Man who lives on Coyote Creek goes missing

By Sean Eastwood *Times staff writer* ichael Amaya Perez (right), who lived along Coyote Creek for two years, is missing.



The 56-year-old spent his nights in a tent, but sometime after the recent

storms came Michael went missing. "I've looked everywhere," said his daughter Irene

Perez. "When I saw the news about the flood I freaked out. I had the very first panic attack in my life."

Irene, who makes her home in Hayward, began to search as flood waters receded.

She checked the parks around Los Lagos, the Burger King and the pop-up shelters and evacuation centers for flushed from their homes by the flood. Her father, she said, had no cellphone and may have had no identification.

Although the Santa Clara County's Medical Examiner-Coroner's Office said no fatalities from the flood have been reported, family and friends of the homeless say some of their loved ones are missing. evel. Firefighters rescued five of them from the trees and dozens more who were left stranded by the rushing water.

In San Jose an estimated 1,500 people live along the local waterways including Thomson Creek in Evergreen Valley.

Evergreen Valley High School set up as Red Cross disaster relief center for residents displaced by flood

Times staff writer nderson Dam releases caused a chain reaction that pushed an overflow condition of Coyote Creek resulting in evacuations of flood victims on Monday, Feb. 20.

Although Evergreen Valley was not severely impacted except for minor street flooding, power outages and downed trees, the Red Cross opened up a disaster relief center at Evergreen High School gymnasium for flood displaced residents.

The Evergreen Valley High School gym, easily accessible from Quimby road, provided ample parking. Upon walking up to the gym entrance one could see the Red Cross logo and various trucks used to transport items. Specific needs for any supplies, food, cultural and or religious requirements could be requested from shelter workers and every effort would be made to accommodate the needs of the evacuees.

A disaster relief center was also set up at James Lick High school where 150 people slept overnight and with strong organizational oversight, the Evergreen High School gym was used Tuesday night Feb. 21 as an overflow for people asked to leave their homes. Smart planning by the Red Cross allowed the gym to increase capacity from a few on Tuesday evening to more than a hundred people by Wednesday morning.

Upon entering the Evergreen Valley High School gym one could see tables of food comprised of bread, muffins, health bars, cookies, bananas, Cup Noodles, *See RED CROSS, page 17*

Evergreen Valley plagued with potholes

Times staff writer s winter approached, one would think that city streets would be cleared of garbage and drains that normally divert water would be cleared to avoid more potholes in city streets in Evergreen Valley.

While driving along Ruby Avenue to the north, the same ruts that were present last summer are now larger, washed out by the worst rain storms we

have had in San Jose for more than ten years.

When blacktop is properly patched and sealed, water cannot usually seep underneath and cause the paving to buckle. These should have been properly patched and sealed before the storms arrived.



Liccardo picks up illegal trash to kick off San Jose's #BeautifySJ campaign

S an Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo kicked off the #BeautifySJ campaign highlighted in his recent State of the City speech by personally picking up illegally dumped trash on an early cool morning, Feb. 13.

Liccardo said that illegal dumping has been on the rise due the housing crises causing displaced families forced to sleep on streets and riverbanks.

The city recently reported that nearly 320 tons of debris has been recovered including 1,200 mattresses, 620 shopping carts, 148 gallons of paint and 151 gallons of human waste, and more than 400 gallons of motor oil since mid-2016.

The mayor asked the council this week to consider expanding the free junk hauling for single-family homeowners last week. San Jose began offering the free hauling for more than two years. Free hauling pickups have more than doubled to more than 15,000.

Liccardo said during the city's mid-year budget review, that the city council will consider spending more than \$130,000 to install cameras, lighting, gates, and signs in a half dozen hotspots that account for more than half of illegal dumping reports.

The city's illegal dumping response team reports that nearly 70 percent of the calls it receives are from junk left on public roadways. Last year, the county entered into a nearly \$800,000 agreement with the California Department of Transportation to help with trash pickup.

