Joe Cluster nominated to fill father's vacant delegate seat

Last week Joe Cluster's name was put forth by the Baltimore County Republican State Central Committee to fill the vacancy left by his father, Delegate John Cluster, who was recently appointed to the state Parole Commission.

Under Maryland's constitution, the governor must fill any vacancy in the General Assembly with a person approved by the central committee of the party of the person last elected. The committee is able to select up to three nominees, but opted to only send Cluster's name to the Governor. Patrick O'Keefe, an aide to Delegate Christian Miele, and Norma Secoura, a member of the central committee, had also applied for the open seat but their names were not passed

"I always had a plan to run when [my father] decided not to run," said Cluster. "We had talked about it and he said it was going to be his last term so I was planning on possibly running in 2018 anyway. So when the possibility came early I jumped on it."

Cluster has been the executive director

of the state GOP since 2013 and gained prominence after the 2014 election saw the Republican party turn previous Democratic strongholds red. Cluster will continue to serve as executive director of the state GOP until Jan. 3 when the current chairwoman, Diana Waterman, finishes her term. When her successor takes over, he will have a discussion about the practicality of keeping his position while he serves in the General Assembly. If he stayed, he would have to take a leave of absence during the legislative

Abandoned boats a big problem on **Back River**

Back River has seen significant progress in recent years, both in the lack of trash and pollution in the water and the return of wildlife to the waterway, thanks mostly to the efforts of the Back River Restoration Committee.

But one thing that continues to plague the river is the issue of abandoned boats, which have continued to frustrate the BRRC and those who live on and use

BRRC President Sam Weaver says there are abandoned boats all over Back River, from its headwaters to the mouth. And government agencies have been little help so far in removing them because of regulations on what can and cannot be considered an abandoned boat.

The state's Department of Natural Resources defines an abandoned boat as a vessel that has remained at a location without the owner or person in control of the property's consent for more than 30 days on public property, including public marinas, docks or boatyards; more than 30 days at a private dock or near water's edge on private property; more than 90 days at a private marina or boatyard or property operated by a private marina or boatyard; or more than 180 days at private property other than

those described above.

However, many of the boats on Back River are tied to private docks and are not considered abandoned, even though they are sunken and dilapidated. And if they are not leaking any kind of fluids, authorities will not remove them, according to Weaver.

"As long as it's polluting the water, they're all over it like white on rice," Weaver said. "But if it's been down long enough that there is no pollution or there is no motor or gas tank in it, nobody cares. That, to me, is unacceptable."

Weaver also lamented that boats that - see ABANDONED on page 2 -

Board of Education passes heat closure policy

Last week the Baltimore County Board of Education finally approved a heat closure policy which will see all non-air conditioned schools close when the heat index hits 90 degrees.

According to the new policy, closures will ideally be announced by 8 p.m. the preceding night when the heat index is forecast to reach 90 degrees the following day.

With over 30 schools still without air conditioning - many on the east side - in Baltimore County the heat closure policy will come as some relief. The push to change the heat closure policy ramped up last September after a heat wave hit as the school year began.

A hearing was held in January, after which it was decided that the comfort of students and teachers needed to be considered more thoroughly. It was also noted that the school system needed to get information out to parents in a more timely manner.

"This was the right thing to do for the public, I appreciate your support," Policy Review Committee Chairwoman Romaine Williams told the board.

Besides creating a set of guidelines for closures, the new heat policy also allows students to carry water bottles at all times and gives principals the flexibility to move students to cooler classrooms.

"I'm really happy about this school closure policy for heat," said Anna Surr, whose daughter attends Patapsco High School and Center for the Arts.

Surr was the only member of the public to address the board at the Aug. 9 meeting. Her daughter has attended schools without air conditioning since kindergarten, and she's happy that there will be some

Surr also noted that temperatures are effected by things such as lighting, and that schools should be looking to get more modern fixtures.

With the school year slated to begin on Aug. 24, 34 of the county's 173 schools will be without air conditioning. Originally, County Executive Kevin Kamenetz's massive "Schools for Our Future" plan would have had air conditioning installed in schools by 2021, but a very public riff with Comptroller Peter Franchot caused Kamenetz to expedite the plan.

As it stands now, most schools will have air conditioning by August 2017; five will have air conditioning by 2018 and four more will have air conditioning by August 2019.

