

Largest American flag in Essex flies high during Pause for the Pledge on Flag Day



The Pause for the Pledge drew out dozens of local residents to pay their respects to America's flag. Started in Baltimore in 1980, the Pause for the Pledge consistently drew in thousands over the years to Fort McHenry. This year the event did not take place at Fort McHenry.

Delegate Ric Metzgar hosted the Pause for the Pledge last Thursday on Flag Day at Trinity Temple Church in Essex.

The Pause for the Pledge, which encourages Americans across the nation to stop what they are doing and recite the Pledge at 7 p.m., was started on Flag Day in 1980. The late Al Clasing, Jr. brought the event to Trinity Temple Church some years later. Metzgar stated that he would like the tradition to carry on in honor of Clasing, a World War II Navy veteran who worked tirelessly for veterans as well as the preservation of the Back River Neck Peninsula community. Clasing died of kidney failure on Dec. 16 at the age of 90.

This year's Pause for the Pledge featured a very special treat - the Retiring of the Colors. The flag that flew above Trinity Temple Church was battered and weather beaten, and so it was time to unveil a

The new flag is a monstrous $30' \times 36'$, making it the largest flag in Essex and the same size as the flag that flew over Fort McHenry which inspired Francis Scott Key to write the Star Spangled banner. The new flag was purchased from donations from the community and is six feet wider than the one that previously flew in its place.

"Thank you to those people who donated towards the purchase of the flag," said Metzgar to a crowd of a few dozen. "Thank you to Street Lighters for hoisting this flag."

While the celebration overall was joyful, the evening began with a solemn moment of silence for those who were killed and injured in the Orlando terrorist attack.

From there the captain of the Essex-Holly Neck Memorial VFW All Services Honor Guard and the captain of the Chesapeake High School Junior R.O.T.C. Honor guard marched their troops into position while Pastor James Lane of Trinity Temple led the invocation.

The invocation was followed by a stirring rendition of the Star Spangled Banner by Joe DiCara, which was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

From there, Metzgar gave a history overview of the American flag, starting with the Continental Congress passing a resolution establishing a flag for the new nation on June 14, 1777, thus beginning Flag Day.

Metzgar guided the crowd through the history of the creation of the flag by New Jersey Congressman Francis Hopkinson and Philadelphia seamstress Betsy Ross, as well as the number of changes made between 1777 and 1960. Metzgar detailed the changing of the arrangement of stars

and stripes, as well as what the stars and stripes symbolize. The red stripe symbolizes valor, while white represents purity. The blue background behind the stars is representative of justice.

Metzgar also detailed the history of the Pledge, from its writing in 1892 to additions made in 1923 and 1954, creating the 31 words we know today.

After the history was given, the members of the Essex-Holly Neck VFW and the Chesapeake Junior R.O.T.C. stretched the flag out and prepared it to be cut and placed on a fire.

There are many ways in which the flag can be retired. Nowadays, however, it's customary to cut the stars out of the canton, followed by cutting the individual stripes apart. The stripes are then placed on top of the fire with care. After the material from the stripes burns completely, the stars can be placed on the fire until that material burns away completely.

During all of this, the flag is not to come in contact with the ground. There was a moment when it looked like that might occur during the ceremony, but a call for veterans to help support the Retiring of Colors prompted three local veterans to grab a hold of the flag and keep it from hitting the grass.

Residential density again a big issue for CZMP in Council District 6

As with the hearings before the Baltimore County Planning Board earlier this year, the public input on the requested zoning changes before the County Council reflected a strong opposition to higherdensity residential development.

The hearing, held on Tuesday, June 14, was the last opportunity for public input as part of the quadrennial Comprehensive Zoning Map Process in the Sixth Councilmanic District before the County Council votes on the zoning changes on Aug. 30.

Peter Terry, a resident along the Bird River and member of the Bird River Restoration Campaign, said that Adequate

Public Facilities laws are not being properly enforced with respect to development, and open space needs to be preserved for family recreation.

Adequate Public Facilities requires that things like schools, water/sewer and traffic infrastructure be able to handle new development before it can be built.

"With the whirlwind of backlogged development coming now, we need to take a step backwards and hold the line on more density until the infrastructure can catch up," Terry said.

Sandra Magsamen, speaking for the Bird River Road Neighborhood Association, echoed that sentiment, as did BowermanLoreley Beach Community Association President Courtney Gruber.

