The event celebrated Carolyn's life, her accomplishments, her contributions to the School District and her passion for children and the performing arts. The master of ceremonies for the event was Surya Mehta, a student at Carolyn A. Clark elementary school.

"Carolyn, although she was very sick, wanted to know everything that was going on in the School District," said March. "It kept her happy. She made me promise she would not be alone when the end was near, and I tried to keep that promise. When we realized that Carolyn was on the decline, her many friends came to visit her. It made her feel so very special. For all of those who visited her during her last days, I want to thank all of you. I miss my wonderful friend... We can take solace in the legacy of Carolyn Clark."

Those attending Carolyn's Celebration of Life event wore her favorite color red, and her school colors, yellow and blue.

Banerjee harassed at Village Square Famer's Market

S. Congressman Ro Khanna reported that Indrajit Banerjee, a Physics Ph.D and an American citizen for more than 40 years, was verbally harassed outside a farmer's market at Village Square in Evergreen earlier this month.

"During these times, Silicon Valley must be a role model for our nation. We need to show the nation that immigrants contribute to our economic success and hate speech or hate crimes are un-American," said Khanna.

"Almost every Sunday I go to the Village Square farmer's market to do some shopping and stop at the Evergreen Coffee Shop to chat with some friends," said Banerjee. "Today was no different, except for the incident, at approximately 11:15 a.m. When I got out of my car with my shopping bag, I suddenly heard shouts "Hey are you an American"

- a few times. I turned around and found the person talking to me. I answered "yes"...the person, in the van continued - 'why are you driving a foreign car? Why are you not buying an American car?"

"I decided to ignore the person and started walking fast out of the parking lot," continued Banerjee. "He pulled the van beside me and continued 'Go back where you came from if you don't like America.' At this point I was scared, since recently I had read of several cases of people being killed in other states with rhetoric in similar lines. I dialed 911... the person noticed and started asking 'do you think I will beat you up?' The operator at the other end of the line asked me a whole lot of questions during which time the van drove away. A while later I received a call from the police department saving that they had no officers available and they could send someone later to my house."

Labor leader Cesar Chavez celebrated at San Jose library

lap..., clap..., clap..., clap..., clap..., clap..., clap..., clap.., clap., clap, clap, clap, clap, clap, clap... This is the ritual of clapping in unison that is a trademark of all United Farm Worker meeting and rallies.

On Friday, March 17, 2017 for the first time in history, this non-verbal pattern of many hands being put together at Martin Luther King Jr. Library in downtown San Jose was once again revived from history and some believed Cesar was looking on.

With bright vibrant weaved Mexican design, two authentic serapes were laid over top of the podium. To the right a one of a kind display was seen which contained historical photos and artifacts from the history of the United Farm Workers movement.

'When he looked at you with those eyes and that smile... you just had to go along with what he wanted you to do," said Cesar Chavez' sister, Rita Chavez Medina, who is now in her nineties, shared so much during the evening about personal stories of her and her brother and the United Farm Worker movement.

"I get very emotional when talking about my brother Cesar, he made me do a lot of things I never thought I could do," said Medina. She said for the past sixty four years she has been working in elections and registering people to vote. It was Cesar that nudged her to begin this and she continued throughout the years ahead. Cesar said to her, "I have found a person to process Note of Republic, to which Rita responded, "who." To which Cesar responded, "You." To which Rita responded, "no, not me." To which Cesar won out by saying, "you are going to do good!" From that day and for twenty four years after that she obtained authority to act as a Note of Republic.

Medina stated that one time Cesar asked her to set up a United Farm Workers meeting. He was not sure he would get there on time. As the meeting time came closer he called her. He said to her, "I can't make the meeting, but I have just the right person to run it." She replied, "Who?" He replied, "You." She said back no! He said, "yes and you're going to do good!." Later that evening Cesar called after the meeting was concluded and all went home. He asked, "How did the meeting go, how many came?" She responded, "I'm sorry but no one came,"

and then after silence (one can only imagine Cesar's puzzled thoughts) she said, "no, many came... you got me so I got you back," (one can envision the smile that discussion gave Cesar and this is an example of the playful banter that existed in how Cesar and those he touched worked together in the United Farm Worker movement.

