K. Smith School launches safety and awareness campaign

Pollowing a tragic incident that claimed the life of a woman in the neighborhood shared by Katherine Smith School, the school is doing its part to keep their community safer.

The school is taking a series of steps to raise awareness of the need for more conscientious driving in the neighborhood and to teach kids pedestrian safety.



Their information and awareness campaign will initially consist of three main elements:

1. Classroom meetings - Teachers in every class will engage student with interactive discussions about street safety rules from getting eye contact with drivers when crossing a See SAFETY, page 3

Ramos named new Montgomery School principal

"Offer children what they want so that we can give them what they need. It is essential that we educators foster a learning environment where children feel safe, look forward to attending, and where they want to be. We must be proactive in our approach in order to engage children in high level learning activities." — Guillermo Ramos

This is the motto of Guillermo Ramos, the new principal of Montgomery Elementary School in the Evergreen School District.

Ramos' roots go all the way back to the state of Michoacan, Mexico. "My father had 12 children with his first wife," said Ramos. "After her passing, he remarried and had four more children with my mother. I was my father's 16th child of sixteen children. After several stints as a Bracero worker, my father decided to immigrate to California in 1971. A few short months later I was born in Hollister, CA and I am the only member of my siblings born in the United States."

Ramos attended Cabrillo College and transferred to San Jose State where he received a B.A. in History in 1996, Teaching Credential in 2000, and M.A. in Education Administration in 2001. He is the only one of sixteen siblings to graduate college fulfilling the wishes of his father and mother that one of their children graduate from college. He is proud to be called a San Jose University "Spartan" and that America has given so



much to him. "My mother is very proud of me," said Ramos.

Ramos credits the public education system for his successes through college and his recent position as principal. In addition to the public system, Ramos attended a private Catholic club named the Penny Club in Watsonville which served chil-

dren of field working parents. His educational background was enriched and strengthened through music and arts education and this is what he wants for every student that attends through Montgomery Elementary.

Ramos is proud of his background in teaching. "I started teaching in Pajaro Valley Unified School District in Watsonville, CA in 1997 as a migrant teacher and I eventually taught kindergarten, 2nd, 3rd and 5th grades. I have been in administration the past 13 years - five as an Assistant Principal and now eight as principal. I was principal of Hall District Elementary in the Pajaro Valley for seven wonderful years where we made a lot of progress. I have to say that being principal has been the best job and experience that I have ever had."

Mr. Ramos' ultimate goal at Montgomery Elementary is to have students on track to be college and career ready. He would like for students in all grades to have hands on opportunities in the field of arts and technology and to continue exploring strategies so that *See RAMOS, page 5*

street to using the corner or crosswalks only. They will brainstorm strategies, role play scenarios, and ensure every student understands why and how to stay safe

- 2. Using Parent Pride weekly meetings to engage parents The group will explore possible tactics to increase safety awareness in the community including crossing guards, improved city street signs, a "walking school bus", or increased safety committee involvement. The school's leadership will empower parents to fight for better resources and improve the ones we have.
- 3. Pedestrian safety posters K. Smith students will remind speeders why we need them to drive safely. Students have been challenged to make safety posters, which

will be posted on streets signs throughout the neighborhood.

"When there is a problem, we work to solve it. The recent tragedy will be our opportunity to make our community safer, especially for our student's journey to and from school each day," says K. Smith Principal Aaron Brengard. "I met with the family of the victim Laura Rosales last Friday. They hope to bring meaning to this tragedy and to keep the same thing from happening to someone else."

Petition supporting wildlife corridors gathers strength with thousands of signatures

Care2 petition is calling on Gov. Jerry Brown and Transportation Secretary Brian Kelly to support the building of wildlife corridors in California after a male mountain lion, known as P-32, was struck and killed on Interstate 5 on August 10. The petition has gathered thousands of signatures.

"It's absolutely tragic to think of the animal lives that have been lost due to California freeways," said Katie Cleary, president and founder of Peace 4 Animals. "We have it within our power to coexist peacefully with mountain lions, and we need to start by respecting their need for safe spaces to roam. Wildlife corridors are an easy way to mitigate the violent impact our fast-paced lifestyle has on these animals."

When P-32 was struck and killed in the early morning, he became the 12th mountain lion to be killed on California freeways since 2012. He was first tagged and collared in the Santa Monica Mountains near Point Mugu State Park, and had wandered an impressive distance. After crossing Highway 101 near Thousand Oaks on April 3, he became the first known male lion to successfully leave the Santa Monica Mountains since researchers began a long-term study of the population.

After that, he crossed three other freeways. Still, thousands of animals are hit by vehicles in California each year. For the 5,000 mountain lions living in the state, vehicle collisions are the number one cause of death.



"I was principal at James Franklin Smith Elementary School for three years. This year the Superintendent decided to spread our talents around to other areas. I am happy to be here at Cadwallader and believe that I can be a positive influence in this community."

