## Visually impaired Carranza awarded 'Gift of Sight'

randon Carranza is autistic and had worn glasses since he was four years old.

Carranza was considered for Dr. Furlong's "Gift of Sight" program. He was accepted and had surgery in both eyes. Before the surgery, Carranza's vision was 20/400 in both eyes, which is considered severe visual impairment. His glasses posed many challenges at school, work and while participating in activities.

Following the surgery his vision is now 20/15. He is now able to enjoy a beautiful view from the 16th floor of the Jeppesen office on Santa Clara Street, where he has been working his first job for the past four months.

Two weeks ago, he also scored his best bowling game and secured a win in a Special Olympics tournament for all of Northern California - glasses free. Here is a message he wrote Furlong Vision's Facebook page, following

"All my life I've had to live with my disabling autism. For as long as I can remember, I have had to wear corrective lenses to be able to see right. In spite of these handicaps, my parents and I have always set goals for myself, and I have worked hard to achieve them. Thanks to Dr. Furlong I have 20-15 vision and no longer have to wear corrective lenses. This is going to make my life much easier and perhaps allow me to set even higher goals for myself."

Other recipients of this year's "Gift of Sight" included U.S. Veterans and two very low-income individuals who were recommended by local optometrists.

Editor's note: This is the 10th year that Furlong Vision has partnered with Hope Services (www.hopeservices.org) to identify clients in strong need of vision correction. Hope provides programs that assist children, adults and seniors with developmental disabilities to become valued and participating members of their communities.




## Fantasy of Lights now open through December 30



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#### City Council ban on marijuana sales provides needed time for policy formulation

n Nov. 1, the City Council passed an emergency ban on the sale and distribution of recreational marijuana.

On November 8, 2016, the voters of California voted to legalize the recreational, adult use of marijuana by those 21 and older. Proposition 64 (the Control, Regulate, and Tax Adult Use of Marijuana Act) took affect the following day.

The ban provides City staff and the City Council with the time needed for policy formulation, analysis, discussion, and implementation. The work will include conducting the required environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), community outreach, Planning Commission hearings, and City Council hearings, prior to a vote on whether to allow and regulate the sale, cultivation, manufacture, and delivery of recreational/adult use cannabis.

The urgency ordinance confirms that non-medical marijuana cultivated for personal use is restricted to six living plants and that non-medical marijuana must be grown indoors, or in a secure accessory structure, in alignment with Proposition 64. It also requires that the personal use cultivation is compliant with applicable fire and building codes.

### Semi-pro football team makes strong impact giving back to the community

Por the players on the South Bay Patriots semi-pro football team, football is more than a game. It's a way to connect to the community and make an impact both on and off the field.

San Jose resident and Patriots founder Ron Birdsall has been involved with coaching youth flag football teams, on up to the high school level, the South Bay Patriots, of the Pacific Coast Football League. Birdsall's goal is to pass the values they have learned from the game onto the next generation of players.

For 23 years Ron Birdsall has been in the cabling industry in the San Jose Bay Area. Owning his second successful company and building some of today's tech giants, Ron brings experience and expertise to the trade. "Growing up working for my grandfather and then my father in the construction trade has instilled strong work ethic and a determination to be the best at his skill," said Birdsall.

Ron owns a local business, Walkercabling.com, which serves both small and medium businesses network infrastructure needs in the Bay Area - he's played semi pro football for 20 years and was inducted into the semi pro football hall of fame in Dec. 2015.

He founded the team last year out of desire to provide a positive and productive outlet for adult players, many of whom he's sponsored and mentored for multiple seasons. He's coached Popwarner and various youth athletic teams for a number of years, and many of his players have gone on to play HS and college football.

Several of the Patriots players coach local

youth football teams, and many others have taken players under their wings. From guiding them with football techniques, to helping them learn life skills, the players know the biggest thing that football offers. Your football team becomes your family.

