Governor's Address:

A Comprehensive Plan to Fight the Drug Crisis Starts with Critical Thinking

As a business consultant, I used my skills and expertise to help deliver an outcome, develop a solution or mitigate a risk.

Dear Maine Taxpayer,

I look at governing the same way as improving a business. As an Administration, we first identify the problem, then we seek solutions to improve the situation.

Today, Maine is facing a huge drug problem. It is killing our children, ripping families apart and jeopardizing the safety within our communities.

Nearly 1,000 babies each year in Maine are born addicted to heroin

and other opiates. Last year, more than 200 people in Maine died from overdoses, and our jails are overcrowded.

This is not just a problem. It is a crisis, and my Administration is taking action. Since announcing the Drug Summit, we have received overwhelming response.

As Commander and Chief and Governor of the State of Maine I will use all resources possible to ensure the public health and safety of Mainers. This includes enabling members of the Maine Army National Guard to help assist the Maine Drug Enforcement Agency in its

counter-drug efforts.

We must have a comprehensive plan created by critical thinkers. We must provide solutions on how to disrupt the drug supply and hunt down the traffickers. We must also provide strategies about how to address addiction and improve recovery rates for those struggling to get off drugs.

We scheduled Drug Summit is on August 26. It will include top officials from local, state and federal law enforcement agencies, as well as judicial officials, including the U.S Marshal, Federal DEA officers, the Chief Justice and Attorney General. The Commis-

sioner of Public Safety will moderate this session and help determine how we can best manage this drug-trafficking crisis from a law enforcement and judicial perspective.

These drugs do not magically appear on our streets; they are being brought in every day by outside drug gangs. Drug traffickers from places like the Philadelphia, the Bronx and Boston are making big money at our expense and they are killing Mainers as they do it.

These drug dealers don't care who buys their heroin. But we do. They are our family members, our loved ones, friends and

neighbors.

Recently, a lawyer blamed me for of his ex-wife's overdose. Too often we see the devastating effects of addiction and how it takes over people's lives, including this one. But we are all to blame if the State and its dedicated employees ignore those trafficking and addicting our citizens every day.

There are treatment programs for the uninsured. In fact, there is no funding shortfall for substance abuse treatment. In fact, my Administration has increased funding over the past five years.

While we've increased funding for addiction pro-

grams we ignore the people who are getting Mainers addicted. If we truly want to save lives, we must cut off the supply.

It's easy to point the finger at someone and say they are to blame, but it's much more difficult to work on a solution. We all have a choice. You either have to be part of the solution, or you're going to be part of the problem.

I am bringing critical thinkers to the table to provide solutions to a complex problem. We will get the job done.

Only Steps Forward

Auburn must speak strongly about its riverfront

If I told you there was a process underway, which will be wrapped up in the next two years, to determine what can happen for the next 30 years on the Little Androscoggin River in Downtown Auburn, how would you respond?

Would you wonder who was making the decisions? Do you know where your elected officials and city staff stand on how

your kids or grandkids should be able to use this resource for recreation or economic development?

Auburn and our sister city Lewiston tout the importance of the riverfront for growing our community and improving quality of life, but you've probably heard more about the debate to replace the canopies at Festival Plaza than this narrow window we have to advocate for use of the river.

The process under

way is the relicensing of the Lower Barker Dam, the technical name for the dam that

sits behind the Barker Mill housing complex owned by Auburn Housing Authority.

The dam and the Upper Barker Dam just upstream are among several hydroelectric facilities on the Little Androscoggin River that are owned by a company based in Canada. Unlike when the dams were first constructed to create jobs locally with cheap power, the power now leaves the community and goes onto the power grid.

In addition to the two dams on the Little Androscoggin in New Auburn that will be seeking new licenses in the next few years to operate on the river, there are three major dams on the main Androscoggin River. The Gulf Island and Deer Rips Dams just secured licenses to operate over the next two generations. In the next decade, the Monty Hydro and the connected canal system will be up for review.

