Mayor Liccardo and Councilmember Arenas speak at District 8 Community Round Table meeting

ore than 50 Evergreen residents braved the rainy weather on Feb. 9 to attend the monthly District 8 Community Round Table at the Village Square Library, where Councilmember Sylvia Arenas and San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo spoke.

Councilmember Arenas led off the evening with remarks about her first month in office, including helping with a cleanup day for the Meadowfair community. She also explained a new city program offering up to \$15,000 of assistance to ground floor space businesses and announced that a bike park adjacent to the Lake Cunningham skate park would be opening, with a late May ribbon cutting ceremony in the works.

"I look forward to serving the people of our community," she concluded, thanking the audience for their support.

The Mayor's Budget Director, Lee Wilcox, led the group through a participatory budget exercise using an interactive web polling software that allowed real time voting by audience members. 56 people logged on to the system and answered questions about their favorite sports team (the Warriors won by a hair over the Sharks), and their top priorities for city services (public safety, unsurprisingly topped the list).

Liccardo focused on the 2017 – 2018 budget which is currently being developed.

'We would like to restore core services to their January 2011 levels," said Liccardo. He explained that while January 2011 service levels were not at the highest level San Jose had experienced, "it's a service level that we think is attainable given our budget constraints."

Liccardo noted that progress is being made, especially since the passage of Measure F. "We have a four times increase in cadets for the upcoming police academy and we paved \$109 million in streets last year," he said. "We are working hard to increase our core services: police, fire, community centers and street maintenance.



The Mayor also announced the BeautifySJ initiative, a focus on "doing what San Jose can do." In support of BeautifySJ, the city will soon announce free, unlimited large item pickup and grants for neighborhood beautification. Liccardo cited the city's work with CalTrans to accelerate graffiti cleanup around San Jose's highways. "We're also releasing a new smartphone app for incident reporting that will make it easier for residents to notify the city of areas needing our attention.'

The Mayor's Budget Director Lee Wilcox wrapped up the meeting with an interactive session focusing on two questions: what would help make your neighborhood great and how might we make these ideas a reality?

Rex Randles, former candidate for the San Jose/Evergreen Community College Board pointed out that "We ARE a community. San Jose needs to view us as that instead of a collection of individual neighborhoods."

The next District 8 Round Table meeting will be held Thursday, March 2 at the Village Square Library Community Room .The meeting, starting at 7 p.m., will focus on mental health issues. A panel of experts from a variety of organizations, including the National Alliance on Mental Illness, the San Jose Police Department and Uplift Family Services will answer questions about recognizing persons with mental health issues, and what services and types of assistance are available

Volunteers give thousands of school uniforms to low-income children

he Assistance League of San Jose (ALSJ), an all-volunteer philanthropic organization, presented 9,210 new school uniforms to 5,434 low-income students in 39 elementary schools in San Jose.

The schools served are within the Franklin McKinley, Alum Rock Unified and San Jose Unified school districts.

"The new uniforms provided by Assistance League helps our students think more positively about themselves which results in increased confidence," said Patricia Hernandez, student support counselor at Anne Darling Elementary School. "Attendance is improved because students who wear clothes that fit them are more motivated to come to school."

This was an increase of 567 uniforms over last year for low-income children in kindergarten through sixth-grade. The uniforms were distributed in two waves; at the beginning of the school year in September and again in January to provide uniforms to students who entered school in the middle of the year.

"Local families living below the poverty line and struggling just to get by can't always afford new school uniforms for their children," said Jerri Kazmierczak, president of the Assistance League of San Jose. "For many of these children, our uniforms will be the only new clothes that they will receive during the year."

The results of the most recent ALSJ annual survey show that 96 percent of the 256 teachers surveyed feel that the uniforms have a positive effect on the students' self-confidence, 82 percent feel that the uniforms help with inclusion in peer groups, while 78 percent notice improved behavior at school in students who receive uniforms.

