Proposal to build hillside homes near Silver Creek Valley Country Club requires moving Greenbelt line


controversial proposal to build hillside homes near Silver Creek Valley Country Club will require moving the Greenbelt line if approved.

Julie Hutcheson, Legislative Advocate for Committee for Green Foothills, addressed the 2,150 acre proposal at the District 8 Community Round Table (D8CRT) meeting held at the Village Square Library on April 6.

Hutcheson informed the community about her organization and their opposition to the Young Ranch proposed development. "We want to inform the community so they can be aware of this attempt at sprawl in our ecologically sensitive hillsides," said Hutcheson.

The Committee for Green Foothills is against the project because of building an urban development in a rural area. Hutcheson says, "It violates the voter-approved green belt line and other long-standing fundamental policies." "We are not supportive of the Young Ranch project because it is an assault on

San Jose's voter approved greenbelt and would set an alarming precedent countywide."

Established in 1952, the Committee for Green Foothills is a nonprofit group that watchdogs and

protects the open spaces, farmlands and natural resources of San Mateo and Santa Clara counties through advocacy, education and grassroots action.

Many Silver Creek Valley Country Club residents are concerned that traffic congestion with a new road intersecting Silver Creek Valley Road will be even more dangerous and believe the project will ruin the aesthetics and beauty of Silver Creek Valley.

Some Silver Creek Valley residents expressed their concerns about fire protection. They point out that the nearest County Fire Department is 13.5 miles away in Campbell which could pose a fire danger for Silver Creek Valley Country Club property owners, unless the City of San Jose agrees to offer fire protection for the new development.

The landholding company YCS Investments, an abbreviation for the Hong Kong billionaire family name Yeung Chi Shing who bought up the See GREENBELT, page 18

Table (D8CRT) invites the public to an Education Forum on Thursday May 4th from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the Evergreen Village Square Library.

This will be a panel discussion on education identifying current and future issues affecting public education and is intended to provide an opportunity for the community to explore new solutions to a better future for public education.

The D8CRT expects five or six local school districts to participate in the panel discussion with the community including Evergreen, Mt. Pleasant, Berryessa, and East Side Union among the possible districts

The moderator for the Education Forum will be Dr. Mary Ann Dewan, Deputy Superintendent, Santa Clara County Office of Education, and the general discussion for the panel will be centered on current and future challenges for local school districts and how Sacramento can and should assist our local schools.

Possible Topics for the May 4th Panel Discussion Include:

Evergreen senior citizen property owners are eligible for Measure H Parcel Tax exemption

Pure 30, 2018 or older are eligible to file for exemption from the annual \$100 Evergreen School District parcel tax for parcels they occupy as their principal residence.

For joint owners of a principal residence, only one owner needs to be age 65.

Forms are also available for Village residents at the Senior Resource Services office.

To complete the exemption, the form and supporting documents may be brought into the District Office located at 3188 Quimby Road, San Jose.

District representatives will be at The Villages Golf and Country Club Forum Room, located at 5000 Cribari Lane, San Jose, CA, to accept new exemption requests for Village Residents on May 5, 2017 and from 1:30 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Residents must file for the exemption in person with documents to prove their home ownership, residency, and age eligibility.

Those who have previously been granted an exemption from the parcel tax, their exemption will be automatically renewed each year as long as you remain eligible for the exemption.



Building assets in students while enhancing teacher collaboration

e really appreciate the time to connect with our colleagues weekly, keeping each other accountable and having time built into our school day," said the sixth grade team. "It has strengthened our team, by allowing us to support each other in a non-judgmental way," stated the second grade team.

These, and other, positive remarks are being passed as Norwood and Laurelwood Schools in the Evergreen School District participate in the Project Cornerstone initiative started in 1999 with the purpose to promote social/emotional health in youth.

Norwood and Laurelwood Schools have chosen to call their program "Asset Building" which benefits both children and teachers. What are students doing while their teachers are collaborating? During the 50 minute session, the students are engaged in Asset Building activities. Project Cornerstone has identified 41 developmental assets that young students need in order to lead healthy productive lives. "The fewer assets a child has, the more likely he or she will engage in atrisk behavior," Says Project

Cornerston

Teacher Instructional Coach, Lucy Hsu, states, "At both Norwood and Laurelwood School we have implemented weekly collaboration and coaching sessions for every teacher. What is unique about our model; rather than teachers collaborating only after school hours, the collaboration sessions are built into our weekly bell schedule. Many teachers cite time as one of the greatest reasons they don't collaborate with their colleagues more. We addressed this by creat-

ing a time on campus during actual school hours."