While it may be a bit wonky, these rivers in our community are actually owned by us, the public. Federal and state laws allow private companies to construct and operate dams on these rivers if they demonstrate certain public benefits for the community through recreation and economic growth.

The public, through local governments, is invited to participate in that process, as are other advocacy groups. Given my experience over the last decade working on environmental issues, I have helped to rally an impressive group of partners to assist Auburn in fighting for maximum local benefit for use of the Little Androscoggin.

This includes local groups like the Androscoggin Land Trust and their leadership in developing the Androscoggin Greenway through parks and trails that line our riverfront.

But it also includes national organizations like American Whitewater that see the potential here to create whitewater waves and seasonal whitewater that could attract recreational tourists.

While much of the last couple decades in Lewiston-Auburn has been spent growing access to views of the river, its real potential must include not just looking at it, but also using it and experiencing it. This could be in a canoe or kayak or even walking along the shores casting a line for fish.

Should there be enough water for paddlers to enjoy the downtown riverfront throughout the summer? With limited access to the shoreline now, how should improved fishing access for anglers or local youth programs be funded: by the city it or those profiting from water power? Should water flows be sufficient to support restoration of fish species that currently struggle to survive along the corridor?

If the community comes together and speaks strongly about its riverfront, the day won't be long off when the summer weekends are filled with people enjoying lunch from Rolly's overlooking paddlers below. Or live music along a new park behind Fire House Grille has a backdrop of fly fishermen casting their lines.

More use of the river. More visitors enjoying the outdoors in our backyard. More investment in our community. And the jobs and tax base that come with it.

Enough is Enough

Lewiston will pay for decisions made in Augusta

Decisions in Augusta have consequences. Lewiston is now going to pay for those decisions.

With the passage of LD 369, Lewiston is going to have to come up with God knows how many thousands of dollars in order to pay for the federal government's refusal to do their job and remove our uninvited guests, known as asylum seekers, from our city, from our state and from our country.

This situation is the result of the Legislature's approval of a bill to give taxpayer-funded benefits to asylum seekers and Governor LePage's opinion that the Legislature had

adjourned, so he believed he had more time to veto the bill—an opinion that was unanimously shot down by the Supreme Judicial Court. With his veto now null and void, the bill has become law.

However, there is a way the Governor and our federal delegation, Senator Susan Collins, Senator Angus King and Representative Bruce Poliquin, could minimize or possibly eliminate the financial burden placed on Lewiston taxpayers as a result of this bill's passage.

If they could secure for Lewiston state and federal funds that will allow us to remove condemned and decrepit buildings from our tax rolls, the tax revenues

lost by creating an empty lot will be considerably less than the taxes that would have to be generated to pay assistance to our unwanted guests.

But as disappointed as I am with the Governor's failure to veto the bill, I am

also angry with our state legislative delegation. Did they put up any type of fight against this bill? State Sen. Nate Libby and Rep. Michel Lajoie voted on the side of Lewiston property taxpayers casting a "no" vote.

Our other legislative representatives, State Sen. Peggy Rotundo, Rep. Jared Golden and Rep. Heidi Brooks voted "yes" along with their Southern Maine leadership in support of the bill. Two of these representatives live in apartments and don't directly pay property taxes.

We also have the Southern Maine country club Republicans, led by State Sen. Amy Volk of Scarborough. She is one

of the Republican RINOs that helped rewrite LD 369, changing it from removing asylum seekers from the General Assistance rolls to now guaranteeing them two years of Lewiston taxpayer assistance.

When you live in a place like Scarborough, Cape Elizabeth, Freeport or Yarmouth, it's easy to be charitable and caring to our uninvited guests when you don't have to bear any financial burden. It is sad to live in a state where many of our legislators place helping non-citizens above helping our state's needy.

