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City Council vote on controversial 27 acre land use change deferred to December 13

ust five hours before the City Council meeting was to start its meeting on Nov. 15, the vote on the controversial 27-acre land general plan amendment land use change for Evergreen Valley College was deferred with a continuation to the Council's Dec. 13 meeting creating frustration and confusion among many residents.

More than a hundred Evergreen residents were expected to voice their opinions, many of them students at the Nov.15 meeting, where the City Council members and the Mayor were ready to vote their positions on approving, denying, or to delay their decision on the general plan amendment.

Evergreen Valley College declared the 27 acres surplus back in 2004. That issue is not in front of the council, but rather the college is asking for a change in the general plan designation on the 27 acres to allow them maximum flexibility to create a master plan for the land that will best generate revenue for the college.

The use general plan amendment would change 27 acres of Evergreen Valley College property from Public Quasi Public to NCC (Neighborhood Community Commercial commercial and retail). The land is located on the Northeasterly corner of Yerba Buena Rd. and San Felipe Rd. The bond funds (Measure X) passed by voters on Nov. 8 will not be used for the proposed development.

Memo requests to defer agenda item

A supplemental memo requesting to defer

the land use change agenda item was sent to Councilmembers from Harry Freitas, Director of Planning Building and Code enforcement for the City of San Jose.

"Reason for Supplemental: To defer Item 10.3, GP16-007, to the Dec. 13, 2016, Council meeting to allow for additional staff analysis related to the Draft Negative Declaration. Recommendation: Defer Item 10.3, Amendment to the Envision San Jose 2040 General Plan Land Diagram Use/Transportation Public/Quasi-Public to neighborhood /Community Commercial on an approximately 27 gross acre site, to the Dec.13, 2016, Council meeting."

San Jose Vice-Mayor Rose Herrera, Council Person for District 8, sent a letter on Nov. 10 recommending to Mayor Liccardo and the San Jose City Council approve all 27 acres for the land use change to NCC. In her letter, Herrera said: "The 27 acres will give the local community college needed revenue to build and expand educational opportunities; create additional jobs for Eastside residents; and supply Evergreen with needed medical, commercial and retail services."

According to Herrera, the planning department admitted they had made a mistake in their process of calculating job and traffic counts. The mistake was made shortly after the planning commission meeting, but not announced until after Herrera issued her memo on Nov. 10 recommending the land use change.

Recount likely for San Jose City Council District 8 race

he tight, intense and fluctuating race for the winning seat for the San Jose City Council District 8 continues with a likely recount to be announced later this month with only 88 votes separating the two candidates.

Silvia Arenas and Jimmy Nguyen have both seen their vote lead vanish and then suddenly reappear as election officials counted provisional and mail-in ballots received on Election Day, Tuesday, Nov.8.

Nguyen and Arenas have been seen at the county elections office

watching workers count the district's vote-by-mail ballots. Both candidates can challenge signatures - but only on certain ballots.


Elections officials ultimately decide which ballots will be counted. Questionable ballots aren't counted until a supervisor decides

whether a ballot signature matches the one on file.

A spokeswoman at the Santa Clara County Registrar of Voters' office said it's not uncommon for candidates or observers to challenge ballot signatures during the vote canvassing process.

Ballot count

On Tuesday, Nov. 8, Nguyen emerged ahead of Arenas by more than 500 votes, but by Thursday, Arenas was leading by 56 votes. Then on Saturday, Nov 12, Nguyen moved ahead in the race by a razor thin 42 votes. On Sunday, the lead changed again with Arenas leading with 80 votes on the afternoon of Monday, Oct. 14. Then a reversal was released at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 15, when the Register of Voters website revealed that Nguyen was leading by 75 votes. The next day, Nguyen's lead fell to 56, and on See DISTRICT 8, page 12



Earthquake-like shake reported by Evergreen residents

Evergreen residents reported a "mysterious earthquake-like shake" on Nov. 15, but it wasn't a quake, but more like a rumble.

The rumbling sound was also heard in nearly every city in the Bay Area, and some reported the same rumbling sound as far away as Denver, Co.

The US Geological Survey says it didn't record an earth-quake and the agency did not know the source of the rumbling. "Our duty seismologist did an extensive search and we did not see any seismic activity in the South Bay," Susan Garcia, a spokeswoman with the U.S. Geological Survey.

On Nov. 16, the U.S. military denied the rumbling was a sonic boom. However, there was a report that the rumbling was a sound wave technology test being conducted by U.S. Navy submarines off the coast of California. The sound wave technology is capable of collapsing underground bunkers.

