Rockin' on the River a massive success in the face of inclement weather

With questions about the weather lurking over the weekend, the fifth installment of Rockin' on the River looked to be in jeopardy. Fortunately for the 2,700 that showed up to Conrad's Ruth Villa in Middle River, the storm managed to hold off until the final few minutes of the day.

"I knew we were going to be fine," said Don Crockett, co-chair of Rockin' on the River. "I knew we were going to be good because I sold two tickets to Jesus."

With Awaken, Kanye Twitty, The New

Romance and Strait Shooter taking the stage and DJs Jon Boesche and Big George handling the tunes in between, the day was filled with music that spanned multiple genres and eras.

Over the first four years Rockin' on the River raised more than \$80,000 that was put back into the community. This year Crockett expects more than \$20,000 to be raised for different community projects. So far the Rockin' on the River committee has pledged money to help the Back River Restoration Committee (BRRC) and the Heritage Society of Essex-Middle River Inc. and their museum. "We do this not just to have fun, but because a lot of good comes out of this," said Crockett. "None of the committee members keep a dime, it all goes back to the community."

Throughout the day festival-goers indulged in delicious pit sandwiches, played cornhole, got their faces painted and danced across the 15.5 acre plot of land at Conrad's that Crockett refers to as "a little slice of heaven."

And as always, feedback from the crowd was full of praise and kind words about the event.

District 5 CZMP hearing light on Perry Hall input

The Monday, June 6, District 5 zoning hearing before the Baltimore County Council featured residents filling the Council chambers in Towson to give input on proposed zoning changes.

But surprisingly few of those residents were from Perry Hall communities, which comprise most of the eastern half of the Fifth District.

Monday evening's hearing was held as part of the quadrennial Comprehensive Zoning Map Process (CZMP) and was the last opportunity for the public to give their input directly to the County Council before the council members make their final decisions in September.

Most of the evening's attendees were from Towson communities - comprising the western portions of the district - which was a stark change from the turnout for the district's hearing before the Baltimore County Planning Board on March 22 at Perry Hall High School. That hearing saw the school's auditorium packed to the teeth with residents from all over the district.

Councilman David Marks, who represents the district, noted after the hearing that neither average citizens nor large property owners had shown up to address the zoning issues. He guessed that they had made their comments at the Planning Board hearing and did not feel the need to reiterate them for the Council.

However, a few Perry Hall residents did attend to give their input, mostly concerning issues with traffic and schools.

Brenda Ward, a real estate agent living in the area, explained that people buying homes in Perry Hall are concerned about the overcrowding in the community's schools, despite their good reputation.

"It seems unbelievable that developers would market their projects based upon our Perry Hall schools, but then not support construction of additional - see **HEARING** on page 9 -

County stresses emergency preparedness as we enter hurricane season

Here in east Baltimore County, residents know just how devastating hurricanes can be. Even though Hurricane Isabel, downgraded to a tropical storm by the time it hit Maryland, landed over a decade ago, east siders can vividly remember the destruction and mayhem it wrought.

And while we haven't been hit by a storm of that magnitude since, it's essential to always be prepared.

"The best way to be prepared is to plan ahead and listen to the experts," said County Executive Kevin Kamenetz at an emergency preparedness

event last week.

And what are the experts saying?

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration predicts a near-normal hurricane season this year, with a 70 percent probability of 10 to 16 named storms, four to eight hurricanes (with winds in excess of 74 mph) and one to four major hurricanes (with winds in excess of 111 mph).

Kamenetz encouraged people to follow the County's emergency management updates on Twitter @BACOemergency and @BACOPoliceFire, as well as on the Baltimore County Government Facebook page and web site.

People can also register for email or phone alerts through Baltimore County's Emergency Notification System.

In the county's Emergency Operations Center, emergency planners conducted training exercises last week to ensure they'll be ready in the case of emergency.

"A lot of what we do in emergency management is relationship management, and so today we are making sure that we know the representatives

of each agency and make sure we have the decision makes here when we need them," said Baltimore County Emergency Operations Division Chief Paul Lurz.

Besides making sure they're ready from a governmental standpoint, Kamenetz and other government officials highlighted the importance of personal preparedness. They urged residents to make sure they have flood insurance, canned goods and other non-perishables, enough water to last three days, batteries, flashlights, candles and more. And when a storm does come, make sure your car has fuel, your phone batteries are charged and you have set plans with family to avoid getting hit by the brunt of the storm.

