Colgate's 'Bright Smiles Bright Futures' celebrates 25 years

Students and teachers at Arlington Elementary/Middle School joined Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake, Baltimore Ravens wide receiver Steve Smith, Jr. and Baltimore City Public Health Commissioner Leana Wen and a host of volunteers and friends at the school on Monday, October 3, 2016, to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of Colgate-Palmolive Companies' Bright Smiles – Bright Futures campaign.

"We have made great strides in raising awareness about the importance of oral care and encouraging families to take their children to the dentist and establish good dental habits," said Mayor Rawlings-Blake during the kick-off to the morning's activities.

According to the Baltimore Health Department's Health Disparities Report Card, almost one third of families earning less than \$15,000 have gone two or more years without visiting the dentist. Close to 50 percent of Baltimore families earning between \$15,000 and \$24,000 skip the annual visit to the dentist's chair.

"Educating children about proper oral hygiene health habits and helping underserved communities is at the heart of the Colgate Bright Smiles, Bright Futures program, said Dr. Marsha Butler, Colgate's Vice President for Global Oral Health.

The 200 Arlington Elementary/Middle

school children involved in the event were treated to free dental screenings and an outdoor arcade of fun oral health games to get them involved in being advocates for their own health care.

Other representatives from the Mayor's Office and Colgate, including Dr. Leana Wen, spoke to students during classes about the importance of oral health. Dr. Wen asked students if they had ever experienced a toothache and as the students nodded and raised their hands, she explained the connection between oral health and school success.

"When it's really painful, it is difficult to focus in the classroom or do our work, right?" she said to the children.

The Bright Smiles, Bright Futures campaign has provided free dental screenings, oral-health education and treatment referrals in urban and rural communities across the United States since 1991. Baltimore is one of the 1000 cities and towns across America that is treated to the free screenings. A fleet of nine fully equipped dental vans reaching millions of children. The program's award winning in-school curriculum is used worldwide.

"So many of our students miss days because of health related issues," said Emily Hunter Principal of Arlington Elementary/Middle School, who was grateful for the focus on health at her school.

Hunter pointed out that the day was well spent because her students learned the connection between oral health and health concerns throughout the body. Dental care remains the greatest unmet health need among children in the United States, according to American Pediatric Association. Low-income children are almost twice as likely to develop cavities as middle-class and wealthy children, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"We are grateful for the support that the Colgate mobile van has provided in helping us dive home the importance of this issue," said Rawlings-Blake.

After the election, back to important things

Soon, thank heaven, the 2016 election will be over. Americans can stop fussing over how many women Donald Trump molested, or what Russian hackers found in Hillary Clinton e-mails. Then, I hope, thinking people can focus again on issues that really matter:

Can America finally gain complete universal health insurance covering all citizens as a human right— a government-run national system suppressing medical costs, as exists in most democracies and all industrialized nations?

Can economic changes reduce the amassing of wealth by the billionaire one percent, and give the middle class a better chance?

Can controls manage the pistol saturation that gives America the worst murder rate among civilized nations?

Will pollution enforcement finally reduce the catastrophic menace of global warming?

Will marijuana become legal nationwide, ending the police-and-prison prohibition that works no better than Prohibition of alcohol did?

Will “black lives matter” become a reality, reducing police killings of unarmed African American men?

Can better birth control prevent millions of unwanted pregnancies that drive desperate women and girls to seek termination?

Will the barbaric death penalty finally cease in the United States, as it has in virtually all democracies?

Will white supremacy fade as the rising tide of Hispanics, Asians, blacks, Pacific Islanders, Muslims, etc., makes America more multicultural, with no majority?

Will college become free for all Americans capable of advanced study?

Will U.S. militarism -- by far the world's largest -- continue costing taxpayers \$1 trillion per year (counting veteran expense and interest on past spending done with borrowed money)?

Will America continue imprisoning more than two million people, giving this country the worst incarceration rate among modern societies?

Can changes prevent U.S. corporations from laying off American workers and shifting production to low-wage countries— and prevent U.S. corporations from stashing profits overseas to duck taxes?

Can human rights grow more entrenched around the world to reduce cruelty?