For 24 years, ALSJ volunteers have managed the entire program, from ordering uniforms in March, to unloading the truck full of uniforms in July, to arranging for storage, planning packaging sessions, assigning liaisons to each of the schools served, and organizing teams to go to

the schools to measure the children and deliver the uniforms.

The elementary schools served include:

Franklin McKinley School District: McKinley, Dahl, Los Arboles, Hellyer, Santee, Franklin, Kennedy, Lairon, Meadows, and Shirakawa elementary schools.

San Jose Unified School District: Gardner, Washington, Grant, Lowell, Empire Gardens, Almaden, Galarza, Anne Darling, Olinder, Allen, Horace Mann, Bachrodt, Canoas, Terrell, and Trace elementary schools.

Alum Rock Unified School District: Chavez, Cassell, San Antonio, Hubbard, Painter, Dorsa, Ryan, Lyndale, Russo/McEntee, Cureton, Meyer, McCollum, Goss, and Arbuckle elementary schools.

ALSJ depends entirely on grants and donations to purchase the school uniforms. Major



Ellie Plane helped plan San Jose women's march in San Jose

of seventeen-year veteran Evergreen School District, Ellie Plane recently played a key role in helping to organize the San Jose Women's March, held January 21.

Currently at Laurelwood, she previously spent 13 years at Matsumoto, coming to the District straight from the credential program at Notre Dame de Namur University.

"I knew Evergreen was the right place being that there was a competitive salary schedule, good medical benefits, the trust, and that it was still in the Bay Area. I grew up in San Mateo and didn't want to live too much farther from family," she says.

She describes her teaching style as "more of a flexible, workshop approach." She says, "I have been trained in Reading and Writing Workshops at Columbia University. I prefer to have my students pushing themselves at their own individual level, and knowing what their levels are. I think that the most important part of education is getting students to buy-in to what they are learning. If they have a better understanding of what their level actually is in all subject areas, they're more likely going to succeed and not get overwhelmed."

Late last year she had planned to attend the Women's march in Washington but the trip proved unworkable. Instead she turned her attention to the local march. "On the website, I saw they were looking for volunteers, so I signed up thinking I would be a day-of volunteer," she says.Before she knew it, however,

she was playing a more significant role than | she ever imagined. "At the first meeting once committees were established, it was clear many of us were organizing something for the first time," she points out. "Not ever having worked in the corporate world, I felt that I was at a bit of a disadvantage for a while, but soon realized that the team I was working with was a wealth of knowledge and that we were in it together. I went from 5th grade teacher during the day to stage manager at night."

Initially anticipating two to five thousand people, the organizers were shocked to see as many as 38,000 turn out in downtown San Jose. "At one point, around 10:30, my friend and I heard that there was confusion at City Hall," she says. "We decided to walk over there to offer support. When we got there, we were completely overwhelmed by the masses of people. Seeing something on which we | worked hours upon hours for the past six weeks come together which such force, peace, and absolute support was overwhelming." She says she had to fight back tears several times through the day. "When the rally started, we have 'our future leaders' up on stage to take an oath. Those leaders included former students from grades 6-12, including my own 5th grade son and his friend. They stood up on stage as a group of 20 future leaders, from all different backgrounds, races, religions, and explained why each one of them were marching and were going to take The Oath. Those kids, completely on their own, identified their reasons with such poise: fighting to stop gender inequality, for equal treatment of Muslim Americans, for women's right to choose, for LGBTQ rights; seeing those kids on stage, and

having former students now in high school leading the march into the plaza, was emotional and overwhelming." She adds, "I don't know that I have ever been as proud to be a part of anything else in my life."

But of course, when not stage managing 38,000-person events she's hard at work teaching her fifth graders. She says biggest advice she can offer potential teachers is to focus on the difference that can be made in the classroom. "As we continue to fight for public education, we need to remember, the students are the ones who need us. Teachers are amazing people who are able to overcome so many obstacles while still taking on the individual needs of 30+ kids every day. It is not an easy profession, but it is by far the most rewarding, especially when you can see the impact that you make as those kids get older."