Despite the move to get a better heat closure policy in place, there are still plenty who want to see portable air conditioning units installed.

"That's not a viable policy," said State Senator Johnny Ray Salling. "It's a surrender that offers little real relief. School closure under those conditions is nothing more than a feeble attempt to address a problem that continues to negatively impact students and teachers alike."

Earlier this year Franchot and Hogan used the Board of Public Works to hold back \$10 million in construction funds unless they were used for portable - see HEAT POLICY on page 11 -

air conditioning units. That move came after Kamenetz was told to to use county funds on air conditioning, with the County Executive failed to do.

"That's an issue that we've been trying to focus on for quite a while," said Governor Larry Hogan. "There are two jurisdictions basically failed to air condition classrooms, Baltimore County and Baltimore City. The Board of Public Works has taken a very strong position that they need to fix it and they've refused to at this point. And now this is a perfect example of what happens when you don't have air conditioning."

According to Superintendent Dr. S. Dallas Dance, days off for heat will be eligible for a waiver of the 180 day school year mandate. The new policy goes into effect on Aug. 23.



Two sentenced to 50 years in Parkville murder case

Mark Eugene Garland, 28, and Peretz Anderson, 31, were sentenced last week to 50 years in prison for the murder of Aaron Nedd in Baltimore County Circuit Court

On Dec. 26, 2014, Aaron Philip Nedd, 28, was living with his wife and children in a motel room on Loch Bend Drive in Parkville. During that evening, Garland and Anderson knocked on the door of the room. One went into the bathroom of the motel room with Mr. Nedd. The victim's wife then heard a struggle in the bathroom. The second defendant then went into the bathroom and Mr. Nedd was shot several times. He died as a result of the gunshot wounds.

Anderson and Garland fled with property belonging to the victim. They were caught shortly thereafter when they were located by the Baltimore County Police helicopter. Property of the victim was found in the car Anderson and Garland occupied. Gunshot residue was located on both defendants.

Garland and Anderson were tried together and convicted by a jury of First Degree Murder, Armed Robbery and Use of a Firearm in the Commission of a Crime of Violence. Judge Kathleen Cox sentenced each to Life with all but 50 years suspended for the First Degree murder and concurrent sentences of 10 years and five years for the Armed Robbery and Use of a Firearm.

MSP respond to multiple DUI crashes over weekend

Maryland State Police troopers conducted multiple traffic enforcement operations over the weekend, but despite their efforts, were still called to more than one dozen crashes involving suspected impaired drivers, including one that involved the team leader of the DUI enforcement unit.

During the weekend, troopers statewide made more than 4,700 traffic stops and issued more than 3,100 citations and 3,000 warnings. They were involved in sobriety checkpoints and special enforcement initiatives in various counties. Troopers arrested 71 impaired drivers statewide.

Despite those efforts, troopers were called to respond to 15 crashes that involved suspected impaired drivers.

State troopers work daily to identify and remove impaired drivers from Maryland roads. So far this year, Maryland state troopers have made more than 338,200 traffic stops and almost 4,400 arrests for impaired driving. Please do not drink and drive.

Current crime trends

Since June 22, there have been seven pharmacy burglaries in the Wilkens, Woodlawn, Towson, Pikesville and North Point precincts. Cases occurred during the early morning hours. In most cases, entry was made with force and through front doors. Once inside, the suspects then forced interior doors and ransacked cabinets. In most cases, the suspects removed large amounts of narcotics or prescription medications. In two cases, the suspects pried or pulled open cash registers and removed money. In the last case, the suspects took money.



cially on nice days. But modern life jackets are available in a wide variety of shapes, colors, and sizes. Many are thin and flexible. Some are built right into fishing vests or hunter coats. Others are inflatable as compact as a scarf or fanny pack until they hit water, when they automatically fill with air.

There's no excuse not to wear a life jacket on

When a vessel is underway with children under 13 years old, they must be wearing a life jacket unless they are below deck or in an enclosed cabin. Child lifejacket approvals are based on the child's weight. Check the "User Weight" on the label, or the approval statement that will read something like "Approved for use on recreational boats and uninspected commercial vessels not carrying passengers for hire, by persons weighing __ lbs". They can be marked "less than 30," "30 to 50," "less than 50," or "50 to 90."