San Jose City Council approves minimum wage increase

The San Jose City Council voted to raise the minimum wage to \$15 by January 2019 - but decided to exclude youth in job training programs from the higher wage on Nov 15.

The unanimous vote will raise the city's minimum wage to \$12 on July 1, 2017, \$13.50 on Jan. 1, 2018, and the final increase to \$15 goes into effect January 1, 2019. San Jose's current minimum wage is \$10.30 minimum.

A city-sponsored study found more than 100,000 San Jose workers would benefit from the wage increase, adding \$3,000 a year to their salaries.

You recently sent a message to a sector of the Community saying that you 'have their back'. This is quite commendable. Do you have our back also?

There is a proposal before the Council to amend the General Plan to allow commercial development on 27 acres of prime educational land of Evergreen Community College. This is a misconceived idea. It will hurt the very people whose back you want to protect. It will restrict educational program development. The financial gain will be minimal. Prime educational land will be lost forever. The Evergreen resident and taxpayer is stabbed in the back - once again.

The Trustees followed the minimalist requirement to notify residents within 1,000 feet of the proposed development to fulfill their legally required mandate. This may make sense for developments with minimal impact beyond the surrounding area. But their decision to develop the land as proposed impacts the entire community of Evergreen, East San Jose and even San Jose in general. We have not been allowed to participate in the vision for the development of this land. The Faculty and Students share similar sentiments.

We have no voice. We want a voice. It is our land. This request for re designation is not the same as a private landowner asking the city to reclassify land for personal development reasons. This is land owned by the Taxpayer purchased from tax funds for an educational purpose being asked to transform this land into a commercial use. The proposal merits extensive input from the landowners, the community. That is, the taxpayer. This plan is ill conceived because of the lack of input from the stakeholders. Let us have a voice.

The Vice Mayor recommended in writing that there needs to be extensive community outreach. So why would the Council make a general plan amendment before the people have the opportunity to have input and support the project they helped create? The Developer has made no development plan public. What he has conjectured as possible development options (excluding housing) can be accomplished within its current designation as 'Public Quasi Public'. Making the General Plan Amendment before giving the people full voice in how their tax investment should be handled only serves special interests and is a betrayal of the people.

Proponents like to tout that the College has more land than any other college in the District. They do not state that the Earthquake fault line that runs through the campus requires the demolition of two major educational structures and the land is unusable. There are also steep grades that lead up the mountainside into a Park.

This College campus at most at my calculation has 94 acres of USABLE, developable land subtracting the 27 acres. This makes the usable campus smaller than DeAnza and Foothill Colleges. Giving up 27 acres leaves no space for such things as the minimum five acres required for sports

fields. This includes track and field, basket-ball, tennis, baseball, football. Perhaps a stadium? A four year degree Nursing program would require upper division space too. It appears that the plan also contravenes the California State Constitution guaranteeing access to basic quality education. This general plan amendment offers no promise to those whom you seek to address in the San Jose Promise.

No College in America has excess land. There is no more public lands available for Community College development in San Jose. EVC should become an educational jewel on the Eastside to build out with greater rapidity what the Mayor labeled the San Jose Promise.

The Council is told that the land designation is required as this is the only development option available. It is not the only option. It is the only option for this Developer. There was no open bid process. Colleges across the country have found ways to use their undeveloped lands to grow their educational program whilst building fiscal relationship with other entities that help build community, expand educational opportunities and positive interactions and relationships with the communities that they serve. This can only happen when the community has ownership of the bigger picture where education is first and foremost. Why would the Council want to make this change without a specific plan from the Developer supported by the people?

Evergreen East San Jose requires the development of an educational institution within reach of its constituents. The current College system organization requires thousands of students to cross town everyday to attend College outside their District because programs and courses are not available nor planned in sufficient number in East San Jose. Limited human resources are wasted on this needless movement of peoples, lost man hours in non productive travel adding costs and reducing the effectiveness of your 'San Jose Promise' project. Social change requires major participation in educational opportunity at the least cost with the most effective implementation. Using the 27 acres to spearhead education will move the Promise from a token idea to a major force in reshaping opportunity in the community.

I am asking you and the Council to have our back and give us the right to contribute to the development plan before it comes to Council vote. I also encourage you to suggest that the College Board create a "blue ribbon" committee made up of a representative cross-section of the community to create a development plan within the PQP designation. This way, the College Board and the Community will retain greater control of the development, create jobs, enhance education and receive a larger cash flow from the development and the educational use.