Large item pick scheduled for March 25 For Almaden residents living in Pierce

Ranch, Almaden Valley Country Club or Glenview Serenity neighborhoods may place large items for pickup on March 25, 2017.

City offices explained that an incorrect notice was mailed announcing a free Neighborhood Cleanup on Feb. 25, which is incorrect. A new notice will be mailed out three weeks before the cleanup event on March 25. The large item collection program offers two free collection appointments per household per fiscal year. Each collection includes up to three large items.

OpEd: Notification during a flood maybe tough to accomplish

T is refreshing to hear people get out in-front of situations by quickly sizing up situations of disaster but blame is a tough thing to place at times due to the mysterious and often unforeseen punches of nature.

We live in an age where all things are electronic. Some people even take their cell phone (with excuse that they use it to record photos) while hiking through the outback trails of Yosemite. We are so technologically driven that some want to run bullet trains from one place to another but want no accidents to ever occur. Well, maybe things just happen and the flooding was no one's fault. Also, history shows us it happens over and over.

Truth is, we must learn from difficult situations for maybe if it is proven out that this kind of flooding happens about every fifteen years, we should just know and be more aware that there are certain "lowlying" areas in San Jose can and will be subject to flooding.

Perhaps it would have been good to have a plan in place to warn residents in low- lying areas. However, the warning may have resulted in

cars stuck on roadways trying to get out and the water may rise so fast that it might be better for all to stay inside. Maybe technology does not always gain an upper hand when it faces up against Mother Nature.

In California we have a no-fault auto accident insurance policy and often if two cars hit each other the no-fault insurance takes effect. So, if there is a flood from a creek due to heavy rains, maybe that too is a nofault situation.

After many years of drought, and water conservation, the Anderson dam in Morgan Hill filled up to

capacity and water had to be let out into the Coyote Creek. This is done to keep the level of water at a certain capacity in the man-made dam. As water rushed down the creek it may have collided into all kinds of trees debris and growth lodged in the waterway for over a decade perhaps causing the overflow and flooding. Investigations will help figure it all out. It could be that the flooding could only have been prevented by ensuring the Coyote Creek was deep and free flowing and maybe that is hard to do with certain amounts of See NOTIFICATION, page 8

OpEd Is Common Core math being taught incorrectly?

s the way math is being taught today better than in the past decade or are vast numbers of children regressing in their math abilities?

It's called "Common Core." Others call it "Constructionism Teaching." One thing for sure, the children in California schools and in other states are being taught very differently than in years past.

Top level educators in California have embraced the "Common Core" methods of teaching; however it's about new teaching standards that are to be covered each school year and not necessarily about how new common core standards are to be taught.

I believe the school district leaders and highly paid training organizations may have pushed the teachers too far in new radical leaning philosophies of how to implement the new standards, including core textbooks and workbooks instead of selecting a middle ground of teaching materials. In some cases the new textbooks with constructionist concepts may have been entrenched into place without the necessary teacher and parent input (see education code 60002). Other textbook choices cover the same common core standards but in more traditional ways. We must not throw a blanket over a bad math program and call it common core as if to say it is the only choice in facilitating the understanding of the new state math standards. So, common core math can be taught in non-constructionist ways. This may have not been properly offered to the teachers by leaders of school districts and highly paid con-

sulting training companies. Let's focus on math: don't mix other sub-

jects when discussing common core teaching

Math is the subject getting the most attention because math is being taught in new and different ways that tend to let some teachers take a back seat to teaching. Children's inquiring minds are discovering new concepts, so called magical moments of discovery, but is this new way of teaching working? Do the individual test scores for children prove out if this new pedagogy of teaching is successful? Is it all an experiment? Has this gone too far?

Some schools may not be teaching math in ways that succeed in getting students to properly grasp or cover the state standards for a particular segment of learners called the remedial math learning children. In some schools, students may not be getting much homework in math. Additionally, parents are learning that students are being put in groups to learn math.

