Nguyen wins!

Provisional ballots not yet counted could change outcome

Jimmy Nguyen has won a seat, in a close race, on the San Jose City Council representing Evergreen and Silver Creek Valley in Tuesday's Nov. 8 election.

The final results released Wednesday morning show the new councilmember, a real estate attorney, winning the District 8 seat by 22 votes over Evergreen School District board member Sylvia Arenas. With 100 percent of the 54 precincts reporting, Nguyen received 10,609 votes to 10,587 votes for Arenas.

Although all precincts have reported, the Registrar of Voters (ROV) has yet to count provisional ballots. Provisional ballots are ballots that can be counted when the ROV verifies whether the voter is a validly registered voter. This means that the election outcome might change. The ROV has 30 days from Election Day to certify

the Nov. 8, 2016 results.

"I was cautiously optimistic during election night because the vote count was very close," Nguyen said Wednesday morn-

ing. "I had a great team of volunteers who worked very hard to put us over the top. I want to thank everyone who supported and voted for me. I pledge to work hard for our community."

The candidates were vying for the seat left open by termed-out Vice Mayor Rose Herrera, a Liccardo-ally. Herrera and former San Jose City Mayor, Chuck Reed, endorsed Nguyen. Nguyen received the San Jose Silicon Valley Chamber of Commerce's backing after edging out Denise Belisle and Pat Waite in the primary.



Arenas, who was criticized for accepting support from Sacramento politicians, was backed by organized labor. Councilwoman Magdalena Carrasco and her ex, Senate President Pro Tempore Kevin de León also backed Arenas.



ila Gemellos, artist and muralist, has been interested in graphics since the age of five and that is when her parents recognized her talent and enrolled her in art classes.

Gemellos began painting with San Jose's Lee Hartman at age seven. Hartman is an acclaimed artist with an extensive collection of portraits and landscapes.

"My parents always encouraged me and found new classes that challenged me." said Gemellos. "Watching Bob Ross on PBS felt like church to me." A native of Evergreen, she still lives in and loves the Evergreen Valley."

Gemellos attended UC Riverside, and has a Construction Industry Technician Certification from Clemson University in South Carolina. When asked, "What do you consider your greatest work thus far? She replied, "My best work and my most notable commission are quite different. I found my style, as well as the most notoriety constituting a mural for Falafel's Drive-In at

Expressionism, Impressionism, Realism, Modern, Art Noveau, and Pop. "I am none and all of these," she explained. "As a child, I was a post-impressionist. As an adult, I use every style worked together. More importantly, I'm a statement artist and visual story-teller. I use these opportunities to create a visual dialogue and provoke thought. I am also trying to coordinate art with media, trying to paint how the internet feels." This shows up in her commercial work.

Gemello's forte is in visual storytelling, but she does not limit herself to any certain style of art. She is proficient and confident in traditional, as well as, psychedelic styles. This includes three dimensional illusions. She can repair and repaint holes, restore blemishes in vintage wallpapers, and even creates signs. She can create faux adobe finishes, bright accent walls, with mural accents, custom trims for residential, or less complicated office projects. She can also generate detailed, photorealistic creations that trick the eye.

When asked where she feels that her art will lead her, she said: "I would like to continue to pursue public art and large scale stories. I am trying to find funding for a series of murals in Evergreen, specifically at Capitol Expressway. This is Evergreen's history, addressing blight, crime, and community tensions." She is presently working on a project in Willow Glen called "Life in Willow Glen." The mural depicts the history of Willow Glen and is on the wall at 1133 Lincoln Ave. owned by

EVC land decision avoids checks and balances

The decision on the 27 acres of Evergreen Valley College is being taken through the system with all the smoothness and efficiency that I have never seen and with no regard for checks and balances that this country is so known for.

Even the Planning Commission,

which is one the gating authority, did not require much of convincing for the development - Despite all the community inputs against the development on 27 acres, they readily convinced themselves that such development is a must for bringing jobs to improve the job per housing ratio in San Jose on par with neighboring cities and bring in tax revenue for cash starved city.