The Coast Guard recommends and many states require wearing lifejackets:

- For water skiing and other towed activities (use a lifejacket marked for water skiing).
- While operating personal watercraft (PWC) (use a lifejacket marked for water skiing or PWC use).
- During white water boating activities.
- While sailboarding (under Federal law, sailboards are not "boats").

Check with your state boating safety officials.

Federal law does not require lifejackets on racing shells, rowing sculls, racing canoes, and racing kayaks; state laws vary. Check with your state boating safety officials.

If you are boating in an area under the jurisdiction of the Army Corps of Engineers, or a federal, state or local park authority, other rules may apply.

Besides life jacket safety, always make sure to have a float plan.

Why should you take the time to prepare a float plan? The answer is simple... there are just too many facts that need to be accurately remembered and ultimately conveyed in an emergency situation. Without a float plan you are counting on someone else,

Boaters enjoy the feel of sun and spray. So it's a friend, neighbor, or family member to remember tempting to boat without wearing a life jacket espedetailed information that rescue personnel need in order to find you. Information that can make a difference in the outcome.

> Don't think for a minute that this is a device only for those with big expensive boats. A Float Plan is equally effective for the owner of a 10 foot kayak or flat-bottom skiff as it is for a 48-foot express cruiser, or a 90 foot sport-fishing vessel or luxury yacht.

There's also always the danger of carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide enters the bloodstream though the lungs by breathing in this dangerous gas. Exposure in a well ventilated environment is generally not a problem. Brief exposure in a more confined environment can cause sickness and prolonged exposure to higher concentrations can kill you. Since symptoms of carbon monoxide mimic seasickness or alcohol intoxication it is sometimes overlooked as nothing serious and those affected never receive the medical attention they need.

Maintain fresh air circulation throughout the boat at all times and maintain your vessel to assure peak engine performance. An improperly tuned engine is more likely to produce elevated levels of CO.

Another safety hazard is boating under the influence. Every boater needs to understand the risks of boating under the influence of alcohol or drugs (BUI). It is illegal to operate a boat while under the influence of alcohol or drugs in every state. The Coast Guard also enforces a federal law that prohibits BUI. This law pertains to ALL boats (from canoes and rowboats to the largest ships) and includes foreign vessels that operate in U.S. waters, as well as U.S. vessels on the high seas.

Alcohol affects judgment, vision, balance and coordination. These impairments increase the likelihood of accidents afloat for both passengers and boat operators. U.S. Coast Guard data shows that in boating deaths involving alcohol use, over half the victims capsized their boats and/or fell overboard.

If you plan on drinking, bring plenty of nonalcoholic beverages to interchange, bring snacks, limit your trip to avoid fatigue and wear clothes that will keep you cool.

are left sunken in the boating channel, presenting a navigational hazard, will often simply be moved out of the channel rather than removed from the river entirely.

"That doesn't fix the problem," he asserted.

Weaver compared the issue to junk or abandoned cars in Baltimore, which can be towed away if left on the street for 30 days or more.

A DNR spokesman called the process to remove an abandoned boat "complex." But after seeing no action from Baltimore County, DNR or the U.S. Coast Guard in getting rid of a particular abandoned boat in Duck Creek, Weaver and the BRRC took it upon themselves to remove it from the river last month. The boat was not

tied to a dock, but was left out in the water and filled with trash and debris from its collapsed canopy.

"If that had been there during this weekend's storm, all that trash would have been all over Back River," Weaver said, adding that the BRRC would have been left to clean it up.

But the state is not solely responsible for addressing the issue of abandoned boats, according to DNR's director of communications, Stephen Schatz, and the issue is a difficult one.

"The final determination of removing an abandoned vessel is quite complex as the state [DNR], as well as our local (counties) and federal partners (U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and U.S. Coast Guard) also play a role," Schatz said in an email.

Funds for the program come from the state Waterway Improvement Fund, generated from the one-time 5 percent excise tax paid to the state when a boat is purchased and titled in Maryland.

In particular, though, Weaver is looking for a way to address the boats that are sunken and tied to docks which he sees as clearly abandoned because of the state of their disrepair. He noted that there are about 10 boats in a particular location near the mouth of Deep Creek into Back River which are sunken, but tied to a pier. So they are not considered by law to be abandoned.

"It doesn't seem to matter to anyone that it's an eyesore and sooner or later it's going to fall into a million pieces and be all over the place," Weaver commented. "But right now there's nothing you can do about it.

