Congratulations to Hopkins County's Buddy and Ina Gore and Psalms 100 for being the 2016 recipients of the "Joe Paul Nichols" Lifetime Achievement Award. It was presented to them at the annual convention of the International Country Gospel Music Association, which honors the best of the best in the country-gospel music genre. And as you know, behind every award is a story, or two or three! Buddy and Ina's story wouldn't be complete without including country-gospel artist and friend Joe Paul Nichols and the ICGMA organization.

Ina Delozier always loved to sing gospel music, and she had a group called Psalms 100 in the 1970's even before her husband Buddy joined the band in 1982. During part of that time she was working at KPLT Radio in 💋 Paris and co-produced The Red River Jamboree. That's where she met Joe Paul when he played in the Tony Douglas "Shrimpers" Band. They re-mained friends over the years. Later, Joe Paul formed his well-known touring band and called themselves "Joe Paul Nichols and His Five Pennies." He recorded both country and gospel music and later joined the ICGMA membership where he was an active member and later inducted into the ICGMA Hall of Fame .

He also loved Western Swing music, performing at fairs, rodeos, conventions and dances all over the country. He performed at the Reilly Springs Jamboree, the Big D Jamboree and other oprys. However, Joe Paul was a Christian first and a musician second, and although he sometimes performed in venues where alcohol was served, he was never known to take even one drink. During much of his adult life he served as Music Minister at his church in Jacksboro, Texas, the same church he was raised in and that his father was pastor. His musical career and ministry yielded hundreds of country and gospel songs, some of which he had written. He remained active with his church and the ICGMA after he lost his singing voice due to ALS and cancer, until his death in 2011.

Because of his contribution to and dedication in the preservation of Christian Country Gospel Music, the Joe Paul Nichols Lifetime Achievement Award was created the following year.

According to Buddy Gore, they are pleased and honored to accept the prestigious award. Since 1982, Buddy and Ina have been members of the ICGMA organization. It originated in Texas, founded in 1956 by Billy Thompson with co-founders Billy Holcomb and Wendy Duvall. In 2010 the Convention was moved to West Plains, Missouri, home of singers Porter Wagoner and Norma Jean. Dan Duncan who owns a TV station in West Plains is the current president.

Psalms 100 has received other recognition as Vocalists, Band ,Promoter, Songwriter and Song of the Year awards. Today, they have a new home base for their Psalms 100 Gospel Opry concerts. It's the McClanahan Life Center 💋 in Emory, Texas, located behind House of Prayer on FM 515. You can enjoy country-gospel music on the third-Saturday of each month at 6:30pm.

Until next week, I'll watch for you at the corral gate. Honk when you go by, and watch for children getting off the school bus. School is starting! For your spare time, here's some country wisdom to ponder.



ALPACAS IN THE TEXAS MOUNTAINS Tumbleweed Smith



Heidi and Scott Wasserman both teach at Sul Ross State University in Alpine. When they're not involved in academic pursuits, they take care of a number of dogs, chickens, alpacas and donkeys on their acreage near town.

"I have one donkey that was born here," says Heidi. "She owns the place and is like the ranch manager."

They got the donkeys first.

"We got a free donkey who arrived pregnant and now we have five donkeys. They're all special and each one has its own personality. We have one giant donkey from France that was used on farms to pull plows and do things that tractors do now."

They saw their first alpaca at a fair in Michigan in 2001.

"You see an alpaca you're automatically enamored with them. I've wanted one ever since. We didn't get any until we put down roots here. We've lived here longer than we've lived any place else. We got our alpacas in 2012."

They have nine alpacas now. Heidi calls them ambassadors for kids.

"We do field trips and host kids birthday parties. We bring them out and the kids get hands on and take adorable pictures. Wonderful things happen when you put kids and animals together."

The animals are popular around Alpine.

"Chewbacca is an old mammoth donkey who's nineteen or twenty years old. He carries Mary at the live nativity every year. We did a trunk or treat for a church around Halloween and we dressed our grey alpaca up as Count Alpacula. I did a valentine promotion last year and called it 'alpaca your present.' The alpaca we used has a registered name of 'Dubadee-doo-dah.' So Dubadee-doo-dah and I delivered Valentine's Day presents to people. We went to a hair salon and a school. A policeman saw us walking an alpaca down the sidewalk. He just shook his head and smiled."