Elsewhere, Baltimore Gas & Electric is planning ahead, spending nearly \$8 million on distribution projects and technology for heat and storm related outages, and conducting drills of their own. When Isabel hit in 2003, over 70,000 were left without power for days.

"We aren't in Oklahoma, Kansas or Texas, but severe weather can and does happen here," said Kamenetz. "We take storm preparedness seriously here, and we ask our residents to plan ahead, too."

Victory Villa Elementary open house celebrates old building

- Article & photo by Patrick Taylor -After the school year ends, Victory Villa Elementary will be torn to the ground to make way for a new building, forcing the children and teachers to relocate to Golden Ring for the next two years.

Hundreds of former students, teachers and principals filled the halls on Friday evening as they took in one last look at the building many considered to be a second home. And it wasn't just those who remained local that attended - many traveled great distances for a final goodbye.

Those who traveled included Russ Jones, a former Victory Villa principal who held the position from 1994 - 1999 before moving on to Joppa View Elementary. Now retired and living in Florida, Jones made the long trek to reconnect with many of his old colleagues.

"This was probably the best four years of my career," said a wistful Jones. "We had a great faculty, and it was a great community. I have a lot of fond memories from this building. And even though it's sad to see the building go, it'll all be worth it when the new building is finished."

Victory Villa has served the Middle River community since 1942. When it was built, a new school was needed to accommodate all of the new families that had moved to the area to work at the Glenn L. Martin plant building planes for the World War II effort. Over the course of the evening, members of the Victory Villa community exchanged stories, laughs and tears as they roamed the once familiar halls. For the next two years the school will be moved to the Rosedale Center located at 8200 Old Philadelphia Road in Rosedale.

Officials to celebrate grand opening of Hart-Miller Island

Although it technically opened to the public back on May 7, officials and dignitaries will gather on Hart-Miller Island this Friday, June 10, for the long-awaited grand opening of its south cell.

One of the largest dredge material containment facilities in the state, HMI accepted more than 100 million cubic yards of dredge material from the Port of Baltimore between 1984 and 2009. The 290-acre south cell stopped accepting the material in 1990, while the much larger

north cell, at 750 acres, continued accepting it until Dec. 31, 2009.

Over the last 26 years, though, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the Maryland Port Administration, the Maryland Department of Natural Resources and the Maryland Environmental Service have implemented a plan to restore the south cell to a wildlife habitat and bird sanctuary consisting of uplands, mudflats, shallow wetlands and open water to create nesting and feeding habitat for several varieties

- continued from page 5 of shorebirds and waterfowl.

It has also become an essential stopover for migratory birds, and more than 290 species of birds have been sighted on or around the island.

But more than that, the ultimate goal for the island has always been to become a public-use state park facility. And that goal is now being realized.

The island already had restrooms, which were installed in 1988, and an office, shop and first aid station, all installed in 1991. It also has 17 total camp sites in two different areas, according to Bob Iman, supervising ranger for North Point State Park and HMI.

Now being added to those facilities are eight miles of hiking and biking trails, as well as bicycles and binoculars for lending to visitors. There will also be covered benches along the trails for resting.

Since all who visit the island must also leave, all guests will have to check in at a booth at the entrance, Iman said. There, staff will not only take their name

and whether or not they check out a bike, but also where they are from and what they would like to see on the island.

Iman encouraged people to get out and visit the island, use its facilities and see what it has to offer.


"A lot of things are based on usage," he said. "The more use we have, the more amenities we could probably get from the [MPA]."

Iman also stressed that seeing the island by boat is nothing like actually being on it.

"It's very impressive. It will take your breath away [with its size]," he commented.

The island and its south cell facility will be open May through September, from 11 a.m. - 4 p.m. Thursday to Monday.

The north cell is still an active construction site and is not yet open for public access.





- continued from page 1 schools in the Perry Hall area or surrounding areas to help us alleviate this problem," she commented.

While recognizing people's right to sell their property, Ward surmised that many land owners would simply sell their land for development, then move out of the area. She asked the Council to consider the negative impacts on schools and traffic infrastructure long-term before making their decisions. And she pointed to Bel Air in Harford County as an example of the negative effects of overdevelopment on quality of life.

"So please support Councilman Marks on his rezoning changes and take a responsible approach to the development of Perry Hall," Ward implored.