Gruber, addressing two particular zoning requests which have the potential to bring a total of more than 200 new townhomes within close proximity to her community in White Marsh, expressed heavy concerns of more traffic and a lack of open space if increased housing density is granted.

Essex-Middle River Civic Council President Bob Bendler added that his organization believes that the existing housing stock in the Sixth District, plus what is under construction and in the pipeline, is more than adequate and additional residential density is not necessary at this time.

The EMRCC feels that the county's priorities in rezoning should be for environmental protection, adequate public facilities and the potential for job creation, he said.

The civic council has unanimously voted to oppose 12 specific zoning issues, mostly on concerns of too much residential density.

"Secondly, we are trying to protect RC [Resource Conservation zoning], and we do not believe that properties zoned RC should be upzoned," Bendler stated.

EMRCC Vice President Tom Germroth noted that the number of residential units in the pipeline or already under construction stands at more than 3,000.

"The communities are interested in protecting the rural zoning of the area and providing a balance in the type of residency," Germroth explained. "There are currently more than enough townhomes and apartments in the area.

The EMRCC, which does not typically endorse zoning change requests, took the unusual step of doing so for two issues -6-013 and 6-014, having to do with the site of the proposed Paragon Outlets in White Marsh and the adjacent property - on the condition that the developments do not include any residential units.

"These two projects will result in sub-

stantial benefits well beyond what would have happened if the existing [planned unit development] that was approved several years ago came to fruition," Bendler

Also unusual at the hearing was the appearance by Planning Board member Scott Jenkins. Although he made it clear he was not there in his capacity on the Planning Board and was only speaking for himself, he drew on his experiences during the last round of CZMP public input hearings to say that there is a concern among county citizens that schools are vastly overcrowded. Yet developers, who are writing big campaign checks to Council members, are allowed to keep building more homes.

While it is happening all around the county, he said, "That is no more evident than in [District 6]."

Jenkins made light of the fact that some Council members, such as David Marks in District 5, are downzoning property in an effort to protect schools from overcrowding. Meanwhile, other Council members are in favor of upzoning.

"It feels like the councilpeople are picking and choosing the winners," he said, since some property values are getting increased while others are crushed.

Jenkins attended the meeting to express his opposition to issues 6-015, 6-020, 6-021 and 6-025, each of which is in White Marsh and would see a stark increase in residential density over the current zoning.

He explained that homes being built in the Sixth District, in areas like White Marsh which feeds to Perry Hall schools, will continue to overcrowd schools in the Fifth District where he lives and his children attend school.

"We can fix this problem by building new schools, but we all know... there are limited resources," Jenkins stated. "We've got to stop picking the winners and losers and we've got to start governing the

Peninsula Expressway bridge re-opened to traffic

The Maryland State Highway Administration (SHA) re-opened the MD-157/Peninsula Expressway drawbridge over Bear Creek in Sparrows Point to street traffic on Friday, June 17, after the first phase of repairs had been completed on the bridge. The drawbridge will also resume normal operations for marine traffic.

The span had been closed for the last three weeks since May 27, when an inspection revealed that corrosion had made the bridge unsafe.

SHA conducted underwater inspections in late May and identified areas of deterioration on the piers supporting the MD-157 bridge, prompting them to close it to motor vehicle traffic until emergency repairs were complete, according to a release from SHA.

The agency completed the first phase of work on the bridge on Thursday, June 16, and crews performed routine maintenance work on the draw span that night prior to re-opening the bridge.

As previously reported in the East County Times, the

repairs were initially expected to last well into the summer months, but was able to be completed much more quickly, according to SHA spokesman Charlie Gischlar.

"What helped us was the 24-hour operation with the contractor," Gischlar noted.

While he stressed that the repairs are not yet fully complete, SHA was able to safely open the bridge to traffic and have it maneuver for marine traffic.

SHA contractors will return to the bridge in early August to complete the second phase of repairs, Gischlar said, "but all those [corroded] pilings are fixed."

The submerged pilings that support the bridge had become corroded over time. But the new pilings have been encased in concrete with the hope that it will extend their lifetime. And the second-phase work in August will include more concrete wrapping of the pilings, Gischlar explained.

"So that way it has a hard time happening again like that," he said. "They are encased in concrete now, but they'll be doing some more work to ensure that this thing doesn't happen again, or it's slower."

