# The Evolution of by Kristin Luna bonnaroo

**In its 15th year, Manchester's own music fest returns with a bigger lineup — and more offerings than ever.**

When the creators of the short-lived Itchycoo Park chose Manchester as the site of their music festival at the turn of the millennium, that decision was no doubt met with some raised eyebrows. Who could blame the critics? After all, it was the dawn of Napster and online streaming, and the founders were already dealing with a rapidly changing music industry while targeting an older—or at least, different—demographic than your typical camping festival traveler while focusing on artists popular in the groovy 70's and the ballad-filled 80's (think: Sammy Hagar, STYX, John Kay & Steppenwolf).

Not to mention, they chose to do so on a 700-acre farm with very little infrastructure located a half hour outside of the nearest mid-sized city.

And though that particular endeavor flopped famously, the small, 10,000-person community found its way onto the global map nevertheless thanks to the success of Bonnaroo, which picked up where Itchycoo left off—only with bigger, better and more thoughtful aspirations—in 2002. Only a year after its first go, Bonnaroo drew in such acts as 2003 Flaming Lips, Neil Young & Crazy Horse and James Brown; 14 years following that, it not only continues to thrive, but grow.



Bonnaroo accomplished what Itcyhoo could not: fill a void the festival community was clearly lacking. Nowadays, 100,000 music lovers descend upon Coffee County every June to take part in the fun. Jeff Cuellar, Bonnaroo's director of community relations and parent company AC Entertainment's director of connectivity, attributes the success and ability to span the test of time to the creation of community.

"In an age of technology, that deeper sense of connection is what truly separates Bonnaroo from a lot of other festivals that are out there," says Cuellar, who has been with the organization since it first started. "From the beginning, we realized we were already tapping into a community, and our role has always been



to foster it. Yes, putting amazing bands on the stage is part of that mix. Yes, having the elements you have to in order to create a city are all part of that mix. But really looking upon all the elements that allow the people to get together and harmonize in a way that your traditional event does not."

Bonnaroo has managed to do what once seemed impossible: bring together a variety of music lovers across genres, from pop, rock, R&B, rap and hip-hop to Americana, bluegrass and country. The 2016 lineup is the perfect example of the festival's diversity with what may be its most well-rounded mix yet: Pearl Jam, Dead & Company (former Grateful Dead members with John Mayer behind the mic), LCD Soundsystem, J. Cole and Ellie Goulding are top billed, while Macklemore, Chris Stapleton, Grace Potter, Haim, Judd Apatow, Sam Hunt,

## Sustainability By The Numbers

*Bonnaroo has long been committed to promoting sustainable living, but 2015 was a banner year for such efforts.*

- 29,000 pounds of food was recovered during the festival and distributed to Meadow Senior Home, Ridge Crest Mental Health Home, Grundy County Jail and a number of summer programs for kids.
- 40+ sustainable food badges were distributed to vendors; to earn this recognition, vendors either had to offset their travel to the site or use at least 60 percent organic or local products.
- \$10,000 was given to Eat for Equity and Oxfam after the success of their second BonnaROOTS dinner series.
- 9 solar phone charging stations were added to The Farm, and Bonnaroo's solar-powered stage ran on a mobile solar generator for the entire run of show during the festival.
- 100 low-income Coffee County residents received free energy-saving upgrades, including installation of energy-saving light bulbs, low-flow sink aerators and insulation for water pipes.
- 20.21 tons of cardboard and 2.71 tons of PVC was hauled to Coffee County Recycling.
- 8.25 tons of tarps, tents, and other usable goods were collected and donated to Gear Closet and other local groups for reuse.
- 4.18 tons of used cooking oil was diverted and collected by Yellow Dog Renewables to be processed into biodiesel.

