Lou Alexander reported that a medium size rattlesnake was resting on his patio for about an hour at his home in the Villages. Public Safety contacted to summon the snake wrangler they use.

Snakes usually move on when the sun goes down and the ground begins to cool. "I love all the wildlife here but could do

without these guys," said Alexander.

Citizens express views at 'Pancake and Policy' breakfast

an Jose City Councilmember Silvia Arenas, District 8, and YMCA Director, Lupe Rubacalba, collaborated to bring a pancake breakfast to the YMCA so that the Evergreen community to review ideas, concerns and issues in the Silicon Valley on June 24.

"I am so happy and so thrilled to have council member Arenas in District 8 for she understands the complexity of economically, social, and cultural... a councilmember that understands it at its roots... for the disenfranchised and those with difficulties...you have someone on the 18th floor that will. You are going to see a lot of changes in San Jose, good and better... we have to make sure that the city of San Jose doesn't leave anyone behind," said Carrasco.

Youth are taking control of their future

Vice Mayor Carresco also took time to point to a staff member at the back of the room, a young lady, who recently became a member of her staff. She expressed that one day she (the young woman who worked as a lifeguard at the YMCA) came up to her and said she wanted to be a volunteer intern in her office. With a big smile, Carresco expressed that she admired youth that "take control of their future," she agreed to put her on the staff. Today, she stated, "She is proving to be a star in my office!"

"I want to acknowledge and thank the East Side Valley YMCA to be our host and set up this beautiful space," said Arenas. "I also want to thank all the volunteers who came out to cook for us today."

In presenting, she began to review some of the accomplishments of her first six months

in office. The audience was seen to be smiling and engaged. Some expressed they liked the authentic way she carried herself in communicating.

"We tackled a lot of different issues," said Arenas.

Here are a few that were mentioned:Ellis Act: "New developments must relo-

cate folks." • Tennant Protection Act: "all renters in San Jose now fall under this protection. We need to ensure our folks continue to stay here because they continue to add to the livelihood of San Jose."

• \$325,000 park improvements in Evergreen; "We got approval of additional monies to activate parks and place an emphasis on Welsh Park.

• Cleanup of Thompson Creek; "we are going to continue to work on clean up and joining forces with other communities."

• Additional funding for Police; She stated, "Our police department is doing so much with so little... we funding new monies to help the department." She talked about the importance of reporting issues to the police so that they can create "data points," Data points show hot spots and help the police rearrange their emphasis to cover certain areas more. She stated that there are 52 new police cadets and they are graduating soon in one of the biggest classes that San Jose has had in a while.

• Measure B approved; Arenas stated that potholes in our roads are being addressed and by fixing our roads that translates to less maintenance for our cars. She stated that another senate bill was passed to also target monies to fixing roads.

• New sidewalk at Ocala; Arenas stated

that the Department of Transportation is going to build a sidewalk so people can walk down Capitol Expressway to get to the bus transit station and Eastridge in a safe way.

Councilwoman Arenas thanked her hard working staff and again asked for the community to call her office anytime. She stated that her office welcomes volunteers (that very day she and her staff were volunteering in a four location dumpster pick up drive).

"If there is a project you want improved, let us know," Arenas stated. "We would love to go to your neighborhood and set up meetings (currently and for many months Arenas and her team have been holding neighborhood meetings that cover many issues of each individual neighborhood including Neighbor-hood Watch programs), thus she and her team have taken time to reach out and meet with all the various neighborhoods in the Evergreen Area and facilitate on going meetings each month.

As the pancake breakfast came to a close, Councilwoman Arenas thanked her staff for their commitment and dedication and again encouraged all citizens to call her office for any questions and input.

Raina Bivens, Marketing Manager of the East Valley YMCA stated," The Evergreen Valley YMCA was delighted to host this important engagement. It was and opportunity to bring our community together and discuss the issues that directly impact our district."

Medical offices proposed for land use Development at Evergreen College

Times staff writer ast year, The Evergreen Times reported that the San Jose City Council approved the use of 27 acres of land for rezoning use at the Evergreen Valley College.

