From the heart of Almaden to the heart of Africa

Imaden resident Mackenzie
Mossing is on a mission to save

Mackenzie spent seven weeks with

Mackenzie spent seven weeks with the Cheetah Conservation Fund in Namibia to learn how to protect cheetahs. Now she's set her sights on protecting elephants.

While completing an undergraduate degree in Animal Science at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, Mackenzie became aware of threats affecting species and their survival. "Instead of standing by and watching endangered species disappear, I decided to take action," said Mackenzie. Her first step was completing an internship at the Cheetah Conservation Fund in 2014. She also raised \$3,000 towards saving the world's remaining 10,000 cheetahs.

Mackenzie leaves for a seven-week internship with Save the Elephants in Samburu this month. Save the Elephants conducts research on elephant behavior and ecology, and works to defend elephants against ivory poachers and traffickers, and end the demand for ivory.

"Elephants are among the most intelligent and sensitive animals on the planet, known for their strongly bonded fam-

ilies and their ability to empathize deeply with one another," says Mackenzie. "The poaching epidemic and ivory trade has been tearing these families apart, leaving behind a dwindling population. Every twenty minutes, an elephant is killed in Africa for its ivory tusks. If we do not do our part to protect these animals, they will be gone within the next few decades."

"In Kenya, in 1960, there were about 160,000 elephants," says Mackenzie's father, Chris, "and it's down to 30,000 or 40,000 now."

Mackenzie is raising funds for her trip through www.gofundme.com/gyd79xtt and hopes the community will lend their support to help secure a future for elephants.

Mackenzie developed a passion for wildlife conservation following a family trip to Kenya in 2012. "Just like it's an everyday thing here to see a deer crossing the road, there it's elephants or lions," she says. "Having seen elephants outside my tent door in Africa, I can't imagine them being gone. I'd hate to look back and tell other generations, 'Yeah we used to have elephants, but we let them die.' It's my personal mission to do something about it."



#### Renovation project earns Girl Scout Gold Award for Karlie Anderson





# Joy Barney of Almaden Valley wins national award

#### **US Forest Service's Barney inspires others for careers as land stewards**

Toy Barney of Almaden Valley has dedicated her life to connecting youth to the land working for the US Forest Service. In the process, Barney has touched many lives; so it comes as no surprise that winning a national award for her, is all about inspiring others.

The Lake Tahoe Basin Management Unit's (LTBMU) Conservation Education Program Specialist since 2007, Barney received regional and national recognition with the Gifford Pinchot Pacific Southwest Region and the National Interpreter and Conservation Educator of the Year Award for 2015. Named in honor of the first Chief of the U.S. Forest Service, the annual award is a national honor given to employees for achievement in environmental interpretation and conservation education.

"I hope that winning this award will help inspire others that I am mentoring to continue on with this kind of work," said Barney. "It is important to see that the Forest Service feels like this is important work."

"The reason this is such a big accomplishment for Joy, is that she doesn't even have interpretive services in her job description – she is a conservation education specialist," said Timothy Williams, regional coordinator for the Interpretive Services Program (conservation education specialist). "When she delivers with the conservation education program, she excels at telling the story and interpreting why it is so important to connect youth with nature."

"She is very deserving of this award and I am thrilled to get to work with her on a regular basis," said Beth Quandt, science outreach coordinator for the Lake Tahoe Unified School District "She has been

instrumental in bringing so many wonderful programs to the students of the Lake Tahoe Unified School District."

Barney, 52, always had a keen interest in wildlife or being in nature from camping trips in the summer growing up. The Almaden Valley native said that was where she felt the most whole.

After receiving a bachelor's of science degree in Wildlife and Fisheries Biology from UC Davis in 1985, Barney started her career with the Forest Service shortly thereafter as a forestry technician in silviculture. Even though she wasn't technically in a Conservation Education position, she started programs such as the Little Children's Forest in Groveland and Earth Day events on the Stanislaus National Forest. She picked up her love of interpretation on the Pinecrest Ranger District with wildflower walks, guided hikes and leading campfire programs.

At the LTBMU, Barney created a partnercalled South ship group Environmental Education Coalition (STEEC, http://www.steec.org). Under her leadership, these groups work together to provide high-quality, standards-based education programs for 2,500 children annually. Other programs she manages include Ski with a Ranger, Winter Trek and Kokanee Salmon Education, serving over 2,000 other forest visitors. In addition, Barney started a successful high school program - Generation Green of Lake Tahoe, providing volunteer and employment opportunities for diverse youth in the Lake Tahoe area. Due to the success of these programs, she expanded to the Eldorado National Forest.