Ms. Hsu continued, "We created a schedule, whereby a grade-level team, consisting of three teachers, meets together for 50 minutes with the instructional coach. Then the next grade-level team meets for 50 minutes with the coach. These coaching sessions occur all day, every Monday, allowing every grade level team to engage in the following: designing lesson plans, discussing strategies to address students' struggles, analyzing student

work and data, attending class-room observations both on and off-site."

Every Monday at Norwood (and every Wednesday at Laurelwood) students engage in Asset-building activities. The weekly, 50-minute lesson plans are written by the Instructional Coach, Lucy Hsu, and taught by three well-trained substitute teachers.

"It's less daunting to try something new when you do it together. There is so much sharing of new and great ideas," Brenda Allen, first and second grade combo teacher.

"We set goals as a team, and we have a focused topic each week; it keeps us accountable with each other," third grade team. "Our time spent collaborating has made me a better writing instructor," Andrea Jaffa, second and third combo teacher, Laurelwood.

Loretta Toy (second grade teacher): "Our time is spent having student-centered conversations and brainstorming strategies together. We come up with solutions that apply to all of our classes. Gracie Wade said, "It's helpful to have my colleagues see my student's work with fresh eyes; sometimes they point things out to me and suggest See TEACHERS, page 7

OP ED: Land Use Master Planning Charrette neccessary for EV College acreage

The District 8 Community Round Table has begun working with our new Councilmember, Sylvia Arenas to initiate, organize and conduct a Land Use Master Planning Charrette for the Master Planning of the proposed development of the entire 27 acre plot of Evergreen Valley College land.

A charette is a meeting in which all stakeholders in a project attempt to resolve conflicts and map out solutions.

The necessity for the Land Use Master Planning Charrette is because of the San Jose City Council action last December, prior to Councilmember Arenas' swearing into office, which changed the General Plan Designation on the land from Public/Quasi Public to Neighborhood Community Commercial.

The District 8 Community Round Table very much appreciates Councilmember Arenas' willingness to reach out to the San Jose Planning Director, the developer Republic Urban, the San Jose Evergreen Community

College District and the community to make the Land Use Master Planning Charrette happen.

It is desirable that City Planning oversees and conducts the Land Use Master Planning Charrette to assure a high quality, significant community engagement experience. A charrette process facilitated by land use planning and group process professionals will foster listening, feedback and shared conclusions, and help engender mutual respect between the various stakeholders. This should result in a much better outcome for our community.

The City Council Motion required that the entire 27 acres be changed to Neighborhood Community Commercial so that the entire 27 acres could be Master Planned and this Motion reflected the request of Republic and the San Jose Evergreen Community College District for Master Planning the 27 acres.

It is important that the Evergreen community is able to visualize the entire 27 acre development plan and that is why the Planned Development Zoning and Planned Development Permit application should be submitted to the City after the Charrette occurs and at the same time for the entire 27 acres to avoid piecemeal development of the site.

The City, Republic, the San Jose Evergreen Community College District and the community are in agreement that there will be no housing on the site. The Charrette and the Master Planning for the entire 27 acres will ensure that there is no housing.

Republic and the San Jose Evergreen Community College District have stated that in addition to the proposed revenue-generating commercial land uses, the Master Plan for the entire 27 acres would incorporate numerous and significant community benefit land uses such as an Aquatic/Gym Center, an Education Center, ample open space, and playing fields.

It is important that significant community

The Second Grade Team especially found it useful to analyze students' work together. Studies show the regular assessment and feedback of students' daily work (known as formative assessments) is most impactful to teachers' instruction and students' learning. As Kathleen Vaughan says, "It's valuable having our coach, who not only facilitates our collaboration, but provides us with resources and tools we wouldn't otherwise have the time to gather and organize!"

"I'm glad my students are getting exposed to developmental assets that are essential. Our students enjoy the activities, and the teachers can collaborate at peace, knowing our students are getting valuable life lessons," Toni Wolfe.

