

Welcome To Cheyenne Celebrating 150 Years

On behalf of the City of Cheyenne Governing Body and the residents of Cheyenne, I am pleased to welcome you to our community. This is a historic year for Cheyenne. I was honored to be sworn in as Cheyenne's first female mayor on January 3, 2017 coinciding with Cheyenne's Sesquicentennial (150th) birthday. I encourage you to participate in the events that will be taking place throughout the year celebrating our fascinating history.

The city of Cheyenne is inextricably linked with the military. In fact, the city was "born" on the same day Fort D.A. Russell (now F.E. Warren Air Force Base) was selected as a site for an Army Post. Cheyenne is home of the Wyoming Air Guard and Army National Guard and will soon have the only National Veteran's Cemetery in the state of Wyoming. Cheyenne deeply values our military personnel and those who have served.

While you are here, I hope you will enjoy the rich history that makes Cheyenne great. For over 120 years Cheyenne has hosted "The Daddy of 'em All"® – Cheyenne Frontier Days™. This annual western celebration is the largest outdoor rodeo in the world and is the pride of our city. The "Daddy" is staffed by thousands of volunteers who dedicate countless hours year round to make the last full week in July a one-of-a-kind experience. These men and women are the backbone for the CFD™ experience — a 10 day celebration chocked full of parades, pancakes breakfasts, the biggest names in country music, Championship Bull Riding, western art shows, Native American arts and culture, and of course, the famous award-winning rodeo itself.

Cheyenne boasts cultural and recreational opportunities as well. Our Civic Center, home of the Cheyenne Symphony Orchestra, offers numerous productions throughout the year. Cheyenne Little Theater productions are some of the finest you will attend, with performances shared between the Mary Godfrey Theater and the Historic Atlas Theater. The historic Union Pacific Depot is the crown jewel of our downtown. The first train rolled into town 150 years ago on November 17th, and since that day Cheyenne and Union Pacific have been close partners.

Our parks and greenway system are some of the best you will find. The Cheyenne Botanic Gardens and Paul Smith Children's Village are located in Lions Park, with an associated High Plains Arboretum located five miles northwest of Cheyenne at an elevation of 6,200 feet. This spring The Botanic Gardens will unveil its new multi-million dollar conservatory - yet another jewel in our community.

A 40 mile, non-motorized Greenway path allows hikers, bikers, skateboarders and strollers to navigate around the city. We have numerous public and private museums including the Wyoming State Museum, Historic Governors' Mansion, and the Old West Museum. Our state capitol is undergoing a monumental renovation and restoration with an anticipated finish date of 2018. We can't wait to see the results.

Again, welcome to Cheyenne, the "Magic City of the Plains." I hope your time spent here is memorable and magical.

Magic City of the Plains

heyenne, Wyoming, "The Magic City of the Plains," is the State's Capital as well as home to one of the nation's foremost military installations, F.E. Warren Air Force Base, and host to the largest outdoor rodeo in America, Cheyenne Frontier DaysTM.

With a population of over 62,000 people, Cheyenne has become an anchor in the growing economy of the Front Range of the Rockies. It is home to numerous museums, art galleries, theaters, parks and Laramie County Community College. Some of the best outdoor recreation and scenery in the country is within an hour's drive of the city. Cheyenne

maintains the charm of the Old West, while still offering all of the amenities of a modern city.

"The Magic City of the Plains" sprang into existence in 1867, when General Grenville Dodge of the Union Pacific Railroad established a tent city here for workers of the first transcontinental railroad. Shortly thereafter, Army General C.C. Auger established Fort D.A. Russell for the protection of the growing new community. Soon settlers began to arrive and brought with them new cultures, as well as new businesses, which included cattle, trading and mining. This influx of new people to the open prairie



forever altered the lifestyle of many of the nomadic Plains Indians, including the Cheyenne, after whom the city was named.

The Transcontinental Railroad, eventually connecting both coasts, was the first modern mode of transportation linking Cheyenne to the rest of the country. Today, Cheyenne remains a major hub for interstate transportation with I-25 North and South, and I-80 East and West.





The Wyoming State Capitol: Restoring the People's House

losed until mid-2019 for its first comprehensive renovation in its 125-year-plus history, the Wyoming State Capitol is the state's most significant building and considered an architectural treasure that embodies the spirit of the "Equality State."

Fifty years before the rest of the nation, the Wyoming Territorial Legislature gave women the right to vote in 1869, giving the state its nickname as the Equality State. In 1889, the Wyoming Constitutional

Convention was convened in the Territorial Assembly Chamber in the Capitol. The Wyoming Constitution was debated and signed in this room and incorporated women's suffrage. Due to its significance in our nation's history, the Wyoming Capitol earned its National Historic Landmark status for serving as the location where women were first given the right to vote, serve on juries, and hold public office.

Today this historic building is not large enough to meet the current level of demand for public meeting



space and critical infrastructure failures must be fixed to protect the Capitol for future generations. One of the principal drivers of the restoration project is to provide the opportunity for increased public participation in the legislative process. The renovation will add several large meeting rooms in the Capitol, as well as in the Capitol Extension, which connects to the Herschler Building. Additionally, the Capitol suffers from dangerous life-safety issues, including inadequate smoke and fire detection systems, and non-existent smoke and fire suppression systems. The renovation will address these issues.



The invasive work to repair the building has created an opportunity to restore historic elements that were significantly altered during previous renovation projects. The original ceiling heights will be restored, exposing historic decorative elements such as stenciling, cornice molding, and arched doorways. Natural light will transform the building through the restoration of lay lights and skylights. The Territorial Assembly Chamber, where Wyoming's Constitution was signed and which was later occupied by the Supreme Court, will be restored to its original two-story height with its stained glass lay light and chandelier. This magnificent room will become the largest public meeting room in the Capitol.