Once the water collects it is pumped out. The public water works department also lends a hand in the process of pumping the water by bringing in an additional pump on such winters of heavy rains.

The rangers need to get the park ready for the high use period of April, however new storms bringing more rain this week could impact the park's readiness.

Evergreen Valley College accreditation reaffirmed

vergreen Valley College (EVC) along with its sister college San Jose City College (SJCC) have received reaffirmation of their accreditation status for 18 months.

The San Jose – Evergreen Community College District (SJECCD) made the announcement on Feb. 7. The reaffirmation is based on a comprehensive evaluation by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC).

"Reaffirmation for 18 months indicates that the Commission has determined that the institution is in substantial compliance with Standards," letters from ACCJC to the College presidents read.

Both EVC and SJCC completed accreditation site visits in October, during which time teams of evaluators from ACCJC spent multiple days on the campuses analyzing data and reviewing reports and operations at the Colleges and District.

"The accreditation process is vital to the ongoing improvement of our Colleges and we

are grateful for ACCJC's work in ensuring that we continue to meet their high standards for institutional effectiveness," said Dr. Deborah Budd, SJECCD chancellor. "The fact that both Colleges have had their accreditation reaffirmed reflects the hard work taking place on our campuses, our commitment to continuous improvement, and the dedication of our faculty and staff to serving students."

The visiting teams noted numerous commendations at each College and the District, including diverse services designed to engage the student population; a focus on equitable access; cultivation of a welcoming environment and an inclusive campus culture; well-developed and documented basic skills and student equity programs; innovative cross-disciplinary and contextualized curriculum; a notable "esprit de corps" and commitment to serving students; and efforts to improve campus safety, security, and emergency preparedness.

"Our accreditation is critical to ensuring that our students and the public are aware that the quality of our instruction and student support services have been recognized as meeting the very high standards set by ACCJC," said EVC President Henry Yong. "The fact that the evaluation process is peer-led confirms that community college educators and administrators from throughout the region have recognized the value of a degree or certificate from EVC."

While the accreditation process was time consuming and required many resources at both Colleges, SJCC President Byron D. Clift Breland indicated that it was very much a team effort that involved all constituency groups at the College. "Having our accreditation reaffirmed is a great achievement and I am proud of our faculty, staff, and students for their efforts in making San Jose City College a great institution of higher learning," Dr. Clift Breland said. "It's important that we always work to improve upon and adapt the programs and services of the College to meet the needs of today's learner as well as the education and job training requirements of the new economy."

The colleges will provide additional information and evidence of changes made since the accreditation team visits last October in a follow-up report to ACCJC in spring 2018.



'CONSERVATION MUST REMAIN A WAY OF LIFE'

Water board continues water reduction target

n Tuesday, Jan. 24, the Santa Clara Valley Water District Board of Directors voted to continue its call for water use reductions of 20 percent compared to 2013 water use.

While statewide and local conditions have improved significantly, the board emphasized that dry conditions could return, and the community's water savings achievements should be continued.

Vice Chair Santos said, "Water conservation is a way of life. It's not going to change. We're an arid region for the rest of our lives. History will repeat itself. Like all good people, we put money in the bank for those rainy days that don't come."

A new resolution, which will be brought back to the board for adoption at its Jan. 31 meeting, will include a call for a continued limit on watering ornamental landscapes to no more than three days a week. It will drop the prior call for retail water agencies, local municipalities and the County of Santa Clara to implement mandatory measures, as needed, to achieve the 20 percent water use reduction target.

The water district does not have the authority to enforce mandatory water use restrictions on the customers of each local water provider. Since 2014, the board's resolutions have instead requested that water providers implement their own mandatory water restrictions to reach the target.

"Mandatory" language dropped

By dropping the "mandatory" language now, the board expects that local water providers will not use drought surcharges or penalties to motivate customers to meet the 20 percent goal.

