Nine-tenths of coal miners are gone!

America's coal industry is sinking sadly. Tonnage, usually above one billion, dropped to 749 million tons in 2016. Employment, which exceeded 800,000 in the 1920s, has fallen below 66,000. Four large mining corporations went bankrupt in the past couple of years. The decline is glaringly visible in my West Virginia.

Our state had 125,000 pick-and-shovel miners in 1950 when I was a teen. Most of the diggers lived in company-owned towns. Coal was the state's throbbing pulse. Explosions killing scores of miners were common. Violent strikes were common.

In the 1950s, coal owners began replacing human miners with digging machines and misery followed. Around 70,000 West Virginia miners lost their jobs and they fled north via the "hillbilly highway" to Akron and Cleveland but coal production remained high.

In the 1970s, long-wall machines could produce 10 times as much coal with half as many workers. And more jobs vanished because mining switched to huge surface pits, where monster machines and explosives do the work. The number of West Virginia miners continued falling to the 30,000s in the 1990s, then below 20,000 in the new 21st century. Official state figures put today's total around 12,000. The number of operating mines fell drastically.

Most of the decline happened because rich, thick seams in the Central Appalachian Basin—largely southern West Virginia and eastern Kentucky—gradually became exhausted. Only thinner, difficult-to-mine coal remains. The slump worsened when horizontal drilling and hydraulic "fracking" loosed a flood of cheaper natural gas that grabbed coal markets.

The U.S. Energy Information Administration says Central Appalachian yearly coal production dropped from 235 million tons in 2008 to below 60 million today and is forecast below 40 million by 2040. That much loss is stunning.

When his coal firms were beset by unpaid fines and taxes, billionaire Jim Justice, now West Virginia's governor said, "The coal business is terrible, it's just terrible.... You may be witnessing the death of the coal industry."

McDowell County is a sad illustration. In 1950, during coal's heyday, McDowell had nearly 100,000 population but mines played out and closed. Thousands of jobs were lost. People moved away. Local businesses folded. Poverty and drug problems soared. Now McDowell has fewer than 20,000 residents. Departing industry leaves misery behind. The retreat is shattering several southern coal counties. Their governments reel from lost tax revenue. School systems are near bankruptcy.

Rapid advances in solar and wind energy are another menace to coal. If renewable sources eventually generate electricity more cheaply than coal does, they'll seize more of the power market. America now has more than 200,000 solar workers, far exceeding coal employment.

During coal's heyday, West Virginia was called the most unionized state and it voted solidly Democratic. As jobs fizzled, so did organized labor. The state turned "red."

In 2016, Donald Trump vowed, "We're going to get those miners back to work"—and West Virginia voted for him by one of the largest margins in America.

However, even if Trump wipes out federal pollution and safety controls, I doubt that it will "get those miners back to work." They would stand a better chance if Trump shifted enough federal funds to training for jobs of the future instead of easy but hollow promises that he can't possibly keep.

Inevitably, all fossil fuels become depleted. Britain's Wales finally reached the end for its fabled coalmines. Some U.S. regions still have good reserves, but the arc of history bends toward an inescapable outcome.

Re: Rebuilding Our Military

As a Navy veteran and a strong supporter of our military, I commend President Trump for initiating a program to rebuild our military with a defense budget increase of \$54 billion. However, it should be decreased by \$1.3 billion and the \$1.3 billion added to the Coast Guard budget within the Department of Homeland Security, so it is not cut by \$1.3 billion.

Our military has dramatically shrunk and has been neglected in recent times. Although we have increased the capabilities of our military through technological advances, we have downsized our forces and we have not adequately replaced worn out equipment.

Due to the cuts imposed by the 2014 sequestration act our Army has significantly decreased from a high of 570,000 soldiers after 9/11, and it is heading down to 450,000. The Marines are going from 184,000 to 175,000 and the National Guard and Reserves will lose tens of thousands. The Air Force will have 700 fewer aircraft, and the Navy remains at 286 ships. My Navy has 11 carrier battle groups but at any one time a number of them are not available due

to overhaul and maintenance requirements, in port rest and relaxation, and ships in transit. It should have 12 carrier battle groups to fulfill its global missions in a dangerous world. George Will in an article on October 1, 2015 stated, "the sun never sets" on our Navy.

Potential adversaries continue to build up their military forces. Iran has a large army and continues with its missile development program. North Korea continues to test long-range missiles and develop nuclear armaments.

The two significant potential adversaries are China and Russia. China has a huge army, is adding to its air force, and is building up its navy, including aircraft carriers and submarines. China lays claim to the South China Sea and has established island bases in the region, which our Navy will have to contest. Russia is rebuilding its navy and maintains a large army and air force, and it continues to threaten Europe.

Trump should continue to rebuild our military so we can meet the military challenges in the world, preserve our national security—and keep the peace.

Trump's budget cuts will hurt the same people who voted for him

If you happened to have voted for the man who now occupies the White House, you may be feeling bamboozled, right about now. 

Helping Our Veterans Back to Work!

Joseph Quarles was among the first in line at the "Marching Our Veterans Back to Work" event on Saturday, March 18, 2017 at Cromwell Business Park in Glen Burnie, Md.

More than 800 suits were provided to veterans in the Fort Meade area.

The honorably discharged United States Seaman (US Navy) didn't know his suit size but knew that he was in the middle of starting a new chapter in his life, as a returning student at the University of Baltimore.

"I love my country and I love helping veterans," said Quarles. "I came from an organization called McVET. I'm in the job market and I thought I'd come out and take advantage of meeting new people and getting a new suit."