The lessons usually involve a monthly book study covering topics such as: healthy friendships, honesty, tolerance, empathy, self-control, and more. A big goal of Project Cornerstone is to promote a caring environment at school that addresses bullying, teach students to be up-standers, and give students life skills for success.

"I try to keep the activities both fun and developmentally appropriate. Aside from reading and discussing the lesson and themes from the book-of-the-month, the activities also include: writing, poetry, creating artwork, active listening exercises, meditative breathing exercises,


and more," said Lucy Hsu.

"We carefully selected three subs who would be available every Monday. We wanted to make sure they understood our vision, valued asset-building, and are committed to forming a positive rapport with our students." She also stated.

The three substitutes stated, "We appreciate the comprehensive lesson plans and having everything prepped for us. I go in every Monday knowing that it's going to be a fun day."

Mortgage applications rise 1.5 percent, as interest rates fall to 2017 low

Investors are moving to the bond market due to geopolitical concerns causing interest rates to drop to their lowest level this year, while mortgage applications are up.

Total mortgage application volume rose 1.5 percent on a seasonally adjusted basis from the previous week. Volume was 21 percent lower than during the same week a year ago, according to the Mortgage Bankers Association.

"Mortgage rates dropped over the course of last week as global tensions increased surrounding events in the Middle East and the Korean peninsula," said Mike Fratantoni, chief economist for the MBA.

The average contract interest rate for 30-year fixed-rate mortgages with conforming loan balances (\$424,100 or less) decreased to 4.28 percent from 4.34 percent, with points increasing to 0.38 from 0.31 (including the origination fee) for 80 percent loan-to-value ratio loans. Mortgage rates took a big leap following the presidential election, and while they have since moderated, they remain higher, leaving fewer borrowers to benefit from a refinance.

Langley to use their talents, imagination and knowledge of NASA to create original artwork for the art contest entitled, "A Storied Legacy, A Soaring Future."

Panidapu said she was inspired to participate in the national contest because "not only would I be able to create something, but also I would be creating it for NASA, an inspiring organization that represents the importance of science, technology, math and engineering in our society, using it to change the world: the embodiment of what I want for my future."

Panidapu's inspiration

Panidapu explained her inspiration in creating her artwork for the NASA contest:

"Writer Henry David Thoreau once said, 'The universe is wider than our views of it.' In my art piece, I have attempted to capture an extremely small part of our universe, a part that is still enormous to us as mere human beings. From a young age, my interests have laid within two subjects, math and art. While many other kids were playing outside with their friends, I would either be scribbling out math problems or doodling on a random sheet. When I heard of this opportunity, I was inspired to participate because, not only would I be able to create something, but also I would be creating it for NASA, an inspiring organization that represents the importance of science, technology, math and engineering in our society, using it to change the world: the embodiment of what I want for my future. In my piece, I started off by creating a landscape upon which there are two children gazing at the sky through a telescope. The older girl is helping the boy by pointing out intriguing constellations and objects in the sky. I then splashed the rich pigments of a deep blue merged with various amounts of crimson with dashes of pitch black paint scattered here and there to create the midnight sky. Adding the finishing touches, I sprinkled pure white paint across the painting to represent the millions of stars, as space is vast and full of enigmas waiting to be discovered. To celebrate the 100th Anniversary of NASA Langley within my piece, I created the number 100 out of three miniature illustrations. I portrayed a rocket as the number 'One (1)' to signify the beginning of every exploration. To depict the incredibly lifechanging moment of the landing of Neil Armstrong, Edwin 'Buzz' Aldrin, and Michael Collin on July 20, 1969, I painted an astronaut looking out on the moon, creating a 'Zero (0)'. And for the last 'Zero (0)', I drew the insignia of NASA, a common sight across the globe, to weave in the purpose I was even introduced to this opportunity. To finish it off, I painted the motiva-

tional phrase, "A storied legacy... a soaring future," onto the earth background on which the children kneel upon. The beginning of the phrase, 'A storied legacy' symbolizes the incredible achievements that NASA has pioneered so far, discoveries that have led to evolutions in our modern world, and our "soaring future" represents forthcoming rapid advancements, innovation, exploration, research, a future where anything is possible as we soar across the sky into the vast unknown we call space."

