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### **Tap into Maple Sugaring Weekends**

March 4 & 5 and 11 & 12 • 9 am to 5 pm Lake Metroparks Farmpark

Ever wonder how pure maple syrup is produced? Discover how through hands-on demonstrations and crafts as you tap into the fun of Maple Sugaring Weekends at Lake Metroparks Farmpark. Maple sugaring activities are featured 9 am to 5 pm every weekend through March 20.

The journey begins with a wagon ride into the maple woods and arrive at the Woodland Center. There, you can see and take part in the maple sugaring process. Kids learn how to tap a tree with hands-on guidance from Farmpark staff. The whole family gets involved collecting sap contained in collection buckets hung on the maple trees. Move indoors to watch the water-like substance you helped collect boiled and ultimately processed into pure maple syrup and other naturally sweet products.



Farmpark's very own pure maple syrup and other maple items are available for sale in both the Woodland Center and Gift Shop.

Maple sugaring-themed activities during Maple Sugaring Weekend include:

Children can tap a maple tree by hand

Gather buckets with fresh sap and pour it into horse-drawn sap collector

See how maple candy is made

Sample pure maple syrup and maple candy

Whip up your own tasty treat with maple stirs (additional fee applies)

Learn how to make maple syrup in your own backyard Tour the sugar bush operation

Sample maple syrup on silver dollar pancakes

Create a maple craft

Make ice cream and taste the results

Pony rides (additional fee)

It takes 40 gallons of sap boiled down to produce just one gallon of pure maple syrup. During the course of the event, you can learn how trees are tapped and see the network of tubing that connects the 1,000 taps that provide sap for the Farmpark's maple syrup production. Once collected, reverse-osmosis is used to remove a portion of the water from the sap prior to boiling, saving both time and resources. Maple syrup production has evolved over the years from the use of hand-made wooden taps to the intricate tubing system used today. Maple sugaring history comes to life



### How Telling Your Child's Teacher the Truth Can Help Them

I once heard a story of a dog (now remember, to some people dogs are their children)...anyhow, this dog had been a good pup all its life. A perfect pooch per Mom and Dad's standards. But, one day, the pup just began to poop on the floor. Out of the clear blue, it seemed, their four legged angel had become defiant. Never having behavioral problems in the past, they brought their baby to the vet. After getting a clean bill of health there, the family wondered what was making their doggy misbehave.

It was just enough. Because that pooch didn't like that and couldn't voice it, he acted out. Because no one could fix his problem or even understand him, he couldn't and wouldn't adjust. So... they had extra poop in places where it was unwelcome. "Just a dumb dog" a nondog person might be thinking. Nope. Not at all. Smart dog, with feelings or emotions. It was change. Change is big. In pets and in kids. A pet trainer once

told me my rescue shepherd mix was a furry two year old toddler. Sadly, she was right. So, here's something to learn from this story and something which can be applied to parenthood.

Your trainer, dog sitter, or even you, might not have any idea why your pet (think child) changes their behavior, but there is always a reason. Most likely it's change. Pets, people and especially kids who experience change will go through their own adjustments. They have to feel, cope and try to transition. They need a chance to work through it, with support. As in this poor puppy, family and caregivers, if someone doesn't communicate the changes in life to those who spend time with them, it will be a complete and utter struggle...possibly impossible for them to heal, cope and move on.

My kids have had lots of transitions. Major moving, divorce, struggles with new classes and new schools, but all through it, I've always made it a point to be proactive in their coping, healing and transitions at home and outside. I not only work with them myself, but I've opened our life and changes up to their teachers.

You might say, "No way, that's my business and no one elses". Yes, I understand, because that's how my dad was. Keep it all here, at home. Well, that, I'm afraid, doesn't do much to help your child. It actually hinders the ability for others to help your child and makes it harder for your child to breathe. Imagine if you couldn't tell anyone anything about your life ever. How would you find support, friends or others who are understanding and empathetic? If we keep our private lives too private, others cannot help us. For kids, communicating life changes to teachers and caregivers is crucial.

There's a way to go about it that can help your child and your teachers, and it's what I've done for ten years; just start

the dialogue, be honest and don't wait. Just pick up your phone, tablet or computer and search for your child's teacher and just start typing.

At the start of every year, I took the time to thoroughly fill out those 'About Me' pages. I spent hours on all three of my children's teacher emails, sometimes to multiple teachers, explaining the issues we experience seasonally, behavior changes, times to watch for and to be understanding about. Every one of their teacher was amazing. They were empathetic, they were concerned and understanding. It was work, yes, and it was revealing, yes. But, it was all for the good (and the help) of my child. I don't regret it at all.

I suggest, if you haven't yet, please reach out to your child's counselor, teacher, daycare provider, etc., and open up about things at home. There's no shame in being honest to these people in the effort to help your child. Any small insight you can offer your child's teacher about a move, divorce, financial strain or new birth, can help your child find comfort and empathy at school, and get back on track to being themselves.



Just like the puppy who suddenly wasn't the puppy he used to be; the who knew where to potty. He was reacting to change. Everything that is not routine, is new, and can (or will) cause a change in a pup, in a child, or in you. Communicate today. You won't regret it, and your child (and their teachers will thank you).