Helping give veterans a hand up and enabling them to confidently make an entrance at their next job interview is exactly what Farmers Insurance had in mind when they imagined what a new suit could do to bolster a veteran looking for work in the civilian marketplace.

Then, Farmers stumbled upon Captain Pete Smith, United States Marine Corps Reserve, (Fort Meade) who is also a city councilman in Anne Arundel County (D-District 1). From that run-in, a unique idea was born for the veterans in the Fort Meade, Anne Arundel County, Howard County and the Baltimore area.

"Farmers launched a program nationally with the goal of collecting 50,000 suits and [other] pieces of business attire for our transitioning military. We've actually exceeded that goal and have

collected 70,000 pieces nationwide," said Carly Kraft from Farmers Insurance.

A colleague of Kraft's connected with Smith who saw the possibilities for veterans who lived near Fort Meade and surrounding areas.

"When he found out that we had suits to donate, he thought about putting together the event, and here we are," Kraft said.

"We decided to make this a community event. Once Farmers told us how many suits they had to give, I was like, 'wow we're really going to need all the help we can get,'" said Captain Smith.

"I reached [out] to my extended network and brought these people together to see if we could make this work," Smith said. "All of my different lives—on the City Council, as marine captain and as budget officer at Fort Meade came together to make this work."

Howard County Councilman Calvin Ball said that he was excited to see the level of inter-governmental collaboration between Anne Arundel and Howard counties as well as the corporate response to serving veterans.

"Pete and I often talk about ways that we can better serve our community, and when he brought this idea to me, I was so excited to see how we could serve our veterans," Ball said. "We thought this

was going to be an event for about 250 veterans but we were amazed to get a response from close to 800 veterans."




Symposium encourages blacks to get involved in \$17 billion tourism industry

Baltimore's tourism counts as a \$5 billion industry. Overall, tourists help bring in about \$17 billion throughout the state, according to the latest figures from the Chamber of Commerce.

However, with all the money dedicated locally to what's billed as a diverse Baltimore, Lou Fields said the vast dollars that help to revitalize downtown and the Inner Harbor rarely makes its way uptown and into inner city Baltimore.

"We have a lot of tourism, but black people get very little from it," said Fields, the president and CEO of the Baltimore African-American Tourism Council, a nonprofit whose mission is to educate, promote and preserve Maryland's African-American history and culture.

Fields has organized the council's second Charm City Cultural Heritage Tourism Symposium, where he promises to provide a current and future outlook on tourism in Baltimore and how African-Americans might be able to share in the lucrative business.

Tourism Development board; Dr. Joanne Martin, co-founder of the National Great Blacks in Wax Museum; Al Hutchinson, CEO of Visit Baltimore; Tessa Hill Aston of the NAACP; Michael Haynie, CEO of Parkway Hospitality Management; and Greater Baltimore Black Chamber of Commerce head Kendrick Tilghman are all scheduled to attend.

"We will also be inviting students from Morgan State, where a hospitality program is offered; small businesses; museum people; and those who work in the hospitality industry," Fields said.

The primary motive behind the symposium is simple, according to Fields.

"Tourism is a multi-billion-dollar industry, yet there are no black millionaires in the industry in Maryland," Fields said. "We're doing symposiums to educate small, minority and black-owned businesses about the value and benefits of being in the industry because of the revenue it generates and the employment opportunities it creates, including the entry-level opportunities for young people who need work."

The previous symposium held in 2014 attracted several special guests, including Dr. Skip Saunders, the director of the Reginald F. Lewis Museum and Ambassador Tebelelo Mazile Seretse from Botswana.

"The 2014 symposium connected our communities to a huge economic industry," Fields said. "But, we need to make sure the money that's derived from tourism reaches our communities."

Private school students assist public school students through unique initiative

It all started as a conversation. Two years ago, Katy Illuminati, a kindergarten teacher at Sarah M. Roach Elementary School mentioned to fellow teacher Jason Adler, a Science teacher at Mount Saint Joseph High School (MSJ) that it would be a wonderful idea if students at his school could tutor youngsters at her school. Sarah M. Roach Elementary is a Baltimore City Public School located at 3434 Old Frederick Road, while Mount Saint Joseph is a Catholic college preparatory school for young men from 9th to 12th grade.

Mount Saint Joseph is located just minutes away on 4403 Frederick Avenue.

"I thought it would be great," recalled Illuminati. "Sarah M. Roach and Mt. St. Joseph are only about two miles away from each other, but the schools are vastly different. I thought it would be a great learning experience for both sides."

Adler moved forward with the suggestion, and with the assistance of Illuminati and others, the idea came to fruition. Every Thursday after school, students from Mount Saint Joseph High School assist youngsters at the school in reading and other areas through the Sarah M. Roach Tutoring Program.

"I attended a private school," said Illuminati. "I think it's great for a private school to get involved, because oftentimes they don't know what is going on outside of that particular school."

Everett Jackson is a senior at Mount Saint Joseph High School. He serves as the Working Group chairperson of the Sarah M. Roach Tutoring Program for the National Honor Society at Mount Saint Joseph.

"This program creates a bond with the kids who may not get to see young positive role models," said Everett. "For those of us who are not from the city, this program puts faces to the situation involving the youth in the city, and opens our minds up. I don't see this as a job. I see this as an opportunity to help the youth in Baltimore City and to have fun with them."

"This has been great," said Aaron.

"This is a neat way to help Baltimore. These youth are the future of our society, and this provides a nice way to give back and get them prepared."

Gerard, a second grader at Sarah M. Roach Elementary School, is among the youngsters who are in the tutoring program.

"It's fun," said Gerard with a big smile. "I learn math, reading, and a lot of fun stuff."

BGE Residential Customers' Winter Electric Bills 25 Percent Lower