Everyone knows that few minimum wage job expected to be created may improve the jobs ratio but

does not necessarily close the gap on revenue shortage which can only be fixed by having competitive business policies. It is to be noted that cities with higher job ratios have high quality educational opportunities within their range. In addition, planning commission convinced themselves that development would internalize traffic -Well, assuming that would be the case, what we would end up with is the grid lock as this pocket of Evergreen is literally land locked. It also claimed that if we are not happy with the board's decision, we have to take it to them - Planning commission being a major gating agent in the process, we expected them to have used lot more discretion in considering the different aspects of pros and cons on such a major decision.

It is to be specifically noted that even with majority of the community opposing the move to develop the land which was apparent in every meeting, public is being completely bypassed at every step... Even today we do not have a clear understanding of how Republic Urban Property's bid was chosen over others if there were any and when the bidding was even held and such details... And we are about to have this voted in the council even in the face of such public opposition and that too by a lame duck council.



'My Name, My Identity' at Laurelwood School

aurelwood School has generated the most interest in the "My Name, My Identity" program in the Evergreen School District.

'My Name, My Identity' is the result of a District meeting which introduced the program to principals of the District.

It was towards the end of the last school year when a sixth grade teacher realized that her student's name was pronounced Sim-er, not Sim-mar. Since first grade, Simar had his name pronounced incorrectly, but he never corrected his teachers. This was a shock to the Laurelwood staff and name pronunciation became an important issue that resonated in their minds. Luckily, Simar was able to go through sixth grade promotion with the correct pronunciation of his name.

Dr. Hong Thi Minh Nguyen, Laurelwood Elementary School principal in the Evergreen School District relates, "When 'My Name, My Identity' was introduced to principals in the district, it touched my heart deeply. So many of our students have name stories that makes them who they are today. In reflecting upon my own name, it made me realize how important name pronunciation is. My name is Hong Thi Minh Nguyen. I pronounce it Hong T Minh New-yen. Traditional Vietnamese names are difficult to enunciate. Even within my own family, my siblings and I pronounced our last name differently in English. My parents named me Hong after the city Hong Kong. They were refugees and spent over nine months in Hong Kong after their escape from Vietnam. I was born shortly after my parents' arrival to the United States. Additionally, the word "Hong" in Vietnamese means "pink."

She further stated, "In reflecting upon Simar's name and also my own. I came to a realization that my staff at Laurelwood would find this initiative important for their work with students. During the morning of our first staff in-service of the school year, I introduced "My Name, My Identity" to them. I began by sharing my own name story to the staff, emphasizing the importance of being intentional in pronouncing students' names correctly. I reminded them of Simar's name and how it took us over five years to finally find out that this name was pronounced incorrectly. In telling these stories, I can feel that teachers were engaged in learning more about the initiative. Hence, a video from "My Name and My Identity" was shown of students sharing their own name story. Soon after, teachers were eager to share their own stories and proper pronunciations of their name to each other. We went one by one, each sharing our name story and proper pronunciation. It was a powerful moment for our teachers. They embraced in the name learning process. I was even more appalled when I found out that I have been mispronouncing a teacher's name for over a year. After sharing the different name stories, teachers felt heard. They pledge to be intentional about ensuring proper name pronunciations of students. If we do not

advocate for our students and empower them to be their own voice, who will?"

It is planned that "My Name, My Identity" will be an ongoing initiative at Laurelwood School and for the school district, and the goals is to have a majority of students take the My Name, My Identity" pledge.

Here are a few of the teacher's testimonials:

Adelizza Cruz De Jesus-Brown "My name is Adelizza Cruz De Jesus-Brown. According to my dad, who supposedly named me, I got my name because my dad once had a girlfriend named Flordeliza and he liked her name. My mother's name is Adelina. So, my father gave me my name by combining both names Flordeliza and Adelina which resulted in Adelizza. My middle name Cruz is my mother's maiden name. In my culture's tradition, my father's last name - De Jesus, would become my middle name as I take my husband's last name upon marriage. However, after 9/11, rules with respect to changing your name did not allow me to drop my middle name - Cruz. This meant I would lose my father's last name. In order not to lose De Jesus, I decided to hyphenate my name which resulted in De Jesus-Brown. Now everyone knows I am from my mother's family Cruz, descendant of my father's De Jesus family, but married to my Caucasian husband - Brown.

