First Tee Open is an official PGA TOUR Champions event that will be held September 13-18 and televised internationally on Golf Channel.

Castro will join 79 other participants from The First Tee chapters for the event, which is in its 13th year. Castro, a junior at Evergreen Valley High School, is an Ace participant and a junior coach at The First Tee of Silicon Valley. She competes on her school's varsity golf team and serves as the Secretary for her school's Golf Club and Art for Foster Care Club.

Evergreen Valley parks have enchanting secrets for you to find and explore

hose of us who live in the Silicon Valley are often over connected with the invisible bandwidths of cell phones, deadlines, financial challenges and the truly important need for strengthening our ties with friends and family.

Cars make noise and the hustle and bustle of our lives combined with electronic imagery and tone can at times nag at us. Is it possible that unlike no other time in history there is a pull inside us

choose to watch video news and view texts voraciously.

Our parks offer us the opportunity of a restful retreat from the accoutrements of the electronic. Personal healthy outdoor time nurtures our ability to unplug and commune with nature. Visiting parklands encourages us to turn off our cellphones. We need no permission.

This article is written to help our community in exploring our Evergreen city parks nestled close by. We can venture out and visit these new places by picking up our car keys or hopping on a bike to say hello to some parks that we never knew were always waiting for us just around the corner.

What are the boundaries of our Evergreen **Community**?

The Evergreen Area is generally defined as the space north to south from Tully Road to San Felipe Road and east to west from our soft flowing east foothills down through the valley stopping along the running man made boundary of highway 101. To see the nice overview map of all our park locations one can google-type "San Jose Parks in Evergreen Area." We embark now on our eagle like flight to each park to give you the reader fun and enjoyable insights for possible visits.

An overview of wonderful Evergreen Parks to visit with your family

Two Parks In One: By driving up Tully Road toward the foothills about a mile up from White road, just past Ruby Road the road turns to the right and its name changes to Murillo. Here we find the big grass area with softball field and nice



basketball court to the right called Groesbeck Hill Park (26.6 acres). There is a country-like, farm-like atmosphere where trails subtly go up the soft sloping Groesbeck Hill. As you stroll you see the wonderful overlook of San Jose. It's curious that the author sees a family flying a drone today, making a hovering sound like a giant bee whereas the old fashioned kites fly quietly and offer more tranquility. Our world is changing. Hiking a short distance frees us from the noises of the city.

Be sure to find the giant compass and buy a kite for the kids to fly here: When you go far up Aborn Road to our east foothills you'll turn on Mosher road and drive around the big circle. In that circle of 18 palm trees there are well groomed bushes and you see small neighborhood groups with music and joy practicing ballroom dancing at times, which remind the author of how people live and play in parts of Europe.

Just up the way you realize you are just at the base of the

Evergreen foothills and the rolling undulating hills remind you of scoops of melted ice cream in a bowl. The welcoming elements of the landscape seem to be saying "we have been here a long time before you and will stay the way we have always been, welcome, and it is good for you to slow down and relax.

Located next to one of the premier middle schools in all of California, Chaboya, which is

well run by Principal Watkins, you will find the expansive Fowler Creek Park (9.5 acres). Fowler Park has tennis courts open to the public, bocce ball courts, a gazebo that can be rented for parties or used anytime when not rented, BBQ's, two playgrounds, and don't forget the giant compass. One of the two child playgrounds is traditional and the other is abstract looking. It reminds this writer of the expressionist artist Miro in the way the playground has swirling balancing and climbing challenges for children.

Walking up towards the steps to the Compass, you are met with a panoramic view of all of San Jose. Children can figure out by looking at the details in the cement which direction certain landmarks are found in our Santa Clara valley. One knows that the valley is unique for it is friendly, smooth and vast. The inviting, embracing atmosphere of the of the shape of the Evergreen Valley landscape lends itself to increased understanding of its value and reaffirms it as a desired living place both today and in years and decades to arrive.

Walking back to the car one notices a warm natural breeze that plays with your hair and it reminds all that it is good to bring a kite here, for the subtle breezes are constant year round, rolling down off the smoothly sculpted foothills like an ocean wave being pulled back into the sea.

