This year, Schnee Days will be hosted by the Elkhart Lake Chamber of Commerce January 29-31.

Festivities kick off officially on Friday with the annual Elkhart Lake's Got Talent show at Three Guys and a Pizza Pie, N8350 County J. The show begins at 6:30 p.m. Contestants vie for the top talent mantra for Elkhart Lake.

Saturday's busy schedule beckons participants to take part in activities from sunrise into the evening. All times listed for Saturday and Sunday events below are tentative and subject to change. Please visit our website www.schneedays.com for any changes in the time frame.

An unexpected treat at last year's Schnee Days was the appearance of the Wisconsin Kite Club on the frozen surface of Elkhart Lake. Kite enthusiasts from across the state came are planning to come back to take part in the Schnee Days festivities filling the skies with their colorful and unique kites. Kites will fly from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

# Sharing our Journeys

# Anticipation

One of the most common and pervasive emotions that we all share (next to love, hate, sexual attraction, hunger and pain) is anticipation. And it is an emotion felt by both men and women and children of all ages. We have all heard the plaintive cry of "Are we there yet?" often enough to require little elaboration as an expression of the anxious or expectation of what is next on an automobile trip, a long hike in the countryside, or a visit to grandma. In general, people (including children) like to know what is coming up on any journey they might be planning or participating in. Anticipation or "to anticipate" is defined in The Random House Dictionary of the English Language in some dozen ways, including: realization beforehand, to foretaste or foresee, to expect or look foreword to, expectation or hope, and intuition or foreknowledge.

There is seldom a day goes by, for example, that we, as human beings, don't act on the basis of our anticipations of what that day might bring. We "anticipate" what our spouses or children might want for breakfast, what the weather might be and therefore what we should wear, what our work is likely to include, and what our evening hours provide which choices of activities. Much of this is rote, you might submit, and doesn't allow the free will choices implied by the preceding sentence. Breakfast fare is limited by what is available in our cupboards and refrigerators, the weather can change from one hour to the next, and our work is probably at least partly determined by our plans and progress from previous days and weeks. The evening hours may provide the greatest opportunities for anything like true choice to operate, but even that has limits.

Perhaps the most useful way to approach this flexibility/non-flexibility question is to consider what our anticipations are as we approach the days ahead of us and then plan what alternative thoughts and actions might be most appropriate for which anticipations. We anticipated that the weather prediction would be accurate, but in fact the 40 degree temperature and sunny skies

predicted by the TV weatherman turned out to be 28 degrees with rain and sleet. Advance planning could avoid the panic search for boots and jackets and umbrellas that our anticipations had not figured in the equation. Your earlier discussion with your employer about "at home" hours of work perfectly fit the situation at work and you were able to call in your projected absence. And so on. The point is a simple one: informed anticipation may be based on past experience, thoughts, and actions, but it must also take into account the possible changes in the conditions which face you and

which may require an entirely different

response. When discussing this topic with one of my friends a few months ago, he argued that in fact most people do base their actions on "informed anticipation" (see above) and, if they are intelligent and prudent, they will also have done some "advance planning" in the event their anticipations were somehow wrong. Many off-base anticipations are based on dated information (i.e. the weather changed), over-reaction (the weather was so bad, they cancelled classes), your employer's plans included several meetings that didn't allow for "at home" work. And so on. My friend felt that too much worrying about what you anticipate might happen can lead you to a "do nothing" attitude since it would be impossible to anticipate all scenarios, which might emerge. Admitting that predictions are "iffy" at best, my own perspective is that to consider and evaluate all the relevant facts will still provide the best approach to the dilemma of the problems of anticipation. What do you think?

# New owners expand Sun Graphics focus

With a strong history in the print business, Sun Graphics is preparing to venture into additional directions under a new ownership team.

Justin and Kelly Webb of Sheboygan hope to build on the company's solid reputation following their purchase of the business from Terry and Mary Kay Evans this fall.

