Baltimore Times Columnist Wins Playwright of the Year Award

“My Big Phat Ghetto FABULE\$\$ Wedding,” Ursula Battle’s exciting play about what happens when a reversal of fortune causes a couple’s expensive dream wedding to turn into a beer buck budget nightmare, is among the journalist and writer’s many works that have helped her to earn the 2016 Newsome Award for Playwright of the Year.

The award is named after Baltimore-native and businessman Fred Newsome, who is also the executive producer of the Newsome Gospel Music Awards and serves on the board of governors of the Grammy, Stellar Gospel Music and Agape Theater and Film Awards.

Battle, who is also a Baltimore Times columnist, was honored on Sunday, August 7, 2016, at the Chesapeake Arts Center in Brooklyn Park, Maryland.

“I was humbled, surprised and I was thankful to God for the opportunity to be recognized for doing something that I love to do,” Battle said of the honor.

“It gives me another opportunity to give God glory because I believe my talent, my gift, is writing. I believe when I write I’m utilizing the gift God gave me and I don’t ever do it for the spotlight or for recognition,” she said. “This is what I believe that I’m called to do, and to be recognized for that is special. It also goes to show you that people do recognize and appreciate your work. When you work hard and put your best effort forward, you will be recognized and appreciated and this is a shining example of that.”

A Magna Cum Laude graduate of Coppin State University, where she earned her bachelor’s degree in English and a minor in journalism, Battle also earned her master’s degree from the University of Baltimore where she majored in publications design.

Also a graduate of the Broadcasting Institute of Maryland and Walbrook High School in Baltimore, Battle is the founder and CEO of Battle Stage Plays.

She says the goals of her plays are to uplift, inspire, educate and encourage through sidesplitting comedy, riveting drama, soul-stirring singing, and powerful ministry.

“My favorite scripture says to walk by faith, not by sight and I thank God for the opportunity to be used as a vehicle,” Battle said. “I’m just one part of a big production of people. It’s really not just about me, it takes the writer, director, performers, stage crews, the audience and all of us come together for this.”

“DisChord in The Choir;” “The Crown of Glory & The Agony of Deceit;” “Widows in The Hood;” “Jacob, Rachel & Leah;” “Noah’s Ark;” “Never Give Up;” “Abraham & Sarah;” “The Christmas Gift;” and “Mary and Martha” are among Battle’s many stage play productions.

Her productions have appeared at several greater Baltimore venues, including Coppin State University, Morgan State University, the University of Maryland Eastern Shore, and the Downtown Cultural Arts Center.

Battle’s romantic comedy stage play production, “FOR BETTER or WORSE” was chosen to be performed at ArtScape 2008.

In 2004, her hit production, “The Teachers’ Lounge,” was chosen for a time-modified presentation for the National Association for Professional Teaching Standards’ Convention held that year at the Grand Hyatt in Washington, D.C.

In 2013, an updated version of “The Teachers’ Lounge” was performed at the Downtown Cultural Art Center in Baltimore.

Her first play, “The Teacher’s Lounge,” was conceived after attending a performance of Shelly Garrett’s “Beauty Shop,” Battle said.

“Me, my mother and some others went to see ‘Beauty Shop’ and my mother

said to me that I should write a play about teachers,” Battle said, adding that it wasn’t long before she wrote “The Teachers’ Lounge,” one of her most memorable plays.

In September, Battle’s “My Big Phat Ghetto FABULE\$\$ Wedding” returns by popular demand to Johns Hopkins’ Turner Auditorium. The production drew sell-out audiences when it debuted in December 2015.

“People asked us to bring it back so we’re bringing it back and we are also working on bringing back ‘DisChord in The Choir,’” Battle said.

“The plays give us an opportunity to highlight the talent we have in Baltimore. We have a lot of traveling plays that come to town but I believe we’re putting plays up that are comparable if not better than those bigger plays.

“We’re able to offer our plays at affordable prices and it gives an opportunity for individuals to shine through their performances and we have so many wonderful singers and dancers and crew members,” she said.

We have to end the war on women in cyberspace

Marylanders Encouraged to Shop During Tax-Free Week

State sales tax waived for qualifying clothing and footwear under \$100 between August 14-20, 2016

Annapolis— From August 14 to 20, 2016, the state's six percent sales tax will not be collected for any single, qualifying article of clothing or footwear priced \$100 or less, regardless of how many items are purchased at the same time.

"A break on the cost of clothing and shoes can make a real difference and help stretch family budgets. Local retailers also benefit with increased foot traffic," said Comptroller Peter Franchot.

