

## Veterans Day facts and figures

Veterans Day, once known as Armistice Day, was first celebrated on November 11, 1919, the anniversary of the end of World War I. In 1928, the United States Congress passed a resolution for Armistice Day to be an annual observation, and by 1938, the day became a national holiday.

Differing from Memorial Day in May, Armistice Day, which would be renamed Veterans Day in 1954 under President Dwight Eisenhower, pays tribute toa ll veterans. Memorial Day commemorates those veterans who lost their lives.

Americans celebrate Veterans Day, while residents of Great Britain, Canada and Australia celebrate Remembrance Day. Those who want to learn more about Veterans Day can consider the following facts.

According to the American Community Survey, there were 19.3 million military veterans in the United States in 2014. Of those, 1.6 million were fe-

California, Texas and Florida comprise the states with the largest number of veterans, equalling one million or more.

Veterans consist of people who served in the military. This includes the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, Merchant Marines and Coast Guard. Veterans serve in times of war and peace.

The word "veteran" comes from the Old English language and means "old, experienced soldier." The first use of the word was documented in 1789.

Although many veterans are working, and the average annual income of male veterans is \$37,000, some veterans continue to be unemployed. According to data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the overall unemployment rate for veterans rose to 7.6 percent in January 2013. The unemployment rate of post-9/11 veterans or those who participated in the Gulf War reached 6.2 percent.

Upon retiring or being discharged, veterans may need help acclimating to life outside the military. The Department of Veterans Affairs says about 30 percent of Vietnam War veterans have been diagnosed with post-traumatic stress disorder, or PTSD.

# November is National Hospice Month

Each November we celebrate National Hospice Month. This is a time to step up our efforts to help our community understand how hospice care can benefit both the patient who has a life-limiting condition and his or her loved ones.

Coastal Hospice educates at speaking engagements for any group, in one-onone meetings, and in publications, from brochures to newsletters. In the past year or so, we have found resources to invest in advertising that describes the improved quality of life our patients realize, especially when they come to us while they are still able to participate in their care. Having time in hospice care allows them to enjoy the company of a volunteer, experience the security of a team available on call 24/7 or perhaps walk a spiritual journey. As a result of our outreach efforts, the number of patients and families we serve is growing. As I write this, there are 187 patients in our care; last year on this date, there were 147; five years ago, 126.

That increase doesn't mean that more people in our community are dying. What it does mean is that more people are taking advantage of the support of a hospice physician, nurse, aide, social worker, spiritual counselor and volunteer who all put the patient's goals and needs first. That's our promise, and it is central to the hospice philosophy.

Serving a growing number of patients can mean something else: While many of the patients and families have a clear understanding of the patient's prognosis and of hospice care, a growing number do not. When Congress created the Medicare Hospice Benefit 33 years ago, it was limited to those expected to live six months or less if the disease or condition followed its normal course (patients who live longer can be recertified for coverage if still eligible). That six-month provision holds today. Yet when many patients are referred for hospice care, this has not been explained to them in a clear way. Many are referred much later than that, when there are only days or weeks left. Nationally and locally, one third of all hospice patients are referred in their last few days of life. For some, the painful and frightening news that the patient has limited time comes first from a Coastal Hospice admissions nurse. Rocked by this news, the patient and family often struggle to absorb the information the nurse or other team members then offer.

For these patients and families, the

hospice journey is even harder than it is for others. This year, as we recognize National Hospice Month, please keep in mind those who find themselves or their loved ones closer to the end than they were prepared to accept. Just as they need our care and support, they need the love and understanding of their friends and neighbors.

Between 1971 and 1977, Veterans Day was celebrated on the fourth Monday in October. It was changed back to its original date, November 11, in 1975 when President Gerald Ford signed bill S.331 into law. The change went into effect beginning in 1978

An American soldier was buried at the national cemetery in Arlington on November 11, 1921. His identity was unknown, and the gravesite is known as the "Tomb of the Unknown Soldier." A guard from the Society of the Honor Guard stands watch over the grave each year on Veterans Day, and the president or another high-ranking member of the government places a wreath on the grave.

