# **Blood Bank to test for Zika**

The Zika virus continues to spread throughout the United States and cases have now been detected in all 50 states. In the Delmarva region, Delaware has reported 16 cases while Maryland is reporting 108.

Due to the rapid spread of this virus, mostly through travel with the exception of Florida where the virus has been locally acquired in some patients, the FDA mandated that all blood centers in the United States be required to have all collected blood tested for Zika, beginning November 18, 2016.

Blood Bank of Delmarva (BBD), the main supplier of blood and blood products to the Delmarva region was faced with one of two choices, either conduct their own testing or contract with another laboratory. The FDA had only given blood centers 12 weeks' notice to comply with the new mandate. To put this in perspective, the normal timeline for a laboratory to implement a new mandatory test would be six months to a year.

To meet the FDA's deadline would take a true collaborative effort on the

part of Blood Bank employees and the testing manufacturer, Roche Molecular Systems, Inc. Working many long hours over this short period of time has resulted in BBD now being a part of a prospective study to evaluate the specificity of the cobas Zika Test for use with the cobas 6800/8800 system for screening of blood donations for the presence of Zika Virus RNA.

According to Trudell Green, BBD's Laboratory Operations Manager, "Our awesome project team worked together feverishly to accomplish construction, installation of two new instruments, validation of equipment, assays and four software systems, no small task given the timeline we had to meet." All blood donated from this point forward will be tested for the Zika Virus. "It's yet another step being taken for the safety of the blood supply and for the patients who will receive transfusions," said Green.

The Blood Bank of Delmarva (BBD) is a not-for-profit 501(c) (3) community service organization which provides blood transfusion products

# Sandpiper agrees to reductions

# What's Happening at Wallops Airborne Science

# missions at Wallops

The Airborne Science mission at Wallops Flight Facility (WFF) has a vital and challenging set of missions.

Similar to previous articles which described sounding rockets (published in the August 24, 2016 issue of *The Courier*) and scientific balloons (published in the June 22, 2016 edition of

*The Courier*), aircraft are used to place scientific payloads in the needed environment to collect scientific data.

The Aircraft Office operates seven aircraft (all obtained as surplus from other government agencies) to perform an amazing myriad of scientific missions. Approximately

90% of the aircraft missions are oriented to collecting earth science but some missions can be startlingly different.

Recently, a WFF 1965 Huey helicopter (the iconic Vietnam War emblem) was used to test a system destined to guide a Venus-bound lander mission. The Venus mission is called DaVinci and is scheduled to launch towards Venus in 2021. Imagine such an old aircraft contributing a key role in a mission which will launch 80 or more years after the aircraft was manufactured.

The WFF "air force" consists of several turbo-prop fixed wing aircraft as well as the vintage UH-1 Huey. The fixed-wing aircraft include two C-130s, one P-3B and one C-23 Sherpa among other aircraft. The use of a turbo-prop fixed-wing fleet allows science instruments to be placed at very low altitudes and low-speed environments, all of which are beneficial for the instruments. For the aircrew, however, the

low and slow aircraft make for long and boring flights to places like Antarctica and the extreme northern end of Norway, among other far-distant locations.

For another recent mission, the C-23 (like the Huey, a Vietnam War era relic previously owned by the Army) was used to sample low-altitude air in Alaska. For weeks, the aircraft flew at very low altitudes as a satellite passed overhead taking similar measurements. The mission was sponsored by the Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL), an organization more often connected with deep-space missions. More in-

# Time to winterize your gear and other stuff

*Getting your fishing gear ready for winter storage:* 

Clean all your lures, rods and reels with soap and water. Be certain to rinse them well and allow adequate time for them to dry before storing them. You don't want the saltwater to remain over the winter and cause rust and corrosion.

Don't forget to check your rod guides for wear, rust and corrosion and replace them if necessary. Also be certain they do not have line grooves

worn into them. If they do replace Check them. your guide wrappings to be certain they are Then intact. spray all guides with either WD-40 or I prefer Reel Magic to prevent moisture

and corrosion over the winter months. There is nothing worse than starting the fishing season with one of your guides dangling on your line.

For reel maintenance strip all monofilament line, braid is o.k. to leave on. Don't replace the mono line until spring. Clean your reels of all old grease and replace with new grease then spray the entire reel with Real Magic.