According to Rosalynn Hughey, Interim Planning Director for the City of San Jose, the applicant has now submitted to the city an application for R-15 Plan Development Zoning which includes assisted living facilities and medical offices.

"At a later time the applicant will apply for a permit," said Hughey. "The city is reviewing the application and has also sent out an initial comment letter to the applicant sharing lots of different comments." **City planning reviewing**

"When The City Council approved the general plan amendment last year, one of the conditions of the approval was that the applicant must undertake a master planning process that would involve community outreach for the full 27 acres," said Hughey.

"The city will be helping to facilitate that process and the applicant has on their team an outreach consultant that they are going to use to help you out on this process."

On June 1, Hughey spoke at the District Round Table for District 8 held at the Village Square Branch Library, that the charrette is to be decided upon (she

referred to this as a "workshop") and it will be a process to explore how the entire 28 acres would be utilized.

However, the city planning department has already accepted a plan development zoning application for about 12+ acres and the proposal is for medical offices and assisted living facility.

Citizens concerned

"We're very concerned that the zoning going forward may limit the discussion that we have in the charrette," stated a concerned stakeholder at the June District 8 Community Roundtable meeting. "I'm very concerned that any kind of application be decided and finalized. We don't want those options to be limited."

Taking a look back at what Mayor stated seven months ago, Mayor Liccardo stated at the December 13, 2016 city council meeting. "I expect a lot of community outreach as this process moves forward."

Some at the District 8 Round Table felt that the current presentation to the city of a proposal for building medical office use and assisted living facility needed to be first presented to the community through a charrette (workshop with community outreach) then secondarily presented next to the city planning office.

The new location, which will include a drive through, is located on the Northeast corner of Cottle Rd. at and Poughkeepsie Rd. A new development sign describing the project is located at the end of the parking lot.

The development is 17 gross acres to accommodate the construction of a 3,867 square foot In-N-Out Burger restaurant with drive through on an approximately 2.4 gross acre site.

Median price increase 1.7 percent

Luxury home sales in Silicon Valley rise in May

The Silicon Valley luxury home market saw a gain in total sales in May yearover-year and a gain in the average sales price from last month, according to a new report by Coldwell Banker Residential Brokerage.

Total sales in May totaled 785 residential properties priced \$1 million and higher, a 14 percent increase from 688

The median price for luxury properties sold in May rose to \$1,475,000 from \$1,450,000, an increase of 1.7 percent. The data is based on sales transactions recorded in Santa Clara County by the Multiple Listing Service.

"The Silicon Valley housing market continued an upward trend throughout the month of May with no signs of slowing down," said Mike James, president of Coldwell Banker Residential Brokerage. "Not only are luxury homes selling at a higher volume, but they're selling for well above asking price and in an even shorter time frame compared to this time last year."

Sales in the upper end of the market also experienced gains. Of the luxury home sales in May, 67 were of homes priced \$3 million and higher, compared to 62 a year ago and 53 properties in April.

Community Liaison Motto: "One call does it all." Let me explain my motto. No matter what you need we will make it happen. That is my philosophy. I am here to help and the city and county too!

Houselessness on the rise

In today's column I tackle the issue of houselessness or as most refer to it, homelessness. I call it "houseless-

ness" because the world is everybody's home. Also the word "homeless" has in my opinion a negative connotation. I believe everyone has a home but some need a house or apartment to live in. Thus, they can find themselves "houseless" at times but never forever. Some also sleep in mobile homes and cars. Some people have children in this situation too. I make you aware of the shortage of housing we have in San Jose right now.

Hundreds of people sleep outside in our city without a home to go to. This is risky because they can get sick sleeping near the creeks and they can get other people sick too.

It is my goal to put as many people as possible (seniors, disabled, behavior challenged and more) in a place to live where they can get a shower and live respectfully.

Their lives are important to me as anyone. All races and people have equal rights and there needs to be no discrimination. We need to help each and every one in our beautiful city and county.

Things have changed in the last 20 years in our city of San Jose. It is now very hard for people to rent or find an apartment so we have to make more affordable housing for them.

A lot of people in tech industry also belong here and we need to make our city welcoming to them. They deserve better too.