President of Chavez Family Vision Speaks

Barbara Median Aranda spoke about Cesar. "In 1980 I helped by working in the legal department of La Vos. I remember my uncle always carried a book in his hand. Also, she stated, "If you wouldn't do your job, he would call you on it." He made you uplifted to do a job you thought you might not be able to do. It was hard work and he was a great teacher. He was very funny and would make jokes during down time. He was very lovable, supportive and always stressed the importance of education in wanting all to go to college. He was very willing to talk to you and would listen when you came to him with a problem."

United Auto Workers in Fremont helped **United Farm Workers**

"My father was Cesar's friend." "The U.A.W. was the first large union to put resources toward the U.F.W. and my dad, Eloy Campus made a connection with Cesar," stated Xavier Campos (Vice President of Chavez Family Vision). He stated that his father grew up picking cotton and then sugar cane. He moved into a factory job at the Fremont auto plant (now home of TESLA).

"One of my memories is of my father bringing our whole family to La Vos meetings. I did not realize the magnitude of the history I was involved in. My parents explained to us the importance of this man Cesar Chavez and what he meant to our country

That is the spirit of Cesar Chavez

It was stated by many that Cesar always was reading and always carried a book in his hand. When he talked he made others realize they could do things they thought they could not. He would listed to others, find out what the person liked and could thrive at, then this brought the best out of folks because they got to do things they wanted to do.

Times Remembrance

George Colacicco, longtime Evergreen resident, Ham Radio advocate

s a young man growing up along San Felipe Road in the 1950s, I often tell people what it was like to be a kid back then. There were only nine homes on our water system, not 25,000 like there are now in Evergreen.

There were few kids to play with but lots of really good adult mentors in the community. One of those was my neighbor George Colacicco, who passed away on March 11.

His loss caused me to reflect on what he was like as a man. He was a good man. For me, as a "farm boy" living on an apricot and prune orchard, George's work and hobbies were quite the attraction. Much like Hewlett and Packard, George had converted his garage into an electronics shop—a laboratory of sorts where a kid could step into a world of audio and video electronics that was rapidly changing by the day. George seemed to master it all, building equipment, repairing equipment and bringing together hybrid electronics that fixed things or took performance to an all new level. It's a wonder that he didn't invent the personal computer himself!

To support his family, he took his talents on the road and made house calls that reassured his customers that their consumer electronics could be made as good as new with a simple phone call to George. There was hardly a part of San Jose where he wasn't present at one time or another.

George will also be remembered as a talented Ham Radio operator. He had an 80-

foot tower antenna in front of the family home on San Felipe, and during the December holidays, the Tower was lit up with Christmas lights that could be seen from far and wide. Most profound was his ability to "patch in" phone calls from parents of military personnel in Vietnam directly to them in combat locations. I sat with George and listened to many of those emotional conversations. Who knows how many of those calls were the last communication between family members.

We will miss George. But somewhere in the heavens he is calling out his HAM call letters to of us: "This is K6GZedK."

The following is an obituary written by his family:

George Salvatore Colacicco was born on October 22, 1925, to Matteo and Mary Colacicco in Saratoga, and grew up in Evergreen Valley. When George was 3, an accident resulted in the loss of an eye and the tips of three fingers on his right hand.

George attended Evergreen Elementary school, Roosevelt High school and San Jose City College, where he majored in electronics. When George was 18, he met Delia Polillo. They married October 14, 1944, and had five children, Theodore, George, David, Susan and Chris.

In George's early working year's, he worked at the Beechnut plant on the midnight shift producing baby food. Tired of working at night, he found a better opportunity with Bischoff's surgical supply. George then went into business for himself, and opened TeleTronics, selling and repairing tel-

evisions, radios and communications equipment. Over time, putting in long arduous hours, his business grew and became a success. When asked how he was able to do it, he said that he never considered his handicap to be an impediment, but rather the driving force to overcome obstacles, and succeed.

