The Back River Restoration Committee's new batch of summer interns has their work cut out for them. But they are already proving their worth, having removed massive piles of trash and debris that were fouling the waterway.

While the weight numbers were not yet available, the group of five interns has used the BRRC's new "Trash Wagon" boat and barge to be able to remove large amounts of bulk trash items, as well as large driftwood, from Back River in a single haul.

In just their first two weeks on the job, the team had worked with Apex Tool Group to create a giant pile of trash, including sofas, construction materials, shopping carts and mattresses, that they had pulled from the river. They also created their own pile consisting mostly of large trees, tree limbs and other driftwood that had been carried down and could have become a hazard for boats on the river and in the Chesapeake Bay.

On top of that, the interns had removed dozens of tires from the waterway. However, those are not included in the total tonnage of garbage removed because they are disposed of separately and recycled, according to BRRC Executive Director Karen Wynn.

The interns - Jake Smuck of West Virginia University, Ben Donofrio of Towson University and Meredith Lansing, Romeo Juandoo and Evan Janis of CCBC - are all students with environmental majors and are in their first year working for the BRRC. But Committee President Sam Weaver is happy to see them getting some real-world experience to go with their environmental degrees.

Simply through clearing trash and debris from the river, the crew is able to learn about the ecosystem and the different ways that waste materials contribute to its pollution, according to Weaver. They also get a valuable lesson in stormwater management since the lack of it along Back River's upstream tributaries causes

New location found for Rosedale Center students

A new home for students of the Rosedale Center, an alternative school for children who have been suspended or expelled from school, was voted on Monday night in an emergency Board of Education session.

The Board voted unanimously to approve the new location at 7090 Golden Ring Road, which the county will lease from Merritt Properties.

The terms of the new deal have the county paying an annual base rate of \$6.75 per square foot and operating expenses of \$1.64 per square foot for the 30,827 square-foot facility. The base rate will increase annually by 3 percent.

In total, the new agreement with Merritt will cost \$3.8 million and will be drawn from the operating budget. That represents a \$300,000 increase from the lease the county had previously agreed to with Nechay Realty Investments, LLC.

The need for a new facility for Rosedale Center students comes amidst the reconstruction project at Victory Villa Elementary in Middle River. Victory Villa students will be moving to the Rosedale Center's location at 8200 Old Philadelphia Road in Rosedale for the next two years while a new elementary school is being built as part of the county's decade-long

Schools For Our Future project.

The lease agreement sees the county holding onto the facility for five years. Members of the Board of Education questioned the need for a five-year lease when the construction for Victory Villa is only supposed to take two years, but Pradeep Dixit, executive director of BCPS's Department of Physical Facilities, stated that the five-year lease would be

According to Dixit, the newly leased property could hold Rosedale Center students and also be used as a "swing school for future construction projects in the

- continued from page 1 county, especially in the northeast."

Dixit also stated that the facility could be converted for another use, or they could just turn the lease over to the county.

When asked about the \$300,000 difference in price between the first agreement and the new agreement with Merritt, Dixit stated that there were more unknowns related to construction costs and that's why they were asking the Board of Education for more money. He stated that the final number could be a few hundred thousand more or less than the \$3.8 million the school system was requesting from the Board.

"The biggest variable here is that we had gone further along with the planning and design and construction of the first property because we had much more time to work through those details," said Dixit. "Here the construction build-out requirements are more uncertain because we just identified and inspected the property, so out of an abundance of caution - we know there will be more construction involved in total but we're less certain of those details."

According to Dixit, there are currently 48 students returning to the Rosedale Center program next year, and facilities will be operational by the time the school year begins in September.

"Our schedule is to start upon the Board's approval and complete the first phase of a two phase project before the school opening," said Dixit. "The second phase, which is about 7,000 or 9,000 square-feet, will be completed by November."

When pressed by members of the Board about whether or not the facility could hold all of the students, Dixit stated that the space was more than sufficient for 48 kids, adding that by the time September rolls around, 17 classrooms will be completed. Superintendent Dallas Dance then added that the space available after the first phase would be enough for 100 stu-

The original lease agreed to with Nechay Realty Investments was for a 31,558 square-foot property located in the Hidden Grove Business Park in Middle River. The new lease in Golden Ring means the Rosedale Center students will stay closer to their old location on Old Philadelphia Road, which members of the Board saw as a big im-

According to BCPS spokesman Mychael Dickerson, there was no sunken cost associated with the switch to Merritt Properties.