We got to all pitch in, the tech people and all others to make the monies that are allotted to the city and county budget work where it is most efficient. It costs about \$5,000 a day if a person goes into the hospital so we must figure out how to help the disadvantaged so that they can go to a nice place to live. The County, City and State are all working together to be more proactive in preventive health issues. That way we can put the saved monies into housing and not spend so much on hospital expenses or when the police put those with behavior or mental health challenges into lock down. We must work smarter to save monies and to help our city create a wonderful environment to live in for all people.

Did you know too that some apartments charge a fee to check the credit of an applicant, so, what if that applicant has limited resources. They apply at an apartment and they may be told, "Sorry the apartment has been rented." So what if the person with limited means applies to five or six apartments for renting a room and is turned down. That makes the situation a negative impact one due to limited resources of the person applying. It puts increased pressures on those without a place to stay who are trying to rent an apartment or get a room, not to mention it can bring about depression too.

Families need a stable home to ensure a healthy environment is protected and nurtured. Children need this greatly.

The Housing Department provides grants to the following nonprofit partners to administer its core services, such as outreach and engagement, case management, and rapid re-housing to homeless persons, with priority services offered to those who reside in encampments located in San Jose. These groups are there to help all.

• Homefirst

• PATH

• The Bill Wilson Center

• LifeMoves

• The Downtown Streets Team

Main focus of city's Housing Commission

Here are some of the things the Housing Commission of our city works on to help plan our future and take care of current needs.

• Provide recommendations on the Housing Department's Five-Year Housing Investment Plan that will guide the Department on the use of housing funds;

Provide input to HUD (U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development) action plans which steers the Department on federal funding for services to: end homelessness, serve seniors, engage community members in lowincome neighborhoods, and;


• Provide recommendations on the fees assessed for the Housing Department's administration of the City's Rent Ordinances (Mobile home Parks and Apartments).

New strategies are being developed and implemented in how our city protects people from houselessness (homelessness).

Helping our veterans is a prime focus of our city. According the website, All the Way Home, this campaign is really making a difference. Why should any veteran live without a roof over his/her head? It is not necessary for that to occur.

Did you know that Santa Clara County has been among the cities with the highest rate of unsheltered homeless veterans in the country? However, this is changing now because of the new thoughtful and pragmatic programs implemented on a fast track to ensure positive changes.

According to the last census, our county has 703 homeless veterans (this number has been significantly lowered and I will update you in a future column). We have programs that can help, but we need landlords to rent to veterans. The "All the

Way Home" campaign aims to end veteran homelessness by the 100th Anniversary of Veterans Day in 2018. The City of San Jose, the County of Santa Clara, the Housing Authority of the County of Santa Clara and Destination Home are collaborating to address this community crisis. We are partnering with our community's consortium of service providers including Veteran's Voices of Santa Clara County, Abode Services, HomeFirst Services of Santa Clara County, Goodwill Silicon Valley, Sunnyvale Community Services, Veteran's Resource Centers of America and others to ensure more housing resources are available for homeless veterans.

The Campaign was inspired by First Lady Michelle Obama's 2015 Mayors Challenge to End Veteran Homelessness, in partnership with the Veteran's Administration and Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The campaign works with landlords and apartment owners to access to rental units (see: Landlord Incentives Flyer) for homeless veterans and their families. Outreach will also be made to corporations and faith based groups to aid with land acquisition, housing development, access to rental units, financial assistance and services.

We got 24 faith based organizations all working together, with 289 landlords ensuring a place for the Veterans to live, and over 700 Veterans have come out from the cold and now live under a roof.

Measure A

This measure created a bond to help those in need. Here is the specifics from the county website; In authorizing the housing bond, the Board of Supervisors stated that it recognized the "existence of a housing crisis in Santa Clara County where the rising costs of home ownership and the increasing cost of rental units throughout the county have resulted in a persistently high number of homeless individuals in Santa Clara County." In considering the bond, the Board of Supervisors considered the following:

Home prices in Santa Clara County rose 10.4 percent over the past year and the median sale price hit \$900,000 according to CoreLogic which tracks the real estate markets in the San Francisco Bay Area. In addition, the market tracker RealFacts has reported that Silicon Valley apartment rents are now the highest in the state further exacerbating an already difficult housing situation.