Although the Capitol and its grounds are closed to the public during the restoration, taking a sidewalk tour around the Capitol is a wonderful way to appreciate the detail in the architecture. Or please visit the Capitol exhibit at the Wyoming State Museum to learn more about the building's significance to national history, and the architectural and design elements. The museum, located at 2301 Central Avenue, just a short walk from the Capitol, is open 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Saturday and admission is free.



"When it comes to your heart, you can't be too careful"

In 2015 Sue Foy, then 63, exercised regularly, ate the right foods and had recommended medical checkups. She was considered healthy and in good shape.

So it was a "complete shock" to her and those who knew her that Sue experienced a heart attack in June of that year.



For Sue, the takeaway is that anyone, even those who are in good shape, may be vulnerable. "At a certain age, you are just going to be more at risk."

For that reason, Sue freely shares her story with others, and encourages people of all ages to know heart attack signs and symptoms, to not second guess those signs and symptoms and to get help immediately if they suspect they may be having a heart attack. (Go to heart.org for a list of symptoms.)

"Throw out all the stereotypes of who typically has a heart attack," she cautions. "And don't self-diagnose. If you are having symptoms, get help. When it comes to your heart, you can't be too careful."

Don't delay

At first, Sue attributed her symptoms—chest tightening, profuse sweating and extreme fatigue—to her lifelong battle with acid reflux. She was finally convinced to get help when she started gasping for breath: "I felt like a fish out of water," she says.

At Cheyenne Regional Medical Center, Sue was rushed to the catheterization lab, where interventional cardiologist Dr. Muhammad Khan inserted three stents to open her left anterior descending artery and one of its branches, restoring blood flow to Sue's heart.

"I found out later that my kind of heart attack is called a widow maker," she says.

Sue credits Dr. Khan for saving her life. "He is the reason I'm here today."

She also praises CRMC's telemetry nurses, who cared for her immediately after the heart attack. "They were empathetic and instructive, explaining things in a way that I could understand."

Moving forward

Normally self-reliant and a gogetter, Sue felt tired and at a loss in the days after her heart attack. She finally realized that she could benefit from outside help, and decided to participate in CRMC's cardiac rehabilitation program.

Through the cardiac rehab program, Sue regained her physical strength and her passion for exercising and living fully.

Within 10 months of her heart attack, with her health on the mend, Sue started walking in 5K competitions, including a 5K Heart Walk in Tulsa, OK.

"That walk had more than 10,000 participants, many of them heart attack survivors, so it was very moving."

Sue would go on to finish eleven 5Ks between April and November of 2016. She plans to compete in several more in 2017.



As of February 2017, Cheyenne-area resident Sue Foy had completed eleven 5Ks since having a heart attack at her home in 2015. A George Bernard Shaw quote inspires Sue to keep moving forward and seeking new challenges: "Life isn't about finding yourself. Life is about creating yourself."

Thankful for care

These days, Sue no longer frets over what might have triggered her heart attack or if she might have prevented it. "There's no way to really know," she says. "I had to quit beating myself up over that."

She is also thankful for the support and care she received from family, friends and the cardiac team at CRMC: "I like to tell people that it was the doctors and nurses in the emergency room and cath lab who saved my life. And it was the cardiac rehabilitation program that gave me back my life."

The Cheyenne Depot and Plaza

on't miss visiting the heart of our community since 1886, the Union Pacific Depot. This National Historic landmark is centrally located in the center of downtown Cheyenne. The Cheyenne Depot and Plaza hosts free events from May through December. The Cheyenne Hispanic Festival, The Cheyenne Celtic Musical Arts Festival, Rhythm by the Rails and Fridays on the Plaza are recognized throughout Wyoming and Colorado. Residents and



area visitors visit the downtown Cheyenne area for these cultural and nightlife experiences year after year.

Looking for some Wyoming and railroad memorabilia or a souvenir? You will be pleased to find a variety of unique railroad, western and Wyoming related items in our gift shop, where there is a little something for everybody.

Designed in Richardsonian Romanesque style and constructed from polychromatic sandstone, the Union Pacific Depot is widely acknowledged to be one of the most beautiful railroad stations in North America. The Depot is next to the very active main line of Union Pacific, with over 90 trains passing through each day. The Union Pacific Steam Shop is home to the famous 844 and 3985 steam locomotives. In 2014, the 4014 Big Boy steam locomotive arrived to start its restoration.

The Transcontinental Railroad map embedded in the terrazzo floor of the Cheyenne Depot lobby is just one of the building's highlights. The original wood benches in the lobby still bear the cigarette burns from soldiers in transport. The "Coupler Building" is a gorgeous addition to the Depot. The building serves as a beautiful viewing area of trains passing by and an entrance in the second floor baggage




attic where the world famous Union Central and Northern HNo3 Model Railroad reside. Built over 30 years by Harry Brunk,

this unique 65-foot layout replicates the Colorado and Southern narrow gauge railroads along Clear Creek in Colorado. The towns of Blackhawk, Idaho Springs, Silver Plume and Georgetown are replicated in exquisite detail on this fabulous model.

Ignite the spirit in your summer; experience the romance of the railroad and join us in celebrating the Union Pacific Depot and all that it represents.

Cheyenne Botanic Gardens: Hidden Treasures

he Cheyenne Botanic Gardens, located within Lions Park, boasts nine acres of beautifully maintained gardens and award-winning landscapes. The soon-to-be-completed Grand Conservatory, which will include a tropical greenhouse, as well as a three-story water feature and a soaring staircase, will be the centerpiece of the Gardens. This educational, sub-tropical building will rise over

50 feet to the ridgeline.

