# Developer contribution bill fails before county Senate delegation

A bill that would limit when developers could make campaign donations to members of the Baltimore County's elected officials was dealt a death blow Monday, March 6, when the county's Senate delegation gave it an unfavorable recommendation.

The bill failed with a 5-2 vote against it. The two "yes" votes cast were from senators Jim Brochin, the bill's sponsor, and Johnny Ray Salling, a co-sponsor. Sen. Ed Kasemeyer was not present.

The bill said that any developer or their "agents" could not have given a campaign donation to County Council

from

members or the county executive within three years of requesting a land use approval such as a zoning or Master Plan change or a planned unit development (PUD) approval from the county. Developers would have had to sign an affadavit stating they had not given any such donations, and if they had, the contributions would have to be returned.

Brochin (D-Towson), who is considering a run for county executive, said the bill would level the playing field when community members oppose development projects in what he has called a "pay-to-play" system.

to approve or deny land use decisions in the county. But opponents have raised questions

about the bill's constitutionality, as well as concerns about fairness and the picture it paints about corruption in politics.

Sen. J.B. Jennings, a Republican who represents Middle River, White Marsh and other parts of Baltimore and Harford counties, said he opposed the bill because it would unfairly silence only those on one side of the issue.

"In order to do it [right], you would have to stop contributions from people on both sides of the issue," he said. - see **DELEGATION** on page 7 -

# **Edgemere community has questions about Shiloh Baptist community center**

- Article & photo by Devin Crum -Nearly two years ago, Shiloh Baptist Church purchased a warehouse at 2518 Sparrows Point Road in Edgemere and partnered with Project Genesis New Beginnings, Inc. to create an ambitious plan for a new community center at the site.

Since then, the church has been raising the funds they need to construct the \$1.3 million project, which would be done through extensive renovations to the building.

They are also working with Del. Ric Metzgar and Sen. Johnny Ray Salling - both Republicans who represent the area - to pass bond legislation and provide the church with \$200,000 in state funds, combining with \$200,000 of their own to finish their first phase.

But some community members have raised concerns about certain aspects of the project and a lack of available parking space at the site, as well as displeasure that they were not informed of the plan before state funds were sought.

The building purchased by Shiloh Baptist, which North Point Peninsula Council (NPC) President Fran Taylor said is one of the larger community churches in the area, is a large, white building close to the road at the intersection of Sparrows Point Road and Ruth Avenue.

"Nobody can argue that we [wouldn't] love to see that place fixed up and looking decent again," Taylor said Thursday, March 2, at the monthly meeting of the NPC. But many area residents had concerns about what the building will be used for and the lack of notification they have received about the project so that they could give input regarding their concerns.

According to the church's website, they plan to use the second floor of the building as six apartments for housing of homeless, jobless or otherwise at-risk persons such as single mothers with children, which Taylor called a "pretty big pill to swallow" for the community.

The church also plans to conduct job training and other social training to help those individuals become more self-sufficient.

The first floor would be broken into separate rooms to be used for a 250-person-capacity banquet and dining hall, a multi-purpose room, after-school services for children such as music lessons or tutoring, an 80-child day care, five classrooms and two outdoor playgrounds.

"The church has brought this, I'm sure, in good faith and in the spirit of their religious obligations," Taylor said. "But it's a little concerning what their future plan is for the project," from a safety point of view.

He added that the biggest thing that jumped out at him in looking over the plan was the parking - or lack thereof. The plan, he said, only shows about 10

parking spaces.

"To me, it's a challenge," Taylor commented regarding the parking.

Doubts remained as well if the zoning and building codes would even allow some of the things proposed for the building because of its limited access. And day care facilities must be approved by the state.

"I think they have a lot of intentions for a small building," said Ed Crizer, NPC's recording secretary.

Shiloh Baptist purchased the building in May 2015, which many residents had no issues with.

## **Dundalk St. Patrick's parade to feature McShane bell**

- Article and photo by Marge Neal -Dundalk will once again pay homage to its Irish roots when its annual St. Patrick's Day parade kicks off at 11 a.m. on Saturday, March 11.