"They hadn't yet been authorized to get any of the funding, and because of that we didn't end up losing anything when the negotiation fell through."

Residents causing stir over Essex housing development plan change

An approved residential development planned for an undeveloped 22-acre property in Essex has drawn the ire of nearby residents after its developer applied for a last-minute change in the plan.

Glen Burnie-based Crasftsmen Developers, LLC, has requested a plan refinement with Baltimore County to build 125 townhomes and four single homes on the site, located at Back River Neck and Middleborough Roads and currently owned by Henderson Webb, instead of the 180 apartments that were approved back in 2007.

Although the plan - dubbed Canterbury Crossing - was originally approved and will be built under now-outdated environmental and open space regulations, it will surpass those requirements,

according to Conor Gilligan, vice president of land management for Craftsmen Developers.

Under today's standards, the project would be required to provide 1.89 acres of active open space. With this plan it will provide approximately two acres of active community green space and a total of 9.4 acres of local open space. And the plan is only bound by the year 2000 storm water management regulations, but they will incorporate more up-to-date practices where possible, Gilligan said.

"So we're going to be utilizing the 2000 regulations, and then we're also going to be instrumenting the new regulations, the Environmental Site Design features, in and around the townhouse buildings," he explained.

Approval for the revised plan would

come from the county's Development Review Committee, which had a meeting on the matter scheduled for this past Tuesday, June 28. DRC meetings are open to the public, but input from the community is not accepted there.

As a result community members have decried the plan for its lack of public input and the haste to get approval, and have asked the director of the Department of Permits, Approvals and Inspections, Arnold Jablon, to intervene to "pump the brakes" on the project.

Rockaway Beach Improvement Association leadership sent a letter to Jablon Tuesday morning outlining their concerns about the amount of time the county and public have had to review the plan, as well as their concerns that the area's infrastructure may be further strained by

the development.

"Our area's infrastructure simply cannot handle more homes unless we want to experience overburdened emergency services, failing infrastructure and uncomfortably overcrowded schools," RBIA Vice President Kevin McDonough told the East County Times. "The people in leadership positions with the ability to help us are choosing to help the developers instead, and it's disheartening to watch our community being destroyed in the process."

RBIA President Kim Goodwin-Maigetter also made mention of the project being just one of three housing projects in the works in just a one-mile radius on the lower Back River Neck Peninsula, all by the same developer.

"We find it concerning to see one entity getting rubber-stamped approvals for grossly dense residential developments at the cost of the quality of life of the residents of this peninsula and at the cost of the damage to an environmentally fragile area," she said. "To say the entire community is concerned is an understatement."

Gilligan admitted that he is seeking the change for Canterbury Crossing ahead of a May 2017 deadline to have the project's infrastructure in place before needing new approvals. But it is merely a coincidence that the firm has two other projects in the area at the same time.

Another project currently under construction on Cape May Road also recently began construction to stay ahead of storm water management expiration dates and approval deadlines. But the company has owned the property and had the project approved for four years, he said.

And the single-home project known as Osprey Pointe on Turkey Point Road gained initial approval last year, but is still undergoing appeals litigation with the community members opposing it.

"A lot of community members feel like they're under siege just from my

company, but it's just kind of the timing that everything is coming together at the same point," Gilligan explained.

He also noted that building the new plan would result in 266 less vehicle trips to and from the site, meaning less traffic generated by it. And it will add 14 less

students to local schools than the plan for apartments.

The schools affected by the development would be Deep Creek Elementary and Middle schools and Chesapeake High School. Of those, only the elementary school is overcrowded.

Metropolitan District fees to increase July 1, pay for aging infrastructure

The Metropolitan District fees, charged to every property owner in Baltimore City and Baltimore County that receives public water and sewer service, will increase on Friday, July 1, at the start of fiscal year 2017, and again on July 1, 2017, with the start of fiscal year 2018.

The increases are an attempt to keep the Metropolitan District fund financially solvent as it pays for upgrades to water and sewer infrastructure around the district.