In the new Grand Conservatory there will be both second and third floor balconies with growing spaces and spots for people to sit and enjoy the view. The balconies are connected with multiple stairways and an elevator. Featured on the second floor will be our Navy Submarine Periscope where children of all ages can have a new "outlook" on





their surroundings. The Grand Conservatory will provide peaceful areas for visitors to enjoy the sun and gardens in a climate controlled setting. The patio surrounding the new building will provide a beautiful outdoor setting with relief from the wind, and you won't want to miss the Observation Deck on the third floor, where you can overlook Sloans Lake and even view the Rocky Mountains on the Front Range.

On our grounds, our specialty landscapes range from xeriscape, rose, herb, cacti, wetland, woodland community gardens and many other thematic gardens. Unique landscape creations include an inspirational Peace Garden, colorful perennial and annual displays, labyrinth, stream bed and our historic Century Plazas which include the state's oldest locomotive.

Don't miss a visit to the Paul Smith Children's Village, a must-see children's garden for all ages. The Village's underlying theme is to teach concepts of sustainability from the past, present and future. In accordance with our commitment to sustainability, the Children's Village received the LEED Platinum award, the highest level of certification for a green building and landscape from the U.S. Green Building Council. The Children's Village is currently the only children's garden in the country to receive this award.

There would not be a Cheyenne Botanic Gardens if it were not for our enthusiastic and devoted volunteers, (primarily seniors, youth and disabled individuals). They provide over 90% of the physical labor for the Gardens. In addition they help us grow from seed over 50,000 bedding plants destined for the Cheyenne City Park System. The Cheyenne Botanic

Gardens works hard to make all of Cheyenne bloom during the summer months.

Cheyenne Frontier Days™ Daddy of 'em All®

ach July, hundreds of thousands of visitors descend on our friendly western town to enjoy the World's Largest Outdoor Rodeo & Western Celebration. "The Daddy of 'em All®" celebrates its 121st year as the leader of rodeo action. More than 1,500 contestants will compete for the largest purse of cash and prizes, worth approximately \$1 million

during the 2017 regular season rodeo tour.

Cheyenne Frontier Days™ (CFD) all started in 1897. It seemed the "Magic City of the Plains" that had grown so rapidly needed a tourism boost. In late August, Frederick Angier, Traveling Passenger Agent of the Union Pacific Railroad, approached Colonel E.A. Slack, editor of the Cheyenne Sun-Leader,



about staging an event in Cheyenne that would attract train travelers from Denver. Angier cited successful excursions earlier that summer to Loveland, Colorado, for Corn Day and Greeley, Colorado, for Potato Day.

Angier and Slack convinced the new mayor, William M. Schnitger and local businessmen to have the first Frontier Day on September 23. The first CFD committee was formed to develop an event that would attract visitors and attention to Cheyenne. They had less than one month to publicize it; and some critics said it wouldn't amount to much. They were mistaken.




CFD has grown from a small event into the World's Largest Outdoor Rodeo and Western Celebration. For Cheyenne, it is the biggest attraction a city could hope to create. Visitors from all over the nation and different parts of the world travel to Wyoming each July to take part in the "Daddy of 'em All®."

Historically, the rodeo has been the main event of Cheyenne Frontier Days™. Other activities have come and gone through the years. Baseball games were popular during the first years. Riding, roping and bison wrestling were also part of the week's events. Until the mid-1920s, non-rodeo activities took place downtown. In 1927, the licenses for street-side entertainment were denied, and the midway and carnivals began. In 1929, "Frontier Nights®" opened as an evening attraction. Visitors could also gamble in false saloons or spend the evening in the dance hall.

Beginning in the early 1930s, an increasing number of celebrities began to attend the festivities. Actors came to have fun and promote their new films. In the 1950s and 1960s, stars from television westerns participated in Cheyenne Frontier DaysTM.

Native Americans weren't a part of the first CFD, but public demand brought them to the second annual Cheyenne Frontier Days™. Shoshones from the Wind River Reservation took part in the early years. By the late 1920s, Oglala Lakotas represented the Native Americans. The Southern Plains Indian Dancers participated for the first time in 1980 and they returned each year until 1996. Several different groups have taken part since 1997, including the Wind River Dancers and the Little Sun Drum and Dance Group.



Parades have long been a part of CFD, and the early parades featured cowboys and military regiments. Dazee Bristol, a prominent citizen and CFD volunteer, designed floats for the parades and created saloons and a lynching bee. Some of these historic floats can still be seen in the parades.

Through all the changes, the rodeo has been the heart of it all. By the 1920s, two or three women's events were included in the rodeo. The economy and World War II changed women's roles, and by 1948 women's events were no longer part of CFD. In 1973, barrel racing was offered and then dropped after 1981; and brought back as a night show feature in 1991.

The rodeos have brought fame and glory as well as tragedy and sadness to Cheyenne. In 1989, bull rider Lane Frost was killed after completing one of his best rides during that year's CFD. A statue now stands in tribute to his life and legacy outside the Old West Museum.

Cheyenne Frontier Days™ is a special gathering, and it couldn't happen without volunteers who donate their time and effort to the event. Tasks range from sorting stock; caring for the world's largest horse-drawn carriage collection and a remarkable

Visitors from around the globe make Cheyenne Frontier Days™ a destination for an authentic Western experience, and a learning opportunity about the history and culture of the West. The past 120 years have seen millions of people travel to Cheyenne to experience this great event, located in the heart of the American West.

he City of Cheyenne features numerous parks and athletic fields located throughout the community. Most parks are a combination of native, natural areas and manicured turf. Some of our premier parks are Lions Park, Holliday Park and the David R. Romero South Cheyenne Community Park.