Tam Huvnh

"The proper way to say your name in the Vietnamese culture is by stating your last name first, followed by your middle, and then your first. I am **Huynh Thanh Tam.** My middle name means "pure" and my first name means heart. When combined, it means pure of heart."

My name is Bobbi Larsen

Majors. My grandfather's name was Robert. He was a wonderful patriarch of our family, so I am very proud to be named after him.

My father's last name is Larsen. I appreciate him and his contributions to his community. It is an honor to have had the last name Larsen until I was married many years ago. My last name is Majors. My son and daughter both have the last name Majors. It means a lot to me to share their name. They truly define me and I am working very hard to be someone that they look up to and are proud of.

Leonetine Brown

I have two conflicting stories of where my parents got my name from, Leonetine Brown. My mother, who's middle name is Leone, says that she just made it up. My father, on the other hand. told me that he saw my name on the back of cake decoration product. The candy letters that you could buy to decorate cakes with use to have a list of names on them and he said "Leonetine" was one of the names. I have looked up the name "Leone" and it has a French and Italian background, both with the meaning of lion or bold lion. I have always wondered how my parents, both from Alabama, ever really came up with my name.

And, a couple of student testimonials:

Zain Aslam, 5th "My name is Zain Aslam. In my culture, my name means beautiful and friendship. My parents named me Zain because they wanted me to be friendly. That is my name story. What is yours?" Richard Valdez, 5th "My name is Richard Valdez and I was named after my dad's dad, who died. And my dad's dad was an important person to my dad. This is my name story and what is yours?

This program could go a long ways in growing friendships and understanding in our diverse Evergreen schools.

College District land decision is significant

27-acre site on San Jose Evergreen Community College District land is a step closer to its fate, with only limited public involvement in a decision that will permanently change the surrounding neighborhood.

On October 12, the San Jose Planning Commission voted 5-2 to recommend that the City Council approve a General Plan Amendment that would change the zoning of 14 acres of the property at Yerba Buena

and San Felipe Roads from public/quasi-public to Neighborhood/Community Commercial.

The City Council, which will review the General Plan Amendment later this month, should delay action on this land use plan for two reasons.

First, residents of San Jose City Council District 8 have chosen a new to represent the community's best interest in this project. The new District 8 leader should carry this issue forward to the City Council for a vote, but only after a new community engagement process.

Second, the community outreach for this land issue leaves much to be desired. There has been very little public involvement early in this project relative to past discussions of various opportunity sites in the district. I can attest to that personally as an Evergreen resident, former Councilmember, and as the County Supervisor representing the area.

Also, when the General Plan Amendment is considered, the applicant should be asked to bring forward a more detailed plan concurrent with the General Plan Amendment so the community can fully understand the impact the development will have.

I attended the most recent community meeting at Grace Church and was repeatedly told that such information is unavailable. I was very disappointed. This is lacking in transparency and proper public vetting. Once the designation is changed, it will be very difficult for the community to assert an alternative proposal.

Further, the General Plan Amendment application as currently proposed does not comport with CEQA or prior council adoption of constraints in the Evergreen Development Policy. Because of that, I believe going forward now is likely to lead to litigation.

The Neighborhood/Community Commercial land use designation allows a broad range of commercial activity from retail

and services to office development and hospital uses. For the development to be compatible with the surrounding neighborhood and acceptable to its residents, the public needs to know the actual scope of the project and its future impact.

The Planning Commission has moved the land designation forward, but the City Council can defer the application and call for reconstructing the outreach process to extend beyond 1,000 feet of the project site to all residents, and schedule a series of meetings to truly

engage public input. The entire Evergreen District should be aware of the land use proposal and should be directly involved in the planning of it.



Silicon Valley luxury home sales rebound says Coldwell Banker

Silicon Valley's luxury housing market rebounded in September with sales increasing from both a year ago and the previous month, according to a report issued by Coldwell Banker Residential Brokerage.

Some economists predicted a slowdown in homes sales, but that was not the case. A total of 125 luxury properties, valued at more than \$2 million, changed hands in September, up 9.6 percent from the 114 sales in September 2015.

