Hogan touts economic growth in visit to Chesapeake Gateway Chamber of Commerce

The Chesapeake Gateway Chamber of Commerce's annual awards dinner usually generates a lot of excitement in eastern Baltimore County, and this year was no exception with Governor Larry Hogan tapped as the keynote speaker.

Hogan, a Republican, started off his address by thanking residents of the east side for getting him elected three years ago.

"It's particularly great to be back on the east side [of the county]," said Hogan. "We surprised a lot of people in that race a couple of years ago... and there's no place that had more to do with me becoming governor than the huge victory we got on the east side of Baltimore County."

The governor spent much of his speech

comparing his first two years in office to former Governor Martin O'Malley's administration, deriding increases in taxes and business regulations.

"In the years just before I took office, the state had increased taxes 43 times in a row, taking \$10 billion more out of the pockets of struggling Maryland families and small businesses," said Hogan. "And the result was devastating on our economy. Businesses, jobs and tax payers were fleeing our state in droves."

According to Hogan, Maryland lost 8,000 businesses and 100,000 jobs during the O'Malley administration. He compared that to the 70,000 private sector jobs added since he took office in 2015 and noted that he had cut taxes, tolls and over a hundred business regulations since taking office.

Given that the east side was home to Bethlehem Steel and the Glenn L. Martin plant, Hogan spoke at length about his administration's success with regard to increasing the number of manufacturing jobs. Hogan told the Chamber that during O'Malley's two terms, the state had lost almost 20 percent of manufacturing jobs, nearing almost 30,000. But, again, things have changed since Hogan was sworn in.

"Over the last two years we've had an incredible resurgence in manufacturing in Maryland," said Hogan. "We've created more manufacturing jobs than all of the other states in the mid-Atlantic region combined. That's pretty good. We went from one of the worst in the country to No. 4 in the nation in the rate of manufacturing job growth."

Salt levels may have contributed to December fish kill, MDE says

A fish kill update issued by the Maryland Department of the Environment suggests unusually high salinity levels may have been a factor in the deaths of roughly 10,000 fish in the Bird and Gunpowder Rivers of eastern Baltimore County.

According to MDE, initial laboratory test results are consistent with the department's preliminary finding that the fish kill, which began on Dec. 19 and lasted until the first week of January, was likely caused by toxins produced by the saltwater algae known as Karlodinium veneficum.

Karlodinium is typically found in waters with higher salinity such as in the larger Chesapeake Bay, and the MDE report stated that blooms of the algae had been seen as far north as Cecil County's Northeast River in November. However, drought conditions in December caused higher salinity in the Bird and Gunpowder rivers, combined with fairly high water temperatures due to the warm fall weather, both of which may have bolstered the algae's growth.

A cold front then swept through the area just before the fish kill, MDE found. The change to colder temperatures can

cause the algae to die, and in dying it can release toxins that damage the gills and cause respiratory distress.

Nine fish species were affected by the event, including yellow perch, largemouth bass, bluegill sunfish, pumpkinseed sunfish, carp, black crappie, gizzard shad, channel catfish and spottail shiner - all freshwater varieties. No saltwater fish were involved.

Early last week, residents along affected shorelines began noticing more dead fish washing up and some feared a resurgence of the fish kill. But MDE has no documentation of a second fish kill, according to a spokesperson, who said the new fish being seen were likely decomposing remnants of the December event.

MDE Communications and Outreach Manager Adrienne Diaczok explained that the bodies of fish that died sometimes take a period of time to surface, and cold weather has preserved them for an extended period.

"It is possible some of the fish died more recently as a result of the latent effects of the water conditions that we preliminarily believe caused the kill," Diaczok said. "But we don't believe those conditions exist at this time and we believe the vast

majority of the fish most recently seen died in the late 2016 event."

Some in the community have questioned MDE's estimate of the number of fish dead, instead suggesting it was actually as many as 100,000 or more.

But while MDE officials initially reported only 6,000 dead, they have not wavered from their adjusted figure.

"Our investigators employ a statistical analysis based on shoreline observations and extrapolations, which resulted in the 10,000 estimate," Diaczok explained. "It is possible that the number might be slightly higher because there were some areas we were not able to get to for observation and there were fish that surfaced later, but the increase would likely be in a range of a few thousand."

