# **SPEEDING TRAGEDY** Memorial service held in **Evergreen for Kiran Pabla**

amily and friends of Kiran Pabla gathered in Evergreen Friday evening on Jan. 30 to pay their respects to the young woman who was killed by two speeding cars on Yerba Buena Rd.

# **Rose Herrera sworn in as** next vice mayor of San Jose

ity Hall's Rotunda was brimming with supporters as Rose Herrera was sworn in by her son David Herrera as the next vice mayor of San Jose on Jan. 29. "I'm honored to be named the vice mayor

of San Jose," said Herrera who is in her second term as District 8 councilmember which covers Evergreen and East San Jose. "As someone who grew up in East San Jose on Carl Street off Story Road, attended Overfelt High School... I am proud of my deep San Jose roots."

The event was a celebration of the city as the San Jose native shared her memories.

"I remember the orchards... my mom worked in the canneries and I remember the smell of peaches when she came home," said Herrera of the times when San Jose was called the Valley of Heart's Delight.

Herrera witnessed San Jose's growth through the years. And her own as well as she received both her Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Santa Clara University. She enlisted and served her country in the U.S. Air Force in the Security and Intelligence Service from 1972 to 1975. # State of the County: Year of opportunity declared

# **Upbeat address highlights** accomplishments and goals

The state of the county ((1 is good and getting

better," said Board of Supervisors President Dave Cortese at the annual State of the County address at the Montgomery Theater in downtown San Jose on Jan. 27.

Cortese announced that the county has come through the recession after cuts totaling \$1.8 million were made. He thanked the 15,000 county employees who agreed to cuts in wages and benefits during those years. With a balanced budget with a small surplus, Cortese expects the 2016 budget to hold steady.

"Our economy is strong and Silicon Valley is booming," he said. "As home to the largest companies that change the world on a daily basis, Santa Clara County captures the heart of Silicon Valley-the epicenter of this daily innovation revolution; A new Valley of Heart's Delight."

Though his speech was upbeat, Cortese recognizes that many still struggle to make a better life for themselves and their families and that is what the county is focused on-to create opportunity and quality of life for the residents. He declared 2015 to be the Year of Opportunity by working together to improve the community.

"That's not too much to ask of the community that boasts to being among the highest per capita productivity in the world," Cortese said. " ... [the] county must ensure we take every opportunity to support businesses so they can thrive, grow and succeed."

He also stressed the need to avoid political posturing of rejecting ideas or solutions based on where or who the ideas are presented. "Too often, we choose sides instead of choosing solutions," Cortese said.

He challenged the county and community partners to be open to ideas and solutions no matter from where they are suggested that will improve services to residents.

In a show of solidarity, San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo and councilmembers and other noted officials attended the address that was well received by attendees who

applauded throughout the address.

Cortese laid out a plan for the toughest problems that are faced homelessness, affordable housing, public safety and access to quality health care.

### Homelessness

On any given day, 7,600 homeless reside on the streets of Santa Clara County with more than 5.000 in San Jose alone. "Stunningly, nearly 1,000 are veterans and another 25 percent are children," said Cortese.

A Task Force will be organized with a report due to the Board Supervisors in 10 months and addressing affordable housing and homelessness in the short term. The Task Force will be co-chaired by San Jose Silicon Valley Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Matt Mahood, South Bay Labor Council Chief Officer Ben Field (who were also emcees at the address) as well as Supervisors Mike Wasserman and Cindy Chavez, a City of San Jose representative chosen by Mayor Liccardo, and others. **Public safety** 

"... every family deserves a safe

neighborhood," said Cortese.

Under county government, is the Sheriff's Office, prosecutors and firefighters. Steps have been taken to fill the vacancies at the Sheriff's Office. There were 215 vacant badge positions out of 1,320 at the beginning of 2014. Cortese expects to have fewer than

30 vacancies at the end of 2015. The county invested \$850.000 to step up efforts in the Sheriff's Office and the District Attorney's Office with the support from the South Bay Coalition to End Human Trafficking for this crime of modern day slavery. A Human Trafficking Commission was created to support law enforcement and collaborate with regional, national and international partners.

