

Governor's Address: Higher taxes drive away successful people—but don't take it from me

Liberals and the media are constantly defending the need for higher taxes. They criticize me when I tell Mainers that high taxes harm the economy. Well, don't take it from me. Check for yourself.

Dear Maine Taxpayer,

I have been traveling all over the state, educating Mainers about the destructive effect that high taxes have on our economy. With over 45 years of experience as a businessman, I can tell you firsthand that taxes drive out companies and successful people. Liberals believe

high taxes are needed to fund their pie-in-the-sky ideology that government should be all things to all people. But high taxes are a very real issue for the people who have to pay them.

When taxes get too high, these people will find someplace else to call home-even if it's just 6 months and a day.

Look at a comparison between states with high income taxes and those with no income tax. Between 2000 and 2015, the nine states with no income tax gained a total of \$146 billion in adjusted gross income.

These states are



Governor Paul R. LePage Alaska, Florida, Tennessee, Texas, Nevada, Wyoming, South Dakota, Washington and our next door neighbor, New Hampshire.

During that same time, the nine states with the highest income tax lost a total of \$107 billion. Vermont, New York, New Jersey, Hawaii, Iowa, Oregon and California and Maine are on the list.

If our tax structure had been more competitive, Maine could have retained much more wealth. But with the new 10.15% income tax that was pushed by liberals and union bosses, Maine is no longer competitive. Even Massachusetts has a lower income tax rate.

Maine is the new Taxachusetts. It is driving away successful people and the companies that provide good-paying jobs. Companies will not look at moving to Maine when they see billions of dollars in investment leaving every year.

Ford Reiche, who was named the SBA's 2008 Small Business Person of the Year for Maine, told the legislature that his accountant advised him to change his residence to Florida before he sold his company. Since he loves Maine, he chose to stay and pay \$1.4 million in income tax.

After the liberals and the union bosses succeeded in their referendum to raise the income tax to 10.15%, Reiche said he might not make the same decision. He called the referendum an "in -your-face persecution of people who are highly productive." Reiche said he has friends in the Portland area who have already changed their residence.

Only Steps Forward LA Arts integrates creative businesses with economic development

LA Arts has launched a new series called "Place for Makers" to highlight some of the creative businesses here in Lewiston-Auburn and to introduce them to not only local residents, but also those "from away" who may not be aware of their talents.

The continued evolution of LA Arts into an arts agency that integrates its work into the economic and community development direction of both cities is something to be applauded and further supported.

The Place for Makers series kicked off at Rancourt & Co, a shoe factory tucked behind Central Maine Health Care on Bridge Street. In the nondescript, interconnected buildings, Mike Rancourt and his team go about constructing some of the finest

shoes in the world. You may have heard reports

during the recent Olympics about the Ralph Lauren-labeled shoes worn by all of the United States Olympians being made in Lewiston.

While Rancourt was the craftsmanship behind those Ralph Lauren shoes, more and more of their work is done under their own name of Rancourt & Co. as they seek to grow their business and its bottom line.



So why would LA Arts be hosting an event with Mike Rancourt? Well, the design work and custom manufacturing that he and his team are leading the way on is cutting against what many of us have seen for decades: the closing of manufacturing businesses in the U.S. in lieu of making things cheap in China. What Rancourt is proving goes beyond the fact that many Americans will pay a premium for the quality of their shoes; it also shows that product development and craftsmanship is happening right here in Lewiston-Auburn with the work ethic of our local residents. With support from

the National Endowment for the Arts, and partnering with the Maine College of Art, LA Arts is encouraging others interested in making things to visit Lewiston-Auburn to see how much success folks are already having here. Affordable building space, affordable housing, a quality and growing work force and a number of flexible incentives to help with small business investments all make these types of businesses a possible growth area for our community.

Lewiston-Auburn was built on manufacturing, and while our economy has shifted with the global economy to be dominated by services and healthcare, the manufacturing tradition lives on, but often looks much different. Be sure to keep an eye out for the next LA Arts Place for Makers event to see for yourself what's happening.

Of course, the Place for Makers series is one of a number of new programs launched by LA Arts to put Lewiston-Auburn on the map and keep us there. This week the inaugural Artist Days in LA started with the featured artist being Ashley Bryan. The Artist Days, being promoted by me and Mayor Macdonald in Lewiston, include engagement with our youth in the schools and public events as well. An award-winning author, story teller and illustrator of children's books, Ashley Bryan is a perfect artist to spotlight and connect to the community with hands-on activities.

These two new activities build on the engagement of local businesses downtown in the ArtWalk Lewiston-Auburn, which recently expanded its footprint from the successful effort on Lisbon Street to include Main and Court Streets in Auburn, and the 2017 Auburn Winter Festival, where LA Arts offered a "pop up" café offering live music, ice sculptures and small plates prepared by boba, a restaurant soon to open on Spring Street in Auburn

When arts organizations make a pitch for public support, you'll often hear the argument that if their efforts are valuable. the free market will fund the effort. If that approach were extended across public efforts, you'd eliminate economic development staff at all levels, you'd eliminate business incentives, you'd eliminate public infrastructure when new projects are proposed and on and on.

In the case of LAArts, I am seeing a steady stream of events, programs and projects that are directly integrating private businesses to showcase their products or services and to attract new customers to them and visitors or investors to Lewiston-Auburn. If these efforts continue, the return on our small investments at the local level will be significant.