Please prevent this General Plan Amendment from going ahead without transparent community input.

Community asks Mayor to 'have our back'

his December 13th there is a San Jose City Council meeting where the city council members and mayor can vote their positions on approving, denying, or to delay their decision on the city's general plan amendment change of 27 acres of Evergreen College property from Public Quasi Public to Neighborhood Community Commercial (commercial/retail).

On November 10, a letter from San Jose Vice-Mayor Rose Herrera Council Person for District 8 recommended to Mayor Liccardo and the San Jose City Council approve all 27 acres for the land use change to Neighborhood Community Commercial.

Five days later, on November 15th, Santa Clara County Supervisor Dave Cortese wrote a letter to Mayor Liccardo recommending that the mayor and the council delay their decision on the 27 acres and land use designation change. County Supervisor Dave Cortese included the following reasons:

As of the recent election, District 8 has chosen a new leader and city council member for the district. Due to the ongoing controversy, it is this new leader who should be working with the community and other stakeholders to lead the strategies they want to represent.

County Supervisor Cortese cited

that the community outreach for this land use issue left much to be desired and suggested that there would be litigation due California guidelines not being followed by the SJECCD and developer.

County Supervisor Cortese also requested the city require the applicant(s) provide a more detailed development plan that is concurrent with the requested General Plan Amendment so the community can fully understand the impact the development will have on the community.

Two days later this was followed by a letter to Mayor Liccardo from Pastor John Goldstein of Grace Church on Aborn Road. Pastor Goldstein requested that the mayor provide for the community to have a voice in the land paid for by the community's taxes and intended for educational use. Pastor Goldstein cited that the city's decision was broader than just the Evergreen Community, and that this was a City of San Jose issue about education and its ability to meet the educational needs of its citizens.

Mayor Liccardo's position and recommendation on this commercial development on college land will be telling in the light of his recent book which he cited in his election campaign and in his recent letter to the city "We've got your back." In his book, "Safer City, Smarter Government, A Plan for San Jose's Future" Mayor Liccardo

writes that "if we share concerns about a Valley with a widening income gap and opportunity gap, then our schools need our engagement." He further writes that "Our residents' future prosperity hinges on our collective focus on college attainment. Inaction condemns another generation to low-skill jobs, widening San Jose' already-yawning gap between rich and poor, and much of that gap remains colorcoded by race."

In his book Mayor Liccardo cites that "City Hall can also ease the biggest obstacle for expanding innovative, high-performing schools." In his letter to the city, "We've got your back," Mayor Liccardo addresses the number of residents in our communities who are in fear of immigration rules; fear of deportation, or in fear of being of another faith. Mayor Liccardo directs "Student 'dreamers' born in a foreign country" to a website and concludes his letter with the statement, "We've got much work to do to take care of each other, and to transform San José's corner of the world. We've got your back."

The residents and students of Evergreen and East San Jose want to know if Mayor Liccardo has "Our back," especially when it comes to education for San Jose and our community.

"The planning assumed the job and traffic counts were the same for Public Quasi Public (PQP) the current GP designation and NCC the new proposed designation," explained Herrera.

"Planning is now in the process of modeling the jobs and traffic count for the proposed new GP designation Neighborhood community commercial," said Herrera. "The results a said we won't know the results in the next week or so. The revision could potential change my recommendation," she said.

Herrera calls for prohibiting housing

Herrera explained that her memo includes a requirement that the college agree not to build housing on the 27 acres.

"I specifically asked for a development agreement that prohibits housing as a condition of the approval," she said. "This is important because converting the land to housing could open the door to other requests to convert job land in Evergreen to housing. There will also be extensive community outreach with the Evergreen community during that process. The project will also come under the Evergreen Development policy limits, which has severely limited allocations for development including commercial.

Proponents proclaim that Evergreen residents lack access to services like medical and retail which forces them to leave the area for other areas. The lack of services and retail in Evergreen creates more crowded roads leading in and out of Evergreen and on to the freeways. Local services would not likely generate trips from more people coming from out of the area but instead would be local residents traveling within the community.

Cortese gets involved

Santa Clara County Supervisor Dave Cortese sent a letter on Nov. 15 to Mayor Liccardo recommending that the mayor and the council delay their decision on the 27 acres land use designation change. County Supervisor Dave Cortese included the following reasons:

As of the recent election, District 8 has chosen a new leader and city council member for the district. Due to the ongoing controversy, it is this new leader who should be working with the community and other stakeholders to lead the strategies they want to represent.

