Pedestrian walk way and bike tunnel to be built at Almaden Lake Park under Coleman Road

By William Bellou Publisher Ore than a million dollars will be allocated to build a pedestrian and bike crossing beneath Coleman Road on the west end of Almaden Lake Park.


The City Council approved the \$1.1M project during its June 6 meeting. The project is being funded by the city park trust and a grant from the Santa Clara Valley Water District.

Starting at the Almaden Lake parking lot, the project includes the construction of a 600-foot-long, 12-footwide asphalt concrete trail that passes under Coleman along the west bank of Lake Almaden. The trail ends at the Almaden Expressway and Coleman intersection.

This project was proposed during San Jose City Councilmember Johnny Khamis' first year on the city council. "I am excited to create an opportunity for residents to access Almaden Lake Park without having to cross the busy Coleman Avenue and Almaden Expressway intersection."

Currently, pedestrians travel north on Almaden Expressway to the Guadalupe River Trail on the east side of the lake.

Construction is scheduled to start the first week of July and is expected to be completed near the end of 2017.

Victory Ranch, a 501(c)3 nonprofit, serves children receiving social services and counseling, with behavioral or psychological disorders, or awaiting adoption or foster parents. Hutten's Kids and Horses Education Program is a 5-week/10-session program designed to improve self-confidence, social and communication skills, personal achievement and teamwork. Program graduates, known as Buckaroos, often return as volunteers, demonstrating newly acquired self-esteem and leadership skills while taking on more responsibilities.

"Being involved with the horses and getting to work with them is really fun," says volunteer Kate Mallison. "Getting to see kids light up and come out of their shells when they're around horses is really cool. The program is a great way to make riding available to people it might not be available to, and just having a connection with horses is really special."

Sophia Larocca, who has volunteered at the ranch for more than a year, says that Hutten has taught her everything she knows about horses from behavior to tacking. "Every day I learn something new," she says. "You never stop learning with horses." Larocca has witnessed the children's growth through the program.


"Kids come here shy and scared of the horses," she says. "Horses are such big animals and they're so little... but they warm up to you and the horses, See VICTORY, page 19





Almaden AAA Cubs Little League wins District 12 Tournament of Champions

Cubs defeat Lincoln Glen and Saratoga in the championship game

he Almaden AAA Cubs capped off an amazing

L season by decisively winning the Minor League California District 12 Tournament of Champions (TOC).

The Cubs, 13-3 in the regular season, defeated the Giants, Tigers and Astros in the Almaden playoffs to earn the birth into the TOC.

The TOC features the best team from every little league in District 12, and as the host, all the games were played at the Almaden Little League baseball fields at Greystone Park.

The first TOC game featured the battle for Almaden supremacy when the Cubs defeated the Almaden D-Backs 5-2 in a tight contest. The Cubs then demolished Lincoln Glen 14-1 and soundly defeated Saratoga 9-3 in the championship game.

Playoff highlights included commanding pitching performances from the Cubs Ace, Kyle Jackson, who had three wins with a 2.47 ERA and 15 strikeouts.

Riley Coddington also pitched incredibly well with a playoff ERA of 0.00 and 15 strikeouts. The dominant pitching staff got support from the

amazing catching crew of Noah Smith and Robert Zettler, who combined, allowed only one passed ball during the threegame TOC. And they were backed by a solid defense which was anchored by Alex Aguerria and Chris Contini. Thad Woodley, Donovan Haynes and Dreyton Johnson all made important put outs to stop the other team from scoring at crucial times during games while Eric Park, Aidan Johnson played key roles on defense.

The offense was fueled by great hitting up and down the lineup including six players with batting averages over 500 featuring Coddington (.636) and Jackson (.500) plus Jack Blozan (.692), Chris Contini (.538), Alex Aguerria (.588) and Dreyton Johnson (.545).

"We were blessed with a dedicated group of boys who were willing to put in the hard work it takes to succeed," said Pete Contini, Manager of the Cubs. Reminder: Fireworks are illegal in San Jose

The San Jose Police Department is reminding residents that the use of any fireworks within the San Jose's city limits is illegal.

Officers will be proactively patrolling neighborhoods to enforce all laws against the use of fireworks, including locations that in the past have been focal points of large-scale fireworks.

The fireworks ban applies to all types of fireworks, including large bottle rockets, roman candles, firecrackers, even 'spark-

The San Jose Police Department is reminding residents that the use of children.

Sparklers can reach over 1,000 degrees Fahrenheit. They account for 50 percent of fireworks-related injuries to children under the age of five and 10 percent of fireworks-related injuries overall.