# FIFTEEN YEARS OF MAGIC

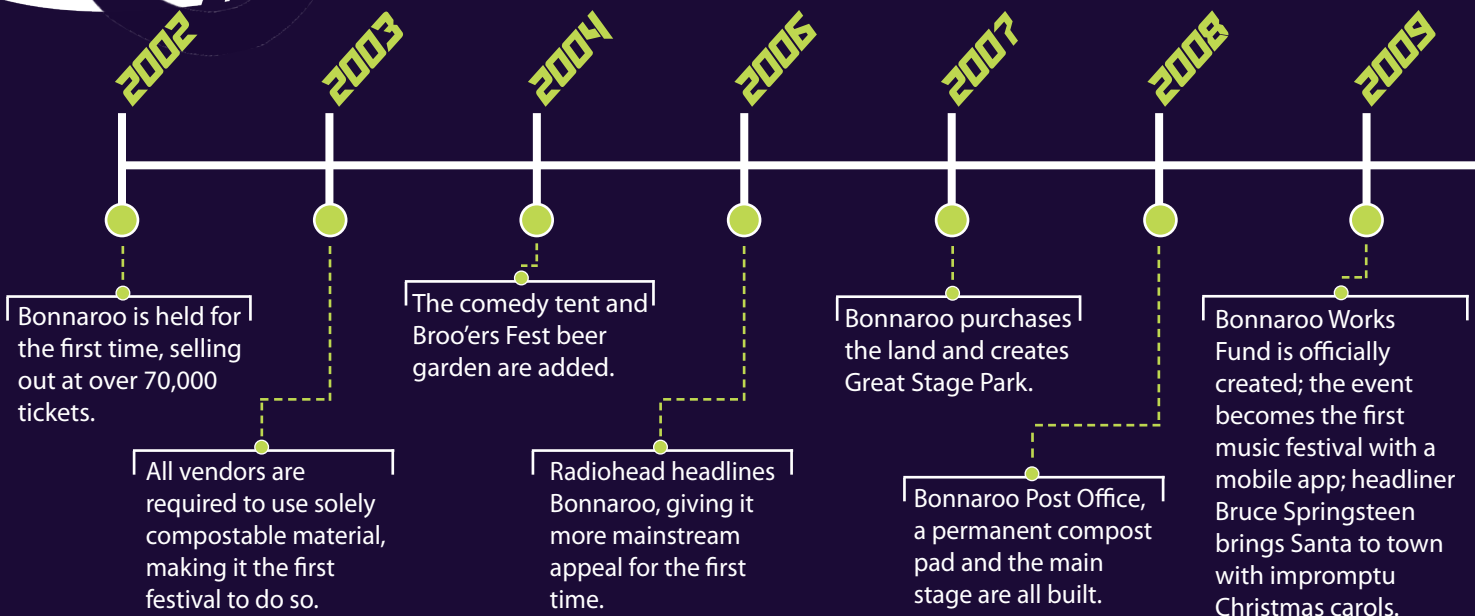
Jason Isbell and an additional 150 acts will also take their turn on stage at various points throughout the four-day event.

“Our goal was always bringing together artists who have a true commanding of the stage, know how to put on a great show, that are out there hustling and that thrive on the live performance,” Cuellar says. “Early on, we were

dubbed as a jam band festival, but we’ve always been more than that—we’ve always been a melting pot of music.”

Music, however, is only one piece of a much larger, more complex puzzle, Cuellar says. The first few years in existence, Bonnaroo channeled much of its efforts toward establishing a fan base, then between 2007 and 2008, the company fully committed to Manchester by purchasing the land and created Great Stage Park. From there, it was a snowball effect: More and more were added like a post office—Bonnaroo is the only festival with one, not to mention it boasts its own official indicia—built from all recycled and/or natural materials, a compost pad and a permanent stage; the Bonnaroo Works Fund (now a 501c3) quickly followed. Sustainability and giving back have always

been a key part of Bonnaroo's mantra, Cuellar says, and in the first decade alone, it donated more than \$5 million to local, regional and national charities and organizations.

