Developer consults community with new Fort Howard plan

Developer Samuel Himmelrich, of Himmelrich Associates, Inc., revealed his new concept plan for the redevelopment of Fort Howard to Edgemere and Fort Howard residents at an informational meeting on the topic last Wednesday,

The new plan, according to Himmelrich, would see approximately 450 residences built across the property while preserving most of the existing buildings and much of its open space.

The previous plan, originally presented by developer Timothy Munshell five years ago, called for nearly 1,400 residences along with retail and office buildings on the 94-acre property.

Himmelrich said that plan, with all its density, basically left only the parade ground in front of the hospital as open space because it was required.

But the new plan's architect, Werner Mueller, said their goal is to preserve as much of the site's natural beauty and open space as possible.

Himmelrich opined that his plan is one that honors veterans and the site's heritage, complies with federal requirements about preservation, reduces density from previous plans and is focused on quality and design.

"We think it provides a realistic and market-driven product based upon our

view of what would work on this site,"

Himmelrich explained that the first phase of the project would consist of restoration and renovation of many of the existing buildings, including the single homes that were the officers' quarters along Gettysburg Avenue, some of which have burned down. Those would be rebuilt on the same foundations in a similar style, albeit using more modern materials.

It would also see a group of 75 for-sale townhomes constructed near the officers' quarters single homes to the northwest of the property, as well as a veterans center toward the northeast.

State, county disagree on Back River midge treatment proposal

Baltimore County's environmental director has rejected a state proposal to split costs on larvicide treatments to decrease the number of midges in and around Back River, citing a lack of data.

Two weeks ago, Governor Larry Hogan joined with the heads of the Maryland Department of Agriculture (MDA) and Department of Natural Resources (DNR) proposing to split an estimated \$1.3 million tab down the middle with Baltimore County for a total of seven larvicide treatments aimed at reducing the midge population that has plagued area residents and businesses.

The treatments, the state officials said, would cover an area of about 750 acres and would act as a stop-gap solution to help address the problem until the upgrades at the Back River Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) - a more longterm solution - can take effect.

Midges are non-biting, mosquito-like insects that are present in abnormally high numbers around Back River and present a swarming nuisance to neighbors. Midge larvae thrive in the Back River mud, feeding on phytoplankton, which consume the excess nutrients discharged to the river by the WWTP.

Upgrades to the plant for Enhanced

Nutrient Removal will be completed in 2018 and are aimed at reducing the amount of nutrients discharged to the river. However, the midge population is not expected to drop to more normal levels as a result for at least a decade.

In response to the state, the county's director of Environmental Protection and Sustainability (EPS), Vince Gardina, wrote back that the proposal lacked a sufficient base of data on midge larval populations by geographic location in the river and that the expenditure would be inadequate to effectively treat the problem.

Van Hollen visits Marine Trades Association, talks Bay protections

Congressman Chris Van Hollen has been making the rounds in Maryland as he campaigns for Barbara Mikulski's seat in the Senate. On Monday night, he stopped by Carson's Creekside in Middle River to discuss his plans, but primarily focused on protecting the Chesapeake Bay.

"I've been very focused on trying to protect our beautiful bay and all the tributaries and waterways," said Van Hollen. "Both because of its beauty and because it's a great engine of economic opportunity in the state of Maryland."

Van Hollen, who co-chairs the Chesapeake Bay Caucus in Congress,

stressed that "other interests outside of the Maryland and Virginia area"- most notably Pennsylvania - posed a big challenge to cleaning up the bay. Point source pollution, urban and suburban runoff and agricultural runoff all contribute to the bay's health, and all must be dealt with.

In the farm bill that Congress passed back in 2006, Van Hollen said that he managed to get more funding so that farmers in the Chesapeake watershed would be able to plant more cover and buffer crops to help reduce runoff. However, Van Hollen stated that Pennsylvania brings a lot of problems to the

"It's kind of like an out of sight, out of mind thing with Pennsylvania," said Van Hollen. "It's not something that's part of their culture, and the waterways that feed the bay aren't really part of their economic ecosystem."

According to Van Hollen, under the Chesapeake Bay Program, Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDL) need to be adhered to, but Pennsylvania hasn't been cooperating. This puts them in violation of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), and the EPA has threatened to take action over the past couple of years. While it seems like a simple thing to enforce, there's an effort in Congress to prevent the EPA from enforcing nutrient runoff rules. Van Hollen doesn't think the bill will pass the Senate, but he pointed out the efforts some states will go to to keep things as they are.

Besides runoff from farms, Van Hollen also pointed to the Conowingo Dam as a big issue regarding the health of the Chesapeake.

Sediment buildup behind the dam is massive, and any time water needs to be released a large amount of sediment comes with it.

While the dam has been an issue for a while, Maryland finds itself with some leverage as the dam will need to be licensed again soon.