Each grade had a first-secondand third-place winner, determined by a panel of NASA artists. Those winners became eligible for the grand prize, which was voted on via a nationwide online poll. The voters also determined honorable mention winners for each grade. There were 3,780 votes online from 43 states and the District of Columbia to determine the grand-prize winner.

The goal was to illustrate how NASA research and innovation pro-

pels science toward new discoveries that help generate new opportunities, technologies and ways to understand and protect our home planet.

Panidapu, who attends California Connections Academy, praised the work of NASA and expressed her appreciation for what the agency does, notably in creating this art contest to help invoke creativity in children.

"I'm grateful to be a part of this memorable milestone and the grand centennial celebration," she said.

Panidapu received certificates for her win: a NASA exploration package (posters, pens, stickers, patches and lapel pins) and her artwork will be publicly displayed at the Virginia Air and Space Center in Hampton, Virginia and at an upcoming Langley centennial exhibit at the Peninsula Fine Arts Center in Newport News, Virginia.

Panidapu enjoys playing the violin, sketching, painting and helping young kids with math and art.



African-American Military History, Woman's History Month honored at Evergreen Valley College symposium

American Military History and honoring Woman's History Month was held last month at Evergreen Valley College.

The event was sponsored by the J.E.W.L organization led by Leslie James, President and Director. The organization resides at Evergreen Valley College campus and organized the event and many other informative events each year.

According to Ms. James, the J.E.W.L. designation pays homage to her parents and in-laws, Joe, Emily, Wilson, and Leona, with parenting, struggles, strength, dedication, and faith.

The event first focused on a historical fact confirmed by many scholars that Crispus Attucks was the first person to die for freedom and independence during the American Civil War. Attucks, a runaway slave, faced British soldiers and was the first to fall in Boston. Few are aware that an African-American run-away slave was the first to give his life for freedom and independence at the start of the Revolutionary War.

Shot by British Soldiers

On March 5, 1770 a fight happened between British soldiers and colonists. Attucks faced down the British as he led the charge against them. He was a rope maker and trader and an escaped slave. Shots were fired by the British and he was hit first and died with other colonists, thus, he is considered the first to set off the Revolutionary war as a martyr. His father was believed to be a slave and his mother was believed to be a Native American woman.

Women's History Month

The Honorable Andrea Flint, Superior Court of California judge took the stage and informed and inspired those in attendance explaining her quest and journey in becoming a judge. She is one of four African American women who serve among 74 judges in the U.S. She graduated from UC Berkeley and Boalt Hall School of Law.

She was a Deputy Public Defender from 1997-2007, then from 2007-2010 she served as Supervising Attorney at the Santa Clara County Office of the Public Defender. After all of that strong experience she took on the great weight of becoming a judge.

"It was not easy to grow up in a neighborhood where I was one of very few African Americans," said Flint. She went on to discuss that at that time in Orange County, residents were still learning about diversity. She stated that one neighbor asked her mother, "How do you keep your children so clean?"...and the neighbor did not think it odd to ask such as question.

Judge Flint said, "We did not come from money, I went to public schools." She went to public elementary, junior high and high school, and then continued with public colleges Cal State Berkeley and Bolt Law School. She stated in elementary school, "There were no African American teachers." She said that she ran track, played volleyball, got involved in drama club and got along with all people and related well to all the different groups growing up while attending high school. She considered herself well versed, a group joiner and a person with many interests and talents.

"I dreamed of becoming a lawyer when I was six years old...and it just stuck! Sometimes people who were to mentor her in high school would discourage her dream of becoming a lawyer by commenting, "thinking of becoming a lawyer... that might be too hard... why not start small," but she stated, she always knew in her gut at a very early age that she would become a lawyer and a judge too. Her positive

attitude in expressing her view on life's dreams let the audience know that for her, the sky was the limit.

"Working helped me to know what I was doing and what I was working for," said Flint.

"I worked at a movie theater and sold tickets and popcorn. "In college I made ends meet with a dream job as a dorm monitor and at the same time get my studies done. Working helped me to know what I was doing and what I was working for."

As she worked diligently in the public defender's office she found that one day she was asked, "Have you ever considered becoming a judge?" It made her think, said Flint..."I was asking all the wrong questions...instead of asking why me, I should have been asking...why not me...couldn't I be as good as a judge as others?" This led her to understand she could be as good as anyone else as a judge and thus in 2010 she got a call from the Governor's office saying she was appointed to be a judge.