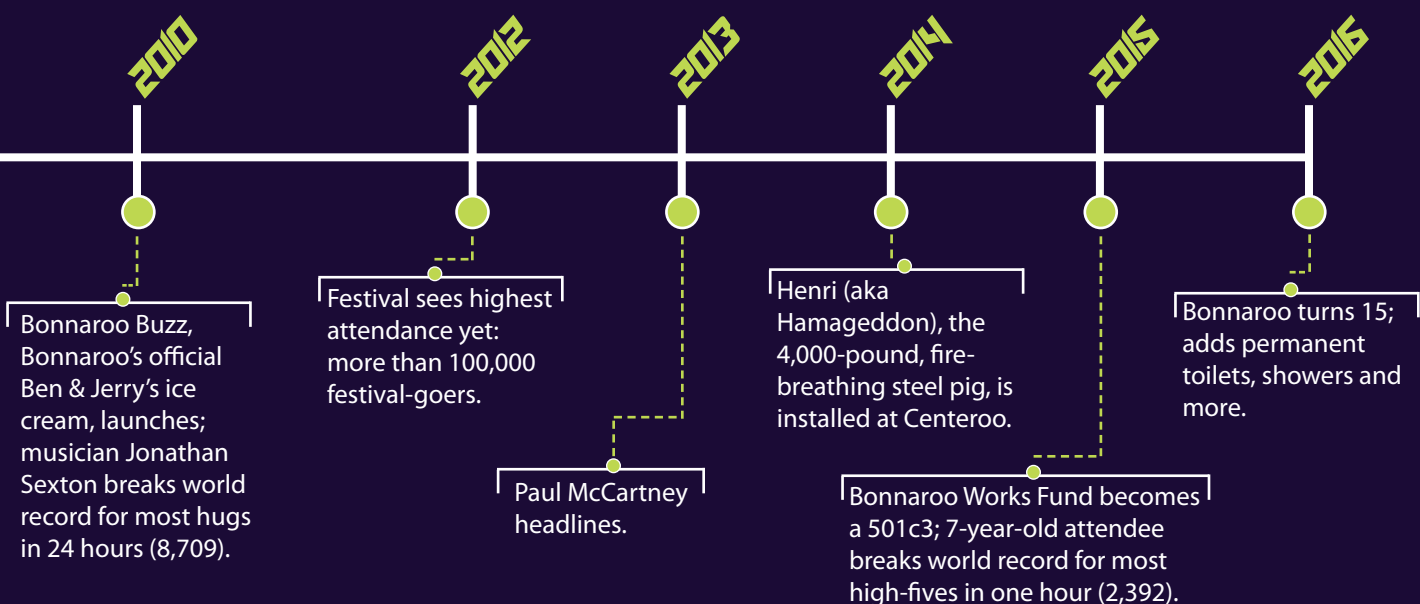
In more recent years, there's been a big shift to quality food with the Oxfam America and Eat for Equity's BonnaROOTS Community Dinners and more than 50 options available in the Food Truck Oasis; past favorites include Prater's BBQ, chili poutine, Spicy Pie gourmet pizza, Korean BBQ, tamales and, of course, Baconland whose flights of bacon sell more quickly than they can be prepared.

"I live in Chicago, and I have some of the best food in the world at my fingertips, but I eat better at Bonnaroo than I do all year round," Cuellar says. "Top to bottom, from farm-to-table cooking right down to the simpler things like Amish doughnuts, vegan to carnivores, the options are almost endless. There's a cross between knowing our fans are coming from all over the

world but also giving them a bit of the South so they're getting a flavor of Tennessee."

But what about the next 15 years of Bonnaroo—where does a festival of this size go from here? Cuellar says "fine tuning" the current product is always top priority, though he adds that the new partnership—Live Nation acquired a controlling interest in 2015—has allowed Bonnaroo to look at infrastructure in a new way and turn its sights on expansion. Already, permanent toilets and showers have been added, and this continuum may include more audience-curated camping options (not to mention, additional events throughout the year) could help draw in new festival-goers.

"We always have to think: 'What are those things that we can do that can help foster community and enhance the experience in some way?'" Cuellar says. "In the end, though, it's mostly about having a great time, doing something good and really having an experience with each other."