The Thrilling Three Children's Cement Slides: Landscaped like a lagoon between two schools (Silver Creek High School and Montgomery Elementary School) Brigadoon Park (5.5 acres) is a hidden gem. The children's playground is for the little ones, themed with anchor ships for climbing and behind is a hill in the shape of the back of a galleon where two walkways extend to the right and left. Children that are just a bit older don't know they get exercise by walking up the hills to ride inside the



crafted cement slides that are unlike anything they have seen or experienced. The slides are about four or five times longer than usual and offer a chance for the younger ones to be a bit daring in riding down while building up their strength of independence. Using their ingenuity the children sometimes sit on cardboard which in some physics way allows them to pick up speed with their newly discovered friend yet some-See PARKS, page 8

Editor,

The terrorist attacks that shook our nation on September 11, 2001, also brought about the deadliest day in U.S. law enforcement history, killing 72 law enforcement officers. While it has been 15 years since that horrific day, the passage of time has not diminished our dedication to honor the memory of those

fallen heroes.

The names of these 72 law enforcement officers are all engraved together on Panels 9 through 22, on Line 23 of the west wall, in addition to the names of 13 officers who died from subsequent illnesses related to rescue and recovery efforts.

They smoothly slide down the gangplank (so to speak) to arrive back into the toddler playground area where moms and dads are tending to the younger children. Then, since there are three different cement slides on the hill, they trounce back up the hill to ride them all again! Adjacent are large grass fields, picnic

tables and BBQ for public use.

A Beginning Skateboard Area Kindly Guarded by Snakes and Dragons: Tucked away in the commerce area of shopping centers and such, you will find beautiful cement snakes and a dragon for the tiny tots to crawl on and explore. West Evergreen Park (about a half-acre) is a small sized park that has five cement tables and lots of sitting areas. For the skateboard learner there is a very professional area with four well designed structures for jumping, ramping, skidding, and each lined with steel so best to use helmet and knee pads. This skateboard area looks to be a good place for dads and moms to bring their child over to when they are learning how to skateboard and wishing to push it up a bit to the next level. It is a beginner place and compactly well designed. Before you leave make sure to rub your hand on the beautiful bejeweled ceramic tile work on the snakes. don't be afraid to pet the cement dragon too.

The Big Giant Grassy Area: Since this park is adjacent to the Quimby Oak Middle School it doubles the spacious feeling of all the school grass area adjacent to the park. At Boggini Park (10 acres) it's nice to experience the open feeling of grass turf and easy to strike up a claim by sitting down anywhere to play, rest and reflect. The park has two children playgrounds a public bathroom and some BBQ pits.

Give Mother Nature All The Credit In The Design: A secret treasure of rest and relaxation Evergreen Park (15 acres) is found on San Felipe Road behind Evergreen Community Center. While you are there you can pick up a booklet that will allow you to read about the activities offered in the way of classes (something for everyone). A circular cement trail allows you to walk around the park and leashed dogs are welcome too. The children play on the expansive well maintained grass field and playground. As you walk up a slightly inclined hill you will have nice BBQ pits and benches to overlook the park.

What a great place to relax, cook, celebrate a party and let the children play. It seems there is a connection here with the Native Americans who walked before us for the small stream that only flows water in the winter seems to expressing something. For ages and ages the trees have given away the secret of the direction the crick, for they line up at attention along its banks as the creek bed moves from high areas to twist and turn lazily in visiting the lower regions.

A special tip to all is that on Saturdays there is one of the most wonderful kid's soccer coaches in the world and it is here on the park grass where he teaches "Kids Love Soccer." If ever you have the chance to enroll your son



or daughter in that program you will marvel at the ambassador of zeal and kindness named Coach Scott who helps all children in their introduction to the sport of soccer at this park. It is fun just to watch the joy of learning taking place. It is nice to experience and see that many people do their jobs for the love of it, which is especially seen in the art of coaching. It reaffirms this intangible thing referred to as humanity.

As you exit the park just across the street from the shopping center, you will see the one wing sculpture honoring Montgomery, that man who long ago was thinking along the same lines as our Silicon Valley professionals in exploring things. He made fifty airplane flights here in a glider. Why not take time to visit the sculpture and read the hidden sentences which are engraved on the bricks as you walk to this small remembrance of the man who like a winged creature took flight here.