"We're trying to use this as an opportunity, while we have some leverage, to get some of the dredging done and get rid of the sediment," said Van

While dredging would do a lot to alleviate immediate concerns, Van Hollen stressed that it was simply a shortterm solution.

"We have to make sure that we get Pennsylvania to comply with the agreement," said Van Hollen. "As long as the sediment keeps running off of the Pennsylvania farms, it'll keep

building up behind the dam."

Van Hollen also noted that, much like with the TMDLs, a bill was put forward in the House that would limit the ability of states to use the re-licensing process like they want to, but he stated that it wasn't likely to get through.

Besides cleaning up the bay, Van Hollen also stressed the importance of cleaning up streams and tributaries, and commended the Marine Trades Association for getting involved. Van Hollen stated that access to the bay via its tributaries is a big deal, and he's working to better connect park systems with waterways that lead to the bay to provide easier access.

"A lot of people underestimate the draw of the bay," said Van Hollen. "Boating and fishing are a big draw."

Van Hollen also hit on the issue of ethanol, saying that he's happy to work with the Marine Trades to make sure they won't have to use E15 fuel.

"E10 is probably tolerable for smaller boats, but E15 wreaks havoc on smaller engines," he said. "It's primarily the state of Iowa where they're introducing E15, where they have a lot of corn. But we're going to want to work together to ensure it doesn't come to dominate the market and cause consumer confusion, which happens."

Van Hollen also touched on issues like workforce development and minimum wage. He pointed out the success of cyber security education through the community college system, and stated that he'd like to see something similar for the marine industry.

On the issue of minimum wage, Van Hollen said he's in favor of a \$15 minimum wage, but that it would need to be phased in over time. He also recognized that minimum wage wasn't intended to be a family-supporting wage, but that the issue is that it hasn't been indexed for inflation.

Atlantic Forest hopes move to Sparrows Point translates to growth, jobs

Tradepoint Atlantic in Sparrows Point gained a new tenant recently when officials signed a long-term lease with Atlantic Forest Products, currently headquartered in Baltimore.

Atlantic Forest, a wholesale distributor of building materials, "has trucks on the road now" and plans to have its industrial and warehouse arms of the business up and running in Sparrows Point by Nov. 1, according to company president John Chisholm. The business office will follow Jan. 1, he said.

The company has been looking for a new place to call home since selling its Port Covington property in 2015 to Sagamore Development, according to Aaron Tomarchio, vice president of corporate affairs for Tradepoint Atlantic. Tomarchio declined to divulge the length of the lease.

The new tenant will lease two existing storage buildings totaling 160,000 square feet of covered space on 16 acres, according to Tomarchio. The company will also lease 6,500 square feet of office space to house its corporate headquarters.

The buildings being leased by Atlantic Forest "are being refurbished to support this use," Tomarchio said. "The target date is the first of the year for them to make the move."

Chisholm said he is excited about

the growth potential that the Sparrows Point property offers. Now using 12 acres of staging land in Port Covington, the move offers another four acres immediately.

"But there's room for more," he said.
"If we eat up the 16 acres, there's plenty of room to grab more - at least for now."

Atlantic Forest has four main operations in three states, according to its website, and ships building materials all along the eastern starboard and as far west as Ohio. About 50 people work at the Baltimore location.

Chisholm is confident that business

growth will allow the company to create more Baltimore jobs in the near future.

"The last two years, we've experienced double-digit growth in revenue," he said. "In 2016, we'll have \$170 million in revenue, and we're looking for a big 2017, with \$200-plus million."

That growth will translate to the need for additional warehouse, administrative and sales workers, he said.

The former Bethlehem Steel property totals 3,100 acres. While many local residents express concern over the environmental damage done to the land and water during more than

a century of steelmaking, Baltimore County spokeswoman Fronda Cohen said most of the land is immediately available for redevelopment.

"About 2,400 acres can be developed right now without the need for more environmental remediation," she said in a phone interview. "The heavily damaged area is actually quite small."

The Sparrows Point property is valuable to many similar companies because of its proximity to three major modes of transportation - rail, deep water shipping and interstate highways, according to Cohen.

"We're starting to see many companies that need to get their products to e-commerce centers," she said. "They need to get their products quickly and inexpensively to their customers and the Sparrows Point property offers that."

Chisholm said "location was key" in his company's decision to relocate to Sparrows Point, noting the land is served by both the CSX and Norfolk-Southern railroads.

The company president believes the move will be good for Atlantic Forest as it strives to grow and strengthen its East Coast brand presence.

"From what I'm hearing, there's a lot of real positive things going on over there," he said of Tradepoint Atlantic. "We're happy to be a part of it."

The veterans center would include 50 beds for at-risk veterans as required by the lease. But it could also include such things as a health club for veterans and potentially medical admittance offices for the Department of Veterans Affairs.

In the second phase, Mueller explained, they hope to build a line of single homes extending southward along the shoreline from the officers' quarters to the property line at Fort Howard Park. Just north of that would be another group of 75 townhomes.