"Joy's tireless energy, enthusiasm and creativity contribute greatly to the success of the conservation education program," said LTBMU Forest Supervisor Jeff Marsolais.

"She excels in creating partnerships that foster meaningful connections for students and has done a tremendous job developing engaging science programs that build opportunities for future employment.

In the process of all her work on the LTBMU, Barney has inspired others to do similar work.

"Joy has led me to my current passion and pursuit of my profession in conservation education," said Megan Dee, conservation education assistant for the LTBMU. "I would never have continued in the Forest Service without her extraordinary leadership and mentorship, which is also the case for many of the students she has worked with.

"She is an inspiration to all who work with her –partners, educators, students, parents, employees, and more. Joy and I both have consistently reminded successful Generation Green students that we aren't losing the students, but the world is gaining them. This is based on our high school model Generation Green post-graduation and post-youth summer internship. It is not just a summer job to the students; it can be life-transformational, and it is Joy who leads them to learning how to achieve, thus creating future land stewards and advantageous citizens of society."

One of Barney's mentors – Jim Oftedal, the regional outreach and recruitment and workforce diversity program manager recalls Joy providing one of her students a bicycle to get to and from work. "She took a big sister approach," said Oftedal, who helped Barney start Generation Green on the LTBMU. "That student she helped is now a permanent employee with the Forest Service.

"Joy is a giver," said Oftedal. "The Generation Green program is more than a typical 40-hour work week. She really is a special woman. I can't say enough about her. She is a very humble person. She has a wonderful smile and I am happy for her. She deserves this award."

"If I was independently wealthy, I would still do this job," said Barney.

Barney has been married to her husband, Paul since 1991. They have an 18-year old daughter Jera who Barney says "has had to share me with my generation green students." When she does get some spare time, she and her husband like to go sailing in Monterey and up as far as Canada.

### 'Pension poaching' scams targeting military veteran seniors, survivors

has issued a consumer alert regarding scams targeting California seniors who served in the military and their sur-

dinary sacrifices to keep our nation safe and uphold our most sacred values and freedoms," said Attorney General Harris. "Sadly, many of our senior veterans are

to take advantage of them for a quick profit.

These reported "pension poaching" scams prey on veterans and target the financial assistance offered through the Veterans Administration Aid and Attendance Program, which provides pension benefits to financially disadvantaged wartime veterans and their survivors over 65 years of age.

Specifically, pension poaching scams involve unscrupulous insurance agents and their representatives posing as unpaid volunteers or accredited VA representatives who offer to help seniors apply for VA pension benefits. These insurance agents and their rep-

resentatives lure seniors into buying an annuity or setting up an irrevocable trust to create a false appearance of financial hardship by attempting to conceal the senior's assets.

Insurance agents and their representatives charge high fees for these services, including undisclosed sales commissions that are paid to the purported volunteer. Targeted seniors may not be fully aware of the consequences of moving their assets into an annuity or irrevocable trust, such as strict withdrawal limitations leaving them without access to funds they may actually need for their care.

Although a VA pension benefits application based on false financial need may be successful, those who receive this benefit may face significant financial and legal con-

> sequences if the concealed funds are discovered, including repayment of benefit amounts received.

> Seniors who receive other VA or government-sponsored benefits that require disclosure of funds held in annuities and irrevocable trusts are especially vulnerable to reversal of their VA pension benefit.



### Living trusts: an out-of-state trustee may work in your situation

This week's question:

My wife and I are in the process of setting up our living trust. We would like to name our son, Jack, as Successor Trustee after we

are gone, but he lives in Florida. We live here in Almaden. Can we list Jack as our Successor Trustee? (His sister may be very unhappy about that.)

Dear Henry:

You have emailed in a very good question, Henry. And I might add that this is a very important topic—the selection of a Successor Trustee after you and your wife are gone.

Since you have indicated that you and your wife live in Almaden, the "principal place of administration" of the trust is right here in Santa Clara County. Of course, you could move to another city which

move to another city which might well change things, but, for the time being, the "location" or "situs" of the trust is here.

Assuming that your son in Florida agrees to serve as Successor Trustee after you and your wife are gone, it seems to me that there is no problem with him serving as Successor Trustee.