The sewer service charge will increase by about 12 percent to a rate of \$50.82 per 1,000 cubic feet of water consumption, eventually increasing by a total of nearly 21 percent to a rate of \$54.92 for FY 2018.

The Water Distribution charge, a flat rate based on meter size, will increase by similar percentages, going first to \$126.37 in FY 2017, then to \$136.48 in FY 2018.

Likewise, the Metered Water Usage charge will increase by the same percentages to \$18.74 per 1,000 cubic feet of water consumption on Friday and \$20.24 in FY 2018.

Baltimore County continues to undertake significant infrastructure improvements to its aging water and sewer system pursuant to a 2005 Consent Decree with the federal Environmental Protection Agency, which are meant to provide enhanced environmental benefits and reduce the risk of future pipeline breaks and sewage overflows.

"These ongoing improvements must be made to protect our citizens, now and for the next generation. As a responsible government, we must bite the bullet now and not kick the can down the road," said Baltimore County Executive Kevin Kamenetz when the fee increase was first announced back in March. He added that the law requires the Metropolitan District fund to be self-supporting, so the rates must periodically be adjusted.

"This will also satisfy the concerns of the Wall Street rating agencies that the current funding level is not sufficient," Kamenetz said.

"Water main breaks and sewage overflows continue to occur, even with the increased efforts of the past decade. Our goal is a reliable water distribution system along with a sewer collection system that has no overflows," then-Director of Public Works Ed Adams said in March. "As anyone who owns an older home can attest, pipes that are 60 and 70 years old are just a disaster waiting to happen."

Baltimore County maintains 3,160 miles of sewer lines and another 2,139 miles of water lines. Sixty percent of the county's water and sewer pipes are more than 50 years old - the average life span of a water and sewer pipe. More than half of the county's pipes were installed before 1970, with the greatest percentage installed in the 1950s.

The fees also pay for the county's contributions to the city-owned Patapsco and Back River Wastewater Treatment Plants, which has averaged \$31 million annually over the last decade. The latter plant is currently undergoing a \$450





Other major investments on the east side have included upgrades to the White Marsh pumping station and the aging force main leading from it, which had been the cause of major overflows before 2005. They were completely renovated in 2008 at a cost of \$30 million. The Stemmers Run Station and force main were renovated at the same time at a cost of \$39 million.

Baltimore County's projected sewershed expenditures under the EPA Consent Decree stand at nearly \$160 million, with the most expensive being the Essex sewershed at \$43,774,395.

As well, water infrastructure upgrades have included complete water main replacement for communities such as Oliver Beach in Middle River and the future completion of the new Fullerton Reservoir water treatment and storage facility.

stream channel erosion, leading to trees along the bank falling in during large storms. Those trees then flow downstream where, in many cases, they can break the BRRC's trash boom, as well as present hazards to boats in the tidal portion of the river.

"It feels good to be making this much of a difference" since it blocks boat access and causes other problems in the environment, Lansing said, referring to removing the large trash and driftwood from the river. "I'm sure at some point it will be disheartening [because it's so much], but for now it's really rewarding."

She added that right now for the crew, it is mostly about learning where to look for the trash, noting that the overpasses are a major place to find it.

And while Lansing is glad to be getting the large items out of the waterway, it is the smaller objects that can be most frustrating because they have to use nets to get lots of small pieces.

For Juandoo, it is especially important to get the plastics out of the river because it can be so detrimental to the ecosystem.

He pointed out that birds can mistake it for food and have sometimes been found with thousands of pieces of plastic in their stomachs.

During the first quarter of 2016 (January - March), the BRRC pulled 13,420 pounds of trash from Back River. But separate from that number are the totals from the aftermath of the Feb. 24 storm. That storm saw five inches of rain fall on the area which caused the trash boom to break and it took a month to fix. But they were still able to collect 97 tons of trash resulting from that storm alone.

While the second quarter totals were not yet in, Wynn expects them to nearly triple those of the first quarter at upwards of 40,000 pounds. That is because the months of April, May and June have included such activities as neighborhood cleanups in Middlesex on the Essex side and West Inverness on the Dundalk side, where they picked up 25,000 pounds and 11,000 pounds, respectively, before it could flow into Back River tributaries.