Lions Park is located just across from Frontier Park, home to Cheyenne Frontier Days™, and has fun activities for the whole family. At the center

of the park is Sloan's Lake, open to boating, fishing, and paddleboats. Just to the west of the lake sits the City of Cheyenne



Kiwanis Community House. The facility is available to rent for weddings, reunions, birthday parties and seminars. Adjacent to this facility is the William N. Brimmer Amphitheatre, home to numerous events. Another feature in the park is the treehouse. This multi-story structure gives families the opportunity to observe nature from a different point of view. The treehouse is maintained by Cheyenne's Urban Forestry Division, which also maintains an animal track path and self-guided tree walk. Lions Park also has a miniature golf course, the Cheyenne Aquatic Center and Spray Park, Botanical Gardens, playgrounds, covered shelters, volleyball courts, softball and soccer fields.

Holliday Park is located on Lincolnway, east of downtown Cheyenne, and is home to the largest steam locomotive ever built, "Big Boy 4004." This gigantic engine weighs 540,000 pounds and is one of only eight surviving of the original 25 made. Holliday Park has two large shelters that can be reserved for parties and special events. Several other shelters are available on a first come, first serve basis. Holliday Park wraps around Lake Minnehaha, home to hundreds of geese and ducks. The park has many amenities including basketball, volleyball and tennis courts, horseshoe pits and two playgrounds.

The David R. Romero South Cheyenne Community Park, located off Parsley Boulevard in south Cheyenne, opened in the spring of 2010. This park includes rehabilitated wetlands, eight acres of parkland and the Youth Activity and Community Center. The wetlands rehabilitation included restoring the original path of the waterway and re-vegetating the area with over 10,000 wetland plants. The park itself includes a large picnic shelter that can be utilized as an amphitheatre with a large play space for sports practice and beautiful meandering pathways. The Youth Activity and Community Center is available to rent for weddings, reunions, birthday parties and seminars. It features a large community room and an activity side, complete with a computer lab, arts and crafts area, social area and large activity space.

Although Cheyenne's summers may seem short, they are sweet, and many people make the most of them by playing golf. Cheyenne's prime golf season usually runs from mid to late May through October. Cheyenne has five golf courses; 18-hole Airport Golf Course, 9-hole Kingham Prairie View Course, 9-hole Little America Course, 18-hole Country Club and the 18-hole F. E. Warren Air Force Base Course. The




The Cheyenne Aquatics Center recently renovated and opened two water slides, a lazy river, a zero depth entry pool with play features and three additional lap lanes. The Johnson Outdoor Swimming Pool, located in south Cheyenne, offers a water slide and diving board. There are open swim times almost daily during the summer, weather permitting. Need to get out and walk or bike a bit? Try the Greater Cheyenne Greenway that connects many of our parks, schools, neighborhoods and shopping areas. The concrete path is lined with over 1,200 trees and beautiful riparian areas and is perfect for walking, jogging, biking and rollerblading. The Greenway is 100% handicapped accessible and is 37 miles in length. Plans are on the drawing board to continue the expansion of the Greater Cheyenne Greenway.

The City of Cheyenne Parks & Recreation Department also has the Clay Sturman Bike, Blade and Skate Park. This facility, completed in 2007, has half pipes, ledges, rails and bowls for the beginning to extreme riders, bladers and skaters. The skate park is located in Brimmer Park on Pershing Boulevard.

rancis E. Warren Air Force Base is celebrating 150 years of active duty on July 4, 2017. Warren is the oldest continued active base in the Air Force and is the home of the 90th Missile Wing, charged with maintaining 150 Minuteman III Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles. The complex spans 9,600 square miles across Wyoming,



Colorado and Nebraska. The base is one of Cheyenne's leading employers; over 4,300 civilians and military personnel work on the base.

F.E. Warren AFB today is a far cry from its beginning as Fort D.A. Russell back in July of 1867. Fort Russell was established to protect Union Pacific Railway workers from attacks during the construction of the Transcontinental Railway. The first troops stationed at Fort Russell, under the command of Colonel John D. Stevenson, lived in tents during the first year while building wood framed quarters. The fort was made a permanent post in 1884 and rebuilding began in 1885 with \$100,000 from the War Department. The original wood structures were replaced with 27 brick buildings and the fort was landscaped with over 1,000 trees. Fort Russell was the training center for the Artillery along with being a cavalry post. In 1889, the Medical Corp was established with Fort D. A. Russell as one of two posts chosen to officially train Hospital Stewards. As you can see, the post had a varied military past.

During the Spanish-American War in 1898 the 8th Infantry departed Fort D.A. Russell for Cuba along with the Wyoming National Guard which was mobilized and mustered into the Army service in the Philippines during the Battle of Manilla. During the 1901 Philippine Insurrection, units from Fort D. A. Russell served in the Philippines. The 10th Infantry returned with a Queen Mary Tudor cannon forged in 1557. The cannon is still displayed on the base today.

Times were changing, however, and the cavalry was becoming obsolete. In 1927, after 60 years of

service, the cavalry left the fort forever, with the last horse leaving in 1943. While being used as a training facility during World War II, Fort Russell became one of the largest military posts in the country.

In January, 1930, President Herbert Hoover re-

named the post Francis E. Warren in honor of Wyoming's Territorial Governor and first State Governor. Warren had received the Medal of Honor at age 19 during the Civil War and served as a U.S. Senator for 37 years. The post was renamed in his honor. F.E. Warren became an Air Force base in 1947. Interestingly enough, the post has had only one dirt airstrip, which was built as a cross country mail air strip. Although modern pilots never used the field, it was made famous when WWI Ace Captain Eddie Rickenbacker survived a crash on the field. In 1919 the "Western Flying Circus," led by Major Carl Spaatz, also used the field.

On February 1, 1958, the 4320th Strategic Missile Wing was activated at F.E. Warren. The wing was re-designated shortly thereafter as the 706th Strategic Missile Wing with three squadrons; the 549th, 564th and 565th Strategic Missile Squadrons. These Airmen stood up the first Atlas D model ICBMs on Warren. The first missiles arrived in November, 1959, from Vandenberg Air Force Base, California. The wing re-designated on July 1, 1961, as the 389th Strategic Missile Wing. The wing deactivated on March 25, 1965, and was replaced as the 90 Strategic Missile Wing. With the deactivation went the Atlas D missiles.