Nationally, there are twice the number of fires during July's fireworks use and thousands of injuries, particularly for children ages five to 14.

Last year, the City Council approved

higher fines for the sale, use, possession, or storage of fireworks. The fines for fireworks-related violations are \$500 for a first violation, \$700 for a second violation, and \$1,000 for a third violation.

The city increases its enforcement efforts during the 4th of July holiday.

Special to the Times or those of you who have had trouble keeping up on all of the action at City Council I thought action at City Council, I thought you might want to know about some of the things we have approved recently. First up is the annual budget.

The new Fiscal Year begins on July 1 and after several months of community input that followed the Mayor's March Budget Message, Mayor Liccardo put forth his June Budget

Message, laying out a \$3.2 billion spending plan for the City, which was approved unanimously. This becomes the spending plan for July 1, 2017-June 30. 2018. I am happy to report that the message got us very close to the goal of \$75 million that I sought for pavement maintenance, with \$74 million committed to paving and sealing City streets.

The plan also sets aside \$2 million to begin the process of planning for the

widening of Branham Lane between Snell Avenue and Vistapark Drive to make the width consistent with Branham on the other side of Snell. I have been advocating for safety improvements for this area given the 161 accidents that have happened along this stretch of road through January 2017.

Housing, at Gallup Drive and Mesa Drive. I've requested that any development include a much-needed community room for the residents of the Hoffman-Via Monte neighborhood.

The City Council approved the Guadalupe River Trail Master Plan and environmental clearance to allow for the development of a continuous recre-

ational and bicycle commute trail from Almaden to downtown, connecting the Los Alamitos Trail to the Guadalupe Trail. I worked with the Parks Department on this project throughout my first term and gained support from then-Councilmember Liccardo, then-Councilmember Oliverio. and Councilmember Rocha to fund the development of the Master Plan. The Council also approved the Coleman Avenue undercrossing that will com-

plete the path for a full circuit around Almaden Lake, and for connecting to the Guadalupe River trail system without having to cross at the busy Coleman and Almaden Expressway intersection


In a public-safety-related action I brought forward, the Council voted to support State legislation to change how former prisoners that are on supervised release are treated after they violate their parole the third time, AB 1408 (Calderon). This legisla-

tion is supported by law enforcement and victim's rights groups and gives police and prosecutors new tools to combat crimes by repeat offenders. AB 1408 has passed the State Assembly and is awaiting action in the State Senate. I encourage you to contact your State Senator if you'd like to encourage the passage of AB 1408.

Finally, action was taken by the City Council to approve a "smart" streetlights project to convert 1,000 streetlights to LED. A Council majority approved this project, but I could not, in good conscience, support a project using controller units that could collect video or audio data on residents unless we first have a data privacy policy in place. I will continue to advocate for a data privacy policy at upcoming opportunities.

It's been a busy year at City Council, but a very rewarding one,

with projects that I've been working on since I began serving as your Councilmember finally moving forward! For some of these items, like trail connections, approval of a plan by the City Council is just the starting point. I ask you to remain engaged to ensure that these long-term projects make it across the finish line.



Luxury home sales in Silicon Valley rise in May


The Silicon Valley luxury home market saw a gain in total sales in May year-over-year and a gain in the average sales price from last month, according to a new report by Coldwell Banker Residential Brokerage.

Total sales in May totaled 785 residential properties priced \$1 million and higher, a 14 percent increase from 688 sales in May 2016.

The median price for luxury properties sold in May rose to \$1,475,000 from \$1,450,000, an increase of 1.7 percent. The data is based on sales transactions recorded in Santa Clara County by the Multiple Listing Service.

"The Silicon Valley housing market continued an upward trend throughout the month of May with no signs of slowing down," said Mike James, president of Coldwell Banker Residential Brokerage. "Not only are luxury homes selling at a higher volume, but they're selling for well above asking price and in an even shorter time frame compared to this time last year."

Sales in the upper end of the market also experienced gains. Of the luxury home sales in May, 67 were of homes priced \$3 million and higher, compared to 62 a year ago.





Gift and estate tax laws explained

By Steven R. Roeser, Esq. Special to the Times This Week's Question: "I am considering getting an estate plan in place, but I am dazed and confused by the current gift and estate tax laws. Can

you help me understand the current gift and estate tax laws?"