On weekends, the grocery lines are full of non-citizens with carts full of food being paid for

by taxpayers. In contrast, we have our fixed income elderly citizens in the express line with three or four items counting pennies to pay for them. Why aren't we giving them more help?

Then we have our severely mentally ill and handicapped residents. They are truly society's needy, yet instead of supporting their needs, we continually underfund them. But, of course, they can't vote.

The way our native-born citizens are treated is practically criminal. When you go to the polls on Election Day, hold those responsible for this treatment accountable and mete out a proper punishment: replace them.

The Certificate in Elder Care Services will prepare students with a basic foundation on the psychology of aging and the

impact aging has on society, while the Certificate in Child and Family Services will emphasize child and adolescent development and child and family welfare issues. Students wishing to pursue a Bachelor of Science in Human Services will be eligible to transfer credit for certificate courses to the degree track.

CMCC hosts advanced machining workshop

A group of precision machining educators from around the country gathered on the campus of Central Maine Community College recently to participate in a "RAMP Multi-Axis Workshop."

The event was funded under a \$900,000 National Science Foundation grant awarded to CMCC to ad-

minister the Regional Advanced Machining Partnership, or RAMP. The goal of the grant is to provide educators and industry personnel with the skills needed for advanced computer numerical controlled (CNC) machining, programming and metrology.

The workshop attracted 24 participants from more than ten states and as far away as Alberta, Canada. They attended sessions led by CMCC instructors Devin Watson, Richard Bolding and Stephen Bolduc, who were assisted by several students. These sessions included "3-D Milling and Multi-Axis Curricula" and "Live Tooling for CNC Lathes." Additional sessions were conducted by representatives of Immersion Engineering, Sandvik, and CamInstructor.

This three-day training session provided instructors with the skills needed to deliver a class as set-up by the RAMP curriculum. The program included instruction and lab time on the set-up and utilization of some advanced techniques and projects. Attendees also used videos created through the RAMP grant to aid them in the set-up of equipment.

A Certificate in Advanced Machining has been developed at CMCC for experienced machinists and graduates of machining programs. Courses such as "Advanced MasterCam Programming," "Three-Dimensional CNC Milling" and "Multi-Axis CNC Milling" can be delivered mostly online through an internet-based communications environment.

The ceremony was followed by a tour of the facility led by the farm's founder and president Trevor Kenkel and refreshments served at the farm stand.

Located on 160-acres

of farm land at 347 Lisbon Street, the new greenhouse will utilize aquaponics to grow fresh lettuce and herbs year-round. Aquaponics is an efficient and sustainable form of agriculture in which plants and fish work together to their mutual benefit. With its new retail stand on Route 196, the farm has also created a convenient sales outlet for local farmers. The stand is open Monday through Sunday from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Kenkel, age 20, who will return to Bowdoin College as a sophomore this fall, plans to continue to operate the farm with his employees to provide fresh organic products to local restaurants and supermarkets year-round. Mission

The mission of the Great Falls Balloon Festival is to provide fundraising opportunities for local non-profit orga-

nizations, while celebrating our community and promoting the Lewiston/Auburn area as a visitor destination.

Balloon Launches

Due to weather conditions, the best times for balloon launches are 6 a.m. for morning launches and 6 p.m. for evening launches.

Launches are always weather permitting and times may vary depending

Spectator Tips

The experience that our visitors get at the Great Falls Balloon Festival is rare in the ballooning world. At most festivals, spectators are not allowed in the area where balloons are launching.

However, this up-close-and-personal venue also poses some challenges. Our main launch site is small. Our visiting balloons are huge. Our visitors are smitten. But our pilots and crews need space. A lot of it. They also need to be able to see and hear each other to keep themselves and everyone else on the field safe.

Maintaining a safe environment is a top priority; and it is crucial to the future of the festival. Some things to keep in mind when visiting the festival:

THE BIG 4:
Don't Smoke. Our vis-

iting balloons carry tanks full of propane gas. Due to the fire hazard created by the use of propane gas, as well as the risk of damage to the balloon envelopes, smoking is prohibited.