During repair work in late summer and early fall, there will be temporary lane closures on the bridge, Monday through Friday, between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m., except on the Independence Day and Labor Day holidays. There will be one lane open in each direction at all times. Weather permitting, the repairs will be complete by fall 2016.

The bridge was constructed in 1950 and has an average of 1,400 draw span openings each year. Underwater inspections are performed on the bridge every four years and above water inspections take place every two years.

Frustrated communities discuss what to do about Back River midges - By Devin Crum -

Since summer is now settling in, the main topic of conversation at the Wednesday, June 15, meeting of the Millers Island-Edgemere Business Association was the annual return of midges to the communities around Back River.

Residents and business owners around the river say the swarms of the mosquito-like insects make it difficult to enjoy the river and its waterfront at a time when they should be doing it most. They even say the bugs have caused a detrimental loss of customers to businesses and other economic activity in the area.

Although a bill to get funding to address the problem failed to pass the General Assembly session in Annapolis this year, the communities are not giving up and have turned to state agencies for help.

Joe Bartenfelder, secretary of the Maryland Department of Agriculture, was scheduled to attend the meeting, but could not make it. So he called in instead to reassure the community that he and Governor Larry Hogan are committed to solving the problem. He noted that he and Hogan have been working on drawing up a funding resolution to get some money for midge treatments, and they may be able to get moving on it in earnest at the end of this fiscal year, June 30.

"We know what a bad problem it is, how [negatively] it affects southeastern Baltimore County, and we want to make sure it gets resolved," Bartenfelder said.

While he was under the impression that the state's Department of Natural Resources would have to take the lead on the issue, he said since MDA has a mosquito spraying program, they may be able to do something with that as well.

Midges are non-biting flies which resemble mosquitoes and are present in excessively large numbers in and around Back River. Adult midges can lay up to 1,000 eggs per day, and their life cycle lasts about two weeks.

The problem is especially bad in Back River because the Back River Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) has contributed to higher-than-natural nutrient levels in the river's sediments over the century that it has been in operation. And studies by the county's Department of Environmental Protection and Sustainability have determined that natural predation on the larvae by fish and other organisms would not be enough to take care of the problem.

A solution is available, though, in the form of a substance known as BTI, a bacteria that infects the larvae and kills them. However, BTI is prohibitively expensive and in short supply because Disney World purchases most of what is produced.

The Back River Restoration Committee funded testing of BTI in Back River last summer to determine its effectiveness in different areas of the river and under different conditions.

'The stuff that we used did work," said Sam Weaver, owner of Weaver's Marine Service, Inc., on Back River and president of the Back River Restoration Committee. "And they have since come up with a better larvicide for less money."

But the cost is still prohibitive - nearly \$500 for a 50-pound bag. It takes 28 pounds to treat each acre of water, and there are about 720 acres just in the headwaters of Back River. So the cost per treatment, which would need to be done several times per summer, would be more than \$200,000.

"The bottom line is, if it was Middle River or if it was... the Inner Harbor they'd be fixing it immediately," Weaver lamented. But because it is Back River and people have not organized on the issue, the problem is not being addressed by state or county government,

Weaver warned, though, that the problem is beginning to spread to other waterways like Middle River and beyond.

"If the county and the state don't get together and

do something, they're going to be all over the place," he asserted. At that point, the problem would be much more expensive to fix.

Weaver acknowledged that with the WWTP's \$2 billion renovation currently underway, the plant upgrades will eventually address the nutrient levels that they discharge to the river. But he opined that they will not begin to actually fix the problem for at least a decade.

In the meantime, Delegate Robin Grammer, who also attended the meeting, is working to put some of the responsibility for funding the midge treatments on the WWTP and Baltimore City which owns the plant.

According to some attendees at the MIEBA meeting, the plant allegedly agreed to set aside funds as part of the renovation process to address the problems it has

caused in the river. But residents were at a loss for where that money has gone. And a spokesperson for the plant had not been able to determine by press time if that agreement had actually been made.

Grammer plans to submit bills during the next legislative session in Annapolis to try to get funding or another solution in place, and he was hopeful that they will be able to get some funding in the short term.

When asked if the county could sue Baltimore City for the money, Grammer responded, "It may come to that" if the bills do not pass and they do not get the needed funding.

"Baltimore County can cough up money every year, but it is a City problem and they need to own up to their part of the deal," he stressed.

