fundraiser featured dances, singing, and a silent auction.







San Clara County water users save 36 percent in July

anta Clara County water users are continuing to heed the call for water conservation with a savings in July of 36 percent over July 2013.


The Santa Clara Valley Water District announced that water conservation numbers show from January to July, the cumulative savings is 25 percent over the same period in 2013.

"We're glad that people have really taken this to heart and are doing their part to save water," said water district Board Chair Gary Kremen. "We thank everybody for their hard work and ask them to keep it up so we can really make a difference by the end of the year."

In March, the water district board called for a 30 percent reduction in water use over 2013 levels based on local conditions: how much groundwater we are projected to have by the end of 2015, and how much imported and local water in reservoirs we have available.

The board also called for a two-day-a-week limit on watering land-scapes, a call that local water providers echoed. Countywide, local water providers adopted a watering schedule allowing those with odd-numbered addresses to water on Mondays and Thursdays and those on the even-numbered side of the street to water Tuesdays and Fridays.

Despite indications of a strong El Niño this winter, it is unknown whether Northern California's precipitation will benefit. Even if there is heavy rain and Sierra Nevada snow, it is unlikely that the state's largest reservoirs and our local groundwater basins will fully recover from four years of drought.



Laurelwood students excited with appointment of new principal

aurelwood Elementary School is humming with excitement with the appointment of new principal, Dr. Hong Nguyen, whose enthusiasm is very infectious. Students, parents and staff alike have commented favorably to Dr. Nguyen's aspirations.

"My goal at Laurelwood is to provide quality education so that students can be successful in life. I plan to collaborate with the teaching staff, students, parents and community members," said Nguyen. "I want a safe and nurturing environment where students are prepared with 21st century knowledge and skills."

This young, energetic, daughter of Vietnam War immigrants whose motto is dream, believe, and achieve, seems to have all the qualifications to produce all her goals at Laurelwood.

"Laurelwood is a great school with a strong staff and support network. I do not see any problems here only opportunities for growth and improvement," said the enthusiastic

Nguyen. "I would like to see more community involvement, and more funding towards student essentials, such as technology, PE equipment, and classroom budgets," she exclaims assertively.

Dr. Nguyen's parents escaped from Vietnam in 1981 with Hong's older sister. She was the first child born on American soil in Hillsdale, Michigan. Later, as a young child, the family moved to Salinas, California.

"My parents escape was fraught with many uncertainties," explained Nguyen. "After a couple of weeks at sea, they landed in Hong Kong remaining in refugee camps for nine months. The Hillsdale United Methodist Church sponsored my parents and older sister to come to Hillsdale, Michigan. After their arrival, due to language barriers, they had a hard time adjusting to the American lifestyle. Eventually, adjustments were made and by blending Vietnamese and American cultures their life was made more comfortable in the United States."

After completing elementary and secondary educational facilities, Dr. Nguyen graduated from the University of California at Berkeley. She also attended U.C. Davis, as well as Santa Clara University and Fielding Graduate University. She holds four degrees and two credentials. She obtained an


undergraduate degree in American Studies, with a minor in Education. She has dual Masters in Education and Educational Administration. She also has a multiple-subject teaching credential and an administrative services credential.

Dr. Nguyen continues, "I have been privileged to serve the past eleven years in the Evergreen community. I began my career as a classroom teacher at Silver Oak Elementary, then Smith Elementary. Katherine Thereafter I accepted the position as Instructional Coach at Cedar Grove Elementary. Last year I served as Assistant Principal and Instructional Coach at Leyva Middle School. I taught for nine years and was an assistant principal for one year before accepting my role as Principal at Laurelwood Elementary."