Later on, he sold TeleTronics and started another business called Telecom, selling transmitters and receivers to Ham Radio hobbyists. Ham radio was George's passion. He held a certificate in Morse code for close to 60 years. He enjoyed talking to other Ham operators all over the world. He was intrigued by how a radio signal could travel so far helping people connect with one another. During the Vietnam War, he would voluntarily run phone patches between the pilots and their families so they could talk to one another. For his service, George held certificates of merit for his volunteer work with

the Military Affiliated Radio System (MARS) and for the Department of Defense.

In 1983, he communicated with the space shuttle Columbia using his HAM radio. George owned two repeaters on Mt. Hamilton called the Condor network, facilitating network communications with handheld radios. Finally, at age 75, with all of their children grown, George and Delia sold their Evergreen home of 70 years and moved to Rancho Mirage. They continued to stay active with their friends, and joined the Citizens on Patrol program, where George provided dispatch communication for the group.

George loved to travel with Delia, taking Amtrak across the United States. He also enjoyed taking long walks with Delia, and when he could no longer walk, he learned to use a computer. George was able to continue his HAM radio communication with computerized HAM websites. He spoke to other HAM radio operators all over the world, always making new friends.

George passed away on March 11, 2017, in Rancho Mirage. He is survived by his wife, Delia Colacicco; sons Tam MacArther (spouse Linda); George Colacicco (spouse Blanca); daughter Susan D'Errico (spouse John); and son Chris Colacicco. Grand-children, Anthony Colacicco (spouse Jane), Brian MacArthur, Richard Rucker, and Tristan Colacicco; great-grandchildren Matteo Stout, Keaton Rucker, and Kalila Rucker, and several nieces and nephews.

Graveside services were held at Oakhill Cemetery in San Jose.



Parents hear school closing or repurposing recommendations at March 14 meeting

roposals going forward to consider closing or repurposing two elementary schools in the Evergreen School District were presented at the March 23 Facilities Advisory Committee (FAC).

The Board is not obligated to adopt these recommendations...'

At the March 14 Facilities Advisory Committee meeting and the March 23 FAC meeting a Facilities Advisory Committee Presentation pamphlet was handed out to the audiences. These meetings are on audio and can be listened to by going to the FAC web page of the Evergreen School District website.

Here is the information on page 10, 11, and 12 of that pamphlet as presented by the FAC committee at the two open to the public meetings in March 2017.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Martin Property (on San Felipe Road) Develop property to generate revenue
- Meadowfair School (this was a proposed new school): not economically viable at this

point of enrollment decline, and if you did, you would need to repurpose a third school.

- Laurelwood (current Elementary School): Repurpose and consolidate with Cadwallader and other neighboring schools
- Dove Hill (current Elementary School): Repurpose and change boundaries to accommodate students in neighboring schools.

At the March 9 school board meeting the demographer for the school district presented a report about the fluctuation and decline of enrollment experienced in our area and others (this report is available to the public and it is under item Agenda 5.1 of Board Docs from the school board meeting). Here is an excerpt from that report:

The report speaks of suggesting that two schools be repurposed in the Evergreen School District and the area focused on is the area termed the "West Central Region," (which is to south of Aborn Road and Capital Expressway).

(Page 21) of the demographer's report states, "Since Laurelwood is the least centrally located of these four schools in this Central West Region (referring to Evergreen School District boundaries), that may be the first optimal choice for repurposing. Attendance boundary scenarios can be created for any two of the other three schools (Montgomery, Dove Hill, and Cadwallader)..." The demographer leaves the choices of which schools to be repurposed to be decided by others.

The Facilities Advisory Committee is scheduled to turn in their report of suggestions to the Evergreen School District Board of Trustees on Thursday April 13th. This may be done at a school board meeting on an agenda item and perhaps the report will be posted and public comment will be welcomed. One can always e mail the school board members by going to "Trustees" on the school district website or speak during public comment time at any school board meeting.