"We want to build on the strong print side of this company, as well as migrating to the technology world," Justin Webb said.

"We are excited about growing the app development and web side of this business for our customers."

Justin and Kelly both come from extensive business, graphic and technology backgrounds. They met while working together at McKinsey & Company, an international strategy consulting firm, in the Chicago office.

The new owners are residents of Sheboygan, Kelly's home town, having moved back to the area in 2011.

Since that time, Justin has been working as a partner in Landmark Consultants focusing on social media app development.

The Friends organization works hand in hand with the Library to enhance its circulation offerings and support events at the library.

Elkhart Lake Library Director Betty McCartney (no relation to the Beatles member who once recorded the abovementioned song) said the input of the Friends is invaluable.

"Their contributions mean we can have extra things that go above and beyond our normal budgets from the village and the county," she said.

"The Friends have helped us have things that other libraries much bigger can offer. We are fortunate to have a well-funded budget from the village, but the contributions from the Friends add a lot."

# Major events

Elkhart Lake Friends of the Public Library hosts three public and highly visible events each year as the mainstay of its fundraising efforts.

Every July, in conjunction with the Elkhart Lake Parade, the Friends group conducts its annual "Book Drop" cookie sale. Many volunteers from throughout the community bake cookies according to a common recipe. The cookies are packaged and sold by enthusiastic volunteers along the parade route.

At the end of July, the organization's signature project unfolds. The annual Elkhart Lake Friends of the Public Library

book sale takes place in the upper level of the Grashorn Center.

Alice Voruz, president of the Friends, said it's a big task to set up the book sale, which includes used volumes from the library collection and from private collections as well.

"In addition to raising funds for the library, the book sale also gives the library the opportunity to remove some items from circulation, based on their protocol," she said. The Friends also accept books to sell provided they are in good condition, with all profits going back to the library.

While it's officially known as a book sale, Voruz was quick to point out that the sale truly includes a wide variety of items, including DVD's, tapes, puzzles, magazines and more. "The book sale is incredible," Library Director McCartney said. "It's a lot of work and a lot of time, but it also allows us to get some value and payback for materials that we weed from the collection."

The final event of the year is currently

Summer reading programs get an uplifting hand from the support of the Friends. Funds from the Friends group have also been used to purchase a comfortable rug for the children's reading area, computers for the library, and the opportunity for the library to offer the Ancestry.com program to its clients.

This is used to help in genealogy searches by library patrons.

The organization was founded in 1996 with 73 charter memberships. Annual

memberships are \$10, with a lifetime membership available for \$100. Today, the organization remains at roughly the same membership numbers.

In addition to the fundraising support, the Elkhart Lake Friends of the Public Library also assists in hosting a weekly coffee hour each Wednesday morning at the library.

Members are currently offering volunteer time to a data inputting project for the library.

The Friends organization is governed by a board of directors which meets on a regular basis.

The organization also has an annual meeting each September to discuss the activities of the past year and review the proposed plans for the year ahead.

President Voruz noted that a strong contingent of the Elkhart Lake Friends of the Public Library also has ties with the long-standing Elkhart Lake Study Club.



# Martin named education friend


The Elkhart Lake-Glenbeulah Education Association recently awarded Andy Martin its Friend of Education Award for 2015.

# 2015 showed signs of growth

# Happy New Year!

2015 was a very good year for the Village. We are seeing considerable growth in the Village. For the first time in many years we are seeing new single family and duplex housing being built in Elkhart Lake. In addition, Sargento is moving along on their new addition to the facility in the Village. The project should be done mid-year 2016.

Our new veterinarian clinic is scheduled to open very shortly. Dr. John Prelwitz will be bringing a new business to the Village. He is located on the new Victory Lane and Cedar Lane.

Wolf Motor Sports, located on Highway 67 and Badger Road is also progressing nicely. Bart Wolf will be relocating his motor sports business to the Village. In addition, Bart is selling car condos. This is relatively new to Wisconsin and is proving to be an early success.