Dr. Nguyen's Doctorate Dissertation explains the problems that new immigrants face when coming to America. Because of older customs that remain, second generation immigrants face additional challenges as they try to fit into American pat-

terns as well as try to please the older generation by adhering to their customs. To quote from Dr. Nguyen's Dissertation: "Different generations of Vietnamese Americans experience culture clash within their own family. This intergenerational strain often stems from the discrepancies in values and lifestyles that occur between immigrant parents and their children as they acculturate to life in the United States.' (Tsai-Chae & amp; Nagata, 2008, p. 205). In other words, children grow up struggling between two cultures. They are often faced with the dilemma to follow their parents' traditional culture and values, while also acculturating to the American culture. Zhou and Bankston (1998) explained, "often they feel the urge to rebel against their parents in order to fit into their adolescent world as 'Americans,' but they also experience a strong tug pulling them back to their own families and to their culture of origin" (p. 161).

Dr. Nguyen is quick to praise her office and custodial staff. Santa Clara County begins postage-paid vote by mail ballots beginning Nov 3

anta Clara County Registrar of Voters has announced that Vote by Mail ballots will feature prepaid postage beginning with the November 3, 2015 Consolidated Election.

Under direction from the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors, the Registrar of Voters will include a new postage-paid return envelope with every Vote by Mail ballot. Previously, voters had to pay the cost of return postage, frequently exceeding a single first-class stamp.

Bushey said that prepaid postage may be particularly beneficial to Santa Clara County voters because 70 percent of the county's voters have chosen to vote by mail. Ballots returned by mail must be postmarked by Election Day and received within three days of the election in order to count. Ballots returned at drop-off sites and polls must be received by 8 pm.

The last day to register to vote in the November 3, 2015 Consolidated Election is October 19. Registration can be done online at www.sccvote.org or by using the free SCCVOTE mobile app, which is available for download on Android and Apple devices. Voters can also request a Vote by Mail ballot at www.sccvote.org or by using the SCCVOTE mobile app.

or those who were not given education opportunities that many of us that many of us take for granted, there is a help available from Math Companions.

Math Companions accomplished their goal of helping hundreds in the Evergreen Valley matching volunteer tutors from local high schools with needy students this summer.

"Fortunately, with a number of dedicated and passionate tutors, we were able to keep the tutor-to-student as close to 1:1 as possible, therefore providing individualized education for our students. By establishing such environment, students were able to learn at an incredible pace, even faster than even expensive prep classes."

Student achievement was celebrated throughout the year with various small rewards such as pencils and certificates. By the end of the summer, the standard for each grade level was immense.

Match Companions has not only built foundations for mathematics by instructing different levels of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division, the organization took a further step by preparing student for the upcoming 2015-16 school year.

"We encouraged our students to develop creative and intellectual minds with AMC 8/10 questions and other word problems, thus preparing them for national-level mathematics competitions, such as American Mathematics Contest 8/10/12 and MATHCOUNTS," said Panda.

Parents were overjoyed with the progress their students made, and

by not assigning homework or making their learning experience stressful with tests we managed to get hundreds of students to look forward to learning math for hours a week during their summer vacation. "We thank the community for its support, and look forward to continuing and expanding the program throughout the 2015-2016 school year," said Lee.

Silicon Valley luxury home sales climb 23 percent

Valley climbed more than 23 percent in July from a year ago while the median sale priced edged lower, according to a new report by Coldwell Banker Residential Brokerage.

The figures are based on Multiple Listing Service data of all homes sold for more than \$1.5 million last month in Santa Clara County. A total of 260 luxury homes sold in July, up 23.2 percent from 211 highend sales in July 2014. Luxury home sales last month did fall short of the 322 sales in June, although a seasonal decline from June to July isn't unusual.

Meanwhile, the median sale price of a luxury home in Silicon Valley last month was \$1,944,000, down 2.8 percent from the median a year ago when it stood at \$2 mil-

uxury home sales in Silicon lion. Last month's median was also off from June's level of \$2,011,000. Looking at the various segments of the market, the strongest by far last month was the \$3 million-plus segment, with sales soaring 65 percent to 38 units, up from 23 a year ago. \$2 million-plus sales were also up solidly, reaching 122 units from 107 last July.

"The luxury segment of Silicon Valley's housing market - much like the overall market - continues to be very strong with a solid increase in sales year over year, especially in the upper end," said Mike James, president of Coldwell Banker Residential Brokerage. "Inventory is gradually picking up, and that's finally giving buyers a little more to choose from as we move toward the end of the summer season."