The tax-free week is held annually during the second week in August, as a result of legislation passed by the Maryland General Assembly in 2007. Businesses selling items that are not eligible for inclusion in the tax-free week can



still participate in Shop Maryland. Under "Sellers Privilege," other unqualified merchandise can be sold tax-free, but the retailer is responsible for paying the sales tax owed to the state.

Terrence West wants the Ravens to be his last stop in NFL

Terrence West attended Northwestern High School in Baltimore and has always been a Baltimore Ravens fan. Now that he is a member of the Ravens, he wants to stay with the team for the rest of his career.

"Yes, growing up in Baltimore, I always was a Ravens fan," West said. "Coming out of the draft, the Ravens were going to draft me, but the Cleveland Browns traded up and picked me."

At one point, it looked as if the Ravens were going to make his dream come true in the third round of the 2014 NFL Draft. The Ravens selected safety Terrence Brooks with the 79th overall selection and planned to come back to get West later in the third round.

The Cleveland Browns foiled their plan by selecting West with the 94th overall pick, only six picks before the Ravens were set to take him. As fate would have it, West ended up in Baltimore.

The Baltimore native has extreme pride in his city as shown by his hat, which says "BWI" on it. "I'm from Baltimore. When you think of BWI, you think of an airport," West said with a smile. "I think it was a good concept. Just 'Balling With Intentions' speaks for itself."

There were grumblings about West having a poor attitude and work ethic. That is the said reason for both the Browns and Tennessee Titans decisions to cut ties with him in consecutive years.

Landing with the Ravens is a blessing for West because of the way head coach John Harbaugh demands the best from his players. Harbaugh said he is pleased

"I think it's been really good," Harbaugh said. "He's done a really good job. He's in great shape; he flashes talent, he's very determined, is all business. I really appreciate it. He's done well."

West is an entertaining person to follow on social media. Like many other athletes, he makes sure fans see the work that he is putting in during the offseason. That hasn't gone unnoticed by his running backs coach Thomas Hammock.

"He has had a great off season, OTAs and training camp," Hammock said. "Obviously, he posts a lot of videos on Instagram, so I can see his off season workouts. He has done a great job of studying the playbook, and he is in great shape. He is really competing hard."

West has fought weight issues in the past, but reported to training camp sporting a more streamlined body. The results have shown on the field as he is noticeably quicker and is making sharper cuts. The third-year running back shared the

secret to his body transformation.

"I've actually been focused throughout my career," West said. "I just put more time in, as far as food and what I put in my body. I just come out here and take one day at a time, one play at a time."

In addition to refining his body, West has found another reason to want to succeed—his twin daughters.

"They're great motivation. That puts another chip on my shoulder. I don't want my kids to depend on anybody; I want them to depend on me, so I'm just trying to put the work in now."

The road appears to have leveled out for West as he is now in contention to be a starting running back on his hometown team, which is an organization that provides the stability that he needs. He wouldn't have it any other way.

"Throughout my career—high school, college—I've always had obstacles, I have had to overcome," West said. "This year, I have limited opportunities. I was in Cleveland [then] I went to Tennessee, now I'm with the Baltimore Ravens. I want to make this my last stop."

Education Secretary calls on leaders to 'raise voices'

The four-day National Urban League Conference at the Baltimore Convention Center had the theme, "Save Our Cities," and organizers said a chief way to accomplish that goal is through education.

To that end, U.S. Secretary of Education John B. King Jr. headlined a Town Hall on Education on Thursday, August 4, 2016— Day 2 of the conference.

King urged those in attendance to be advocates for changes in education that would provide equal opportunities for all students. It is important that community and other leaders raise their voice to make sure that students have access to quality schools and resources, the only way the new No Child Left Behind Act would work, he said.

"We have to be vigilant to make sure it is not replaced with doing nothing at all," King said. "We have to make sure that it is replaced by meaningful interventions when schools are struggling."

Since becoming secretary, King's supporters say he has brought a commitment to advancing excellence and equity for all students, supporting educators and elevating the teaching profession, and improving college affordability and completion rates.

Prior to being appointed to the position of secretary, King served as principal senior advisor to the Department of Education where he not only carried out the duties of the deputy secretary, but he oversaw all preschool-through-twelfth grade education policies, programs and strategic initiatives, as well as the operations of the department.

His work focused on increasing equity, improving educational outcomes for all students, and closing achievement gaps through implementation of key adminis-

tration priorities in areas including early learning, elementary and secondary education, special education, English language acquisition and innovation, he said.