There were a number of comments made during and after the meetings:

"We are promised by our leaders, during their campaigns that they will insure that our children are fully educated, their welfare will be insured and a healthy environment will be provided for these comforts. But alas. just as soon as budget season arrives in every school district throughout the state of California the same cry goes up; "Our coffers are empty for education! There is no money left for frivolities! There is no money to pay our custodians and instructors! Schools will have to be closed or layoffs occur in order to meet the crisis!" The question arose, "Where is all the funding going from all the bonds, parcel taxes, lotteries, (yes many taxpayers have forgotten that the State Lottery was approved in order to fund education throughout California), and State funding provided by the taxpayers of the richest state in the Union? It seems that the proverbial 'Cookie Jar' has been invaded by the hands of sweets- loving children to spend on committees set up to figure out how to spend this windfall of tax money."

Continued from previous page time the money dwindles down to the poor children, they are told, "Sorry, we cannot have a music program; sorry we cannot have an arts program; we can only provide for basic educational programs in a class room not properly cleaned because we had to cut the custodial program down to twice a week

cleaning." Additional comments included: "The 'Cookie Jars' should be overflowing as poor men and women take their last dollar and purchase a lottery ticket in hopes of instant wealth. Isn't it time that someone took a look at where all these millions, even billions of Lottery monies are going? Do we need another committee in the Evergreen School District to see how to disperse the Measure H funds? Where does the Finance Department come in at the District level? Shouldn't they be taking a hand to insure that there is equality throughout the District? Does the Evergreen School District have an active representative in Sacramento who can lobby the State for more funding for the programs so desperately needed by the local schools? What about equality for each school? Shouldn't funding be sent out equally to each neighborhood? The School Board in each district is there to insure that equitable funding is provided to every school, no matter if the board member happens to live near that school. It is not time for school closures but it is time for reevaluating our priorities. Is educating our children important or not? Will the Measure H funds be spent in order to cut down class sizes as was promised when the taxpayers approved it?"

Measure H

The Measure H Parcel Tax, which was passed in the last election, provides competitive and safe learning environments to enhance student achievement by improving hands-on science, technology, and math instruction, keep class sizes low, improve teacher quality and training, protect arts/music programs and libraries, and ensure adequate student supervision and safety. If class sizes are lowered by measure H, this would compensate for less funding from the state as enrollment declines. They also would like to remind the District that not one time has a bond issue or parcel tax been turned down by the citizens of Evergreen as far back as anyone can remember.)

The new Durango SRT SUV can haul in every way imaginable. It's powered by a 475 hp 6.4-liter Hemi shared with the Dodge Challenger. The all-wheel-drive SRT can accelerate from 0-60 mph in 4.4 sec. and run the quarter-mile in 12.9 sec.

The new 2018 Dodge Durango SRT is America's fastest, most powerful and most capable threerow SUV," said Tim Kuniskis, Head of Passenger Dodge, SRT, Chrysler and FIAT. "This is what you get, when you take everything great about the Durango and combine it with the performance of the Charger SRT: a 12-second quarter mile, toy-hauling, three-row muscle

The 2018 Dodge Durango SRT is built at the 3-million-square-foot Jefferson North Assembly Plant in Detroit, which has been the site of Durango production since its introduction in the 2011 model year.

The price of the new Durango hasn't been announced, either, but is expected to be priced at \$68,000. South County Chrysler- Dodge-Jeep is expected to offer pricing incentives for qualified buyers.

he City of San Jose Transportation Department was so concerned by the Evergreen Times March 3 article titled "Evergreen Valley plagued with potholes" they took action.

WATER DISTRICT REPORT

After the floods: risk reduction efforts continue

n the last four decades, the Santa Clara Valley Water District has invested more than a billion dollars in reducing flood risks, pro-Lecting more than 93,000 properties in previously flood-prone areas. As the flood protection agency for the county, the water district

works to protect as many parcels as possible through strategically designed flood protection projects and annual stream maintenance which The water district is comincludes sediment removal, bank repair and vegetation management.