> Michael G., Almaden Valley

Answer: Many are speculating that our current President will eventually eliminate estate taxes at the Federal level entirely, which would result in the wealthy passing along all of their assets without paying any Federal estate tax. I for one do not believe that will happen, but who knows! Nearly all of our

United States population falls into the category of having under \$5,500,000 in assets, or twice that amount if married, which represents the permissible exemption amounts under current Federal Law (as further discussed below). Most all of us would also rather give our assets to our children, grandchildren, etc. when we (along with our spouses) are gone, rather than having it go to good old Uncle Sam. With some planning, you can maximize what goes to your chosen heirs, and minimize what Uncle Sam keeps for

the privilege of living in the United States ... and it is indeed a privilege to live in this great country, which we should always remember in celebrating the 4th of July. A big thank you to all that serve our country to maintain our freedoms.

You make this country what it is.

Now, let's have a look at the basics of federal estate and gift tax planning. California does not have any estate tax or filing requirements (it was repealed) with rare exceptions, so this article addresses federal estate and tax laws only.

To put it simply, when you die, your estate will have to pay estate taxes if the net value of the estate (assets minus debts) is more than the permissible exemption

amount for the applicable year. For 2017, the individual federal estate tax exemption is \$5.49 million per person (it generally increases each year with inflation). meaning every dollar over the exempt amount of 5.49 million is taxed at forty


While you may be thinking hey, I am well under the exemption amount, so I have no worries, the laws could change and exemption amounts reduced, but more so, your assets are likely to grow See ASK THE LAWYER, page 16

substantially in value before your death. In Silicon Valley, this is all the more true, where small properties cost millions and appreciate consistently over measured time periods, and some fortunate start up employees come into millions in a matter of years. Or maybe this is your year to win the PowerBall Lottery! (kidding.)

As you and your spouse each get the 5.49 million exemption, a married couple jointly has nearly 11 million in assets they can pass along without paying any federal estate tax. Amounts above the 11 million will be taxed heavily at 40%. If the estate goes up 2 million to 13 million, there would be \$800,000 in tax going to Uncle Sam. You get the point and would be wise to consult counsel and get a proper estate plan, including a living trust, in place, to start, if you have such assets. Getting a revocable trust in pace is also wise for those that fall under the exemption amounts and are not at risk of paying any estate taxes, because trusts have many other benefits such as avoiding probate court and bringing certainty to estate administration and distributions, to name a couple.

In addition to the individual estate tax exemptions at death, you can currently make annual tax-free gifts of up to \$14,000 per recipient, and if you are married, you and your spouse together can give \$28,000 per recipient per year. Additionally, subject to specific rules, you can also give an unlimited amount for tuition and medical expenses if you make the gifts directly to the educational organization or health care provider. With respect to real property you want to pass along to your family, you can give your child a \$14,000 "interest" in the property each year, which can be discounted via appraisals under certain conditions, which can be a very effective way to transfer wealth at a discount.

If you want to give more than 14,000 in a given year, you can do so, but must report it to the IRS and it will begin to reduce your lifetime gift and estate tax exemption of 5.49M. Like estate assets, gifts in excess of exempt amounts are also taxed at forty percent at the federal level. Some planning here is the key to effectively utilizing annual and lifetime exemptions.

For example, it can be especially wise to gift assets that are appreciating in value, because any income and appreciation that occur after such gift is made are removed from your taxable estate. However, the recipient then may have to pay capital gains tax if the asset is later sold, with such tax calculated using your original basis ... meaning the recipient is taxed on the difference between your purchase price and the sale price. That could be a lot of tax. If the property passes through your estate after your death, the recipient may receive a step up in basis as of the date of your death (basis is the fair market value at your death), which would save a lot of capital gains tax on the subsequent sale of the asset.

No offense, Uncle Sammy, but I want my kids to keep as much of our family assets as possible! Consult counsel and get an appropriate estate plan in place. It makes good sense to take care of your family, whether you are under or over the estate tax exemption thresholds.

Coding club presents \$2,000 check to local charter school

ushil Kapadia, a junior at Archbishop Mitty High School, presented a \$2000 check to Ace Empower Academy, a Charter Middle School recently.

The money donated to the school was generated from Kapadia's non-profit coding club, Computer Programming for All, Inc.

Upon discovering that we had no computer science curriculum and realizing that many of our students come from homes with limited opportunities, Kapadia decided to start an after-school coding club on a voluntary basis.

"I realized that 'traditional' curriculums would not work and so I developed my own curriculum using the Scratch programming language," said Kapadia. "The curriculum is quite innovative -- it teaches kids programming by having them create popular games such as Pacman and Galaga -which the students find very engaging."

This is his third year Kapadia has been teaching at Ace Empower which now provides instruction for more than eight locations with the assistance of 15 volunteers teaching more than 100 students.

Kapadia has donated more than 500 hours and raised, and along with this team of volunteers, raised \$2,000 for Ace Empower to help with computer science education.

