## Candidate Forum Oct. 6 at Grace Church

Candidate Forum will take place at 6 p.m. - 9:30 p.m. on Oct. 6 at Grace Church in Evergreen.





### Mt. Pleasant High School graduate serving as a sonar technician on the USS Kentucky

nthony Mendez, a 2010 Mount Pleasant High School graduate is serving as a sonar technician in the U.S. Navy as part of a crew working aboard one of the world's most advanced ballistic missile submarines, the USS Kentucky.

The USS Kentucky measures 560 feet long, 42 feet wide and weighs more than 16,500 tons. Its nuclear-powered propulsion system helps push the ship through the water at more than 20 knots.

Mendez is responsible for protecting the boat from colliding with anything while submerged.

"It's a cool job to have, and I get to hang out with some really great people while working," said Mendez.

The Navy's ballistic missile submarines, often referred to as "boomers," serve as a strategic deterrent by providing an undetectable platform for submarine launched ballistic missiles. They are designed specifically for stealth, extended patrols and the precise delivery of missiles if directed by the President.

On average, the submarine spends 77 days at sea followed by 35 days in-port for

maintenance

Mendez is part of the boat's Blue crew, one of the two rotating crews, which allow the ship to be deployed on missions more often without taxing one crew too much. A typical crew on this submarine is approximately 150 officers and enlisted sailors.

"Every day I am extremely proud to lead and serve alongside the exceptionally talented men and women of the submarine force," said Capt. Mark Schmall, commodore of Submarine Squadron 17, of Bangor, Washington. "Our team is filled with dedicated, hardworking, and highly qualified professionals who hold uncommon levels of responsibility and accountability in support of our nation's strategic deterrence mission. Their work ethic, commitment, and enthusiasm are second to none."

They crew is there every Saturday, Sunday and holiday this year. They are there around the clock, far from our shores, defending America at all times. "Serving aboard this sub is a unique experience," said Mendez. "Everyone on the crew is here to protect each other. If anything occurs, I know that everyone knows their job and will be there."

### HelloBots celebrates first LEGO Robothon at Evergreen Library

Hubbler elloBots, a non-profit organization, is celebrating their first anniversary. To commemorate this occasion, a Robothon was held at the Evergreen Branch Library on Aborn Rd.

The Robothon was a huge hit with more than fifty contestants participating. The free LEGO robotics competition showcased the skills of 4 – 8th grade students learned from HelloBots workshops during the past year.

This year's theme was "Clean and Green," in which the teams had to build a robot using LEGO Mindstorm and program it to go through a course while pushing "debris" into "recycling bins."

"The LEGO Robothon is a preparatory step towards First LEGO League (FLL) and the first of its kind in San Jose," said Hellobots founder and president, Labanya Mukhopadhyay. "The event was for both beginners and those experienced in robotics to sharpen their skills in a friendly competition.

Labanya, a junior at Evergreen Valley High School, started the free HelloBots program so that all children interested in STEM or robotics could learn how to build and program a robot using LEGO Mindstorm, regardless of their economic background.

The first part of the Robothon was the girls' competition, where the goal was to encourage more young girls to participate in the technology field, where females are still a minority. It consisted of three teams of four girls each.

The second part of the competition was open to all competitors. It consisted of six teams and followed the same game rules.

The teams were guided by the instructors and volunteers and were judged based on robot design, team work, and field challenges. All the necessary LEGO kits were provided by HelloBots.

The students increased their knowledge of robotics, problem-solving, and teamwork, and had fun at the same time. Parents also shared the excitement of the competition with their children.

All participants received a certificate, personally signed by San Jose's Vice Mayor Rose Herrera, and a gift card according to the prize for the category won in the awards ceremony.

The goal of this event was to encourage young students in robotics and to learn from each other through a fun competition. All participants received an award.

HelloBots had a tremendous growth in this last one year. Starting with a workshop in Alum Rock branch library it now runs 5 to 6week workshops at five different Public Branch Libraries and after school classes at two public school districts in San Jose.


### Citizens Watchdog Committee Report to the Public

#### 2000 Measure A Sales Tax Activities Fiscal Year 2015 (7/1/14 - 6/30/15)

Measure A, approved by Santa Clara County voters in 2000, is a 30-year half cent sales tax dedicated to enhancing the county's public transit system. Although revenue collection did not begin until 2006, upon expiration of a previous measure, numerous Measure A Program accomplishments have been achieved during the first nine years, all significantly benefitting county residents and commuters.



• *Extending BART to the Silicon Valley* cities of Milpitas and San Jose, which will provide more transportation options and reduce congestion. The extension to the Berryessa section of San Jose is ahead of schedule and under budget. Service is projected to start late 2017.



- *Extending and improving light rail service* with projects such as the Mountain View Double-Track and Tasman Drive Pocket Track projects enabling enhanced service to the new Levi's Stadium, Sunnyvale and Mountain View.
- Completion of environmental and planning to *increase Caltrain service and electrify the system* from Palo Alto to Gilroy.

Santa Clara County voters entrusted the Citizens Watchdog Committee (CWC), comprised of fellow community members, with overseeing Measure A expenditures to ensure your sales tax dollars are spent as intended by the ballot. After thorough and careful consideration:

### **Measure B survey shows support**

n a survey of 600 likely voters, sixty-nine percent indicated they are in favor of the Valley Transportation Authority's proposed half-cent sales tax increase (Measure B) on the Nov. 8 ballot.