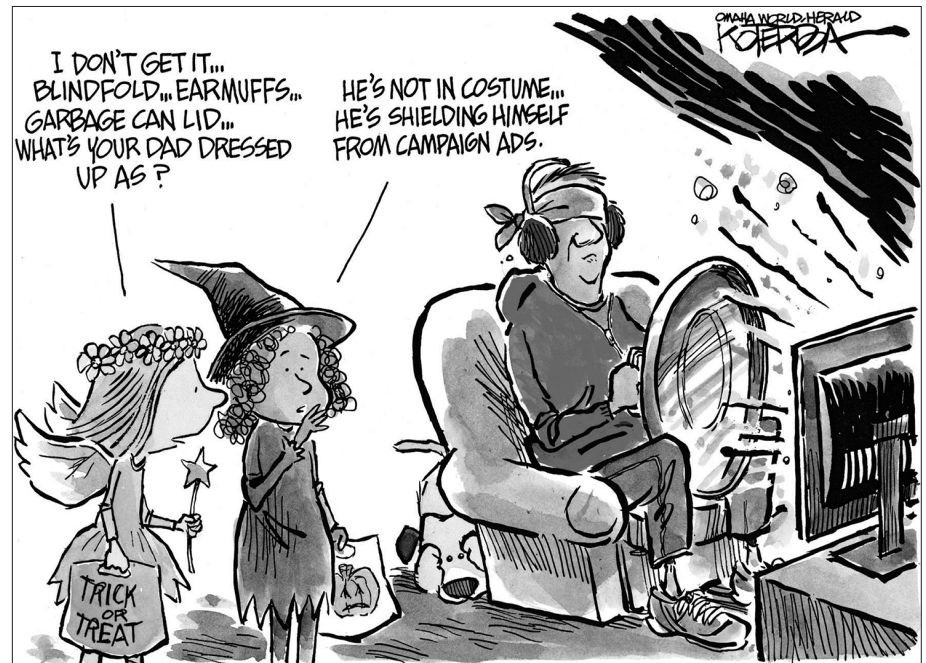
Etc., etc.— After the tumult and shouting of the 2016 campaign ends, goals like these should get new attention. They concern liberal democracy, the system of government of the people, by the people, for the people.

During the past century, liberal democracy won enormous gains: Women won the right to vote. Couples won the right to practice birth control. Retirees won Social Security pensions. Jobless workers won unemployment compensation and other safety net provisions. Labor won the right to organize. African Americans escaped Jim Crow segregation. Medicare and Medicaid expanded health treatment. The disabled and workers hurt on the job gained protections. Censorship of books, movies and magazines was wiped out. The Affordable Care Act expanded health treatment further. Gays won, first decriminalization, then the right to marry.

In all these struggles, conservatives fought fierce resistance, but liberal progressives finally carried the day, improving humanity and western civilization. I hope this pattern continues forever.

The 2016 election has been a carnival, a circus, a farce. In only a few days, it will fade into the past. But the deep public questions— things that really matter— still will stare us in the face.

Race and Beyond: Say It Ain't So, Ruth Bader Ginsburg

Out in the wilds of the Internet exist two sets of memes establishing Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg as a champion of progressive idealism.

In one of them, Justice Ginsburg assumes the alter ego of the so-called Notorious R.G.B. This Tumblr fabrication equates the diminutive and eloquent jurist with the robust and bawdy rapper Christopher George Latore Wallace, also known as Biggie, Biggie Smalls, or—as is pertinent to this column—the Notorious B.I.G.

In the other, well-trafficked meme, Ginsburg is the shero of feminism, expressing her displeasure at the inability of her male colleagues on the Supreme Court to comprehend a woman's right to control her body.

With nothing more than a compilation of side-eye facial gestures, Ginsburg shows her disdain for mansplaining.

As these images went viral, a pop culture icon emerged: There are now t-

shirts bearing Ginsburg's likeness and breathless online articles to prove it.

So it is akin to an "Et tu, Brute?" moment for her erstwhile unquestioningly adoring, progressive fans to learn that she harshly criticized the San Francisco 49ers quarterback Colin Kaepernick and a handful of other professional football players and their supporters for refusing to stand for the national anthem prior to the kickoff of their games.

During a wide-ranging interview earlier this week with Yahoo News' Katie Couric, Ginsburg shared her feelings about the football players' silent protest: "I think it's really dumb of them," she said. When asked to elaborate, she added:

Would I arrest them for doing it? No. I think it's dumb and disrespectful. I would have the same answer if you asked me about flag burning. I think it's a terrible thing to do, but I wouldn't lock a person up for doing it. I would point out how ridiculous it seems to me to do such an act... If they want to be stupid, there's no law that should be preventive. If they want to be arrogant, there's no law that prevents them from that. What I would do is strongly take issue with the point of view that they are expressing when they do that.