While the procession will once again feature many traditional bagpipers, men in kilts, antique vehicles, community groups and local dignitaries, a new participant is sure to be popular with the crowds.

"I received a call out of the blue," parade Chairman Dennis McCartney told the *East County Times*. "This guy told me he had a bell made in 1918 by the McShane Bell Foundry and asked if he could be in the parade."

Essex resident Chuck Ritz has made the McShane bell the centerpiece of his rolling tribute to those who lost their lives in the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001. The display includes several plaques that honor the memory of Marylanders killed in the attacks on New York's World Trade Center and the Pentagon, as well as those who died in the crash of United Airlines Flight 93 in Shanksville, Pa. It also honors Marylanders who have died in the wars against terrorism in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Those who are up on their Dundalk history will know that the McShane Bell Foundry was founded by Henry McShane, who also is credited with naming Dundalk after his hometown of the same name in Ireland.

His descendants, now led by matri-

arch Patty McShane, serve as the grand marshals of the parade.

Dale Crammond, agriculture and food counselor at the Embassy of Ireland, will serve as the honorary grand marshal.

The parade will also feature students from the O'Connor School of Irish Dance, led by Casey O'Connor, according to Mc-Cartney.

While the parade is not on the scale of its big brother, the annual Independence Day parade, it still needs the financial help of the community to survive, according to McCartney.

When some local business sponsorships dried up, McCartney personally footed the bill to add more bagpipers to the lineup.

"There wasn't enough music and festivities for me," McCartney said. "So I brought in some more pipers and paid for it myself."

Knowing that he was picking up a huge part of the tab, friends recommended that he hold a fundraiser.

McCartney contacted Steve Goff, owner of the Seasoned Mariner restaurant in Dundalk, and he agreed to host a fundraiser. This year's event is set for Thursday, March 9, beginning at about 5 p.m.

The parade chairman described the fundraiser as a "spontaneous, looselyorganized affair" where different folks show up with contributions for the cause.

"I'm going to make proper Irish coffee for \$10 and I know Lil Tirschman will

have some cakes for sale, and Steve donates a portion of sales to us," McCartney said. "Beyond that, I don't know what we're having."

The parade will kick off from the Logan Village Shopping Center on Dundalk Avenue and wind through Old Dundalk, following much of the July Fourth prade route, with the exception that it skips Admiral Boulevard, according to McCartney.

Asked about inclement weather plans and how residents could check to see if the procession is on as scheduled, Mc-Cartney said, "Look outside."

# Chair massage fundraiser to honor memory of CCBC student

Dave Fiore didn't have the opportunity to attend college after completing his final two years of high school in a homeschool program.

He always regretted not having that experience and, after becoming a father, vowed to do everything he could to see that his daughter, Emma, was able to attend a four-year university.

To back up his belief in the importance of education, he also decided to further his own. He enrolled in the two-year massage therapy degree program at the Community College of Baltimore County and cut a deal with his daughter, according to longtime friend Kris Galasso.

"The two of them agreed that she would watch him walk at his graduation and he would watch her walk at hers," Galasso said in a phone interview.

Emma is a freshman at Mount St. Mary's University in Emmittsburg in Frederick County.



Fiore, 39, was on schedule to complete his half of that agreement with his graduation this May, but fate intervened with those plans.

Fiore died suddenly on Jan. 31, just one day after becoming ill with what he thought was the flu, according to Galasso. He went to a doctor on Jan. 30 and

was treated for the flu but collapsed and died the next day after soaking in a hot bath in an effort to ease his discomfort, Galasso said.

"He worked out, he was a personal trainer," Galasso said of her best friend. "He ate well and was in great shape - I still can't believe this happened."

To honor his memory and to help make sure Emma has the financial support to fulfill her and her father's goal of graduating from college, Fiore's massage therapy professors and fellow students will hold a chair massage fundraiser from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, March 11.

"And we will stay later than that if we have people in line," Robin Anderson, director of the CCBC massage therapy program, said.