The third phase could be either two curved condominium or senior housing buildings joined in the middle in a slight "s" shape, or three separated buildings for the same purpose.

Mueller said the overall design would create an interior density for the property that does not interfere with the views of the shoreline.

Himmelrich noted that the hospital building, as the most important piece of the project, would be the tallest building on the property and would likely be used for residences, conceivably for senior housing. The condo buildings would be the next tallest at four or five stories.

The townhomes, which he said are "not big, crazy townhomes," would be next going outward, followed by the single homes along the shoreline. They would be low and spaced far enough apart to be able to see through them.

Additionally, all residents would be able to walk along the promenade along the waterfront despite the homes there. And they would have a committment that there could be no structures between the homes and the water.

Himmelrich said they would also have

to comply with all flood plain rules. However, he was unsure if they would be subject to Chesapeake Bay Critical Area regulations regarding setbacks from the water since it is federal property.

The developer acknowledged the challenge of building for-sale homes on land leased from the VA under the 75-year Enhanced Use Lease program.

But we're not strangers to challenge," Himmlerich said.

His company, he said, has been able to complete several controversial projects at historical sites that others have struggled with.

Baltimore-based Himmelrich Associates redeveloped a former nut and bolt factory into the Mt. Washington Mill project and a former raincoat factory into their Meadow Mill project, as well as the redevelopment of the Montgomery Ward building into the Montgomery Park office

building, all in Baltimore.

Himmelrich also said there is language in the VA lease that allows for the extension of its length or possible purchase of the property from the VA. And he hopes that when the VA sees the quality of the development, they will be more willing to sell the land.

County Councilman Todd Crandell, who represents the area, has declined to comment on the new plan until he hears from the community. But because of his downzoning of the property to only one home per acre, any plan more dense than that would have to be done as a planned unit development (PUD) or else wait for the next zoning cycle.

PUDs allow developers to ignore a property's zoning in exchange for a community benefit. But they must be approved by the councilperson representing that district in order to move forward.

county staff had determined the estimated cost of effective midge larval treatment, based on the cost of materials and the amount of time and equipment necessary, to be between \$12,500 and \$25,000 per acre per year. Based on this cost, the state's proposal would only be enough to treat between 48 and 96 acres - or about 1 to 2 percent - of the total 4,500 acres on Back River, Gardina said.

"At best, such a proposal does not seem to offer a comprehensive solution and does not constitute an effective investment of tax dollars," he wrote.

He recommended that the state provide the county with a detailed scientific analysis of midge larval populations by geographic location in Back River with a "statistically significant sample that is spatially accurate."

Karen Wynn, administrative director of the Back River Restoration Committee, and MDA spokesman Jason Schellhardt said the state's proposal was based on the findings of a pilot study carried out by EPS in 2015 which looked at the effectiveness of different concentrations of the larvicide on midges in Back River.

Schellhardt said the state consulted industry professionals, applicators of pesticides and pesticide manufacturers to determine the cost of materials and labor needed to treat the specified area.

The BRRC - a volunteer group working

toward restoring the river's health - funded the cost of the study with consultation from Kevin Brittingham, a county scientist with EPS.

The 750 acres highlighted in the state's proposal was roughly the area of the river between the Eastern Avenue bridge and the tip of Cox's Point, according to Wynn, which she said was identified as having the most dense midge larval population.

Gardina discounted that study, though, stating that it just took "random samples" in response to what he said was a complaint from Weaver's Marina, and the samples taken in that study were not indicative of the entire river.

"That was where we started and then we looked at a couple other locations near there, but we didn't do a comprehensive study," he said.

Gardina criticized the state's proposal as a "randomly selected" area, not based on any statistics.

"Our position is we're not willing to spend \$650,000 without more data," he said. "You have to do a sample based on a statistical and spatial analysis."

But Wynn argued that the 2015 study's test plots were not random and were chosen based on the findings of another EPS study done in 2010, as well as the 2014 DNR study referenced by both the state's proposal and Gardina's response.

"It's staying away from the hard, sandy areas where the midges wouldn't be

found as much, and pulling away from the shorelines where it's uninhabited," she explained, adding that they also looked at the movement of the tides and how that affected the treatments.

Through that study, she said, they determined that the most cost-effective course of action would be to treat the hot spots where the most midge larvae were found which would have been done under the state proposal.

Wynn also said the county's cost estimate was calculated using airplane-based dispersal systems, which are more expensive than the boat-based ones they plan to use. And they did not account for the

fact that volunteers would donate their time and vessels for the treatments to save on costs while still under the supervision of licensed exterminators.

Wynn said the BRRC and other advocates for the treatments do not yet have a definite course of action going forward, but she noted their permit from the Maryland Department of the Environment for the 2015 pilot study could be expanded to include more of the river if it yielded positive results, so they will pursue that.

The BRRC is also scheduled to hold a "midge summit" this month in Essex to discuss the issue with state and county officials.