Reactions from her fans were swift and negative. A stoutly progressive friend and colleague of mine shook her head in sadness as she lamented, "It's so sad. The woman who detests mansplaining is now raceplaining."

A more prominent voice, singer and songwriter Ne-Yo, profanely disagreed with Ginsburg and expressed disappointment about her comments in an interview with the entertainment news website TMZ. "She's right," he said in a recorded message about the justice. "There is no rules to stop people from

being stupid the same way there is no rules to stop her from saying the dumb s*** she just said. ... I expected better."

Other notable voices challenged the justice, as well. For example, writing for The Nation, Dave Zirin takes Ginsburg to task:

I am less struck by the words "dumb," "stupid," and "arrogant" than by the words she does not say: "police," "racism," "injustice," or "death." There is no reckoning with the reason why so many people feel driven to kneel in protest and raise their fist in the name of black lives.

Whether you love or hate the San Francisco 49ers quarterback, his political principles and actions are anything but arrogant. ... Instead, he is risking his precarious place in the sports world by choosing this moment in his career to stand up. That's not arrogance. It's conviction. To even call Kaepernick "arrogant" sounds much too close to "uppity" for comfort.

As painfully disappointing as Ginsburg's comments are—and they are profoundly upsetting—this is yet again another teachable moment in the country's ever-evolving struggle to recognize how institutional racism—which is so deeply embedded in the national conscience—cripples even those who are allies in the struggle for equality.

Ginsburg is a product of her world. She is an 83-year-old woman who has devoted her life to the law. As Mark Joseph Stern points out in an insightful Slate article, Ginsburg "was never really 'Notorious RGB.'" Instead, he writes, "Ginsburg's social and professional cohort is largely limited to an elite circle of friends in the arts, the law, and academia. She is not a rabble-rouser and probably does not know any rabble-rousers."

Thus, as her comments suggest, Ginsburg believes there is a right and a wrong way to protest, to which those who support Kaepernick's view take fitful exception. Her thinking on this matter fails to accept that values are more important than tactics and that protest is a legitimate, necessary, and uncomfortable process to wrest change in a society that is more comfortable with the status quo.

What this candid peek into the mind of a modern-day liberal icon should tell us is that sometimes even favored allies won't—or perhaps, can't—walk the walk in every cause because sometimes they are incapable of seeing the world from where others stand. It's a good reminder, as Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. noted in his famous piece "Letter from a Birmingham Jail": "Shallow understanding from people of good will is more frustrating than absolute misunderstanding from people of ill will. Lukewarm acceptance is much more bewildering than outright rejection."

Ginsburg is no less an ally to progressivism in the wake of her imprudent comments than she was before she made them. Her record on the bench shows her as a stout and outspoken advocate for women, civil rights, and equality. In all likelihood, her opinions to come from the Supreme Court will still affirm progressive causes and issues. It's just that in this case, it hurts to see her exposed mind because she's so painfully wrong.

Fly Girl Network seeks to empower young African-Americans

Tiffany Ginyard is adamant that a strong sense of perceived self-efficacy is an important and contributing factor to both the prevention of diminished self-concept and self-sufficiency in young adulthood.

And, when the former teacher who now works for the Baltimore Times started the nonprofit, The Fly Girl Network in 2010, she did so with a mission to create opportunities for development and enterprise for young women by providing the resources that would position them for promising futures.

The organization offers mentorship to local women, particularly African-Americans to fill any gaps left by broken homes, foster care or in those who might encounter other disadvantages.

Ginyard says the Fly Girl Network represents a valuable resource for any young woman who might be trying to cope with adolescence.

The nonprofit serves young women by hosting and sponsoring social, academic and cultural events and activities designed to strengthen adolescent and young adult females, helping them to make positive and productive decisions that could help lead to a bright future.

"I've realized by my upbringing how important it is to have access to support services, and how important it is to help push our young women forward," said Ginyard, whose organization will host 30 young women at its inaugural Fly & Fearless Empowerment Conference at Stratford University from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, October 29, 2016.

Ginyard, a Baltimore City College graduate says the purpose of the event is to inspire young women to fall in love with themselves and to live fearlessly in pursuit of their wildest dreams. The event's theme is "First Love You," and its goal is to encourage participants to engage in candid conversations about being a female.