For three years Cadwallader has had a program called Visual Thinking Strategies (VTS).

This is a program where students and teachers analyze images and ask probing questions to gain insight on what students are seeing:

What do you see? Or what is going on in this picture?

What do you see that makes you say that? What more can you find?

McClintock plans to continue the program with an added strategy called Accountable Talk. Accountable Talk is the use of sentence frames to respectfully agree or disagree with a classmate. "I agree with Lilly because it says on page two in the first paragraph that the dog wouldn't eat his food." The important element is that students cite evidence from either an image or from text to support their statements.

Maureen is assisted in the office by the talented and always cheerful, Dilly Bhoot, who is a former Cadwallader parent and knows the community well.

"Dilly is well known in our community and keeps our school running smoothly. In addition, Sherry Gilmore is our health clerk who teams with Dilly and the rest of our staff. Schools operate successfully with a great office staff and a strong custodial staff."

This observation of Mrs. McClintock seems to resound in all the schools throughout San Jose. Support staff is a strong foundation for our schools in addition to our talented teaching staffs.




sponsored by the Villages Democratic Club, at the Cribari Center Auditorium on Thursday, August 20.



President Carter's local appearances remembered

Timmy Carter's sojourn as president of the United States proved not to be such a success due to extenuating circumstances, and he may have been a little too unliberal for his liberal minded counterparts.

Carter was said to have failed to gain the release of hostages, taken by the Iranian Government, on November 4, 1979. After two failed attempts to rescue the hostages, the majority of them were kept 444 days, even though diplomatic efforts on the part of Carter prevailed little.

It is not really known what caused Iran, on January 20, 1981, to release the remainder of the hostages. This happened to be the day that Ronald Reagan was sworn in as president of the United States. Carter met the hostages in Germany to insure that they were well represented by the United States.

Jimmy (as he likes to be called) became active on many fronts after his presidency, notably, his Habitat for Humanity. The Habitat organization has been an active force for good throughout the world for many years. He has also been an integral figure in gaining peace between Israel and Palestine. World leaders have recognized him as a man of his word and have depended heavily upon his guidance and leadership.

February 8, 1995 dawned drizzly with a promise of rain the whole day. This was the day that Carter was coming to the Bay Area to conduct a book-signing for his book of poetry, Always a Reckoning, and Other Poems, illustrated by his own granddaughter, Sarah Elizabeth Chuldenko.

I was invited by a work colleague to go stand in line to obtain a signed copy of the book. I, in fact, took along another book by Jimmy and when I reached the table where he sat, I asked him to sign the other book for my wife. He graciously greeted me, signing both books, and smiled a knowing smile, as if to say, "That is what I would have done also."

This prompted me to write the following poem for Jimmy Carter after I returned home

February 8, 1995

Palo Alto was a' hum last night The media recorded it all People lined the adjacent streets To answer the collector's call.

There was Bob, Leonard, Helen and Frank And a lady who "loved" to read An impressionistic artist who was married to Bob And a hippie of no certain creed.

The incessant rain was no hindrance



To this headstrong, determined group Their minds made up to endure to the end They all showed plenty of poop.

Finally, the doors were swung open To the cultural hall, and their goal For hours and hours they had waited Did anyone mind? Not a soul.

All this standing and aching
For four seconds of valuable time
As Jimmy signed volume on volume
He longed for ole Georgia's clime.

Frank Shortt February 9, 1995

After writing the poem, I did not feel that it should be presented as only a typed document. A friend of mine, Pam Maroni, was a wonderful Calligraphist, so I asked her if she would mind doing the poem in calligraphy. She graciously did so and I sent it to Jimmy along with some photographs that another friend had taken at the book-signing.

Jimmy was very pleased with the poem and sent me autographed photos, as well as, returned my check that I had sent to pay the return postage.

My next encounter with Jimmy Carter was when he came to San Jose on October 8, 2013 with his Habitat for Humanity group. That morning he arrived in Evergreen and entered the gate at Lake Cunningham Park and later going to the Cesar Chavez neighborhood to work on some houses there that needed repair. My article appeared in the Evergreen Times.

Now Jimmy is undergoing treatment for the dreaded disease, cancer. He still insists on teaching his Sunday school class Plains, Georgia, as well as trying to keep up with correspondence for several of his other causes.

Jimmy, our prayers are with you, and I count it a pleasure to have, in a small way, shown my appreciation for all that you have accomplished as the humanitarian and gentleman that you are. Keep up the good fight!

Long term 27-acre lease adjacent to Evergreen College to be discussed

he District 8 Community Round Table will host a meeting to discuss Republic Urban Properties proposal for their long term lease of 27 acres of property adjacent to Evergreen Valley College. The meeting is scheduled to take place at the Evergreen Community Center on Oct 1 stating at 7 p.m.