"If a law in place doesn't work, it needs to be fixed," he added.

To that end, the BRRC has partnered with the Marine Trades Association of Maryland to press for a solution, as well as State Delegate Bob Long (R-6) in hopes that they can pass legislation to clarify the law in the next General Assembly.

Long said they had been working on a bill for this year's legislative session, which ended in April. But the issue came up late in the session and the details had not all been worked out before the session drew to a close.

"After talking with some other people, with DNR, we had to add some more layers to it and we just decided to hold off and do it again next year," Long said.

He hopes his legislation can simplify and clarify state regulations to more effectively deal with what he called "nuisance boats," as well as those that may present environmental hazards other than by leaking fluids.

Long said his legislation will specifically lay out what can be considered an abandoned boat fit for removal and specify the steps authorities will take to remove abandoned vessels.

"We have a lot of boats that are just floating around out there that don't have ownership," Long said. "Right now, from what I understand, DNR can't really do anything with them.

"[The legislation] is going to be very specific," he continued. "We just don't want to arbitrarily take someone's boat, but we have a lot of boats" that are abandoned.

Regarding the collection of sunken boats in Deep Creek, Long said, "I don't know how long they've been there, but if they had been dealt with when they originally sank they might not be sticking up out of the water like they are."

In the meantime, Weaver says there are at least six more half-sunken boats in Back River that have been that way for "quite a while" and are not tied to anyone's pier. So he is looking to have those removed.

"We're just cleaning up the pollution and the eyesores," he said. "Why should people pay big bucks to live on the waterfront and have to look at garbage?"

Penalties for abandoning a boat, a misdemeanor, can include a \$2,000 fine, up to a year in prison or both.

'Pete's Dragon': Something for movie lovers to roar about

As crass, profane and altogether vulgar as the guilty-funny "Sausage Party" is, "Pete's Dragon" is as sweet, gentle and altogether sentimental. It washes over you like a tonic. You find yourself in a darkened theater, briefly protected from life, from the divisions and the closed minds and the cold hearts of the real world. You're in the presence of gentility and goodness, heroism and hope, family and new friends. I haven't felt THIS good after seeing a movie in a long time.

Yes, the film is a remake of the 1977 kids film. But that sentence should be where the cynicism ends. At the outset, we are introduced to Pete (Oakes Fegley), an 11-year-old boy who has lived in the Pacific Northwest wilderness protected by a dragon he has named Elliott ever since surviving a car crash six years earlier. He and his mythic beast are happy playing, foraging and napping in their wooded playground day-in and day-out.

But civilization starts to encroach in the form of a logging company run by a decent man named Jack (Wes Bentley) and his hot-headed brother, Gavin (Karl Urban). Pete is discovered by Jack's wife, Grace (Bryce Dallas Howard), a forest ranger who thinks she knows the forest like the back of her hand. When she takes Pete into her home, she laughs off his stories and drawings of Elliott...

even though her dad (Robert Redford) has been telling those same tall tales to local kids for years. When Elliott comes looking for Pete, though, their small, remote Oregon town learns new meaning to the old exclamation "Here be dragons!"

"Pete's Dragon" is essentially a "boy and his dog" story. But the touches director and co-writer David Lowery works into this story elevate it far above studio product or the usual Disney merchandise manipulation film. For the most part, this is a distinctive vision that never panders.

I don't want to oversell this by comparing it to "E.T.: The Extra-Terrestrial." But I will say that this is one of the most Spielbergian movies since his golden era of "Jaws," "Close Encounters," "Raiders" and "E.T." If you enjoyed the excellent Netflix series "Stranger Things" (whose events take place in 1983), and were enthralled by the new novel "The Totally Gnarly, Way Bogus Murder of Muffy McGregor" (set in 1986), you will totally get into this 1982-set "Pete's Dragon" remake. There's also a little crazy "Goonies" adventure at the heart of the film, along with a bit of "Iron Giant" sweetness to boot.