It will also include an estimated 10,000 - 12,000 pounds of trash they cleaned up after the June 7 wind storm. "And that's a low-end ballpark figure," Wynn commented.

Wynn also pointed out that discarded tires are a major problem for the river, especially on the Dundalk side. She said they typically find them near trucking and distribution centers, and they are always finding more in the river.

Additionally, Weaver stressed that the trash in Back River is not just a problem for the river, but for the entire Bay. As the river and tides flow, they carry the garbage and debris out to Hart-Miller Island, which has undergone extensive environmental remediation efforts for decades, as well as to places like Tolchester on the eastern shore.

"People have got to understand that, if they want to clean up the Bay, they've got to start in places like this," Weaver said, employing his well-known adage that he has been out on the Bay countless times, but has yet to ever see trash fall from the sky.

The BRRC is completely supported by donations and grants, but for Weaver, it is important for the organization's sponsors to see what their contributions are being used for. He noted that, although they

are based in Essex, the river belongs to both Essex and Dundalk, and they do a lot of work on the Dundalk side as well.

Their county-funded trash boom continues to haul in an average of 37,000 pounds of trash per month, capturing it before it can flow out to the Bay. But the boom, first installed in 2010, is aging and more often in need of repair after storms.

Baltimore County has only wanted to fund two replacement sections of boom per year, but this year the BRRC pleaded with them to fund four new sections, and they are hopeful that they will get them.

However, Baltimore Boating Center's Jim High has agreed to donate some sections of "Tough Boom," which is more rigid and durable, to help protect the boom from the large trees and logs that flow down the river with incredible force during storms.

Marks recommends downzoning at Joppa Road and I-95

- By Councilman David Marks (R-5) -During this year's Comprehensive Zoning Map Process (CZMP) vote, I will recommend downzoning more than 19 acres of land along Joppa Road

near Chapel Hill Elementary School to block future development.

The property is currently undeveloped, but zoned for single-family homes if ever sold. It is located between Peach Blossom Avenue and Interstate-95, near the Moores Orchard, Moores Meadows and Orchard Crossing neighborhoods. The land is mostly publicly owned.

The land will be zoned Neighborhood Commons, which prohibits any development whatsoever. Right now, a vote of the Baltimore County Council would allow for the public property to be sold for development. The downzoning effectively blocks this from occurring, since the land will be zoned as open space and have to be changed back in order for development to occur.

Kim Bankard, president of the Moores Orchard homeowners association, has praised the move. "Everyone I have talked to in the Moores Orchard community wants this land to remain undeveloped," Bankard said. "This will guarantee a wide, unbuilt area along Joppa Road near the entrance to three communities."



Travel can be fun and eco friendly

Many people go to great lengths to adhere to eco-friendly lifestyles at home. That devotion to the environment may or may not continue when those same people travel, but it is entirely possible for travelers to take their eco-conscious behaviors with them on the road.

- Rent a hybrid or eco-friendly vehicle. If you will be renting a car during your trip, book a hybrid vehicle or a small, fuel-efficient model to cut back on fuel consumption. Many vehicles are now equipped with "eco mode," a feature that typically forces the transmission to upshift sooner than it normally would in an effort to conserve fuel. Cars in eco mode may seem somewhat sluggish, but that sluggishness is actually the eco mode doing its job.
- Reuse towels at the hotel. Many hotels now ask guests to reuse towels in order to conserve water. Guests who want to make their hotel stays as

eco-friendly as possible should work with hotels and reuse their towels for as long as possible. If visiting a resort, try to use the same pool or beach towel for as long as possible as well.

- Patronize restaurants that offer locally grown foods. Another way to be eco-friendly when traveling is to eat your meals at restaurants that use only locally grown foods and ingredients. Eating local reduces the need to transport foods across long distances, cutting back on fuel costs as a result.
- Use mass transportation. When possible, use mass transportation rather than relying on taxis or car services. Take a bus or train from the airport to your hotel, and ride the subway or just walk when sightseeing. Many travelers insist that riding mass transportation when visiting a city provides a much more realistic experience of life in that city than traveling by cab or driving alone.

Prevent phone-related accidents

Because they enable people to make calls or send messages from just about anywhere, mobile phones can be great conveniences. But they also can be annoying when conversations, texting or perusing the Internet gets in the way of proper etiquette.