Marks has raised more than 2,500 acres of land in his district for review and potential downzoning, including protection from development using the Neighborhood Commons (NC) overlay which blocks development of open space. This follows the downzoning of hundreds more acres during the 2012 CZMP cycle.

The Gerst Farm was again an issue, as it was before the Planning Board, with Glenside Farms Homeowners Association representative Julie Henn raising concerns on behalf of her community about the 55-acre property's development.

Classified as zoning issue 5-028, the Perry Hall Improvement Association has requested that the farm, located along Gerst Road behind the Honeygo Shopping Center, be downzoned from its current designation of DR 10.5 (10.5 homes per acre), DR 2 and DR 3.5, to DR 1. This would take the property from allowing about 150 homes to only about 50.

Henn stated that her association supports the PHIA's request and that lower density housing is more appropriate for the Honeygo Area district of Perry Hall, which has seen "exorbitant" growth in the last decade, exceeding the current infrastructure's capacity.

"The intent of the Honeygo Area Plan was to ensure that the development of



infrastructure coincides with the approval of building permits," Henn said. "This has not been realized."

She also pointed out that Chapel Hill Elementary School, which would receive students from the Gerst Farm development, enrolled 796 students for the 2015-16 school year - operating at 125 percent of capacity. Perry Hall Middle enrolled 1,737 students, putting it at 106 percent of capacity, and Perry Hall High School was just under capacity but projected to exceed its capacity for next year.

"Perry Hall needs more schools, not more homes," Henn asserted.

"Downzoning the Gerst property to DR 1 is a balanced solution for the property owners as well as for our community," she continued. "Larger, single-family homes will preserve the character of surrounding developments and attract new families to the area.

"DR 1 zoning will allow for more green space," she said, "adding value to new and current properties, and will afford residents a higher quality of life in Baltimore County, consistent with the intent of the [Honeygo] Plan."

Like Ward, Henn acknowledged that property owners want to get the most that they can out of their land. But she posited that additional green space included in the developement, or even a small park constructed on the property would ensure that the land is enjoyed by generations to come.

One longtime resident, Robert Rye, was the lone dissenter of the evening, speaking against the mass downzoning in Perry Hall because of the investment in the infrastructure that has already occurred to accommodate it in what was designated long ago as a growth area.

Rye said he finds it hypocritical for new people to move into the area and then complain about the growth. He also protested the plan for downzoning without a plan for a more appropriate growth area.

Marks, however, justified his downzoning requests in his opening remarks by stating that he and Sixth District Councilwoman Cathy Bevins inherited a school overcrowding "crisis" in the northeastern part of the county when they took office six years ago. He also noted that many of the developments currently under construction were approved a decade ago.

"Both of us have worked very hard to accelerate school construction, but just tonight the County Council was forced to approve funding for more trailers at places like Chapel Hill, Oakleigh and Carney Elementary Schools," Marks lamented, referencing the action taken by the Council in its legislative meeting prior to the CZMP hearing.

"I am concerned that if we build at the rate allowed by the current zoning, it may prove unsustainable and require new taxes in the future to pay for additional schools and infrastructure," he concluded.

The Council hearings for Districts 6 and 7 will be held on June 14 at Parkville High School in Parkville and June 28 at Chesapeake High School in Essex, respectively, each starting at 6 p.m.

Two teens charged with murder

Baltimore County Police have charged two suspects in connection with the April 4 shooting in Dundalk that left a man deceased.

Amritpal Singh Mavi, 17 (charged as an adult), of the 1800-block of Homberg Avenue in Dundalk, and Michael Christian Mullen, 18 (no current address) were both originally charged with first-degree murder. Indictments for both men have added additional charges that include armed robbery, first-degree assault, handgun violation, and other related charges. Both are being held without bail at the Baltimore County Detention Center.

The investigation has indicated that on April 4 at approximately 2:30 a.m., Mavi and Mullen were involved in a dice game with 21-year-old Marlo Delector Braxton in the basement of a home in the 7500 Block of Lange Street in Dundalk. During the game, Mavi shot Braxton in the head. Mavi and Mullen then fled to West Virginia where they were later apprehended.

Mullen was found on April 18 in Beaver, West Virginia and Mavi was found on April 21 in Mount Hope, West Virginia.

The exact cause for the shooting remains unknown. This incident remains under investigation by the Baltimore County Police Homicide Unit.

Current crime trends

Since May 24, there have been three convenience store robberies involving similar motive and suspect description in the Towson, White Marsh and Essex precincts. Cases occurred during early morning hours between midnight and 3 a.m. The suspect displayed a weapon and demanded money and, in at least one case, cigarettes.