Perhaps the remedial learning children on some teams need to be segregated to a more understandable differentiated learning math teaching classroom when they enter middle school. Sixth grade teachers can also differentiate in cost-free and exciting team ways. Is it proper to put children who are way behind in math skills in a one size fits all classroom using radical constructionist textbook/workbooks in middle school and offering them extra credit work on the side to improve their grades? Should elementary schools also differentiate learning more as students move up the grade levels?

To know we must look carefully at the

data.

Teachers are not always to blame, as they are only taking the marching orders of the top brass of administration. However, if the teachers believe there is indeed something going on that is wrong, it is hoped they will speak out more.

To get true understanding of the plight of teachers using math programs, private survevs need to be done by the teachers and parents so that if a math product or program is not measuring up it should be improved or replaced. Some math programs that are radical in nature may need to be banished to be used only for high level preforming math students because those students that are at remedial levels may not get much out of such programs and be regressing in math.

Often by the time the school board figures out the situation to act on it, the children directly affected in elementary school have graduated from high school. Thus deep private surveys by teachers are needed in a timely manner and the school boards need to lead at a faster pace. Although the textbook adoption processes allows teachers to decide what products to use in the classroom, often there seems to be a push of one product or another by school district office leaders and some school districts perhaps put too much pressure on how to teach with a particular textbook

Often parents' input is not used in the selection of textbooks. Often no written record or minutes are kept for math school textbook adoptions and parents are not invited into the room who do not work for the school district. Instead parent voice is more of a required protocol than used in a valuable meaningful way. Also, when a parent voices a concern often it takes many attempts for a school district to act and the ratcheted up power of a group of parents to begin to make pressure for change. Perhaps students too need to review the possible math textbook adoptions for their voice is just as important as their parents.

Administrators should perform a simple survey for students on their math textbook/workbook at the end of each year to inquire on a scale of 1-10 how they liked using the textbook and workbook. School board members (who have power to select and adopt the text books and math books) should read the written opinions of deep, truthful, honest children and let the truth be told. It could be that some new Common Core math workbooks or adopted materials might be lacking and teachers decide to skip portions.

Where did the math textbooks go?

In some instances, math textbooks are being substituted with paper workbooks and or massive amounts of math skills run off on copy machines, resulting in schools and classrooms running in different ways. The workbook approach is different and often it does not walk the parent through the process of solving the math (self-learning tutorials) as presented in textbooks, so it's a more difficult solving math problems at home.

Dr. Comers wonderful "No Fault Complaint, No Retaliation," piece

Dr. James P. Comer is best known for the founding of the Comer School Development

Program in 1968. He is very much involved in education today and has received numerous awards. One of his big focuses in improving schools and teaching is to ensure that collaboration of parents, educators and community is in place. He speaks of having a 'No Fault...No Retaliation," complaint process where all stakeholders are free to voice concerns and all listen. If something is wrong then let's all work solve the problem, and not at a snail's pace. Steve Jobs has shown us in how he set up a culture and climate in running his business. We need to change the mindset of how school boards, district offices, county offices of education and the California Department of Education function. New educational codes will need to be developed and implemented that will provide the quick turnaround of ensuring children are being taught well.

Are some schools not covering 49 percent of the math textbooks?

It needs to be mandatory that all schools cover 51 percent of all textbook/workbooks. This should be mandated by written school district policy and new education code. This applies to federal law with regard to teaching English as a second language.

Dual math programs needed

If the teachers agree and the parents agree, the school districts will need to get the school boards to adopt two dual math programs (especially for middle schools). Again, teachers and parents need to express if this should be mandatory and the California Department of Education needs to help out more too rather than take a hands off approach in all things of curriculum selection. The C.D.E.

can with research promote and highlight dual remedial math programs for middle schools that are in place and work to educate all the school districts. The C.D.E. can also promote with communication new ways some schools teach math. In other words the C.D.E. can get the word out and promote wonderful methods of teaching for other schools and districts to learn from. For the year 2017 the C.D.E. really has a hands off policy of helping anyone in the opinion of this parent. The C.D.E. seems to be a giant bureaucracy that needs better leadership to become more effective to help children, teachers, parents and all other stakeholders.

