Hopkins County has a new Sheriff, Lewis Tatum. He was elected during 2016 and sworn in on January 1, 2017 upon retirement of former Sheriff Butch Adams. Tatum's law enforcement career began 19 years ago as a member of the Hopkins County Sheriff's Posse. Following completion of Law Enforcement Academy, Tatum spent his career as an employee of the Hopkins County Sheriff's Department, and served as Chief Investigator prior to taking the office of Sheriff. His father Sam Tatum is a long-time Posse member, having served in numerous posts and as a Platoon Corporal for 2017.



The Hopkins County Sheriff's Posse was formed in 1987, sworn in under Sheriff Bill Dierks. The organization will observe it's 30th anniversary in October 2017. Seventeen of the 21 members of the Posse were present on January 10, 2017 for a swearing-in ceremony under the new Sheriff. The group also held election of officers for 2017.

They are: Captain Lisa Hooten, Lt. G.W. Moon, Platoon A Sergeant Joe Hooten and Corporal Earl Martin, Platoon B Sergeant Steve Huffman and Corporal Sam Tatum.

The Posse is a volunteer auxiliary to the Sheriff's Department. Originally a mounted patrol, Posse members have assisted in manhunts, crowd control and other city and county needs. You will still see members on horseback in Dairy Festival and Fall Festival parades, and assisting with security at rodeos, concerts and other local events. New members are being recruited for the Posse. For information, inquire at the Hopkins County Sheriff's Department.







and is considered one of the most influential and popular

recording artists of all time. He is known for his neotraditionalist country style, cowboy look, and being one of the first and main country artists to bring country music back to its roots and away from the pop country era in the 1980s.

Strait's success began when his first single "Unwound" was a hit in 1981. During the 1980s, seven of his albums reached number one on the country charts. In the 2000s, Strait was named Artist of the Decade by the Academy of Country Music, was elected into the Country Music Hall of Fame, and won his first Grammy award for the album Troubadour. Strait was named CMA Entertainer of the Year in 1989, 1990 and 2013, and ACM Entertainer of the Year in 1990 and 2014. He has been nominated for more CMA and ACM awards and has more wins in both categories than any other artist. In 2009, he broke Conway Twitty's previous record for the most number-one hits on Billboard's Hot Country Songs chart when his 45 number one singles surpassed Twitty's 40. Counting all music charts, Strait has amassed a total of 61 number-one hits, breaking a record also previously set by Twitty, and giving him more number one songs than any other artist in any genre of music.

Strait is also known for his touring career when he designed a 360- degree configuration and introduced festival style tours. For example, the Strait Tours earned \$90 million in three years. His concert at AT&T Stadium in Arlington, TX in June 2014 drew 104,793 people, marking a new record for largest indoor concert in North America. Strait was successful innovating country music and in numerous aspects of being a part of popular music.

Strait has sold more than 100 million records worldwide, making him one of the best-selling music artists of all time. His certifications from the RIAA include 13 multi-platinum, 33 platinum, and 38 gold albums. His best-selling album is Pure Country (1992), which sold 6 million (6× platinum). His highest certified album is Strait Out of the Box (1995), which sold 2 million copies (8× Platinum due to being a box set with four CDs). According to the RIAA, Strait is the 12th best-selling album recording artist in the United States overall.

Strait married his high school sweetheart, Norma, in December 1971. Ten years later, George and Norma's son, George Strait, Jr., known as "Bubba", was born. Their daughter Jenifer (born October 6, 1972) was killed in an automobile accident in San Marcos on June 25, 1986, at the age of 13. The family set up the Jenifer Lynn Strait Foundation, which donates money to children's charities in the San Antonio area. Bubba, who is a graduate of Texas A&M in College Station, is pursuing a career as a Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) team roping competitor. Strait was able to watch his son compete at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo in 2006 shortly before taking the stage for his own perfor-

Strait enjoys hunting, fishing, skiing, playing golf, and riding motorcycles. Along with his son, he is a member of the PRCA and partners in team roping competitions. George and his elder brother John Jr., known as Buddy, hosted the annual George Strait Team Roping Classic, in which they competed against some of the best team ropers in the world. Strait has also said that he very seldom picks up a guitar when not in the studio or touring. He and his wife live in northwest San Antonio in a master-planned community known as The Dominion, as well as on a ranch near Cotulla in La Salle County between San Antonio and Laredo. Strait is a fan of the NBA's San Antonio Spurs and can be seen court-side at many of the Spurs' home basketball games.

Since 2010, Strait has served as spokesman for the Wrangler National Patriot program, a campaign designed to raise awareness and funds for

America's wounded and fallen military veterans and their families. Strait states, "I've been a part of the Wrangler family for a long time... when they came to me with the idea for supporting fallen and wounded American veterans and their families. I knew I wanted to get involved." In February 2012, Strait became a grandfather.

**Tumbleweed Smith** 

Raye Virginia and her husband H.K. Allen spent 12 years working with architect Zale Logsdon, a student of Frank Lloyd Wright, designing a house just down the road from the farmhouse. "I live in both of them," she says. Both are filled

She is 87 now, but has a life of accomplishment and still sits on a number of boards and advises artists, writers, historians and scholars.

She is a land steward among other things and has created Friar Creek Preserve on her 60-acre Green Oaks Farm. She takes groups on tours free of charge, but by appointment only, and points out archeological sites and plants native to central Texas. "I take every type of group from Boy Scouts to the Red Hat Ladies of

Her Texas roots are deep. "I was reared in a family that it was just part of our blood to care about Texas history and traditions," she told me. Raye Virginia was a cheerleader when she attended Temple High School. Her parents encouraged her to study and it paid off. She was in the Plan II Honors Program at the University of Texas. "That's a very small program," she reminded me. "We studied Aristotle and Thomas Aquinas and all the great thinkers from all over the world. But I got interested in women's history, especially women artists who had been ignored."

Raye VA, as some people call her, spent 13 years writing an illustrated biography of Gordon Conway, a prominent artist and social icon of the 1920's jazz age whose drawings appeared in Vanity Fair and Vogue Magazines, in newspapers, on posters and in costume and set design for 119 stage productions and 47 films. The book, published in 1997, is a classic and won several awards. She gave me a copy of it and it is something I treasure. It has more reference pages than a dis-

Raye VA did graduate studies in folklore. She has been involved in folklore on both state and national levels. "It was a great honor for me when I was appointed by the Congress of the United States to be on the founding board of the American Folklife Center in the Library of Congress." She was later elected chairman of the board.