Last month's increase was the first year-over-year rise in sales in the past four months. September's sales total also outpaced August by 11.6 percent.

The upper end of the luxury market was mixed last month with 40 sales over \$3 million, down from 46 a year ago, but 19 sales over \$4 million, up from 17 last September.

Meanwhile, the median sale price of a luxury property in September fell 7.8 percent from the same month last year to \$2,580,688. However, last month's median sale price was up from August, when it stood at \$2,475,000.

"Ever so slowly, we're starting to see a few more listings come on the market and that's resulting in improving sales of luxury homes in Silicon Valley," said Mike James, president of Coldwell Banker Residential Brokerage.

"Inventory of homes for sale still is extremely low by historical standards, but it's starting to inch up as we begin the fall homebuying season," he said. "Silicon Valley

remains one of the hottest markets in the country and demand for homes continues to be robust, thanks to our robust tech sector and overall strong economy. Now perhaps we'll have a little more inventory for pent-up buyers to choose from."

Op Ed: Measures against cheating in the education system

A central topic of concern nowadays is why students resort to cheating.

Has the education system become so demanding that students feel the need to plagiarize their way through an assignment to get a good grade? Or have students simply lost interest in the process of learning, designating teachers' expectations as just another pothole in their path to self-discovery? As controversial as it may be, the answer lies in a compromise of the two: schools have risen demands to impossible heights, in which students have no way to truly allow their creativity to shine through as they squirm under the stringent guidelines set forth by the district. "If they break all the rules but still manage to get to the point, heck, give them the points. They're geniuses." Nevertheless, teachers do not hesitate to call out students when the latter's submitted work resembles that of another's, a sign of plagiarism. While this may sometimes be the case and that plagiarism should never go unpunished, the accuser must evaluate the circumstances prior to the allegation, for even the brightest student can sink under the perpetual incursions against his or her creativity.

If one assesses the patterns of cheating among schools, what notoriously stands out is its frequent correlation with research papers. Students today are feeling pressured to satisfy the incessant requirements for graduation and college admissions to the point where they are afraid to put what they are actually thinking on paper, afraid that a wrong answer to an essay prompt will cost them a letter grade. With this mindset, many students believe that the only way to respond is to utilize hard-proven facts, especially those easily accessible on the inter-

net. Yet, when it comes time to synthesize the material, the average student is stuck at a cross-roads: What if his or her interpretation of the text, although making sense to him or her, does not hold the same connotation to the teacher's judgment? The student has satisfied the research aspect of the teacher's assignment, yet he or she would lose points on the analysis aspect due to having an idea that the teacher may deem too "far-fetched".

As a result, the student resorts to asking friends for their viewpoints on the factual matter and even searches up scholarly perspectives to get the overarching stance on the topic. At this point, the student has become inundated with society's opinions to the point where his or her own judgment has become washed out and saturated with external factors. Students are young. Their minds are still developing, as well as their abilities to adapt to constructive criticism. As in many cases, there are individuals who are very adamant in their opinions and believe that theirs reign superior to others'. However, with a growing oppressive educational system like that of Common Core, the school system's ignorance to creativity is undermining the self-confidence of many young students. If teachers want to be explicit in what is expected, they should alter the assignment's guidelines to allow freedom of expression instead of straight up facts.

In the 2002 scandal of Piper, Kansas's high school biology teacher, Christine Pelton, it only seems logical to state that her accusation of the students' blatant plagiarism was justified in that biology is not as open-ended a topic as an AP Literature paper may be. Nonetheless, it is not justified to say that Pelton is without blame.

Her requirements for the research paper were never revealed to the public, so that is a slanted claim on her part. What if all her directions stated were to do a research paper on the development of cells in the evolution of the antelope? Reading this task, there is only so much even an AP high schooler can do to answer the prompt without having some fragments of his or her response incorporate vocabulary and theories in conjunction with the cellular theory that was directly found on the internet.