Dan Doerfer, environmental advocate with the Essex-Middle River Civic Council, sought to address the root of the problem at the organization's Jan. 4 meeting. There he noted that Karlodinium algae blooms are becoming more of a problem around the world due to nutrients like nitrogen and phosphorus washing into local waterways.

"The reason for having algae blooms still comes back to the fact that there's too many nutrients going into the local streams and those waters," he said. "And when the weather changes this late in the season and those algae die off after blooming, that's what causes the fish kills."

Karlodinium veneficum was the same algae responsible for the November 2015

Middle River fish kill which affected an estimated 200,000 fish.

"It's a worldwide problem," Doerfer said. "And unless we get storm water under control where the nutrients are being restricted... we're going to continue to see the problem."

He commented that it is "more important than ever" for developers to meet the most current standards for storm water controls in their projects, since many nutrients come from storm water runoff. He added that he is "a little nervous" with all of the development planned for the Middle River and White Marsh areas.

EMRCC President Bob Bendler said residents also cannot blame the nutrient levels in the Bird, Gunpowder or Middle rivers on Pennsylvania or New York by way of the Susquehanna River, which drains into the bay.

"The Susquehanna brings down a tremendous amount of pollution, but it doesn't come into Middle River or the Gunpowder. It comes from our yards," he said, noting that many residents in the watersheds of those rivers over-fertilize their lawns and gardens, leading to much of the nutrient pollution.

Bendler expressed at the meeting an interest in gathering together community members, business owners, developers and environmental advocates so they can interact and be educated about the issues and what they each can do to help.

"Two fish kills ought to be enough to get our attention to try to do something bigger," he said.



County seeks public input on next 10-year solid waste plan

On Monday, Jan. 23, the Baltimore County Bureau of Solid Waste Management (SWM) began its "listening tour" at the Perry Hall library to garner public input on its 2019 - 2028 solid waste management plan, hosting its first of five meetings on the topic.

According to SWM Bureau Chief Michael Beichler, the bureau handles about 900,000 tons of trash and 80,000 tons of recycling per year from about 322,000 residences, for which they provide roughly 43 million pick-ups per year. And through all that, they only receive approximately 7,000 complaints per year, he said, contributing to their 88 percent satisfaction rate from residents

SWM spokesman Charlie Reighart, explained the goals of the solid waste program as promoting waste prevention, which helps with pollution prevention and disposal cost minimization; increasing and encouraging recycling; resource recovery, which includes incinerating waste to produce energy; and decreasing the amount and toxicity of solid waste.

Commercial waste comprises more than half of what is generated in the county as a whole, according to Reighart.

"We really don't have any control over that under the current situation," he said, noting that the private sector "does its own thing," moving material to where it makes sense to move it.

The county does, however, encourage increased commercial recycling which can be more cost-effective for businesses.

On the residential side, the bureau works toward waste minimization through encouragement of grasscycling - think, "cut it high and let it lie" - and composting of organic materials, and publishing their Reuse Directory, which lists organizations like Goodwill or the Salvation Army that accept donations of items residents find no longer useful but have not run out of useful life. The directory is available online and in hard copy and is published every two years.

Residential collections are handled by 39 private collectors, and the county's adoption of single-stream recycling made it much easier for residents to participate, Reighart said.

Yard materials are also collected between April and mid-December in about 70 percent of the county. According to Reighart, they are not collected the rest of the year or in the other 30 percent of the county because not enough material is generated to make it cost-effective.

'It's more important for us to be costeffective because you're all taxpayers in the county," he said.

The three residential drop-off centers will also take an unlimited amount of material from county residents for free.

"Nobody else does it quite the way we do it, and it seems to work," Reighart commented.

He also noted that the cost-effectiveness of Baltimore County's program is consistently on par with or better than other counties around the state.

Recycling tends to net the county about

\$62 per ton, while disposal of waste at the Wheelabrator waste-to-energy facility in Baltimore City costs the county about \$65 per ton.

Baltimore County has a contract with the facility to deliver at least 215,000 tons of trash per year for incineration, which is good at least through 2021.

That's the majority of the trash we generate," Reighart said.