Who Was First To Fly Like A Bird? History can be elusive as you visit and walk where glider airplanes first flew. Lots of sharing and borrowing of ideas was done during the time of the Wright Brothers, but should they take the bulk of the credit. The art and refinement of flying and getting a contraption called a glider to lift a person in the air took shape here. Located on the foothills on the back side of Evergreen Valley College are nice walking trails and you stand where it all took place. This is Montgomery Hill Park (8 acres). The rolling hills offer all a nice place to walk, jog and bike and some of them are steep. In addition, these foothills are also the place where great cross country teams run and practice to compete at highest of levels. In the spring the flowers are beautiful to see on the hillside.

Very Close Yet Hidden From Sight: As one drives south on White Road and crosses over Aborn Road the name of the road changes to San Felipe Road. As you pass the Evergreen College and the San Jose Community Center on your left, just a half mile more, past the Villages, ahead, fifty yards, you take a quick right turn on Larkspur Canyon Drive. The hidden park on your right offers a panoramic view that overlooks the back side of the Evergreen foothills. Canyon Creek Park (37 acres) has a grass area shaped like a gigantic kidney swimming pool. There is a child playground where it is said the little ones love the bucket swing seats and some picnic tables and benches that help one take in the pleasant views. Looking down from the overlook there is a cement footpath that wraps along the hillside and this is part of the expansive park trail area. It is something else to explore on another trip, perhaps a bike ride or walk, yet it looks a bit rough in parts so See PARKS, next page

A Giant Rectangle With Trails: Perhaps it gets its name from its



Mayor Liccardo not happy with San Jose Police recruiting trip to Hawaii

aying it is "not a good use" of taxpayer dollars, San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo is not happy with the time, money and results of a recent Hawaii recruiting trip to Hawaii that cost taxpayers more than \$40,000.

"I'm no expert when it comes to police recruiting, but I would not have used public dollars for a recruiting trip to Hawaii." "Based on the numbers we see today, it was not a good use of the public dollars."

Eleven San Jose police officers boarded planes in May and flew to Hawaii in search of new recruits for a total of 11 days. There, officers attended two job fairs to bring

back academy recruits. The officers stayed at the beautiful Waikiki Beach Marriott Resort and Spa.

SJPD recruiters decided to attend the Hawaii trip based on a March 12 email from a mystery person because, according to sources, the author's name was removed from the email. The trip went unnoticed with little scrutiny as the was put together quickly.

In Hawaii, three officers were instructed to build a build a sixfoot obstacle course to test applicants. Lt. Heather Randol, manager of San Jose's recruitment division, says it was "not a vacation" but rather "a long and tiring trip."

The number of SJPD streetready officers total 814, with nearly 200 vacancies.

Government representatives from the city of San Jose, of California participated in



Reasons military veterans make top notch employees

Special to the times oliticians call them heroes and strangers thank them for their service.

But when their enlistment comes to an end, veterans need more than a pat on the back as they return to civilian life. They need jobs.

And increasingly, they seem to be getting them because the unemployment rate among veterans has been on the decline in recent vears.

"I think in the last several years there has been a focus on the importance of hiring veterans and many businesses have taken that to heart," says Nick Baucom, a U.S. Marine veteran who makes hiring veterans a priority for his company, Two Marines Moving.

"But probably the biggest reason that the unemployment rate for veterans has trended downward is that, as a group, veterans bring with them experience and attitudes that make them great employees."

Baucom says there are several reasons veterans make topnotch employees, including:

• Their tenacity. Veterans know what perseverance is all about, if for no other reason than they survived boot camp, an arduous challenge that puts a person's fortitude to to the test. Marines, for example, must prove they can hike 20 miles carrying a fully loaded pack.

• Their decisiveness. People in the military don't always have the luxury of taking all day to analyze a situation before making a decision. Yes, they must gather data and understand it thoroughly - but they understand the need to do it expediently. "A 90 percent solution now is better than a 100 percent solution later," Baucom says. "Both in the Marines and in the business world, I've found that waiting for that 100 percent solution just leads to paralysis.'

• Their initiative. Anyone in the military learns to follow orders. But they also understand that there are situations when they need to take action in the absence of orders. If something needs to be done, they don't have to wait to be told.

