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
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
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
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
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THE ROBINSON-WEST PLANTATION Tumbleweed Smith



Point Blank is a small place in San Jacinto County just west of Lake Livingston. It got its name from a French governess who was hired to teach children on the Robinson Plantation. She arrived when the cotton was high and the ground was covered in white. She exclaimed in her native language, "pointe blanche," which translates into the English words "white point." When it came time to establish a post office, the place took on the name Point Blank.

The Robinson family arrived in what is now Point Blank in 1846 when Texas was a brand new state. Land was cheap and fertile and the Robinson clan left Alabama to carve a future in the Lone Star State. They bought 3500 acres and their sixty slaves built a beautiful home that looks like something from Gone With The Wind. Sam Houston used to spend the night with the Robinsons when he was traveling. He lived not to far away. The Robinsons lived on the place one hundred and twenty hears then sold it to Bill and Barbara West. The Wests have been in the house nearly forty years. Barbara died in 2014 but Bill carries on, giving lectures about the place, conducting tours of the grounds and entertaining his children and grandchildren.

Bill loves to look for artifacts with his metal detector and has found enough treasures to turn his barn into a museum. It contains tools, jewelry, coins, glassware, silverware and other items from the Robinson family. My favorite is a mop made of corn shucks, the creation of a slave. The Robinson-West River Plantation is a state archeological landmark.

Bill has interviewed several descendants of both the Robinsons and their slaves and has written two books about the place. Their titles are TO LIVE AGAIN and JOURNEY TO THE ROBINSON-WEST RIVER PLANTA-TION.

Bill is an ex-coach and teacher. Huntsville ISD named him Teacher of the Year in 2000. He spent some years in Arizona where he had a scholarship to Grand Canyon University in Phoenix. He later taught and coached in Flag-staff, eventually settling n Sedona. During the summers he worked as a forest ranger in northern Arizona and wrote a book about the beauty of the Oak Creek-Sedona area. The Wests had a home in the middle of Oak Creek Canyon. They were a popular couple. Just before moving back to Texas, Bill and Barbara were named Sedona's Man and Woman of the year.

I had a great visit with Bill. I arrived at the plantation on a Sunday afternoon and immediately we got in his pickup and drove around the place. He showed me a special picnic area overlooking a creek where he and Barb went to solve all the problems of the world. We drove to Onalaska for supper and when we got back, I had one of the biggest thrills of my life. I got to sleep in the same room where Sam Houston slept. Although the plantation does not have overnight accommodations, Bill extended me a surprise invitation to spend the night. The next morning he prepared a breakfast we shared at the place where he and Barb solved all the problems of the world.

I know professional watermelon growers concentrate mostly on summer melons. They know that people like to eat them at picnics, reunions and at the lake during the summertime. But a few Hopkins County backyard gardeners STILL have some prize melons on the vine now, heading into late October! They are letting them attain size and sweetness from the extended Indian Summer we've had with it's moderate temperatures. But they are kept busy supplying the water needs of the vines, as rain can't be counted on these days!

Stan Cooper is a local engineer who grows food year-round in his greenhouse. He also has a prize watermelon patch in his yard. He planted a couple of different varieties. The round striped ones have really done well. He harvested a 35-pounder on October 14 to take to a church function. He also harvested a 25-pounder that same week which I got a slice of. It was probably the most perfect sweet and fragrant melon I can remember, ever! He says he has a few more that are still maturing out there.



Here's a melon I saw at Fall Festival. Not sure if it was entered in the Creative Arts contest, or if it was just brought in for display, but this melon weighed almost 60 pounds! You can see, it almost fills the seats of two folding chairs, side by side! The oblong, green stripe melon was grown by Linda Phillips from a patch in Sulphur Springs, and it weighed in at 55 pounds.



I ran across a gourd-grower from down near Kilgore, Texas. This man and his wife raise a few acres of the gourds which they make into nifty items to sell as bird houses, windchimes, dippers and more. They had a large booth at Fall Festival with their wares. They also brought in a quantity of un-improved gourds straight from the garden which filled up two large plastic tubs. This variety is the color and shape of potatoes, but MUCH LARGER!



As the autumn comes on and frost gets near, we will talk about prize pumpkins and what to do with all those green tomatoes and the peppers you'll have to gather before frost.

Finally, let's show this year's crop of Fall Festival Cover Girl contestants. Just four this year, but they were all keepers, making it hard to select the winner. In the end, Maddie Peavler of Yantis was named Miss Cover Girl, and Cami