# You Don't Know JACK

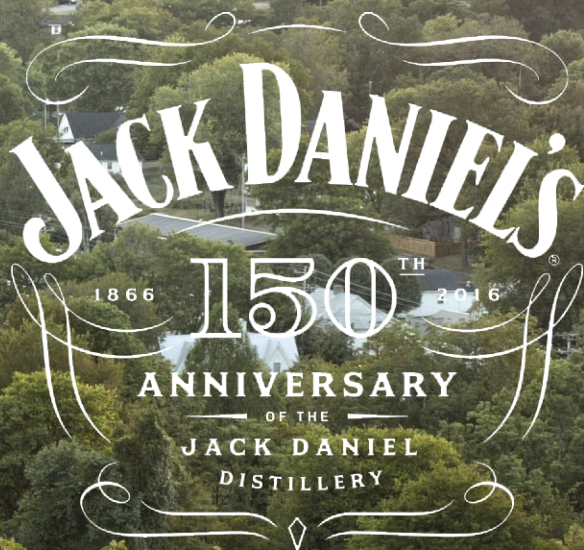
You can't step foot into a well-stocked bar anywhere in the world without seeing Jack Daniel's recognizable black label peering back at you. It's not only the most widely known whiskey brand, but the Lynchburg-based distillery is also one of the biggest drivers of tourism in Tennessee with more than 250,000 people visiting annually.

And through 2016, it will commemorate a major milestone: turning 150 years old.

Born in 1849, Jasper "Jack" Daniel stumbled upon a gold mine as a teen—a limestone water source flowing from a cave spring—in the tiny town of Lynchburg and was wise enough to plant his flag in the form of a distillery, which was officially registered by the U.S. Government in 1866 and is now listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Though the famed purveyor of whiskey passed away in the early part of the 20th century, the process he perfected is still in use today: Each Jack Daniel's barrel is meticulously crafted so that every last drop of whiskey is mellowed through 10 feet of charcoal.

"In a world where change is a constant, it is an incredible achievement to be making whiskey in the same way, in the same place, after 150 years," said

Mark McCallum, President of Jack Daniel's. "I believe the endurance and success of Jack Daniel's is the result of our ability to continue to operate according to Mr. Jack's lifelong motto: 'Every day we make it, we'll make it the best we can.'"

Tours of the grounds are offered daily year round and include visits to the barrelhouse, which stores more than 20,000 barrels, the rickyard, the underground spring and The White Rabbit Saloon. And this year alone, the oldest registered distillery in the United States also will pay homage to its heritage through a number of special birthday events.

"During this milestone anniversary, we will celebrate our history, traditions and values by continuing to tell the unique and powerful stories that make Jack Daniel's the unique and very special global brand that it is today," McCallum continues. "We are looking forward to delighting our brand fans all over the world in some very special ways to celebrate this milestone for Jack Daniel's."

Though the distillery underwent a \$103 million expansion just three years ago, plans for an additional \$37 million expansion to keep up with increased demand were recently unveiled. The renovations include building two new barrelhouses, expanding the existing bottling facility to add more capacity and, in turn, create more jobs.

# ON SACRED GROUND

Manchester's own state park, a favorite among history buffs thanks to its Native American heritage dating back two millennia, turns 50.

Manchester sits near the largest and most complex hilltop enclosure in the South, and many locals go a lifetime without discovering the beauty of what's hailed as one of the most spectacularly sited sacred areas of its period.

Named for a particular kind of Native American mound site, the 50-acre Old Stone Fort State Archaeological Park contains a ceremonial site that was established during the Middle Woodland Period, roughly 2,000 years ago, and used through the 5th century A.D.

"We were the first official state archaeological park in Tennessee and one of only two currently in existence. We celebrated our 50th anniversary earlier this year," says Park Manager Keith Wimberley. "The cultural aspect of Old Stone Fort is what brings so many visitors here, and our scenic beauty is right up there with any park in the state."

Since the site itself hails from a pre-historic era, much about the Native American rituals are left up to interpretation, but

characteristics of the Woodland Period flank the waterfront trail, and park visitors will find a set of parallel mound walls oriented to within one degree of the summer solstice sunrise at the narrow neck of land before the Little Duck and Duck rivers meet.