In a recent survey, some of the students said expressed their appreciation to the education opportunity. "This class has endless fun...The

people here are so nice... we learn a lot about creating games...It's a cool place to relax and release us of stress."


"I feel the program has had a real impact and touched the kids' lives," said Justin Gill, eighth grade Science Teacher at ACE Empower Academy. "The kids used to view computers as a vehicle to play games after school, and did not have the appreciation that they could build a career in computer science. Through this program, they have come to appreciate that they could go to college and pursue computer science as a major -- this is exactly the outcome we had hoped for,"

Gill said some students find the class so engaging that they log in from home and continue to work on their projects. "On a 'dress up to work' day, a seventh grader dressed up as a game developer/ computer programmer. She said that the class has inspired her to pursue a major and subsequently a career in computer science"

Rushil's efforts have enabled a number of kids, who had absolutely no exposure to programming, to become well versed at Scratch and further inspired them to learn more. His curriculum based on building games to teach programming is innovative, and resonates with the kids.

"For the first time, many kids have realized that computers are a tool that can be harnessed rather than just a device to play games," said Gill

and by the end of the program, they have smiles on their faces and you can just see their enjoyment. They have confidence in themselves and are no longer afraid. It makes me happy."

Although she says she's bonded with many children, there is one boy she'll never forget. As she led the horse he was riding around the circle, they talked the whole time about horses, video games, his friends and things he likes. "Afterwards, I noticed the social worker looked shocked," she says. "The social worker said that the boy doesn't talk—to anybody. It made me want to cry. The kids will always remember their experiences with this program."

"People here are like family," says volunteer Rowan Brush. "I love it here. Doug has taught us a lot. I volunteer here because I enjoy helping the community and working with the horses."

Victory Ranch also partners with HomeFirst, which serves homeless veterans. Through his Veteran's Ranch Visit Program, veterans have the opportunity to enjoy a peaceful ranch visit and commune with the horses. A disabled army veteran himself, Hutten has experienced how a horse's calming spirit can help those suffering with PTSD and was excited to start this program to help comrades in arms.

Hutten's own victories over life's challenges inspired the name Victory Ranch. "We all go through stuff," he says. "No one can escape the things that occur in life, but I choose to have victory."

Empowering children is Hutten's main goal. When students graduate, he says, "How many of you were afraid about things you did in the program? In your lives, there will always be challenges and you can say, 'I did this!"

His favorite part of teaching is seeing the changes in the children over time. "I provide a way for them to step away from their stuff and step into the spirit of the horse," he says. "I know how to connect them." When Hutten lived in Denver, Colorado, he worked with kids from a church youth group at his ranch there. Sometimes the kids would play ball and there was a horse standing on second base. Other times, the horse would pull the kids on tubes down the snow-covered roads.

The idea of starting a ranch with a program for children and horses began when Hutten was volunteering with an equestrian program for children with autism through B.O.K. Ranch in Woodside. Thanks to grants from the Dean Whitter Foundation, Morgan Family Foundation and Sorenson Foundation, his dream became a reality.

Caring for the children is evident in everything Hutten does, from educational classes in the barn to working with the horses in the corrals. During these lessons, Hutten also instructs the children in manners, focus and following directions. "I try to put them on the right path in life," he says.

Utilizing his Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Speech Communication, Hutten teaches his students to communicate effectively and project their voices. "We need to talk to our horse like we do with our dogs at home," he says. "We need to monitor their behavior. Horses talk through their behavior. When we're connecting with our horse, we want to be confident and firm."

He helps the children feel more confident, even while standing beside a horse for the first time. "Feel her breath. It's warm, right?" he says. "Hold the lead rope with your right hand and the remaining rope coiled in your left hand."

Walking beside a child in the corral, Hutten tells him, "The horse should walk beside you. The handler should walk between a horse's head and shoulder. What we're going to do now is walk all the way around. Are you ready? Talk to the horse. Make the horse go where you want him to go. There you go. Good job!"

"So many kids need our help," says Pat, Hutten's wife and business partner. "They all have their issues, but they all love being close to the horses. There's a boy with Asperger's who is so gentle with his horse."

"My son is getting attached to the horses," says Robin (last name withheld). "He loves the connection. He's really enjoying it. What Doug's doing is amazing. He's teaching the kids the proper way to do everything. Ryan has always been very comfortable around animals, and I'm hoping once he gets on a horse, he'll feel

so much more comfortable. I think he will."

"Wait and watch what happens," says Hutten. "You want to be a team together when you're sitting on a horse's back. When children get on a horse for the first time, all of a sudden their focus is there, where it wasn't before."