The board's resolution will incorporate explicit reference to the State Water Resources Control Board's permanently prohibited practices that waste potable water: hosing off sidewalks, driveways and other hardscapes; washing automobiles with hoses not equipped with a shut-off nozzle; using non-recirculated water in a fountain or other decorative water feature; watering lawns in a manner that causes runoff, or within 48 hours after measurable precipitation; and irrigating ornamental turf on public street medians.

Estremera motion carries

Director Tony Estremera, who made the motion to continue the 20 percent water use reduction target, said, "[We should] be very clear that we support the public maintaining all of the great behavior that they've adopted."

Local water supply outlook

In 2016, Santa Clara County used 28 percent less water than was used in 2013, exceeding the board's water use reduction target of 20 percent. This achievement, along with the water district's groundwater replenishment program, resulted in groundwater storage ending the year in the "normal" zone for the first time since the beginning of 2014

Local reservoir storage is currently at 161 percent of the 20-year average for January. Several reservoirs have exceeded their capacity and excess water has been flowing from their spillways. Rainfall totals exceed 200% of normal for this time of year in the wettest parts of the county.

The board will re-visit its water use reduction target in May, after the amount of water supply avail-

able to Santa Clara County is finalized

Editor's note: The Santa Clara Valley Water District manages an integrated water resources system that includes the supply of clean, safe water, flood protection and stewardship of streams on behalf of Santa Clara County's nearly 1.9 million residents. The district effectively manages 10 dams and surface water reservoirs, three water treatment plants, an advanced recycled water purification center, a state-of-the-art water quality laboratory, nearly 400 acres of groundwater recharge ponds and more than 275 miles of streams. We provide wholesale water and groundwater management services to local municipalities and private water retailers who deliver drinking water directly to homes and businesses in Santa Clara County.

Water District awards two projects grants

he Santa Clara Valley Water District recently awarded \$87,440 in grants to two innovative projects expected to help the district meet its long-term goal of saving more than 32 billion gallons of water each year by 2030.

The two awardees were selected from a pool of eight applicants in the fourth round of competition for grants from the Safe, Clean Water and Natural Flood Protection Program, a parcel tax approved by voters in 2012. Projects granted funding must be completed by June 30, 2019.

"We are excited to support these innovative projects," said John L. Varela, chair of the district's board of directors. "These projects can help save water locally, but also serve as a model for water conservation nationwide."

Fisher Nickel, Inc.

Fisher Nickel Inc., of San Ramon,

was awarded a \$37,500 grant to replace dipper wells at multiple food service sites in Santa Clara County with different business models to showcase the efficacy of each replacement technology.

Ecology Action

Ecology Action, of Santa Cruz, was awarded a \$49,940 grant to investigate water savings from using captured rainwater for indoor purposes such as toilet flushing and clothes washing. They will partner with residential, commercial, and institutional property owners in Santa Clara County to construct and monitor water use and water quality of rooftop rainwater harvesting systems for indoor, non-potable uses.

The water district expects to distribute nearly \$35 million in grants, partnerships and rebate programs over the life of the 15-year Safe, Clean Water Program.

New 'U.F.O.' houseboat design ready for Kickstarter

he Italians, known for their exotic cars, have come up with a new houseboat design from the mini-yacht company, Jet Capsule.

The new houseboat design called UFO is a floating circular houseboat with a large disk around it. It's made mostly of fiberglass and carbon fiber, relies on solar panels, and has a dome containing bedrooms, bathrooms, and a kitchen.

The craft has three levels with an upper area with the controls and hot tub; a central room with a kitchen and bathroom and a submerged bedroom; and its twin 80 horsepower engines allow the UFO to travel at 10 mph.

In addition to utilizing solar panels, the houseboat uses water turbines to juice up its 16 batteries. It can theoretically travel the universe



(or at least the aquatic one) for an infinite amount of time.

Meant to be used as a floating spa, restaurant or the coolest water home on the planet, Jet Capsule plans to launch the UFO 2.0 on Kickstarter in the next few weeks, and supporters will have the chance to make a reservation to stay in the prototype once it's complete in 2018.