Talking loudly in public areas, texting when in the middle of a face-toface conversation or sharing personal details in public are not just bad manners, but such behaviors also can be unsafe. Poor mobile phone etiquette is cause for some concern, but there is great cause for concern for people who find themselves routinely distracted by their mobile phones while driving or operating equipment. Using a mobile phone when driving greatly increases a person's risk of getting into an accident. Distracted driving has become something of an epidemic, as the following figures, courtesy of Don't Text and Drive, illustrate.

- Texting or doing something on your phone can distract drivers for as long as five seconds. If you're traveling at 55 miles per hour, that is the equivalent of driving the length of a football field without looking at the road.
- Texting while driving makes you 23 times more likely than normal to be in a car crash.
- Among drivers between the ages of 18 and 20 involved in car accidents

in the United States, 13 percent admitted to texting or talking on their phones at the times of their crashes.

- The National Safety Council reports that cell phone use while driving leads to around 1.6 million crashes each year, with nearly 330,000 injuries occurring from such accidents.
- Cell phone usage while driving can delay a driver's reaction time as much as having a blood alcohol concentration at the legal limit.

Although the majority of drivers support a ban on texting while driving, many still continue to do it. The single best way to prevent driving accidents and fatalities related to mobile phone usage is to put the phone down. Consider the following suggestions to help you avoid looking at your phone while behind the wheel.

- Keep your phone in a purse or in a bag in the back seat so that it is not readily accessible while driving. Many cars now have Bluetooth-enabled handsfree dialing and calling. So you do not need to have the phone nearby to answer a call.
- Leave your phone at home on short trips and give yourself a break from screen time.
- Turn off notifications.

Remember, any texts can wait until you pull over, park or arrive at your destination.

Let there be light

With the exception of certain luxury and sports car manufacturers, many of today's automakers equip their vehicles with standard halogen headlights. • Allow the paint time to dry. Drying times vary depending on the temperature. Paints may take longer to dry when temperatures are below 70°F



than they will when the weather is warmer. Once the application process is complete, do not wax the vehicle for 30 days.



Response to McDonough on HOME Act

When I read the letter in the *Times* on June 16 by Delegate Pat McDonough, my heart sank. Through inflammatory language and not-so-vague innuendos, he criticizes the proposed legislation that would help further the ministry to the homeless that Camp Chapel Church has been pursuing for more than a decade. In addition to feeding residents sheltered at the Eastern Regional Resource Center, our long term goal now is to help the homeless settle into permanent housing. To this end, we now provide used furniture to individuals and families who have, in fact, been able to find homes of their own

The one obstacle that many of the homeless cannot overcome is the landlord practice of refusing to accept Housing Choice Vouchers from the Baltimore County Housing Office. The vouchers often expire and the families have to start all over again, trapped in a system that does not serve anyone well. We should do what we can to lift all families up by ensuring that they have stable living conditions in thriving communities across Baltimore County.

The Housing Opportunities Made Equal Act (HOME Act) would be a move in the right direction. The bill would prevent landlords from discriminating against tenant applicants based on the source of their income, meaning that housing vouchers would be treated like any other legal income.

To be clear, the HOME Act does not authorize any new spending to Baltimore County's Housing Choice Voucher program. It also does not prevent landlords from screening tenants based on other criteria, such as their ability to pay rent or criminal records.

But, in treating voucher holders equitably, the HOME Act will allow people to live in the community of their choice. Historically, program participants have been limited by where landlords are willing to accept vouchers, effectively concentrating them in certain communities or leaving no alternative but shelters.

I know that some people have had bad experiences with voucher tenants. I also know that problems occur with tenants that have nothing to do with their source of income. The overwhelming majority of voucher holders are decent folks, just like you and me. A large percentage of them in Baltimore County are seniors, people with disabilities, veterans or low-wage workers.

People with housing vouchers just want to live in a safe and stable home in a nice neighborhood. They want the opportunity for their children to escape life in shelters, on the streets or in the woods. They just need financial assistance. We should welcome them into our communities.

Officers to begin wearing body cameras

Back in September of 2015, County Executive Kevin Kamenetz and Baltimore County Police Chief Jim Johnson announced a program that would equip 1,435 officers with body cameras. The first 150 cameras are scheduled for deployment over the next few weeks. The cameras will be distributed evenly throughout the county's precincts to officers in a variety of assignments.