Similarly, transfer of trash to disposal sites outside Maryland costs the county about \$64 per ton. The county has budgeted for transfer of 50,000 tons in FY 2017.

"So if you've got a recyclable item, and you've got a choice between putting it out in the recycling or the trash..., the swing is about \$126 - \$127 a ton," Reighart said. "The decisions that residents make are being borne by all of the county residents, whether you recycle or not.

One thing in particular the bureau seeks public input on is the concept of using a High-Diversion Material Recycling Facility (HDMRF) for trash disposal in the county. This is an approach to collection and processing that would see all materials - trash, recycling and yard waste - put out for collection together for a single pick-up per week.

Reighart said this method is "not at all common" in the U.S. But Beichler noted it has gained traction in Europe and is beginning to emerge in California.

Using the HDMRF, 100 percent of the recyclables disposed of in the county would have the opportunity to be captured and recycled, according to Beichler.

The county currently only captures about 20 percent of refuse as recycling and is able to send just 12 percent to market for sale.

"I've always felt that at least 50 percent of what's in the total stream is recyclable," Beichler said. He added that SWM has found an operator who says they can guarantee a rate of about 52 percent recovery of recyclables.

"That's a quantum leap far beyond anything anywhere," he said.

According to Beichler, the county has evolved and adapted its solid waste program, changing to different methods roughly every 10 years, and have looked at models from around the country and the world to determine what would work best here.

"The key part is, what can we do at a Baltimore County price?" he said.

Beichler anticipates that the added cost of the HDMRF would be offset or exceeded by being able to recover more recyclables for sale.

The county has sent out a Request For Proposal for the concept, but has not gone beyond that stage.

Reighart said that, overall, the county is in "pretty good shape" when it comes to solid waste management. "We're not in a bad spot, but that doesn't mean we can't get better," he said.

SWM will hold additional public input meetings regarding the solid waste plan around the county, including at the North Point Library on Wednesday, Feb. 1, at 6:30 p.m.

But while Hogan spent much of the night touting his administration's economic impact, he also touched on the controversial Maryland Open Transportation Investment Decision Act, or the "road kill" bill as Republicans have taken to calling it. The bill requires that road projects must be ranked and any funding for a project not deemed to be priority will be cut unless the governor provide in writing a "rational basis for

the decision."

"Contrary to what some of my friends across the aisle have been saying, the reality is that these new regulations take effect on Feb. 10 and under these new requirements with this bill, 66 of the state's top 73 transportation priority projects simply will not be able to move forward," Hogan told the group.

According to Hogan, all of Baltimore County's top priority transportation projects would have their funding cut.

This includes the widening of I-695.

"I don't have to tell any of you in this room that relieving congestion and moving forward on improving our transportation infrastructure is absolutely critical to economic development," Hogan said.

The evening also provided local business owners the chance to speak with Gov. Hogan about more local issues of importance. Sam Weaver, president of the Back River Restoration Committee (BRRC) told *The East County Times* he discussed the issue of midges with Hogan. Midges have become an issue on the east side, and it has negatively impacted businesses. Weaver maintains that the issue needs to be dealt with before it gets out of hand. According to


Weaver and Hogan, there were plenty of local politicians and business leaders broaching the topic with Hogan.

"I've heard more about midges recently than I ever have before, that's for sure," Hogan joked.

And, of course, there were plenty of awards and honors given throughout the night. Baltimore County Police Chief Jim Johnson, who recently announced his retirement, was honored by the County Council while Richardson Farms, Cliff's Hi-Tech, Jim Jennings Transmissions, the BRRC and Tradepoint Atlantic were all honored by the Chamber for "setting the standards for excellence and innovation with their business practices and community involvement."

Former Essex doctor to be sentenced

A former doctor who at one time was a pain management provider at an Essex medical center will be sentenced in March for traffic and drug convictions.

Hasan H. Babaturk, who worked for Multi-Specialty Health Care on Eastern Boulevard in Essex from 2004 until he was terminated for cause in June 2015, was found guilty earlier this month of driving while impaired by drugs and/or alcohol and possession of a controlled dangerous substance (not marijuana). He is set to be sentenced March 10 in Baltimore County Circuit Court.

Sixteen other charges stemming from the traffic stop at Honeygo and White Marsh boulevards on Oct. 25, 2016, were dropped, according to online court records.