Workshops will be held on topics that reflect the core values of The Fly Girl Network including: self-awareness, integrity, courage, enterprise, spirit, poise, service and sisterhood, according to Ginyard.

"Our goal is to make this event free for all young ladies living in underserved communities and low-income families interested in attending," she said. "I've expanded the age from 13 to 17 to 14 to 24 because we realized that we can't stop when a girl graduates high school. Life is now real for them because they're on their own and they have to find their resources and some of them have children."

Among the programs and services, the nonprofit offers are the BMF Media Institute, which Ginyard says is an enriched experience in media production, social development, and service learning. Through that service, young women learn concepts in several disciplines including media literacy, journalism, podcasting, photography, videography, and creative writing. Par-

ticipants also publish their own works using video, audio, and the Internet.

Ginyard noted that it is for African-American girls to be themselves in a culture that discourages individuality. So, as part of the organization's mission to encourage young black women to cultivate their own concept of beauty that embraces their own skin and enhances the beauty within, The Fly Girl Network offers a program called The Butterfly Profiles Project, where participants express their personal statements of beauty through videography and photography.

"I don't profess to know it all but we're raised to compete as black women with the media images and we're raised to keep a certain façade up," Ginyard said. "On the inside, however, there are insecurities that needs to be cleaned up."

To further her effort to inspire a coalition of healthy, purpose-driven and confident young women, Ginyard insists that those who work with her Fly Girl Network are prepared to offer more than just mentoring and coaching services.

"Transportation is needed. I'm a strong believer in a grassroots approach because I've been doing this work for 15 years and I know that transportation is a really big thing and if people can't get around, if it's not convenient, they won't do it and these girls need transportation and we must have mentors and coaches who are willing to provide that transportation," Ginyard said.

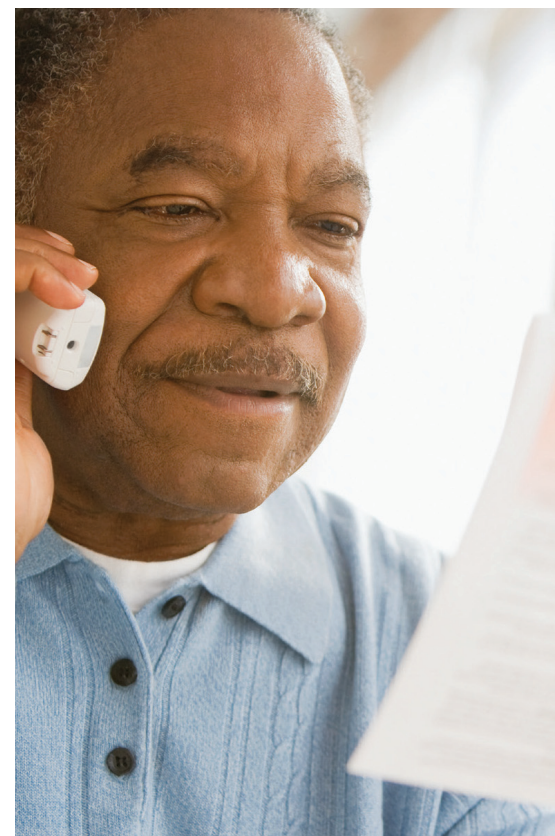

Ravens loss shows Jimmy Smith's value can't be measured by stats alone

The Baltimore Ravens lost a close game to the New York Giants on Sunday, October 16, 2016. Protecting a lead with 1:24 seconds left, the Ravens gave up a touchdown on a 64-yard catch and run by Odell Beckham Jr. won the game.

The play came on a fourth and one situation. Defensive coordinator Dean Pees made the call for man-to-man coverage, but Baltimore's best cover corner, Jimmy Smith was not on the field.

Smith left the game with a concussion and did not come back onto the field to start the second half. Unfortunately for the Ravens, not having Smith on the field has been a frequent occurrence.

The Ravens signed Smith to a four-year contract extension worth \$48 million with \$21 million guaranteed in 2015. Smith battled lingering effects from a four injury that landed him on the injured reserve list in 2014.

Despite the discomfort from the injury, Smith posted three interceptions last season. The sixth-year cornerback's impact cannot truly be measured by his personal stats, however.

Baltimore has relied upon his coverage skills to minimize the effectiveness of opposing wide receivers. For example, when Smith was in the game against Beckham Jr., the dynamic receiver only had two catches for 11 yards and did not score a touchdown.