What holds "Pete's Dragon" back from really reaching the highest of highs, though, is a weak antagonist. Karl Urban's Gavin is the human baddie here, and he's a muddled mix of backwater




hunter and conniving opportunist. But he isn't given enough of a backstory or lines on screen to really make us hate or fear him. The movie just doesn't know whether to make him altogether bad or just dangerously opportunistic. He is a bit of a bumbler, too, which takes some of the bite out of the character. The true unsung "heroes" (for lack of a better word) of "Close Encounters" and "E.T." were Francois Truffaut's intrepid scientist and Peter Coyote's shadowy, but sympathetic government project head, respectively. Both were formidable men who could have become true villains at any point in their films. But both were ultimately revealed to be more aids to the lead protagonists after they ceased

being obstacles. And both films were better for them.

But that's my only real criticism of this wonderful, wonderful motion picture. As "Pete's Dragon" drew to a close, for some reason, I began thinking about what Linus used to say about The Great Pumpkin - that he would value sincerity above all other attributes. Linus was sure the Great Pumpkin would pick him to give toys and treats to because he would have the most sincere pumpkin patch around. Well, "Pete's Dragon" is the most sincere movie in theaters today. I loved it. It's a movie for all ages; it's a movie

AUSAGE PARTY: Hot dog, it's funny!

Something happened during my recent preview screening of "Sausage Party" that has NEVER happened in my nearly 20 years of being a paid, professional movie critic. The studio representatives served... *drum roll*... FREE BEER to the audience and press! No, I did not partake. I was on the job, man! So, what's my sober take on the flick? Funny! "Sausage Party" is a funny, filthy smutfest. And I feel I must point out, the movie appeared to be even funnier the more ale one consumed.

Just sayin'.

"Sausage Party" is set in a world of sentient food, drinks and groceries. That's right. Walking, talking hot dogs, bread, fruits, vegetables, juice boxes, even feminine hygiene products. They all sit on their supermarket shelves wish-ing and hoping and praying that "The Gods" (i.e. the store's human customers) will buy them before their expiration dates so they can be taken to "The Great Beyond" (i.e. whatever exists outside the store's sliding glass doors).

But when one Honey Mustard (voiced by Danny McBride) is returned to the store's shelves, he comes back from The Great Beyond with tales of horror of what he saw once purchased. He speaks of a food holocaust where The Gods are actually cruel, violent monsters eager to cut them up, cook them up and consume them. The store's merchandise doesn't believe him. But he causes just a bit of doubt in the mind of Frank the hot dog (voice of Seth Rogen) - enough for Frank to set out to find the truth of existence in other corners of the store when the glass-jarred Honey Mustard commits suicide (jumps from a customer's cart) and causes a chain reaction of groceries to fall to the market's floor.

From there emerges a multi-pronged story of food fighting for survival inside and outside the market, as Barry (voice of Michael Cera), a deformed hot dog, narrowly escapes slaughter at a suburban single-family home and Frank runs afoul of The Douche (voice of Nick Kroll) inside the store. Rogen and writing partner Evan Goldberg and their merry band of hucksters, hangers-on and hookah enthusiasts (the film features the voices of such Rogen smoking buddies as James Franco, Jonah Hill and Craig Robinson) serve up their usual sophomoric pot and poo-poo humor. But the story is genuinely clever.

There are, of course, several times in the film where you do want the guys to just "grow up." They're actually onto something here with this R-rated variation of "Toy Story" essentially crossed with "Team America" that they don't need to overstuff it with as many F bombs and gay and ethnic jokes as they do. The balance is not always there, and it really should have been this time out.

Now, of course, many of you reading this will probably not want to see a movie this incredibly raunchy (the film's climax is a gigantic, store-wide food orgy) and vulgar. But I can't lie: I chuckled pretty hard throughout. If you like ribald humor, there are some belly laughs and more than a few instances where the audience is almost invited to chant in unison: "Oh... that... is... SO wrong!"

I will leave it to you to decide if Rogen, who professes to be an atheist, has gone to the well now once too often with his whole "God doesn't exist" complex. His issues with the existence of a Creator have been a recurring theme in several flicks he's been a part of, from "Paul" to "This Is the End" to this. I actually admire the guy for trying to work stuff out in such silly, goofy flicks. Anyone who wants to explore these ideas this much... I think there's a certain nobility there in the questioning. You can tell he thinks about this stuff a LOT!

But he also thinks about flatulence and secretions a lot, too. "Sausage Party" is a fun night at the movies if you can take it... and, uh, if you've had a mug or two of ice cold Bud.