Even though housing for homeless and populations with very low income is currently being built, the number of units available to these special needs populations does not satisfy the projected demand and falls far short of the demand within our community. In fact, the California Housing Partnership has reported that 67,576 additional homes are needed to meet the needs of Santa Clara County residents who are very low income (VLI) (31 percent to 50 percent of the area median income) or extremely low income (ELI) (below 30 percent of area median income) renters.

Housing Trust of Silicon Valley reported that in 2008, agencies in Santa Clara County had \$126.2 million available annually for affordable housing. By 2013, that amount had decreased to about \$47.3 million annually. The Housing Trust estimated that in addition to the \$47.3 million, the county needed an additional \$220 million annually to meet the affordable housing needs of ELI and VLI households. This estimate was based on the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) Regional Housing Needs Allocation for Santa Clara County from 2014 through 2022.

The 2015 Homeless Census and Survey revealed a total of 6,556 homeless individuals in Santa Clara County on a given night. When compared with similar surveys around the nation, Santa Clara County has the ninth largest number of homeless in the United States. "Home Not Found: The Cost of Homelessness in Silicon Valley," found that homeless persons use about \$520M in services annually. Ten percent of homeless persons account for 61percent of these costs. The report found that providing permanent supportive housing to the highest users of services could result in a net cost avoidance of more than \$42,700 per person per year for services such as emergency medical care and general assistance."

What is the Housing Authority?

The Housing authority is there to assist you. The following is stated on their website;

"In 1967, the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors established the Housing Authority of the County of Santa Clara (HACSC) as an independent local government agency to administer the federal rental assistance programs authorized by the United States Housing Act of 1937. Since 1976, HACSC has operated the federal rental assistance programs of the County of Santa Clara and the City of San José as one program. In 2008, Congress designated HACSC a Moving to Work (MTW) demonstration agency.

Our agency assists about 17,000 households through the federal rental housing assistance (Housing Choice Voucher, also known as Section 8) program.

The vast majority-more than 80 percent-of our client households are extremely low-income families, seniors, veterans, persons with disabilities and the formerly homeless. Working together with landlords, housing developers, charities and local governments, we strive to provide housing and support services to as many eligible families as possible"





County making major push to reduce diabetes

iabetes is one of the most pressing health challenges in Santa Clara County.

• 46 percent of adults here are either prediabetic or have undiagnosed diabetes.

• Those who are pre-diabetic and do not get treatment have as much as a 30 percent chance of developing type 2 diabetes within 5 years.

• Individuals with diabetes are at significantly increased risk for heart disease and stroke.

• The disease is the leading cause of kidney failure, new cases of blindness among adults, and non-traumatic lower-limb amputations.

These are just some of the many reasons that I fought to get extra funding for diabetes prevention programs into this year's County budget.

One of the most effective prevention programs is a 16-week intervention that has been proven to help pre-diabetic individuals change basic habits and significantly reduce their risk of becoming diabetic, even 10 years after the program is

Have you lost your pet due to fireworks explosions in your neighborhood? Your pet may have ended up at the San Jose shelter at 2750 Monterey Road.

The shelter is open Tuesday through Saturday 11 a.m. -7 p.m. and Sunday 11 a.m. -5 p.m.

You can also check online anytime to see if your pet has been turned in.to the shelter by visiting www.sanjoseanimals.com

If you're coming to look for your pet at the shelter, it helps to bring medical records such as proof of spay/neuter and current rabies vaccine record. Screenshots or emails completed.

Unfortunately, there are just a handful of providers currently offering this type of program locally. The County will be awarding grants to multiple communitybased organizations that offer this program, with a particular focus on programs that are in languages other than English and serve immigrant populations.

The county will also provide funding so that program is covered for Medi-Cal recipients who are pre-diabetic and use the Valley Health Plan.

Sadly, type 2 diabetes is not just an adult health problem. That's why I, along with Supervisor Dave Cortese, worked to secure funding for the American Diabetes Association to send approximately 500 Santa Clara County youths to a one-week summer camp focused on diabetes prevention.