Beckham ran wild once Smith was out, posting six catches for 211 yards and two touchdowns, including the game-winning score.

Much has been made about Beckham's antics after the whistle when it comes to

interaction with opposing cornerbacks. Smith had a message for Beckham leading up to the game.

"All that extra hitting and talking is not going to fly," Smith said on Thursday. "Hit me after the whistle—there's going to be a fight."

Another example of how Smith can impact a game without it showing the box score came on the Ravens final goal line stand in Super Bowl XLVII. The Ravens were once again protecting a late lead.

It was fourth down and the Super Bowl was on the line. San Francisco 49ers quarterback Colin Kaepernick went to his top target, wide receiver Michael Crabtree throughout the game.

Crabtree lined up against Smith and Kaepernick lofted a touch pass in his

direction in the corner of the end zone. Smith jammed Crabtree at the line and prevented him from getting into position to make the catch. Smith's defensive

play sealed the Super Bowl win for the Ravens that year.

At 6' feet 2" and 206-pounds, Smith is the ideal blend of size and athleticism to play cornerback. His long arms allow him to be disruptive at the line of scrimmage.

The Ravens pass defense is ineffective when Smith is not in the game. Smith is not viewed as the clear best at his position like Deion Sanders or Darrelle Revis were, but like them, he allows the Ravens defense to do a lot more schematically when he is in the game.

Pees, does not have to worry about rotating coverage over the top of Smith to help him cover the speedy receivers that are featured throughout the NFL. Smith has the speed to turn and run with most receivers if he does not get a quick jam on them at the line.

His coverage ability allows the defense to focus on taking out other aspects of the offenses that they face. When healthy, Smith can be relied upon to take care of the best receivers.

‘Boys of Dunbar’ is a winner!

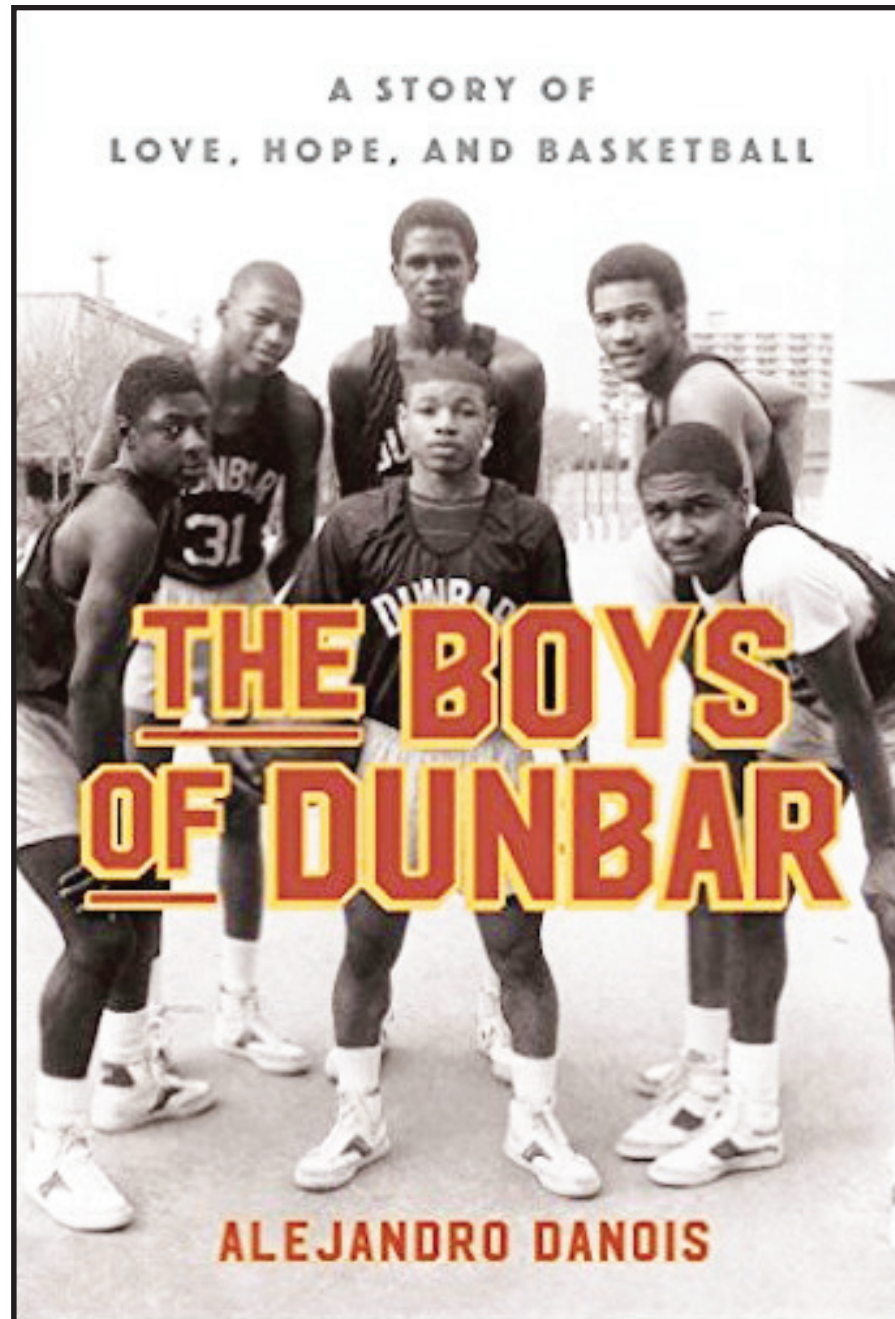
The Boys of Dunbar: A Story of Love, Hope, and Basketball. It’s hard to put down this book. Alejandro Danois, a native of Brooklyn, New York has curated a well-written account of the Dunbar Poets, Paul Laurence Dunbar High School’s nationally acclaimed basketball team.