Both Kamenetz and Johnson stressed that the use of body cameras will improve public safety, enhance transparency and accountability, reduce complaints against officers and make prosecutions more efficient.

The remainder of the body cameras will be deployed in July of 2017.

Body camera video is a public record, subject to release under the Maryland Public Information Act (MPIA) and other relevant laws. Baltimore County police will honor any requests for body camera footage unless an ongoing investigation merits retention of the film.

In cases where there is a significant public interest or a public safety need, body camera footage may be posted to the department's news blog and social media platforms. Footage will be redacted in accordance with the MPIA. Legally mandated redactions include the identity of juvenile suspects, personal identifiers such as license plate numbers and medical information.

The cameras will be mounted to an officer's uniform and will capture anyone who interacts with an officer. These cameras are equipped with audio, as well. The retention period for a body camera video depends on the type of incident.

While body camera footage will be an important tool for officers, as well as the State's Attorney, there are limitations. The camera does not necessarily reveal what the officer perceived or what was in his mind. It doesn't follow the officer's eyes so it can't see everything the officer sees. The camera cannot record sensory cues, such as physical resistance or tension, only visual cues. In low light, the camera may see more clearly than a human being. And finally, cameras record two-dimensionally. This means viewers may not be able to judge distances from

14-year-old drowns in Essex community pool

A 14-year-old boy from Essex has died after being found unresponsive in the deep end of a pool.

Police responded to the Harbor Point Estates Community Pool in the unit block of Nerbay Road in Essex just before 9:30 p.m. on June 20. When they arrived on the scene, they found an unresponsive boy next to the pool. He was transported to Franklin Square Hospital and then transferred to Johns Hopkins Hospital where he died Tuesday morning.

The boy has been identified as 14-year-old Meshach Praise Massally of the 1100-block of Middle-

The investigation into this indicated that Massally and other juveniles had entered the pool area after hours. Some people got into the pool while others threw pool furniture in. Massally, who could not swim, had been in the shallow end of the pool. He was later found in the deep end of the pool and pulled from the water.

This incident is under investigation by the Baltimore County Police Homicide Unit. The Homicide Unit investigates all sudden deaths of juveniles.





Times writer Teddy Durgin releases first novel

Recently, *East County Times* writer Teddy Durgin, who many recognize for his film reviews, released his first novel. Titled "The Totally Gnarly, Way Bogus Murder of Muffy McGregor," this murder mystery is a fast-paced, action and humor packed tale that will keep you glued to the pages.

Set in Laurel in the summer of 1986, the story follows 16-year-olds Sam Eckert and his friends Chip and Buddy (think the geek crew from the seminal show "Freaks and Geeks"). With summer work at the mall beginning, it looks like all will be relatively dull until the school year began - until a car explosion kills Muffy McGregor, one of the more popular, attractive girls in their school.

From there Sam and Chip get roped into the world of private investigation with the help of a mall regular, Mr. Rabinowitz. Suspects pop up one after the other, with McGregor's classmates, co-workers and lovers all under the watchful eyes of Sam and his crew.

Those who have consistently read Durgin's reviews over the last few years won't be surprised that the book is filled with pop culture references that capture the time period perfectly. Whether it be discussing the films that made 1986 stand out or paying tribute to cultural touchstones such as the

M*A*S*H finale, Durgin perfectly captures what it was like to grow up in that era.

"The thing about throwing references in is that you try to make them true to the character, and you don't want to overdo it," said Durgin.

Of course, given Durgin's love of film, it should come as no surprise that this book often has a very cinematic feel to it.

"The premise of the book started with a simple question - what if John Hughes had written a murder mystery? It kind of went from there," said Durgin. "That's what was part of the fun of writing it."

In typical John Hughes fashion, the book features many of your high school archetypes - jocks, nerds, pom-pom shaking cheerleaders. It also features some of the truest dialogue between teenage boys that I've read in quite some time. Seeing as how the boys are 16, it should come as no surprise that the book is littered with swears and moments of characters speaking before they've thought about what they're going to say. A particularly awkward exchange early on between Sam and his new boss, a former plus-sized model named Collette, ends with Sam asking if she has any copies of her old magazines lying around.