Marshy Point Nature Center set to host sixth annual Turtle Trek

Marshy Point Nature Center in Middle River is now registering participants for its sixth installment of the annual Turtle Trek 5k race and family nature walk on Saturday, Nov. 12, beginning at 9 a.m.

The event, being held jointly by the nature center and the Katie and Wil Brady Memorial Foundation, Inc., will be on a different course this year than last, making use of the Katie and Wil Trail which opened at the park in 2013. It will raise funds for programs at the nature center as well as the maintenance of the Katie and Wil Trail.

"It's a positive event that we do in memory of Katie and Wil," said Ben Porter, a naturalist at the nature center. "They visited Marshy Point and really made use of a lot of different accessible trails in the area for kids bike-riding and things like that."

The Katie and Wil Foundation put money into developing that trail at Marshy Point "to make a trail like that available in a place that they visited often."

Mother and son Katie and Wil Brady lost their lives in a traffic collision in Harford County in 2008. Wil was just 8 years old. The Katie and Wil Foundation was then set up in their memory to fund different initiatives in their honor.

Katie's sister, Kelly Lane, said the Bradys often went on family bike outings, such as on the Ma and Pa or

NCR trails, but there were none suitable for young kids in the immediate area in eastern Baltimore County. So the foundation decided that the approximately 300-acre area opened up by the nature center's bridge over Dundee Creek would be the perfect place for such a trail.

They started the Turtle Trek event in 2011 to fund the new trail and were able to dedicate the Katie and Wil Trail at the third Turtle Trek event in 2013. The foundation donated \$110,000 to the trail's construction, and the Marshy Point Nature Center Council kicked in \$20,000 of its own money to contribute.

Last year's Turtle Trek took place on the park's natural trails while the nature walk was on the Katie and

Wil Trail. This year, the 5k race will be on the Katie and Wil Trail, but will also feature some of the newlydeveloped trails on the northeast side of Marshy Point, according to Porter.

He added that the newest trails in the park bring the total to well over five miles of pathways.

In addition to the race and nature walk, the event will include live music, turtle-related activities, several varieties of live turtles, kids' activities, food and prizes for top runners. They will even have a giant tortoise at the venue for everyone to see.

"It might be too cold for him to run the course, though," Porter joked.

Registration for race participants, held online at www.eliteracemanagement.com, is \$30 through Nov. 11 and \$35 on race day beginning at 8 a.m. Registration by Oct. 31 guarantees a race t-shirt.

Beginning last year, the foundation also decided to hold the event jointly with Marshy Point so that 100 percent of the proceeds could be given to the nature center.

"The first few years, everything was for the Katie and Wil Foundation, but we would give funds to [the nature center] to help maintain the trails," Lane explained.

"We've had a great partnership and a wonderful relationship," she continued. "They do so much for us; we try to do as much as we can for them."

Porter noted that, in addition to the event being a fundraiser, it is also a nice family day.

'It's a beautiful time of the year," he said. "We'll have good music and exciting things to see and hopefully just a really fun and family-friendly atmosphere going on like we like here at Marshy Point."



Upon receiving a breast cancer diagnosis, patients will soon receive a pathology report that informs them about the stage their cancer is in. The stage indicates how advanced the cancer is and whether or not it is limited to one area of the breast or has spread to other tissue or even other parts of the body. Understanding the stages of breast cancer can help patients cope with their diagnoses more effectively.

Once the doctor has completed all the necessary testing, patients will then receive their pathology reports, which will include the stage of the cancer. The following rundown of the various stages of breast cancer can help breast cancer patients better understand their disease.

Stage 0

Non-invasive breast cancers are considered to be in stage 0. When doctors have determined the cancer is in stage 0, that means they have not seen any indication that the cancer cells or the

abnormal non-cancerous cells have spread out of the part of the breast in which they started.

Breast cancer patients may hear the term "five-year survival rate" when discussing their disease with their physicians. The five-year survival rate refers to the percentage of people who live at least five years after being diagnosed with cancer. According to the American Cancer Society, the five-year survival rate for women with stage 0 breast cancer is nearly 100 percent.

Stage I

Stage I refers to invasive breast cancer and is broken down into two categories: stage IA and stage IB. Stage IA refers to invasive breast cancers in which the tumor is up to two centimeters and the cancer has not spread outside the breast. The lymph nodes are not involved in stage IA breast cancers. In some stage IB breast cancers, there is no tumor in the breast but there are small groups of cancer cells in the lymph nodes larger than 0.2 millimeter but not larger than two millimeters. But stage IB breast cancers may also refer to instances when there is both a tumor in the breast that is no larger than two centimeters and small groups of cancer cells in the lymph nodes that are larger than 0.2 millimeter but no larger than two millimeters. The ACS notes that the five-year survival rate for stage I breast cancers is roughly 100 percent.