The camps will be held in Gilroy, Morgan Hill, and San Jose for low income 10-15 year-olds who are at high risk for developing type 2 diabetes. The 15, oneweek camps include daily sessions on diabetes prevention through healthy food and beverage choices, in addition to lots of fun physical activities.

There are currently 164 members who volunteered 33,356 hours during the past 12 months.

"Most of our members volunteer for more than one of our eight programs and serve on our committees," said Jerri Kazmierczak, president of ALSJ. "Our motto is caring and commitment in action and this definitely reflects who we are."

Program Highlights:

Operation School Bell is the philanthropic program that distributes two school uniforms each year to underserved children. This year new uniforms were given to

5,434 elementary school children in 39 schools in Alum Rock, Oak Grove, Franklyn McKinley, and San Jose Unified School Districts.

Readers are Leaders volunteers read six times this year to 1,283 children in 32 second and third-grade classrooms. These books were then donated to each classroom and school library. Each child also received a book of their own to take home in December.

Screening Eyes Early screened 718 preschoolers to detect vision problems at 18 preschools; 15 children were referred to an ophthalmologist.

Hug-a-Bear distributed 973 teddy bears to seven agencies to support and comfort children in crisis including San Jose Police Department and Family Supportive Housing.



Kids on the Block puppets demonstrating ways to prevent bullying were shown to 222 children at 3 schools. Senior Bingo games with prizes are held each month at 2 residential care facilities.

Caring Hands volunteers knit 1,052 baby layettes as well as caps and lap robes for chemo patients. These handmade items were donated to Valley Medical Center.

Assist-a-Shelter serves two organizations: Family Supportive Housing and City Team. Volunteers served 624 dinners on the 3rd Friday of the month to Family Supportive Hosing residents. In addition, volunteers put on four enrichment programs to 148 children and adults. ALSJ also assisted children in "shopping" for holiday presents for their families.

The forgotten side effect of smoking Marijuana

ith every passing election cycle, more states are beginning to legalize marijuana for recreational use.

Eight states and the District of Columbia currently have laws legalizing the use of recreational marijuana, while nearly half the states in the union have some form of a medical marijuana law on their books.

Whether pro or con to the marijuana argument, dentist and bacteriologist Dr. Harold Katz says there is one aspect of smoking weed that no one is talking about.

"One of the side effects of marijuana is dry mouth, otherwise known as cotton mouth," says Katz. "I don't see anyone discussing the negative effects of smoking marijuana, particularly to oral health."

Katz says the effects of dry mouth can lead to bad breath, tooth decay and gum disease, which is linked to an increased risk for heart attacks and strokes.

Millions of people suffer from dry mouth, known as xerostomia (zeer-oh-stomia). Dry mouth affects the ability to maintain a sufficient flow of saliva in the mouth, which eliminates food debris in the mouth, kills viruses and discourages the anaerobic bacterial growth that produces chronic bad breath.

There are many different causes of dry mouth, but Katz says three of the most common causes that can be controlled include the following:

• Smoking tobacco and marijuana. Studies have shown that long-term smoking significantly reduces salivary flow. This reduction is tied to an increase in oral health disorders associated with xerostomia, including dental decay, gingivitis, tooth mobility and halitosis.

• Medications. Both prescription and over-thecounter medications can cause dry mouth. Among these are decongestants, allergy medications, diuretics, sedatives, muscle relaxants, antihypertensives and antidepressants. In addition, cancer treatments such as radiation can damage salivary glands, and chemotherapy can cause saliva to thicken, making the mouth feel dry.

• Drying agents. The most common drying agent in food and beverages is alcohol. In fact, alcohol causes the worst form of dry mouth, because both the flow of saliva See MARIJUANA, page 17

and oxygen content in the mouth are substantially reduced. Compounding this problem is that many popular brand-name mouthwashes contain at least 15 to 27 percent alcohol. Using alcohol-based mouthwashes makes the mouth very dry, which exacerbates xerostomia.

"If dry mouth is left untreated, it can take its toll on a person's oral health and cause many side effects," Katz says. "Consequences include oral fungal infections, mouth sores, cavities, gingivitis, receding gums, tooth abscesses and even a loss of teeth."