Cortese wants to create an Office of Neighborhood Safety to reduce violent crime by working with offenders and victims through mentoring and intervention services. Also, a Juvenile Fellowship Program will be created for youth offenders who engage in violent activities or use firearms. The youth participants will take part in the program, work on improving

their lives through education, job training and a resolution to the pain and damage they caused their victims.

### Public health

Cortese wants to reverse the growth of Type 2 Diabetes in Santa Clara County by ensuring that the county's 1.8 million residents have access to screening to prevent Type 2 from occurring. Supervisor Ken Yeager will lead the effort that no metro area in the county has undertaken. A similar assessment of the health of children in the county is also planned that Yeager will head.

With funding increased for the Senior Nutrition Program that began this month to insure meals were cooked onsite at their community centers, Cortese wants to move toward the goal of becoming a World Health Organization Age Friendly Community.

# Immigration

The Board of Supervisors is exploring creating a County Office of Immigrant Relations to better serve these populations. They are also looking to form partnerships with the City of San Jose and community foundations to research the impact of changes in our area and coordinate services such as an education campaign to stop fraudulent notarios from preying on immigrants who are navigating though complex legal matters.

#### Economic development

Create a County Economic Development Office that will seek out opportunities in each city within the county to use the land and provide incentives to builders and businesses such as for affordable housing for the homeless. An economic summit is also planned for this year as was organized in 2012.

Plans are being made to create a pilot tourism program that will offer boating field trips around the Don Edwards Wildlife Refuge at the Alviso Marina.

Bob Dhillon, the general secretary of Sikh Gurdwara, said "the service is a healing process for the family and also for the community that has been greatly affected by the tragic event."

Earlier in the week on Jan 28, the community held a vigil that drew more than 125 concerned citizens to remember Pabla, a Silver Creek High graduate. It was difficult for people to attend due to heavy traffic and limited parking. More than 75 lit candles were placed at the scene of the accident along with dozens of flower bouquets.

After the vigil, San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo and Vice Mayor Rose Herrera representing Evergreen District 8 met with the family and they said they were deeply touched by the outpouring of sympathy and comfort given to them by the community.

The day following the vigil, mourners brought additional flowers and local resident Andrew Cantana arrived at 2:30 p.m. to light candles that had gone out during the night. "I am coming here every afternoon to make sure every candle is lit," he said. "I didn't know Kiran or the family but this is something I just have to do," he said.

While the Cantana interview was taking place, several residents came by with more flowers and many signed a poster with dozens of messages for Kiran and her family.

"She touched me like no one has every touched me before," said a tearful Nilda Enriquez. "I did not know her, but I feel I am closer to her now even though she is gone. She was so beautiful. She was such a caring person according to people I have talked to here at the memorial site," she said.

"I plan to come several times per week and bring flowers and pray for her and I plan to spread the word to get everyone to slow down on Yerba Buena," said Enriquez.

The incident happened at noon Monday Jan 26 on Yerba Buena Road near Edenwood Drive when two speeding cars involved in an alleged street race crashed at high speed into a guard rail and careened into Pabla jogging on the sidewalk pinning her to a tree.

Pabla's family explained that any action now wouldn't bring Kiran back but they're vowing not to let this happen to another family.

Kiran Pabla's loved ones call her the star of the family and everyone's best friend, and right after the accident, they pleaded with city officials to do something to slow traffic

on the busy thoroughfare.

The accident occurred on a one-mile stretch at the bottom of the hill west bound on Yerba Buena Road that neighbors say they've complained about for several years. However, city officials report that the accident rate on the road is about average with other comparable roadways in San Jose.

Pabla's family was planning Kiran's 25th birthday party scheduled for this month but instead attended her funeral. Kiran was currently a California State University East Bay business student.

When friends were asked to describe Kiran

they said she was like a ray of sunshine, caring and charismatic.

The accident is devastating to Pabla's family. Her dad died a decade ago and her mother is battling breast cancer. The Pabla family said Kiran kept up the household duties alongside her two older brothers, while maintaining her studies as a business major.

"She's a really good person," said the victim's brother Kunal Singh. "She didn't deserve this."

Singh said his sister went out for a jog every other day. "She always dreamed of someday running 50 miles per week, he said. "She was our star."

