
Norway Savings supports Community Financial Literacy

Governor's Address: Legislators must stay true to their principles

When I first ran for Governor five years ago, I made it very clear that I would stick to my Republican principles. Today, that hasn't changed.

Dear Maine Taxpayer,

First as a mayor and now as Governor, I held firm to the Republican principles of lowering taxes, reducing the size of government and reforming welfare.

It has not been easy. We took on the special interests, the lobbyists and the political establishment. The state, local and national media have been against us every step of the way. gangs from selling poison in our neighborhoods. They rejected a Constitutional amendment that would give Maine people a voice in eliminating the income tax.

After 5 months, these legislators have done nothing. Sadly, Republican leaders in the Senate joined liberal Democrats to roll back these reforms. They left their Republican principles at the door when they made these back-room agreements with Democrats. Fortunately, most Republicans in



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

Historical Society spotlights Packard-Littlefield Farm

The Lisbon Historical Society will feature a talk by the owners of the historic Packard-Littlefield Farm at its next meeting on Wednesday, June 10. Bob and Ella Mae Packard have developed this unique property, comprised of over 400 acres of farmland, wet lands and a managed tree farm, all bordering the Sabattus River in Lisbon. The entire property is an agricultural conservation easement, ensuring that it will be protected from development and remain a working farm.

The history of the Packard-Littlefield Farm is unusual in that it has been under the ownership of just two families - the Arris's and Littlefields, since its establishment in 1790. The Packards will talk about various members of the Littlefield Family and how a family farm operated in the past in contrast to how one operates today.

Free and open to the public, the program will take place at 7 p.m. in Room 10 of the MTM Center on School Street in Lisbon Falls. Because of renovations to the building, the society archives and museum will not be open; those attending should use the front entrance to the building.

They sound like spoiled little children, who after getting their way over the years are suddenly introduced to the concept of "tough love." Like any child after being told "no," they whine that their parents are being unfair. They feel that their parents have become unhinged and unglued.

Last November Governor Paul R. LePage was re-elected by Maine voters. In doing so, he spent less money on his reelection than either of his opponents. His message and coat tails swept Republican candidates to victory. This led to Republicans taking over the Maine State Senate and gains in the House.

Governor LePage campaigned on tax reform - relief for those of us who actually pay taxes. He envisions and is working hard to eliminate the state income tax. If he accomplishes this, taxpayers should see a hefty increase in their take-home pay.

The Governor may be a politician, but he's not your typical politician. He has something most politicians lack: intestinal fortitude. He is his own man who doesn't dance to the harmonic tunes of progressive special interest groups, nor does he weigh his decisions on which is the path of least resistance.

Some would argue the harsh winter weather keeps people away. But in Maine, an hour or two after a storm, everything is back to normal. 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


In Memory of Michael P. McGuire

curriculum.

"The College is very excited to be launching the Life Science program," said Dean of Academic Affairs Betsy Libby. "The program provides new opportunities for graduates and has already enabled CMCC to expand our transfer relationships with four-year institutions.

"For instance, the University of New England will accept all Life Science credits as applied coursework, and we are working with several other universities to establish transfer agreements for our students. These transfer agreements not only allow for a seamless transition, but in the end, they save our graduates time and money."

The 61-credit program will include 34 credits in lab science, consisting of two-semester sequences in Biology, Chemistry, Anatomy & Physiology and Organic Chemistry. Students seeking admission must have a high school diploma or equivalent and be qualified to enroll in College Writing (or College Writing Seminar) and College Algebra.

The World No. 1 ranked doubles player in 1990, he was a member of the U.S. team which won the Davis Cup that year. Partnering with Jim Pugh, he won the doubles rubbers (individual matches) in all four rounds, securing the team's victory in the final with a win over Pat Cash and John Fitzgerald of Australia.

Lorne Abony will also play both singles and doubles. A former member of Team Canada, Abony is the owner of the Austin Aces, one of seven professional teams in Mylan World Team Tennis, the professional league cofounded in 1974 by Billie Jean King. The team's 2014 roster included former World No. 1 men's singles player Andy Roddick and 2013 Wimbledon women's singles champion Marion Bartoli.