If approved by two-thirds of voters, it could raise as much as \$6.5 billion for transit and road improvements during the next 30 years.

Measure A is also on the ballot which asks county voters to approve \$950 million in general obligation bonds to provide affordable housing for seniors, at risk veterans, foster children, the disabled and the homeless. There have been no surveys regarding voter sentiment regarding the measure.

### **Be prepared!**

hortly after it erupted in the afternoon, the billowing black smoke emanating from the Loma Fire could be seen from city hall. The fire began on Monday, September 26th in the Santa Cruz Mountains near to the edge of San Jose. It was astonishing how fast it grew. At present, the fire has consumed over 2,500 acres of dry fuel and at least 1 home. We're grateful to our own San Jose Fire Department for their quick response in deploying firefighting units to assist in the battle to contain the wildfire. Hundreds of homes lie in it's path in addition to radio and television towers. Evacuations of residents have occurred and emergency shelters have been activated by the American Red Cross. Cal Fire will be joining local agencies and we all pray for speedy containment and the safe return of fire fighters and residents. By eerie coincidence, the start of the fire appears to have begun in the same area of the epicenter of the devastating Loma Prieta earthquake of 1989. Evergreen has drought impacted hillsides that must be alert for fires too. Disasters such as earthquakes can happen anywhere and anytime. So it's time to be prepared! In fact, the month of September is recognized as National Preparedness Month across the country.

For the past eight years of my tenure as a city councilmember and as Vice Mayor, I have been concerned for our preparedness (or lack of) for disasters. Due to budget cuts over the years, our city dropped funding for Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training. CERT training enables residents to prepare themselves, their families, and their neighbors to support the response to and recovery from large-scale, complex emergencies or disasters. In response to requests from residents, I requested restoration of this funding last year during our budget season

and won support and approval for the funding. As this recent fire season has shown us, it is imperative that the City of San Jose provide disaster relief training and education to our residents. Ensuring that our community has adequate CERT training will increase the chances of survival in the event of an unpredictable, but likely to occur natural disaster such as the next large earthquake or wildfire. If you're interested in CERT training, the Office of Emergency Services will be posting class dates and times on their website later this fall. For more information please go to:

In addition to the funding for CERT training, I have also authored a memo which included directing staff to include in work with all Council Districts to create, implement, and maintain a district emergency plan. This request has also been supported and implementation will be part of the Office of Emergency Services workplan.

We live in a large city and each resident should be aware that immediately following a disaster, everyone should be ready to fend for themselves for at least 72 hours. As we work to develop district and citywide Emergency Preparedness, I would also encourage you, your family, and your neighborhood to begin planning for disaster. The first step in preparedness is to sign up for the reverse 911 call through AlertSCC. AlertSCC is a free, easy, and confidential way for anyone who lives or works in Santa Clara County to get emergency warnings sent directly to their cell phone, mobile device, email, or landline. AlertSCC can reach you wherever you are to provide information and instructions in a variety of emergency situations, which may include: Flooding, wildfires and subse-

quent evacuations Public safety incidents, including

crimes, that immediately affect your neighborhood Post-disaster information about

shelters, transportation, or supplies It only takes a minute. Sign up

today and tell someone everyone you know to sign up, too! To sign up go to:

https://www.sccgov.org/sites/ alertscc/Pages/home.aspx. The next step is to make a plan with your family. 1. Talk with family, friends

and co-workers about what kind of emergencies might happen in your area and how you might respond to them. Our area is particularly vulnerable to earthquakes (updated predictions for a 6.7 magnitude or higher earthquake in the next 30 years is 63%), fires, and extreme weather (flooding). 2. Make a plan on what exits you might use and where you will meet up if you are not all at home. 3. Practice your emergency plan twice a year in order to be able to respond quickly during a real emergency.

Every resident should learn to be self-reliant in any emergency. I encourage you to create your own Emergency Kit which should include:

■ Battery-powered radio, flashlights, and batter-

- Extra set of car keys
- Supply of easy-to-prepare, nonperishable foods (packaged snacks, fruits, water, and juices)
   Manual can opener
- Windup or battery-operated clock
- Cash, coins, and credit cards
- Change of clothing, rain gear, and sturdy shoes
- Blankets or sleeping bags
- If you have a baby, include extra diapers and

### other infant care items

First aid kit

 Essential medicines and prescription information

■ Names, addresses, and telephone numbers of doctors and pharmacist

• Extra pair of glasses, hearing aid batteries, extra wheelchair batteries, oxygen, medication, catheters, food for guide or service dogs, or other special equipment you might need

■ List of the style and serial numbers of medical devices such as pacemakers

Neighbors can also work together in preparation for disasters by identifying those in their neighborhood who may need extra help during an emergency such as elderly and handicapped residents. Get to know your neighbors and make an emergency plan for your neighborhood. You can start by gathering some of your family and neighbors and plan to attend a Community Preparedness Fair for more resources on Thursday, October 13th from 10 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. in the Rotunda at City Hall. As we move into fall, the risk of wildfire in and/or around our community remains high. Please be vigilant and practice firesafe habits. 