Patriots long snapper, Chris Ruane, and Head Coach of the ADAL Blach Middle School Falcons flag football team in Los Altos, sees the impact that coaching can have on the youth. "There are too many coaches who coach for the wrong reasons, and it directly carries over to players and how they operate later in life, said Ruane

"If we can properly show kids how to be decent people while working closely with a family/unit, we're giving them the tools to do great things in the world."

Jesus Carbajal, linebacker for the Patriots, and Defensive Coordinator for the Evergreen Valley High School football team, wants the next generation to be able to get all of the things he has gained from football. "Football gave me an opportunity to travel the country, obtain a college education, as well as qualities and characteristics that I put to use in everyday life," said Carbajal. "Sports help you develop and adapt to the world without losing composure and build confidence within yourselves to go achieve any goal you may have."

South Bay Patriots offensive linemen, Avido Sainz, and Head Coach of the Del Mar Dons Junior Varsity High School football team, has leaned on football through the ups and downs of life.

"It started back in my college days as a player, being a low income and dyslexic athlete. I didn't know how to prepare myself, or fully understand what it took to be on top of my grades," said Sainz. "I wanted football so badly, but didn't have that one person to guide me through difficult times."

Sharing his story of struggle and success with his players has made Sainz a mentor to many of his players. "I decided to coach when I was 22 years old, — I had just lost my job, I had too much time on my hands, and had an itching to coach football," said Sainz. "I figured, I had tons of knowledge about my position, and my energy, coupled with my love of the game could help another young athlete."

Sainz soon realized that he could relate to the struggles that some of the athletes he coached were experiencing. "They know they can come to me with their frustrations, or whatever is on their mind," said Sainz. "There is nothing like being able to help an athlete steer their lives in the direction they want to go, even with all the distractions that occur in their daily lives."

The South Bay Patriots football team is a non-profit organization dedicated to providing an excellent on-field experience for their fans and sponsors, and an opportunity for their players to showcase their talents. In addition to on field performance, the Patriots staff and players are a volunteer group that helps support the local community. This season alone, there are a dozen Patriots players and coaches who volunteer their time and talents in support of various youth sports organizations in the Bay Area.

The South Bay Patriots will participate in the UCFL Veteran's Bowl charity game in Patterson, CA on December 3rd, benefiting children of parents who are serving in the U.S. Army.

The Chamber also supports some tax measures, like the Measure B Transportation tax, as it was important to their members for their workforce. "The business community felt that the way the transportation tax was proposed and written under Carl Guardino's and VTA's leadership would be beneficial for Silicon Valley," says Gomez.

However, taxes like Measures E and G are concerns to the Chamber. "All of these things add up," says Gomez. "These are all obstacles and add to the cost of business." Under Measure "E," companies with 35 or more employees are required to offer part-time workers more hours before adding additional staff. "That really complicates things for business owners," says Gomez, "from frivolous law suits to loss of employer flexibility." Gomez sees the Measure G Business Tax as another burden for business, but an easier pill to swallow than the original initiative, which would have been a 1,000 percent increase to the busi-

The Chamber is especially proud of their foundation, Strive San Jose, which partners with local businesses to provides high school students with professional development, financial training and job placement. "Our goal is to focus on students who need opportunities," says Career Pathways Liaison, Eddie Truong. "Two-thirds of our students come from low-income families."

Strive San Jose launched their six-week internship pilot program in the summer of 2016. With leadership from Mayor Sam Liccardo and the work2future Foundation, Strive San Jose was able to attain a grant from the Bank of America Foundation to subsidize 41 paid internships. In polling companies that hired the students, they found that about 95 percent were extremely satisfied with their high school interns and 68 percent had hired high school students for first time. "We encourage businesses to invest in their local communities so we can build a pipeline of talent so companies can grow," says Truong.