Veterans Day occurs each year on November 11, marking the end of World War I. The day has evolved into a celebration and remembrance of the heroism of America's brave soldiers.



data power point presentation and 2016 Worcester County Community Strengths and Themes Survey (CSTA) on our website, worcesterhealth.org, for community review.

Created by the Worcester County Health Department (WCHD), the CHA underscores positive trends such as a lower teen birth rate, increasing numbers for residents covered by health insurance, and declining rates of binge and underage drinking. The CHA also highlights areas that need improvement, including high diabetes and obesity rates, a general lack of physical activity, and rising addiction cases in Worcester County.

WCHD used information from a collection of reports to create the CHA, with data taken from the US Census Bureau, the most recent Maryland Youth Risk Behavior Survey, and the Behavior Risk Factor Surveillance System, among other sources. The assessment includes information on demographics and social economic factors, chronic health conditions, health risk behaviors, and other benchmarks related to community wellness



# The Finger Lakes region: closer than Napa Valley

Last month's article about Bully Hill Vinevards in the southern end of the Finger Lakes region of New York inspired me to do some more research into wineries in that area. The region is quite renowned for its winemaking with over 100 wineries. In fact, you can make Finger Lakes Wine Country a vacation destination similar to Napa Valley, California. The area is open year-round, with plenty of outdoor activities such as camping, boating, harvest festivals, skiing, and simply taking romantic drives.

The Finger Lakes American Viticultural Area (AVA) is a wine alliance that was formed on October 1, 1982 with a mission of increasing the visibility and reputation of the participating wineries. The area covers over 11,000 acres along the Seneca, Cayuga, Keuka, and Canandaigua Lakes. The majority of the wines produced are Riesling wines which thrive due to the cool climate and soil which contains shale left behind by glaciers over 10,000 years ago. At www.fingerlakeswinealliance.com/riesling, the quality of their Riesling wines is described with this quote, "Our shallow soils and beds of shale produce wines with steely minerality, natural acidity, liveliness, and balanced alcohol."


An easy way to plan your travel route is to choose from among three main wine trails. The largest of these is Seneca Lake Wine Trail with 35 member wineries, then the Cayuga Lake Wine Trail with 16, and the Keuka Lake Wine Trail with 8. There are festivals and special events throughout the year such as the Seneca Lake Pasta & Wine Weekend in January, the Cayuga Lake Wine & Herb Fest in April, and the Seneca Lake Smokin' Summer Kickoff in June. October offers a Corning Wineglass Marathon, and December hosts a number of holiday open houses. You can find these events and others at http://www.fingerlakeswinecountry.c om/things-to-do/events/.

In addition to producing over 200,000 cases of Riesling wines per

year, other grape varietals that do well in the climate are the Gewürztraminer and Pinot Gris whites and the Cabernet Franc and Pinot Noir reds. Ice wines, described in our recent article on Canadian wines, also do well here. Another red wine varietal in this region is the Lemberger, which originally got its name from the Slovenian town of Lemberg. The wine is quite popular in European countries such as Slovenia, Austria, Germany, Hungary, and the Czech Republic. The grape is not to be confused with the odorous German Limberger cheese. An article written by Andy Purdue in December 2013 described that Lemberger wines are delicious, yet they do seem encumbered by the perceived association with the smelly cheese. His interesting article is entitled "Lemberger's Long Slide into Oblivion."

Driving to the Finger Lakes Wine Country is quite doable with many of the wineries located between six and eight hours away. While it is best to confirm the operating hours of the wineries you plan to visit, the typical hours are from 10 a.m. - 5 p.m. daily including Sundays. There are lots of lodging choices, including bed and breakfasts, hotels, motels, familyfriendly and romantic cottages, and campgrounds and cabins. Examples include the Country Inn & Suites in Ithaca, the Chalet of Canandaigua B&B, the 1907 Bragdon House B&B in Geneva, and the Bud Valley Campground in Prattsburgh.