Don't bring your dog. Or your cat. Or bird. Or snake. With the exception of service animals, NO PETS of any kinds are allowed on festival grounds.

Don't bring your wheels. This include bikes, skateboards, scooters, roller skates and—yes—unicycles. The level of foot traffic on the walkway around the park is very high, especially at launch time.

Don't drink. No alcohol is allowed on festival grounds.

LAUNCH TIMES
Launches are scheduled for 6 am and 6 pm throughout the weekend and are always weather permitting. This includes wind and clouds as well as more obvious conditions like rain and lightning.

In the event of ques-

tionable conditions, Our Balloonmeister will wait as long as they can in hopes of a turn for the better. However, a launch decision may be delayed by up to an hour if weather conditions are changing. Ideally, the balloons will launch by 6:45 p.m. This timeframe provides a fair ride for our passengers and gets everyone back on the ground before we run out of daylight.

LAUNCH SITES
Simard-Payne Memorial Park in Lewiston is our main launch site. Edward Little High School in Auburn will also act as an additional launch site for some regular shape balloons.

ON THE MIC
Live stage performances will end at 5pm and will resume following the launch. As the balloons arrive on the field, visitors will learn about each balloon and pilot from our on-field announcer.

SPECIAL SHAPES
Specials fly only in the morning. At our evening launches, the specials will inflate and stay at the field to glow for the crowd. They are large, complex and hard to pack up in the dark.

TETHERED RIDES
When the weather permits, tethered rides are available for \$10–\$15/person. Tethered rides typically begin in the late afternoon (exact time is dependent on

temps and/or winds).

MOONGLOW
This ground-level light show is a crowd favorite! Following the Saturday evening launch (usually around 9 p.m.) some of our visiting balloons will return to the field, inflate and light their burners for a ground-level light show.

BE READY TO RELOCATE
If you've staked out a spot in the center of the field ... you probably won't get to stay there. At launch time, if you're on the main field at Simard-Payne Memorial Park, there is a good possibility that you will be asked to move; and maybe more than once. Additionally, please give balloon vehicles the right-of-way when they are entering/exiting the field. We also ask that you take care not to step on the fabric of the balloon envelope when the balloons are on the ground.

CHASING BALLOONS
Chasing balloons can be an exciting way to participate in the festival. Keep your focus on the road if you spot a balloon while driving. Pull off to the side of the road to watch the balloon safely. And be careful not to drive or walk onto private property without the landowner's permission. We ask that everyone involved in the festival—including spectators, volunteers and balloonists—be respectful of landowners' rights and responsibilities.







Originally conceived in 2005 as a way to recognize public-sector employers and employees who are striving to provide a safe and healthful workplace, SHAPE certification is conveyed to exemplary public-sector employers only after a thorough review and inspection

of the employer's safety and health policies and procedures by a SafetyWorks! consultant of the Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Standards. There are currently 54 SHAPE-certified worksites in Maine.

SHAPE status keeps workers on the job by reducing workplace injuries, which in turn decreases workers' compensation claims and costs. In addition to keeping people healthy, this program can save governments and taxpayers thousands of dollars a year.

Health Affiliates Maine to serve Maine Nat'l Guard

Health Affiliates Maine of Auburn has been

awarded a contract with the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention to provide suicide awareness training and mental health and substance abuse services to members of the Maine National Guard and their families. Through the contract, services will be provided at no cost to active Guard members who are without health insurance or cannot find a provider who accepts their insurance in their area.



The implementation of a standardized, system-wide PLA program to assess learning from outside the classroom is a goal of the Maine Community College System's Maine is IT! initiative, funded by a \$13 million grant from the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration. This grant initiative coincides with the collaborative work being done between the University of Maine and Maine Community College Systems in the areas of transfer, PLA, and career pathways. In June, the two systems signed

"Elise and Salma