Babaturk is no longer allowed to practice medicine in Maryland. His medical license was suspended in February 2016 after an extensive investigation into his alleged violations of standard medical practices, according to the Maryland Board of Physicians.

A patient complaint alleging that Babaturk was using illegal drugs spurred the investigation that led to the suspension of the doctor's medical license, according to MBP records.

Members of the Baltimore County Police Department conducted surveillance on Babaturk from Oct. 14, 2015, through Jan. 6, 2016, according to the records. On many occasions, law enforcement officers witnessed Babaturk make "exchanges" with "purported patients" on motel,

Current crime trends

Since Jan. 6, there have been 10 burglaries or attempted burglaries of sheds and detached garages in communities in the White Marsh Precinct within a mile of the Baltimore City line. Five cases occurred on Mondays and Tuesdays. Times were generally overnight. Some cases may have occurred over a period of several days. apartment complex, fast food restaurant and shopping center parking lots, among other places.

He was found to be primarily dispensing controlled dangerous substance (CDS) prescriptions on a cash-only basis, charging \$250 to \$350 per patient visit. He admitted to using crack cocaine and heroin, and admitted to trading prescriptions for illegal drugs on occasion, according to the records.

Babaturk was cited for failure to follow safeguards for the responsible prescribing of CDS, according to the documents. He did not take appropriate patient histories, he did not perform physical exams nor create and follow comprehensive treatments plans and failed to monitor his patients' drug use through lab tests such as urine testing, according to the MBP records.

Based upon the observations of the Baltimore County Police Department; an investigation by the Harford County Sheriff's Office; an interview with Babaturk, during which he admitted to many of the accusations made against him; and his employment records, the physicians board "summarily suspended" his medical license on Feb. 25, 2016.

The physicians board's disciplinary panel, in making its decision to suspend the doctor's license, said it had "reason to believe that [Babaturk] poses a substantial likelihood of risk of serious harm to the public health, safety or welfare."

He was ordered to surrender his original medical license, any renewal licenses, wallet cards and wall certificates and his drug dispensing permit.

At his March sentencing, Babaturk faces up to four years in prison on the non-marijuana drug possession conviction, according to Maryland sentencing guidelines.







Distracted driving a real threat

Dating back to the days of the first automobiles, drivers have always taken on a degree of risk when getting behind the wheel and hitting the open road. While technology has done much to mitigate that risk, it's also contributed to the growing number of distractions drivers face on the road.

Distracted driving is a significant threat. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, in 2012 more than 3,300 people were killed in crashes involving a distracted driver. Just a year earlier, 17 percent of crashes in which someone was injured involved distracted driving.

Those figures are even more disturbing when one considers the problem of under-reporting with regard to distracted driving. The National Safety Council notes that under-reporting of mobile phone use leading to car crashes makes the issue of distracted driving appear less substantial than it likely is. Perhaps because they fear potential citations or even possible incarceration, many drivers involved in crashes do not admit to using mobile phones while driving.

But a 2011 Centers for Disease Control study found that distracted driving is a genuine threat. In the study, survey participants were asked how often they had read or sent a text message or email while driving in the previous 30 days. Nearly one-third of study participants in the United States admitted that they had, and those figures were similar in Portugal and Belgium. In addition, 69 percent of U.S. drivers between the ages of 18 and 64 reported that they had talked on their mobile phones while driving in the past 30 days.



TOO MUCH LEAN

A sway bar (also known as an "anti-sway" bar or a "stabilizer" bar) helps prevent a vehicle from leaning too much in turns. It does so by resisting twisting force. With sway bar links at either end that attach to suspension components on each side of the front or back, in order for a wheel on one side to be higher than that on the other, the bar has to twist. Each sway bar link has a ball joint that is subject to wear, the first sign of which is a knocking noise from the suspension when driving slowly over road bumps. At this point, the vehicle should be brought in for an inspection to determine if replacement is needed.

Combatting distracted driving is not easy. As the use of mobile devices grows, many people are finding it increasingly difficult to put those devices down, even when they are behind the wheel of their automobiles. But there are some steps drivers can take to improve their awareness on the road.