Michelle (last name withheld) says that Victory Ranch is a great fit for her son as he loves animals. "He knows horses have feelings and body language, so it helps him to read body language and know he has to be calm," she says. "He learns not only what the horse's behavior is, but also what his reaction should be to the behavior, and he can carry this on in other situations."

"I have moms walking up to me after the kids ride sobbing, 'Doug, you've changed my child.' That's it for me. Life's about what we're giving to the world, rather than to ourselves...."

Hutten has been a member of the San Mateo County Sheriff's Mounted Patrol Search and Rescue Group, Deputy Sheriff with San Francisco's Mounted Unit, Colorado Search and Rescue and Marin County's Sheriff Search and Rescue team.

Horses have always been a part of Hutten's life. He started riding when he was six years old and continues to do so 60-some years later. "The spirit and connections of my horses really help me to work through life's challenges," he says. "The peace I've been able to experience on horseback is phenomenal. I have a gift; a sense of understanding a horse's spirit." Part of that connection, he says, comes through his Native American sensibilities, as his mother belonged to the Chickasaw tribe. "It's been an honor to maintain my heritage," he says. On the wall in his office is a picture of three Native Americans walking their horses through snow in the woods. "It's near and dear to me," he says.

For 24 years, Hutten rode a horse named Sydney, writing short stories to share his experiences on horseback during character-building times. "He was my buddy," he says. When Sydney passed away, he got Minko, which means "Chief" in Chickasaw. "His spirit was special," says Hutten. "Animals look to us for friendship, connection and trust. People don't know how deep that goes." He rode him for 15 years. "When he left the planet four years ago, a cowboy friend of mine introduced me to Dude," says Hutten, "because when I train horses, I always say, 'Hey, Dude.'" Hutten and Dude have developed a tight bond that just grows stronger with time.

As a child, Hutten rode ponies on Belle Isle, Michigan. "Instead of a soccer mom, my mom was a pony mom," he says. As his dad was a project engineer on the Apollo project, the family moved to Alabama. They later relocated to Cambridge, Massachusetts where his father worked at a NASA Research Center.

In high school, Hutten volunteered helping kids in Boston's inner cities. He played college football at Boston See VICTORY, next page

He left his dad at the airport, where they fondly touched their foreheads together. Three days later, he got an emergency phone call that his father had died, having drowned in a whirlpool. He had

to fly back to identify his body. Doug was 18 at the time. He served his country, helping to find pilots who were shot down, and finished college through night school, using every penny of the G.I. Bill.

About 12 years ago, Hutten left his job in Silicon Valley to start Victory Ranch. "I paid my dues and was very successful," he says, "but I decided to do something else using my gifts with horses." Hutten has worked as a high-end consultant to industries getting technologies off the ground, including cable start-ups TCI and DirectTV in Denver. He walked down the red carpet in his cowboy tux in 1999 when The Matrix won an Academy Award, as his consulting group had managed a merger/acquisition for their special effects company. He worked as a consultant for IBM, bringing the first supercomputers into China and with Apple and Sony. "For me, Victory Ranch has been a great way to use my talents to focus on helping others," he says.

Like Hutten, Pat left her hightech career behind to help others through Victory Ranch. She traded in her high heels and beautiful clothing and career at Qualcomm in Taiwan to work at the ranch. "But the reward here is huge," she says. "You're happy. I worked 12 to 15 hours a day at Qualcomm, but I wasn't happy."

"My personal gratification is that Victory Ranch has been able to help so many kids with behavioral disorders through the years," says Hutten. "On a personal level, I just feel joy in being able to see the changes in


them, especially when the kids start to ride a horse."

Victory Ranch is currently run out of Rose Rock Ranch, located at 20100 Almaden Road in San Jose. While he greatly appreciates the accommodations, Hutten hopes to raise the funds for a ranch of his own where he can expand the types of programs he offers like Equine Assisted Psychotherapy, veteran's PTSD and battered women programs. "We want to help more people," he says. He would love to stay in the area as they've established relationships with local social service agencies who can transport the children. They also have about 18 teen and adult volunteers. Hutten hopes to raise funding to enable him to purchase land on Harry Road in Almaden Valley to create a ranch. "The need for the ranch is huge," he says. "Our real focus is to the future and securing our own ranch to serve more disadvantaged youth."

"It's so rewarding at the end of the day to be able to transform kids' challenges, fears, pain and suffering. I have a special way through the spirit of the horse to help them get through all that. Everyone who becomes part of the Victory Ranch family benefits. It's a story of helping people in our community. I hope there might be someone out there who can help us move to where we should be."