Stage II breast cancers are also divided into two subcategories: stage IIA and stage IIB. Both subcategories are invasive, but stage II breast cancers are more complex than stage 0 or stage I breast cancers. Stage IIA describes breast cancers in which no tumor can be found in the breast, but cancer that is larger than two millimeters is found in one to three axillary lymph nodes (the lymph nodes under the arm) or in the lymph nodes near the breast bone. But an invasive breast cancer can still be considered stage IIA if the tumor measures two centimeters or smaller and has spread to the axillary lymph nodes or if the tumor is larger than two centimeters but not larger than five centimeters and has not spread to the axillary lymph nodes.


Stage IIB breast cancer describes breast cancers in which the tumor is larger than two centimeters but no larger than five centimeters, and there are small groups of breast cancer cells in the lymph nodes. These small groups of cells are larger than 0.2 millimeters but no larger than two millimeters. Stage IIB may also be used to

describe breast cancers in which the tumor is larger than two centimeters but no larger than five centimeters and the cancer has spread to between one and three axillary lymph nodes or to lymph nodes near the breastbone. Tumors that are larger than five centimeters but have not spread to the axillary lymph nodes may also be referred to as stage IIB breast cancers. The five-year survival rate for stage II breast cancers is about 93 percent.

Stage III cancers are invasive breast cancers broken down into three categories: IIIA, IIIB and IIIC. When patients are diagnosed with stage IIIA breast cancer, that means doctors may not have found a tumor in their breast or the tumor may be any size. In stage IIIA, cancer may have been found in four to nine axillary lymph nodes or in the lymph nodes near the breastbone. Tumors larger than five centimeters that are accompanied by small groups of breast cancer cells (larger than 0.2 millimeter but no larger than two millimeters) in the lymph nodes also indicate a breast cancer has advanced to stage IIIA. But stage IIIA may also be used to describe breasts cancers in which the tumor is larger than five centimeters and the cancer has spread to one to three axillary lymph nodes or to the lymph nodes near the breastbone.

A stage IIIB breast cancer diagnosis indicates the tumor may be any size and has spread to the chest wall and/ or the skin of the breast, causing swelling or an ulcer. The cancer may have spread to up to nine axillary lymph

The types of radiation therapy

Radiation therapy is an effective treatment option in the fight against breast cancer. Cancer cells that remain in the breast after surgery can potentially cause significant harm, and radiation therapy can effectively destroy those cells. Cancer cells are less organized than healthy cells, and that makes it hard for cancer cells to repair the damage caused by radiation therapy. There are three main types of radiation:

- External radiation: The most common type of radiation, external radiation therapy employs a linear accelerator that aims a beam of highenergy radiation at cancer-affected areas. Treatment with external radiation is extensive, lasting as long as seven weeks, during which radiation is administered on an outpatient basis five times per week.
- Internal radiation: Internal radiation therapy is being studied for use after a lumpectomy, a surgical procedure in which a lump is removed

from the breast, often before the cancer has spread to other areas. Internal radiation typically involves the use of seeds, which are small pieces of radioactive material placed in the area where the cancer was prior to the lumpectomy procedure being performed. These seeds work by emitting radiation into the surrounding tissue, which is an area that is at great risk of recurrence. Multiple small tubes or catheters are typically used to deliver internal radiation doses.

• Intraoperative radiation: Intraoperative radiation is unique from other forms of radiation in that it is administered during cancer surgery after the cancer has been removed. The underlying breast tissue is exposed during the procedure, when a single, high dose of radiation is directed at the area where the cancer was found. There are two ways to administer intraoperative radiation therapy, neither of which typically takes more than 10 minutes.

- continued from page 8 nodes or may have spread to the lymph nodes near the breastbone.

In stage IIIC breast cancer, doctors may not see any sign of cancer in the breast. If there is a tumor, it may be any size and may have spread to the chest wall and/or the skin of the breast. To be categorized as stage IIIC, the cancer must also have spread to 10 or more axillary lymph nodes or to the lymph nodes above or below the collarbone or to the axillary lymph nodes or lymph nodes near the breastbone. The ACS

notes that women diagnosed with stage III breast cancer are often successfully treated and that the five-year survival rate is 72 percent.

Stage IV

Invasive breast cancers that have spread beyond the breast and lymph nodes to other areas of the body are referred to as stage IV. Stage IV breast cancer may be a recurrence of a previous breast cancer, though some women with no prior history of breast cancer receive stage IV diagnoses. The fiveyear survival rate for stage IV breast cancers is 22 percent.

Dundalk, Parkville gear up for Friday night fight

There's only three weeks left in the football season, and it's been building to this moment since week three. Ever since Parkville topped Perry Hall and cemented themselves as a true contender, I've had this week circled on my calendar.

Parkville sits in third place in the 4A North region, while Dundalk currently sits in third in the 3A North region. These teams match up well. Both have strong defenses capable of big plays. Both have talented wideouts and running backs who can turn minimal gains and broken plays into touchdowns. And both have top tier quarterbacks.