"For those two guys who did this," said Kiran's other brother Aman Singh outside the courtroom. "I hope you guys [Exparza and Maldonad-Avoalos] go to sleep at night knowing you killed an innocent person, but we will still pray for your family as well."

with the city's Department of Transportation and police on proactive measures to slow traffic.

"Any straw is the last straw," said San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo. "Losing one 24-year-old young person to a tragedy like this is one too many."

Herrera said she has been working closely with San Jose Director of Transportation, Hans Larsen, to enact short-term, near-term, and long-term mitigation efforts for this stretch of Yerba Buena Road.

Herrera called for radar feedback signs to be put up right away. The radar was quickly activated on Jan 29 resulting in more than nine tickets for speeding being issued in the first hour of operation in the morning.

A photographer for the *Evergreen Times* noticed that more than half of the drivers exceeded the speed limit while taking photos for approximately 10 minutes of the sign, some speeds recorded at nearly 60 m.p.h.

Herrera also sent an urgent request for a permanent radar feedback sign. "Director Larsen informed me that because of my request for urgency in putting mitigation measures in place, the Department of Transportation was able to expedite the order of a permanent radar feedback sign. Instead of waiting until March, it was installed last Saturday."

The mobile radar feedback sign has been moved into the downhill portion (Westbound) of Yerba Buena and will remain along with the permanent sign.

The speed limit along the downhill portion of Yerba Buena is 40 miles per hour. The permanent radar feedback sign will give a digital

display of speed as cars approach up to 49 miles per hour.

"Once a speed is recorded above 49 miles per hour, the digital display will then flash a message 'Slow Down', giving a driver immediate feedback in order to change driving behavior and encourage compliance," said Herrera.

Herrera explained that drivers may not realize how fast they are going and the sign will remind them to maintain a legal speed. In addition, the city is installing all oversized speed limit signs between Nieman Boulevard and Silver Creek Road within two weeks. The radar feedback signs and the oversized speed limit signs are things that we can do immediately.

The two drivers were arrested and identified by police as Gabriel Bacerra Esparza, 18, and Manual Maldonado-Avalos, 23 both of San Jose. Esparza worked at a local restaurant in Evergreen. San Jose police have charged both drivers with felony vehicular manslaughter with gross negligence.

Police suspect Maldonado-Avalos, driving the BMW, had been racing against Esparza's Nissan Altima at speeds between 70-80 m.p.h. when they both sped out of control at the curve in the road near Edenwood Drive and crashed through a guard rail striking Pabla. Both men are scheduled to appear in court on March 9.

Mayor Sam Liccardo said he planned to survey the crash scene to see if any changes in the road could be constructed to make it safer. "There's more we can do to combat street racing. We know it will take more police officers," he said.

The city's safety engineering team is evaluating what might be able to be done based on funding and overall city priorities, including using technology for automated enforcement.

"We also must do everything we can to discourage racing cars on our city streets," said Liccardo. "There seems to be an increase in this type of behavior. Other cities have enacted penalties associated with car racing that include the destruction of the racer's car. We will be working with our Police Department and Department of Transportation to look at various strategies. I will be holding outreach meetings to include the communities input on speed mitigation as well as other safety measures as we move forward."

Herrera has asked the Department of Transportation to begin focusing on the 1 mile stretch of road on Yerba Buena and evaluate it for possible mitigation measures.

The Department of Transportation will be conducting the following activities:

■ A review of traffic safety issues along Yerba Buena Road to make sure safety elements are clear and in place.

■ A site review of crash scene and street corridor.

■ The repair of the damaged guardrail and other infrastructure damaged by crash.

• Ongoing coordination with the Police Department on traffic enforcement and past response to racing concerns.

Adding two more permanent radar feedback signs along Yerba Buena Road.

# Slowing down drivers to protect pedestrians

Tragedy befell our community last Monday when Kiran Pabla, was struck and killed by two cars driven by two young men that were allegedly racing on the downhill side of Yerba Buena Road near

Edenwood Drive. Kiran grew up in Evergreen and had worked as a page for the city's library service. Mayor Liccardo and I met with the family and they were deeply touched by the outpouring of sympathy and comfort given to them by the community.