A more efficient way to teach students

Few school districts have sixth, seventh and eighth grade middle schools. I believe schools and teachers would benefit by having one teacher teach math and another sixth grade teacher teach science, and another to teach language arts. So, if a school has 100 sixth grade students, teachers can teach three classes of math for one day; another teacher to teach three classes of science; and another three classes of science.

This could eliminate the vast lesson planning for a sixth grade teacher to plan out Math, Science, Social Studies, Language Arts, Physical Education, Art, etc.

By having the sixth grade teachers transform the elementary classrooms into a middle-school-switch-multiple-teacher experience, there is less lesson planning. Maybe this concept can be explored in a no fault no retaliation environment and the California Department of Education can find ways to inform and collaborate with all school districts better through use of the funding for the County Offices of Education that are placed in each region in California. Maybe such highly paid school district oversight entities need to do much more with their time. Maybe this kind of exploration is a good use of monies spent.

Testing will show us all the way

There is a new push and a new California embraced policy not to "teach to the test." However, the federal government seems to keep battling back California top policy makers in pushing for more testing. We need general testing on basics implemented three times a year and math benchmarks placed included on report cards.

Yeah, but we don't want to teach to the test One must look and compare the mastery of math according to barometers of measuring understanding of concepts. One tool that is now used for all children state wide is called the CAASPP test (California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress).

Each year the results are mailed to parents. To quickly view how a school is doing in each grade level for the subject of math one can use website choices. An easier way to quickly discover how a school is successfully teaching children at all grade levels one can do an internet search with School Digger." Parents now can just type in the name School Digger and the name of the school. Then click on "test scores." You can click on math and navigate it to easily pop up comparative bar graphs that show the percentage of math proficiency, and also other subjects.

For a real eye opener type in this school and view the math scores...(School Digger Katherine R. Smith Elementary School) located in Evergreen School District. Then compare it to another school in the same school district by typing in (School Digger Silver Oak Elementary School). It is seen that some schools have very low scores in math and others have somewhat higher mastery in math. Look at the variance of math proficiency between the two schools.

It seems that math is lagging in student mastery on a statewide level at many schools and without parent input the status quo may keep going down the road. What if one school has a math proficiency of say 20% but another school has a math proficiency of say 80%... and what if both schools set the same exact goal of raising math understanding of 5 percent for a year. School boards need to step in and roll up their sleeves to make changes faster. **Teacher parent and student voices needed**

If a teacher likes the math product then it will be more of a joy for the teacher to use it each day. School board members should develop and build trust with teachers and parents and encourage private input.

Is collaboration cheating or is cheating collaboration

As stated earlier, some math textbooks in sixth, seventh and eighth grade are thought by be constructionism textbooks. Some of the other textbooks in other grade levels also have this constructionism component in the opinion of this parent but the % of it is different for each product. The word constructionism according to Wikipedia is a learning theory when learners construct mental models to understand the world around them.

The solution is for the teachers and parents to have more VOICE in what is going on and for those who oversee the role of the teachers (principals and others) to inquire more with private surveys if math is going well or can be improved. The constant honest and earnest *See COMMON CORE, page 8*

ear to what is going on and if help can be offered needs to be nurtured by each school principal and on up the administration ranks by not only voice but by example.

It's time to end all combination classrooms

Computers should be used to stimulate remedial growth if a child is behind in learning. Computers and apps like Google classroom open up this gift but to have it functioning the school districts need more funding. Perhaps children need to bring their own computers to school.

Local control of schools proposed by De Vos

Betsy De Vos who is Donald Trump's choice for Secretary of Education is calling for "local

control" of schools and wishes to end what is referred to as "the federalized Common Core." Also President Elect Trump has called the Common Core standards "a complete disaster." However, Muhammed Chaudhry, president and CEO of the Silicon Valley Education Foundation, said he believes schools across the country need to "stay the course" in implementing Common Core standards in Math and English Language Arts for U.S. students to compete globally. He said the results do not accurately reflect the impact of the new, more rigorous standards since they are still not fully implemented.