Over the last 57 years, the base has gone through much realignment of missile systems. From the Atlas D to Minuteman I, Minuteman III and to the Peacekeeper, the base has transitioned from Strategic Air Command, Air Combat Command, and Air Force Space Command to Air Force Global Strike Command. On July 1, 2008, the wing at F.E. Warren AFB was re-designated the 90th Missile Wing.

This year marks some major celebrations for the 90th Missile Wing. The Air Force is celebrating 70 years as a service. The 90th Bombardment Group, who the 90th Missile Wing is named after, is celebrating 75 years. The military is celebrating the 100th year since WWI. Lastly, the 90th Missile Wing is




celebrating 150 years, along with the city of Cheyenne who shares the same birthdate. Some famous people have been stationed at F.E. Warren AFB over the years. They include: General Billy Mitchell, General Mark Clark and General Benjamin O. Davis, Sr., Doctor Walter Reed,

Sammy Davis Jr., country singer Chris LeDoux and music legend Neil Diamond grew up on the base.







he Southeast Wyoming Welcome Center provides visitors with a front porch ex-

perience into Wyoming. The center showcases the very best that Wyoming has to offer. The interpretive displays boast an entrée of what lies along the road ahead. Travelers are surrounded by sights, sounds and encouraged to participate in several photo opportunities, like spending a moment in jail with Butch Cassidy, then bustin' out in one of two secret passages or viewing a life-sized cast of a Colombian Mammoth!



The building and grounds design also piques the interest of many, with rammed earth walls, several sustainable features and nearly a mile of walking



Tucked away in a grove of trees, nearly hidden from the view of modern-day travelers, is a piece of Wyoming history.

The old Little Bear Inn is nestled on a ranch north of Cheyenne (2 miles north on I-25 to exit 16 - Horse Creek Road, left on Horse Creek Road, over the interchange bridge to Little Bear Road, right on Little Bear road, 2 miles to The Little Bear Inn on the left). In its heyday, it was a stop for weary travelers. A saloon and casino.

The Cheyenne Deadwood stage route passed by the inn, and though it was not a scheduled stop, the stage often would use the inn as a rest

stop. The post office at Horse Creek closed in 1877, moving to Little Bear and making it a regular stop.

The next life of the Little Bear Inn was as a gambling hall, saloon and restaurant. When gambling was outlawed in the 1950's, it became a restaurant and bar. Little Bear Inn is Cheyenne's original steakhouse, and has been operating since 1958 at the current location.

here is a place in Cheyenne where you can stand beside a machine capable of nearly five and a half quadrillion computations per second, where the most advanced models of our climate are being run, and where scientists try to answer important questions about water, energy, health, severe weather, wildfires, and much more. The NCAR-Wyoming Supercomputing Center (NWSC), a world-class supercomputing facility created through a partnership between the National Center for Atmospheric Research (NCAR) and several Wyoming government and business entities. It opened to the public in 2012 and welcomes visitors Monday-Friday 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and on Satur-

days from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. (except holidays). Visitors to the NWSC can take a self-guided walk through exhibits in the educational visitor center to learn more about climate, extreme weather, supercomputing, and the facility itself. There is a "Young Scientist" section with hands-on activities and interactive games. Group visits should be scheduled in advance by contacting nwscinfo@ucar.edu.

What's it about?

The scientific mission of the NWSC is to help scientists better understand our planet and how human activities are affecting it. For centuries, science has relied on theories and experiments to explain how things work. Today, computing power is so



essential to improving our understanding of our complex world that computation has joined theory and experiment as a third pillar of the scientific method. Computers help us understand the processes that churn inside stars and thunderstorms, visualize future climate on Earth, and

predict the paths of hurricanes—problems that could never have been tackled with a pencil and paper. The NWSC's newest flagship supercomputer, named Cheyenne, is an SGI system capable of performing 5.34 quadrillion operations per second. It would take a person counting one number per second nearly 170 million years just to reach that number. Scientists use Cheyenne, and its predecessor named Yellowstone, to learn about many important physical processes, including severe weather, climate change, wildfire dynamics, water and energy resources, air pollution, and human health. The NWSC is operated by NCAR under sponsorship of the National Science Foundation.

The Building

The NWSC's mission inspires the guiding principle at the heart of the center's design: to maximize the benefits of the facility to society while minimizing its environmental impact. The center was designed to use energy and water resources efficiently, be adaptable to new technologies, make use of sustainable and recycled materials, and reduce or eliminate waste both during construction and during



operations. During its construction, more than 70% of construction waste was diverted from landfills and used for recycling, and the building itself is made with over 510 tons of recycled concrete, 60 tons of recycled wood and 26 tons of recycled metal. The facility is powered in part by

renewable wind energy, and it also boasts superefficient office space and systems that save up to six million gallons of water per year. The NWSC was awarded LEED Gold certification from the U.S. Green Building Council, in recognition of its outstanding sustainable design and construction.

Serving Our Veterans

n May 4, 1934, 67 years after the first tents were pitched on the prairie known today as Cheyenne, the US Veterans Hospital of Cheyenne was opened and dedicated. The facility capable of accommodating 100 patients was built at a cost of approximately \$750,000, which included the site, buildings, equipment and landscaping and took only 20 months to complete.

Construction began in 1932 to consist of seven red brick buildings with shingle tile roof and with a capacity of 133 beds. The only services to be provided were general medicine and surgery. There were to be no beds for tuberculosis or mental patients.

At the dedication, bureau officials stated that the hospital "will continue to be active for more than 50 years, at least."

Today, more than 80 years later, the Cheyenne

VA Medical and Regional Office Center serves Veterans in one of the largest geographical service areas in the VA system.