The fundraiser will offer 10- to 15-minute chair massages for a donation of \$15. It will be held at the CCBC Essex Massage Therapy Clinic area, room 330 in the Administration Building.

The group hopes to raise \$5,000 for Emma's college fund.

Anderson said she was still in shock over the sudden loss of the good student she had known since originally interviewing him as a candidate for the program.

"He was really dynamic, so happy-go-lucky," she said of Fiore. "He just had the greatest personality."


While personality as such is not a criteria that is measured when accepting students into the program, Anderson said it can be a sign of how well a student will succeed in the field of massage therapy.

But Fiore was ultimately selected because of his drive and ambition, and his success in the fitness industry, according to Anderson.

"He was already a physical trainer and he wanted to add this skill to his toolbox, so to speak," she said of Fiore's desire to become a massage therapist. "He hoped to add that ability to what he could offer his clients."

Anderson said she will remember Fiore for the outof-class discussions they had in her office as much as she will remember his success in the classroom.

"He used to come camp out in my office and he would talk about his daughter and his plans for her to succeed," she said. "His daughter is why he was in school; he wanted to do better for her."

Delivering the news of Fiore's death to students in the massage program was one of the hardest things she has had to do during her teaching career, Anderson said.

"It's a small program so everyone knows everyone else," she said. "It was quite a blow."

Galasso is still reeling over the death of her best friend. They had known each other for six years and shared a house within walking distance of the Essex campus.

"Dave was the kindest, gentlest soul you'd ever meet," she said. "He had a smile that would brighten your whole day and light up the whole room, and he gave the best hugs."

Fiore excelled in personal relationships and had a way of making people feel special, she said.

Galasso is the mother of four children and she was raising her children with Fiore and his daughter. She said she and her children would keep Fiore's legacy alive by striving to live each day with kindness and gentleness toward others.

"We're all better people for having known him and loved him," Galasso said.

Other fundraisers are planned, in addition to the chair massage event, according to Galasso, with all proceeds going to Emma's college fund.

"We're raising this money so she can fulfill the dream she and her father had together," Galasso said.

- continued from page 1 -Sen. Kathy Klausmeier (D-Perry Hall) also questioned how far-reaching the bill could become since she sits on the Senate Finance Committee and receives campaign contributions from special interests such as insurance brokers and bankers.

Likewise, she noted that Brochin, who sits on the Judicial Proceedings Committee, receives contributions from lawyers.

"Are we all going to have to start giving our money back because there are certain interests?" she asked.

Brochin countered that the bill only addressed campaign contributions to Baltimore County Council members and the county executive starting in 2019.

"It has nothing to do with state legislators," he said, adding that he believes it is already a "fair fight" with contributions to state legislators because there is money coming in from many different angles and sometimes competing interests.

"But I also believe that, when it comes to the county, it's developers on one side and community associations... and everybody else on the other side that have no resources, and the deck is stacked against the average person," Brochin said.

Sen. Bobby Zirkin (D-Pikesville) said, though, using an example from his and Brochin's districts, that there are instances in which the community has enormous resources to oppose development projects and make campaign donations on the other side of the issue. He said simply picking a side of a fight and silencing its opponents because you do not like that side would be problematic.

Zirkin continued that the bill also creates a "false, cheap-date narrative" that "disenfranchises one side of a fight" from the political discourse.

"You can't make that determination based on who has more money," he said.

Zirkin and Klausmeier agreed that they thought Brochin's heart was in the right place with the legislation, but they did not believe the bill was the appropriate way to address the issue.

Salling told the *East County Times* that he felt the bill failed because people in his and Brochin's districts are disproportionately affected by the issue.

However, he admitted that he was "split" on the bill and supported it mainly because many of his constituents feel so strongly about it.

And although he was conflicted about the bill, Salling said he has seen certain issues in his district specifically because of developer influence.

"It's a factor," he said. "And I don't want that to ever happen again in Baltimore County, period."

Having failed in the delegation, the bill is effectively dead and will not continue on in the General Assembly this year.