Since May 18, there have been three street robberies along Hazelwood Avenue and one street robbery along Radecke Avenue in the White Marsh Precinct. Cases occurred during evening and early morning hours. In most cases, the victims were outside of or walking from a store. In the last case, a pizza delivery driver was robbed. The suspects used physical force in three cases and displayed a weapon in two cases.

Man charged with trying to run over officers

A Baltimore man has been charged with first-degree assault after trying to run over two Baltimore County police officers.

Just before 12:30 p.m. on May 29, Baltimore County Police Officers responded to a home in the unitblock of King Richard Court in Rosedale for a report of stalking. When officers arrived at the location, they met with a woman who told them that she dated a man for two months and they broke up about a week ago. Since then, he has been contacting her and coming to her home despite her telling him to leave her alone.

The man was not present at the location when officers arrived, but as officers were leaving one of them noticed a vehicle that matched the woman's description of her ex-boyfriend's vehicle. The vehicle, a white Ford Expedition, had begun to circle the parking lot. The officer exited his vehicle to motion for the Expedition to stop. Instead of stopping, the Expedition accelerated in the direction of the officer and continued until the officer had to get out of the way to avoid being hit.

The second officer also motioned for the Expedition to stop but had to jump out of the way to avoid being hit by the truck.


Officers pursued the Expedition south-bound on Philadelphia Road until it crashed into two other cars and stopped. The driver of the Expedition, the man that the woman on King Richard Court told police about, was taken into custody.

The man has been identified as 48-year-old Victor Jerome Rybak of the 600-block of South Grundy Street in Dundalk. He has been charged with two counts of first-degree assault, numerous traffic charges, and other related criminal charges. He is being held at the Baltimore County Detention Center on \$200,000 bail.

Neither officer was injured during the incident.



Baltimore County currently permits landlords to

reject prospective tenants based on their intended use of government-issued (Section 8) Housing Choice Vouchers. The Housing Opportunities Made Equal or HOME Act, scheduled for a vote in August by the County Council, would disallow that practice in the county.

In a letter to the *Times* two weeks ago, Wayne Monroe said that the HOME Act would compel landlords to accept applicants with vouchers. This is not true. Other vetting channels - such as credit, employment and criminal histories - are permitted by the HOME Act. If something negative turns up through another source, the landlord can reject an applicant with a voucher.

Nor are there any other burdens on landlords in the

Regarding Baltimore County's HOME Act

program. Yes, a pre-occupancy inspection is required, but most Baltimore County landlords must already pass a county-required rental inspection periodically.

Other detractors of the HOME Act have conflicting concerns over whether it would increase concentrations of poverty in certain communities or shift such populations to other communities. But renter policies over the years have helped solidify the poverty footprints of the county. Landlords have accepted vouchers in their Essex and Dundalk properties, but not in their apartments in Towson and Timonium. The HOME Act would give tenants a greater choice of communities in the county. The federal Fair Housing Act has already set the

standard for non-discrimination in housing by race,

national origin, ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, disability and presence of children. In Baltimore County, 32 percent of voucher holders are low-income seniors, 30 percent are people with disabilities and 25 percent are low-wage workers. What justification can there be for clutching onto an ingrained practice of discriminating against such poverty-burdened households?

I would urge all Baltimore County residents and council members to embrace the HOME Act as an important step toward helping individuals and families live in communities where they have a better chance of breaking their cycle of poverty.



'**ME BEFORE YOU**': For cryin' out loud!

There are two ways you can look at "Me Before You." On the one hand, it's definitely a weepy melodrama about a quirky, young British woman who is hired as a caregiver to a suicidal, quadriplegic man, and the two slowly fall in love. Ladies, if you're yearning for a date night with your man over a girls' night out at the cinema, you can try and sell your boyfriend or husband on that plot summary.

Or there's a second way to present your case. If you are in the predicament of convincing your beer-bellied, football-loving manly man to accompany you to "Me Before You," tell him this: it stars Daenerys Targaryen who, in the film, cheats on Neville Longbottom with Finnick Odair. Finnick's father is Tywin Lannister (or if you wanna go way back... Sardo Numspa) and Daenerys' sister is Clara Oswald.