"Some of those conversations are

actual conversations from my youth," Durgin said. "Before I really started writing the book, I had a lot of funny lines and interchanges between characters so I knew where to put lines."

But the best dialogue comes when Rabinowitz is in the picture. An elderly Jewish man who often wonders aloud why he didn't choose another field of business over private investigating, Rabinowitz is often trying to keep Sam and Chip in line during the investigation. After all, you can't be making noise gushing about *Magnum P.I.* while you're breaking and entering looking for clues.


For Durgin, writing this book was something that has been on his mind for a while, with the characters bouncing around in his head for ages.

Last year, he took about three or four months to plot out what the story would be, figuring out what should happen in each chapter. Around September, he decided that he was going to start really writing and dedicated himself to a chapter per week for the next 16 weeks. The book was finished around President's Day this year.



"It was the most fun I ever had writing," said Durgin. "I love doing the film reviews for the *Times* and for other papers, but this was something I just had to do. I had started and stopped novels before, so it felt really good to get this done."

For Durgin, setting the story in the summer of 1986 felt natural. Much like Sam Eckert, Durgin was born in 1970, and 15-going-on-16 in the summer of '86. The nostalgia for this time period drips from the pages, but it never comes off as forced or insincere. The dialogue, references and struggles seem very true to the time.

"This book will appeal to anyone who has a twinge of 80s nostalgia, anyone who has lived in Maryland and anyone who enjoys a good whodunnit," said Durgin.

"The Totally Gnarly, Way Bogus Murder of Muffy McGregor" is available now on Amazon and for Kindle, and it couldn't have been released at a better time.

This book is the perfect companion for travel, beach days, lounging by the pool and more. It's a quick, easy read, but one that will keep you interested and engaged. When I first picked up the book I had a plan to read half of it on a Saturday, half on Sunday. Instead I finished it in one go.

The payoff is absolutely wonderful, and one that I did not expect as I made my way through the book. This might be Durgin's first mystery novel, but it reads as if he's been crafting these types of tales his entire life.

With elements of John Hughes, Thomas Pynchon and the Coen Brothers (Durgin compared a particularly poignant scene to the highly underrated "Burn After Reading"), this story is a wonderful blend of mystery and humor that really brings suburban Maryland in the 1980s to life.

"If the *East County Times* readers have enjoyed reading me in the past, I think they'll really enjoy this book," said Durgin.

'THE SHALLOWS' reaches some scary depths

Now, of course, "Jaws" is THE shark film for all time. It will never be topped. Even if somehow it IS topped, it won't be. That discussion is closed. No other opinions will ever be allowed on the matter. That's because it was more than just a shark thriller. Take the shark out of the movie and you still want to see a film set in that little beachside town with those people and their foibles. "Jaws" had interesting character dynamics; quirky, personality-driven comedy; even some savvy political drama. Throw in a Great White eating people around the Fourth of July weekend and you had an instant classic that is now also a spot-on period piece of mid-1970s kitsch.

It'll never be topped.

That said, "The Shallows" has one thing going for it that "Jaws" will never have. Blake Lively in tight, tiny bikini bottoms for nearly 90 minutes!

Hey, you know that's an upgrade. You know it!

Sure, Roy Scheider was lean and fit and looked good for the ladies in khaki. But Robert Shaw and Richard Dreyfuss circa 1975? Come on! They were practically human-Sasquatch hybrids with their giant sideburns, unkempt beards and body hair seemingly escaping from every open and semi-open button in their shirts. They were like the middle transformation from human to werewolf in those old Universal horror movies. Oh, they looked like real dudes, out there doing battle with Bruce the Shark. But Blake Lively in bikini bottoms trying to ward off a CGI Great White?! No comparison.

Lively plays Nancy, a young female surfer who becomes stranded on a rock 200 yards off a highly remote Mexican beach after she is bitten by a shark in the water. The razor-toothed sea predator, who is convincingly rendered in CGI, then circles her menacingly as she contemplates a desperate swim for the shore.