However, flood risks still exist in our county, with more than 66,000 parcels in flood-prone areas. The water district currently has 18 projects underway to minimize this risk. Flood protection projects are a large and multi-faceted undertaking that include planning, design and construction phases, and oftentimes a permitting phase after design. In the initial stages of each project, it is essential to gather support and evaluate existing risks, potential benefits, environmental impacts and costs. Support from the community and agencies at local, state and even federal levels is crucial for a successful project.

As seen with the improvements to the lower and downtown portions of the Guadalupe River, flood protection projects improve a creek's capacity to withstand strong storm events and protect homes and businesses. Previously downtown San Jose and Alviso experienced historical flooding on multiple occasions in the 1980s and 90s. Both regions, addressed by flood protection projects completed by 2009, were in partnership with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. When the upper reaches of the Guadalupe River are completed, the entire project will protect more than 7,500 parcels from a 100-year flood event.

The devastating impacts of the recent flood event along Coyote Creek on President's Day are a reminder that flood risks persist. During the wettest winter in over 20 years, our watersheds were saturated and increased run-off filled our reservoirs and raised creek levels. Anderson Reservoir, our county's largest reservoir, has received a lot of attention and at times, has been attributed as the source of the flooding. However, there are a few key facts to clarify.

Anderson Reservoir was less than half full on January 1, 2017. Prior to January, we were in a historic drought, and there was no way to predict if we were facing another year of drought. After the first series of storms in January, we began releasing water from the reservoir on January 9, as it became likely that winter storms would fill the reservoir exceeding the seismic safety restrictions. Heavy rainfall from

January and February storms caused more water to flow into the reservoir than we could physically release. The reservoir reached its capacity and began to spill on Feb. 18. The subsequent storms resulted in the largest flow of water ever recorded over Anderson's spillway.

Our hearts go out to those impacted by the recent flooding event. The water district is committed to reducing flood risks in the affected areas of San Jose. Since the President's Day storm event we have reached out to our federal and state legislators for support in seeking assistance and funding to prevent future flooding.

We are also working closely with the City of San Jose to update creek capacity thresholds and develop a joint Emergency Action Plan. At the request of Mayor Liccardo our board of directors approved repurposing up to \$450,000 in an existing contract between the water district and the San Jose Conservation Corps to help the city in

In the wake of the tragic Coyote Creek floods, the City of San Jose continues to work tirelessly to both assist residents directly impacted by the flood and better protect residents from floods in the future.

As the San Jose Flood Victims Relief Fund continues to disburse financial assistance to flood victims with the greatest needs (\$1.4 million has been distributed to-date),

the City also recently announced the availability of low-interest federal and state loans to help renters, homeowners, businesses and organizations repair and/or replace losses suffered during the floods.

At the same time as it focuses on flood recovery efforts, the City continues to improve its emergency preparation and response protocols to protect against future floods. At a March 9 special meeting, City leaders acknowledged the shortcomings in its emergency notification and decision-making protocols and outlined a plan for

addressing those shortcomings.

Among those recommendations, the City is developing a new multi-tiered threat-level matrix that integrates multiple data points to trigger escalating levels of public advisories and warnings. In addition, the City is improving its public notification protocols to stress earlier warning triggers, multilanguage communications, door-to-door outreach, and exploration of better technological tools.

Mayor releases March budget message calling for targeted spending on flood recovery

mid a challenging fiscal landscape, Mayor Sam Liccardo has released his March Budget Message for the 2017-18 fiscal year calling for a prudent and targeted approach to spending that focuses on the community's highest priorities and most pressing challenges.

"We've made significant progress over the past year in restoring services after a decade of budget cuts," said Mayor Sam Liccardo. "Yet, like many other cities, San Jose continues to be constrained by a variety of larger fiscal forces and challenges. That's why we must remain focused on strategic investments that will create the greatest impact with the scarce dollars available."


Given the challenging fiscal environment, the Mayor's budget message focuses on a few key strategies:

1) In the wake of last month's Coyote

Creek flooding, the Mayor has proposed instituting a number of immediate actions to assist with flood recovery and disaster preparedness.