Nick Baucom is the founder and owner of Two Marines Moving (www.twomarinesmoving.com), a moving company that has operations in the Washington, D.C., area and Miami. Baucom, who also is author of "On the Move: A Marine's Guide to Entrepreneurial Success," served in the U.S. Marines from 2002 to 2008, and was in Iraq in 2003.

Egyptian mummy's face recreated with 3D printing

Times staff writer n Egyptian mummy's head and face have been reconstructed with forensic science and 3D printing.

The final rendition offers scientists and the pubic a tantalizing glimpse of the individual's life and death.

The mummified head was discovered by accident in Australia at the University of Melbourne. A museum curator found the remains and sent it for a computed tomography (CT) scan for preservation.

A university team used the scans to create a 3D-printed replica of the mummy's skull, and a detailed study of the specimen's facialbone features including the size and angle of the jaw and eye sockets.

It was determined that the head belonged to a female, named Meritamun who died at the age of 25. Here death was important enough to be mummified nearly 2,000 years ago.

From the distinctive style of the linen bandaging and embalming of the specimen, the researchers think Meritamun was mummified in Egypt and that she may have lived at least 2,000 years ago. They will now use radiocarbon dating to date the specimen more precisely, the scientists said.

Scientists believe Meritamun was suffering from a thinning skull bone brought about by anemia and dental pathologies.

CA Department of Education test results: East Side Union High School District 'uptrend'

he California Department of Education released its CAASPP.

The CAASPP are from the Smarter Balance Assessment Consortium (SBAC). The CAASPP replaced the former California Standard Test (CST) during the 2014-15 school year.

The 2015-16 school year marked the second year that students took the SBAC in English Language Arts and Math. The 2014-15 results established the new baseline for performance and trends.

Tests include performance tasks that challenge students to demonstrate critical thinking and problem-solving, and to apply their knowledge and skills to real-world problems.

The following is an executive summary of the CAASPP scores from Spring 2015 for East Side Union High School District (ESUHSD) and five demographically comparable districts (Sweetwater Union, Antelope Valley, Kern Union, Oxnard Union, Anaheim Union).

ESUHSD Key Highlights and Trends:

ESUHSD had a higher percentage of 11th grade students scoring "meeting or exceeding standard" in both English Language Arts (ELA) and Math (2016 vs 2015)

30 percent of 11th graders scored "college ready" in ELA

63 percent of students met or exceeded the standard in ELA (+3 percent vs 2015)

19 percent of 11th graders scored

"college ready" in Math

40 percent of students met or exceeded the standard in Math (+1 percent vs 2015)


Comparable Districts: ESUHSD had a higher percentage of students "meeting or exceeding standard" than the 5 comparable districts in both ELA and Math.

To help streamline student performance goals, the District has developed the Graduate Profile, a document to support ESUHSD's efforts to implement their strategic plan and realize their mission and expectations for all students. This incorporates the District's core values, state standards, state assessment frameworks, and the 5 C's for students as Communicators, Critical Thinkers, Collaborators, Creators and Community Members.

"We are pleased with the uptrends in the 2016 CAASPP results and are very proud of our students, but we know that there's still work to be done to reach a higher level of college and careerready students," said Chris D. Funk, ESUHSD Superintendent. "The Graduate Profile is an extension of our efforts to align our core values with student performance results."

Martha's Kitchen, a non-profit hot meal soup kitchen in Willow Glen, is keenly aware of this crisis and wants to assist these students.

Edita Cruz, Executive Director of Martha's Kitchen states, "Various studies that have been reported in the Mercury News and other media outlets found that as many as one in four students in higher institutions experience food insecurity."

Cruz continues, "To address this issue we are turning to social media, passing out flyers, and using old fashioned word of mouth to tell people that Martha's Kitchen welcomes students needing a meal anytime during our hours of operation."

This approach is a throwback to the Depression era. Martha's Kitchen will gladly open its doors to make it convenient for low-income students to have a meal regardless of their class schedule.

Cruz states, "This grass-roots approach to feed students is just one of many steps Martha's Kitchen has taken to put a dent in the serious problem of hunger in the Bay Area and surrounding counties. Our near term goal is to serve one million meals annuSome local college students have struggled to get their basic needs met while trying to gain a education. Several students, who have been forced to live in their cars close to campus, are also having food insecurity issues.