MTA unveils Express BusLink as part of Gov. Hogan's transit improvement plan

On Monday morning at the White Marsh Park and Ride, Maryland Transit Administration (MTA) officials unveiled the Express BusLink, billed as an easy-to-use transit system that will better connect people to jobs and improve suburb connectivity.

Three new Express BusLink routes were introduced on Monday that provide efficient travel from Baltimore/Washington International Airport MARC Train station to Old Court Metro Subway Station; from Owings Mills to Towson; and from Towson to White Marsh.

"These routes are just like our other Express routes in place," said Deputy Transportation Secretary James F. Ports, Jr. "So it's \$2.10 one way. So that's no increase, it's the same as our other routes."

The new Express BusLink No. 102 connects Towson to White Marsh, with stops along the way, heading east-bound, at the Baltimore County Circuit Court, Towson Town Center, North Plaza Mall and more. Westbound includes two new Joppa Road stops

at Pershing Road and Goucher Boulevard, as well as a stop at Osler Drive near the Towson University Enrollment Services building. The No. 102 will operate from 6 a.m. - 8 p.m. everyday except Sunday.

"Governor Hogan and Transportation Secretary Pete Rahn are committed to building a strong transportation network," he continued. "This is a down payment on the transformative transit plan that will deliver a truly interconnected system when BaltimoreLink is fully in place next summer."

Before the changes, it took two hours and two buses for someone to travel from White Marsh to Towson. Now, somebody can take one bus the whole way with the trip lasting about an hour.

"Before you would have to catch a bus [in White Marsh], take it all the way into the city, transfer and come back," said Ports. "These improvements cut the time in half."

The changes are part of the second phase of Governor Larry Hogan's \$135 million BaltimoreLink plan, which he unveiled last fall after canceling funding for the Red Line light rail system.

Next year, officials plan to launch the third and final phase of the plan: 12 new color-coded CityLink highfrequency routes.

As part of this plan, MTA also extended the existing route 150, which connects to Columbia to downtown Baltimore, to Harbor East. Also starting Monday, MTA began providing additional peak-period trips on the local bus No. 77 line between Old Court Metro station and BWI.

When asked if this should be considered a replacement for the Red Line, Ports stated that it wasn't, that it was something completely independent of the Red Line. He also stated that it actually mirrors the Purple Line, except with buses instead of trains.

Still, the goals of the ExpressLink and the Red Line are similar - reducing downtown traffic while providing quick and efficient transportation between the city and county.

"Baltimore has desperately needed a comprehensive, regional transit plan that helps alleviate downtown congestion by opening up the transit grid and that connects people to emerging job centers," said MTA Administrator and CEO Paul Comfort. "That is why updating our regional transit system with Express BusLink service is key. Express BusLink will link people to

where they need to go."

Comfort stated that the routes currently used are outdated, while Ports described them by saying it was "as if someone dumped a bowl of spaghetti on a map." These improvements, according to Comfort, will improve travel for the 180,000 customers who ride every day.

Over the next six months, MTA officials will be watching the BusLink service closely to see what improvements need to be made.

"This is the brand-new MTA. We're not doing things the old way. We've done a really deep analysis of what our current passengers and new folks want that would want to ride our service, and we've redesigned our service to meet their needs," said Comfort.

Kevin Quinn, MTA director of planning and programming, said comments from more than 1,500 residents have played a role in the development of Hogan's plan. Residents will have more opportunities to provide feedback when MTA conducts 20 public workshops in July, August and September.

The Boulevard Rule - by Parker, Pallett, Slezak & Russell, LLC -

The Boulevard Rule is an ancient, static principle which goes back to the time when horse-drawn carriages romped through the cobblestone thoroughfares of London. If a rider, whether on horseback or commanding a stately carriage, attempted to enter the more traveled and wider road, he entered at his peril.

The modern rule (as defined by English Professor Black) states: "the driver of a vehicle approaching a highway from a smaller road must stop and yield the right of way to all highway (boulevard) traffic." So if Miss Brown is leaving the parking lot of Middlesex Shopping Center, she must adhere to Black's principle. If the front end bumper of the boulevard traveling vehicle crashes into Brown's driver door, there is clear-cut liability: Brown is at fault, and she and her carrier will have to make whole the occupants of the striking vehicle, despite the fact that Brown was stricken and the other vehicle was the "striker." Now, "making whole" means repair of the striker's car and payment of all medical expenses, including usually an award for the pain, suffering and inconvenience.