This Friday, we'll get to see these two juggernauts throw down as Parkville visits Dundalk for a 6 p.m. game. And everyone reading this should go.

First and foremost, defenses need to bring the pressure. White has a bit more patience than Sample, which is good and bad. White stays in the pocket allowing plays to build, but has a tendency to hold on too long at times which leads to sacks. On the other end, Sample, while great rolling out and running, tends to get a little erratic when passing under pressure. Both teams will need to constantly be harassing the other quarterback in order to grab a win.

Besides pressure, both teams need to establish the run - and early. If you want to give your quarterback time, you need to have a multi-faceted attack. Vernon Miller is Parkville's stud, and they'll need to feed him early and often. For Dundalk, Isaiah Antol leads the way. Miller and Vernon are similar runners, though Antol possesses a bit more power and Vernon has the edge in speed. When Miller and Antol are on, White and Sample thrive. It's that

Finally, every point matters. So many close games in high school football are decided by missed extra points, I often wonder why teams don't just always go for the two-point conversion. Both teams have capable kickers, but it might be worth it to just throw extra points to the side and go for two every chance. That's no dig at the kickers, but it makes more sense to put the ball in the hands of your studs whenever possible. And given each team's ability, two yards shouldn't be

He eventually gets a mentor/ merchandise-friendly sidekick in Steel, a robotic alien intelligence who looks like the Phantasm ball had it been developed by Radio Shack. Steel also rips off Ellen DeGeneres' Dory character like you wouldn't believe, right down to the fauxcharming memory problems, swim-like movements and sarcastic asides. Steel is voiced by Josh "Who?" Brener, and you'll almost immediately want to delete the CGI program that was used to add him into the film. But without him, you wouldn't learn about the Ultralinks, a race of similarly robotic beings who can control the wind, rain and weather who want to suck all energy from our Earth.

"Max Steel" is a mostly tedious affair, with the reluctant hero slowly getting spoon-fed information throughout the flick about his and his family's past (there are at least three scenes where a character literally says, "We have a lot to talk about") all the while finding and losing his powers as the script calls for it. It's sci-fi gee-whiz, cheese-whiz awkwardly framed as a coming-of-age story. If you're of legal drinking, voting or driving age, this one is NOT for you. "Max Steel" is rated PG-13.

'THE ACCOUNTANT': Almost all the numbers add up... almost

"The Accountant" is one nutty flick, folks. I never thought I'd see a cross between "John Wick" and "Rain Man." And I never thought such a mash-up could ever work! But this film does work... uh, mostly... er, at least enough for me to give it a mild recommend. It's got problems out the wazoo. But so does everything else right now in this crazy, crazy world. At least with this flick, every time it started to come undone, the filmmakers realized it and just threw their star, Ben Affleck, into another cool gun battle with bad guys.

Affleck stars as Christian Wolff, the film's titular numbers man. We meet Christian as a young boy in the office of a psychologist who is trying to describe the kid's level of autism to Christian's mom and dad. Christian can't handle sudden, loud noises. Any change in his routines causes panic attacks. If he is putting together a jigsaw puzzle and misses the last piece, he reacts violently. But a pan up of the camera, and we realize he is putting his latest huge puzzle together... upside down. All the pieces are gray shapes and the picture coming together is face-down on the table.

We then meet Christian as an adult, now played by Affleck, and he's shown to have an almost supernatural ability with numbers. Soon after, we learn that the U.S. Treasury Department under the



leadership of veteran Agent Ray King (J.K. Simmons) has a file on Christian, who is an enigma to King and his agents as he's helped fixed the books for some of the world's most notorious organized crime families and terrorist groups.


So, what happened? How did that disturbed, twitchy boy in that doctor's office go from there to being a numbers cruncher for some of the worst criminals in the world, all from a suburban Chicago strip mall in which he also helps farmers and other blue-collar types turn the tables on the IRS? When Christian is invited out to one happy client's farm for some light target practice, we discover that he has insanely accurate sniper skills. And when some bad men finally come for him, the speed and agility with which he dispatches each of them draws you in further to the guy's story. All the while, he is trying to find a numbers discrepancy hidden in the books of a major technology company, and his equations written in magic marker on the windows of a large, glass-enclosed office look like something out of an M.I.T. classroom.

It's like Affleck suddenly got character envy of his ol' buddy Matt Damon after so many years, towel-snapped him in the sauna, and said, "Oh, yeah, 'Martian' Man! Watch me combine your Will Hunting with your Jason Bourne!" Watching Affleck do insanely complicated addition and subtraction while snapping dudes' necks and Swiss-cheesing them with bullets is just crazy. But Affleck plays the character so confidently, that you largely go with it. To paraphrase Raymond Babbitt, "He's an excellent hitman. He's an excellent getaway driver."

The central story is the keeper. Where the film comes up short is in its investigation subplot in which Simmons' retiring King blackmails a fellow agent, Medina (Cynthia Addai-Robinson), into helping him catch Wolff. The government's hunt for Christian at almost all times feels completely separate from the main plot of Christian and fellow accountant, Dana Cummings (Anna Kendrick), on the run from killers.