*Note:* Do not take your reel apart unless you know how to reassemble it. If you feel it necessary take it to a professional.

Check all of your used lures and hooks for sharpness and sharpen if necessary. You don't want to lose that first fish next season because of a dull hook.

Finally, don't forget to winterize your boat if you have one.

*Fishing Report:* With the water cooling the striper migration is beginning and should soon be in full swing and there are some keepers being caught. A friend of mine caught two keepers in the inlet on the gulp artificial eels which seem to really be working for some fishermen. The party boats seem to be doing well on sea bass and tog with an occasional flounder being caught.

### Did you know?

Crab meat is very high in vitamin B-12? Just 2-3 ounces of crab meat will supply an adult with the daily B-12 requirement.

The largest crab in the world is the Giant Japanese Spider Crab, which can measure up to 13 feet across.

The blood like material found along the backbone in the body cavity of most fishes is the kidney. It is usually removed when cleaning.

There are 43 species of dolphins found in the world. There are 38 marine, and 5 river dolphins.

Fighting large strong fish: A simple rule for fighting large strong fish, when the fish pulls, you don't; when the fish doesn't pull, you do. I liked that one and so will my friends at the Ocean Pines Anglers Club.

2017's proposed Summer Flounder quota: The Mid-Atlantic Fishery Management Council in a fact sheet released on August 24 indicated the most recent stock assessment update indicates that the stock has been experiencing overfishing for the past several years. As a result the council requested that to reduce severe economic impacts a quota reduction should be phased in over a period of three years. Thus the recommended reduction for 2017 is a 30% decrease from the 2016 catch limit. Just how this will impact size and creel limits will be determined at a later date. I'll keep you up to date on changes as they are announced.

The idea was to establish a proactive partnership between the community and the public school system by linking community resources with the educational needs of its students to prepare them to succeed. Local businesses and individuals have championed education with donations to the WCEF. Current goals include accelerating the purchase and distribution of digital devices for K-12, so every

student has equal access to a world class education. In addition, teachers are supported through annual grants, funds are also set aside to provide financial assistance to students in need and money is being raised to set up a \$ 1 million endowment which will provide perpetual funding for future needs.

A casual observer might look at the WFF aircraft and think the aircraft are just like others of their pedigree but nothing could be further from the truth. Each of the aircraft have been extensively modified inside the cargo bay and with many fuselage penetrations to accommodate a myriad of instruments flown over the years.

Due to many alterations that may be included in each aircraft, every pilot is a "test pilot" – a specialized rating for pilots. Additionally, the engineering staff at WFF must analyze and test each installation and modification to ensure that the airworthiness of the aircraft has not been compromised. Upon completion of a mission, the instruments are removed and the aircraft is restored (as best as possible) to the original configuration.

NASA Test Pilot Alan L. Barringer came to WFF after a career flying helicopters for the U.S. Army. Alan and over a dozen other pilots share the flying duties of the many missions flown annually. The engineering, maintenance and logistics functions round out a small but effective staff.

Alan stressed the frugal culture of the Aircraft Operations Branch, pointing our reuse of surplus aircraft and the close coordination between scientists, engineering staff and the flight crews to deliver valuable scientific data at low cost. Alan said the objective of the group is to deliver, "safe, reliable, on-time and economical Airborne Science.'

# **Turkey facts** According to the Food Network, thawing a

frozen turkey takes several days. The popular food-based television channel says it can take roughly four to five days for a frozen 20-pound turkey to fully defrost. Thanksgiving hosts who plan to cook turkeys that weight more than 20 lbs. should afford their turkeys even more time to fully defrost. The Food Network also recommends that cooks who want their turkeys to have crisp skin leave the bird uncovered in the refrigerator overnight. The time it takes to cook a turkey depends on whether or not the bird was purchased fresh. The Food Network advises cooking fresh turkeys for 10 to 15 minutes per pound in a 350 F oven, while frozen turkeys need roughly 20 minutes per pound at 350 F. And while stuffing is a Thanksgiving Day staple, the Food Network recommends going easy with the stuffing. Turkeys that are not densely stuffed will cook more evenly than turkeys whose cavities are overflowing with stuffing.