Modern law, particularly in Maryland, has made modifications to the Boulevard Rule. The Maryland Appellate Courts have created some minor exceptions to the rule. For instance, if it is determined that the main contributing factor to the accident was the







There have been so many summers that have started off with a bang with a big Marvel movie or disaster flick, then almost immediately sputtered with middling to OK flicks, and then became absolutely rejuvenated with a new Pixar movie. So it is this year with the splendid sequel, "Finding Dory." determine the fate of her loved ones. And therein lies the core of why this film is so good and why so many of Pixar films are so good and resonant. It's ultimately about caring. It's about helping one another. And it's about overcoming a big challenge in order get on with the next important part of your life.

To be perfectly honest, I think the first third of the film is a bit slow and even weak. Dory was not conceived as a lead character of a major movie. And the transition here from supporting to featured takes a bit getting used to, especially with her frustratingly unreliable memory. But the more the film opens up and continues to add new and colorful characters, the better it becomes until you get a double climax - one emotional, one action-packed - that is just a thing of beauty. Among the newcomers, I most liked the T-1000-like ocotpus, Hank (Ed O'Neill), who is your classic selfish character who you just know will become selfless. He has basically the same visual trick as Steve Buscemi's lizard Boggs



in the "Monsters Inc." movies. But O'Neill makes him extremely likable. And he doesn't really sound at all like Al Bundy or his "Modern Family" patriarch. It's a really terrific vocal performance.

And if you are also a fan of HBO's late, great "The Wire," the two funniest characters in "Dory" are a couple of sea lions voiced by Dominic West and Idris Elba. Yup! Freakin' McNulty and Stringer Bell!

The rest of the film I will leave to your surprise and delight. And there are several surprises and many delights. This is how you do a sequel!

"Finding Dory" is rated PG for mild thematic elements (mostly having to do with separation from parents and family).



As for Hart, I've never seen a flick of his that was anywhere near as funny as his stand-up concerts. Maybe it's his diminutive size, maybe it's his yappy-dog line deliveries. But he just hasn't had "The Great One" yet. I've liked him in more movies than most critics have, giving positive reviews to everything from "The Wedding Ringer" to "Get Hard." An opening sequence in '96 finds him inexplicably showering (a mix of CGI trickery and portly body double) while the rest of the school is at an assembly in the gym. Four bullies seize him and toss him out into the middle of the gathering, and

the entire student body points and laughs... except for Calvin who offers him his letterman jacket.





MVA to begin registering autocycles

Effective July 1, Motor Vehicle Administration, (MVA) will begin titling and registering certain 3-wheel motorcycles known as Autocycles. These unique vehicles are constructed using both automotive and motorcycle equipment, but with the majority of the equipment being based upon automotive equipment technology. The Maryland State Police, Automotive Safety Enforcement Division has created a Standard Operation Procedure(SOP) for all Maryland Inspection Mechanics/Stations to follow in regards to the inspection of this class vehicle. This SOP can be located on the Maryland State Police website on the ASED page under downloads http://mdsp. maryland.gov/ASED/Pages/Downloads.aspx

These unique vehicles will be inspected at class "A" inspection stations by class "A" inspection mechanics. These vehicles require at least a class "C" (regular, motorcycle endorsement not required) driver's license and you are required to wear a DOT approved helmet, unless the vehicle has an enclosed passenger compartment. Seatbelts are required to be worn when operating these vehicles as well.

Man killed in industrial accident in Sparrows Point

A 19-year-old Dundalk man was killed on June 15 in an industrial accident at a Sparrows Point metals processing company. The victim is Colin Richard Kelley of the 7500 block of Old Battle Grove Road in Dundalk.

Maryland Occupational Safety and Health responded to the scene and will investigate the accident.

Welder dies after being hit by beam at White Marsh construction site

A welder at a White Marsh construction site died after he was struck by a metal beam Saturday afternoon, a Baltimore County Fire Department spokeswoman said.

It's all about jobs

- By Delegate Kathy Szeliga -We keep hearing on the news that the unemployment rate is dropping, yet we have family members, friends, and neighbors, who are still out of work. It doesn't really feel like the job market has gotten any better, so how is it that unemployment has dropped to 4.7 percent?