County Supervisor Cortese cited that the community outreach for this land use issue left much to be desired and suggested that there would be litigation due California guidelines not being followed by the SJECCD and developer.

County Supervisor Cortese also requested the city require the applicant(s) provide

a more detailed development plan that is concurrent with the requested General Plan Amendment so the community can fully understand the impact the development will have on the community.

Grace Church voices opinion

Two days later, Nov. 17, a letter was sent to Mayor Liccardo from Pastor John Goldstein of Grace Church on Aborn Road. Pastor Goldstein requested that the mayor provide for the community to have a voice in the land paid for by the community's taxes and intended for educational use. He cited that the city's decision was broader than just the Evergreen Community, and that this was a City of San Jose issue about education and its ability to meet the educational needs of its citizens. Chancellor sends letter to Liccardo

Dr. Debbie Budd, Chancellor, San Jose-Evergreen Valley College sent a letter to Mayor Liccardo on Nov. 10. In her letter, Budd stated: "The District desires to ground lease the land for the purpose of generating substantial rental revenue which will be used to support the educational needs of the students of the District. With our Values of Opportunity, Social Justice and Equity, supporting our students is of paramount importance to the District. By approving the NCC designation for the entire 27 acres, the City will be

providing the District with the flexibility to consider a variety of job producing proposals for the use of the land with any specific proposal being subject to future City zoning review and approval. This flexibility is critical to the District's long term utilization of the land. The NCC designation facilitates the use of the land for jobs related uses and will facilitate a ground lease that will bring in funds to support our students in programs such as the San Jose Promise. The NCC designation does not support residential housing. On behalf of the District, I respectfully request your approval of the Application for the entire 27 acres."

The Evergreen community will present their concerns at the Dec. 13 San Jose City Council Meeting when they vote on the 27 acre general plan amendment change.

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

Secondary units are a source of naturally affordable housing

Special to the Times ccessary Dwelling Units sometimes (ADUs), referred to as "in-law units" or "secondary units" are self-contained housing units that are secondary to the main residence. They are often located in backyards of single-family lots, but can also be attached to the main house. As such, these units unlock the opportunity for development within the existing fabric of our single family residential



Consider these numbers: if just 10 percent of the approximately 342,500 single family homeowners in Santa Clara County were to add ADUs to their properties, we could add over 34,000 units to our housing stock -34,000 naturally affordable units that can reduce the gap of at least 67,000 homes that we need for low- and moderate-income households throughout the county and help prevent displacement of teachers, nurses, service workers and other key members of our community. Secondary units are a unique type of housing that is naturally affordable without the need for public subsidy. They can play an important role in alleviating San Jose's overcrowding issues and can help keep families together, often providing a way for retirees or returning college graduates to continue living near family, when they otherwise wouldn't be able to afford to stay. They can provide housing for seniors who want to stay in their home and age in place. Contrary to common fears that secondary units exacerbate parking problems, a study conducted by UC Berkeley shows that secondary unit residents have





lower rates of car ownership.

Despite these benefits, the number of ADUs actually built each year in the county is small. According to Silicon Valley at Home (SV@Home) - an affordable and policy advocacy organization working across Santa Clara County - in recent years, fewer than 90 permits have been issued

In September, Governor Jerry Brown signed into law Senate Bill 1069 (Wieckowski), a bill to encourage the development of accessory dwelling units (ADUs) throughout California. While this bill is an important first step, cities must now do their part by easing regulatory constraints to ADU development to address our housing crisis. SB 1069 encourages accessory dwelling unit construction, modernizes regulations, streamlines processes, and reduces fees.

ing and reduce the number of illegally built

On Tuesday, November 14th, San Jose became the first city in the County to comply with SB 1069 requirements. Additionally, the City Council unanimously agreed to further ease restrictions to ADUs, to study the development of a public information program, to implement an amnesty program to legalize illegal non-conforming units that are brought up to code, and to remove impediments to the conversion of detached garages or other accessory structures for residential use.

More secondary units alone are not going to solve the affordable housing crisis, but they are a piece of the puzzle. We need to be creative and utilize many different strategies to make a dent in the need for housing.

While they won't fix the housing crisis on their own, secondary units can make a meaningful difference in San Jose's efforts to solve the housing crisis.

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


David Reynolds, and Sherry Oppenheim.