Boasting 51 heavily wooded campsites outfitted with water and electrical hookups, grills, picnic tables, hard-surface pads and restroom facilities with showers, Old Stone Fort State Park is not just for day-trippers, but also appeals to those who want to spend a weekend—or longer—exploring the area with Manchester as their home base (campsite fees are \$20 a night with a two-week stay limit). The park has a museum and gift shop, perimeter trail within the ancient enclosure and two additional miles of developed trail, while the campground has its own Nature Trail. A children's playground is located in the picnic area along with more than 30 picnic tables and grills, in addition to a shelter available for rent.

Along the main trail, a dozen interpretative markers tell the stories of the ancient societies, their myths and rituals, as well



what historians do know is that the site was not used for habitation, burials or defense (settlers often dubbed such enclosures "forts").

"[The Woodland Indians] wanted to set their sacred space apart," Wimberley explains. "This was meant only to be a ceremonial gathering place."

Upward of 200,000 people visit Old Stone Fort State Archaeological Park annually, many to experience its history and others for the abundance of outdoor offerings, including its iconic cascading waterfalls. Located at the point where two rivers drop off the Highland Rim plateau, the park is rife in water sources; falls plunge from the top of the trail down to the depths of Tennessee's Central Basin. Long, wall-like mounds that were

as the historical significance of the site and the natural features of the area. Birders can delight in catching glimpses of such native species as the Northern Parula, Red-eyed Vireo and

occasional Wood Duck. Fishermen love the park for the copious largemouth Bass, bream and catfish that swim the waters of the Duck River. There are also interpretative programs every Saturday and Sunday from Labor Day to Memorial Day led by seasonal rangers and suitable for all ages.

"[Old Stone Fort] is truly a hidden gem," Wimberley says. "A lot of people who grew up here will show up and say, 'I've lived here my whole life and never really knew this existed.' And when they discover it, it's something special."

Harold Shelton worked in real estate for 48 years before retiring and shifting his focus to his true passion: buying, trading and selling high-quality antique goods. Seven years ago, Harold and his wife Ruby opened Shelton Lane Antiques, one of Coffee County's true hidden gems, nestled among the 30-acre property they've owned just off of I-24's Exit 105 for nearly three decades. While Harold's own favorites are evident—gas station signs and old pumps greet visitors as they drive up; even more are prominently displayed inside—the store is chock full of 8,900 curiosities like a 1800s fire department call box, a marlin mount from the Mandrell family and a clock commissioned by Conway Twitty himself for his mansion, Twitty City. Among other things, the Sheltons specialize in kitchenware, knives, signage, furniture and hard-to-find items; they also boast a collection of 3,000 vintage records in a separate structure in the back of the main shop. Be sure and take time to appreciate the full impact of the Shelton's sprawl, which includes a pear tree-lined entry, a re-creation of an old general store and a 10-foot waterfall in the holler just beyond the fence.

# Fruit of the Vine

**A family of farmers turns wine  
into a local institution.**

A winery in the heart of whiskey country may not seem like an obvious fit, but for the nine families backing Beans Creek Winery, it was something they felt Manchester needed.

“My dad [Tom] started making wine out of his home back in 1976,” says Beans Creek winemaker Josh Brown, who grew up down the road in Hillsboro. “It was a hobby that got out of hand.”

For a quarter of a century, Tom Brown worked on perfecting his craft until he was able to turn the dream into reality. In 2001, he started getting interest from locals wanting to invest in his concept, and the following year, they teamed up to purchase the land the winery now sits on adjacent to I-24. In 2003, construction on the property began—which entailed adding a warehouse and tasting room in addition to the house that was already standing—and Beans Creek made its debut in 2004. The name was derived from Josh’s childhood home, with the label paying homage to the bucolic setting.

“The last house I lived in growing up was on Beans Creek in Hillsboro, and that’s when my dad started making his 200-gallon allotment of wine each year out of the basement,” Josh explains. “My brother and sister had made him homemade labels



that said ‘Beans Creek Cellars,’ and when we opened here in town, he fought with coming up with a name but knew it had to have a story behind it. So we decided to bring the creek with us.”