If parents place too much trust in a new experimental method of teaching math then shouldn't testing play a role in transparency of student understanding?

The math teaching pendulum needs to move more towards the middle.

I believe many teachers that are now retiring should express their views on common core math at all grade levels. The dialogue should be open. Let us honor Comers views of a "no fault, no retaliation" voice of concerns for common core math and if it is determined to not be working out properly for some schools in California, let's reinvent

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
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Let's not settle for the same old statement by school district leaders and others that the Common Core is new and we are still learning how to teach it so let's stay the



course...after all haven't we already hit an iceberg in our quest for learning?

To view the current scores for math in California schools do a web search of (CAASPP Statewide Results) and scroll down to math. The results are very troubling for the students in California and their future for in every grade measured it shows that over half of the students are not proficient in math.

With this kind of situation it is believed that tutoring companies are having gangbuster record profits.

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CDC: Current flu vaccine is only 48 percent effective

those who or received a recent flu vaccine, only 48 percent is effective, compared to 60 percent in typical years, according to the Disease Centers of Control.

The difference this year is the recurrence of the H3 flu strain. The strain mutates a lot, and we don't have as good immunity, according to Dr. Richard Zimmerman,

Director of the University of Pittsburgh flu and vaccine research. "The last time we saw the H3 strain was 2014-2015,

the year of the vaccine mismatch." Zimmerman said there was a spike of

flu cases in early January and we are starting to see another increase approaching now. "We don't fully understand it...but the transmission can be different and obviously people crowd in when the weather is bad outside and so there can be



both the crowding issues as well as humidity changes," said Dr. Zimmerman.

Flu attacks the pulmonary system, so people with underlying lung disease or people with underlying heart disease, are especially at risk. If you feel the flu coming on, Dr. Zimmerman said Tamiflu can shorten the duration of symptoms, but only when taken within 72 hours.

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

Recent floods affect community

County Assessor Larry Stone offers advice to flood victims

County Assessor Larry Stone advises property owners whose property was damaged during the recent flooding that property tax relief is available. Stone said, "I strongly encourage all property owners who suffered flood damage to their property to visit the Assessor's website at www.sccassessor.org to read about the calamity property tax relief program and download the claim form.

The calamity property tax relief program requires the property owner to file a calamity claim with the Assessor's Office within 12 months from the date the property was damaged or destroyed.

The loss must exceed \$10,000 of current market value. Upon receiving the application, the Assessor's office may issue a temporary reassessment that reflects the property's damaged condition. The reduced value will remain in effect until the property is repaired or rebuilt. More importantly, after the property is rebuilt or repaired, the property can retain the previous Proposition 13 factored base year value if the property is rebuilt in a like or similar manner. That means that the property tax assessment will not increase beyond what it was before the flooding.

"This tax relief is available for all properties including homes, commercial and industrial buildings, and mobile homes. However, damage to vehicles and the contents of a home such as personal effects and furniture are not eligible for this tax relief because they are not assessable property." said Stone.

Capri sun drinks, orange juice, water bottles, hot coffee or tea and toys for the children. Boxes on the floor contained more than one hundred pairs of shoes of all sizes.

Behind the tables were clothing racks full of clothing including warm jackets for all to access if needed. There were blankets and bedding in plastic bags and pet food. All items were labeled for easy to find access.

The Red Cross people, mostly volunteers, were kind and helpful to all and came on different shifts to work. It was announced in the media that suitcases (rolling type were needed and in a matter of hours many new suitcases on rollers were provided at the center. **Red Cross handout ensured things ran**

smoothly

Here is the intro to the Red Cross Handout: "We hope your stay here will be as pleasant as possible, considering the circumstances. American Red Cross disaster assistance is provided at no cost. Please take a few minutes to read the important information below. As additional information becomes available, we will inform you as soon as possible. Please reach out to a shelter worker if you have any questions or concerns."