The delegation also voted unanimously Monday to advance the Senate's version of a bill that would raise the brewey cap in the county for Guinness' proposed new facility in Relay, which could have implications for eastside breweries and others statewide.

They amended the bill at Guinness brand owner Diageo's request, however,

- continued from page 2 -"That's not a big deal," Taylor said. "The big deal is, what you put there has

to be safe for the community." Taylor expressed concern that Metzgar and Salling did not come to the community with this plan before supporting it and taking it to the state for funding when they knew there could be community opposition.

Metzgar admitted to the *East County Times* following a committee hearing on the bond bill in Annapolis that he expected some push-back from community members.

"If they are going to be proposing or sponsoring legislation that's going to be controversial - obviously we're going to have questions about this - they should let us know," Taylor maintained.

Metzgar noted that the public notification about the bill hearing in Annapolis was posted and available to the public, and that church leadership had been out in the community collecting input and information on the project.

Shiloh's Sister Marietta Lewis, who testified at the bill hearing, told the *Times* at the time that church representatives have attended local meetings to take in the information. And she said they plan to hold community input meetings as the project gets closer to completion.

"Well that's not the way it works," Taylor said at the NPC meeting. "You have the community meetings up front and then you put your project forward [for approval]."

Metzgar said he believes the project will ultimately be something the community will be proud of. Nevertheless, he said he has asked church leadership to reach out to the community more to address their concerns about the project and gain their input.

Additionally, the delegate said there will be more opportunity for public input since the church still has to apply for several permits in order to move forward with the project.

## **Perry Hall boys advance to Final Four after taking down Paint Branch**

The Perry Hall boys basketball find themselves in familiar territory - the 4A state semifinal. Last year, the Gators were knocked out by Eleanor Roosevelt. This year, they'll be hoping to slip past Annapolis and secure a berth in the final. The semifinal will be played at 7 p.m. on Thursday in College Park.

The Gators took down Paint Branch in the 4A/ North regional final on Saturday in what was one of the more wild games I've seen in ages. The game had absolutely everything - huge dunks, technical and flagrant fouls, an ejection, star foul trouble, comebacks and more. Before I get into the nitty-gritty, I'd like to address the officiating.

While the game was exciting, the referees were absolutely horrendous. The game started not with a jump ball, but with Perry Hall taking technical free throws by virtue of a Paint Branch player dunking before the game. That's a no-no for the MPSSAA. Rulebook hardliners will tell you "tough break," but calling a technical before the game on something as innocuous as a pre-game dunk seems a bit tacky. Later on in the first half, a Paint Branch assistant coach was given a technical for yelling at a referee, and within moments the head coach was ejected despite not saying a word.

Another wonderful MPSSAA rule stipulates that technical fouls assessed to the bench count against the head coach. The pre-game technical was considered a bench technical, as was the assistant coach's punishment. And so Paint Branch's head coach was



tossed for committing the crime of...uhh...existing? That led to a lull in the game where rules needed to be explained and security needed to escort the coach out. Yes, rules are rules, but important games shouldn't be decided by little-used rules and technical fouls tossed out like candy at a parade.

Besides the technicals, the refs were just bad. Laquill Hardnett was given a technical for shooting after the whistle. The infraction gave him his third foul in the first quarter, and so he was subsequently pulled. They later decided the technical was a bench technical, giving Hardnett some breathing room. Hardnett was put back in but pulled almost immediately when he picked up his actual third foul on a soft call.

Despite the shoddy officiating, the game was as entertaining as it gets. With Hardnett in foul trouble early, the bulk of the work on both ends fell to Anthony Higgs, and he delivered with 23 points and 18 rebounds. But the Gators had plenty of other players step up as well. Senior forward Darrell Green put up 11 while junior forward Tyler Holley put up 15. Hardnett finished the game with 12 points, predominantly coming from the free throw line at the end of the game.