King and Medina never really do get all that close to Christian. In fact, the film actually didn't need the Treasury investigation at all. When you really think about it, it truly never factors into the final resolution and outcome at all. It might have been a tighter film if they had left Simmons and Co. on the cutting room floor. But a final, final reveal is surprisingly sweet, if a bit unbelievable, too. What can I say? For the most part, I went with it.



Massive voting fraud coming to Maryland election

Delegate Pat McDonough, Candidate for Congress, is charging that Maryland will be in victim of massive voter fraud in the upcoming election. A few years ago, members of "Voter's Alliance," a volunteer group, conducted an investigation in Frederick County, that uncovered a large number of non-citizens voting in Maryland's elections. The group discovered that these non-citizens were called in for Jury Duty. When the non-citizens arrived at the Jury office, they admitted that although they were registered voters, they were not citizens. They confirmed they were violating the law by signing a required legal document at the Jury office.

Under present Court rules and state law, the information contained in the documents confirming a non-citizen is registered to vote is to be forwarded to the State Election Board. Step 2 requires the Election Board to remove this individual from the voting list and provide the information to the State Prosecutor for future action. None of these mandated actions are being initiated at this time. This means the law is not being enforced and the violators are not being punished. The system is broken and some public figures may need to be called on to provide answers. Remember, at the federal level, these violations are a felony.

Multiplying the number of noncitizen voters discovered in Frederick County by the other 23 sub-divisions brings us to the conclusion that the number of non-citizen voters could be in the thousands in Maryland. This scandal is not a Democrat, Republican or partisan issue. This challenge is about great leaders like Dr. Martin Luther King and Susan B. Anthony who put their lives on the line to maintain equality and integrity in the voter process.

It is hard to believe in this day and age with modern technology, the non-citizens are voting unlawfully. It is even more difficult to believe that these unlawful voters are getting away with this violation and are remaining on the voter's rolls.

This scandal is a form of suppression of voters' rights. Our votes are being cancelled or diluted by a non-citizen who is voting at the same time.

Delegate Pat McDonough attempted to remedy this situation with legislation in the 2016 session of the Maryland General Assembly. The Delegate's House Bill 1122, the "Voter Disclosure Act," would introduce a common sense chain of actions that would protect the voting rolls of Maryland. The State Jury system would be compelled to forward any information discovered about non-citizens voting within 5 business days to the Election Board. The Election Board would then be reguired to remove the violators' names from the voting lists and forward their information to the State Prosecutor for appropriate actions. House Bill 1122 failed in committee by a vote of 12 to 8, along partisan lines.

Delegate Pat McDonough is now demanding that several key actions must be initiated in order to protect Maryland voters during the upcoming election.

#1. He is sending a letter of complaint to the State Prosecutor's office requesting that they summon information from all Jury clerks in every subdivision requiring them to provide any information related to non-citizens being called to Jury Duty and rejected.

#2 In the spirit of bipartisanship, Delegate McDonough will be providing this information to his opponent in this current election and requesting that Congressman Dutch Ruppersberger contact Maryland U.S. Attorney Rosenstein to investigate this matter because it is a violation of federal law. Delegate McDonough stated, "I am asking Congressman Ruppersberger to join me in a partnership to protect the voting rights of Maryland's citizens."

Other jurisdictions have this mechanism as well. In Anne Arundel and Montgomery Counties, the commissions have broader responsibilities or meet on a more regular basis. But Baltimore County has not had a charter review in 25 years.

We live in difficult times. Taxpayers expect government to deliver services in a cost-effective manner. There is no harm in looking at our governing document periodically to make sure that our government is acting as efficiently and effectively as possible.

Parkville man charged in 2006 homicide case

A Parkville man who reported his wife missing in September 2006 has been charged with her murder.

On Sept. 14, 2006, Baltimore County Police responded to the home of Michael and Roxanne Amick in the 4200 block of Necker Avenue in Parkville for a missing person report. Michael Amick told police that his wife, Roxanne, left their home at 2 p.m. on Sept. 13 to go shopping and never returned. She took his 1998 Plymouth Voyager and left her cell phone

At 2:24 p.m., the Plymouth Voyager was located unoccupied behind a shopping center in the 8800 block of Belair Road.

Just before 8:30 a.m. on Sept. 15, 2006, Roxanne Amick's body was located in a wooded area near Belair Road and Perry Hall Road. The body was wrapped in two blankets and was in an area that contained a large amount of poison ivy plants. An autopsy concluded the cause of Roxanne Amick's death was multiple injuries and the manner of her death was homicide.