During his appearance in Baltimore at the National Urban League conference, King noted there are numerous inequities in access for African-American and Latino students in the country.

While money shouldn't determine whether an individual receives a good education, it does play a role, and for schools and institutions that lack funds, they must spend wisely, King said.

"Money isn't everything, we know," he

said. "But, educators must make good choices on where they put their resources," King said.

There are approximately 1.6 million students who go to schools that have a sworn law enforcement officer, but without a school counselor, King said, quoting from a survey.

Further, African-American students in pre-kindergarten are three times more likely than their white peers to be suspended from school, he said.

Again noting a survey, King said blacks are significantly more likely to attend schools where they cannot take courses

in chemistry, calculus or physics. During the past two decades, there has been a re-segregation of schools, which has left many minority and economically disadvantaged students out in the cold and has prevented them from having interaction with white and middle class students, according to King.

"We can change that reality as a result of choices we are making in terms of school and housing opportunities," King said, noting that school was a place where he always felt safe while growing up. "My teachers gave me a sense of possibility."

Urban League Conference Draws Big Names

Democratic Vice Presidential candidate Tim Kaine may have helped set the tone at the annual conference of the National Urban League, which was held last week in Baltimore.

Kaine, who proved an ample fill in for Hillary Rodham Clinton, spoke passionately about more police training, data collection and the need for community policing rather than an adversarial and zero-tolerance strategy.

“A profound distance has grown up between law enforcement and communities in too many places in America, and that distance is dangerous,” he said. “Let’s support independent data collection, investigation and, if necessary, prosecution of police involved in deaths.”

Kaine also called for the end of the era of mass incarceration.

The conference, which kicked off on Wednesday, August 3, 2016 and ran through Saturday, August 6 at the Baltimore Conference Center, also featured

several workshops and a panel of civil rights activists and community leaders, moderated by the Reverend Al Sharpton, who championed criminal justice reform.

“We cannot have flash-point movements to settle systemic problems,”

Sharpton said. “Black America has to change the temperature in the kitchen.”

Panelists noted that one in 10 black men in their 30s is incarcerated in the United States and one in 50 children have a parent in prison. Additionally, it was noted that there are currently approximately 6,000 youth in adult jails in the country.

“There has been an explosive increase in incarceration in the United States,” said Jenny Kim of Koch Industries, who sponsored the discussion about criminal justice reform and ending mass incarceration.

Mass incarceration has hit black communities the hardest, by far, National Urban League President and CEO Marc Morial said.

Cornell William-Brooks, president of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, also spoke on the topic at the conference.

Brooks said the plight of African-Americans and the criminal justice system demands immediate attention.

“Mandatory minimums and other laws are condemning our people to the bowels of the criminal justice system,” he said.

Last year, more than 900 lives were lost due to police and citizen encounters, Brooks said. This year, more than 500 people have been killed at the hands of law enforcement and the United States needs national standards regarding use

of force and police conduct, according to Brooks.

Famed Baltimore attorney Billy Murphy Jr., who represents the family of Freddie Gray, said the election of the country’s next president is pivotal for African-Americans.

It’s imperative that “anyone but a Republican” is elected, Murphy said.

Melanie Campbell, president of the National Coalition on Black Civic Participation, said blacks must turn out to vote in record numbers because “everything is at stake.”

Benjamin Crump, president of the National Bar Association, likened high prison rates to slavery.

“We’ve got to quit incentivizing mass-incarceration. We must use the power of the ballot to hold elected officials accountable,” Crump said.

Baltimore Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake blasted Republican Presidential nominee Donald Trump and the GOP for not accepting an invitation to appear at the conference.

“If you plan to be president, you should plan to be president of the entire United States and when you have a national organization of this stature and refuse to participate at this national conference, it speaks to what your priorities are moving forward,” Rawlings-Blake said. “African-Americans in this country have a strong tradition, a strong history and an extremely powerful future.

“You cannot think you’re going to have an inclusive country, a country that is good for all of America, without including African-Americans.”

Among the many who spoke or appeared at the conference were: activist Sil Lai Abrams; Lee Baker, president of Apex Financial Services; Linda Blount, president and CEO of Black Women’s Health Imperative; Charmaine Brown, the director, Office of Diversity and Inclusion at Fannie Mae; Maryland Senator Ben Cardin; singer and songwriter Raheem DeVaughn; hip-hop legends Doug E. Fresh and M.C. Lyte; U.S. Education Secretary John B. King Jr.; TV One’s Roland Martin; and former Baltimore mayor and University of Baltimore President Kurt L. Schmoke.