If it's your first visit to the Finger Lakes, you may want to go during the fall when the changing leaves create stunning views for as far as the eye can see. The Seneca Lake Wine Trail with its 35 member wineries may be just the place to start. Here are a few of the wineries you can look into: The Lamoreaux Landing Wine Cellars, Castel Grisch Winery, the Glenora Wine Cellars, Inn & Restaurant, and the Hazlitt 1852 Vineyards. This small peek into what awaits in the wine country of Upstate New York is certainly piquing this author's interest!



**Bridge of Sighs**by Richard Russo

What is the son but an extension of the father? -Frank Herbert

To travel during the autumn through the northeastern United States that reach all the way to Canada presents a wonderful

presents panorama of leafy trees turning all tints of red, orange and yellow. For those with the discerning eye of a realist this beautiful foliage as it gradually diminishes will reveal an intermittent landscape of skeletal hulks of large, decaying buildings featuring broken windows and encroaching undergrowth. These are the factories that helped build America before and after World War II, making their owners into mil-

lionaires. The structures are now unsightly monoliths. Some have been turned into a useful second life as apartments, commercial offices and health centers. But unfortunately, most have not.

In the past, such a manufacturing endeavor was the lynchpin, the hub around which small town living enfolded. Unfortunately, many of these industries were major polluters such as those presented in the familiar disaster of Love Canal in Niagara Falls, NY in the 1970s and the Koch Industries of today. Those who didn't work in the factory provided the services and needs for those who did. This is the canvas upon which Richard Russo paints his latest novel "Bridge of Sighs" and the Lynch family, a supplier of food and sundries with their corner convenience store in a small town.

Growing up as Mr. Russo did in Gloversville, NY, a place similar to his fictional Thomaston, NY, the site of his novel, undoubtedly was the genesis of the story. And the polluter for his novel is the local tannery, alternately employer and killer of the residents. As the nearby stream flows past the tannery, each day it carries the remnant

color of the daily dye run and the cancer that will fell Louis P. Lynch.

Without doubt Mr. Russo wields a master's brush when he brings his characters to life with all their dreams, insecurities, humiliations, foibles and quests. He does this by assigning Louis P.'s son, Louis C. Lynch (better known as Lucy), the role of narrator of most of the book. When the story

shifts to the influencing lives of others, the narrative slides into third person

The story opens as 60-year-old Lucy begins writing his memoirs. He and his wife, Sarah, are about to travel to Venice, Italy, a major endeavor for him because he fears travel. Why Venice specifically? During their teenage years their best friend was Bobby Marconi, now a world-famous painter who goes under the name of Robert Noonan, and lives and paints in Italy. They have not seen him since Lucy helped him escape Thomaston at the age of 18 under threat of arrest.

As Lucy writes, his life's story emerges as little cameos, documenting his life - a series of short stories, any one of which can stand on its own merit. He reflects on the episodes of growing up with his two best friends, Sarah and Bobby, and his love for them becomes apparent, as well as theirs for each other.

Mr. Russo's book might also be seen in depth as the ins and outs of relationships of fathers to sons as he outlines the good, the bad and the ugly all with equal insight. The devotion between the Lynches. The animosity between the Marconis. And the wasted lives, as described in the Mocks, a black family that drift in the background of the myriad characters that populate Thomaston. We will be intrigued and challenged by the many personalities brought before us by Mr. Russo.

This is a strength of Mr. Russo – to vitalize a fictional town much as he did in that same canvas in his previous Pulitzer prize winning novel "Empire Falls." He excels in spreading the net wide so we might find some opinions and ideas we agree and disagree upon.

Now that winter is upon us once again we might see the old manufacturing towns of the northeast revealed without the screen of lovely autumn leaves. But writers like Mr. Russo will continue to bring towns like Thomaston, NY wrapped in a human persona where readers might glimpse a new vitality to them. Can these old manufacturing towns from the past rise again? It's worth working on.

### The Bridge of Sighs

The Bridge of Sighs was built around 1340 and is a famous landmark located in Venice, Italy. The forbidding bridge is enclosed with a few small barred windows and is constructed out of white limestone. The bridge rises up and over the Rio di Palazzo and connects to the New Prison and to the interrogation rooms in the Doge's Palace.

As prisoners passed through the bridge to their fate, they were afforded a final view of Venice. It was believed Lord Byron suggested the name as prisoners sighed and took their last look at Venice. But it is said that the days of the inquisitions and following executions were over by the time the bridge was built and the window grills limited anyone from seeing much of Venice.