- 2) The Mayor has also included proposals that leverage the tremendous energy of San Jose volunteers (exemplified by the recent flood relief effort) to advance the new #BeautifySJ campaign focused on reducing blight, trash and graffiti across San Jose.
- 3) Since every \$1 invested in preventative road maintenance can save \$4 to \$5 in future repairs, the Mayor has proposed increasing the FY 2017-18 street pavement maintenance allocation to \$50 million, which will allow the City to pave 200 miles next fiscal year.
- 4) Furthermore, the Mayor has focused his remaining spending proposals on modest allocations that will leverage private funding or resources, create new efficiencies to achieve an even greater impact.

The City Council will discuss and vote on the Mayor's March Budget Message at its March 28 meeting. Following this action, the City Manager will use the direction included in the approved budget message to develop a proposed budget for the 2017-18 fiscal year, which will be released on May 1. The City Council will adopt a final budget in June.

a third party research organization that studied the impact of cycling on middle school students.

"This donation is exciting because it enables us to enhance our physical education program and provide our students with a lifelong skill while also developing proper life time fitness habits that prime the brain for academic success. It is this combination of fitness and academics that we found particularly interesting," says Derrick Watkins, Chaboya Middle School principal.

Chaboya students in Chris Connolly's P.E. class will pilot the new cycling program this spring. "All of our P.E. teachers are enthusiastic about the new program and have completed a professional safe cycling skills training last fall so they are ready to teach biking and bike safety as a standard unit in their P.E. classes," explains Watkins.

It all started with a vision that Chaboya eighth grader Aiden Theocheung had last year as part of his Boy Scout Eagle Scout project. While on the soccer field, Aiden was telling Al Ventura, Chaboya assistant principal and athletic director how applying for a grant from The Specialized Foundation would help provide the PE curriculum in addition to the bicycles and gear for cycling classes at school.

The Chaboya administration and P.E. teachers met to gauge interest and support in adding cycling to their physical education classes. "At first we thought this would be a tough challenge to support and implement, but the more we studied the program, the more we learned how well structured and safe the turnkey program was, and we found it especially rewarding for both the students and the staff, "says Chris Connolly, Chaboya PE teacher.

Mr. Connolly also said, " on the academic side, we're seeing studies that cycling offers improved focus and attention and can lead to better grades for students." Ms. Alison Espejo said, "We are so excited to have this opportunity for the students to have the bike unit (a bike unit is a focused individual group during P.E. time led by a teacher).

Cycling can help students with unique challenges



Grant opportunity for community 4th of July fireworks events available to non-profits

onprofit organizations planning to hold 2017 Fourth of July fireworks events in Santa Clara County may benefit from a County grant program established to fund safe and legal fireworks displays.

The County is allocating a total of \$25,000 to sponsor up to two fireworks events in each of the five supervisorial districts (\$5,000 per district).

"The County supports professional displays to help deter the illegal use of fireworks in our community," said President Dave Cortese, County of Santa Clara Board of Supervisors. "The grant program offers funding for up to 10 events throughout the county."

Nonprofit organizations that have held Fourth of July events involving fireworks displays and meet the criteria to receive a grant are encouraged to submit their applications before the 5 p.m., April 7, 2017, deadline.

Interested organizations must complete an application. Events must include public/fire safety educational elements, be open to any resident in Santa Clara County, and be family-friendly.

A panel that includes representatives from

Santa Clara County Fire Department, the Sheriff's Office, the County Executive's Office, and Parks and Recreation Department, will review and evaluate submissions. The Board of Supervisors will review panel recommendations in May. Sponsorship recipients will be notified and receive funds following Board approval.

Selection Qualifications/Criteria for Fireworks Events:

- 1. Must be held in Santa Clara County
- 2. Must be proven, at least, in its second
- 3. Must have Public/Fire safety Education element(s).
- 4. Must be open to any resident in Santa Clara County and be Family-Friendly.
- 5. Must be able to specify how County of Santa Clara grant award will be used.