Victory Elkhart Lake continues to work on the apartment complex and single and duplex housing on the north end of the property. The Planning Commission will be meeting in January and February to move this project along. The hope is to break ground in spring.

# Spring Election & Photo ID Required

The first election of the year will be held on Feb. 16, 2015. Photo ID will be required at this election and all other elections. The following are some frequently asked questions about the photo ID law:

Do I have the right photo ID?

Below are the acceptable IDs for voting purposes and can be unexpired or expired after the date of the most recent general election (currently, Nov. 4, 2014):

Wisconsin DOT-issued driver license
Wisconsin DOT-issued identification card

• Military ID card

• U.S. passport

There may be other acceptable forms of photo ID, but please contact the Clerk's office at 920-876-2122 for more information. The address on your ID does not have to be current. Election officials will only look at your ID type, name, picture, and expiration date.

What if I don't have a photo ID?

If you are eligible to vote but do not have a photo ID, you may obtain a free ID from the Department of Motor Vehicles. Apply for the ID as soon as possible. You'll need some documents to get the ID. Some records satisfy more than one requirement. For a complete list visit wisconsindot.gov or call (608) 264-7447.

# **Do I need a photo ID to absentee vote?** Absentee Ballot Requests

Requests for ballots sent by mail or email must be accompanied by a photocopy of an acceptable form of voter ID. You will not need to do this with future requests, as long as you have not changed your name or address.

In-person Absentee Voting

If you are casting an absentee ballot in the municipal clerk's office, you must present a photo ID, just as you would at the polls.

# Are there exemptions for absentee voting?

Photo ID is not required for the following absentee voters:

- Military voters
- Voters who are permanently overseas
- Confidential voters
- Indefinitely confined voters
- Nursing home residents whose ballots are delivered by special voting deputies

• Residents of care facilities who are not

visited by special voting deputies **What can I expect at the polling place?** Now that voters are bringing their IDs, voting at your polling place will be a little different. \*\*Please be prepared & patient. State It

As always, you'll need to state your full name and address for the election official who checks you in. They'll check your information in the poll book. Understandably, some people are uneasy about announcing their name in public, but it is the law, and it helps ensure openness in elections. Show It

Next, it's time to show your photo ID. That way, poll workers can compare your face to your photo and confirm that you really are you.

Sign It

Finally, you'll sign the poll book (unless a physical disability prevents it). Your signature or mark should go right next to your name and address.

# Winter Parking Rules

6.04(2) (a) No parking of any motor vehicle shall be permitted on either side of any Village street or in the parking lot north of Square Street or the parking lot on North East Street between the hours of 2 o'clock A.M. and 6 o'clock A.M. commencing the fifteenth (15th) day of November and ending on the first (1st) day of April of every year.

(b) Any vehicle parked in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be removed from the streets and stored, and such removal and storage shall be at the expense of the owner of said vehicle.

Vehicles violating this ordinance will be ticketed.

# **Snow Removal**

Chapter 10.03 - Residents have 14 hours after a winter storm to remove ice and snow from their sidewalks. Snow cannot be blown or plowed onto Village Streets. Residents must also shovel out any hydrants near their home. You will not receive prior notification, if sidewalks are not cleared on a timely basis; the village will shovel your walk and bill you.

# **Tax Collection**

Tax Collection is underway. The 2015 taxes are due by Jan. 31, 2016. The Village Offices are open from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday to collect taxes. The Village offices will be closed on Thursday, Dec. 31 and Friday, Jan. 1, 2016. Payments can also be dropped off at Community Bank & Trust and National Exchange Bank & Trust. You can also drop payments in the Police Depository box located on 40 Pine Street next to the library drop boxes. If you cannot make it to any of these locations, payments can be mailed to the Village of Elkhart Lake, P.O. Box 143, Elkhart Lake, WI 53020. In order to receive a tax receipt by mail, a self-addressed stamped envelope needs to be included with your payment.