Many of you have contacted my office offering your condolences and support for increased speed mitigation measures. I appreciate your support for the family and advocacy for doing something. Upon learning about the accident, I took immediate action the same day asking for Radar Feedback signs to be

installed along Yerba Buena Road to slow down drivers. The fact that the San Jose Police Department Traffic Unit has given out over 400 speeding tickets along Yerba Buena last year, combined with the history of fatal accidents on this road, supports the need to take more action to slow down drivers.

I have been working closely with our Director of Transportation (DOT), Hans Larsen, to enact short term, near term, and long mitigation efforts for this stretch of Yerba Buena Road as well as looking at other streets across our district and city with similar statistics to prioritize for mitigation measures. As an immediate response, SJPD and DOT took the following actions last week: they deployed SJPD traffic enforcement for speeding, mobilized a Police Department radar speed feedback mobile trailer, repaired a damaged guardrail, and installed a permanent radar speed feedback sign. Regarding the permanent radar feedback sign, we initially reported that DOT was projecting installation in March; a 2 month lead time. Thanks to the rapid response from DOT, two months was reduced to two days. The sign was special ordered from Washington State on Wednesday, shipped by plane to San Jose on Thursday, and installed by a DOT electrician and maintenance workers last Friday. The cost of the sign was \$10,000.

Our city safety engineering team is evaluating other things that might able to be done including signal lights and other measures. This tragic incident raises the question of whether we need to implement additional safety programs ranging from discouraging street racing to general safety education (particularly at the high school and college level – both of the speeding drivers were students at Evergreen Valley College).

Automated speed enforcement cameras are used in over 40 U.S. communities to remotely ticket speeding drivers. In an independent review of speed cameras for the prevention of road traffic injuries and deaths found the effect of speed cameras to be a reduction in all crashes, injury crashes, and death or severe injury crashes. In this review, 28 studies measured the effect on crashes. All 28 studies found a lower number of crashes in the speed camera areas after implementation of the program. In the vicinity of camera sites, the reductions ranged from 8 percent to 49 percent for all crashes, with reductions for most studies in the 14 percent to 25 percent range. For injury crashes the decrease ranged between 8 percent to 50 percent and for crashes resulting in fatalities or serious injuries the reductions were in the range of 11 percent to 44 percent. Effects over

wider areas showed reductions for all crashes ranging from 9 percent to 35 percent, with most studies reporting reductions in the 11 percent to 27 percent range. For crashes resulting in death or serious injury reductions ranged from 17 percent to 58 percent, with most studies reporting this result in the 30 percent to 40

percent reduction range. The studies of longer duration showed that these positive trends were either maintained or improved with time..

These remote cameras are not currently legal in California for issuing moving violations. However, San Jose and other municipalities have had discussions about the issue and are interested in changing this. Cities feel with budget priorities and limited Police Department bandwidth that automated enforcement could be a significant tool to address egregious speeding and improve traffic safety. Technological advances

(like driver assist and crash avoidance systems for vehicles) that can overcome the human limitation of reaction time are where the future of vehicle safety is headed but are not going to be standard equipment for years. In the meantime we must focus on educating drivers to slow down in as many ways as possible.

While one fatality is one too many. According to our Director of Transportation, San Jose continues to be among the safest big cities in the U.S. for injury crashes. The national average is 5.0 injuries annually per 1,000 residents and San Jose is at 2.7. Among the 10 largest U.S. cities, San Jose ranks second (behind NYC). Nevertheless we have seen the number of pedestrian fatalities climb over the past few years. In 2014, there were 21 pedestrian deaths and we have had four pedestrian fatalities this year (2015) in San Jose. Key areas of concern are on major streets (4 and 6-lane arterials) where 91 percent of pedestrian fatalities occur, elderly pedestrians, and night-time crashes (particularly between 9 p.m. and 2 a.m.). It is time to prioritize pedestrian safety in San Jose and take action to make our streets safer for people to walk. Especially as we promote San Jose as a walkable bikeable city, safety must be a top priority.

As a councilmember I have advocated for pedestrian safety measures supporting additional funding for traffic radar signs city wide during last year's budget as well as advocated for stream lining the process for neighborhoods to implement traffic calming measures such as speed bumps. I supported an ordinance prohibiting bicycles on downtown sidewalks to protect pedestrians and encourage bicyclists to utilize bike lanes.