Friday his vote count rose to 64. On Saturday, Nov. 19, more than 1,800 provisional ballots were opened including 342 partial ballots. By Saturday evening, Nguyen was ahead of Arenas by 39 votes. On Sunday, Nov. 20 the afternoon update changed course with Arenas up by 51 votes ahead of Nguyen, and her lead extended to 88 votes on Monday, Nov. 21.

As the *Evergreen Times* went to press, there were still more ballots left to count or to be verified for the District 8 election race.

Recount

If the margin of victory for either candidate, Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors' automatic recount program requires a recount if the difference is less than half percent of the total votes cast. A candidate may request a recount.

By Dec. 8 the vote totals will be certified and the both candidates will be able to get off the emotional and stressful rollercoaster ride with a clear winner proclaimed by the Registrar of Voters.

Ballots counted after Election Day

- "Last Minute" Vote by Mail Ballots: Vote by Mail ballots that arrive on Election Day are processed and counted starting the next day; these take longer to count than a precinct ballot because they have to be signature-verified; most of these are counted by the Friday after the election
- Postmarked Vote by Mail Ballots: Under California law, ballots may be counted even if they arrive after Election Day, as long as they are received by mail no later than three days after the election and are postmarked on or before Election Day
- Provisional Ballots: these are the usually the last ballots counted because they have to be researched and verified; it may take a few weeks, but every valid vote will be counted
- Damaged/Unreadable Ballots: some ballots are torn, damaged, or marked in such a way that the tallying machines can't read them and require additional processing
- Write-In Votes: when the voter writes in the name of a candidate, that vote must be tallied manually

Red Cross issues safe cooking tips as Thanksgiving approaches

hanksgiving is almost here – a time when many people will travel home to visit loved ones and households will prepare the holiday feast. The American Red Cross has steps people can follow to have a safe holiday.

"Cooking is the number one cause of home fires," said Trevor Riggen, Regional CEO, Bay Area Chapter. "And thousands of people will travel over the holiday. We want people to stay safe and offer steps they can take to avoid a kitchen fire and reach their destination safely."

TOP TEN COOKING SAFETY TIPS

- 1. Don't wear loose clothing or sleeves that dangle while cooking.
- **2.** If you are frying, grilling or broiling food, never leave it unattended stay in the kitchen. If you just leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- **3.** If you're simmering, baking, roasting or broiling food, check it regularly.
- **4.** Use a timer to remind yourself that the stove or oven is on.
- **5.** Keep kids and pets away from the cooking area. Make them stay at least three feet away from the stove.
- **6.** Keep anything that can catch fire pot holders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper or plastic bags, food packaging, and towels or curtains—away from your stove, oven or any other appliance in the kitchen that generates heat.
- **7.** Clean cooking surfaces on a regular basis to prevent grease buildup.
- **8.** Consider purchasing a fire extinguisher to keep in your kitchen. Contact your local fire department to take training on the proper use of extinguishers.
- **9.** Always check the kitchen before going to bed or leaving the home to make sure all stoves, ovens, and small appliances are turned off.
- 10. Install a smoke alarm near your kitchen, on each level of your home, near sleeping areas, and inside and outside bedrooms if you sleep with doors closed. Use the test button to check it each month. Replace all batteries at least once a year.

Measure X bond measure passes by wide margin

ith all precincts having reported, San Jose - Evergreen Community College District's (SJECCD) Measure X has passed by a margin of nearly

As of Thursday afternoon, more than 64 percent of ballots counted had voted "yes" on Measure X while less than 36 percent voted "no." Many of the no votes cast on Election Day as protest to the proposed controversial 27 acre commercial development at Evergreen Valley College. The San Jose City College will vote on the proposal on Dec. 13.

"I am pleased to see such a high level of participation in the election by our community and grateful for the overwhelming support of Measure X," said Dr. Deborah Budd, SJECCD chancellor. "Measure X ensures that students for decades to come will be able to train and learn in state-of-the-art facilities so they will be well-equipped to transfer to universities and enter the workforce."

Measure X will provide \$748 million for SJECCD to build new educational facilities as well as upgrade and repair existing facilities on the campuses of Evergreen Valley College (EVC) and San José City College (SJCC), each of which is slated for approximately \$320 million in upgrades and new construction. The remainder of Measure X funds will be spent on District-wide projects,



In connection with this search, the NASA vision for Space Exploration involves robotic missions to prepare for humans living and working on the surface of Mars and also exploring the planet to find indicators of life.

Over the past 10 years we have been planning and conducting NASA Spaceward Bound field expeditions to terrestrial planetary analog environments where we can gain scientific knowledge; and test technologies and analytical protocols for life detection.