California Probate Code §17003(a) states that: "By accepting the trusteeship of a trust having its principal place of administration in this state the trustee submits personally to the jurisdiction of the court under this division."

And subsection (b) of the above section states that: "To the extent of their interests in the trust, all beneficiaries of a trust having its principal place of administration in this state are subject to the jurisdiction of the court under this division."

Almaden Times readers can read the above provisions for themselves by heading to their computer and entering the quoted California Probate code provisions in their system.

Related provisions are also interesting, such as California Probate §17000 that provides: "Subject matter jurisdiction. (a) The superior court having jurisdiction over the

trust pursuant to this part has exclusive jurisdiction of proceedings concerning the internal affairs of trusts."

And subsection (b) of §17000 states that the superior court having jurisdiction over the trust pursuant to this part has concurrent jurisdiction of the following:

Actions and proceedings to determine the existence of trusts.

Actions and proceedings by or against creditors or debtors of trusts.

Other actions and proceedings involving trustees and third persons.

So, Henry, it seems to me that you can see that you and your wife have every right to name your son as Successor Trustee of your family living trust after you and your wife are gone, even if he lives in Florida. Of course, he might have a problem in "moving" the trust to Florida, since Santa Clara County would have been the principal place of adminis-

tration of the trust.

And it seems to me that even though his sister might be unhappy with him serving as Successor Trustee, there is not much she can do about it, all other things being normal. We are assuming that your son would be a good Successor Trustee, but merely being a non-resident of California is probably not a disqualifying factor.

By the way, if you have your computer on and are reviewing some of these provisions anyway, §17200 is very interesting when it talks about "Proceedings Concerning Trusts". One can see a long list of various issues that are properly brought by trustees of trusts to the attention of the court.

And if you would like to see our Superior Court in action involving trusts, you could visit the Superior Court at 191 North First Street, San Jose, for yourself. Department 10, fourth floor, at present typically hears proceedings involving trusts most days of the week and the proceedings are open to the public.

That department may also be hearing other types of cases as well, such as probate cases, guardianships, conservatorships, and other types of cases. Although cases can be

a bit tedious at times, I think you will agree that we have an excellent system of justice.

Thank you for your question, Henry, and

keep up the good work in getting that living trust done for you and your wife. Your family will appreciate it very much.

# VTA January 2016 Fare Program Modifications

#### When will Day Passes change?

Effective 1/1/2016, Day Passes will generally only be available for customers using Clipper®; riders will no longer be able to purchase a Day Pass from bus fareboxes or at light rail ticket vending machines.



Paper Day Passes will continue to be issued only for riders using Day Pass Tokens distributed through public agencies and social services.

#### What is Clipper®?

Clipper is the all-in-one transit card for the Bay Area. Besides VTA, transit agencies accepting Clipper cards include BART, Caltrain, AC Transit, Muni and others. For a complete listing go to www.ClipperCard.com.

#### Where can I obtain a Clipper Card?

During a limited period of time and while supplies lasts, a limited number of Clipper cards will be distributed without charge during VTA Community Outreach activities at various cities and at the VTA Downtown Customer Service Center and River Oaks Administrative Office Lobby.

#### How does the Clipper Card Accumulator Feature work?

A Clipper user's fares will accumulate for that day up to the Day Pass amount, then once reached the Clipper user may continue to ride with no additional fare charges for the remainder of the day.

By having a daily fare cap, there is no longer a need to stop at a ticket vending machine or feed cash into a bus farebox. Just tap the Clipper card once for every ride.

molded by a fierce love for animals, both domestic and wild. When she was younger, she would operate on her stuffed animals and dreamed of becoming a veterinarian. Her focus shifted during college when she realized that although many people want to become veterinarians, relatively few dedicate their lives to saving wildlife.

Helping animals runs in Mackenzie's family. Her mother, Pam, volunteers at an animal care center and fosters dogs for rescue groups. "If I can find a way to secure a home for a dog that really needs one, I feel fulfilled," she says. "Dogs and cats round out a human's life; they're an important part of the family."

Chris is a strong supporter of wildlife conservation. At a Wildlife Conservation Network Expo, he learned about the Cheetah Conservation Fund and met its founder, Dr. Laurie Marker, a Leland High School graduate. Hearing about Mackenzie, Marker encouraged Chris to have her apply for an internship, and it changed the course of her life.