One such step is to reduce reliance on hands-free devices. Though it might seem as though hands-free devices are the ultimate weapon against distracted driving, the NSC reports that more than 30 studies have shown that such devices do not make drivers any safer. That's because drivers remain distracted by the conservations they have while using hands-free devices. Reports from the NSC, Texas Transportation Institute and AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety indicate that drivers talking on handheld or hands-free devices can fail to see as much as 50 percent of their surroundings. When driving, stick to driving so you can focus all of your attention on the road, where it belongs.

Another step drivers can take to improve their awareness on the road is to educate themselves and their teenaged drivers about the dangers of distracted driving. A University of Utah study found that drivers using mobile phones had slower reaction times than drivers with a .08 blood alcohol content, which is the legal intoxication limit in many states. If more drivers realized that speaking on their mobile phones impairs their reaction time even more than driving drunk, then perhaps more people would put down their phones and continue their conversations once they reach their destinations.

Finally, drivers who recognize their habits can take steps to prevent those habits from putting them in harm's way. If you are never too far away from your mobile phone and unable to resist the urge to read and/ or answer a text message or email, turn your phone off and put it in the glove compartment before you hit the road. Doing so might just save your life and the lives of your passengers and fellow motorists.

Model T: Ancestor of SUV?

The Ford Motor Company's Model T was offered in several styles, not unlike how vehicles of today are offered in various models. Among the Model T styles available was a two-seat runabout, which can be considered a precursor to the coupe style popular today, and a seven-seat town car, which might be considered an ancestor of today's SUV, at least with regard to passenger capacity. While prospective Model T drivers had some options when choosing which Model T they wanted to purchase, between 1913 and 1925 the car was produced only in black. The Model T engine was a 4-cylinder engine that generated 20 horsepower. To put that latter figure into perspective, many of today's riding lawn mowers are 20 horsepower, and some commercial lawn riding mowers provide as much as 40 horsepower. While car dealers might not sell too many cars featuring 4-cylinder, 20 horsepower engines today, historical estimates suggest that more than 15 million Model T's were built and sold between 1908 and 1927, the last year the car was produced.

Did you know?

According to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety and the Highway Loss Data Institute, roughly 10 percent of all highway deaths involve large trucks. Braking capability can play a role in such deaths, as the IIHS notes that loaded tractor-trailers take between 20 and 40 percent farther than cars to fully stop. That discrepancy is even greater on poorly maintained roads or roads marked by adverse conditions such as ice, rain and / or snow. While 16 percent of the roughly 3,600 people who died in large truck crashes in the United States in 2014 were truck occupants, more than four times that many people (68 percent) were occupants of cars and other passenger vehicles. That's because large trucks typically weigh 20 to 30 times more than passenger vehicles, meaning occupants in cars and passenger trucks are incredibly susceptible to serious injury or death should they get in accidents with tractortrailers and other large trucks. Time of day also must be considered when examining large truck crashes and fatalities. While 17 percent of deaths in 2014 took place between the hours of noon and 3 p.m., that figure dropped to 11 percent between the typical rush hours of 6 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Factors to consider when looking for a new car

According to analysis of new vehicle retail registrations by IHS Automotive in 2014, SUVs and crossovers accounted for 36.5 percent of the new vehicle market, versus 35.4 percent for sedans. Consumers are drawn to attributes like higher ground clearance, more interior space, stronger towing capacity, and higher seat positions. Sedans still draw attention, but are losing ground to larger vehicles, resulting in a major shift in the market. The study also found that pickup trucks and hatchbacks have lost more share in recent years than any other vehicle categories.

How to handle car trouble while driving

• Keep a first-aid kit, spare tire and tire jack in the car at all times. Flat tires are no fun, but they are even more of a nuisance when drivers are not prepared to address them. Always keep a jack and spare tire in your car, even if the spare is a donut, you can temporarily use it to replace a flat tire until you make it to a filling station or automotive supply store. As an added safety measure, keep a fully stocked first aid kit in your vehicle in case you cut yourself while changing the tire or need to address another medical situation. Keep a blanket in the trunk as well so your passengers can stay warm should you experience car trouble on a cold day or night.