A store on the premises carries alpaca items imported from Peru.

"They produce a hollow fiber that has thermal properties like a thermal window with two panes of glass. You can have something that's very lightweight but really really warm."

Heidi and Scott took me to the barn where an alpaca and a chicken seemed to be carrying on a conversation. Interesting sounds around their place. The donkeys bray real loud. They love their animals and have no intentions of selling them.

"It's funny," says Heidi. "We draw people in with the alpacas. People are really curious about them. But people leave loving the donkeys." www.tumbleweedsmith.com

Famous Texans



Christopher Scott "Chris" Kyle (April 8, 1974 – February 2, 2013) was a United States Navy SEAL veteran and sniper. Kyle served four tours a United States Navy SEAL veteran and sniper. Kyle served four tours in the Iraq War and was awarded several commendations for acts of heroism and meritorious service in combat. He was awarded one Silver Star Medal, four Bronze Star Medals with "V" devices, a Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal and numerous other unit and personal awards. Kyle was honorably discharged from the U.S. Navy in 2009 and published his bestselling autobiography, American Sniper, in 2012. An eponymous film adaptation of Kyle's book, directed by Clint Eastwood, was released two years later. On February 2, 2013, Kyle was murdered by Eddie Ray Routh at a shooting range near Chalk Mountain, Texas. A former Marine with PTSD, Routh was found guilty and sentenced to life in prison without parole. in prison without parole.


Kyle was born in Odessa, Texas, the first of two boys born to Deby Lynn (née Mercer) and Wayne Kenneth Kyle, a Sunday school teacher and deacon. Kyle's father bought his son his first rifle at 8 years old, a bolt-action .30-06 Springfield rifle, and later a shotgun, with which they hunted deer, pheasant, and quail. Kyle and his brother grew up raising up to 150 bead of actual at a time. Kyle attended bish school in Midlethian to 150 head of cattle at a time. Kyle attended high school in Midlothian, Texas, and after graduating, became a professional bronco rodeo rider and ranch hand, but his professional rodeo career ended abruptly when he severely injured his arm. Military career

After his arm healed, Kyle went to a military recruiting office, inter-ested in joining the U.S. Marine Corps special operations. A U.S. Navy recruiter convinced him to try, instead, for the SEALs. Initially, Kyle was rejected because of the pins in his arm, but he eventually received an in-vitation to the 24-week Basic Underwater Demolition SEAL school (BUDS), which he joined in 1999. Assigned to SEAL Team 3, sniper element, platoon "Charlie" (later "Cadillac"), within the Naval Special Warfare Command, and with four tours of duty. Kyle served in many major battles of the Irag War. His first

"Cadillac"), within the Naval Special Warfare Command, and with four tours of duty, Kyle served in many major battles of the Iraq War. His first long-range kill shot was taken during the initial invasion when he shot a woman approaching a group of Marines while carrying a hand grenade. CNN reported that the woman was cradling a toddler in her other hand. As ordered, Kyle opened fire, killing the woman before she could attack. He later stated, "the woman was already dead. I was just making sure she didn't take any Marines with her. It was clear that not only did she want to kill them, but she didn't care about anybody else nearby who would have been blown up by the grenade or killed in the firefight. Chil-dren on the street, people in the houses, maybe her child." Because of his track record as a marksman during his deployment to Ramadi, the insurgents named Kyle Shaitan Ar-Ramadi (English: "The Devil of Ramadi"), and put a \$21,000 bounty on his head that was later increased to \$80,000. They posted signs highlighting the cross on his arm as a means of identifying him. In his book, American Sniper, Kyle describes his longest successful shot: in 2008, outside Sadr City, he killed an insurgent sniper aiming at other members of the US

other members of the US military with "a straight-up luck shot" from his McMillan Tac-338 sniper rifle from about 2,100 yards (1,920 m) away.

Kyle became known as "The Legend" among the general infantry and Marines he was tasked to protect. The nickname originated among Kyle's fellow SEALs following his taking of a sabbatical to train other snipers in Fallujah, and he was sometimes called "The Myth".