As a member of the Transportation & Environment Committee I have voiced my concern that pedestrian safety should be addressed and requested that pedestrian safety be included in an upcoming annual traffic safety report in May.

My office will be holding a community meeting in the next few weeks to provide an update on the traffic mitigations on Yerba Buena as well as solicit public input on ideas for additional measures. The location date and time will be announced.

I will continue to work with the community, the Department of Transportation, and our Police Department and I ask for your help in encouraging everyone to slow down. Let's ensure that we are all doing what we can to prevent another tragedy from happening.

# Art of Living presents 'Happiness Program' for self-development

By Akanksha Bhalla Special to the Times The Art of Living Foundation, an international, nonprofit, educational and humanitarian organization, will be conducting a self-developmental program called the 'Happiness Program' from Feb. 6 - 9 at Evergreen Elementary School.

The new program will be taught by the award-winning author of "Stumbling into Infinity," Michael Fischman.

The Art of Living Foundation has been teaching the yoga of breath along with meditation and practical knowledge to combat stress and increase overall well-being for more than 30 years to people in more than 150 countries.

"We have taught our programs to a cross-section of the society including corporations, schools, general public and even correctional facilities such as drug rehabilitation centers and prisons," says Sunanda Gadagottu, an Art of Living (AOL) instructor when asked about the foundation's work in San Jose.

According to the founder of the Art of Living, Sri Sri Ravi Shankar, the secret is in the breath. The breath connects the body and mind. Various medical studies on AOL's core life-enhancing technique of *Sudarshan Kriya* have been published in international peer-reviewed journals such as the Harvard Health Publications.

"I am surprised how deep of an experience *Sahaj Samadhi* has turned into. The feeling of peace is incomparable. It is really what the world needs," says Abir, a 35-year-old engineer in Silicon Valley, about the

meditation practice taught by AOL.

Among various feedbacks to the program, these schools have reported decreased disciplinary action on kids, fewer fights on campus, and an increase in attendance.

On yoga and ancient wisdom's relevance in the modern age, says Sunanda, "The wisdom is ancient but the practices are current and designed to fit into a regular person's lifestyle, for example the practice of *Sudarshan Kriya* takes merely 20 minutes but has deep impact on the physiology and psychology of the person." In that sense the Art of Living has globalized wisdom instead of it being the prerogative of only a particular set of people in a certain part of the world, she says.

"Besides, what a person is looking for in terms of happiness, relaxation and peace has never changed over the ages."

Fischman who has taught this program to people as diverse as Muslim women in the Middle East to high profile executives in U.S. corporations and even prominent public figures concurs, "Everyone is looking for a higher purpose and a higher value in life no matter where they live. There are different expressions of it in the West and East. Besides organized religion, in the U.S. there has been a tremendous and growing interest in yoga."

# 'Cash for College' workshops offered

Special to the Times ducation has the power to transform lives and I believe every student who is qualified to attend college should have that opportunity. But too many times, cost is a barrier.

This year, I have made it my mission to inform students and families about the resources available to them to pay for college.

I am sponsoring a series of "Cash for College" workshops in February to help students and their parents complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid form - commonly referred to as FAFSA, a form that determines how much federal. state, and other college financial they can receive.

The workshops will also furnish essential information about applying for Cal Grants, the Middle Class Scholarship, and more.

It has become clear to me that many students, especially those who are the first members of their family going to college, do not know what free financial aid is available to them

or understand how to apply for it. What they don't know can hurt them.

Two years ago as tuition fees rose, over \$396 million in Pell Grants, free federal money earmarked for college-bound students from California's working families, went untouched. About 108,000 students eligible for the grants simply did not apply for the money,

leaving on the table grants that were worth on average about \$3,640 each.

Many officials believe this mistake was largely the result of parents and students being unaware of the requirement to fill out the FAFSA. The mistake can cost a student the chance to attend college or severely delay entrance. That's why I am holding the "Cash for College" workshops throughout my Senate District. This month, I've scheduled four

workshops: Thursday, Feb.5, 4 p.m.

to 7 p.m., Pioneer School: High Thursday, Feb. 5, 4 p.m. to 8 p.m., Homestead High School; Tues-day, Feb.10, 3:30 p.m. to 7 p.m., Leland High School; and Wednesday, Feb.11, 2 p.m. to 7 p.m., Willow Glen High School. The workshops are open to all students and their families throughout Silicon Valley. Recently, I held an

evening workshop at James Lick High School that drew nearly 90 people. Represent-atives from the California Student Opportunity and Access Program and the Cash for College program spoke to families about their options for scholarships, grants, and loans.