Representatives from Republic

Urban Properties have been invited to attend along with the College District and the community to present their thoughts on the project to the community.

At their April 14, 2015 meeting San Jose/Evergreen Community College District Board of Trustees received an offer from Republic Urban Properties to enter into a long term lease of approxi-

mately 27 acres of property adjacent to the Evergreen Valley College. Republic offered the district \$1.5M annually for a 99 year agreement; there were no competing bids. One week later the offer was accepted.

Republic intends to develop the parcel as a mixed-use project, potentially including over 400 residential units along with retail and

commercial office facilities, subject to the approval of the City of San

The land, which was declared surplus in 2004, is not currently zoned for such development. The College District has identified several guiding principles for the development. Ideally, it will link to and enhance the identity of the Evergreen Valley College campus


while serving as a destination for visitors, residents and employees.

The project is a component of the Board's long term strategy to stabilize the funding variability driven by California's economic cycles. During the last downturn, the District was taxed with cutting approximately \$3.5 million from its operating budget, in addition to losing about \$1.0 million in funding due to lower student enrollment. The Board believes that the current campus footprint of 130 acres can support the current and future needs of the college and has developed a master plan consistent with that belief.

Some area residents take issue with the proposal, and have launched a Facebook page, Friends of Evergreen Valley College. They note that Evergreen Valley College offers significantly fewer degrees and certificates than other nearby community Evergreen students drive across the valley to DeAnza or West Valley to get into the programs that they want, adding to the traffic congestion for which the Valley is known. These residents believe the land is better used to improve the number and quality of programs, facilities and fields at Evergreen Valley College as a way to help relieve congestion and reduce carbon emissions.

The development proposal must work its way through San Jose's comprehensive planning process, which includes community meetings as well as hearings by the Planning Commission and, ultimately, the City Council.



"I think it means a great deal to receive a gift, and know that people in the community care about them," says Benoit. "It raises their self-esteem. Most importantly, these gifts motivate teens to connect with city agencies which can get help them with counseling, job training, educational programs and sometimes housing, changing lives."

The teenagers, recommended by local San Jose service agencies, are family members of Sacred Heart Community Service, homeless youth helped by Bill Wilson Center, street kids served by HomeFirst, and teens living in group homes run by Unity Care Group and Advent Group. They face financial hardships, and some live on the streets.

The gift bags provide the teens with a fleece blanket, t-shirts, USB flash drive, hat, socks, flip-flops, underwear, water bottle, Frisbee, playing cards, journals, cosmetics, personal care items, dental supplies, school supplies, jewelry, snack bars and a candy cane. Gift cards are included for The Tech Museum, Golfland, movies, Target, and fast food. The teens also receive warm clothes they might not otherwise have. The girls receive knit caps, scarves and gloves, and the boys get baseball caps and sweatshirts. Due to a generous donation from Cisco, this year the boys will receive leather jackets as well.

In addition, due to a \$24,300 grant from the Sharks Foundation, and a \$5,000 grant from the Trombetta Foundation, each teen will receive a \$25 gift certificate to buy a new pair of shoes at Payless. "Getting them a new pair of shoes has always been our dream," says Gifts for Teens volunteer Arlene Shaughnessy. "It's wonderful they'll have the opportunity to shop for something they want, and it's so important for them to know someone cares."

The gifts bags were received with great appreciation last year. "This gift bag is the only gift I received," said one teen. "It means so much that someone cared enough to put the bag

together just for me." "This was one of the best Christmases of my life," said another.

"I loved the sweatshirt; it doesn't show dirt," said a recipient. "Without this sweatshirt, I wouldn't have anything nice to wear to my job interview." "I want to thank you for taking time out of your day to buy the gifts you brought me for Christmas," shared a homeless boy from a group home. "If I could buy you a present, I would have done the same for you."

One of the girls in a group home wrote in a thank you note that she was happy to have her own shampoo, and a father said he was finally able to have presents under the tree for his kids.


"Hearing the feedback is heartwarming," says Gifts for Teens volunteer Beverly Bassett. "It means so much to them, and brings tears to our eyes. We have such a diversity of incomes in the San Jose area. To be able to help those that don't have advantages in life...families struggling with two or three jobs to do the best for their kids...knowing I'm doing something to help them, is very rewarding."

"I love that there's something available for older kids," says Gifts for Teens volunteer Norma Faulkner. "The comments are so touching. I hope Gifts for Teens continues for time to come. There's always going to be a need."

"So many people don't realize that there's such a struggling class in San Jose," says Bassett, "and there are things that can be done to help them."

"It's a wonderful thing that we are able to help these young people who have little, if anything," says Benoit. "It's extremely important that we're getting the word out to the community that there's a need out there and the community is responding." "It's wonderful some companies are stepping forward," says Benoit. "SanDisk gave us 800 USB drives so the kids can store school work and resumes."

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