“Boys of Dunbar” is more than a book about basketball. At a deeper level, it’s an inspiring tale about the magnificence of the human spirit played out in the lives of young people on and off the court. For Tyrone “Muggsy” Bogues, Gary Graham, David “Gate” Wingate, Reggie “Russ” Williams, Reggie “Truck” Lewis and Tim Dawson, and nine other darn good players, attending Dunbar and playing basketball taught them how to cope with the struggles they faced growing up in the crime-ridden public housing communities. They learned how to survive difficult, challenging and often, dangerous times.

At center stage in their story is Dunbar’s 1981-82 (29-0), undefeated basketball season. The team was led by the stellar 5’3” point guard Muggsy. The head coach, revered as a father figure among members of the team, was Bob Wade. Prior to taking the reigns, he served as assistant coach at Dunbar to the incomparable, late William “Sugar” Cain, who passed the torch after 32 successful years.

Wade, also an ex-NFL cornerback, comes across in the book as a mix of a brilliant basketball strategist and a hard-as-nails U.S. Marine Corp drill instructor. Wade once played under NFL’s legendary coach Vince Lombardi, (then, with the “Washington Redskins”). So, it’s evident where some of that tough guy, take-another-lap-around-the-field persona came from.

The 1980-81 season ended on a bummer note for the Poets. They lost to the Calvert Hall Cardinals, coached by the Catholic League legend, Mark Am-
atucci, (94-91), at the Towson Center before a capacity audience. The game went into triple overtime. The Poets were “actually winning by nine points



with less than two minutes to play in regulation,” writes Danois.

After that bitter defeat, Wade and his team, were committed to the 81-82 season— not only for the win, but to also extract some sweet revenge on the “boy-ohs” from Towson, who wore the cardinal and gold uniforms. From the first practice session—incidentally they usually lasted about four hours— Wade pushed hard to create a mindset of victory, no matter how high the price.

Danois takes readers through this phe-

nomenal season game by game. Noting, poignantly at times, what was going on inside the sometimes difficult family lives of the players. His words ring with the pain-filled truth of how these youth soldiered forward despite the roadblocks and the setbacks their families faced.

Lurking on the perimeter of this story are the ubiquitous drug dealers who are responsible for the havoc and ravaging of inner city neighborhoods. The 81-82 Dunbar carried with them the memory of what happened to one of the school’s’

greatest basketball stars, Allen “Skip” Wise, who was “the man” in the early ‘70s. Wise only lasted one year at the University of Clemson, turned pro and then became a serious drug user. He also served time for drug related offenses.

Wade’s players knew that this could be their fate too, if they hung around with the “wrong characters.”

Besides drugs, Danois also mentions another curse that seriously impacted all the blue-collar, neighborhoods in the city in the late ‘70s and early ‘80s, and particularly in black East Baltimore— deindustrialization.