Many other key well thought out organizational policies were stated on the handout such as, supervision of children, check ins and check outs, dormitory registration, no photos of shelter client policy, housekeeping policy, quiet hours policy, personal belongings policy, respectful policy, smoking policy, alcohol-illegal drugs- and weapons policy, and more. Everyone was welcome including service animals, but pets are not allowed. However, shelter workers were available for those needing assistance in finding a shelter for their pet.

The meals and supplies were there for the giving in a self-serve process. There were clipboards and information sheets, if anyone chose to fill out needed in formation to gain more assistance etc.

If a person wanted to let their family know they are well, they could register on the Red Cross website redcross.org/safeandwell. Also if a person left a shelter they could also register to let family know that they moved on.

Medical problems were addressed with regard to any family member needing medications or having medical conditions. Workers from Disaster Health Services were available.

If a person needed emotional support, since disasters can be stressful, counselors were available to assist 24 hours a day.

A Red Cross representative said the Red Cross responds on average every other day of the year to various disaster situations. Perhaps 90 percent of the responses are due to fires. "We help people," said the leader. When trouble hits the Red Cross tries to arrive in about an hour. They also offer financial assistance to those in need.

Upon entering the gym it was seen that due to efficient preparation more than 100 cots were neatly set up with blankets on each. The gym was a bit cold but when a hundred people come it gets warmer. Also, if anyone needed extra blankets they would be given them.

Friday afternoon it was stated that both the James Lick High and the Evergreen High gyms would close and the Red Cross would still be up and running but at a different location.

The Boulevard Bombs nonprofit foundation, a local San Jose helping car club organization, visited and stated the observations on their website: "This morning we stopped by Evergreen High School to see how we could help. According to the Red Cross volunteers the community has donated so much they no longer need donations. We left our phone number with the volunteers and asked us to call them should anything change. Our community is amazing!"

All in all, the Red Cross and the city worked well as a team with great planning and care.





11th Annual Boy Scout Pinewood Derby

By Judy Davis Special to the Times ace conditions were perfect for the Cub Scouts racing to the finish line at the Boy Scout's 11th annual Coyote Creek District Pinewood Derby.

This year's event was held on Saturday, February 4, 2017 at Eastridge. Fifty-three racers registered at this year's event and qualified for racing at Eastridge on Feb. 4, 2017.

There are five classes of racers – Tigers (1st Graders), Wolves (2nd Graders), Bears (3rd Graders), Webelos (4th & 5th Graders), and Open Class (racers of any age, Girl Scouts, even adults).

A tradition that started in 1953, entering a Pinewood Derby is one of the major highlights of a Cub Scout's year. The idea behind the Pinewood Derby is for the parent to spend time with their child by helping the child design, carve, paint, and fine tune the car. Each Scout gets a kit that is simply a block of pinewood and a set of plastic wheels, along with nails that serve as the axles.

Each car is carefully inspected before qualifying for racing. The rules state the car must be no longer than seven inches, no wider than two and three-quarter inches, no taller than 3 inches, and no heavier than five ounces. With a little imagination, some sanding, and paint, these impressive racecars compete by zooming down one of the three computer-controlled racetracks.

Giri Venkat (who served as master of ceremonies) and Ron Davis organized the exciting event with the help of many other volunteers, including nearly 30 Scouts and Adult Leaders from Troop 251, Pack 222, and Pack 102. The Cub Scouts and their families cheered as their cars competed and speeded down the tracks. Each car runs in each of the four lanes of one of the tracks, and competes for the fastest cumulated time. Winners of each class received huge, glittering trophies and the congratulations from everyone in the district.

Coyote Creek District, part of the Silicon Valley Monterey Bay Council Boy Scouts of America (svmbc.org), serves the area of Edenvale, Evergreen, Milpitas, Berryessa, Alum Rock, Mt. Pleasant parts of downtown, and East San Jose.