Holley was particularly impressive with Hardnett sidelined. The two-sport stud (Holley is also Perry Hall's quarterback) hit big shots and frequently managed to get to the line. He showed tremendous toughness going hard into the lane, even after he got walloped along the baseline resulting in a flagrant foul on a Paint Branch player (undeserved, might I add. It was a hard foul, but not flagrant). Holley drew high praise from a team of scouts, who wondered aloud whether or not Holley should be more focused on basketball or football.

Even with the contributions of others, the game was controlled by Higgs. The junior forward was a menace, getting into the lane with ease, hitting threes



and throwing down huge slams. Higgs brought the house down twice on Saturday, once on a fastbreak and once on an alley-oop inbound play that would have made Dick Vitale lose his voice.

Perry Hall entered the half with a commanding 13-point lead, but that lead slipped away in the third quarter. Paint Branch got Perry Hall's lead down to one, but weren't able to get in front. Hammond placed sixth as a freshman last year and Whitelaw challenged him to put in the work to become a state champ, a challenge Hammond took to heart.

"The amount of work he put in to be a state champ is outrageous," Whitelaw said. "Everyone expected Ethan to be there but Max took a lot of people by surprise."

# **Parkville house fire** leaves one man dead

A 28-year-old man died Sunday when an early morning fire heavily damaged his Parkville area home.

# **Edgemere man sentenced** in assault case

An Edgemere man has been sentenced to 18 months in the Baltimore County Detention Center after being found guilty of second degree assault.

William Bruce Howard Jr., 57, of the 2700 block of Sparrows Point Road was sentenced to 10 years with all but 18 months suspended, according to Lisa Dever, an assistant state's attorney for Baltimore County.

Howard also received a probation before judgement ruling in regard to a charge of fourth-degree sex offense. Upon the completion of his jail term, Howard will undergo five years of supervised probation for the sex offense charge. If he successfully completes the probation period, he will not have to register as a sexual offender, according to Dever.

Howard faced a total of 14 charges related to the alleged assaults involving two minor girls. Twelve of the charges were dismissed as part of the plea agreement, according to Dever.

"We didn't do this lightly," Dever said of the agreement. "We reached this decision after discussing it with the family and deciding it was in the best interests of the victims."

The plea agreement was a way of punishing Howard for his behavior while keeping the victims, whom Dever described as "brave and strong young ladies," from having to testify in trial proceedings.

In addition to the jail term and lengthy probation period, Howard will have to successfully complete a sex offender program through the Baltimore County Department of Social Services and has been ordered to have no contact with the victims or any females under the age of 16, according to online court records.

sandwich served in a dirty ashtray?"

In the film, Paxton played a small-town police chief who suddenly finds himself embroiled in a manhunt for some criminals who pulled off a heist in the big city and may have come to hide out in his little, podunk town. Paxton was amazing in it.


After that film, Hollywood suddenly started to see him as a leading man. The nice guy had hung in there and was suddenly seen as a bankable star. Lead roles in everything from "Twister" to "A Simple Plan" followed. He wasn't above continuing to take supporting roles in excellent flicks like "Tombstone," "True Lies," "Apollo 13" and "Titanic." He directed and starred in the thriller "Frailty" in 2001. And when the time came that better parts for him were on the small screen, he transitioned easily to starring roles in "Big Love" and the series he was

working on at the time of his passing, "Training Day."

I had the great fortune of meeting Bill Paxton just once. I got to work the Baltimore red carpet premiere of Cameron's "Ghosts of the Abyss" IMAX documentary in 2003. Cameron was there. "Ladder 49" was filming in Charm City at the time. So, I also got to briefly chat up stars like John Travolta and Robert Patrick. But it was Paxton who stopped on the red carpet and chatted the longest. I couldn't help myself. As much as I should have talked to Paxton about getting to dive with Cameron down to the Titanic wreck or ask him more relevant questions to the actual film everyone was there to see and promote... I had to ask him about "Weird Science." I just had to!