Varela, Santos elected chair and vice chair of water board

The Santa Clara Valley Water District Board of Directors unanimously elected John L. Varela, District 1 representative, to serve as board chair in 2017. Richard P. Santos, representing District 3, was elected vice chair.

Chair Varela, who represents Evergreen Valley, was appointed to the water district board in December 2015, filling the vacant District 1 seat following the resignation of Dennis Kennedy.

Varela was subsequently elected

in November 2016 to serve the remainder of Kennedy's original term, which expires in December 2018. He has served as mayor and council member of Morgan Hill. He has been an entrepreneur in the solar/clean energy, bio-fuel and toy industries. He volunteers with several community organizations and is co-founder of South Valley Angels, an organization helping people start small companies.

Vice Chair Santos was first elected in 2000 to represent District 3, which encompasses the City of Milpitas, the northern portions of the cities of Sunnyvale and Santa Clara, and the Northern San Jose communities of Alviso, Berryessa, and Alum Rock. Mr. Santos is a native of Alviso, California and served in Korea with the 1st Calvary Armored Division until receiving an honorable U.S. Army Discharge in 1965. In 1968, Vice Chair Santos was hired as a San Jose Firefighter, promoted to Fire Engineer, Fire and Arson Inspector, and retired with 33 years of service as a Fire Captain in



Public notice of vacancy and provisional appointment

A vacancy in the membership of the Board of Trustees of the Evergreen School District has occurred due to the election of Sylvia Arenas to San Jose City Council.

Following an extensive application and interview process of 20 community members, Balaji Venkatraman was appointed February 8, effective that date.

If a petition calling for a special election containing the signatures of at least 1.5% of the number of registered voters of the District at the time of the last regular election for governing Board members held within

the Evergreen School District (November, 2016) is filed in the Office of the Santa Clara County Superintendent of Schools within 30 days from the date of this provisional appointment, the District will be required to hold a special election.

The cost of a special election for the District has been estimated at \$250,000 and will be the financial responsibility of the District. If a petition is not filed and verified by the Office of the Santa Clara County Superintendent of Schools, the appointment of Balaji Venkatraman to the Evergreen School District Board of Trustees shall remain an effective appointment until December, 2018.

Mortgage rate increase does not deter homebuyers

The recent increase in mortgage rates moved up last month, but lenders report that loan demand stays strong with an application increase of 4 percent.

Refinance volume did move slightly up 0.2 percent seasonally adjusted. It had jumped sharply the previous week, after outgoing HUD Secretary Julian Castro announced a quarter-point drop in the FHA's annual mortgage insurance premium.

The average contract interest rate for 30-year fixed-rate mortgages with conforming loan balances (\$424,000 or less) increased to 4.35 percent from 4.27 percent, with points decreasing to 0.30 from 0.39 (including the origination fee) for 80 percent loan-to-value ratio loans.

The FHA share of total applications increased to 13.6 percent from 13.1 percent the previous week, but that is likely to fall back next week. Mortgage rates also moved higher, but that didn't cut into refinance demand.

"While this was the first rate increase in January, rates remain about 10 basis points lower than four weeks ago," said Lynn Fisher, MBA vice president of research and economics.


Georgia Tech announce two graduates from Evergreen Valley


The phone is not designed to be an outright replacement for your laptop or desktop PC, but rather an alternative for those on the go.

PRESIDENT TRUMP APPROVES EMERGENCY FUNDING

Oroville Dam erosion repairs continue around the clock

President Donald Trump approved federal emergency aid for California as a result of the potential failure of the Oroville Dam's emergency spillway, and separately to help recovery efforts from recent storms.

As of Wednesday afternoon, crews were continuing to make repairs on the eroded emergency spillway in an around-the-clock operation as a new storm was forecast to reach the Oroville Thursday morning.

Residents in the evacuation areas began started returning to their homes Tuesday afternoon. Many businesses started to reopen.