Madeline Villa, who accompanied her 18-year-old daughter, Jecelyn, a James Lick senior, told my staff that the workshop provided her with solid information on new alternatives for

paying for college.

"We basically thought we'd have to pay for college ourselves," Villa said. 'Now I see a lot of programs out there to help our kids get the education they need for a great future. This is something new to us."

Ensuring every eligible student can get into college and graduate without burdensome loans is a priority. Studies show that students who carry heavy college loans are less likely to purchase a home or open their own business. Their career choices are also affected.

Sponsoring local workshops is just one way I'm trying to help. Taking action on a larger scale, I am co-authoring legislation, Senate Bill 15, to expand college access and affordability. The bill would eliminate University of California regents' plans to hike tuition by 5 percent.

SB 15 provides \$50 million each to the UC and California State University systems to expand support services, such as counseling, to help students complete their degrees and augments the UC and CSU budgets by another \$25 million to increase course offerings. The bill also adds 10,500 more enrollments slots at CSU campuses and creates an additional 7,500 competitive Cal Grants.

The plan will be financed through three sources: increasing UC nonresident student fees; transitioning the Middle Class Scholarship program; and a \$150 million general fund investments that declines to \$66 million by the 2017-18 fiscal year.

Government must take the leadership role in seeing that our colleges are open to all. Perhaps the best example is the original G.I. Bill of Rights, passed by Congress in 1944. The bill covered the college tuition for 2.2 million World War II vets, many of whom could not have afforded it. The bill had another effect: It opened the doors of higher education for those groups – such as minorities - who had been customarily denied entry. The sudden influx of these new college-educated students would fuel America's post-war prosperity.

Investing in education makes sense because it is about investing in California's greatest resource - its people.

*Continued from page 1* and counseling on racial prejudice and stereotypes for all military personnel. She was even named "Veteran of the Year" in 2011 by the San Jose Veteran's Center.

"I grew up during the greatest civil rights movement," said Herrera mentioning the impact that Martin Luther King, Jr. and Gloria Steinem had on her growing up.

As the founder and CEO of Cinnamon Software, Herrera

oversaw the growth and development of a software manufacturing company with more than \$10 million in annual sales and more than 150 employees. She also worked in world-wide software sales and as a consultant to a start-up company developing products utilizing wireless area broadband.

In 2008, Herrera was elected to San Jose City Council and was reelected in 2012. An advocate for women's issues, she is a founding member of the Bay Area Military Women's Collaborative, and founding president of the League of California Cities Women's Caucus She was honored as one of the the *San Jose Business Journal's* 100 "Women of Influence for 2012."

his choice for vice mayor on Jan. 6 and voted in by city council on Jan. 13. "She has a vision... she has taken time to understand both sides... in the best interest of the city. She has the heart of a leader. You are all here because you've been touched by her."

As the District 8 council member Herrera helped save funding for Lightrail to Eastridge, secured funding for the 101/Tully Road highway project and the 101/Capitol Expressway/Yerba Buena interchange. She prevented Municipal Water from being privatized and kept Lake Cunningham Regional Skate Park from closing.

Most recently when a street racing crash caused the death of Kiran Pabla, 24, on Yerba Buena Road on Jan. 26, Herrera was instrumental in obtaining a permanent radar feedback sign before the planned March install (see story, page 1).

San Jose's deep cultural roots were also honored as performers from Kriyaa Dance Academy, McKon Kathak Dance, Evergreen Studio of Music and the Arts and El Grito de la Cultura students performed. The Boys and Girls Club of Silicon Valley's Christopher Step Team also performed and the club's president and CEO Dana Fraticelli spoke representing all nonprofits. "I am honored to have been named vice mayor of San Jose," said Vice Mayor Herrera whose term will run 2014-15. "It is important to me to continue to work toward making San Jose the best city it can be, and to do that, we all need to work together. We are one San Jose."