I was 14 when I saw it. And, sure, it's considered the least of writer-director John Hughes' teen comedies of the era (the others being "Sixteen Candles," 'The Breakfast Club" and "Ferris Bueller's Day Off"). But I love it for all its nutty, quotable, only-in-the-80s fun. My first question to Paxton? "What do you think Chet would be doing now almost 20 years later?" Without missing a beat, he immediately went right into character and replied, "I'm unemployed, buttwad!"

He then went on to talk about how he loved playing that character, which was really cool considering all of the "more important" work he had done in the years since. He clearly loved what he did, and I loved watching him in pretty much everything I saw him.

# **'LOGAN'** introduces a new superhero...Killjoy!

I can understand why critics and adult "X Men" fans are heaping slobbering praise on "Logan." First of all, it's an extremely well-made film. It's gritty, in-your-face and very emotional in spots. But more than anything, it's an R-rated film. The first to feature Wolverine, in fact. So, audiences are finally getting the hard-edged take on the title character they've been clamoring for, with lots of instances where Wolvie jams his claws into dudes' skulls, guts their bellies, even decapitates a few for kicks. And blood. Lots o' blood!

Hugh Jackman swears this is his last go around as the character that put him on the Hollywood map 17 years ago. And I'm not going to reveal here whether Logan lives or dies. All I'll say is once you've seen the film, you'll understand why and how this is the last of Jackman as Wolverine. With Hollywood and the overwhelming greed of all concerned, I'm sure we'll get a reboot in a few years time. And the new Wolverine will probably be ridiculously young and, in one cameo scene, nudge a 50-something Jackman in a bar or coffee shop, and Jackman will grumble "Piss off!" and we'll all cheer.

But, man, there's very little to cheer about in this send-off. "Logan" is one bleak-as-hell film to sit through! The flick is set 12 years in the future. All of the mutants we've come to know and love? They've been totally wiped out. It's only Wolverine and Professor Charles Xavier (Patrick Stewart, the only actor returning from the other "X-Men" movies) left, and Charles is suffering from... Alzheimer's Disease! Wolverine, meanwhile, isn't healing like he used to. He has a nasty cough. He drinks too much. And he and Charles are hiding out in Mexico, with Logan trying to scrape together enough cash to buy a boat and live with the Professor far out on the open water so that his increasingly un-tethered telekinetic powers won't harm anyone.

But Charles insists he has been in telepathic communication with a 12-year-old girl named Laura, who has extraordinary abilities. Logan thinks it's the dementia talking. But he soon learns that Laura (Dafne Keen) is real and has abilities almost exactly like his own. Hot on her heels is a military-industrial task force led by the enigmatic Dr. Rice (Richard E. Grant), the ruthless mercenary Pierce (Boyd Holbrook) and a seemingly endless number of gun-toting lackeys. The film quickly turns into a road movie, with Wolverine, Charles and Hitgirl... er, Laura crossing back into the United States to find a fabled safe place for mutants known as "Eden"

somewhere near the Canadian border.

There's a feeling of dark inevitability hanging over the entire film. You never once get the sense that any of the mutant heroes from the other movies will somehow come to the rescue late. This is Wolverine on his own, a lone wolf, wounded throughout, slower and older, not wanting to feel again, not really wanting to live. He even carries around with him a special bullet made of the metal that his claws are comprised of to blow his head off one day when the time is right. Oh yeah. This is some good, popcorn-chompin' fun, dear readers!

"Logan" is ultimately a film I admire more than like

or love. It will definitely satisfy those fans who crave their superhero stories to be ever darker and edgier. The "X-Men" series and spin-off movies have always flirted with apocalyptic endgames. Well, "Logan" is sort of the "Walking Dead" of the franchise. This is what mass entertainment has largely become... either we're getting cartoony CGI eye candy or heavy, self-serious lamentations where beloved characters like Superman or Han Solo or Captain Kirk come back only to bite it or you have long-time good guys like Batman, Iron Man and James Bond turned inward and put through the emotional ringer for two-plus hours.

Oof! Our knights can't get much darker, can they?