The approval of the emergency declaration provides money for the area and authorizes the use of federal equipment and resources to alleviate the impact of the dam incident. That allows the state to potentially get up to 75 percent federal reimbursement for "required emergency protective measures," which might include the cost of repairing the dam's emergency spillway.

Even if one disagrees with Liccardo's views there is no mistake that his ability to communicate builds bridges with the community which helps get things accomplished in a turbulent world of politics.

Chaudhry master of ceremonies

Nine community honorees were bestowed with each person in a group earning a medal. The groups were Los Paseos Neighborhood Association, Desiree Barragan, Rock Canyon Circle Concerned Residents, San Jose Conversation Corps, San Jose Auxiliary for Children, Alma Neighborhood Association, San Jose Sikh Gurdwara 5K Walk for Humanity, Cambrian Park Kiwanis and the District 10 Faith Community.

Next the moment everyone was waiting for arrived, Mayor Liccardo took center stage.

As stated earlier, Mayor Liccardo took command of the event in the same way that Apple Computer makes a new product introduction and he channeled the electricity of Steve Jobs in the way he communicated to all in attendance.

He first started out by honoring his wife for "her love and patience , and for spending Valentine's Day weekend with me in this unique setting in a high school gym with 1,000 of our good friends..." He thanked his parents and to his dad whom was in attendance he stated showed him integrity in his growing up and he also thanked his sister for her love and support. From his family at home he moved to thank all members of his team, his city family, whom he expressed work so hard with him to achieve so many wonderful accomplishments to better the city!

"A Tale of One City"

"Today, our country encounters a uniquely difficult moment," said Liccardo. "Our national political discourse has disintegrated into a divisiveness that has belittled some, embittered others, and left many dispirited. The rancor pulls many people to extremes, urging some to pull up the drawbridge to exclude our most vulnerable, while others abandon any search for middle ground in a defiant resistance."

Liccardo contrasted the shiny city in the sun called San Jose in a different light from the nation. "San Jose offers our discordant nation another way," he said.

In contrasting "Tale of Two Nations" that occupies daily headlines, Liccardo said we have a different story to tell to our divided nation, and to a troubled world, San Jose unveils its 'Tale of One City.'

He went on to state that San Jose's "basic DNA is...a diverse people who work together to embrace a common future..." Thus he went on to express that all in our city work hand in hand to get things accomplished for the welfare of our future.

Restoring services

In the last ten years nearly one-third of the city's workforce was lost and this was frustrating to underserved residents and overstretched employees, he stated. "So, we worked with courageous leaders on both sides of the ideological aisle... to enable two critically-needed revenue measures and a pension reform settlement to reach the ballot...because voters overwhelming supported these efforts, "we're using those dollars today..."

He continued, "We'll need to keep tightening our belt in the years ahead, to be sure, but I am proud to see how we've pulled together to begin restoring those services."

Public safety a top priority with \$3 billion saved

Liccardo explained his team worked hard to eliminate two barriers of rebuilding the police department and resolving the battles over pension reform with reduced disparity in officer pay.

In a historic, "coalition of community leaders, our voters approved our negotiated pension settlement that will boost police recruiting and secure more than \$3 billion in savings for our taxpayers...The police pay is now becoming competitive with all other cities too. San Jose to have double the corps of community service officers to increase ability to respond to property crimes."

All police officers to wear body cameras

"...We're leading the national conversation about police accountability by expanding See ADDRESS, page 19

to reach out to common people, many of whom are poor, to care for their physical, material and spiritual needs, and welcome them into the life of the Church."

"We believe in caring for those in physical, emotional, and spiritual need to conveying the love of God for people in need and as a way for us to be formed in the character of holiness."

"We believe participation in groups in which we hold each other accountable for good deeds and spiritual practices as we respond to God's call of holiness of heart and life."

The Sikh's who attend the Gurdwara (place of worship) have similar beliefs too;

Charity is a key component of Sikh teachings because the Sikh's embrace the teachings that their actions and compassion are essential for their spiritual life. They believe all religions and all nations must be helped to live a good and peaceful life and it is good to share one's earnings with the community and to remember God. The Gurdwara is open to the public and one can visit their history room to learn more.