At the time Beans Creek opened, Josh was employed as a firefighter but came in on his days off to help out at the winery.

“We’re just a **small family business** trying to do what we can to **keep going**,” Josh says.

When Tom retired in 2013, he passed on the torch to Josh, who left his post at the fire department after nearly 14 years and began to oversee production with his mother Becky and the other families backing the venture. Luckily for Josh, there wasn’t a huge learning curve as he had helped Tom out on the farm and at the Hillsboro home winery as a teen—but the job did wind up being more than he bargained for.

“I’m now the janitor, the winemaker, the yard boy—I do whatever needs to be done around here,” he laughs. “It’s fun, though. How many people say they get to make alcohol and drink at work, too?”

“Within two to three years of when we opened, there were six new wineries opening in the state,” Josh recalls. “Tennessee’s wine industry isn’t as old as, say, California or New York, but Highland Manor [in Jamestown] is more than 30 years old—so they’ve been around for some time, wine just wasn’t so much promoted as a whole.”

In all, Beans Creek utilizes nine grape varieties to make 30 different wines, producing between 3,000 and 4,000 cases a year. The kinds of wine Josh makes are largely dependent on the kind of grapes that prosper in Tennessee; Cabarnets, Merlot and Syrahs, for example, don’t grow in the area, so more and more grapes are being developed that are conducive to the climate of the eastern United States.

“Everyone has always associated Tennessee with sweet wines, but we make everything from fruit sweets to dry reds and white to a port and three different kinds of sparkling,” he says. “I’d love to see the port get out a little bit more. It’s won several awards,



Cultivating vines is a precarious profession, one that relies on so many factors as altitude, climate and soil quality, and while Beans Creek has a handful of its own vines, it mainly sources grapes from a number of growers throughout Middle Tennessee, such as the Weaver family on the edge of Woods Reservoir who grows Traminette, Concord and Chardonel. When it first opened 12 years ago, Beans Creek had to buy all its fruit from outside of Tennessee as the vineyards it now buys from weren’t mature yet; this out-of-state sourcing ended in 2007 when Josh and Becky were able to start keeping all grape purchases local.

“We’re weaning out the varieties we got from out of state early on,” he adds, “and are now promoting the ones that are growing here really well.”

Beans Creek Winery is open 361 days a year, and even in the dead of winter, it receives at least a handful of visitors daily to the tasting room. The team has also been able to capitalize on a growing wine culture in Tennessee, one that continues to flourish as more wineries open throughout the state each year.

not just nationally but internationally.”

Half of Beans Creek’s wine list is always available for tastings, and since the winery doesn’t serve food, visitors are allowed to bring along picnic spreads if they like, though all booze must be purchased on site. Tasting options range from six pourings for \$6 to the entire list for \$10. And from Memorial Day to Labor Day weekend, the winery offers free live music in the backyard every other Saturday night; on those occasions, a BBQ truck is on site for food purchases. Beans Creek also boasts a wine club that includes discounts, access to members-only vintages and a quarterly shipment of some of their best wines.

“We’re just a small family business trying to do what we can to keep going,” Josh says.

# The Arts



## Manchester Arts Center

The Mission of the Manchester Municipal Arts Commission is to foster, promote, and encourage the development of the arts in Manchester and the surrounding areas.

The organization serves Coffee County and surrounding counties of Rutherford, Cannon, Warren, Grundy, Franklin, Moore, and Bedford. It has roots dating back to 1968, when the emphasis was on the visual arts. It was incorporated by the state and named the Manchester Municipal Arts Commission. In 1995, this group purchased a building at 909 Hillsboro Blvd. The building was leased to a professional theatre group which renovated the interior for theatre and reception use and operated the facility for one year. Since Oct. 1, 1996 the MMAC, with the help of those trained in college in theatre and a cadre of volunteers, took over the building and put on the productions.

