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Warm Weather Attire For The Groom And Attendants

Weddings are a time to get dolled up. Though some gentlemen may be tempted to wear the suit they wear to work, a formal event necessitates something a bit more remarkable. When the weather is warm, some men may scoff at the idea of wearing a full suit or even a tuxedo. But just because a person is wearing pants and a jacket doesn't mean the suit must be dark and heavy.

Although dark colors are traditional for weddings, dark, heavy fabrics will absorb the sun's rays, making the groom and his groomsmen uncomfortable. Even when a warm-weather wedding takes place largely indoors where it is climate controlled, many couples

choose to have the ceremony outdoors, where they pose for photographs as well. The groom and his groomsmen will want to be comfortable during these times, and the right suit and fabric can make all the difference.

Linen and cotton are all-natural fabrics that are made from plant fibers. They are much lighter weight than wool, and linen and cotton suits may be more comfortable. But linen and cotton are highly prone to wrinkling, and a wrinkled suit will not present well in a formal setting. Cotton and linen may be best reserved for informal weddings or those that will be taking place outdoors or beachside. Seersucker suits

are made from cotton in a unique weaving pattern that lets air ventilate through the material. Seersucker suits may be most popular in the southeastern United States, but they can be worn anywhere the weather is warm.

A khaki suit or a tan one may work better if the wedding is more formal. The suit should fit well and be tailored appropriately. Sharp creases in the pants and a crisp shirt and tie can complete the look. If the groomsmen are in coordinating suits, a tan or khaki color will not look out of place. If a full suit still feels too stiff, a nice blazer paired with a complementary colored trouser may be appropriate for a less formal affair.

Some grooms want to err on the side of caution and stick with a classic suit or tuxedo. In such instances, grooms may want to investigate lighter weight wools. Grooms wearing a tuxedo may want to choose a white tuxedo. A white tuxedo will look pristine and fit with a formal theme. And the white will reflect the sun and be cooler without looking casual.

Dressing for a warm weather wedding may require a bit of ingenuity on the part of the groom. There are different fabrics and styles of suit available to present plenty of wardrobe options. © Metro Creative Connection









Did you know?

The timing of when a couple cuts the wedding cake can have a specific meaning. Long ago, the cake was usually cut at the very end of the reception and would signal to the guests that it was the end of the festivities. Today, cutting the cake is an unspoken signal that represents that the formal wedding is nearing a close, and guests who would like to leave can do so without worry of being rude. Many couples will cut the cake right after dinner as a courtesy to older guests who may want to get started on their trips home. This affords them the chance to make an earlier exit, rather than staying through the dancing that could extend into the wee hours of the night or missing the cake entirely. Cutting the cake mid-reception also serves another practical purpose for couples who are paying a photographer by the hour. Photographers typically go home after the cake-cutting, so a mid-reception cutting can save couples a substantial amount of money. © Metro Creative Connection
































In an era when many Americans are waiting until their thirties to get married, the thought of getting married as a teenager is extraordinary.

Joe and Sylvia Jennings grew up in Wisconsin and started dating in 1961, when Sylvia was 15 and Joe was 17 years old. Their courtship lasted a year, but they knew at 6 weeks of their future life together. "Our parents had to sign the marriage license because we weren't of age. We just knew it was right," recalls Sylvia. They took a short time to plan their wedding. Sylvia recalls, "We had to get married before deer hunting season because the priest and my dad were going deer hunting."

Sylvia purchased her taffeta and lace wedding gown at nearby Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, for \$90 and the veil and crown was \$16. "That was my limit to spend," says Sylvia with a grin.

The wedding was held at 10:00am on November 10, 1962, and continued to be a beautiful 50° day. It was a large Catholic mass with 300 guests and the reception was held from 2:00 to 4:00pm at the Moose Hall (where Sylvia's father

was a member). Sylvia had two attendants, her sister as maid of honor and cousin as bridesmaid. Joe also had two attendants, his brother in law and Sylvia's brother. There was not a dance or honeymoon following the ceremony.

Sylvia grew up in Bloomer, Wisconsin, where her father owned a gas station.

He would let Joe use his tools to work on his car at the service station and gain experience in car mechanics which has become his lifelong career. Joe, through the years, has continued to learn and keep up-to-date with changes in the car mechanics industry.

After the wedding, Joe worked at a Standard station in Chippewa Falls, for \$50/week. After a couple of months they moved to Kenosha, Wisconsin, where Joe worked at American Motor Co.