During this era, globalists pushed through trade agreements, like NAFTA, that robbed the U.S. of many of its steel mills, shipyards and booming manufacturing plants, such as the Bethlehem Steel’s Sparrows Point plant.

There are a host of unsung heroes in the communities around Dunbar High that also shaped the lives of the players and other students at the school.

One of them is Leon Howard. He ran the Lafayette Projects’ Recreation Center. He was Muggsy’s first mentor. Another hero was the long time principal of Dunbar, the late Julia B. Woodland. She was a first class motivator, who insisted on the surrounding communities being an “integral part of the school community.”

Does Wade’s Dunbar team get its revenge on Calvert Hall in the end? You will have to read the book to get the answer to that one. In addition, Danois also addresses how the lives of the members of the team played out post Dunbar, including perhaps, the “eighth wonder of the world”— Tyrone “Muggsy” Bogues.

Summing up, Alejandro Danois has written a gem of a sports story. It belongs in the library of all lovers of high school athletics. Danois definitely takes home a win for this one.

Baltimore resident founds organization to serve Rwandan refugees

Eugenie Mukeshimana was a young adult and eight months pregnant when the genocide began in Rwanda in 1994.

She gave birth while hiding from extremist Hutu genocidaires and, at the end of the genocide, the widow was forced to rebuild her life, finding solace in working with communities that have been divided and disintegrated as a result of the dastardly massacre waging in central/eastern Africa.

Last month, Mukeshimana traveled to the nation's capital to participate in the Refugee Congress, an advocacy and advisory organization comprised of refugees, asylum seekers and stateless individuals from each of the 50 United States and the District of Columbia.

Their mission is to promote the well-being, integration, and dignity of all refugees, asylum seekers and stateless individuals in the U.S. and beyond by bringing their voices and experiences to inform decision makers on domestic and international issues and policies that affect those groups.

"I have been raising awareness about conflicts that cause people to leave home in search for a safer place to rebuild their lives," Mukeshimana said. "I use my voice as a survivor of one of the worst conflicts to educate students and teachers, policy makers both at the UN and U.S. lawmakers, and the general public. The hope is that they would put pressure on their representative to do more to help those in need as well as reach out to others in their community to continue the support for humanitarian programs that help refugees around the world," she said.

Mukeshimana, who settled in Baltimore, has even spoken to cadets at West Point Military Academy about gender risks in armed conflicts and she's also worked with legal counsels and other professionals to assist individuals who are in the process of adjusting their immigration status.

"I provide social and emotional support, language and cultural integration guidance to newcomers. Many have gone through unimaginable pain," she

said. "Now that they feel safe here, they often are in a better place to deal with feeling and pains that they have been suppressing and pushing aside for so long," Mukeshimana said, adding that she also helps to organize events like retreats to strengthen the sense of community among survivors and use those gatherings to provide training for critical skills.

"One of such retreats was held two years ago at Harvard Law School, and brought together over 40 genocide survivors," she said.

Mukeshimana, emigrated to the United States in 2001 to pursue a degree in social work at the College of St. Rose in Albany, New York. She soon noticed that her classmates and teachers had little to no knowledge about the tragedy she had personally suffered seven years earlier, which inspired her to embark on a new mission to educate students, teachers, and other community groups

about the crime of genocide.

After graduating, Mukeshimana worked with homeless families in New York and New Jersey, helping them to regain housing stability and jumpstart their lives.

In response to the increased demand for assistance by fellow genocide survivors emigrated to the United States with no support system to help them address the unique challenges they faced coming to America, Mukeshimana founded the Genocide Survivor's Support Network. The charitable organization's mission is to help genocide survivors rebuild their lives and educate communities about genocide.

"Sometimes, under the circumstances of heavy grief and pain, you forget the normalcy of life. It's not normal to dig up mass graves and attend funerals every weekend like we did in Rwanda in the years that followed the genocide,"

she said. "Every refugee carries scars of the horrors they've experienced. Some are visible, others are invisible. Despite this burden, when given a chance, they try to carry on and make life better for themselves and their children.

"I want people to remember that refugees are people too. Like everybody else, they too have dreams, skills, are faithful, and want to live a peaceful life. They share in our cultural values such as quality education, hard work, and perseverance," she continued.

"They may not get off the plane loaded with skills, but are fast learners and will make it here if we give them a chance. After all, they have been tested in life in ways that words can't even describe and yet, they still believe in humanity and have not given up on living. How can we give up on them?"

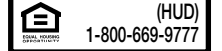