In 1996, the Commission applied for and received 501(c)(3) status as well as a state tax exemption. Since that time the group has produced 5 or 6 shows yearly accompanied by complementing art shows. Active youth groups, Teen Actors Guild( TAG) and Wee Actors Guild (WAG,) were formed which put on one show yearly as well as having monthly activities. The teen group had Coffee Shops with open mic and felt a vested interest in the Manchester Arts Center. Both groups took adult led trips to professional shows and art galleries. The building was completely renovated, including lighted parking area, a ramp into the building for those with disabilities, new roof, rebuilt theatre seating, and improved lighting and sound. Even when the building was destroyed by a fire in 2006, the Arts Commission continued to function and provide quality events for our community.

Now that the new Manchester Arts Center is once again in a new building, we anticipate adding more events, offering more classes and continuing to serve the youth and adults in this community and surrounding areas.

## South Jackson Civic Center @SouthJacksonCiv

Each year the Civic Center entertains and educates with a variety of programs for the community. Programming includes:

- The Educational Outreach Series offers quality programming at affordable prices for schools. Through study guides and discussions, we hope to develop critical thinking skills.
- The Performing Arts Series offers a variety of different style shows to attract different audiences.
- Other events are also held at the Civic Center that include a variety of different programs such as South Jackson Goes Country, various dance recitals, festivals on the grounds, and an ice cream social.
- The Mitchell Museum provides exhibits that pertain to city and area history

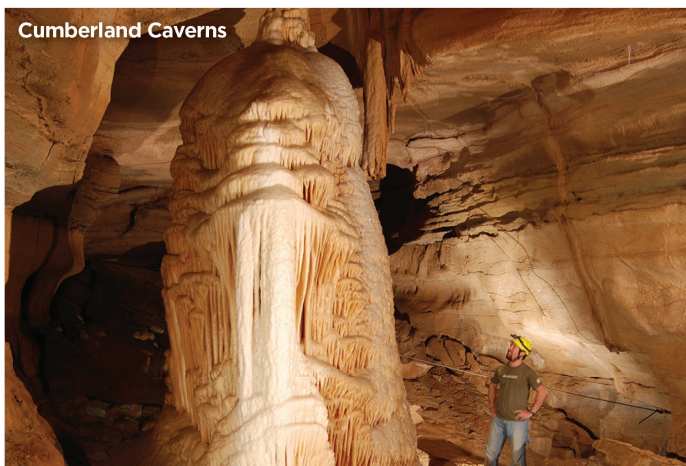

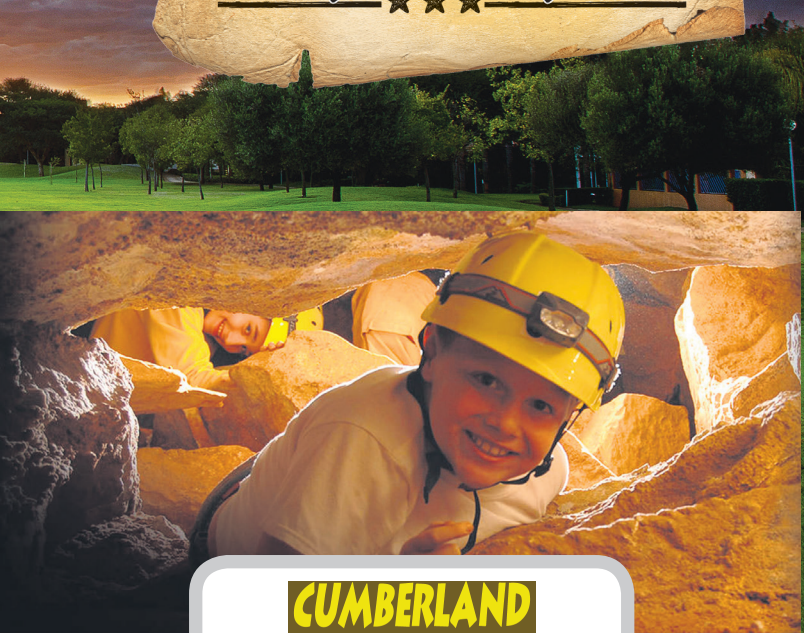

## Cumberland Caverns - @CumberlandCave

Cumberland Caverns located in McMinnville, Tennessee, is one of the most extensive known caves in America. Portions of this caving system were originally known as Higgenbotham Cave and Henshaw Cave. Considerable exploration of previously unseen sections along with integration of the two caves substantially enlarged Cumberland Caverns to the more than 32 miles that can be toured today.