The problem is the unemployment numbers that get reported each month do not count those who have stopped looking for work or those who are underemployed. According to a recent survey by CNBC1, 43 percent (or nearly half) of those Americans who are unemployed have quit looking for work. And the longer someone has been out of a job, the more likely they are to have given up hope completely. Almost 60 percent of those who have been out of work for two years or more have stopped looking for a new job. As of the end of May, the number of people the Labor Department considers "not in the labor force" reached a record 94.7 million Americans.

There are many reasons for this. Some are basically out of our hands as our economy evolves. Technology, for example, has greatly improved our lives but has also made certain jobs obsolete. Some, however, are things we can absolutely fix, like government overregulation.

As I travel the state talking to Maryland voters, I have heard countless stories from small business owners about the problems they have encountered due to overregulation by the county, state and federal governments. All of the rules and regulations have made it cost-prohibitive for many of them to operate their business the way they have in the past. And, unfortunately, as the cost of doing business increases, often the only place to cut back is trimming the number of employees or not hiring anyone new.

In Maryland, we have seen some great progress under Governor Hogan. He has reduced state-based business regulations, cutting fees where he can, and has instituted new customer service standards for state workers. This is why it is important to have people with actual business experience like Governor Hogan in government instead of career politicians. They have seen what overregulation has done to American businesses, and they know what needs to be done to help rather than hurt. But Governor Hogan needs a common sense person with business experience to be his partner in Washington if we are going to be able to continue his progress.

That is not my opponent Congressman Chris Van Hollen. With the possible exception of an unknown

summer job or two – and I can't imagine the son of a diplomat would have needed a summer job - Van Hollen's only work experience outside of Congress was his time as a high-priced lawyer at a large law firm in Washington DC.

As a small business owner, I appreciate experience as a qualifying factor for some jobs in the real world. For example, I would never hire an electrician that had never rewired a house before. But so far, I haven't seen that experience is much of a qualifying factor when it comes to elected officials. For decades we have sent the same career politicians to Washington and they have continued to let us down. Since Congressman Van Hollen was first sworn into office in January 2003, the national debt has tripled. For decades we have been promised our immigration system would be fixed and our borders would be secured with nothing to show for it except upwards of 11 million illegal immigrants in our country. Congressman Van Hollen said one of the reasons he supported Obamacare was because we needed to address rising premium costs, yet once again we are expecting another rate hike in the fall. And we now have more than 94 million Americans who either looking for work or who have become so discouraged by the state of the job market that they have given up hope altogether.

Government does not create jobs; however the government can create a pro-growth environment that can help business owners create jobs. But that will not happen if we continue to send career politicians with no business experience to Washington. It's not that they aren't well-meaning people. It's that they understand government – not business. And the only way we can bring business sense to Washington is if we send someone with actual business experience

Agreement preserves land on Northwind Road

An agreement has been reached between myself and the Baltimore County Game & Fish Protective Association to preserve 10 acres of sensitive land along Northwind Road as Neighborhood Commons, or open

After discussions with the leadership of the BCG-FPA, that association will support placing the most sensitive land into the protective zoning. The 10 acres is located west of Jennifer Run and along Northwind Road in Parkville. Neighborhood Commons zoning prohibits any development whatsoever on the property

The BCGFPA was established in 1936 by Baltimore County sportsmen concerned about the conservation of wildlife and natural habitats. Today, the association property includes a trap range and rifle/pistol range, a fishing pond, and pavilions and other areas used by members and many local groups such as the Boy Scouts.

I would like to thank the Baltimore County Game & Fish Protective Association for its support of our rezoning initiative, which will help preserve the character of Northwind Road.

BCGFPA President Wayne Jacobs added, "The Baltimore County Game & Fish Protective Association will continue to be a good neighbor and steward of the environment."

Additionally, I announced on Wednesday, June 15, that an agreement has been reached to place Neighborhood Commons zoning, on the 29-acre Maryland State Fish and Game Protective Association off Honeygo Boulevard, a heavily-wooded site next to Joppa View Elementary School.

Presently, the land is zoned DR 1, or one house per

I would like to thank Association President David Van Sant for the support, and also acknowledge the wonderful work this organization does in advancing conservation and sportsmanship.

The Maryland State Fish and Game Protective Association traces its roots to 1895. The property is also protected as part of the Maryland Environmental Trust, so the downzoning adds another level of protection.

In 2012, Councilman Marks helped add 11 acres to the north of the property to Honeygo Park.

The zoning maps will be voted on by the Baltimore County Council on Aug. 30.