As the film goes on, the story actually reminded me less of "Jaws" and more of "127 Hours," where James Franco found himself trapped between a literal rock and a hard place and had to saw his own hand off to escape. "Cast Away" also came to mind, as it's pretty much Lively and Lively alone for long stretches of screen time with only her physical pain to keep her mind from obsessing too much on the nearby shark who just waits and waits. What many audience members will remember most about this flick is the sequence where Nancy, luckily a medical school dropout, uses jewelry to perform some gnarly emergency surgery on her dangling flap of nasty thigh meat that was nearly torn away by the shark earlier.

"The Shallows" clocks in at just under 90 minutes and is a lean, mean thrill machine. Give it a chance... but only if you've already made your trip to the beach or shore for the current season.

'INDEPENDENCE DAY' sequel: Where there's not a Will, there's no way!

Structurally, "Independence Day: Resurgence" is a mess. There are way too many characters, about three or four subplots too many and the new cast members are about as bland as a liquid diet. This sequel also runs nearly a half-hour shorter than the original. And, yet, it somehow feels... longer.

Now, let me state something right up front. I love, love, LOVE 1996's "Indepdendence Day." It's an insanely watchable, flat-out great popcorn flick that remains one of the quintessential '90s cinematic experiences! You can say that it's full of two-dimensional characters; cheesy dialogue; and has a goofy, world-saving computer virus. But Will Smith, Jeff Goldblum, Randy Quaid and Bill Pullman all brought their distinct personalities to their starring roles. It also had a great three-act structure. And it delivered on each of the big moments, from the incredibly foreboding arrival of the aliens to the pulse-pounding attack on L.A., New York and D.C. to the two-pronged, action-packed climax.

I was stoked to see this sequel. And while the disappointment isn't crushing... it doesn't feel good. The major failures of "Resurgence" are threefold. One, there is not a single moment that is anywhere near as rousing as The Speech. Two, there's no Will Smith. He reportedly asked for \$50 million to star in this. They should have paid him. He is missed like you wouldn't believe. Jessie Usher essentially replaces him, playing the grown-up version of stepson Dylan. But he is rightfully ninth-billed in this flick. When Liam Hemsworth has more charisma than you, and the two of you are in almost every scene together... yikes! That said, at least Dylan wasn't played by Jaden Smith.

And, three? The film never comes up with its own signature image or action sequence. Yeah, the aliens essentially scoop up China and drop it on England at one point. But there is little to no build-up, the CGI looks about 10 years dated and you get precious few on-the-ground shots of people in terror. It's a very clean apocalypse. Last week's Brexit vote was far scarier than anything in this film.

Goldblum's David Levinson has a whole menagerie of goofy, one-note characters trailing him for much of the flick, including a boring British love interest, an African warlord and a nerdy U.S. government pencil-pusher. For the most part, Goldblum just looks annoyed at each of them. Pullman, meanwhile, does get a fine Han Solo moment late in the film. But what was up with him walking with a cane for much of the film and then... after a quick shave and a look in the mirror...





he walks just fine?!

Judd Hirsch is back as David's dad, Julius, and he tones down some of the broad "Oy vey!" Jewish caricature stuff he got away with 20 years ago. But his subplot is entirely unnecessary to the film. He ends up driving a school bus full of kids across the desert to Area 51. In doing so, he has no vital piece of information to bring to Earth's defense force, and no kid traveling with him has a special skill or connection to anyone of consequence.

The casting here really deep-sixes this flick. Director co-writer Roland Emmerich and producing partner Dean Devlin really should have taken a page from the J.J. Abrams playbook, too. Abrams and Disney DID back the Brinks truck up to Harrison Ford's driveway and got Han Solo in "Episode VII." They also cast the three new, young leads who do all of the youthful heavy lifting extremely well. John Boyega, Daisy Ridley and Oscar Issac have 10 times the charm and on-screen charisma that Jessie Usher, Maika Monroe and the lesser Hemsworth exhibit in this film.

In the end, even if it makes decent coin, "Independence Day: Resurgence" will likely be relegated to the heap of other sequels that got part of their main cast back from the first and then failed to reignite the magic. Flicks like "Jaws 2" and "The Fly II." Each of those films had keeper moments. But neither came close to equaling their originals. So it is with this film.

Oh, and the dog in "Resurgence" isn't nearly as awesome as Boomer!

"Independence Day: Resurgence" is rated PG-13 for sci-fi action and destruction and some language.