The medical center also provides outpatient care in the following eight communities in the tri-state service area: Fort Collins, Greeley and Sterling, Colorado; Laramie, Rawlins, Torrington and Wheatland, Wyoming and Sidney, Nebraska.

Presently, the Cheyenne VA Medical Center operates 16 medical and surgical beds, 6 Intensive Care Unit beds and 34 beds in the Community Living Center, and 10 beds in the Psychosocial Residential Rehabilitation Treatment facility located within the main hospital building.

In 2016, all divisions of the medical center provided service to 23,583 Veterans in the tri-state service area, for a total of 283,003 outpatient visits. ■







The Cheyenne Regional Airport

he Cheyenne Regional Airport was "put on the map" on September 8, 1920 when the Chicago-to-San Francisco leg of the Columbia Transcontinental Airmail Route was inaugurated. It was one of only fifteen national locations to serve as an airmail station. In the late 1920s, in an effort to increase revenues, airmail companies, such as Boeing and Western Air Express, began to augment their airmail service with passenger service. In 1929, after changing their name to the United Aircraft and Transport Company, Boeing established their main overhaul base in Cheyenne. The number of jobs created by this base grew to exceed 500 in subsequent years.

The late 1920s and early 1930s provided a gradual shift in the aviation industry from delivering the mail to transporting passengers. Several changes occurred at the airfield as a result of this new trend. In 1925, four brick hangars replaced the original wooden hangar that had burned down in 1924. The building that currently houses the Wyoming Department of Transportation-Aeronautics Division



was originally built in 1929 as the passenger terminal. Flight safety was improved through the use of nationwide radio-range-finding stations. Cheyenne's station, one of 400 across the nation, was located at Fort D.A. Russell, now F.E. Warren Air Force Base, and provided a fix to the east-west runway.

The United States' entrance into World War II in December of 1941 would bring additional business to the airport. In an effort to maintain the supply of B-17s being used on the battlefronts, a modification center was set up on the north side of the airport. B-17s would leave factories on the west coast and stop in Cheyenne for final outfitting prior to departing for the air front lines. The Cheyenne Modification Center was a huge facility that employed 1,642 workers at its peak. After the war, United Airlines took over the modification center in a lease agreement with the government and moved most of their equipment and machinery from their overhaul base at the airport to the modification center.

The introduction of the DC-4 in 1939 changed the face of the commercial aviation industry. The DC-4 could fly from Chicago to California nonstop at an altitude of 18,000 feet. The ability to cross the Rocky Mountains without having to follow a mountain pass made a stop in Cheyenne unnecessary. While the war may have brought more business to Cheyenne, it did nothing more than delay the inevitable. In 1947, United's maintenance facilities moved to San Francisco while their flight training division moved to Denver. In what almost appeared to be a compensatory move, United did move its stewardess training school to Chevenne in 1947. However, 14 years and 83,000 graduates later, the training school also left Cheyenne to make a new home in Chicago.

Currently scheduled for groundbreaking in April 2017, is a new terminal facility at Cheyenne Regional Airport which is scheduled for completion in late 2018. This will mark the third time since the 1930s that Cheyenne has seen the construction of a new terminal. The current building was constructed more than 50 years ago in 1960. The new terminal and vehicle parking lots will be constructed on Airport Parkway, to the east of the current facility. Travelers will welcome the convenience of the new facility, efficiently designed to meet all airline, passenger and modern aviation security requirements. This new structure will easily handle the current passenger demand, but is truly designed to meet the challenges of future growth. Scheduled for completion in late



2017, the new airport terminal will stand as a welcoming gateway to the State of Wyoming and the Capital City of Cheyenne for many years to come.

Cheyenne is a city rich in aviation history. What was once a 200 acre field is now a multi-million dollar industry covering over 1,000 acres. The Airfield is the base of operations for the Wyoming Air National Guard, Great Lakes Airlines and several corporate flight departments. With continued strong leadership and support from the community, there is little doubt that the Cheyenne Regional Airport will continue to maintain an exciting spot in the aviation industry.



Laramie County Shooting Complex

aramie County Shooting Sports Complex (LCSSC), Wyoming's premier public shooting range, welcomes the general public to the shooting facility. Laramie County Shooting Sports Complex, located at the Archer Exit (exit 370) off of Interstate 80 near Cheyenne, offers shooters facilities for pistol, rifle, shotgun, air gun and archery recreational activities. The range's indoor facilities include an expanded 50' pistol/small bore rifle range, air gun/archery range, classroom and small shoot-

ing sports supplies shop. Outdoor facilities include a 100 yard rifle range, 50 meter pistol/rifle range, and a 25 yard pistol range. Two voice activated trap fields are completed and operational. We also offer outdoor archery to 60 yards.

The LCSSC is operated by Laramie County for the purpose of being accessible to everyone. The range can be used on an hourly pass basis, or a yearly access fee can be purchased for families and individuals who participate in recreational shooting

activities more frequently. To honor military, law enforcement, veterans and seniors of the community, discounts are given on yearly access fees.



As the world's largest outdoor rodeo and western celebration, Frontier DaysTM attracts worldwide visitors, tremendous publicity, and annual traveler spending exceeding \$25 million. At the same time it brings these external benefits, it also knits the community together with local sponsors and the more than 2,500 volunteers who donate their time to make the event a success. Few communities our size can boast

a 10-day event that brings so many benefits.

What about the other 355 days of the year? Does our tourism industry disappear when Frontier Days™ closes down? No, it does not, as Cheyenne welcomes visitors like yourself year-round. Here are some quick hospitality industry statistics:

- Laramie County has the 2nd highest level of traveler spending among all Wyoming counties, behind only Teton County.
- If the travel industry were a single business, it would rank as the county's third largest



- employer behind F.E. Warren Air Force Base and the State of Wyoming.
- Visitors pay Laramie County and Wyoming taxes that support local schools, roads, and other services. Visitors pay 9.1% of the sales tax collected in Laramie County.