Judge Flint commented there are many great women and men in history to read and learn more about. She discussed Charlotte E. Ray, who in 1872 became the first Black African American female lawyer. She expressed that this female lawyer used a newspaper run by Fredrick Douglas to advertise and publish items dealing with law.

Judge Flint tied in lots of history to give a bigger picture of the way our nation is progressing forward in ensuring there are more women of color in governance. She spoke about Ruby Bridges and others. She suggested that everyone see the movie called Hidden Figures about a team of African-American women mathematicians who served a key role in helping NASA during the early years of the U.S. space program. "Be sure to go out and see that movie," Judge Flint stated.

As she concluded her presentation as a keynote speaker, she made the audience realize the steps and kind of positive attitude one must possess to succeed in making dreams come true.

The meritorious Warren Miller next took the podium and presented thought provoking insights on Black/African-American Military History. A man of knowledge selected to serve as Assistant Secretary for the U.S. Department

of Nuclear Energy, Warren Miller has an illustrious career which includes, Vietnam Veteran, childhood friend and classmate of Emmett Till, Assistant Secretary for Nuclear Energy at U.S. Department of Energy as nominated by President Obama, 27 years serving as computation physics researcher and senior administrator at Los Alamos National Laboratory, graduate of West Point Military Academy, PhD. in

Engineering Science from Northwestern University, elected Fellow of the American Nuclear Society and co-author of textbook, Computation Methods of Neutron Transport.

With an upbeat style of presentation and a jovial way of connecting with all audience members, Miller used expert presentation skills of power-point photos while pinpointing certain key areas of photos projected on the large screen with a laser pointer. The photos helped to add thousands of unsaid words with each new camera shot which emerged as he spoke on various subjects. Revelations repeat throughout Black/African American Military History which mirror our society norms.

He began to help all of the audience understand that going back to America's history from the late 1800's with comments about Marcus Garvey, it was seen that there was a "black separatist" movement of some Black people believing that Blacks should go back to Africa. This was referred to as the Black Diaspora. This same kind of tension was seen in various wars of the United States. There was always tension with regard to what some movements were with regard to Blacks serving in the military.

Displayed photos helped tell the story

He discussed many key points of Black/African-American Military History. It seemed like the depth of what he discussed could be expanded in the depth of a yearlong class for it was of such great importance. Thus, the audience got just a very interesting caption-like lecture which was of such great interest it left all with a yearning and wanting to know much more.

2,150 acre parcel in the 1970s. The investment company has filed initial permits for the \$90 million project with Santa Clara County approximately four years ago. If approved, YCS Investments must dedicate 90 percent of the land as a nature preserve. Hutcheson states, "the term used in YCS' marketing materials "nature preserve' will not be accessible to anyone in the community except the residents of the Young Ranch who can afford homes on an endangered species habitat.'

The proposal would build Young Ranch in two phases: 39 homes at first, the rest following later approval. It would need San Jose to relinquish two-thirds of the parcel to the county. The homes would lie on two-acre plots with strict landscaping rules. Homeowners would rely on septic tanks and water would come from wells or the privately owned Great Oaks Water Service.

Councilmember Sylvia Arenas responds

"Young Ranch is a project that has repeatedly earned strong opposition - including the strong opposition of city staff," said Sylvia Arenas, San Jose City Council member, District 8. "While the question is currently in front of the County Board of Supervisors, there is a city component, which is why I'm currently gathering more information and meeting with city staff, community members, and advocates. As a new councilmember, it's important for me to complete my research before taking a final position, but I do share the same concerns that our community is expressing."

'County staff reportedly believes they have a viable project here," said Hutcheson. "Whereas the city of San Jose believes the project doesn't match up to what we have in our general plan. There's a conflict of jurisdictions."

Hutcheson stated that the project is controversial due to a proposed "clustering" of two county owned properties with four city properties. This would allow transferring of lots. "This tears at the fabric of what the city is supposed to do and what the county is supposed to do," said Hutcheson. She also said that many other organizations are concerned about this proposal for it is precedent setting. (Voters previously approved Measure K for Greenbelt lines).

Several Evergreen residents attending the April 6 meeting expressed their opposition because the proposed development sets an alarming precedent and endangers sensitive hillside habitat species; scenic views, traffic safety, noise, and air quality. Animals and plants that are endangered include Tule Elk, turtles, plants, bats, etc.) Cultural resources are also impacted, with include: Ohlone graves, settlements and relics.