Whiting Farm offers Children's Garden Program

This growing season, Whiting Farm of Auburn will offer a Children's Garden Program designed to encourage those in Grades 1 through 4 to find the fun in gardening while learning the importance of growing their own food.

Beginning during April vacation, running through the growing season, and ending with harvest time in October, the program will provide fun, hands-on lessons on such topics as seed germination, garden pollinators and pests, the important role of worms in soil health, raising and caring for chickens, companion planting, garden planning, and more.

The program will begin April 18 through 21, from 9 a.m. to noon. Then, in May and June, participants will return to the farm to care for their seedlings and plant the Children's Garden. 

Tree Street Youth to unveil its newly renovated center

Tree Street Youth will unveil its newly renovated and expanded space, the Geiger Center for Leadership and Learning, at a ribbon cutting ceremony at 144 Howe Street in Lewiston on Wednesday, April 12, from 2 to 4 p.m.

The event will mark the completion of a five months-long construction project with Harriman Architects and Hebert Construction that has doubled the center's indoor and outdoor areas. Tree Street Youth, which raised \$1,521,353 for the project through gifts from over 350 individuals, businesses, and foundations, is grateful for the widespread community support that made the project possible.

The newly renovated center includes two age-specific outdoor recreation spaces and a large multi-purpose room that will function interchangeably as a performing arts center, gymnasium, and assembly room. The center also includes new classroom spaces to host programs for middle- and high-schoolage students and an improved college-career aspirations center.

By working with area youth, Tree Street Youth plays a key role in downtown neighborhood stabilization and revitalization efforts, thereby fostering community well-being in one of the state's only two centers of population growth. Next Step Maine offers college scholarships for workers

Thousands of Maine workers from more than 300 businesses are eligible to be nominated for a Next Step Maine Employee of Promise Scholarship in 2017. To be eligible, emplovees must work for a business enrolled in Next Step Maine's Employers' Initiative and be pursuing a bachelor's degree or associate's degree or be enrolled in a certificate program. Scholarship amounts range from \$500 to \$2,500.

There is no cost for businesses to join the Next Step Maine Employers' Initiative and nominate their employees for scholarships. The deadline for nominations is April 21, with scholarships to be presented in May. Nomination forms can be submitted online at www. nextstepmaine.org.

"Maine has thousands of adult learners holding down jobs while working to earn a college degree or advance their skills," said Maine Development Foundation President Yellow Breen. "When employers encourage and support degree attainment, their employees are far more likely to complete their degrees.

"Not all employers, though - especially Maine's small and micro businesses are able to provide financial support to their workers. That's where Next Step Maine scholarships can fill the gap."

Since 2013, Next Step Maine has contributed nearly \$100,000 in scholarships to 78 Maine employees working toward attaining an advanced education. In addition to providing scholarships to improve workforce education and skills, the Next Step Maine Employers' Initiative offers Maine's public and private employers technical assistance, resources, and training opportunities for providing educational support services to employees.

The Mona Lisa was stolen? Surprisingly, yes - on August 21, 1911. Even more shockingly, it was taken by a simple Italian immigrant, Vincenzo Peruggia, who hid it in his dingy tenement room in Paris for more than two and a half years. How did he do it? Why did he do it? Learn more when Morse Memorial in Greene opens for its 2017 season with the award-winning documentary "The Mona Lisa Is Missing" on Friday, April 7 at 2 and 7 p.m. A Q&A with the filmmakers, writer-director Joe Medeiros and producer Justine Mestichelli Medeiros, will immediately follow both screenings, which are free and open to the public. Joe and Justine Medeiros spent more than six years working on the project, but their interest in the story goes back much further than that. "I stumbled onto the story in 1976," said Joe Medeiros, a former head writer for The Tonight Show with Jay Leno. "I always wanted to make a fictional film about it, but could never get a handle on who the thief was, his character, his motives. Anything I wrote sounded made up."

The project took a fateful turn in 2008, when Joe discovered that Peruggia had an 84-year-old daughter, Celestina, who was still alive in Italy. But when the Medeiroses and their crew traveled to Italy to interview Celestina Peruggia, they realized that the charming Italian grandmother didn't really know much about her father, because he died *See* Sawyer, *page 12*



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
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

Lisbon Comm. FCU helps provide financial ed. for teens

Staffers from Lisbon Community Federal Credit Union and other area credit unions spent a recent morning presenting a hands-on lesson to local high school students on the importance of personal finance. As in the board game "LIFE," each student was assigned a career with a monthly income and then required to visit booths associated with the monthly expenses of a typical adult. Costs for transportation, housing, clothing, food, student loans, insurance and everyday expenses were all deducted on a monthly budget form. The object

of the game, which proved eye-opening for many, was to develop a monthly budget that did not exceed one's monthly income.

The event was part of a Financial Fitness Fair presented at the Lewiston Armory to about 200 juniors from Brunswick High School, Lisbon Falls Christian Academy, St. Dominic Academy, Edward Little High School, Lisbon High School, Spruce Mountain High School, Monmouth Academy and Oak Hill High School.

During the 2015-16 school year, the program's busiest year to date, par-

ticipating members of the Maine Credit Union League presented 35 such Youth Financial Literacy Fairs to a total of 6,904 students across the state. This effort has been recognized on a national level through eleven consecutive Desjardins Awards for Youth Financial Education.