Visit Cheyenne is the official tourism organization for Cheyenne and Laramie County and we work to improve the area through tourism development and visitor spending. The Laramie County lodging tax is our primary funding source and is paid by visitors who stay in local lodging establishments.

Visit Cheyenne produces and distributes 6 brochures about the Cheyenne area, and we provide marketing grants to area festivals such as the Cheyenne Arts Festival, Depot Days, Ribfest, Ballet Wyoming, Cheyenne Frontier Days Western Art Show, and the Old Fashioned Melodrama.

Convention Marketing & Services: Visit Cheyenne pursues conventions which are important to fill hotels and restaurants in the winter months. In 2016 we bid on 109 conventions and provided assistance to 137 conventions being held in the area. We provide unparalleled services for conventions to help the events be successful and cost-effective. These services include online registration, onsite registration staffing, a photo kiosk, phone charging stations, convention materials, welcome receptions, and a mechanical bull if you dare!

Visitor Services: Once you get here, we want to be sure you maximize your experience. We operate the Cheyenne Street Railway Trolleys, providing historic tours, holiday specialty tours, and transportation for conventions. A total of 23,737 passengers rode the trolleys in 2016, the majority of them during our daily summer Wild & Woolly Historic Tours. We operate year-round visitor centers in Pine Bluffs







and the Cheyenne Depot, and maintain a countywide Calendar of Events on our website and for distribution.

Visit Cheyenne led the effort to refurbish and reseal 11 of Cheyenne's Big Boots with Arts Cheyenne and the City of Cheyenne.

temporary exhibits. Permanent galleries include: Wyoming's Story, The Wild Bunch, Swamped with Coal, Hands-On History, RIP-Rex in Pieces, Drawn to this Land, and Unbroken Circle. In these galleries, visitors will find artifacts on display that represent life in Wyoming from Prehistoric times to the present, and range from objects crafted and used by Na-

Laramie County School District #1

aramie County School District 1 is the largest school district in Wyoming serving approximately 13,800 students. This is nearly 15 percent of the state's student population and includes 411 English language-learning students from 23 different countries.

LCSD1 is comprised of 36 elementary, junior high and high schools. Meadowlark Elementary,





the district's first 5th and 6th grade configuration school, opened in the fall of 2016. Amenities at the school include a grade-appropriate library, advanced placement math taught on site and the availability of more grade-appropriate enrichment and remediation for students. Meadowlark Elementary, along with all of the district's replacement and new schools, is state of the art and provides a physical learning environment that enhances student learning.

The mission of Laramie County School District 1, in cooperation with students, parents, staff and the community, is to guarantee a high-quality education in a safe and orderly environment for all students, inspiring them to become lifelong learners and responsible, productive citizens.

In April 2015, the district successfully completed the accreditation process with AdvancED. More than 10 years ago, LCSD1 became one of the first accredited school districts in the region. Accreditation serves as the stamp of excellence that a district is doing a good job and meeting the standards that all schools should meet to provide a quality education. In 2016–2017, the district continues to provide updates to AdvancED noting the systematic advancements that have been put in place to address suggested areas of improvement.

The district's strategic plan guides all of the schools' efforts to improve. The Board of Trustees' 2016–2019 plan was adopted and approved during the fall of 2016.

Action plans are continually being developed and implemented in the areas of student achievement, professional expectations and growth, instructional leadership, safe and orderly environment and

effective and efficient use of resources. The action plans provide a detailed roadmap for achieving each of the district goals.

LCSD1 strives to ensure students will achieve academic success as measured on PAWS, ACT and MAP assessments. Included in this is preparing students to be responsible citizens as well as preparing them for post-secondary education.

In 2015, using standards-based reporting, district staff prioritized the curriculum to determine what students should know and be able to do on a quarterly basis. Likewise, proficiency scales have been built for each course providing specific information detailing what success on each standard must look like.

LCSD1 students take their schoolwork very seriously. Their dedication is evident, considering the awards they receive at local, state and national competitions. Additionally, the district encourages parents to support their children by working with them and becoming partners in learning. Many mothers and fathers contribute to their schools and the district in voluntary capacities.

The district offers several forums to unite parents, schools, students and the community. These forums promote communication and joint problem solving as well as ensure academic success for all children. Examples include:

- District parent advisory committee, building collaborative decision-making team, district and building school improvement teams, district standards and curriculum committees (in each content area), district calendar, policy and building advisory teams.
- Olweus Bully Proofing surveys to collect data, which continues to show improvement in the reduction of bullying in elementary and junior high schools
 - Periodical parent surveys
- Open houses for families and students at the beginning of each school year
- Parent/teacher organizations/associations (PTO/PTA)
- Districtwide student/parent handbooks for every elementary, junior and senior high family
 - School newsletters
 - District Facebook and Twitter
 - District Website, www.laramie1.org
- Districtwide newspaper—the Public Schools' Chronicle—published five times a year and mailed to every home and business in the Cheyenne area
- District annual Report Card to the Community provides updates from the previous school year as

well as information on strategic initiatives for the upcoming school year

The district has more than 3,100 full and part time employees working at all levels to ensure students receive a quality education that will open future doors for them. This daily commitment is exemplified by the transportation personnel that make sure our students are safe on their journey to school, nutrition services employees that serve nutritious food, and the support staff that clean and maintain functional facilities. Our teachers, professional support staff, paraeducators, and substitute teachers do more than teach, and our principals and supervisors focus on continuous improvement.

LCSD1's Board of Trustees makes decisions, which helps LCSD1 grow in so many ways, and our legislators ensure we have operational funds and facilities so that we can provide quality educational opportunities for our students.