Michael Amick was brought to police headquarters where he said that he and Roxanne had been involved in an argument and that is why she left. Investigators noticed that Michael Amick had a rash on his arms that went from above his wrists to below where a short sleeve shirt would have ended. A search and seizure warrant was obtained for Michael Amick and he was taken to GBMC hospital to have the rash examined. Doctors determined that the rash was contact dermatitis that was a reaction to plant material like poison ivy. Further medical review indicated that the contact would have occurred within







three days of Sept. 15. Amick did not tell how he might have gotten the rash.

Work gloves had been found in the minivan. Recent advances in DNA technology allowed DNA found inside the right hand work glove to be matched with Michael Amick's DNA profile. The blankets that Roxanne Amick's body was found wrapped in belonged to the Amicks.

Michael Amick moved to Hawaii after Roxanne's death. He recently returned to the Baltimore area

The case was reviewed again by the State's Attorney's Office and detectives were instructed to obtain an arrest warrant for Michael Amick. Detectives obtained the arrest warrant and took him into custody on Oct. 13. Michael Amick is charged with firstdegree murder and is being held without bail at the Baltimore County Detention Center.

Current crime trends

On Oct. 9, there were three street robberies of victims in front of their homes in the White Marsh Precinct. Cases occurred on Sunday during early morning, and late afternoon to early evening hours. Suspects assaulted the victims and demanded money. In two cases, the suspects fled without taking property. In the third case, suspects stole money from the victim. 





Julie Henn appointed to Board of Education

Last week Governor Larry Hogan appointed Julie Henn to the Baltimore County Board of Education. Her appointment will take effect in December.

Henn, who is currently serving as Chair of the Northeast Area Education Advisory Council (NAEAC), has been very active in the Perry Hall area over the last decade when it comes to issues with schools, most notably on the issue of overcrowding.

"Overcrowding is the reason I became involve in the NAEAC," said Henn. "Perry Hall schools have been overcrowded for decades."

According to Henn, she'll be a big help when it comes to educating parents about these issues and how they can make a difference. Essentially, it all comes down to involvement and attending meetings. "The responsibility is twofold. Parents need to be heard, and the board needs to be responsive to those parents. Concerns can't fall on deaf ears."

Henn said that she's been encouraged by the board this year and that she's had multiple discussions with Superintendent Dallas Dance about alleviating overcrowding. "We're all unanimous that there's an issue, we're just not sure yet how we're going to deal with it."

Besides looking to alleviate overcrowding, Henn said that communication is something she will look to improve. "There's opportunities for improvement," she said. "There's more common ground than we realize, but thing's such as the grading policy and heat closure policy get rolled out and the parents don't really get a reason."

Henn is the Chief Information Officer and Director of Technology for QM Quality Matters and holds an Executive MBA from Loyola University.

Kenwood gets a visit from a Blue Angel

Before the Fleet Week festivities kicked off last weekend, members of the Blue Angel team stopped by Kenwood High School to speak with members of Kenwood's NJROTC and AFJROTC programs.

Major Mark Montgomery, who joined the Blue Angels earlier this year, spoke to the group about how he became part of the team. Over the last 11 years he's racked up over 2,500 flight hours and multiple decorations, including 16 Air Medals.

"It comes down to doing the right things, choosing the right friends, and honestly a bit of luck," said Montgomery of his appointment to the Blue Angels. "If you're hanging around with the wrong crowd, drinking and doing drugs or not doing what you're supposed to, you won't find success."

Montgomery stressed the importance of luck, considering the amount of applications the Blue Angels receive each year.

Most of the event was lighthearted discussion with a focus on Montgomery's rise to become a Blue Angel. Montgomery reported to the Naval Air Station in Pensacola, Fla., for aviation indoctrination in April 2003. He jumped around Florida before moving on to Corpus Christi, Tex. He received his wings of gold in September 2004.

Montgomery has been deployed multiple times to Iraq and Afghanistan, and he's had missions and exercises in Italy, Morocco and Spain.

"I'm very fortunate I've been able to see as much of the world as I have," he said. "It can become a little difficult being away from family and friends for lengths of time, but it's worth it."

Montgomery stressed the amount of practice and hard work it takes to pull off the maneuvers that you see performed by the planes during air shows.

"When we start off practicing, we're doing these moves really far away from each other, and with each round of practice we get a little bit closer," Montgomery told the students. "Eventually, we get within a few inches of each other."

Besides practice, Montgomery said that it takes an immense amount of trust to pull off the stunts he and his team do. Given the inherent danger of flying planes so close, one of the students asked about air show casualties. Throughout the history of the Blue Angels, 27 have been killed during shows.

Montgomery mentioned Captain Jeff Kuss, who was killed in a crash back in June during a test run in Tennessee when he didn't eject from his plane. Before Kuss's crash, the last fatality occurred back in 2007.

"Everytime I get in my plane I'm reminded of Captain Kuss and all the others who have lost their lives," Montgomery said soberly.

"I loved going to air shows as a young boy growing up in Annapolis," said first-year Kenwood principal Brian Powell. "So to have them stop by and speak to our ROTC students is just a real treat and honor."