Point Church and The Gurdwara join hands to hand out blankets together

In understated ways they get in trucks and drive over to most all the houseless encampments to offer help.

Those receiving the blankets, tarps, and more express in heartfelt ways;

- "It's a blessing from God."
- "I am very grateful."
- "We are happy they are doing this for us."
- "Nobody should have to live like this."

"They really don't know how much they help us for it has been extremely cold during the night."

"We appreciate their help because our tent was taken and our things thrown away."

Challenging issues face those without a place to live

It was explained by one person who has diabetes that when they try to use a restroom at a gas station they are often refused. The same is true for some large big box stores and discount places. They are told they are not welcome. This person expressed a situation that actually occurred:

"I was in need of going to the bathroom. I have diabetes. There was no place to go. No public restrooms near. I asked if I could use the restroom in a large store and was refused. I had to crouch down so as not to relieve myself. I think all stores should allow all bathrooms to be used by all."

Actual examples of discrimination are expressed:

"Some small convenience stores reserve the right to not serve us." So, if a person is without a home and wants to buy a small item from a little mom and pop store, they are told to go away and not served. This means that the houseless person has to walk for miles to find another store to buy the item.

Harassment experienced

An individual expressed that some agencies told them that they would tag their goods and

kindly bring them all over to the houseless shelter (homeless shelter). What allegedly occurred is that the good things such as bicycles and such were missing after the move leading some to ask who took them and more importantly lose trust in others.

Hired security companies may need more training

Some complained that when they do sleep

outside the security people that patrol the areas they sleep harass them. "They saw me walking and tried to scare me by pulling the truck toward me so I would jump back because they know I am homeless." This same person stated that they were often the brunt of slurs and that "they snicker at us." Something profound was expressed too! "We are like anyone else. We pay like anyone

else for things. Some of the large companies spend millions and millions of dollars as members of Habitat for Humanity but don't help us."

Hi, I can pay you \$1700 per month for rent with City Voucher for a year and a half, can you rent to me?

No. That is the answer often heard. Seventeen hundred dollars a month in rent and turned away. This is actually the situation in our Silicon Valley right now. It is seen that the Veterans also have the same pressing need and it is said that leaders in San Jose are approaching key organizations to try to get all to help transition these paying renters. Finding rental opportunities is hard.

"I ain't scared of work..."

This kind and strongly built man expressed and he and his wife want better conditions for those without places to stay. Such people are very gracious and intelligent often asking questions such as, "how did you enjoy the holidays," in meaningful sincere ways. There is a joy in communication. What a wonderful change from the often rushed conversations that are experienced in our Valley with pocket phones chiming, voiced sentences in the air and frequently heard multi-tasked well dressed techi-faithfuls having lone conversations with shopping with their lit up blue electronic attachment riding along in an ear all the day waiting in anticipation of never let them wait phone calls.

Homelessness (House-less-ness) is not a nomadic way of life

It is improper to refer to those without houses as "The Homeless," for that is a pejorative term. Instead we all must understand that to be houseless is temporary. It is not a way of life and sometimes tough to get out of it. To be homeless can happen even if people with a child and a baby hold out \$1700 in guaranteed rent monies for a year and a half to potential rental places or private parties (City Voucher after waiting often over a year and a half to be approved).

Point Church parishioners and Sikh members of The Gurdwara show strength in working together to help the poor

Tyler Wiest, member of the Point Church expresses in words the merit of two organizations joining together to help others, "I feel I am doing what I have been called to do by God. There isn't any apprehension because it's what Jesus would have done, and the Holy Spirit leads me to do so. I also feel The Point Church and the Gurdwara Temple of San Jose were meant to be neighbors, so that we could do great work in the community together as we grow in our spiritual relationships."

officer training on racial bias, inviting public scrutiny of arrest data, and deploying bodyworn cameras on every officer. He went on to say, "Chief Eddie Garcia has set a national gold standard for building community trust." Also, he thanked independent police auditor Walter Katz for the exceptional work done.