Surveyor Aaron Higgenbotham discovered Higgenbotham Cave (now a national landmark) in 1810. Venturing into the cave alone, he was trapped for three days on a high ledge when his torch went out. According to local legend, his hair had turned white by the time a rescue party found him. Aaron Higgenbotham did not penetrate very far underground, but shortly after the close of the Civil War, someone explored for over a mile in Higgenbotham Cave and discovered a huge avenue—60 ft. wide, 10 ft. high, and 2000 ft. long—the “Ten Acre Room.” The name “Shelah Waters” and the date “1869” are inscribed on the walls in candle smoke or scratched into the rock in many rather remote areas. This is the oldest name and date in the cave. Higgenbotham Cave is mentioned in old histories of Warren County as a local attraction, and Thomas L. Bailey in “Resources of Tennessee” first described it in print for 1918.

# On The Water

## Area Lakes

### Tims Ford Lake

Tims Ford was impounded in 1970 when the Tennessee Valley Authority built a hydro-electric dam across the Elk River. The 10,700 acre lake is one of the most picturesque in Tennessee and is regarded as one of the top bass fishing and recreational lakes in the Southeast. The lake's deep clear water has made it famous for those in search of smallmouth bass. In addition, the lake hosts excellent populations of largemouth bass, Kentucky bass, Rockfish, hybrids, crappie and catfish.

### Normandy Lake

Normandy Lake offers a number of public boat ramps, and campgrounds. Covering 3,160 acres it offers anglers superb fishing opportunities. The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency and the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Agency regularly stock rainbow trout in the Duck River below Normandy Dam. The lake boasts sizeable populations of largemouth bass, smallmouth bass and is one of the top spots to tangle with the feisty Kentucky bass. In recent years thanks to a very successful stocking program by the TWRA walleye have taken the spotlight from late spring through summer as a preferred quarry by many anglers. Crappie anglers fish the lake year round.

## Duck River

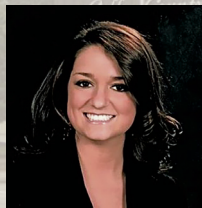
## Little Duck River Greenway

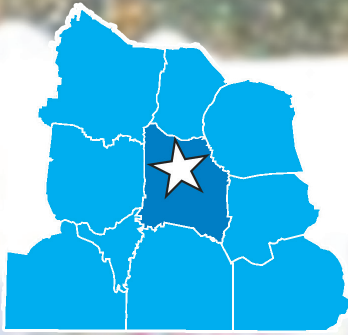

## Walking Horse Celebration

September • Shelbyville, TN

The Celebration® is the term generally used to identify both the event and the organization that manages and presents it.

The idea for a Walking Horse “festival” (later identified as the Tennessee Walking Horse National Celebration®) is generally credited to the late Henry Davis of Wartrace, TN.

It began when Davis went to nearby Winchester one spring day in 1939 and observed the Crimson Clover Festival. He became very enthusiastic about what he saw and returned to Shelbyville with the idea that his home county should have a festival to celebrate their most important asset – the Tennessee Walking Horse.

The idea was cultivated into the first Celebration on September 7, 8, and 9, 1939. It has been held every year, without interruption, since.

The show has grown into its own 100-plus-acre equestrian complex; a complex frequented by many breeds and including a 30,000 seat outdoor stadium, a 4,500 seat indoor arena, a covered outdoor practice arena, permanent stalls for more than 1,700 horses, and campgrounds featuring full hook-ups for more than 350 recreational vehicles.

Indeed, it is a thrill to watch the more than 2,000 horses compete during the 10-day-and-night Celebration...and when the one horse emerges proudly on that Saturday night before Labor Day as the World Grand Champion Tennessee Walking Horse®, even the most somber could not help but feel a chill run up their spines. The Celebration® moved to its present location in 1948.