Soon, Mackenzie was working with orphaned or injured cheetahs in captivity, and tracking those in the field. As she had experience with animal husbandry from working at a wildlife rescue center in San Luis Obispo, she helped care for 40 cheetahs in captivity, making sure the ones to be released were learning how to hunt.

"My favorite part of the trip was going out

with radio telemetry equipment and tracking the wild cheetahs," she says. "You literally have a stick for protection between you and the cheetah. We would check their body condition to determine if the cheetah was hunting okay and getting water, and see if she made a den and had babies, and was interacting with other cheetahs and record the data. If they were thin, we'd bring them meat, or note if they killed an antelope."

She also compiled a spreadsheet covering 20 years of 'rewilded' cheetahs, including their territory range, kills during the rainy season, and both male and female interaction. "I wanted to learn as much as I could," she says, "and I'm proud of what I took from that experience. Ever since, I've been itching to go back. I just loved it there so much."

In October, Mackenzie attended the Wildlife Conservation Network Expo with her parents and met leading conservationists, including Dr. Iain Douglas-Hamilton, the founder of Save the Elephants, who encouraged her to apply for an internship. "The speeches the conservationists give about their work are so compelling you want to cry, or get excited, and just do something," she says.

"Mackenzie's always been an animal lover," says Pam. "We lived in England for seven years and bought our daughters two guinea pigs. At a year-old, Mackenzie was carrying them around, and caring for them, so I knew she had a passion for animals even then." Through the years, they've had dogs, cats, a turtle, hamsters, goldfish, and a horse. "Mackenzie always wanted animals to be a part of her life," says Pam, "and I've always encouraged it."

"I was the one who would convince my parents we needed another dog or cat," says Mackenzie. She currently has two kittens: Bo and Lennon, as well as Emma, an Australian Shepherd, and a red paint horse named Rascal.

At age 10, Mackenzie convinced her parents to let her lease Rascal. "Even on cold, stormy nights, she was determined to take care of the horse, cleaning out the stall, and

grooming him," says Chris. "With kids, you try things like piano lessons, but with that horse, I could see it was something she really wanted to do."

She ended up buying him, and has had him for 11 years. "He's 29 now, and not rideable, but I'm devoted to him," she says. "I pinch my money for grain or blankets; I care more about buying them than my own clothes. Horses teach you about responsibility and hard work, but it's all worthwhile. Rascal's been there for me during my hardest times in life, and I'm repaying the favor."

Mackenzie got her first taste of animal husbandry with Conservation Ambassadors. After they attended a Cal Poly Vet Club meeting with a beaver, fox, and other rescued animals, she knew she had to work with them. Mackenzie secured a summer internship with them and soon lived in their provided housing with kangaroos hopping around the yard. She spent her summer working 50 to 60 hours a week in 100 degree heat caring for about 200 animals, but she still enjoyed it. After the summer, she was hired as a staff member.

"Most of the animals came from illegal confiscations," she says, "like a monkey who was thrown away in a dumpster." They had a tiger, bears, mountain lions, birds of prey, including eagles with shattered wings, orphaned raccoons, servals, macaws, and reptiles. Mackenzie says she became close with the animals, and especially those used for education. "We went to schools and brought endangered species like lemurs with us. Our philosophy was that people are more

Continued from previous page likely to want to protect animals they have personal connections with.

Before working there. Mackenzie wanted to be a horse veterinarian. "Within a few months, I saw that there was a whole other world I hadn't even explored," she says, "and animals I didn't know existed that needed help." She learned how to care for animals in captivity, what their lives are like in the wild, and why people need to protect them. "It completely changed my career goals," she says.

Recently, Mackenzie did an internship with Wildlife Center of Silicon Valley, caring for animals that are triaged and released like squirrels, possums and birds of prey. She also released squirrels and doves back into the areas they

were found.

"The world's in desperate need of people who are willing to dedicate their lives to saving what remains of Earth's wilderness... and our wildlife," she says, "so that generations to come can also appreciate their beauty...before they're lost forever."


Mackenzie hopes to learn more about conservation research and education, reducing human/elephant conflict, and methods for battling poaching. "It will be nice to work with people who have the same interests I do," she says.

"I hope she finds work that's fulfilling," says Pam, "and helps to save these creatures, which are on the verge of extinction."

"It's intrinsically satisfying doing something that makes your heart sing," says Mackenzie. "In the end, you'll feel the most rewarded by seeing the positive changes you can make in the