The stubbornness of Kevin Kamenetz

In just a matter of days 6th District children will begin the 2016-2017 school term in the same boiling hot classrooms they left last June. Once again, teachers will be challenged to effectively teach and our children will be challenged to learn in overheated rooms where both teaching and learning are nearly impossible!

Baltimore County's new policy to address the problem offers the only relief from sweltering classrooms students and teachers can get. Governor Hogan and Comptroller Peter Franchot, two of the three Board of Public Works members, have succeeded in getting the Board to hold back \$10 million in Baltimore County school construction funds. These funds can be used only for the purpose of installing portable air conditioners in all classrooms in schools without air conditioning.

However, County Executive Kevin Kamenetz has stubbornly refused to use the funds for that purpose. He wants to install central air conditioning in all county schools. But the rub is that the project cannot be completed until the end of 2019. That's a long time for 6th District children and teachers to wait. In my opinion it's too long to wait. If the County Executive had to sit in an office that could reach 127 degrees, action would be swift.

Indeed, spending money on portable air conditioners is a short-term fix. However, the students and teachers need the deplorable hot box classrooms fixed. And they need it fixed now! We have all sought relief from the recent 90 plus degree heat wave in air conditioned places. Reason demands a real response now.... and that response should be the use of portable air conditioners until central air can be installed in these schools.

I intend to visit the schools in my district when the heat is high. And I intend to invite County Executive Kamenetz to accompany me, so he can see first-hand what our students and teachers are forced to bear when the thermometer rises. Perhaps then, he will realize our children and teachers need relief as quickly as possible.





Bird River community hears developer's revised plan for new homes

After residents of the Bird River community heard last month of a developer's request to move the Urban-Rural Demarcation Line (URDL) in order to more densely develop a piece of land near Vincent Road in Middle River, they began expressing their firm opposition to such a move.

The URDL currently cuts the property into northern and southern portions with the southern portion inside the district. The developer and owner of the property requested moving the entire property to the inside of the line.

Developer Joseph Moran of Hilltop Residential, LLC - a subsidiary of Towsonbased Moran Properties - had presented his plan for the 28-acre property to the

Bird River Road Neighborhood Association at their July meeting. But after facing opposition from them on it, he revised that plan and presented it to County Councilwoman Cathy Bevins, who told him to once again take it to the community for feedback.

The resulting new plan, unveiled at the Aug. 9 meeting of the BRRNA, would see the property developed with a total of only 19 homes rather than the 26 he had previously planned.

Moran also revealed that he would likely no longer seek the URDL change and would leave the portion outside the district undeveloped.

The entire subject property is currently zoned RC3 (resource conservation), which is used by Baltimore County to defer

planning and development on land that could be used for future public facilities such as utilities or roads. And Moran's attorney, Scott Barhight, said at the July 21 Planning Board meeting on the URDL change request that portions of the property were surplus land from the State of Maryland that they did not need when building the MD-43 extension.

As part of the new plan, Moran said he would concentrate all of the proposed homes on the 11-acre portion of land inside the URDL and commit to placing a forest conservation easement on some of that property.

A development of this size, Moran explained, would require between five and six acres of forest to be preserved either on-site or replanted elsewhere. He

is choosing to leave it on the site since he has the space.

"And the balance, we'll work with the county to put some type of restriction on development so that, once we're gone, nobody can come and develop this land," he said.

The property is also the subject of Issue number 6-025 in this year's Comprehensive Zoning Map Process, through which the developer sought to rezone the property with a mix of DR1 (density residential, one home per acre) and DR3.5 (3.5 homes per acre).

However, the county's planning staff and Planning Board each recommended keeping the portion outside the URDL as resource conservation zoning, while

- continued from page 4 granting the request for DR3.5 on the portion inside the URDL.

If Moran was granted his original zoning request, the property would allow for up to 59 homes to be built. If the planning recommendations were granted, he could build up to 50 homes. The current zoning on the property would allow only six or seven homes.

But with the new plan, Moran said he would decrease his zoning request from DR3.5 to DR2 on the southern portion and withdraw his request to change the zoning on the northern portion.

"So we're really looking for an increase of 12 - 13 lots over what we currently have," Moran said. "That's the net change."

As compared to other recent housing developments in the area, Moran said his lots would be bigger with estate-type yards and homes.

A nearby project, Vincent Farms, has lot sizes ranging from 0.1 - 0.29 acres, with the average being 0.2 acres. His lots would range from 0.25 - 0.67 acres with the average being over one-third acre.

