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# **10th Annual Winter Hike**

Penitentiary Glen Reservation February 12 • 1 to 4 pm

It may not be Mount Everest or the Arctic tundra but Lake County has its own wintery wonders and amazing landscape to explore. Join us for our 10th annual Winter Hike Saturday, February 12, as we venture through Penitentiary Glen and into the wilderness in your own backyard. Hikers will embark on their choice of two hikes, varying in length and terrain. The novice hiker will enjoy a short hike with flat and mild terrain led by Lake Metroparks naturalists. More experienced hikers will enjoy the challenge of a longer self-guided hike featuring rolling terrain and a few steep hills. Along the way they will encounter naturalists as they learn hands on how to survive hiking in winter. Additional naturalists and volunteers will be roving along the paths to assist hikers in any way. Both hikes begin at 1 pm. Trail maps will be provided to all hikers.

Our program theme, "Clothed and Unafraid," reminds hikers of the importance of wearing comfortable footwear that is sturdy, warm and water-repellent. Hiking boots are recommended as the trails may be snow- and/or mud-covered. Remember to dress in warm, comfortable layers.

Warm yourself by a roaring campfire and enjoy s'mores after completing your hike. Enjoy hot soup, warm cornbread and beverages served inside the Nature Center and listen to the sounds of live music. Browse our selection of nature-related items in The Nature Store including birdfeeders, wildlife houses and other accessories, binoculars, books, field guides and clothing.

Note: No dogs are permitted at this event. Visit bit.ly/LMcanine for canine-friendly programs offered by Lake Metroparks.

Registration is required to participate in the 10th annual Winter Hike. A commemorative Winter Hike patch, s'mores, soup and beverages are included in the \$8 registration fee. All ages are wel-

Explore the outdoors with an X-Plorer Pack filled with seasonal hands-on activities that help you discover nature in the park.



# Summer Camponeview

Another mother wrote that the family was on a ski trip. The son got to the top of a steep hill and started to panic. The mom said, "What would you do if you were at camp?" and he proceeded to engage himself in positive selftalk that was part of the camp culture: "It may take time, it may be hard; but stick with it, and you'll be fine!" He skied down with a huge sense of accomplishment and perseverance.

It's tough to be a kid these days. It's tough to be a parent. In a society where the nature of the family, the work place, and the community have changed dramatically, we can no longer assume that the natural process of growing up will provide children the experiences and

> the resources they need to become successful, contributing adults. In sharp contrast to the traditions of

growing up in the 50s and 60s, today we live in the first moment when humans receive more of their information second-hand than first! We are in a climate where it is harder to know what we need to survive, so drawing on experiences that give children healthy alternatives and opportunities to instill capabilities, the hallmarks of thriving, is the greatest gift you can give a young child.

Does it really matter if my child doesn't go to day camp, especially since she will go to overnight camp in a few years? She is only four years old — why does she need day

Camp provides one of the very few links with a world larger than the consumer culture we inhabit — and day camp is one important choice in a quiver of options. The camp experience helps children and youth develop an appreciation of their place and

their responsibility in a much larger universe. A preschooler — or even an older child who might be reluctant to go to overnight camp — can join a community that is created especially for her to practice growing up. Why wait until age ten when the benefits of feeling connected and being able to contribute and navigate at an earlier age can be reaped? Under the supervision of inspiring guides and passionate coaches, children can feel successful and make new friends while having the time of their lives; they can experience belonging and contribution; they can have a sense of consistency and predictability in times of turbulence and change.

Day camp can begin as early as age three, and is geared to children who get to experience camp and still return home each evening! They have the best of both worlds

# Art Camps at Rabbit Run

All summer long kids discover hidden talents at six different fine arts camps available at Rabbit Run Community Arts Association (RRCAA) in Madison.

Youth Art Camp is for anyone who likes to be creative and maybe make a mess in the process. For one or two weeks, campers ages 7 to 16 get elbow deep in paint, clay and other mediums as they create original two- and three-dimensional works of art.

**Art Camp** meets Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to noon in the pavilion in the Madison Village square and is conducted by Nancy Brotz, art instructor at RRCAA.

**Pop Star Camp** gets youth ages 5 through 10 up and moving as they learn to sing and dance like their favorite pop star. This one-week day camp is from 9:30 a.m. to noon. Pop Star Camp is led by RRCAA dance instructor Heather Felden and is held at RRCAA, 49 Park St., Madison, OH.

Specific dates for the Art Camps and Pop Star Camp will be announced in February.

Campers delve into all areas of the theater arts including drama, music, dance, costumes, make-up, and stage craft in four theater camps. Combining the best of both worlds, campers have access to the professional-quality stage with state-of-the-art theatrical equipment at Rabbit Run, as well as access to the fresh air and beauty of Stanton Park where many traditional camp activities take place.

Campers also participate in arts and crafts and ageappropriate games including water games. At the end of each theater camp, actors share their talents with parents in an end-of-week program.

**Explorer's Camp**, for those who are new to theater, offers two weeks of camp with a different emphasis each week. This camp, for ages 7 through 15, runs June 5 through June 9 and July 17 through July 21. Campers may register for one or two weeks of Explorer's Camp.

**Just for Juniors Camp**, for children ages four through eight, runs July 24 through July 28 from 9 a.m. to noon. Just for Juniors introduces children to the world of theater through song, dance and lots of imagination.

The Master Class Camp, ages 10 to 15, for the serious young actor runs July 24 through July 28 from 1 to 4 p.m.

New this year is **Youth Theater Camp**, a five-week camp for ages 8 through 15, running June 12 through July 14. Campers in Youth Theater Camp learn all the basic components of producing a show and will perform in a camp production on stage at Rabbit Run Theater the last week of camp.

— the camp community which is built exclusively for kids and their own home which provides the security they need at a tender age.

One day camp parent said, "While my children and I are constantly bombarded by the news which is focused on what is wrong with the world, camp is a living example of what is right."

Day camp is a terrific first experience. Reminiscent of less complicated days, when people connected with nature, thrived on inter-generational relationships, and made new discoveries, everything is designed and scaled to ensure that children feel included, cared about, and capable. Beginning camp at an early age provides important advantages.

Camp is the best demonstration of moral and spiritual order — democracy is the core purpose. Children learn life skills and behaviors that become habits of the heart. 

Meredith and Paige believe there are students in our schools that are unable to ever learn to read! This troubling statement says there are most likely some teachers and administrators with the same

belief. Bruce Meredith (Former general counsel to the Wisconsin Education Association Council) and Mark Paige Assistant professor of public policy at the University of Massachusetts-Dartmouth, specializes in law and education.) recently wrote an op/ed article about the U.S. Department of Education, "Education Dept. has done what little good it could do." (Los Angeles Times, January 9, 2017.) They state, "Rather than admit the impossibility of proficiency for all students, the Education Department took a hard line."

For three decades, we have been suc-

cessfully teaching children and adults of all ages and abilities how to read. Take Sara, a sixteen-year-old with a forty IQ. Yes, you read the IQ correctly, her IQ is forty. 