Many teachers advocate to never plagiarize, vet still reward students with high scores on a paper where the content is exactly the same as in the source they credited, just with rearranged sentences and more "high school level diction". With teachers using the same course outline throughout the years and teenagers having similar interests and resources, the task becomes more difficult every passing year. A similar instance occurs in my AP English Language class. As a supplement to this rigorous course, students are required to present Connecting Outside projects, integrating an amalgam of ideals from their personal life into the course material. However creative the project, it must stand out among the rest of the class's and have next to no predecessor from previous years. It is no wonder why parents are complaining that the education system has become so subjective. Their innate parental mindset wants their children's creativity and success to be recognized by their peers and teachers instead of being categorized under another project belonging to a student two years ago, of whom that student probably has never even met prior to the project.

These views usually direct students to one

conclusion: What's the point of trying anymore? What's the point of trying to showcase one's creativity if it is only going to be classified as too far-fetched, mediocre after the plethora of similar projects, or worst of all, plagiarized? There are instances where the students really are lazy and resort to blatant copying of materials from the internet and they do deserve zeros and severe consequences for doing so. But for those students who put in arduous effort but still receive low scores and get compared to others, that is on the teacher's behalf. Measures should be taken to ensure that there is no room for students to cheat in the first place. That may be as simple as revising a prompt from "Research about the development of cells" to "Express the connection of cells to health issues in today's society."

High school teacher Christine Pelton's resignation in the face of "a national decline in integrity" holds true if all 28 of her 118 students blatantly copied word for word from the website, and they truly deserve the zeroes on their assignments. But if the teacher had thrown out a prompt that she had regurgitated for years on end with the same established responses, yet expected an elaboration of the same factual evidence, there was only so much the students could do to avoid plagiarism. "If they break all the rules but still manage to get to the point, heck, give them the points. They're geniuses." Students are creative individuals with a right to express their thoughts. It is the school system that has evoked fear and anxiety among students and, ironically, have reprimanded these robots for reproducing lifeless work.

Hacksaw Ridge a gripping wartime tribute

"Hacksaw Ridge," is not a story about a pacifist against war. It's about a man who makes a promise to God and will not allow anyone to force him to break his promise.

It's a gripping wartime tribute to faith, valor, and the courage of remaining true to one's convictions. Hacksaw Ridge is the extraordinary true story of Desmond Doss (Andrew Garfield) who, in Okinawa during the bloodiest battle of WWII, saved 75 men without firing or carrying a gun


He was the only American soldier in WWII to fight on the front lines without a weapon. As an army medic, he single-handedly evacuated the wounded from behind enemy lines; braving fire while tending soldiers and was wounded by a grenade and hit by snipers. Doss was the first "Conscientious Protector" to ever earn the Congressional Medal of Honor.

When he was a boy he almost killed his brother by smashing his head with a brick during one of their fights. When he was older his father threatened his mother with a gun during a drunken bout. He took the gun away from his father; and he would have shot his dad had he not broken down in tears.

In the movie, he related to another soldier that he killed his father in his heart. At that point in time he made a promise to God that he would never touch a gun again. Doss was never against the war. When the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor, he told he superiors that his heart burned with fire. It's the story of a man who won the Medal of Honor by keeping his promise to God while at the same time serving his country in a war against the Japanese. Doss has no problem with blood-lust or killing Japanese. He never condemns his soldiers for killing Japanese. He just wanted to serve and keep his promise at the same time about not touching a gun.

When Captain Glover played by Sam Worthington (Terminator Salvation) first encountered Private Doss during basic training he thought Private Doss was a coward. After going into combat with Private Doss, Captain Glover changed his opinion of Doss and proclaimed him to be the bravest man alive. If it wasn't for his promise to God about not touching a gun, Private Doss would have been Audie Murphy in battle and would have slaughtered hundreds of Japanese by himself. He was fearless in battle. It got to the point that his men would not step foot into battle with the enemy unless Doss was leading the charge.

The most spectacular part of the film itself was when it was revealed about just how many lives Doss saves. I thought to myself about a possible Saturday Night Live parody. What if by accident because it was dark during the battle that Doss carries out Japanese by mistake to safety instead of his American soldiers? Oops! Anyway, right when I thought that to myself an American soldier shouts, "Not only did he save countless American soldiers, but he also carried out two wounded Japanese soldiers off the battle-



field.