### Want to Become a Teacher? Do your Homework First ... Here's Why

I began teaching in December 1970 before I received my degree. There was a real teacher shortage and the State of Ohio allowed me to teach without a degree or certification. I

completed both by June. By June 1971, the teacher shortage began to dwindle. Some of my classmates and friends couldn't find teaching jobs. While I didn't research why, I suggest that men trying to stay away from Viet Nam with a teacher's deferment.

In 1985, I opened North Coast Education Services and began hiring teachers. I quickly learned that many prospects could not find teaching jobs. Yet, our teacher colleges continued to crank out new teachers.

Fast forward to 2017 and we continue to interview 150 to 175 prospective tutors each fall. I bring up the topic of a "faux teacher shortage". Since we conduct initial interviews in groups, this leads to a discussion. Some individuals have multiple degrees and teacher licenses yet they have not found a teaching job in a school.

Some potential tutors consider returning to college for a master's degree hoping this will lead to a teaching job. I suggest they investigate this idea further because most school districts do not elect to hire master's level teachers because they must pay a higher salary. I often see several heads shaking and agreeing the financial investment of another degree may not be a good idea. All of my research over 32 years in business is informal and by research standards is anecdotal.

Kate Walsh, President of the National Council on Teacher Quality wrote an opinion piece in the Washington

Post on December 2, 2016. She states, "neither states nor the federal government collects the information that would be needed to pronounce the onset of a true teacher shortage. ... over the past 30 years, programs graduated 175,000 to 300,000 teachers each year. Yet school districts consistently only hire between 60,000 to 140,000 newly minted teachers."


In Ohio, teachers must pass a series of exams called Praxis or the Ohio Assessments for Educators. I often find many graduates have not completed exams in time to apply for teaching jobs upon graduation. Therefore they may wait a full year before applying. And their licensure expires in four years or less and they must take additional courses and pay additional licensure fees to continue being licensed. Many new teacher graduates give up and move onto different careers.

So who benefits from continuing to

prepare teachers? Our colleges benefit, of course. And, they benefit again when licensed graduates must renew their licenses taking six additional credit hours at \$300 per credit hour or more. This is in addition to \$200 per license from the Ohio Department of Education. This is just in order to pursue a teaching job further.

So if you are considering a teaching degree, please think about what lies ahead. In teaching, select a field such as such as math, science or special education. Don't go blindly into the teaching field without an end game plan to get a job.



### Wildlife Dos & Don'ts

As the weather warms up and new leaves start to grow on the trees, wild animals become very active. Springtime is a great time to see birds returning from migration, animals searching for mates and nesting sites and the arrival of young.

A wild animal's chief concern is survival. They need food, water, space and shelter. Any available area that provides these things is an opportunity for them to create a home. In order to happily co-exist with native wildlife so that we can enjoy watching them without creating problems for them or ourselves, there are a few simple things to keep in mind.

The most important thing to remember is that wildlife need very little from us—we must respect their space and do no harm.

Watching native wildlife can be a treat—even in our own backyards! Here are some suggestions for a wildlife-friendly

Check for nests before cutting down a tree or clearing brush.

Place caps on chimneys, vents and window wells to prevent wildlife from falling in or nesting in your home.

Keep pets under control so that they don't injure or eat backyard wildlife.

Keep your pet's food inside, not outside on porches or decks.

Keep trash cans locked or inside the garage. Demonstrate respect for wildlife and their homes; teach children not to catch or harass them.

Exercise caution when driving and watch the roadside for wild animals, especially at dawn and dusk.

When at home or visiting the parks, remember to keep animals wild and healthy by not feeding them.

Feeding wildlife creates unhealthy conditions. Animals congregate in areas where they are fed, causing several problems. They exceed the carrying capacity of their habitats and become overcrowded. High levels of fecal matter are concentrated in one area, which causes unsanitary conditions for animals and people. Diseases

can be passed from one animal to another when areas are overcrowded.

Foods that are not part of their natural diet (bread, popcorn, shelled corn and cereal) are "junk food" to wild animals. They lack many of the nutrients the animals need in order to stay healthy.

Feeding wildlife causes loss of wild instincts. Wild animals that are routinely fed by humans become habituated to humans for food and lose their healthy fear of them. If you want to help out wildlife, plant native plants and wildflowers that provide nutritious berries and seeds.

Call us on the Wildlife Hotline: 440-256-1404 x2131 If you find an injured and/or orphaned animal, the best thing to do is call our Wildlife Hotline immediately. Injured animals can be very defensive even when they are hurt and weak. When you call the Kevin P. Clinton Wildlife Center, you will be given the best and safest information on what to do next.

If you find a young animal by itself that is not injured, please remember that wild parents know what's best for their young. Animals are often left alone, which is part of their development and how they learn survival skills. We don't need to get involved! Most young animals don't have a scent. If the parents have hidden them in the grass or elsewhere, predators will not be attracted to them. The parents will come back for them when it is safe. If you have concerns, please call the Wildlife Hotline before intervening.

Each year, the Kevin P. Clinton Wildlife Center treats more than 2,000 injured and orphaned wildlife. Many eventually recover from their injuries and resume their lives in the wild. The center is home to permanently injured Animal Ambassadors including reptiles, mammals and birds of prey. These animals assist staff in teaching about wildlife issues and conservation. Visit the Wildlife Yard to get an up-close look at all of the amazing animals! The yard is open daily 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.


Entertainment and education will be a big part of the weekend. The entertainment stage is located in front