A romantic legend persists that when lovers kiss on a gondola under the Bridge of Sighs at sunset with the bells of St. Mark ringing that these lovers will be granted eternal love and bliss. The going rate for a gondola ride these days is 40 minutes for \$90.

# Prepare a Thanksgiving feast like the pilgrims

Low in fat, high in protein and an inexpensive source of iron, zinc, potassium and B vitamins, turkey makes a healthy addition to a person's diet. Turkey also tends to be the star of the show on Thanksgiving and other holidays. Even though turkey can be a delicious addition to any holiday table, some people prefer to buck Thanksgiving tradition from time to time and divert focus from the golden gobbler.

Even though turkey may be synonymous with Thanksgiving, hosts and hostesses should not shy away from serving something different. In fact, turkey may not even have been on the menu for the first Thanksgiving.

Thanksgiving dates back to New England in November 1621, when newly arrived Pilgrims and the Wampanoag Indians gathered for an autumn harvest celebration. It is reported that pilgrims went on a "fowling" mission in preparation for the three-day feast. Although wild turkey was plentiful in the region, ducks, geese, passenger pigeons, and swans were commonly consumed. Historians at Smithsonian say documents refer to wildfowl and venison as foods appearing at the first Thanksgiving, but turkey was not mentioned.

Home chefs can take a cue from those first pilgrims and choose less traditional offerings this Thanksgiving. The following are some ideas that are reminiscent of the first Thanksgiving.

If the flavor is more palatable, do not hesitate to select another bird to grace the Thanksgiving table, such as a goose or even a chicken. Some people find turkey meat to be too dry, despite all of the different preparation methods. Chicken or goose may be more well-received and just as versatile.

Do not overlook the possibility of serving fish and other seafood.

Colonists and the Wampanoag probably ate eel, lobster, clams, and mussels. Fish can be dried, smoked and preserved.

Replace wheat-based recipes with those made from cornmeal, as maize was more likely available during colonial time than wheat.

Forests provided chestnuts, beechnuts and walnuts, so a platter of nuts paired with cheese or fruit also can make a welcome addition to the table. Nuts also can be ground and used in baked goods or flavoring for Thanksgiving desserts.

Pumpkin and squash were plentiful in colonial times, and this is why these gourds are often included in Thanksgiving meals and decor. The flesh of a pumpkin or squash can be turned into casseroles or used to make quiche.

A traditional Thanksgiving meal for the early settlers would not have included potatoes. White potatoes originated in South America and sweet potatoes in the Caribbean. At the time of the first Thanksgiving, these would not yet have been introduced, as white potato patches in North America were not established in the region until 1719, according to the potato resource Potato Goodness.

Because colonists did not have wheat flour and butter to make flaky tart crusts, pumpkin pie was not on the first Thanksgiving menu. In lieu of pumpkin pie, hosts can experiment with moist loaf breads or muffins made with pumpkin.

The average Thanksgiving dinner table today looks quite different from the one the Wampanoag Indians and Pilgrims gathered around centuries ago. Families can stick closer to history and tailor their meals for a touch of something different this year.



# Manklin Meadows playground closed due to poor maintenance

On Thursday, November 3, the Ocean Pines Association (OPA) was forwarded a report that was originally presented to the organization on July 22, 2014, that recommends corrections to safety issues on the playground at Manklin Meadows. The contractor who performed the initial inspection report was brought in last week to provide a third bid for rebuilding the playground using components purchased by OPA. During his site walk, the contractor notified OPA of his previous report, and cited the severe change in the playground's conditions from when the report was initially provided to

OPA two years ago. A lack of main- has been intenance to correct the issues outlined in the 2014 report contributed to the playground's deterioration.

The contractor followed up with an email to OPA, that cited the deteriorating conditions and he provided his original report, with the recommendation that the playground be closed. With that recommendation, the acting General Manager Brett Hill instructed Public Works to fence off the playground through the weekend, and immediately begin to disassemble the current structure to prevent injury to any of residents or guests. The Facilities department