Their goal for summer 2017 is to match 200 students from San Jose Unified School District, Eastside Union High School District and Campbell Union High School District with paid internships. The Chamber hopes that the program makes an impact on the community and transforms local education to prepare the workers of tomorrow. They are looking for additional local businesses to invest in Strive

San Jose through offering internships, financial sponsorship, hosting career days, mentorships, job shadowing, and training workshops.

As a Work Force Development Coordinator with Kaiser Permanente, Marilyn Rodgers initiated a job shadowing and summer internship program there many years ago. "I can't tell you how important it is to do this for young people in our community," she says. "It's critically important we include the trades and vocational training and not just focus on college education. I hope we can get more small businesses involved."

Looking at San Jose's economic growth and development, Gomez compared it to Seattle's booming city. "Seattle has 58 cranes in the sky downtown compared with two in San Jose," he says. "They don't have the issues we have to deal with here like the Affordable Housing Impact Fee, Transportation Impact Fee and skyrocketing business taxes. Seattle doesn't have regulations and obstacles businesses here have to overcome like CEQA. What we want to do is find creative ways to allow investment to come here and compete with other cities to cash in on economic growth."

Councilmember Khamis concurs. "Dollars will go where companies can get the biggest return on their investment," he says, "and if we make it harder for people to invest in San Jose, they're going to invest elsewhere. Santa Clara can streamline permitting much faster than we can and they have less impact fees." San Jose's developers will soon have to also contend with the Project Labor Agreement requiring developments to use organized labor. "Our city has way too many fees (park fees, traffic mitigation fees, etc.) and we want them all upfront," says Khamis. "We have more fees and taxation than any other surrounding city."

However, there are prospects on the horizon: Brocade is coming, Apple bought 80 acres near the airport, a new Kaiser Permanente building is also being built by the airport and Splunk is building a 5-story structure at Santana Row. "We're getting more businesses every day," says Khamis, "but it would go better if we didn't have so many impediments on development."

## Measure A funds will be spent on solving homelessness in Santa Clara County

anta Clara County officials announced that Measure A past with a slim margin.

The \$950 million affordable housing bond designed to help house homeless and low-income residents in the county passed with just over two-thirds of the vote.

The \$950 million in general obligation bonds is structured to help the neediest residents in the county.

\$700 million of the funds are earmarked to construct new permanent supportive housing. Permanent supportive housing is designed to help the chronically homeless who have been on the street for more than a year.

Rapid rehousing is designed for residents who fall into homelessness for brief periods and need transitional housing for up to 18 months to stabilize their situation.

## **SCV Water District Board presents its efforts to address homeless encampments**

he Santa Clara Valley Water District Board considered three recommendations brought forth by the board's Home-less Encampment Ad Hoc Com-mittee at its recent board meeting.

The recommendations could help curb the growing impacts of homeless encampments on local waterways.

The first recommendation is to develop a process to offer the Santa Clara County Office of Supportive Housing the first chance to lease vacant residential rental properties owned by the water district. Since housing the homeless is the county office's domain, that office would manage the rental process and address individual tenants' needs

The water district currently leases 53 residential properties. Most rental properties were acquired because the lands will be needed for future flood protection projects. Until those projects break ground, the water district typically leases them directly to individuals or families on a month-to-month basis

The second committee recommendation is that certain water district-owned lands be declared surplus and then offered for sale or lease to other governmental agencies that may be able to utilize these lands for the development of permanent housing. Currently, seven water district parcels have been identified as potentially "surplus" because the water district no longer has an identified purpose for them. The parcels, totaling nearly 60 acres, are located within unincorporated areas, and in the cities of San Jose, Morgan Hill, and Gilroy.

The third recommendation is to direct \$350,000 to partner with the City of San Jose to fund an extension of the innovative and successful Downtown Streets Team program to remove trash and debris at encampments along local waterways. The water district's voter-approved Safe, Clean Water and Natural Flood Protection Program specifically designated approximately \$8 million for the removal of trash and debris in waterways.

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
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