"So we're a substantially bigger product and we're trying to build a nice product in the community," Moran commented, noting that his prices are projected at about \$500,000 while those in Vincent Farms averaged about \$460,000.

Additionally, the storm water management facilities constructed on the property would direct runoff toward MD-43 to

the west rather than toward the homes to the east along Vincent Road.

Traffic was still a major concern for residents, though, with traffic on Ebenezer Road - one of the community's main arteries - sometimes backing up nearly a mile back from the traffic light at Pulaski Highway to Richardson Farms. Adding more traffic with additional homes, they said, would be worrisome.

Moran did not have a solution to offer except to reiterate the relatively small size of his project.

"I'm trying to do a small, tasteful, estate-type subdivision, a nice tax base [addition]," he said. "I think it would help everything around it. I'm trying to leave over 60 percent of what I could develop open."

Overcrowding of the area's schools was also a particular issue for the community since the massive Greenleigh at Crossroads development has already been approved

to build 1,700 new residences. Many are concerned that, although there are new schools being built, they will open at capacity. And adding anything else will again burden the area's infrastructure.

Planning Board member Scott Jenkins, who attended the BRRNA meeting to explain the URDL to residents, said the developer's decision to pull back his URDL change request was "news to him" since Moran's attorney had advocated for it at the Planning Board meeting less than three weeks prior. But he would certainly take that message back to the board, which has sole authority to change the URDL.

Councilwoman Bevins, who makes the final decision on zoning changes in her district, had not revealed her decision for the property in question, but said she was not considering the possibility of the URDL being moved and shared that with the developer in asking him to go back to the drawing board.

Because of this work, acres could be turned back to conservation and the URDL remains intact," Bevins commented. "Only 19 homes would be built, selling at over \$400,000. These are the types of projects I hope to accomplish through this process.

from raising money for their party during session.

Cluster already has good relationships with the other District 8 delegates and with Senator Kathy

Klausmeier, and hopes that will make the transition somewhat easier.

In regards to what you can expect from Cluster, he plans to follow his father's example while being a bit more outspoken.

"My father was not a very political person," said Cluster. "He was there to serve the people and look after constituents. I'm a bit more political, but sometimes it's about the community first and politics second, and that's something I'll try to emulate."

Cluster stated that he wants "good government bills" to be his focus for the legislative session. He said he wants to work to impose term limits and enact salary and pension reform.

"This is a part-time position, it shouldn't be a career," said Cluster. "It should be something you do for a little then get out."

In regards to legislator salaries, Cluster thinks they need to be tied to an index. After the session begins on Jan. 11, you can expect Cluster to introduce legislation that would tie legislator pay to the average single family income.

Cluster also stated that it was wrong that legislators can buy into the pension program if they don't last the eight years necessary to receive a pension.

"We need to reform the way this legislature has given itself these perks," said Cluster. "I don't think it'll be very popular but it's something I'm looking at. And if I get down there and it turns out these are things that are already being worked on, then I'll gladly work with whoever. I think I have a good relationship with people down there because I've been around for a while. I have a good number of relationships."



Everyone nowadays has total access to the law through the Internet - you can find individuals' accounts of their experiences in court, the e-way to file, legal brief synopses and more. There are blogs, statute postings, law firm websites, lawyer rating or referral sites, case search and case archive sites, all easily found. You can find online contracts, leases or even drafted complaints

These can be excellent sources of information, but there are dangers in relying on self-research for your own legal issue or in preparing a legal document. Our bottom line: what you discover "Googling the law" should NOT be counted on as legal advice!

Here's why. The law is largely specific to a jurisdiction. A Marylander researching an impending divorce might find a thorough discussion on AVVO of the splitting of property. But if the information is from a California attorney, it would most likely be completely inapplicable because California (a "community property" state) divides marital property differently than does Maryland.

Also, it is not uncommon for people empowered by online legal info to feel competent to pursue their own legal matters in court. But individuals representing themselves may likely overlook a cause of action or a defense, they may fail to file helpful motions or they may miss important filing dates. Certainly, it is not difficult to copy what's online to produce a legal document. But in repurposing such for your own use, you might include disadvantageous provisions ("foreign jurisdiction" dispute resolution), or you might omit important terms required under Maryland law.