Hutchison said the applicant, YCS Investments, Inc., attempted a similar proposal in 2014. She said the Santa Clara County planning commission has met with the developer who also | wants to build a community center on the property.

"The applicant has also filed for a Zoning Ordinance Text Amendment to allow transfer of density from parcels located within the City's jurisdiction to parcels located within the County's jurisdiction, which would result in an additional 40 lots on County parcels," said Hutcheson. "In addition, YCS Investments has also requested a density bonus, allowable under State Law, to enable an additional nine lots on the County parcels, bringing the total of proposed lots to 70."

"The Evergreen community and residents of Santa Clara county in general, should be especially concerned about this proposed development, not only because of the potential development of 79 large units outside the long established green line, but more importantly because of its potential to unravel decades of hillside protections and preservation of green spaces," said Evergreen resident Jim Zito, who serves as a board of trustee for the Evergreen School District. "Any such development would further exacerbate traffic impacts and tax our critical services such as flood control, water and police and fire services."

Zito, who served on the San Jose Planning Commission for eight years, said the Young Ranch project "proposes to use questionable land swap and density credits to circumvent long standing preservation policy and voter approved safeguards of our

"I'm pleased the initial indication is that San Jose's Planning department has recommended denial of this project and is preserving the fundamental policies that were followed during tenure on the planning commission," said Zito. "That is to preserve the surrounding hillsides, and fully respect our Greenline policy. We knew then that any breach of this fundamental priority would open the floodgates to additional developments such as the adjacent Richmond Ranch and other hillside properties as far north as Fremont, and as far south as Gilroy."

EIR for proposed development

The 445 page Santa Clara County Planning environmental impact report of the proposed development of the Young Ranch property can be read by searching the web: "Santa Clara County Young Ranch report 2017." The report reads: "The 2,150 acre site is located southeast of downtown San Jose along Coyote Ridge, which runs along the eastern side of the Santa Clara Valley. YCS Investments, Inc. (the applicant) has submitted an application for a Cluster Sub division consisting of 30 lots and a 4.000-square foot community center on two parcels located in the unincorporated area of Santa Clara County.'

Hutcheson stated, "Those who wish to learn more about the project and its implications can contact Committee for Green Foothills or they can voice their opinion by contacting their County Supervisor (Dave Cortese is the Evergreen area County Supervisor and a representative from his office said residents can contact their office for any information, and input).

On April 24, the county Planning Commission will hold a fourth hearing on the matter to discuss whether the application complies with the general plan's vision for unincorporated development.

The closing of Warren Miller's presentation left everyone upbeat in relating the honor that Mohammed Ali displayed when he was in the prime of his boxing career. He was asked to fight in Vietnam but decided it was against his religious practices. He could easily have gone to Canada and avoided the draft but he chose instead to serve in prison. This again was during the prime of his boxing career.



Rubicon Recon Edition is a tougher Wrangler

hile many four-wheel drives have taken a turn as luxury models, the Jeep Wrangler has not lost its charm as a capable off-roader.

Although the regular Rubicon can go just about anywhere, some hardcore enthusiasts want more. They want to know they can go where no other 4-wheeler can go.

The new Wrangler Rubicon Recon aims to cater for these buyers.

Recon has a tougher underbody making it less prone to rock and tree limb damage. The front axle has been upgraded with strengthened tubes and heavy-duty end forgings, while the differentials at both ends have been covered with cast heavy-duty covers.

There is now room for gigantic off-road tires with a 4.10 ratio on both axles, while Tru-Lok locking differentials are standard as well.

The new Recon is fitted with a

six-speed manual gearbox, the car has a crawl ratio of 73.1:1 for easy rock-crawling.

Jeep has given the Recon Edition some unique exterior touches and a fresh interior trim. The car sits on a half-inch lift kit, and the new 17-inch aluminum wheels are wrapped in 32-inch BF Goodrich rubber.

The standard front bumper has been replaced with a winch-ready unit with removable end caps and exposed red tow hooks, just in case the off-road upgrades can't keep you from getting stuck.

Recon's interior is fitted with black leather seats, an eight-speaker audio system, red accents on the doors, seatbelts and door pockets, are also standard.