• Make note of your surroundings. Some car troubles can only be fixed by the professionals, so pay careful attention to your surroundings in case an issue arises and forces you to pull over and call for help. Always pay attention to mile markers and any landmarks that might help you describe where you are. Though more buyers may prefer to lease new vehicles over preowned vehicles, some prospective lessees consider leasing preowned automobiles. For lessees who intend to buy the vehicles at the end of the leases, preowned leases may make the best fit, as the vehicles will cost considerably less to purchase when the lease expires.

Over the last few weeks I've written extensively about Perry Hall and Our Lady of Mount Carmel. Both teams have been making a lot of noise this season, so it only stands to reason that they would get a lot written about them. But the east side isn't just being dominated by those talented squads, there's also the Dundalk Owls, who have been quietly surging since the turn of the calendar year.

'20TH CENTURY WOMEN' should be seen by 21st century women...and men

Coming off a weekend when thousands of women marched in Washington, D.C., and cities nationwide, I hope a good number of them also march to a cinema to see the wonderful "20th Century Women." And dudes... you're gonna like it, too. But audiences are gonna have to look for it at the art houses and some of the larger cineplexes (The Charles theater in Baltimore started running it this past Friday). Because unfortunately, the studio that is distributing this film has not been giving it the push that flicks like "Moonlight," "Manchester by the Sea" and "La La Land" have had.

I put it at No. 4 on my 10 Best Movies of 2016 list, and I stand by that. There are a few flicks each year where the characters transcend the mechanics of plot and script and become real to me... friends even... almost family. "20th Century Women" worked for me on that level.

Annette Bening plays Dorothea, a chain-smoking widow who is raising a teenage son, Jamie (Lucas Jade Zumann), in sun-dappled Southern California circa 1979. The time period is richly evoked, as Dorothea finds herself caught in an era of emerging feminism, punk rock and the Jimmy Carter presidency.

Dorothea has created a nest for herself and her son in an old Victorian home that she opens up to a small band of misfits. One tenant is Abbie (Greta Gerwig), a young photographer dealing with cancer. Another is William (Billy Crudup), a quiet handy man who is

given a room in return for doing work on the house. And then there's Julie (Elle Fanning), a promiscuous teen who sneaks into Jamie's room every night and sleeps with him... but only sleeps, much to his frustration.

They all have deep and not-so-deep conversations about life, death, love, sex, music, art, politics, gender dynamics and more. Things are changing for all of them. For some, the changes are coming too fast. For others, too slow.

At its heart, it's principally a coming-of-age story about Jamie's path to sensitive manhood. If the film has one flaw it's that its target female audience may feel a bit disappointed that the movie is indeed so much about Jamie and not about the women of the movie's title. Any one of the five main characters really could have been the lead here, and it's still Bening's film (she's getting pretty much all of the awards notice so far). But even I will concede there were times when Abbie and Julie and their dilemmas were used more to service the Jamie character and his development than to their own. Ultimately, though, you do come full circle with all of them, and I don't think I've ever been more interested to get to an end credits where you find out what happens to each person in the years to come a la the end of "American Graffiti," "Animal House," etc.

I truly loved it, and I think you will also.



Finally, a 'xXx' film Teddy can recommend to PG-13 audiences

Criticizing "xXx: The Return of Xander Cage" would be like criticizing an old Looney Tunes cartoon. Like the classic animated fare featuring the Road Runner, Wile E. Coyote and Bugs Bunny, the film has no need for such trivial annoyances as gravity or basic physics. Who needs gravity when you can drop Vin Diesel off a 200-foot-tall communications tower and have him land on skis in the jungle below without breaking every single bone in his feet and legs?

The film is utterly preposterous. But it knows that it's utterly preposterous. It doesn't for a second take itself seriously. I mean, come on. No one wants to see "xXx: The Months Xander Cage Spent in Traction." No one wants to see "xXx: Donnie Yen Never Walks Again." We want to see Diesel's Cage out-racing avalanches and driving motorcycles on ocean waves. He did the first feat of craziness in the film "xXx" back in 2002. He takes a Harley right through a Wave Tube in this latest flick in the series, and you can practically hear a Beach Boys song in your head re-done as a thrash metal tune while he's doing it.

Clearly, Diesel is trying to duplicate some of the adrenaline-fueled elements of his mega-popular "Fast & Furious" series in re-launching a brand that went