Yes, Emilia Clarke stars as the poor, young British woman hired by a wealthy man (Charles Dance) to serve as a caregiver to his grown son, Will, a quadriplegic played by Sam Claflin. Even though she is dating a successful local fitness spa owner (Matthew Lewis), Clarke's Louisa finds herself drawn to the handsome, moody Will. When she finds out he wants to travel to Switzerland where assisted suicide is legal, she tries to use all of her charm and spunk to convince him to live.

The film is based on the best-selling novel by Jojo Moyes, who also wrote the screenplay here. Yes, Jojo is so so manipulative. And like "Pretty Woman," we wouldn't care a thing about this story if the lead guy wasn't obscenely wealthy and good-looking and his and the lead woman's dates were not the stuff of Harlequin romance novels. But the film works because of the charm and chemistry of the two leads and because... well... it's just so gosh-darn beautiful to look at at all times.

It's fantasy tinged with tragedy. But it's highly watchable. The supporting turns are also memorable, especially Jenna Coleman as Louisa's headstrong sister and Stephen Peacocke as Nathan, Will's medical aide. Peacocke, by the way, looks so much like a well-built, young Hugh Grant, it's eerie. Seriously, look him up on IMDB.com. It will really freak you out.

"Me Before You" has wit and a touch of wisdom. It appealed to me... but I also had my loving wife next to me, open-mouth bawling for almost the entirety of the film's third act. And, OK, yeah. I might have had something caught in my eye by the end credits, too. Don't you judge me. I still like football.



'POPSTAR' never stops trying to entertain

"Popstar: Never Stop Never Stopping" has one big claim to greatness: it's a comedy produced by Judd Apatow... that comes in under 90 minutes! How'd that happen?!

Mind you, this is a good thing - a very good thing - because the film is essentially a "Saturday Night Live" sketch played out to feature length. When it's funny, it's very funny. When it's not, it treads water and feels unsure of exactly what it wants to be. But there are enough laughs here to recommend the flick, especially if you are a big "SNL" fan as it features about two dozen cast members from the last two decades-plus of the show.

"Popstar" is headlined by "SNL" musical digitalshorts superstars Andy Samberg, Akiva Schaffer, and Jorma Taccone, who are collectively known as The Lonely Island. OK, these guys don't have a gift for titling their movies or their bands. But they practically invented the viral video clip. Their film is a "mockumentary" about a Beastie Boys-esque white rap group called the Style Boyz, who become fractured when their Justin Bieber/Macklemore-like lead singer/ rapper Conner4Real (Samberg) goes solo and delivers one of the most successful albums in history. Conner gets a way-big head and insists on writing all of the tunes on his sophomore album. The result is a creative disaster that he makes worse with an ill-conceived cross promotion with a major appliance maker to deliver his raps whenever people open their new refrigerators, stoves or dishwashers.

With his concert sales waning, he brings on a deranged, up-and-coming rapper named Hunter (Chris Redd, giving the film's funniest performance) who immediately upstages him. Conner then gets the bright idea to stage a reality show centered around him proposing to his trophy girlfriend (Imogen Poots). He even gets Seal to serenade while he proposes flanked by wolves, who

suddenly turn frighteningly aggressive the longer the singer croons. The question eventually becomes: "Will Conner swallow his pride and reunite the Style Boyz, or will he continue to behave like an egomaniac?"

All the while, the film features cutaway interviews with a myriad of celebrities - everyone from Usher, Adam Levine and 50 Cent to Carrie Underwood, Simon Cowell and Pink - who give their skewed observations on Conner4Real's rise and fall. Samberg and Co. even managed to get the two surviving Beatles into this flick! Most hilariously of all is Will Arnett absolutely skewering Harvey Levin with brief look-ins inside the fictional CMZ's "newsroom" as he and his cackling staff of unscrupulous paparazzi sling mud and slurp down enormous caffeinated drinks.

There are a lot of funny ideas here, most of which are R-rated. That said, there is so much thrown at the screen, that some of the gags land with heavy thuds. But, then again, a surprisingly large number hit the bull's eye, too. The more you follow today's social-mediafueled pop culture, the bigger the yuks are going to be.

Look, this is not the second coming of "This Is Spinal Tap." Samberg doesn't quite know whether to make his lead character likable or unlikable, savvy or stupid, talented or a hack. Conner is whatever each individual scene or extended sketch calls for. Several times he is saved by some funny, funny turns by people like Arnett, Maya Rudolph, Justin Timberlake, Tim Meadows and more. And, best of all... they kept Apatow out of the editing booth!