"It is my honor to serve our students, parents, community and our elected Board of Trustees," said LCSD1 Superintendent of Schools John Lyttle. "We are truly blessed in Cheyenne to have students, families and a supportive community that strive each day to make the most of their educational opportunities."

heyenne and Laramie County have enjoyed visible successes over the years...and Cheyenne LEADS is proud of that. LEADS is even more proud of the Cheyenne community which has created the foundation for those successes.

During the bust period in the mid 1980s local leaders decided that if Cheyenne and Laramie County were to thrive, the community would have to take

matters into its own hands. There were no resources available from outside sources, including the State of Wyoming. the community could ill afford doing things the same as it always had.

Since then, the private sector has contributed \$7.4 million to Cheyenne LEADS' operations and the city and county governments have funded another \$2.2 million. Additionally, the business community and individuals have contributed \$5.9 million



through the Progress and Prosperity capital campaigns, the majority of which has been used to pay for business parks and infrastructure.

That investment is paying dividends with over 80 new or expanded companies and over 6,000 new direct jobs. The annual payroll from just those jobs LEADS can track exceeds \$170 million this year! The capital investment into our community from those companies has now exceeded \$1 billion and is grow-

ing monthly. We can track millions of tax dollars annually flowing to state and local governments from that investment. That is a real and positive impact on the local economy.



he Cowgirls of the West is dedicated to preserving the heritage and the role women played in the taming and settling of the wild, rough and tumble west. The organization was founded in 1995 by women who not only wanted to keep the Western Spirit alive, but also to honor strong women of the past and present who have made amazing contributions to western culture and history! The settling of the west has been romanticized in

books and movies and the lives of women have been shown as easy, glamorous ones. Nothing is further from the truth—these women worked alongside the men to make our west the one we know today. The purpose of Cowgirls of the West is to tell this story.

They do this in a number of ways. Their goal from the beginning was to have a museum to house the many items of Cowgirl history that have been donated and put on loan with them. In 2001, the



Cowgirls of the West Museum and Gifts opened in downtown Cheyenne and recently announced the expansion of their Museum and Gift Shop to the building east of their present facility. Here you will find Cowgirl memorabilia and Cowgirl volunteers to answer questions and help tell the tale. They also have an interesting collection of western gifts and have monthly luncheons with wonderful, educational western programs. The Cowgirls can also be found at many civic events helping out and wearing their very visible black and red capes!

They have also sponsored a scholarship at Laramie County Community College and published two cookbooks. There are interesting stories about many of their members included with their recipes. They participate in the CFD™ parade every year with a float and lots of cheering Cowgirls in the back of a 1957 red two-ton flatbed truck. Their largest fundraiser is the Cowgirls of the West Annual Brunch and Style Show held July 24, 2017, the first Monday of Frontier Days™. The public is invited to attend. Each year at the brunch, they honor someone who has made a contribution to the organization with a

program on his or her life.

Some of the members are ranch women from pioneer families, but most are women and men who love the west and are interested in preserving and learning more about western history. They welcome all to join their membership; annual dues are only \$30. Monthly luncheons are held the second Monday of every month (except June, July and August) and are open to the public. "You don't have to rope and ride—just have the Western Spirit inside!"

They have lots of fun promoting the Cowgirl in these ways and also being a part of this community, state and the west. The Cowgirls of the West feel that by their presence, they are making people more aware of the Cowgirl and the woman's role in the history of the west. The Cowgirls of the West Museum is located at 203 and 205 West 17th Street in downtown Cheyenne and is open May through September.


During Cheyenne Frontier Days™, Cheyenne Transit Program operates additional routes for your convenience.

The Historic Governors' Mansion

he Wyoming Executive Mansion, located on the corner of 21st Street and House Avenue, served as home to 19 of Wyoming's governors and their families, including the nation's first female governor, Nellie Tayloe Ross. Stepping onto the political stage in 1925 to win this monumental election, she changed America's history as well as the history of Wyoming. The mansion has been host to United States presidents, famous authors, and neighborhood children. It is now your turn to be our guest.

The stately mansion, designed by Charles Murdock, was modern in 1905 because of its central plumbing, hot water heat, and combination gas and electrical fixtures. This two-and-a-half story structure's portico features solid sandstone Corinthian columns that were quarried in four sections, carved on-site and assembled. Construction of the mansion began in the spring of 1904 and was completed that fall. Governor Bryant Brooks and First Lady Mary Naomi Brooks opened the house in January of 1905, beginning a long tradition of entertaining and community service at the mansion by Wyoming's first families.

Governor Stanley and First Lady Bobby Hathaway were instrumental in listing this historic home on the National Register of Historic Places in 1969. In July 1977, the Historic Governors' Mansion opened to the public as a historic house museum. In 2004, an extensive restoration was done on the mansion and it now reflects the history of the home through the various eras throughout.

Enjoy self-guided tours enhanced with cell phone audio tours, as well as videos providing information

about Wyoming and its first Executive Residence. To schedule a group tour, or for more information, call (307)777-7878 or visit www.artsparkshistory.com. essenger's Old West Museum, located at 616 Crook Avenue, contains one of the area's largest private collections of Old West Memorabilia. Charles Messenger started the collection over 30 years ago and opened the museum to the public 16 years ago. There are now nearly 30 horse-drawn vehicles on display including Buffalo Bill Cody's personal carriage and harness. Several are presented in natural settings. They have a collection of firearms dating back to the early 1800s and an impressive 600-piece Indian arrowhead collection.

Come see their Old Fashioned kitchen, bedroom, spinning wheel, rope maker and much, much more. Take a stroll down memory lane as you view the historic wagons in a realistic setting as they crossed the United States in the 1800s and cars dating back to 1906. Their Royal Coach is a must see, as it is similar to the Royal Coach the Queen of England may have ridden in.




