





KASSAB **EMBRACES** ROLE AS **INDUCTION** WEEKEND INTERPRETER

CANASTOTA, N.Y. >> Dr. Juan Kassab grew up in Miami, Florida watching boxers like Sugar Ray Leonard compete in the ring. Resettling over 1,000 miles north has given him the chance to count many of those fighters as his friends.

Kassab, who runs Smile Solutions a dental practice in Canastota – with his wife Dorothy, has also served as the Spanish interpreter during the International Boxing Hall of Fame's Induction Weekend for the past 15 years.

Born to Cuban parents, Kassab spoke only Spanish until he was five years old. He moved to Central New York after obtaining his Doctor of Dental Medicine degree from Tufts University in Boston in 1992 and started acting as the IBHOF interpreter after one of his patients recommended him.

"I was the only guy in town who spoke Spanish, I guess," he said with a laugh. "So I did it and I had a blast."


Kassab didn't have any previous experience as an interpreter but said it wasn't hard to do. One challenge he faced early on was learning different sayings that



are popular in different countries, but he said that has gotten easier throughout the vears. Throughout the weekend. Kassab goes around with the Spanish-speaking boxers and interprets for them during interviews and also during Sunday's induction speeches. He also volunteers for the IBHOF in other ways. Kassab has previously gone to the airport to pick up boxers and also helps out each year with the fist casting, which is done using dental materials.

It's through interpreting, however, that Kassab has developed relationships with many of the boxers who return to Canastota vear after year.

"In general, the best part is just having met all these boxers through interpreting, even the non-Spanish speaking ones," he said. "Having other Spanish-speaking boxers speaking with them through me, that's allowed me to get to know all the boxers on a personal level.

Lorenzo's favorite boxer is Micky Ward, a fan favorite who returns to Canastota each June. Kassab said he's known Ward for years. making it easy to introduce his son to his idol. It's an experience he enjoys seeing fans have vear in and vear out.

"The best part of the weekend is seeing all the fans trying to get these boxers' autographs and get their pictures and so on and so forth," said Kassab, "It's still so awesome to see all these people come from different parts of the country to meet these guys. I'm fortunate to know them and know them well."

Marco Antonio Barrera The Baby Faced Assassin"

Born January 17, 1974 in Mexico City, Mexico. A five-time Mexican national champion, Barrera posted a 56-4 amateur record before turning pro in 1989 at age 15 and won his first 43 houts

He won the NABE super flyweight title before capturing world championships in three weiaht divisions. In 1995 Barrera won the WBO super bantamweight title with a 12-round win over Daniel Jimenez and successfully defended it eight times. He lost the crown to Junior Jones in 1996 (DO 5) but rebounded to capture the vacant WBO belt from Richie Wenton in 1998 (TKO 3). Barrera lost the crown to Erik Morales (L 12) in 2000 but remained champion as Morales refused the belt. He defended three times before vacating to go up to featherweight to defeat Naseem Hamed (W 12) in 2001. He defeated Morales (W 12) in a 2002 rematch for the WBC featherweight title, but refused the title. Three wins preceded the 2004 rubber match with Morales (W 12) for the

WBC super featherweight belt. He added the IBF title in a unification bout with Robbie Peden (W 12) in 2005. Barrera lost the WBC title to Juan Manuel Marguez (L12) in 2007.

The versatile boxer/puncher boxed sporadically before retiring in 2011 with a record of 67-7 (44 KOs). Barrera is now an analyst for TV Azteca.

Evander Holyfield "The Real Deal"

Born Oct. 19, 1962 in Atmore, Georgia. Holyfield capped his 160-14 (75 KOs) amateur career with a bronze medal at the 1984 Olympic Games and turned pro that year at Madison Square Garden.

In only his 12th fight, he defeated Dwight Qawi (W 15) for the WBA cruiserweight title and became unified champion with wins over

IBF champion Rickey Parkev (TKO 3) and WBC champion Carlos DeLeon (TKO 8). Holyfield set his sights on the heavyweight title and got his chance in a 1990 WBC / WBA/ IBF championship fight with "Buster" Douglas, which he won via 3rd round knockout. He lost the titles to Riddick Bowe in 1992 but regained the WBA/ IBF belts in the infamous "Fan Man" 1993 rematch. He dropped the titles to Michael Moorer (L 12) in 1994 and met Bowe in a 1995 rubber match (TKO 8). In 1996 he upset Mike Tyson (TKO 11) for the WBA title and won the rematch (DO 3) the next vear. He added the IBF strap with a rematch win over Moorer (TKO 8) in 1997. After unification bouts (D 12, L 12) with Lennox Lewis in 1999, he boxed a trilogy with John Ruiz that saw him win. lose and draw in 12-round WBA title bouts in 2000

"The Real Deal" continued to box until 2011, compiling a record of 44-10-2 (29 KOs).

and 2001.

Johnny Tapia "Mi Vida Loca"

Born Feb. 13, 1967 in Albuguergue, New Mexico. Tapia, who learned to box from his grandfather, compiled an impressive 101-21 (65 KOs) amateur record. He turned pro in 1988 and captured the USBA and NABF super flyweight titles before stopping Henry Martinez via 11th

round TKO in 1994 for the vacant WBO super flyweight crown in front of a raucous hometown crowd. He successfully defended the helt 13 times and added the IBF belt with a 12-round win over hometown rival Danny Romero in 1997. After two successful unified title defenses. Tapia vacated the belts to campaign as a bantamweight and captured the WBA strap with a 12-round win over Nana Konadu (W 12) in 1998. He lost for the first time when he dropped the belt to Paulie Ayala (L 12) in 1999's "Fight of the Year." Tapia won the WBO bantamweight title in 2000 by defeating Jorge Julio (W 12) and became a three-division world champion with a 12-round decision over Manuel Medina for the IBF featherweight championship in 2002. Known for his passionate fighting style and celebratory post-win back flip, the fan-friendly Tapia retired in 2011 following a win over Mauricio Pastrana (W 8) with a pro record of 59-5-2 (30 KOs). On May 27, 2012, Tapia died from heart problems

amateur titles there. in 1935 soon after relocating to San Francisco and remained there throughout his career. He would go on to meet the best at welterweight. middleweight and light heavyweight and won both the California welterweight and middleweight championships, retiring in 1944 due to a detached retina in 1944. One of the most talented and popular fighters of his era, Booker was never stopped in his career despite the high caliber of opposition he met. stands at 66-5-8 (32 KOs). Booker died in San Francisco on January 26, 1975 at age 57. **NON-PARTICIPANT** in Albuquerque at age 45.