# Lots of opportunities to celebrate St. Patrick's Day at Dellis

- Article by Marge Neal, photos by Patrick Taylor -If you're a fan of corned beef and cabbage and other traditional Irish meals and are bummed that most local restaurants feature the Irish fare for just a couple of days each year, Dellis Bar and Grill in Rosedale has you covered.

Dellis will feature its St. Patrick's Day menu through March 19, giving patrons the opportunity to get their fill of these once-a-year specials without having to brave the holiday crowd on March 17. All the restaurant owners ask is that you bring an appetite.

The *East County Times* was invited to the Philadelphia Road eatery to sample the Irish holiday offerings and there were no disappointments.

The meal started with a potato and leek soup that Goldilocks would have been pleased with - not too thick, not too thin but just right. We went for lunch on Friday, March 3, so it was fitting the temperature dropped back down to winter-like settings, more

appropriate for the heavy comfort foods we tasted. *Times* co-editor Patrick Taylor and I ate just a spoonful or so of each dish presented and left com-

pletely sated - perhaps for a day or more. After the soup was delivered to our table, the main dishes started appearing in what seemed like an endless parade of food.

The fish and chips arrived first. The fresh cod was hand-battered in-house and fried to a light, crispy - see ST. PATRICK'S DAY on page 16 -

perfection. The slab of fish was thick and moist. The meal, with two pieces of fish accompanied by a mound of equally crisp fries, would satisfy any appetite.

The Shepard's pie has a base of ground lamb, beef and pork mixed with fresh peas and carrots followed by a layer of mashed potatoes. The entire dish was covered with gravy and garnished with fresh peas.

Patrick, a self-described "mashed guy," gushed about the Shepard's pie and its well-blended mix of flavors.

"I just love the sweetness of it," he said of the subtle combination of cinnamon, nutmeg and all-spice, vital ingredients according to owner Chris Spanellis.

Because of the aforementioned love for mashed potatoes, Patrick is also partial to the bangers and mashed, another generous dish to consider when extra hungry. The meal consists of a mound of mashed spuds crowned by five handmade sausages and finished with gravy, fried onions and peas.

The Irish lamb stew is just what one would expect - a bowl filled with large chunks of lamb, thick slices of carrots and potatoes, peas and onions held together with a nice, medium-thick stock that complements rather than overwhelms the main attraction.

Because of its popularity, perhaps the star of the luncheon was the corned beef and cabbage. The Dellis chef put together a beautiful presentation, with thin, tender slices of corned beef draped over a mounded bed of steamed cabbage. One side of the plate was lined with thick slices of carrot cut on a bias and the other side was ringed with red potatoes cut in half.

In all of the dishes, the vegetables were cooked to what I consider perfection - still bright and colorful with a little bit of crunch remaining. The portions are all more than generous and can be shared among several people.

Prices range from \$14.95 to \$16.95 for the St. Patrick's Day entrees. Light eaters who want to celebrate without the heaviness of a full meal - especially at lunchtime - can opt for a corned beef sandwich, served with French fries and cole slaw, for \$9.95.

No discussion of a St. Patrick's Day celebration is complete without mentioning adult beverages. Beers available from the Isle of Green include Guinness, Guinness Blonde, Harp and Smithwick's. Even Budweiser gets in on the Irish act with 16-ounce special edition green aluminum bottles.

Those desiring something with a little more kick can finish off their meal with an Irish coffee or perhaps something even stronger.

If you have room left for dessert, there's a piece of Key lime pie with your name on it. But be warned, the pie is rich and thick and sweet and might need to be shared as well.



The corned beef and cabbage is perhaps the star of Dellis' St. Patrick's Day offerings, with moist, tender strips of corned beef draped over a bed of cabbage and accompanied by red potatoes and thick slices of carrot and garnished with peas.

It's also worth noting that the hospitality at Dellis is warm and friendly. The service is attentive and timely without being obtrusive.

If you're still making plans for the day known for green beer, be sure to include Dellis in those plans. And if you already have plans for the big day, Dellis gives you through March 19 to complete your celebration with a visit to the eatery at 8776 Philadelphia Road.