Private Doss remembered that Christ not only taught that we should love our neighbors as ourselves, but that we should also remember to love our enemies. Doss wasn't against killing our enemies, but he did remember to have compassion on another human being regardless of their race during battle. Private Doss looked into the eyes of his enemies and saw young Japanese boys that were just following orders. These Japanese boys were wounded and afraid just like the American soldiers wounded and afraid.

It's a blunt-force, but highly effective treatise on the horrors of war as well as those who rise above the brutality to maintain as much humanity as one can on a battlefield.

"Hacksaw Ridge" is the best emotional movie I have seen this year. Some will not be able to watch the film because of its intensity and war violence, but for those who can it is an amazing emotional story of faith, courage, love and patriot-

Preparing for a flood safe winter season

The signs of seasonal change are upon us: trees shedding colorful leaves, dewy mornings and chilly evening gusts. With the arrival of fall we will soon welcome chances of rain. Our region's rainy season can begin as early as October.

While climatologists do not predict a weather phenomenon like an El Niño this year, any time it can rain, it can flood. It is to our benefit to invest time and efforts toward being flood safe.

The Santa Clara Valley Water District offers you a few tips to prepare your family and home for flooding:

Prepare an emergency kit for your home and your car with non-perishable food, water, medical subscriptions, copies of important documents and supplies such as a flashlight, batteries and tools. Keep a full tank of gas in your car so you don't get stranded during a flood. An emergency kit is essential for any kind of disaster, including earthquakes.

Check you rain gutters and drainage system and remove any debris clogging them. Check your property for cracks in foundation, exterior walls and small openings around pipes; be sure to seal them.

Learn how to turn off utilities in your home, such as gas, electricity and water. Keep a wrench handy near the shut-off valves to assist you.

Keep a stockpile of emergency building materials on hand, like plywood, plastic sheeting and sandbags. Sandbags are available at any of the water district distribution sites. For more information visit: www.valleywater.org/sandbags

Know your flood hazard. Be familiar with neighborhood streams and learn the best route to higher ground, if necessary. Never walk or drive in flood water. Six inch-

es of moving water can you make you fall and as little as one foot of water will cause many vehicles to float.

Purchase flood insurance. Even if it's not required by your mortgage lender, flood insurance is a good way to protect your property and belongings. Be aware there's a 30-day waiting period before your policy goes into effect.

As the flood protection agency for the county, the water district fights floods year round. During the summer months, district crews repair banks and remove accumulated sediment and clean up vegetation in creeks throughout the county to help our waterways carry floodwaters safely. Year round, the water district works on long-term flood protection projects to protect thousands of homes and businesses in the county. In November, our award winning flood awareness campaign kicks-off flood safety messaging through the rainy season with the help of Charles Chicken Little, our flood spokesperson.

San Jose Minimum Wage to Increase January 1, 2017

Minimum wage employees who work in San Jose will receive a 10 cent per hour raise starting Jan.1, 2017. Under the initiative approved by San Jose voters in 2012, the minimum wage will increase from \$10.30 to \$10.40 per hour.

To prevent inflation from eroding the value of the minimum wage, the initiative ordinance requires increases to take effect each year based on the Consumer Price Index (Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers, U.S. City Average for All Items.) Over the last 12 months (August 2015 to August 2016), the CPI increased .7 percent. If the CPI remains the same or decreases, the minimum wage in San Jose would remain the same. Information about the San José minimum wage law, including wage posters, frequently asked questions, and how to file a complaint, can be found online. When diversity conflicts with community

Proposed road change name change from Murillo to Gurdwara

s a Chinese immigrant, I have been living in Evergreen for more than 14 years and I love this nice community, which has beautiful rolling mountains, highly rated schools, and kind neighbors.

On Sunday, my child played with puppies with her Vietnamese friend. When we were out of town, my Indian neighbors collected our mail. I feel at home and relaxed every time I enter the community after getting off the jammed highway 101. Other than calling for the community to discuss ways of improving traffic a good idea, Evergreen is an ideal place to live in the San Jose area.