Equity

"...Nowhere does the yawning gap between the rich and poor appear more palpable," the mayor stated. He went on to say he worked with other mayors of cities so all can raise the minimum wage to \$15 per hour by 2019.

He stated that this year construction is to be launched to create 500 apartments for homeless. Also, an innovative micro-housing village is to be achieved and work with churches is in effect in the creation of a rotating shelter network. Schools are being helped with a new initiative to prevent homelessness among struggling families with children too.

Dave Cortese and mayor help the veterans

Destination Home, nonprofit partners and faith congregations housed close to 600 veterans last year. The mayor stated that, "Thanks to Board President Dave Cortese's willingness to lead this effort with me... together we will end veterans' homelessness in our valley this year!"

Our immigrant community

Mayor Liccardo stated that, "diversity is our hallmark...nearly 40 percent of us were born abroad and our immigrant neighbors enrich our culture, spur innovation and reinvigorate our collective passion for freedom."

"To those who seek to divide new Americans from the rest of us; we denounce the politics of fear and exclusion. Our police officers will not engage in immigration enforcement that tears our families apart, and sows mistrust in our community. We will fight for our Muslim neighbors. We will fight of our Dreamers. We will fight for any community member earnestly striving to better their families' lives...Los vamos a respaldara. We've got your back."

The city of thinkers

San Jose continues to shape the future of the world through technological innovation and new ideas. In addition to new inventions transit and infrastructure will make our future bright.

The mayor made an amusing statement



which again was refreshing in its truthful resonance. He said, "To get to our bright future, we better not take 101, 85, 680 or 280, because the crippling traffic will make us miss it... We've got to find a better way to move our fast growing city." He thanked Mayor Gonzales in realizing his dream of launching BART service from North San Jose to Berryessa Station.

Like New York, we are going to have a Grand Central Station

The mayor stated that the transit systems will converge in the future at a single place called "Diridon Station." It will be "the Grand Central Station of the West." It will become a "memorable, vibrant, and iconic destination for our downtown." Construction will begin this year on several million square feet of new office space, restaurants, retail and housing surrounding the station. This is the vision

The mayor will push forward with building light rail connection along Capitol Expressway to Eastridge. There will be a link from Diridon Station to the airport and in the future with planning an innovative transit solution for West San Carlos and Stevens Creek.

Data analytics enlighten

The future will be shaped more with innovation, leveraging technology, and fresh thinking. Data analytics is used to combat illegal

trash dumping, and to help policing and park maintenance. Permitting processes is shifting to on-line more and it enables 23,000 permits to be issued without people leaving their chairs.

coach Vince Lombardi and began to admire his views on knowing the basics in becoming a champion.

Philosophy of the basics

This is a short but slightly moderate hike where you will hike through diverse habitats and majestic redwood groves. Once you make it to the Lookout Point destination, you will see spectacular views of west Santa Clara Valley and South San Francisco Bay Area.

2. #BarnTrail

Joseph D. Grant – Hotel/Lower Hotel/Barn/

This easy hike will take you through beautiful grasslands, wooded habitats, and permanent wetlands. Your destination, the Snell Barn, was once used by Joseph D. Grant for farming and hay operations.

3. #MummyMountain

Coyote Lake Harvey Bear – Mendoza/ Mummy Mountain/Coyote Ridge Trails – 3.7

You will meander through large oak trees, pass by a huge sandstone cliff pockmarked

with caves and see spectacular views of Coyote Valley. Your destination will be a picnic table at the summit overlooking beautiful Coyote Reservoir.

4. #TieCamp

Travel through diverse habitats from mixed oak to coast hardwood, redwood, serpentine, chamise, and mixed chaparral. The Tie Camp Trail destination features spectacular views. Be careful as there are some short steep ups and downs on loose soil.