In 1970, Joe read in the classified section of the Des Moines Register of a "service station for lease in the Iowa Great Lakes". They had never heard of this place before, so they looked it up on the map. Two weeks later, Joe and Sylvia were making the move to Spirit Lake, Iowa, after leasing the Texaco

station (across from Stoller Fisheries). At this time, they had four children, Julie, Rick, Tony and Joe Jr. After leasing the land at that location for 11 years, the Jennings purchased the DOT land across the street where Jennings Tow & Repair now stands. The service department was kept in the original location until 1984 when the existing building was built to house the gas and service station combined. In 1990, Jennings Auto Parts opened in the original DOT building adjacent to the station.

As Joe and Sylvia reflect on their 52 years of marriage, along with their bold decision to marry young, they simply say, " It worked for us. We've worked side by side since 1970. Our kids have grown up in the gas station and now the three boys, Rick, Tony and Joe Jr. and one grandson work in our business with us. I don't believe we would do it any different."

Joe and Sylvia love to spend time with their family including seven grandchildren. They also love to

go on vacations and attend wrecker shows around the country, "We have the same interests and just like to hang out together."

And 52 years later, their adventures continue...

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
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How To Throw A Successful Outdoor Wedding

right, and a growing number of couples are exchanging vows amid an expansive garden

or with the splendor of the pounding surf providing a picturesque backdrop. If Mother Nature cooperates, outdoor weddings can go smoothly. But even if the weather does not cooperate, there still are ways couples can enjoy a memorable ceremony.

Preparation and planning help keep outdoor weddings moving along. Weather can be unpredictable and unforgiving, so it is always best to account for various scenarios. The following are some tips to consider.

* Be mindful of hot

weather. Many outdoor weddings occur when temperatures are at their warmest. As anyone who has had to sit outdoors in the blazing sun for an extended period of time can attest, it can grow quite uncomfortable, especially when everyone is dressed to the nines. Advise guests in advance that the wedding will be taking place outdoors and to dress accordingly. Arrange to have shaded areas for guests who may struggle with the heat. Keep chilled bottled water nearby so guests can stay cool and refreshed. Ask the officiant to keep the ceremony brief so that guests are not melting away in their seats.

* Keep wind in mind. A stiff breeze can upset tents and wreak havoc on hairstyles. Be sure everything outdoors is properly secured and weighted down. Avoid light fabrics on a wedding gown that will get swept away by wind. A short, blusher veil may be more appropriate than a sweeping train. Couples should advise their hairstylists that they will be getting married outdoors, and looks should be well secured by bobby pins and gel to keep hair in place. Stick to real dishes for food service, as plastic or lightweight materials may get blown away.

Check for power sources. Choose wedding location with easily accessible power outlets. Guests will certainly want to hear the vows, and that may require the use of microphones and a sound system. Having power available also makes it easier for bands and musicians to set up their equipment for an outdoor reception. If the wedding will be stretching into the evening hours, electricity will be needed to power supplemental lighting that illuminates the festivities.

* Ensure accessibility. Outdoor terrain can prove tricky, especially for older guests

Outdoor weddings are romantic when done or those with mobility issues. When scouting locations, select a wheelchair-accessible spot that can be easily traversed. Understand that

turf can become waterlogged and challenging to walk over should it rain the day of the wedding or prior. Plastic or fabric runners may make things easier. Also, choose a location that isn't too far off the beaten path. It should be close enough to a parking lot and not require guests to have to take an extended hike through nature.

* Face away from the sun. Glares can make it difficult for guests to see the ceremony. Be sure to arrange seats so that guests do not have to look into the sun.

This is best achieved by having the sun behind everyone for the ceremony. It also ensures that you won't end up with washed-out photos or pictures of everyone squinting.

* Ensure food is properly chilled or heated. Dining outdoors means keeping food safety in mind. Food that is supposed to be kept cool should remain on ice or be refrigerated until served. Hot foods should remain hot. Food in chafing dishes or served buffet-style also should be protected from insects. Improper handling of food can result in foodborne illnesses. No one wants to remember a wedding for intestinal discomfort.

* Use fresh flowers in potted plants. Cut flowers tend to wilt prematurely in hot weather. Rather than waste money and beautiful flowers, choose potted plants that will thrive if well-tended. Guests can then take the plants home and continue to cherish the wedding long after it is over.

* Budget for a tent. It is always better to have a contingency plan. Even if you have your heart set on an outdoor wedding, have a backup plan in place if the weather is uncooperative. A tent with surrounding sidewalls may be sufficient. Otherwise, determine if there is an indoor location that can be kept on standby.


* Mix up the candles. Intersperse citronella candles with the decorative ones to help keep bugs at bay. You can also consider placing small bottles of insect repellent on the tables. Guests will appreciate the gesture when biting flies or mosquitoes want to join in the fun.