However, recently a rock was thrown into the peaceful community by a proposal of changing a road's name. Our neighboring Sikh community proposed renaming the street of "Murillo Avenue" to "Gurdwara Ave." While I believe the suggestion came from good intentions — the growing of the Sikh community and the pride of their culture and religion — and also agree with the San Jose city's attempt to promote ethnic diversity in the area (indeed it is one of San Jose's attractions to immigrants), I have concerns about the division of the community after I attended the two public hearing meetings that started in 2014.

In the public hearing meeting in 2014, I saw both a high number of opponents and a high number of proponents to the proposition. The proposed name "Gurdwara", which translates as "The Place of Worship for Sikhs," will be imposed on the community members who have different religions or no religion at all. Also, the taxpayer will have to pay for the cost (updating GPS, Map and etc.), which will be triggered by the name change. The proposal was raised again in 2016, and I saw the number of people who attended the Sep 19 meeting almost doubled in size comparing to 2014.

The two sides were still strongly holding

their own views and the place was filled with a feeling of hostility. Then a big question came to my mind. "Why do we continue having such meetings that do not bring peace and unity to the community but instead grow the anger and separation among the groups?"

At this meeting, our Sikh neighbors showed their generous contributions to the community such as schools, activity and improving the traffic. They also promised to pay some of the costs for the name change. I really appreciate what they have done for the community, however, their contributions do not give them the right to push a proposal against the wishes of the community. The proposal will not serve the majority of people and will not bring peace and harmony to the community that is shared by other neighbors and other religions (i.e. the Christian church "The Point" is just at the end of the road.)

I personally have no prejudice against the Sikh community. I am also an immigrant and I support a diversified community, like most of us. However, I have a big concern on how the diversity is reflected in our community. I fear the proposal and the meetings cause more division and separation rather than help bring people together.

Unity should not turn out as a sacrifice of diversity. The reason is simple: no group will benefit from a separated and divided community, even if the proposal is approved. For this reason, I propose that our Sikh neighbors and the city reconsider, withdraw or postpone the plan in order to make the best decision for the majority of people.

Saving lives one dog at a time

y name is Madison and I am a serial dog fosterer ... along with my husband Andrew and Ronan, our resident hound, that is.

Together our family brings dogs in need of rescue and rehabilitation into our home to ready them for adoption. Usually that means some level of house training, sometimes it includes medical care, and always it includes a lot of love.

Andrew and I foster dogs for Silicon Valley Pet Project (SVPP), a non-profit rescue partner with the San Jose Animal Care Center, Silicon Valley's largest municipal animal shelter. SVPP rescues, rehabilitates and rehomes both cats and dogs of all breeds, as well as senior and special-needs pets that are at-

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risk of euthanasia

At this time they are greatly in need of more families to help save homeless dogs in our community. Read on to learn more about fostering and how your family can help.

So how does it work?

It all begins by filling out a foster application online followed by a quick home check and discussion to assess what type of dog will be the best fit for your home. SVPP considers all aspects of your lifestyle, members of your family, and any resident pets, to make the most successful placement possible.

Once you are approved to foster, SVPP pairs you with a "buddy" in the organization who assists you in all aspects such as getting answers to your questions, helping you meet

potential adopters, and offering moral support all along the way.

What will be expected of you?

First and foremost, foster families provide a safe and loving home. Your pup will need regular exercise, socialization, and probably some basic training. You'll be asked to bring your dog to vet appointments, photo shoots, and adoption events. You'll also meet with potential adopters and have a say in which family is the best fit for your dog since you know them best.

How much will it cost you to foster a dog?

SVPP pays for pre-approved vet visits and procedures and, depending on donations, also provides toys, food and other supplies such as crates and baby gates. They also

work with local dog trainers/behaviorists to assess all of their foster dogs on intake and put them on training plans as needed to prepare

them for their forever homes.

How long will you have your foster dog?

Foster time commitments vary and can sometimes depend on the breed or the age of the dog. If you can't agree to an open-ended fostering arrangement, SVPP also needs families to serve as vacation foster homes where the commitment is a very clear length of time.

As you can see, fostering a dog is a serious commitment but it can be a lot of fun too. It's also highly rewarding to see these formerly unwanted dogs become loved and cherished members of a forever family. Please contact SVPP at info@svpetproject.org if you have questions. You'll be glad you did!




